We probably 19 should have done this earlier in the year, 20 but, thank you, Chief DeSarno, for being 21 here this evening. 22 MR. DESARNO: Good evening, 23 How is everybody tonight? everyone. 24 office was contacted to see if somebody 25 would come down and give some holiday safety

tips, so I see since Chief Graziano was getting a lot of face time this week so I volunteered myself, I have some catching up to do. First before the holiday stuff, just in general people should maintain their furnaces, obviously. If you think you need service, please have it done. You need to have our flues, your chimney flues attended to and keep all water levels, you know, where they should be, that's first and foremost, but onto some of the holiday stuff.

Kitchen safety, everybody is cooking stuff during the holidays so keep your pot handles turned inward and away from the traffic area so you want to avoid accidently spilling or knocking pots off the stove.

Don't clutter up your stovetop with combustibles, dishrags, napkins, potholders, food wrappers, boxes, and the like and try to avoid wearing loose fitting clothing around open flame you know, housecoats, robes, loose fitting sweaters and things as such.

The electrical safety, when you are

hanging your lights avoid plugging two many strands together, try to have as many as you could coming back to either a rated power cord or a safety power strip. Do not run extension cords under carpets, mats and table legs, chair legs, and try not close windows down too tightly on any cords you have going to outside lights, all of those mentioned can cause a fire. Be careful when you are using portable space heaters, don't place them in walkways or heavily trafficked areas or anywhere they can easily tip over and avoid keeping them too close to combustible items.

Everybody likes candles, popular all the time anymore, don't put them by combustibles and curtain, under cabinets or on furniture or nearby furniture or put them in decorative arrangements and stuff. Keep them on a safe sturdy surface, pie plates, tins, cookie sheets, your stovetop and never leave candles unattended.

And for the big one for the holidays, for this holiday especially, if you a cut tree keep it watered and check it

the water in the stand daily, and no matter where you keep them try to keep them watered, they are going to dry out eventually so don't keep them up too much longer six weeks or so, and ideally they say Thanksgiving up, New Year's Day down. For a procrastinator like myself, it's just -- Christmas up and I most likely to have it down by Valentine's Day.

And finally, just to close the paraphrase on something I once said at this podium, nobody wants to see the Fire Department working at their house ever. So for myself and every member of the Fire Department we wish everyone a happy and safe holiday season and Merry Christmas to everyone. Thank you for having me.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. MCGOFF: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Good evening. Joan Hodowanitz, Scranton. Good news and bad Good news for those residents who news. haven't yet got all of the Christmas shopping done, we received a -- friends of the Scranton Public Library are still have their book sale going on at the Library Express on the second floor of the Steamtown Mall. All kinds of books, fiction, non-fiction, children's books, cookbooks, CD's, DVD's, VHS tapes, you name it, even chocolate candy. As an example of the kind of bargains you get, this is Jan Roberts "The History of the World 1901 to 2000," hard cover, mint condition, it retails for \$39.95. It was on sale for \$2. So you are going to get some pretty good bargains if

you go there. The sale continues Friday at Saturday 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Sunday 1 to 5 p.m. at the Steamtown Mall in the second floor of the Library Express so please everybody go because if you haven't figured it you out you are going to need those saved dollars to pay your taxes next year.

Now, Item 3-A, Rossi's audit status, just another change of the date stamp, the same 23 items are listed, I know you mentioned in the caucus that we are progressing pretty much to the draft stage. I would give by firstborn child to see that posted on the city's website, as I would like to see the approved 2015 budget posted on the website, as I would like to see the compliance audit for the pension fund, and all of the monthly control or reports, and everything else that you generally get as backup reading.

I have no idea and I see no logic why they are not posted on the city's website for public review. You know, actually, maybe you don't have a financial problem, at 25 cents a page at the rate I

have been paying for Xerox copies I'm probably making a major contribution to the city.

But that having been said, reading the two articles about the pensions this morning the one for a request to not take the increase next year for the retirees, and the second one about the MMO, the minimal municipal obligation, as I recall in attending both the pension board meetings and these meetings, I mentioned the fact that we paid \$185,300 last year in interest at 8 percent because we missed that milestone. We do this again, we are going to incur another debt. It's going to an interest, but it's a debt. We can't keep doing this.

And what I really don't understand, and I find quite shocking, is the fact that the mayor or at least his business administrator did not personally attend that meeting with they were going to blind side them with a letter requesting them not to take raises for the retirees in 2015. It makes no sense and then to read it in the

paper that the mayor could make no comment because he only found out about it a half an hour earlier, who is leading the city? This is not giving me a warm glow, okay?

You asked questions, you get in answers. If Mayor Courtright wants any credibility as the mayor next year he better start an administration of transparency and start by putting all relevant financial documents on the city's website. If you can't do that, save the city some money and get rid of the website. That's all I have to say.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Doug Miller.

MR. MILLER: Good evening. Doug
Miller, Scranton. Just to begin, basically
just to summarize everything that took place
last week with the budget, again, just to
express my disappointment and the council
and the administration for their lack of
effort in the process and the way I define
the lack of effort is there was no effort
whatsoever in doing anything to cut the

budget. We talk about a need -- citizens talk about the need for 30 percent budget cuts, that didn't happen. We saw a 19 percent tax increase, we saw a tripling of the LST. We saw raises, a creation of jobs, funding our city government on grant money which is something that I find quite embarrassing to be quite bluntly honest with you, nothing to hold our heads up high on.

You know, we listen to members of this council try to justify another tax increase after you slaughtered them with a tax increase last year, not this particular body, but the majority that voted on last year's budget, you know, basically what we did here is just put the nail in the coffin on the city. There is not positive outlook that we have going into the new year. have a lot of the respect for and appreciation for Mr. Gaughan casting the lone dissenting vote on the budget, and I appreciate his statements he made last week because he basically summed it up quite well in regards to the actions of one of his colleagues, and I just find it kind of

amusing how, you know, for years, you know, we listened to this anti-ax increase idea, and that we needed to make cuts and we needed to cut the budget, you know, tough decisions had to be made and we had to think outside the box and we listened to a lot of theatrics, I remember a lot of that in 2012, and I know who put the work into that process, and I'm not going to get into that because that's in the past and there is no need to address that again, but, you know, it's really unfortunate that, you know, we have individuals received on this council who have yet to really roll their sleeves up and do their job and put the effort into You know, fortunately the voters don't have necessarily a great track record themselves. They are just as responsible for the city's situation as anybody seated in office in the city because they are the ones that put you here. And so they certainly don't have any need to walk around town with their heads held high because they haven't done a great job themselves and that's unfortunate.

We ask people to, you know, use some common sense and to educate themselves on what's going on here and they haven't done that, and ultimately that's going to be the demise of this city, unfortunately, unless we do something quickly which at this point, you know, the track record of the majority of this council at this point hasn't given us that indication. I think we are just continuing to go backwards when we thought previously we, you know, were moving forward, but now we are just taking some steps back and that's sad coming here and seeing this takes place. It's really comical at this point and beyond frustrating and I am kind at a loss for words when I come up here.

But, you know, those who are in it and who are truly in it for the right reasons I hope you continue to do the right thing and make decisions based on fact and what's right for the people. You weren't elected to work for the administration, you weren't elected to, you know, work for special interests, which I think has a lot

of influence on what goes on in this community and that's pretty disturbing and if we are not willing to get our acts together and change that we are just wasting our time.

You know, some points have been made up brought about the landfill recently, council finally came out a little more publically and their feelings on the landfill and I appreciate some of the comments and for the most part most of you are in opposition to the expansion because you understand the negative impact that has had not only on Scranton but the entire region, you know, the harmful health effects, but what I did find a little disturbing were the comments made by Mr. Courtright and Mr. Rogan on your unwillingness to give an opinion on the expansion due to the fact that you haven't had a chance to read the DEP report and I just find that be totally absurd. This isn't about reading a DEP report, this is about using a little common sense and realizing one thing, that landfill causes

harm and jeopardizes the health, safety and welfare of the people you represent and that's what you should be thinking about, not a DEP report, where if we know how government politics works. I think we can understand that DEP that DEP has a lot of political influence behind the scenes.

So, you know, we should start using a little common sense and, you know, let's not be that caboose that just follows the train around because, you know, like we have heard the comment about following the magical flute that leads off a cliff, that's all this is, so let's show some leadership, have a backbone, quit playing politics. know as Mr. Morgan, not no steal his thunder, makes a good point about the pretty little suits comments, suits don't think, people do and, unfortunately, we haven't had a lot of thinking going on, and if we don't start thinking soon we should just say goodnight to this city.

Do the right thing, protect the people, our health, safety and welfare and you should be standing up and objecting to

anything that goes on at that landfill and do it now because the future is on the line, and if we just sit back there is going to be a major problem. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Miller. Bob Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council, Bob Bolus, Scranton. You know, for the first time in a long time it's going to my nice to come in and congratulate those councilmen that stood and be counted last week regarding the landfill. I'm just saddened that it wasn't the majority. This is about all of us, it's not about you two guys that didn't stand up and know what's going on with this landfill.

You know, Councilman Tim Burke in
Dunmore out of all of them was the only one
that stood up no matter the repercussions
were going to be. He stood up to the
bullies. Remember, DeNaples is only paying
a penny a ton more than Dunmore. Think of
that, just a penny. I showed you that last
week, that's what's going on, and it's an
insult to all of us that we are not paying 8

cents more.

What you have to do is take the step beyond. If you recall, I supplied council with the lab reports regarding what's going into the landfill from the Marcellus. you recall all of that? Every one of you got a copy of that. Has anybody taken the time, because Bob Bolus submitted it, geez, should we believe it or not? Has anybody taken the time to call the lab and ask them to educate you what's on that lab report? I'm not here to educate you, but they can, they are the specialists. They did the lab report and it's deemed hot. Departmental terms, hot means you got some serious issues there with carcinogen and chemicals. Contact the lab, it's on the reports, and educate yourselves. This is a serious This isn't a gang anymore, it's not about blaming politics, don't rely on DEP. DEP, the higher ups are the big fish playing with the big fish, the little guy on the bottom gets squashed, he is not going to be able to open his mouth or go anywhere because he gets step down. He wants to do

his job, let's be realistic. We all know how politics play. You read the story in the Times the other day that Chris Kelly wrote, you read the story about the quite quiet gone, we all know what's going on here, there are many issues. This landfill is a ticking time bomb. That's what you are dealing with.

Keep in mind years ago, Joe, you guys that are older, you all know what went into the old unpermitted landfill anything and everything that you could throw away went into that landfill, but not one person, DEP or otherwise, has said we are going to get a neutral environmental company, not a relative or a friend or somebody politically controlled, and do drilling on that landfill all the way through the bottom of it, do core drillings that tell us what's in there before you allow him to move \$2 million ton of unpermitted waste to another part of that landfill, and still a million plus ton in the hole and God knows what's underneath it.

You have to stay unified. This is a community issue. You live in the Up Valley,

you drive down Route 6, you smell the stench, you breathe the dust. It's about all of us. You are down valley, you are getting the stench, you are getting the dust, the airborne carcinogens. That's the killer, not what's going in your water supply, it's airborne. You are ingesting it, you are breathing it in.

And people have been around, had cancers and other issues, you all know the seriousness of what I'm saying here. It's not about who, what or where and how much money you want to make, money is matter of what you make here, but don't believe the people in this community. I want to hear from the legislators. Don't sit there and take an idle, oh, let DEP make this, no, that's not why you were put in there. If you were (unintelligible) and elected then you should work for DEP. You are here to work of the people. You need to put strong rules and contingencies in here to stop what's going on.

You turn around and, you know, you can't dismiss what's going on, and we call

it a sanitary landfill. As I just talked about the waste that went in there on unremitted, you call that sanitary? You call what we throw in the garbage that goes into that landfill sanitary? Would you drink the water coming out of their leachate line? Would you take a bath in it? not sanitary. It's a poison. Lyme, they can put out the chemicals going in their right now that's mixed. What did they do, they buried bodies in the past, remember, they threw lyme on them to eat the bodies. You are allowing a poison to go on the top there, be tracked out of there with trucks on a wet muddy day like today, going up and down the highway. You go to your home after you drive down 81 and you pick up some of that debris that falls off these trucks and you wipe your mouth after you touch your door handle, think about what you just ingested. When you are breathing the air it's just blowing, think what you are ingesting, and will you sell our souls for a penny a ton? I applaud you gentlemen that stood up, you represent Scranton, but you

represent a whole community, the whole valley. You are the leaders, now is the time to leave. Don't be bullied because you saw what a bully did to us, 80 cents a ton, yet he has never paid for his two parking garages in the city. That's how we got to do business and deal with it, you're dealing with the health and welfare not only of us but of future generations. That expansion cannot take place, if it closes in five years, so be it, but let's not be bullied and pushed around because somebody that has the money and the political power to own the politicians and make them do what they are This is about us and our voice is a doina. hell of a lot louder than theirs. you.

> MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Bolus. Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council,
Lee Morgan. My comments here are that I'm
surprised at what's happened with the budget
at all, because like I said here previously
I really didn't expect this council to take
the budget apart and really do anything at

all because we have just followed just whatever somebody else has told us because politics come downhill. Everybody in politics does what they are told by somebody else, and that's the way it seems to work, and I just think it's time for the residents to realize a couple of things here, in order to make any changes happen in this the tax money has to be escrowed. You have to starve the city out. You have to stop allowing them to raise any tax revenue at all.

You know, I didn't give up on the idea for the United Neighborhood groups, that's still moving forward and I just wanted to make sure that I understood exactly what was taking place, at this point that's just a formality, that's just a legal formality to make that function, but you know we are talking about the same silly things. You know, we are going to, you know, borrow against the Sewer Authority or the parking garages or we are going to sell them out, and then the city will absolutely have no assets left, none, zero. The voters

really have done a very poor job of picking their leaders, but you know when you vote on sound bites like even they do in the presidential election I guess things don't change, just put a different suit on somebody or a different skirt or a blouse and send them out. Find one nice sentence, you know, just present it to the voters, get a couple of billboards out and that's why our country is in the shape it's in.

You know, the other day I was working and I started laughing because three years after I retire the social security fund will be exhausted and the people we have elected in Washington haven't done anything there for decades and this council, well, it hasn't done anything for decades either because we keep talking about how this person made that recommendation, that person made this recommendation, but my point is why elect people who can't think because if you can't think for yourself and you can't come up with a plan then what are we doing here?

Detroit took a year and a half to

come out of bankruptcy, a year half. have been here a couple of decades. talked about putting all the information on the city's website, I talked about a lot of issues here, when you talk to people and they are more impressed with what kind of suit they have on instead of making smart choices that are legitimate for the voters, this budget was ridiculous. Most people I talked to tell me they can't even afford it. We are funding projects for nonprofits, Mr. Wechsler knows that. Look at North Scranton project, that's an absolute joke. We have so many rental units in the city here that are for rent and unrented, but yet still we are coming up with money for everybody that's got another suit and tie on, but for the little old lady or little old guy in his house that's on social security that can't pay his taxes we have no solution for them. We have no solution for the average person, and we are so disrespectful to the assets we possess. know, the question is how much did the state put into that new parking garage in grants?

And we are going to just say, well, here come take it, we need money.

You know, there the responsibility of council even in regards to the pension funds they had oversight in the charter.

Never happened. They knew that that fund wasn't funded right and now we are going to turn around to the fire and police and say, well, look it, take it on the chin because we didn't do our job and neither did the mayor, but they were elected and you were elected to represent people, and when it comes to a point -- well, you were appointed Mr. Evans, but when it comes to the point when you elect people and they don't do their job what's the point?

And then you wonder why voters don't vote? They know that the most of the people that run for public office are liars. The proof's in the pudding. It's real simple here. I mean, after 20 some years if you can't figure a course of action to turn this city around I don't know what you would call what you presented to the voters over two decades, and I don't know what the house of

line item instead of saying they are waiting for the mayor to set it up an and you are going to deal with Mr. Amoroso's plan? And does Mr. Amoroso really know what he is talking about? Maybe council should just consider resigning and starting over and maybe the mayor should consider the same thing because you are not representing the people, but I will say this, the suits look nice. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Good evening.

MR. UNGVARSKY: I'm Tom Ungvarsky. Last week city council passed the budget for In it, there were several revenue enhancers, one of them was a 19 percent tax increase. Second one was the tripling of the LST tax from \$52 to \$156, and the third one was a doubling of the garbage fee. week in sixth order there are three more revenue enhancers, one is the cost of the permit to have your own home fixed. second one is the \$15 increase going from \$20 to \$35 to get a license for a dog, and the third one is the quality of life. Quality of life has about 29 different things in it, most of them are already on the books, but the reason for bringing it up is so that you can fine people for violations, and I understand that some of the fines can be from two to five hundred There is no need for it if you would just enforce the ones that are already on the books.

Several times the mayor has said that we have to bear the pain, but why does the pain have be bared by just the taxpayers in the city? I'm sure that there is other ways that it can be done. About ten years ago a group was formed they were called the Doomers by the Scranton Times newspaper and they warned the city that you cannot keep going down the same path, apparently we are still going down the same path. Thank you for your attention.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. I'm not mad at you guys, somebody asked me why I was so hostile to you, I'm not mad at any of you. You're probably mad at me. I'm not mad at the mayor, I just wish that he would show the people something. You know, I'm just greatly disappointed in him.

Now, I'm going to pick on you, Pat.

I read that little statement in the paper
that you wanted to take the burden off the
people by selling the authority. Let me ask
you real quick, do you remember this year

we're the biggest producers or the second of gas in the country, this year what did the gas company do to us? They raised the rates 6 percent. I think it was 6 percent, it went up anyway. Biggest producer, they went up. What do you think is going to happen if you sell that Sewer Authority? Their rates will shoot up so fast you wouldn't believe it, and I don't mean to be argumentative about the landfill, as you know, I worked for the DeNaples for years. I was up there this morning for a free cup of coffee before any of you were up, I was there before six. You don't think I get up like that?

MR. WECHSLER: I was up before that.

MR. ELLMAN: You were up. I was up earlier, I walked by dog at 5:30.

MR. WECHSLER: Still up earlier than that.

MR. ELLMAN: But just speaking as a taxpayer, what do you think would happen if we'd have to got to Taylor to dump our garbage in five years or six years or ten years? The rate is going to shoot up because they will be the only one in town.

I think that we ought to keep out of something and keep our noses out of something and worry about Scranton right now and not Dunmore or you will be paying for garbage to go down there to Higgins.

And has any of you ever talked to someone that has got a house for rent for six months or a year or two years? I have the other day, and I bet Mr. Evans has plenty of times, here we are and it's such bad shape and you want to raise taxes. Next year there will have to be another raise and then the garbage will go up and it doesn't stop on people, but there is lot of people I think that have just reached the point they are just no more. I have talked to a dozen or more in the past year and they just can't go no more. It's over with for a lot of people. I live off the equity of my house. I borrow like -- I spent probably over \$1,000 a month and I told you once I get about \$1,000 social security, it takes two of those to pay my taxes and garbage fee. Just think of somebody out there that just doesn't have it no more, you know?

heaters and toilets and pipes breaking and whatever, fixing cars. Between the school board, what's that, 6 percent they are going to go up, and you are 19 you are going to lose some houses, you know, people they just don't have it. I'm telling you, you just -you people just don't associate, if that's the right word, with the people that are hurting like any time I go to Price Rite for my peanuts for the squirrels I talk with three or four people that are in that neighborhood. The houses are run down, you know, my neighborhood the houses are run down and all of those people that are as far as I know they have incomes.

I don't know who read the paper this morning, there is an article there on the 25 years ago and it's says there is a society then that wanted to stop and put the tax payments, you know, in escrow. I don't know how far they got or what happened to them, but if they were talking to a council then like we are now and I remember 25 years ago here. I don't remember too well everything. I could remember sitting out there one time

and a councilman said, "If I had read it, I wouldn't have passed it."

I never heard something so ridiculous from somebody that is supposed to be taking care of our city. And again, I might say some harsh things and get you mad at me, but I love you guys and I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and I hope we have a better year coming then this one has been, and get our mayor down here once in a while. People just want to see him and hear him give us a pep talk or something. Thank you.

You know, the 2015 budget is looking a lot more and more like the city's recovery plans, none of them are adhered to as approved and there is not a whole lot of credibility within. Just last week you passed a budget for 2015 and with less than a week out comes the RFQ for monetizing the parking assets of the city. Now, certainly it's not going to take -- that process is not going to be taking a year yet there is no parking tax

for the spaces at these parking garages as they will be I would assume private, and there is a little bit of a -- I didn't have time to read through all of the RFQ, but there is some question in my mind if we lease them and we get a pittance for them because they need to be changed and we have to accept that, and still have the humongous debt of like another \$30 million; or conversely, in order for somebody to take them we do lease them and say as the owner we will make the needed repairs. We don't have the money to do that. So that's a little bit nonsensical to me. And also, where is the money in the budget for -- how much we think we can get for those garages and the expenses that accrued to that.

I don't think we can keep on doing what we are doing. We just keep doing more of the same. We look at selling assets, raising taxes, raising fees, meanwhile the debt keeps increasing and I think this morning's paper was the icing on the cake for me. I do not see how we can get from here to out of recovery in eight years, five

years, three years. If either or any of the five of you see how that's going to happen based on the budget you passed last week I would certainly like to hear you share that, but I don't think that -- unless you can do that I think it's time we cut our losses and maybe give the mayor one more chance to have a come to Jesus meeting with all of the effected parties, with the debtors, with the stakeholders and with the taxpayers and the citizens because the way I see it all we are going to do is bleed a lot of people dry, they are going to lose their homes and they are going to lead miserable rest of their lives because they have been displaced and I don't think that's fair. If we are going to end up in the same spot that we are that we are in now why bleed everybody? Why not have the mayor call, as I said, all of these people together, sit them down in one room with an out-of-town mediator who is qualified and say, "You've got six weeks to come up with a balanced budget. Don't care how you do it, it will have to be passed by council, I have to approve of it, but you've

got six weeks and if at the end of the six weeks we don't have a credible balanced budget we are going to the state to seek bankruptcy and receivership."

I just think extending the pain is not an option anymore. It's just -- I don't see how we are going to get there from here. I don't think any of you can tell us tell me how we are going to get there from here and so I think the time is now and it's time to stop playing games, stop bleeding people dry and hurting and I hope you will consider that. Thank you.

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

McGoff, just a few things this evening. I have been a professional manager for over 30 years and one of the things that I have learned along the way is that it's important to do self-evaluation on how your performance is, so when I was sworn in on council I picked a few things to judge how I'm doing and to judge how the

I consider that at a lack of performance or failure on myself and also on the administration. This year we have increased our taxes, and hopefully when we look back at this again next year we will be able to pay our MMO in full.

Right now we are hearing some positive things on the TAN. We have some banks interested, but, once again, we haven't had that finalized yet, so our evaluation on that is not complete yet.

Next week I'll talk about some of the positive things that we have accomplished, but right now I am not satisfied with my performance or with the

We heard tonight someone mentioned about Detroit and I was interested in reading today that Detroit got out of bankruptcy so fast, but Detroit had a couple of things that we don't have, the first thing was the State of Michigan offered them considerable assistance in getting out of The second thing that they their problem. got and that we have not achieved yet is they got concessions from their current employees and their retired employees in terms of their pensions. And the third thing I found quite interesting and perhaps is something that we can look at here, in Detroit there was a series of many nonprofits made sizeable contributions to the pension fund, and I'm thinking maybe when we talk about the nonprofits and the PILOT program one of the complaints is that they get nothing tangible from contributing to the city and they are always worried about the black hole, perhaps if the nonprofits were able to make contributions,

I know there is not millions like there were in Detroit making contributions from the nonprofits to the pension fund would be more acceptable to them, so that's -- and I congratulate Detroit for getting out of their bind, they were \$7 billion in the hole.

The one thing that, the final thing I have is more of a cautionary tale, recently on East Mountain there have been some packages delivered by the US postal service that have been stolen that are being left at homes where people aren't home and they are working, so I would caution people to be careful having packages delivered to their homes if they are not going to be there and I perhaps they want to ask, you know, the mailman or mail person to drop them off at a neighbor's house so they don't disappear before Christmas. That's all I have tonight, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, two very brief items I'd like to bring up. The first one that Councilman Wechsler touched on a little

bit is the TAN. We did discuss in our caucus tonight a little about the TAN and legislation is expected for next week on that anticipation note. discuss the budget to offer suggestions, to put forth ideas, to give your opinion and to simply be engaged in the process. While we may not always agree, this is what the process is and should be so thank you again for your involvement.

With that said, I was somewhat disappointed that more citizens did not come before us to be directly involved in that budget dialogue. I am and always have been someone that is willing to listen, to search out new ideas, and try to affect positive change when I can. So please stay engaged, stay positive, come to the council meetings if you can, e-mail me or my colleagues any ideas that you might have to improve our city, especially related to the budget, and let's see what we with accomplish when we work together.

On a totally different topic, last evening I was out for a short drive and I said -- I have to say, you know, when it snows around Christmas time our city really is beautiful. The light show at Nay Aug is spectacular and I'd like to personally thank

the Parks and Rec Department and administration for their commitment to the light show and all the hard work that goes into that as well as the county for the decorations around the courthouse square in downtown Scranton, and to the hundreds and maybe thousands of homeowners and businesses who decorate the outside of their properties for the holidays you really make our city look well, look good.

I want to offer a special shut out to Tom and Marilyn Falke, whose Moosic Street properties are a must stop for generations of Scrantonians to see at the holiday and to Jerry and Carol Smurl, good friends of mine, who have turned the corner of Prospect and Orchard Street into a winter wonderland, and who this year have added a pink gazebo as a tribute to the Susan Komen Foundation. So thanks again to everyone that makes Christmas season a little bit brighter and a little happier for each of us each and every year.

Finally, my time spent on the City
Planning Commission was mirrored by Danny

Noone's time spent on Scranton City Council.

While Danny may have disagreed on several issues over those years, Danny was always a fair, honest and he was a true gentleman, so he will be deeply missed and I offer my deepest condolences to his family. Thank you.

I spoke to the resident yesterday about the condition and history of the road and I will be speaking with our DPW director about this issue to see if it can be resolved and included in the paving project next year and I will keep those residents updated on any progress.
