I would like to 20 just make note that on tonight's agenda 21 there are two items that we will suspend the rules to move to Sixth and Seventh Order, 22 23 one is the listed as 5-A -- or 5-B, excuse 24 me, which is the tax anticipation note for 25 2015, that's accompanied by an emergency

certificate and if passed in Fifth Order it will be moved to Sixth and Seventh Order for final passage.

Also, item 6-A, which is the contractor's licenses and fees, there will be a motion to move that to Seventh Order for final passage. That will also be a public comment period prior to Seventh Order if anyone wishes to speak to those two items in particular.

Also, just two items of note.

First, the Friends of Connors Park

Association is planning to place a veterans memorial at Connors Park and to help fund that what they are doing is they are -- part of the memorial involves a flag pole and sort of a pathway around a brick path and what they are doing is they are selling bricks that would be inscribed with veteran's name or whatever it was that you felt was appropriate for the memorial. I do have some forms here. The bricks are being sold at \$65 a piece or two for \$100. If you are interested, you can contact it's Bob Gattens and the phone number is 570-561-7584

and I'm going to ask if ECTV will also run this, you know, the promo and the contact number, okay?

And the second thing, I attended a presentation or an announcement today at the vacant East Scranton Junior High School or what was the Madison Grade School, and the announcement was that it was a three-part project among Greenspace Properties, who are the owners of the property, Hilderbrand Learning Centers and the University of Scranton. What is going to happen it's going to be converted by Greenspace properties into a childhood learning center on the first floor and 24 apartments on the second and third floor for graduate students at the University of the Scranton.

The University is leasing the building from Greenspace so that it will continue to be a taxable property and not a property of the University of the Scranton, but it's sounds like a great renovation for that building, which has been vacant for I believe about 13 years. I actually taught in that building for a year so I do know

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that it does need some renovation. And that is all.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. MCGOFF: Gerard Hetman.

MR. HETMAN: Good evening, Council.

Gerard Hetman from Lackawanna County's

Community Relations Department. Good to see you as always.

To begin this evening, on Tuesday afternoon, November 25, the Lackawanna County Commissioners along with our state senator and representatives from Lackawanna County as well as management from Colts, the County of Lackawanna transit system, met with the Pennsylvania Secretary of Transportation in Senator Blake's office in the state capital in Harrisburg. The topic of the meeting was to address the paybacks that are due from Colts to the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation. Many of us are aware of the situation and the topic of the meetings was centered on trying to find a solution where an agreement could be reached between Colts and PennDOT with the

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assistance of the commissioners and our state senator, again representatives, where the agreement would allow Colts to make payments in a fashion where the state would be made whole and would be fully reimbursed for the monies that were overpaid in previous years, while at the same time reaching a solution that would allow as much of Colts current service to continue uninterrupted during that cycle.

Shortly after Colts proposed their changes over the last few months our offices, as I'm sure possibly your offices, and I know the offices of, again, of our state officials were flooded with visits, e-mails, phone calls, and letters from Colt's riders, their families, and folks in the community who use that service and we saw from that that all of the service is very important, particularly Saturday ridership. And some of us if we don't ride the bus on Saturdays often we think of that as a recreational amenity on Saturdays, but the reality that we saw is that the riders who ride Saturday very often do that to go

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to work, to get groceries and essentials, to visit relatives or friends, some of whom may be infirmed that they way not be able to reach during the week so the Saturday service is a lifeline for many, and that was very much a topic of discussion during that meeting.

And I was fortunate to be present at that meeting in an observer's capacity and I believe I can report, and I think all of the officials there would reiterate my feelings, that the meeting was productive. There was very much a reciprocal tone of cooperation between the secretary and his staff as well as all of the elected officials and their staff in the room. I don't have any anything new to report on that situation since the meeting, but as Colt's and PennDOT officials work forward I'll be certain to report any developments that come up as soon as they happen, and again, we hope to see a situation reached -- a solution reached in the situation we, again, the state is able to be made whole for the overpayments, and Colt is able to keep as much service as

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possible going forward.

Also, on a Christmas note for the holiday season, the Electric City Trolley Museum, just two items to note, their trolley rides with santa, which have been going on for the month of December, are still taking place this weekend. The trolley departure time is 10 a.m., 11 a.m., 12:30 p.m., 2:00 p.m., and 3:30 p.m. from the Electric City Trolley Museum on Cliff Street in Scranton on the grounds of Steamtown. Reservations are required and they can be made by calling the Trolley Museum at 570-963-6590.

And also, the Trolley Museum for the remainder of the month running through

December 31 is the annual festival of trees exhibit, and I mention this because the museum is open every day during the month except for Christmas Day from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day, and during the week actually from the December 22 through the 31st, so a little more than a week, there is a special \$2 admission charge for everyone that attends the museum. Normally there is a few

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different prices for admission, but for those days, again, September 22 to the 31 all of admission to the museum is \$2 regardless of age or anything else. So again, if anyone has any questions about that they are welcome to call the Trolley Museum 570-963-6590.

And then also on a last Christmas-related note, on behalf of the commissioners we would like to thank everyone who attended the Lackawanna Heritage Valley santa train stops, particularly the last stop on the line here in downtown Scranton, which this year was moved to the Steamtown National Historic site due to the ongoing construction on the State Office Building parking lot. rough count that we had from the National Park Service rangers was approximately 600 people came out to Steamtown that day for free to see santa come in on the train, and it was a great atmosphere, just a fantastic afternoon, and the crowd, this is my third year of being on the committee to plan that event. The crowd was absolutely

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astonishing. It was a great atmosphere and many families, individuals, people of all ages and shapes and sizes were there and it was a great atmosphere, we hope to see it grow in future years, so our thanks to everyone who attended that.

And just lastly, I'd like to thank council, as well as your staff and all city officials for your cooperation this year. I do have to leave after my remarks this evening to speak to your counterparts in Clifton Township, who had a rescheduling of their meeting from their normal time, but I will try to return actually when their meetings lets out for the remainder of the meeting if you're still in session. again, on behalf of the commissioners, thanks to each of you for your cooperation this year and we hope to see cooperative things happen next year between the City of Scranton and Lackawanna County. So thank you, gentlemen, and ladies.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Hetman.

MR. HETMAN: Thank you. And have a Merry Christmas and great holiday season.

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MR. GAUGHAN: You, too.

MR. MCGOFF: Paula Yaugi.

MR. YAUGI: Mr. McGoff, and members of Council, thank you for giving me this opportunity to speak. My name is Paula My brother, Fred Yaugi, lived on Beach Street in Scranton and he died unexpectedly the beginning of August, and I have spent the last few months cleaning his house out and I sold one car and he has a BMW that I cannot drive, it's a standard shift, and we had it parked in his driveway covered because it's a convertible top and we were afraid of it getting ruined in the winter, and on Wednesday night, December 3, at 9 p.m. I received a call from a neighbor of my brothers that there was a ticket on his BMW. Mind you, the BMW was covered and it was parked in his driveway. The ticket from Scranton Permit, Inspections and Licensing Division and it was marked "Junk and Abandonded" and it would towed within 48 hours if not removed. It was in his own driveway.

I did not sleep at all that night.

I couldn't get over that night to see the ticket, and in the morning I called the city and I spoke to Mr. Jack Liptai, an inspector, and he met me at my brother's house, and here is the ticket, and it got ruined because of the rain, and it's marked "Junk and Abandoned" and it would be towed within 48 hours and the time it was ticketed was 12:15. I was at my brother's house until 12:20 that morning and nobody knocked on the door to ask. And so Mr. Liptai was a true gentleman and he called the office and he spoke to the person and said that this should never have been ticketed.

And I am wondering how that could be? How this person, you can't even read her name but he said it was a female inspector that was off that day, the fourth, how she could ticket without picking up and looking that it was a sticker, that it was a legal sticker. I had the car inspected in September. It was the registration was due in September, I had a sticker, and I thought maybe somebody took the sticker off. It was there, the inspection sticker was on the

windshield, and I saw it in the paper on your agenda in 7-A that you are going to be looking at the quality of life and violations and I cannot believe that the person that inspected did not even take the time to pick up the cover and see that it was legal, and I wonder how this could happen.

So as not to be harassed all winter with this issue, I had the car moved to a heated garage over the weekend. Please be sure of what you are ticketing. The city has enough problems than to do this to legal vehicles and I'm wondering how this can happen, because I drive Harrison Avenue, it's one of the few streets I travel, and you don't know a car is abandoned until you see it all winter long covered with snow and flat tires and this was in my brother's driveway. How could that happen?

MR. GAUGHAN: Myself and Councilman Evans just actually had this conversation a few moments ago that there needs to be policies and procedures in place so that over zealous inspectors or whoever don't go

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on a ticketing spree for no reason and, you know, it's a problem. I, myself, have heard from different people throughout the city that they have had issues, also. So I think it should be looked into.

MS. YAUGI: Well, I just hope whatever you are going to do decide that you take into consideration that was a private driveway, it was a legal car, it was covered, and I'm wondering did she get a call from someone? There is a bar across the street and I know they have parked in his driveway, they have blocked his driveway, he had to have a sign put up "No Parking," but they still did so maybe because the BMW was in the middle of the driveway they couldn't park in there and so somebody from the bar called and reported We don't know. But what made her go on personal property? Does she drive the city and did she get a call, that's what I would like to know?

MR. GAUGHAN: I think that maybe you should have a meeting with Director Hinton from the Department to make sure that this

MS. YAUGI: Thank you very much.

MR. MCGOFF: Leanne Theoni.

MS. THEONI: Good evening, Council.

I'm here to speak to you tonight to possibly shed some light on how the choices you make as a council negatively impact your residents. I was born in North Scranton, raised in West Scranton and I'm not a homeowner raising my children in South Scranton. Our house, which my husband and I purchased in 2005, is a modest, three-bedroom, two bath, brick ranch on a quiet street. Our taxes on this 1600 square foot ranch total \$5,200 when you combine school and property taxes. Meanwhile, on our block other taxpayers have bills half as much. The properties I mentioned have larger lots and more square footage, but our bills don't compare.

In addition to this tax bill, my husband and I contribute \$5,100 to the city's wage tax so if you haven't been doing the math allow me. \$5,200 in total tax, \$5,100 in wage tax makes for a grand total

of \$10,300 a year. \$10,300 each year, which is roughly 7 percent of our income that goes to this city and municipality.

And what do I get for it? Every time I take my children to the park I have to do a quick sweep to make sure my children aren't playing amongst hypodermic needles, trash, litter, or the one time at Connell Park four gentlemen were smoking marijuana while my kids were on the slide. Luckily my husband cajoled me into calling the police instead of approaching them like I initially intended.

You sit up here and you go about your business while the educated people flee the city. What's left for my children? They will sit next to a classmate whose parents are not raised in this city, were not taught the sense of pride that generational Scrantonians have known for decades. The poor choices of many have created a renter society where no one has any real attachments to our neighborhoods and when I tell people I want to move to a surrounding neighborhood out of the City of

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Scranton I hear, "Taxes won't be any better up there."

But I can guarantee you I won't be paying \$10,300, and I can guarantee you I will be surrounded by families that take pride in ownership, and I can guarantee you that I won't have to worry about my son or my daughter picking up something dangerous at a park. Do something admirable, do something for your residents who when given the opportunity to purchase their very first home picked Scranton because they couldn't imagine raising their children or their family anywhere else. Do something quick because I will soon be saying "I used to live in Scranton."

MR. SPINDLER:

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs. Theoni. Les Spindler.

Good evening, Council. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. It's been awhile since I have been here, my work schedule wouldn't allow me to get here in time, now it's a little different every other week

maybe.

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As I said, I couldn't get here to talk about the budget, but I just wanted to make a couple of comments about it, I know it's too late. You know, everybody was criticizing the mayor because taxes are high and other stuff was raised and this and that, but nobody said it was going to be easy, the mayor was left with a mess. came into a mess which was 12 years in the We had 12 years of mismanagement by making. the previous administration and I think the mayor is doing the best he possibly could. I don't like paying higher taxes, but his hands are tied. We had to raise taxes to try and raise some money until other revenue sources come in, but I'm not happy, but we got to grin and bear it, we got to try and help the city out, and for anybody that thought that the city would turn around in a year they are very naïve I hear people coming up here and criticizing the mayor because, you know, he is not doing anything, you know what, I said it as soon as he was elected people have to be patient.

said, you are not going to turn around 12 years of mismanagement in one year. It might take 12 more years to do, but I think the mayor is doing a heck of a job, and I heard one person come up here and say he thinks he should resign. That's the most ridiculous thing I ever heard in my life, after one year asking a mayor to resign, but that's all I have to say on that.

I am disappointed that the commuter tax wasn't enacted because I'm one person that thinks we should have it and any Scranton resident I think that comes up here and talks against it I don't think they want to the city to do well, maybe they should move somewhere else if they are not happy.

And on that note, you know, everybody else wants us to help them, all of the other communities around there, but when comes time to help us, they don't want to do it. An example, two weeks ago there was a tragic explosion in Dunmore where a woman lost her life, the next day in the paper I saw a Scranton fire truck right there at the scene. You know, we were helping other

communities out, no other communities want to help us out when we need help, so let the people that don't want to pay the commuter tax remember that, and the people who live in the city talk against it. Let them move to Dunmore and Dickson City or whatever if they don't like it here.

Again, about the budget,

Mr. Gaughan, you said you didn't vote for it
because you wanted concessions made by

unions, whether you know it or not the

unions made a huge concession. They had a Supreme Court order award over \$40 million, they are taking half of that. That's a huge concession. And also, they have been very patient, they could probably own half the city by now, but they chose to wait and wait, you know, they are waiting until they get their reward, so saying they didn't make

and maybe the mayor will talk to them, right

concessions that a totally wrong statement

now isn't the time. Like I said, they are

being very patient and they are letting the

city off the hook.

Next thing, I was glad to see I

think it was in yesterday's paper that the city is getting a \$5 million loan to pay towards that Supreme Court award and I think that's a step in the right direction and I think that shows that the mayor is doing a good job because in the previous administration the banks they wouldn't look at us to loan us money anymore. Now we are getting a loan and I think the banking community sees that we are trying to turn the corner here.

So for all of the naysayers, like I said, I think in his first year the mayor did as good as job as possible. I know that anybody could have done a better job, and like I said, I think getting this \$5 million loan I think that proves it, and I think the future is bright and I think he surrounded himself with a lot of good people. People come here and criticize BA Bulzoni, I know Dave Bulzoni, I worked with him for a long time, he is a very smart man, and I think he was one of the best hires the mayor would have made.

Lastly, one reminder, I have worked

at the Bob Bolus Christmas dinner, I think this is like my 12th year now I volunteered, it's a very rewarding thing, and that is a week today, next Christmas day, I know there is a notice outside so everybody that wants to volunteer just show up at St. Patrick's at noon next Thursday and I'll be there for the 12th year in a row.

Other than that, I want to wish everybody, all faiths, happy holidays and happy new year and we'll see you next year.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Spindler.

Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, Scranton taxpayer. Gentlemen, all I want for Christmas is the 2013 city budget. Is it soup yet?

MR. MCGOFF: Budget or audit?

MR. HODOWANITZ: The budget. I'm sorry, the audit, I stand corrected. The audit, where is it? You remember that historical document we are supposed to have seven months ago? Any progress? Because I know this is your last meetings for the year

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so ou won't convene again until January.

MR. MCGOFF: I have not heard anything recently.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okav. Next topic, PFM Financial Advisory Services. April, council approved a resolution to grant them a contract from March of 2014 to March of 2018. At that time they weren't factored into the 2014 budget so it was determined that their fees for the year 2014 would be deferred until 2015. My question is basically do we have an estimate of how much they have charged per bill? How many billable hours and what their total fee will be for 2014 that would apply to the 2015 budget, and I want to verify are those monies falling under the line item "Professional Services in the BA's Office"? is that where that money is going to be for 2015?

MR. MCGOFF: The only thing I know for sure is that there is a fee for financial advisory in the TAN at \$29,000 and that will be taken out of the proceeds of the loan.

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MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. And the next item is the pensions. The first thing, the MMO that's due on December 31, the minimal municipal obligation payment, has the administration determined whether or not they will pay the minimum amount or are they going to fall short?

MR. MCGOFF: It will be short.

MS. HODOWANITZ: They can't use any money from that \$5 million loan or anything else, the TAN, anything? It would seem to me that if I knew, and this is a fixed cost that they are going to have every year, the MMO, so they know this is coming every year, we knew from last year what happened when we missed paying that we ended up paying \$185,300 in interest for a late payment, so we know there is a consequence for missing that payment, okay? Yes, there are many other faxed payments that the city has, but certainly there has got to be a way of prioritizing these obligations, including the MMO, so that if you have to pay one late you choose one that's not going cause you an extra cost, like interest. I don't

understand. We knew this was going to be coming, how we could end up missing it a second year in a row while we didn't put a pile -- put aside a pile of money for that purpose. I don't know, maybe I'm just well enough educated. Is there a reason that I'm missing?

MR. MCGOFF: Only that there is a revenue shortfall and the choices are we could pay the MMO and miss maybe three payrolls, which is not going to happen.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I wouldn't recommend that either, but we knew about this from January 6 when the mayor took office, so I wonder if it's going to happen three years in a row, I hope not.

And finally, the pensions themselves, the Times-Tribune has been doing a series of articles on the pensions and the pension problem, and I'm very interested to read about the 1978 state law which trumps all municipal laws apparently that puts us behind the eight ball in that we cannot stop the pensions of convicted felons after the fact, and I understand, you know, the way

the law was written why that happened, but two things we have to look at, we have to look at our local ordinances involving pensions and the state law, and if need be and they have to be modified, changed or rewritten we need to start looking at doing that for the future, you know? I just don't think it's right, you know, that we should pay a penny to a convicted felon. It's just not right. It sends the wrong message. I'm all for paying extra taxes for those public officials and servants who have served honorably, but not one sent to a convicted felon. That's all I have to say.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I'm not going to mention the pensions because I have been doing it for 12 years. I know more about the pensions and what happened than any of you up there, I think I told you more reasons. When we first came out, I'm not going to really get into it, I wish Brian Reap had kept on council, that's

all I got to say. He is the only one that ever made sense up there.

Let's go with the quality of life.

You know what the great impedence of the quality of life in Scranton is? City government. You are the problem that the quality of life is declining in the city. Every time you raise taxes you lower the standard of living of everybody in the city. Now, you have some type of that 12,500 I guess cushions you a little, but it doesn't cushion us, and you have done everything you could to destroy the city.

Many times people came before you not as a nose on your face, but as a suggestion, suggestion that should have been looked into instead of tossed away. The secret of Scranton, the only survival of Scranton is regional government, you got to look at that. Not the Abingtons. Abingtons only means money coming to a certain individual with grants, but has nothing to do with the city itself. You have got to reach out to your surrounding communities, not over the mountain. It's the only way

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you are going to survive. You are not going to -- you are already reaching out, but you are reaching out in their pockets. The right to work tax going up to \$156, it's got a fancy name to it, but it's a right to work tax, and you got to look at it as a right to work tax and not give it a fancy name. You try to do everything to sweet water it. That's not the way to do it. You got to tell the people what's happening.

I couldn't do nothing, I told the people vote with your brain instead of your name or party, did they listen? No. is why we are where we are now. People did not use good judgment when they elected They like the name, Gatelli and people. Fanucci are gone because they didn't like their names, but their policies are the same as yous people, and that's the bad part of it are the policies that are in trouble, not the name. You got to look at an individual as an individual, what he believes in and what he works for, but people didn't vote that way, they voted Democratic party because that's the way they vote. Mr. Rogan

had to run as -- was a Republican, had to run as a Democrat, he got elected. That's not right, they should have elected Mr.

Rogan as a Republican because he believed in that philosophy, but unfortunately people don't do that.

And where we are now has taken many years to go and many years many people have come to this podium and told me what was going to happen and I blame a lot on the Times for ridiculing a lot of people, calling them a Legion of Doom. Believe me, they weren't here to profess doom, they loved Scranton or they wouldn't have come and wasted all their time to come before you, they would have just moved out.

A lot of people in this city are disgusted with the government, and I don't blame them, whether they are going to change or not I have no idea, but I tell you one thing a lot of people are going to lose their homes. And any time you quicken the way you can process homes or really do anything to the people, we don't have to have all of these Draconian laws, whether a

thing like calling this quality of life, we are not Nazi Germany. We don't tell the people over there that we are taking you out to a beautiful place to live and you can spread yourself. We are Scrantonians. know that we have to keep our yards clean or cut our grass or do whatever it requires to make your neighborhood liveable. We don't need oppression, and that's what yous people are, you are the most oppressive council that ever sat there, and there is no way to look at it. I keep telling everybody your government is your enemy. Your weapon is your vote. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. QUINN: Good evening, Ozzie Quinn, president of the Hill Neighborhood Association. First, I want to concur with Councilman Evans in regards could 7-F. too, was on the planning commission and that is spot zoning and I remember the old zoning ordinance, it looked like it made a mess out of the whole neighborhoods of the City of Scranton because they allowed spot zoning.

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Once you start something, you change the whole zoning so I concur with Mr. Evans on that.

The other thing has the city council received or you aware of the Scranton Municipal Recreation Authority's audit? Have they given a copy of an audit yet, is it completed? I know last summer I asked for a copy and they gave me a balance sheet and they said they were doing an audit it's The reason I'm concerned December now. about it, you know, we got to raise money for kids swimming free, okay, Kids Swim Free, and you people, the council, set a line item for swimming, okay? And I want to see just the Recreation Authority's audit to see is there money in there for chemicals, how much money is in there, you know, and whatever because are they any findings whatever, okay?

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Quinn, I might suggest you see one of the members from the Recreation Authority, Shawn McAndrew is here, and he has been a regular attendee at our meetings. You want to talk to him after

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the meeting, he is right in the front row.

He would probably have a little more insight on that than we would.

MR. QUINN: Okay. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: You are welcome.

MR. QUINN: Okay, I want to talk about the quality of life ordinance. I want to commend Councilman Evans for bringing that forward to the City of Scranton. research that he done and, you know, up in the Hill Section neighborhood we are for it because there is over 500 absentee landlords in the Hill neighborhood and it's not really a policing. You know, there is people who own their properties and keep up their properties and they try to keep the value of their properties up, and the fact is that they are a lot of people that do not care, okay? It's like Police Chief Carl Graziano, the broken glass theory. If there is a broken window someplace and if it's not fixed it continues and pretty soon you got blight and you got crime. Somebody throws a piece of paper on the ground, pretty soon the next person throws a piece of paper on

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the ground, and what you have you just have neighborhoods that are blighted, and I think had is going to be what's an exterior situation where it's exterior more or less looking at what's happening in the neighborhoods and try to eliminate this blight, and there is a lot of blight. Take a walk around. I walked around with Mr. Evans and Mr. Hinton, you know what? People had their laundry out on the hedges drying their laundry. People put their laundry drying on the front porch, you know? They put couches and other household furniture on the front porch. I mean, that's ridiculous and there has got to be some approach to it.

Now, in order to respect the other homeowners that live in there and in the area it's got to pass, and I appreciate it the other council looking at and hopefully you will pass it tonight. Thank you on that, okay?

Now, streetlights in the Hill Section, you know, there is no one, I mean, this is going on for months and months and

months, we have seven streetlights out, and people are saying, "When is my streetlight going to be get fixed?

All right? Now, in all due respect if that contractor has too much of a workload with his private contract then it should be -- somebody else should do it, okay? There is no doubt about it, okay? Now, I looked at Allentown, and Allentown has a population of 100,000 population persons, and you know who is doing their streetlight repairing? The maintenance, traffic maintenance department, and there is no reason, you know, why the City of Scranton, we have a cherry picker, why the City of Scranton DPW traffic maintenance cannot do the work of an outside contractor.

You know, as a matter fact, we should look at a lot of outside contracts that a lot of the in-house -- could be done in-house by the employees. A little elbow grease is all it takes, okay? I really hope that you look at that contract for the streetlights and try to something about, this is not my opinion, this is a proposal,

okay, and I hope you look at it from the standpoint of a proposal, and I would appreciate that.

And again, I thank Councilman Evans for what he has done in bringing that to the City of Scranton and I'm sure it will work out, you know, it's just a matter of fact that a lot of people get concerned, but I'm glad that they are getting concerned because now I think we are going to end a lot of that blight that's going on in the city that shouldn't be happening. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Quinn, if I could just mention with the street lighting, and IU agree with you that it's one of the things that probably can be done better in-house than contracted out, if residents recall when we had the firm before Joyce was awarded the contract we had the same issue where initially when they first were awarded the contract you would submit the pole number and the light number and it would get fixed in a matter of a week, and then Joyce then -- you know, they took forever, forever and switched to Joyce and initially they

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were very successful with getting the lights put in and I think all of us on council have encountered problems where people have submitted requests and, you know, sometimes over a month to get a light bulb fixed, which certainly isn't acceptable.

MR. QUINN: We recently had a rash of car break-ins in the Hill Section in the areas were three or four of the lights were out, you know, and obviously it accommodates the criminals when the lights are out and it's ashame. Thank you very much.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.

Doug Miller, Scranton. I really had no intentions of coming down tonight, but after listening to some of the previous residents this evening I thought a lot of good points were made early on in the meeting. I caught the tail end of Mr. Sbaraglia. Also, heard from a woman that came forward speaking on, you know, the amount of taxes that she pays and how she is a very concerned about the future for her children in this community

and I really hope that this council actually paid attention to those statements because I thought that she pretty much summed up the state of this city within those five minutes that she was up at this podium.

You know, we talk about the taxation, we talk about blight and, you know, tonight we have a quality of life ordinance on the agenda and, you know, quality of life right now in general, you know, isn't too good. As we look around the city is pretty much dead at this point and that's reality. Unfortunately, we haven't allowed reality to set in. A lot of us are still in this delusional fairytale world that we are getting somewhere and we are not.

You know, it's nice to talk about quality of life and to go through the neighborhoods and punish people for not keeping their properties intact and, believe me, I understand there are some homeowners out there and property owners who do neglect their properties for unfortunate reasons, but for the most part there are a lot of

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people out there who make every attempt to upkeep their property and to keep that quality of life, you know, up in a positive manner, and then there are those who just simply can't do it because we have a government who has continued year after year after year to come forward and suck the life out of them, suck them dry. You did it again this year with your budget, you did it last year, and you are just going to continue to do it, and so it's nice to go around and slap people on the wrist and tell them you better get your property up to code or else, and then in the same token come forward and say, "I'm going to raise your taxes 57 percent, 16 percent, we are going to triple the LST, we are just going to make your life a living nightmare, just nothing but misery."

And that's where we are at right now in this community, and as we get set to ring in 2015 there is not one optimistic thing that we can look at right now. You know, a statement was made that, you know, perhaps if our elected officials don't get their

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acts together they should consider resigning. That's not an absurd statement to make, that's where we are right now and we have every right to come forward and make that statement because right now we have people in place that don't have an ability to lead. They are bought and paid for. They are paid puppets. They represent special interests. They are not looking out for the residents of this community because if they were there things would be a lot different right now, we would certainly be singing a much different tune than we currently are.

This council didn't make any attempt whatsoever to look out for the residents of this city. You looked out for special interests and you looked out for those control you, quite frankly, and you may not like to hear those statements but that's reality. And it's just really sad, you know, when you hear people come forward and share their stories and what's really sad is we have a government that just turns a blind eye, falls on deaf ears time and time again,

and that's why this city just really isn't going turn around any time soon because we don't take these issues serious. You know, the solution is always taxation and we are forcing people, we are giving people every reason to want to get the heck out of here. My generation, forget it, they are gone. I guess I'm the only nut that stayed around and a few handful of others that decided to stay around, but there is no opportunity here and there is not going to be any opportunity because we don't have any leadership in the city.

You know, look around, downtown, no jobs, neighborhoods are falling apart, it's easy to blame the homeowners, is it really the homeowners we should be blaming or should we be blaming our government? I think we really need to look in the mirror as we head into the new year and, unfortunately, we lack any creative thought in our government. You know, we listen to these consultants that come forward with their suggestions and their solutions and claim to have all of these grand plans, we

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MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

listen to all of the plans, we haven't had one work yet because we keep relying on people that they don't live here. Mr. Amoroso really know what's going on around here? I don't think he does. was he brought here to begin with? really never got an answer to that question. Who really did recommend Mr. Amoroso and why was he here? Why did we elect a mayor? did we elect five members to sit up on this

don't because we just keep kicking the same can down the road and we expect a different result.

Do we have an answer to that?

council?

Thank you.

And to basically sum up the holiday season for this city it's pretty bleak, we are on life support and the only question we have to ask ourselves right now is when do we pull the plug and when do we march down to the courthouse with a bankruptcy petition because that's where we are right now. Thank you and I wish the residents of this city Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

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MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.

Bob Bolus, Scranton. There is a question I have on 7-F, and I agree with Mr. Evans I don't think we should be doing spot-type planning or zoning within the city. I think Geisinger needs to come forward, put a comprehensive plan of exactly what's going to go on and what they intend to do, not take a facility just because they bought it at an auction and just wait until they throw some at the dartboard and decide what they are going to do with it. Everybody else once you set a precedent you are going to live that from now and forever throughout the city because you will not be able to deny any citizen or any business coming into this city to make a change once you set that precedent without having a comprehensive plans of exactly what they are going to do and go through the proper procedure through zoning, meetings, council to verify and have citizen participation what's going to happen in their city? So I would is that you table this tonight until you have a solid concrete foundation of what's going on there because

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what they are doing is just wrong. You can't just do what they are doing.

Tomorrow Mr. Rogan may want to put something up that he tried once before, okay, you can come in and tell them, "I want a spot zoning permit" and they can't deny it, so don't start a precedent that you are going to regret down the road, so that's where you got to start there.

The other thing that I had a question on is 7-A, an ordinance adopting the quality of life and violations and tickets. I mean, quality of life takes on many, many facets, so if we are going to do something in an ordinance that says quality of life let's be specific. Air quality, which means protecting us from the landfill if goes to a higher elevation from airborne carcinogens, it's quality of life. studies within the city, noise abatement along the highways. And we could go on and on and on, potholes in the city that somebody could break your leg in. It's all part of quality of life. Better insurance, lower taxes, more input from the public,

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more legislative changes that increase the tax base and decrease the tax rate. the stress off people, stress is part of quality of life. So I can go on and on, financial burdens, quality of life, so this should be tabled until you make a comprehensive quality of life program and process that covers a multitude of things not just a few specifics or change determination quality of life, make it an ordinance that's specific to what you are looking to. Condemnation, blight, whatever that may be, but don't call it quality of life, change the definition.

The other thing I have here is a lot of the issue happened in the city you passed the budget, but you know, gentlemen, we have come here and spoke and spoke, I listened to the young lady before what they are paying, what I'm being paying for a church and a hall that I bought, was being torn down and purchased by the city for a \$1 when the city was going to tear it down, spent how many thousands or hundreds of thousands of dollars to demolish it, make it a parking

prejudice against me for doing what we did to buy it and we didn't sell it or allow an underhanded deal to go on in the City of Scranton, and we are paying the price, but a major development we were going to do there has been cancelled, and who did it hurt? hurt the people in the city because we are not going to invest in other capital improvement in the city under the tax base. You could have a passed a 1 percent 20 fee across everybody in this city, which 21 would have included the nonprofits and 22 KOZ's, but what happened is it was 23 neglected, you went and punished all of the 24 people out here but you didn't punish and 25 make accountable those that aren't paying

lot and then sell it to a local magistrate

for \$2 that already had a deed prepared but

never filed it, was upset because we bought

it all and I paid \$35,000, it's assessed at

a half a million bucks. We had development

plans for it, I have let the kids play free

for Holy Cross Hall since the day I bought

it, haven't paid a dime to me, yet I got to

pay the taxes on the property because of the

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their fair share, but yet you are asking, as General Kane says, the regular people are being made to pay because they didn't defend themselves. That's what a council does, that what's our legislative body does. You are the defense. You are the money people that General Kane and other people have the wherewithal to that defend themselves, but the people here can't do that.

So I would look at the budget again or look at modifications to put a 1 percent fee, call it a quality of life fee, perfect. Quality of life covers many things and you could use the money in many other areas, reducing taxes, reducing things. I proposed a casino to this town, and it was viable and it could happen, but Mr. McGoff called it Herculean. It wasn't any part on council's part but writing a letter, we were doing the investing in it and we were investing in the future of the City of Scranton, but instead of putting the rails on a positive line you put the sale on the railroad to a destruction, which is going to include a bankruptcy because you are never going to

1 borrow to get out of debt. You are going to kill this city. Put a fee on us and start 2 3 making people pay. MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Bolus. 4 5 MR. BOLUS: I'd like wish you each, 6 and all of the people out here, a Merry Christmas, and remember our dinner that I 7 8 have on Christmas Day is held at St. Pat's 9 and everybody is invited. Thank you. 10 MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, 11 council, Marie Schumacher. First off, is there any member of the council who would 12 13 like to take up my challenge to tell me how 14 we are going to get from the 2015 budget to no unstructured debt within three years? 15 16 takers, huh? I didn't think there would be. 17 Is there collateral on this TAN --18 for this TAN? 19 MR. MCGOFF: I'm sorry? MS. SCHUMACHER: Is there collateral 20 for this TAN. 21 MR. MCGOFF: Just a general 22 23 obligation. 24 MR. ROGAN: The taxes would be 25 collateral.

MR. MCGOFF: Well, and a lockbox.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, if I'm reading the raw materials, raw figures that Mr. Evans provided to me last week rather than the statistics I'd asked for, I would like to note that it appears the median sales price of Scranton homes has fallen from \$87,000 down to \$72,000. That sort of screams for reassessment, and I guess I'll dovetail that into what irritated me the most this morning.

First, I'd like to thank the

Scranton Times-Tribune for the work they did

on the pension situation, but this one that

said, "Officials --" this is referring to

Scranton, Scranton officials -- "Are

watching pension bills."

I don't think you guys were elected to watch, I think your job is to call our representatives in here and ask them what they are going to do to help this city, and in conjunction with that you might be able to get them to pass legislation, since we are the only 2A city and we are 40 percent of the county, to allow Lackawanna County to

do what is done in Northern Virginia, which is not spend \$8 million every time you have to do a reassessment, it's based on actual market values and we don't have to spend a lot of money unless somebody wants to help their buddy at Century 21 or whatever those companies are the come in and do that, take a picture and then decide from that, it's sort of worthless in my estimation. of other things go, a lot of things don't get reported, but I think one of your top things for next year should be call our legislators in and set them down here and tell them what you think they need to do for us, not just watch. Get your bag of popcorn and watch, that's not acceptable, I'm sorry.

And now I also was shocked tonight, it seemed to me if my recollector is working that one of the problems or things that was stated during the fiasco about the taxes not being enacted properly for this year was that the taxes were -- the tax rates were supposed to be voted on by Congress -- or Congress, yeah, wrong location, sorry, by the council before the end of this year, and

these rates are not on the agenda tonight and it's my understanding this is the last meeting of the year, did I hear incorrectly or is what we are supposed to do enact all of those rates before the end of this year? Maybe during Fifth Order, because I do want to get to the so-called quality of life legislation.

I think this is terrible. I fear that it's just yet another way to grab money from the property tax owners so you don't have to raise the rates. Quality of life means different things, people want different things in their yards. I think maybe the only people who will benefit from this are fence makers and installers because I have a bunch of questions maybe you could answer on this legislation, and I can see people go by.

For instance, I went by Mr. Rogan,
the lot that he bought that was up for a
cell tower. I drove by there, it appears
that two-thirds of that is cut, and the back
third is brambles and --

MR. ROGAN: There is a property

adjacent. There is two vacant lots next to one another.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Yours does not go back to the one behind? I'll bring the map next year, but first of all, going to -- may I continue for just a few? Accumulation of rubbish, it says, "All exterior property and premises, the exterior, shall be free from any accumulation of waste, trash, rubbish or garbage."

Does that mean you can't have a composter? The county gives them away but now we can't have a composter in our yard?

On Item 16, what's free speech? I can't put a sign in my yard if I want to state something? I think you are treading on my free speech.

Snow removal, this is crazy, must be removed within four hours of cessation of the said snow and ice falling? I mean, God forbid you are on a trip and it snowed what do you do? You get a \$150 ticket or something? That's crazy. And how about the city properties, will the city properties be likewise assessed a violation if they don't

do their own sidewalks?

On 18, all containers must be stored in the rear of every property so said containers are not visible from the public right-of-way. Where is the rear? Now, I own a corner property, 25 percent extra I pay in taxes, and where is my backyard? Is it visible from any corner? I think that is -- that is my right. There are just so many, this one though is my best one, "Shrubs and bushes. Bushes and shrubs on all premises and exterior properties shall maintained and kept in good order."

Would somebody please define good order? It's not in your -- and I think -- and one more and I leave promise I'll leave, which is back on definitions, which is the public officer, it says, "Any police officer, authorized inspector or public official designated by the city to enforce city ordinances."

I think if you going to go ahead with this, and I strongly recommend that you not go ahead with this, it's going to turn in a disaster and neighborhoods fights I'm

pretty sure, but this will -- I think it should contain a clause that any change in who is designated to enforce these should come before -- should come before council and I think --

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I think the police should be doing their job on people who are running lights and there is nothing about cars parked on sidewalks forcing disabled people out into the street.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. EVANS: Can I offer one clarification?

MR. MCGOFF: Yes.

MR. EVANS: Can I offer one clarification while we are on the subject on of quality of life? If you want me to talk about it later? Every law that's in the quality of life ordinance already exists. Everyone that Ms. Schumacher just recited already exists. All the quality of life ordinance does is package them into one ordinance and streamline the process for enforcement, it's that simple. This is no

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new laws that were written, there is no new additions that were written, all it does is streamline the process. Thank you.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, city council.

MR. GAUGHAN: Good evening.

MR. UNGVARSKY: I'm Tom Ungvarsky.

I see we have another emergency on the agenda, I guess it's getting to be regular anymore. Tonight in Seventh Order is the quality of life, that means it's been voted on twice. All five of you have had two chances to explain to the people what the quality of life is. All of these codes are already on the books, all's you are doing is applying fines to them. Last week it was brought out a few amendments were put on the quality of the life, I noticed that the only thing that was read off was numbers and the amount of the fine. It seems strange to me that you couldn't describe what each one was instead of reading off all of the numbers. Let's face it, the only thing this is designed to do is enhance the revenue for the City of Scranton.

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What will happen in the future is will you will one neighbor pitted against the other and reporting this or that or didn't get the garbage can in time, my recommendation is if you don't vote it down to table it until you get a better idea of what the people feel about this. I wish all a Merry Christmas and Merry Christmas to Chrissy.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer, property owner. Ours ears are probably ringing now on this 7-A, but I have some concerns. don't know if that I am inept on the computer, but I tried to find a copy of the ordinance so I could read it, I just found out of Marie Schumacher I can go down to the library and pay 25 cents a page for the ordinance, which I may do, it may be too I don't even know what the ordinance entails so please table it until what time that our IT Department starts to get ordinances that could seriously impact somebody, a resident of Scranton, on-line. I pay \$176 a month for Com service and, you

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know, it's like certain things just don't exist. I'm little concerned about certain things on it, yeah, four hours is -- suppose you are in work and it finishes snowing at 9:00 in the morning, by 5:00 in the afternoon you are up for \$150 fine, Pat, and I'm sure you got home after 5:00 most days, you know? What if people are disabled or there is some kind of problem? More often than not, I had a big snowblower and we worked with other neighbors, a heart patient, a retiree and two diabetics to clear the snow out of half of the court and what happened the DPW came and we had a wall as high as this podium pushed in front of the Court and my wife missed work on Friday, it snowed on Wednesday.

I mean, you know, is that -- another time somebody from the city blew a bunch of ice and snow up on our sidewalk after we had run the snowblower and they laughed at us and drove away. Ha, ha, ha. A lady next door left her house because she was making \$8.50 an hour at Shift's, that's where empathy comes in, and some of the neighbors

got together and she was a little sloppy, you know, but at any rate now the house is abandoned and when the inspectors came up on the property they didn't have it clear whether it was my property they were complaining about, which they really didn't have anything to complain about period, and started screaming at my dog to shut up. He was on leash, he was licensed, that was his job. I always want a dog that barks when some stranger is on the property. He barks when the newspaper hits the back porch at 4:00 and I don't mind. Don't mind one bit. Good boy.

It's just that we can't get it on-line. I mean, some are straight forward, I mean, Mr. Gaughan is back 7-B, that's straight forward, I mean, I don't have to know anything about that, I can see it, his parents are buying a lot and I can say buyer beware when you get that tax bill, young man. It might eat up your salary up there, if they don't have any specific use for the lot or it's undersized or unconstructable like mine is it doesn't have a -- I often

wish I could just leave it behind and go back to the city and abandon it and stop paying the taxes on it, but with my luck somebody connected will buy it up and put a bunch of breaker rock on it and park a couple diesel trucks there and idle them until doom's day.

I'll make it quick, but it's time we start to have empathy. You know, a young married person shouldn't buy a house immediately, 50 percent of marriages break up within a short amount of time, not 50 percent, but probably half of that, 50 percent, break up in a short amount of time, and they have a default and you have car loans and everything else and two people out on the drunk.

MR. GAUGHAN: I hope my wife isn't watching this, Mr. Dobrzyn, we just got married.

MR. DOBRZYN: What's that?

MR. GAUGHAN: I said I hope my wife isn't watching this meeting, she is going to start to get nervous.

MR. DOBRZYN: Yeah, hey, we prudent,

1 you know? I was glad for 25 years for a landlord in some cases because I couldn't 2 3 afford a house, interest rates were 15 percent in the late 70's and it was silly to 4 5 buy a house. MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn. 6 MR. DOBRZYN: 7 Okay, one final, 8 oppression starts in your home town. If you 9 want a constitutional reprieve go to the 10 Supreme Court and make sure you have \$5 11 million in your pocket to do it. Thank you 12 and have a great night. 13 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. 14 MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes 15 to address council? 16 MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. 17 MOTIONS. 18 MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler? 19 MR. WECHSLER: First of all, I'd 20 like to wish happy holidays to all of those 21 celebrating Hanukkah, Christmas and Kwanza. 22 Just a few comments on some of the 23 agenda items. Last week I talked about that 24 we were disappointed that we did not make 25 our complete MMO payment this year, but on a

brighter not this year the TAN did come in at an exceedingly lower rate than it did last year, we will experience considerable savings base on the deal that we got. I would also like to publically thank council solicitor Amil Minora and city solicitor Jason Shrive for not taking any fees that we were entitled to that were associated with the TAN. It's a considerable savings for the city and I do respect them greatly for their contribution and to help this along here.

Administrator Bulzoni the Parking Authority default still haunts us, it precludes us from having more banks interested in it because the process of our default comes up every time. Hopefully in a few years the steps that we have taken this year to correct that default will start to pay benefits.

Listening to the speakers tonight, I sympathize with someone who has purchased a home in the city and is trying to make a go of it. I had the same problem 30 years ago.

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It's tough starting out, but the part of thing that we have to realize is it's not just the city, the county taxes you and especially the Scranton school district is a significant portion of your taxes. trying to here to keep them as -- tax increases as small as possible. think your comments were heartfelt and I have great interest in helping you out with that, but I also think you should take your message to the school district and to the county. Since council is here and we are the only elected public officials that face public and listen to your concerns every week and we appreciate them, I encourage more people to come down and speak. shows a commitment that you have to your neighborhood and I respect that and I will do anything I can to help you with your problems, short of lowering your taxes.

But, unfortunately, we hear comments here tonight why didn't you pay the MMO?

Well, we didn't pay the MMO because we didn't have enough revenue? Why did you raise taxes? We need more revenue. This is

a cycle. Some of the arguments and comments that we are here tonight don't jive. We can't do more with less, so that the amount of the taxes that we collect are going to towards hiring inspectors. We are tying to add additional firemen -- I'm sorry, policemen to help with the problems in your neighborhood, but it goes hand-in-hand, we need revenue to do this.

Just one last comment, and like I said we hear a lot of things here, and one thing that I don't agree with is that the City of Scranton is dead. Financially we are almost dead, but the city itself is not dead. Just take a look at two people that came here tonight to make comments, good or bad, to me that means that there is still hope for the city and people are trying to make things work.

Mr. McGoff read a letter today about neighbors in South Side who have adopted Connors Park on their own. No one asked these people to do that, they are making a serious contribution to their neighborhood out of their pride and their desire to make

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their neighborhood better. Now, you tell me if that's an example of a dying city and I tell you that you are wrong. I'll tell you that are you wrong. You know, the elected officials we have a difficult job, and we ran for it and we asked for it, and I keep hearing that the wrong people got elected. Well, I'll tell you what, I'd rather sit with these guys here who are out working in the neighborhoods all the time taking citizens' complaints, trying to get your lights lit, trying to get your potholes fixed, we are doing it and we might not be the best elected officials, but we did make a commitment. We went out, we knocked on doors, we went to spaghetti dinners, I don't know who else would have been chosen. We had great candidates when myself and Mr. Rogan and Mr. Gaughan ran. There were great candidates out there. We were I don't know anybody else who was selected. out there while we were running that would do much different than what we are doing They all shared the same commitment here. to the city and that's what we are doing.

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can't imagine electing people who would say that the city is dead. Why would you ever consider people that abuse the voters that they are wrong for candidates. It makes no sense to me, and there are problems here and I admit that, and I do appreciate it. And I said this when I came on the council last year, I appreciate citizens' participation more than you people know. If it wasn't for citizens' participation there would be no pressure on us to do a better job. week we do a better job because of citizens' participation. I agree with that 1,000 percent and I would never limit the speech and I would never seek to have it changed, but I do think we have to start listening to the comments where you can't have more city services and not increase taxes. You can't tax nonprofits, it's against the law. is nothing that we can do with that.

And, like I said, I think once in awhile something positive perhaps from the speakers would be appreciated, and if not that's fine, too. Criticism is good, also, and we try to improve from it. But once

again, I'd just like to wish everybody a happy holidays. I have some more comments and we go into the legislation. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Just a very brief comments, I'd like to start with the TAN as well and I echo much of what Mr. Wechsler just said thanking our city solicitor and our council solicitor for choosing not to take fees that they were entitled to for their work on this TAN.

Just a highlight some of the comparisons, and I'd also like to thank Mr. Bulzoni for attending our caucus earlier and the mayor for working so hard to get this to us, I remember sitting in meetings last year and I think Mr. McGoff remembers as well what the concern was is the city going to get a TAN to make payroll the beginning of the year. Luckily that's one concern that we won't have this year.

I'm not going to go through them all, I just want to hit some of the main points, and the TAN -- the breakdown that Mr. Bulzoni

provided us with is very helpful because it doesn't just -- if you just look at the interest rate alone it can be rather misleading. Now, the interest rate is lower this year, but the fees are significantly lower. All in the costs of issuing the 2014 TAN was \$787,149. Fees and interest, all in. The all in amount for the 2015 TAN the cost is \$471,685, so just by looking at those numbers there is about a \$316,000 savings year over year.

As the business administrator reported to us, it's not as good of a deal as other cities are receiving or as school districts are receiving, but it is a step in the right direction, and there were more banks interested in year, which anyone who understands anything about the finances the more you have -- when you have more people looking to bid on more you will get a lower rate which did hold true this year, so I thank the administration for all of their hard work on this and hopefully next year we will be able to report again that there were -- we are making progress in the right

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direction.

Next, a couple of the issues that were brought up, the quality of life, which is one that was brought up by many of the speakers, and one of the examples that Mr. Evans uses actually when he first told us about it, and I think this is a helpful example on why we are packaging these nuisance laws into one ticket is that enforcement has been issue. For instance, one of the issues that Mr. Evans mentioned was some individuals -- there currently is a law in the city that you can only place your garbage on the curb the night the day before pick up, and there were individuals that were putting their garbage out six days before pick up, and in the summer with animals that can become a problem. ripped open, it makes a mess on your street and it's not nice to look at and it's not nice in the neighborhoods.

Now, in the past what would happen if somebody wanted to report that they would call city hall, they would talk to a city inspector and a letter would go out in the

mail telling that person to clean up and they had so many hours to do it, I think it was two or three days. By the time that expired, those three days, the letter was sent out, you know, all of the time that went through the seven days has passed and the garbage men were there and they picked it up. So it's a recurrent -- things like this are a recurrent problem every week that couldn't be addressed because of the lengthy nature of issuing this type of citation.

The quality of life ordinance basically is like a parking ticket, it can be written on the spot and handed to the individual, where as in the past it was done through a very lengthy process through the Licensing and Inspections Office, so we are hopeful that this will cut down on some of these issues and make it easier for inspectors to do their jobs.

And also, as mentioned, there has to be discretion by the inspectors without question. The example that was brought up, nobody should be ticketed for having a licensed car in their own driveway. That

certainly should never happen. Mistakes do happen and luckily Mr. Liptai was able to correct it in this situation, which is a good thing that it did work out, but discretion does have to be used.

The same thing with the snow ordinance. I don't -- you know, I know Mr. Dobrzyn mentioned, you know, my job I work a 9 to 5, I drive about an hour back, if snow were to stop at 10 in the morning it wouldn't be feasible for somebody who works 9 to 5 to have their snow cleared within four hours, but I think there is a reasonable expectation that, you know, sidewalks in the neighborhood should be cleared when it snows.

Now, there are exceptions, people that go on vacations, people that God forbid are in the hospital, and I think most of our city inspectors are compassionate enough and have enough common sense to work through those issues, and that's what needs to happen.

That being said with the quality of life, it's not perfect and there are, as I

mentioned last week, there are other items that I would like to add to it to make it even better, to target panhandling, vagrancy, loitering, these smaller issues that can lead to bigger issues.

As Mr. Quinn mentioned, our police chief believes in the broken windows theory where if you have a neighborhood where buildings are getting dilapidated they are going to continue to move in that direction. On the other hand, when you have neighborhoods where things are progressing and moving in the right direction that will continue to go in that direction, so that's why I am hopeful that this will work. I thank Councilman Evans for all of his work on it and inviting me to sit it in on a couple of the meetings.

Two final issues, the streetlights were brought up again and this was a frustration of mine, a lot of times residents will contact us on council and we can enter in on-line, a lot of times I send them to our city clerk and she will enter them for Joyce and send it to the DPW, but

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they have been -- Joyce Electrical has been much slower in the last few months especially than in previous years so, Mrs. Reed, could we please send a letter to Joyce Electrical asking what type of time frame residents should expect from the time they report a light being out until the time it's repaired? Just so we know what kind of time frame residents should expect.

And finally, I would like to wish everyone out there a very Merry Christmas and a Happy Hanukkah, and a Happy New Year as well. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans.

MR. EVANS: Thank you. Some further clarification on the quality of life ordinance, I think the four hours is a typo and it should be 24 hours, so we are going to take a look at that. The second part of it is the fines that are currently in place are sometimes doubled and tripled what the quality of life ordinance calls for. So it's not a money grab. We are trying to make it a little bit simpler for the enforcement side of it, quicker, have it

done in a timely manner because as

Councilman Rogan has explained the process

before takes a long time to get to the end

result and sometimes we never get there, you

have to go through the Magistrate's Office

and all of those other things.

So again, we are streamlining the process, we are consolidating ordinances into one ordinance and the fines are actually one-third less than most of the fines that are currently in place for some of these ordinances.

Now, onto my favorite subject, pension reform. As most people have been following the issue already know, I have been calling for, suggesting, asking, cajoling, recommending and expecting pension reform since I first sat in this seat on council. In fact, at the November 20 city council meeting I proposed the following actions to bring about long-term stability to the pension plans:

 To freeze the entrance into the existing plans for all city employees immediately.

- 2. All new hires should have one option, that is a 457-B plan, only available to municipal and state employees, the plan is similar to a 401-K plan that have been implemented in the private sector for decades.
- 3. All non-union employees should be transferred to a 457-B plan.
- 4. As we know, over 50 percent of the police and fire pensions are disability pensions. We have a systemic problem that must be fixed through ordinance.
- 5. The 2015 budget allows for \$5 million to be paid toward the court award union employees. Any future payments should be made directly to the pension funds of the effected union members.

I'd also like to make a few comments on the series of articles on city pensions over the last week in the Scranton Times.

After thoroughly reading the information presented, if anything it is my hope that we can finally agree the goose that laid the golden egg, like Elvis, has left the building. That only drastic radical change

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in the way we do business can change our future. I find the articles both enlightening and disturbing.

One single, undisputable fact we are paying \$5.2 million towards the disability pensions and comparable cities are paying approximately 10 percent or less of that amount is absolutely shocking. At this point I'm not interested in playing the blame game, however, I am interested in see how we respond to this information. I would hope to see an ordinance from the administration that addresses and correct the deficiencies in the current system and most likely contributed to this situation and if must include, among other things, a reexamination clause. Our taxpayers are running out of patience and it is urged to see real reform real soon.

And on that positive note, if I may,
I would like to wish everyone a very Merry
Christmas, happy holidays and a very
prosperous new year, and to my colleagues it
has been a pleasure serving with all of you
this year and I look forward to a very, very

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interesting 2015. Merry Christmas.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. would just like to first update everyone on the Rockwell Avenue bridge project. work has been completed to start installation of the new pedestrian walkway bridge. The superstructure of the temporary walkway bridge should be installed on Tuesday, December 23, per PennDOT. pedestrian walkway should be functioning by the first of the year after the walking surface, safety fence, and approaches are complete. The contractor will apply a non-slip paint application to the plywood walking surface of the pedestrian bridge to address icy, winter issues. Due to the temperature constraints this will have to be performed indoors prior to field installation.

The contractor has agreed not to work on Christmas Eve and December 26 in order not to disrupt any of the neighbors who may have Christmas parties planned.

After the pedestrian bridge is in

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place and available for use, demolition on the existing bridge can proceed as stream restriction will allow after the first of the year. So that's an update on the Rockwell Avenue bridge project.

In regards to the many concerns that I have heard over the past few weeks about the Keystone landfill expansion, I would just like to reiterate my opposition. people of our region have spoken loud and clear. They do not want the landfill to expand. They are concerned, as am I, about the impact the landfill expansion will have on our health and our environment. I have to wonder 50 years from now what the future generation will think about the mountain of garbage towering over our region. Will this be a place where families want to buy a home and raise their children? We have to ask ourselves what kind of world that we want to We can either accept the way live in. things are or we can fight to change them, and I think that we should fight to change them.

Ultimately, the State Department of

Environmental Protection will decide whether or not to approve the landfill expansion. I would ask my colleagues if we, as a council, can send a letter to DEP expressing our opposition to the expansion and asking them to reject the current proposal, if everyone would be in agreement?

MR. MCGOFF: I think that personally if we included "As currently constituted", I would be in favor of that letter.

MR. WECHSLER: Do we need a motion?

MR. MCGOFF: Any opposition.

MR. EVANS: No.

MR. MCGOFF: Please.

MR. GAUGHAN: Secondly, just to piggyback what Mr. Evans spoke about, I'm sure everyone has read the articles concerning Scranton's pension crises over the past few days. I am extremely alarmed and concerned over decisions and abuses in the past that have greatly contributed to our pension distress. It is very clear that we must act immediately to reform our pension ordinances. Stringent safeguards must be put in place to avoid cases of fraud

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I would respectfully ask that we and abuse. as a council, along with our solicitor, immediately begin a full review of all policies, protocols and ordinances in order to identify the necessary revisions that ensure greater accountability and oversight of the pension process. Once we have finished our review, we should provide our revisions to the administration and work with them to begin placing this on the agenda for introduction as soon as possible. We ask our citizens to make sacrifices and live within their means every year at budget time, and I think it is time for our government to practice what it preaches.

I would like to end by wishing everyone a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: First of all,

Mrs. Theoni and I are friends, former

colleagues, she did warn me at one point in

time that she was coming to yell at me, and

I appreciate the comments. I think all of

us on council sympathize with Mrs. Theoni

and the problems that she stated. I know

that it is all of our hopes that we can resolve some of these issues. We are residents and taxpayers as well. We want to see a better Scranton.

One of the issues that Mrs. Theoni brought up was about the parks and the condition of the parks throughout the city. That is a problem. One that we really do need to address, and I'm not making excuses, but it is a condition of the economic condition of the city and the personnel of the city. We simply at times don't have the wherewithal to take care of the parks that we have.

I think that that is something that we have spoken about on council, you know, what can we do to make the things better. I think that one of the blueprints that we are looking at is what's happening at Connors Park. Kind of -- it may be a bad term, but neighborhood control of the parks where the maintenance and supervision of the parks are in the hands of the community, of that neighborhood, and perhaps that would much as we do with little league fields, you know,

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turn it over to the community. Let them, you know, operate the parks. I think that that will go a long way to improving the situation there.

As far as the other issues, again, it's a process, and certainly we are looking forward to trying to resolve many of the issues that we spoke of.

As far as the quality of life ordinance, I have sat here for 8 years and listened to complaints about properties that were unkempt, about neighbors, about individuals that refuse to be good neighbors who wouldn't take care of their properties, who were doing things that were in violation of the law, we wanted to do something about that. Our response was to provide an ordinance that would make the enforcement of our already existing statutes easier to enforce and make it maybe a little more stringent so that people would be concerned about violating the law, and the response has been complaints about our attempt to resolve that. I don't understand why people are opposed to this. It makes no sense.

All we are trying to do with the quality of life, whether you like the title or not, the purpose of the ordinance is to make the communities better, to try and improve our neighborhoods. And it's not, as I said last week, if we never collected a dollar from this and everyone in the city obeyed the ordinances, I would be a happy person. I think everyone else would be as well. This isn't an attempt to grab money, it's an attempt to make our city better, and I applaud my colleagues for pursuing this and I think it's something that is going to be beneficial to the city.

And one last thing, just an announcement that I failed to mention earlier, the University of the Scranton is holding it's sixth annual community breakfast, Christmas breakfast, on Christmas Day from 8 to 11 on the third floor of the DeNaple's building. This breakfast is free of charge for anyone who wants to -- who does not want to be alone on Christmas morning. That's Christmas morning from 8 to 11, the third floor of the DeNaples

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buildings sponsored by the University of Scranton, and that's it.

MR. GAUGHAN: I have one. Ι apologize, I failed to mention this earlier. The streetlight time frame was brought up about when someone makes a complaint and how long it takes for Joyce Electrical to get out to the scene, I also was receiving a lot of complaints and our office did check into it, we talked to Joyce Electrical and the time that you submit a complaint to them about a streetlight that's out it will take them 10 to 14 days to get out there and fix the light, and the last time that we checked they were backed up considerably but they are trying to get out as if as they can.

MR. ROGAN: Thanks, Mr. Gaughan, and that's the issue. They are -- I don't know if the one you are requesting are typically taking much longer than that and, you know, if they can't get them done in a reasonable timeframe I think we should either look at another contractor or possibly doing it in-house.

MR. GAUGHAN: The only I think issue

we have doing it in-house, and I think the reason that we contracted out was because we don't have enough DPW personnel now as it is, so I think that would -- I mean, I think if you went to the DPW director or the guys down there they would probably tell you that they don't have enough -- they are having problems, you know, taking care of the parks and everything else.

MR. ROGAN: It would be something next budget time we could look at if it's more cost effective to add a position for streetlights and, you know, other sign repairs. I know it's only one person doing all that work currently.

1 the fines were actually reduced from what 2 they were previously read in at law as, so 3 anyone who is saying this is just a point to 4 get money certainly is incorrect. 5 wouldn't be reducing fines if it was, you know, a ploy to bring revenue in the city. 6 7 MR.
