4	MS. CARRERA: Mr. Wechsler.

12	MR. MCGOFF: Let the record reflect
13	that Mr. Rogan did contact the office and
14	that he will be unable to be here this
15	evening. At this time we do have a
16	proclamation to be presented. We would like
17	to have the recipients come forward, please.
18	MR. WECHSLER: "WHEREAS, the month of
19	March mobilizes hundreds of local MEALS ON
20	WHEELS programs across the country to reach
21	out to their communities and build the
22	support that will sustain them all year
23	long; and
24	WHEREAS, founded in 1969, MEALS ON
25	WHEELS OF NORTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA, was one

of the original agencies funded under the Older American Acts to provide nutritional services to homebound older persons. The agency's founder, and first director, alerted the nation to the unmet nutritional needs of the elderly during congressional hearings in the late nineteen sixties; and

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WHEREAS, form its modest origins in the unused hospital building, over the years the agency has developed to become the major provider of nutritional services to the elderly and disabled population of Lackawanna County, serving more than eight hundred elderly and disabled persons a home delivered lunch each day, Monday through Friday. This hot meal is the main meal of the day for most of the recipients, and for some, contact with the volunteer delivering the meal is the only consistent visit they receive; and

WHEREAS, the emphasis on the elderly is very appropriate in a county that ranks as one of the highest concentrations of older persons in the nation. The percentage of elderly in this Northeastern Pennsylvania

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1	Community is twice the national average; and
2	WHEREAS, the Home Delivered Meal
3	Program could not succeed without the
4	support of one hundred ten plus volunteers
5	willing to deliver meals on a regular basis.
6	Many of these volunteers are older person
7	themselves providing vital community service
8	in their retirement.
9	WHEREAS, this year, MEALS ON WHEELS
10	OF NORTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA is celebrating
11	45 years of serving the seniors and
12	physically challenged people of Lackawanna
13	County.
14	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that
15	on Thursday, March 5, 2015 Scranton City
16	Council wishes to designate that month of
17	March 2015 as "MARCH FOR MEALS MONTHS" in
18	Scranton.
19	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that his
20	Proclamation be made a permanent part of the
21	Minutes of this Council."
22	MS. COOPER: I just wanted to take
23	this opportunity to thank you very much for
24	the recognition that you have given us, and
25	as you mentioned we service over 800

recipients here in Lackawanna County doing about a 1,000 meals a day, but 300 here in Scranton and our office and kitchen are located here in Scranton so we are very proud to be part of this community and we appreciate again your recognition. MS. WOOD: As Chairman of the Board of Meals on Wheels, I would like to also thank you from the Board of Directors, all of the paid staff and volunteers that are so vital to this service that we provide. 23	the council? A couple of announcements just
24	for information's sake, and also, first of
25	all, I'd like to thank there are a number of

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students from Scranton Prep here once again
fulfilling a class obligation, I'm sure, and
we will make sure you stay for the entire
meeting and that your teacher knows, but
thank you for attending our meeting.
A couple of the things, it was
reported in the I'm sorry, I didn't turn
the microphone on. It was reported in the
newspaper about a problem in the pension
legislation for the police department, the
retirement, what was found is that that was
a clerical error and discussions between the
solicitor's resulted in legislation that
will be sent to us next week that will
rectify the error in that piece of
legislation.
Also, last week I announced that the
Auditor General would be having a public
hearing, it will be on March 19 in council
chambers at 1:00 regarding Senate Bill 4
which deals with nonprofit tax exempt
designations.
Also, this evening, on or agenda,
Item 7-A which was legislation dealing with
an increase in fees for signs, that

legislation will be tabled pending further review. There was some apparent conflict with prior legislation and the solicitors are looking at when that or if there needs be a change in that or whether it needs to be taken back.

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Also, I understand that there was a problem with the rental registration mailings. The office -- the people dealing with the rental registration were using a new mailing list for the rental registration and apparently it was not accurate and some people received notices that should not have. Please, if you received a notice from rental registration and you do not -- you are not the owner or operator of a rental property please contact the office so that they can remove your name from that list.

It is, you know, our error or the city's error and, please, you know, bear with us and allow us to rectify that list and the problem that occurred. And that is all.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

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1	MR. MCGOFF: Joan Hodowanitz.
2	MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
3	city resident and taxpayer. Section 313 o
4	the Home Rule Charter reads as follows:
5	"Council shall provide for an
6	independent audit of all city revenue and
7	accounts by certified public accountant who
8	has no private interest in the fiscal
9	affairs of the city government or any of its
10	elected or appointed officers. Council may
11	provide for more frequent audits as it deems
12	necessary. Said special audit shall be
13	conducted by a certified public accountant.
14	The complete annual audit shall be submitted
15	to city council who shall conform to
16	existing legislation. A summary of the
17	fiscal affairs shall be published in the
18	local newspaper by May 31 of each year."
19	Now, since there's an RFP for the
20	audits from 2014 through 2017, which has a
21	submission date of March 27, that would not
22	leave much more than two months to complete
23	the 2014 audit by May 31, 2015. Is it your
24	intention to amend the Home Rule Charter to
25	facilitate a later completion date for the

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1	2014 and future audits?
2	MR. MCGOFF: I don't think that
3	there is an intent at this time, it is
4	certainly something that needs to be done
5	because, in fact, I don't remember the last
6	time that an audit met that deadline date.
7	MS. HODOWANITZ: I looked at all of
8	the audits and the website since 2002. None
9	of them met the May 31 deadline and the last
10	six or seven were not completed until
11	October, November, and about three or four
12	of them the following year, so there is a
13	long history of not making that date and I
14	think either the Home Rule Charter should be
15	amended or we shouldn't go with a May 31
16	date, one or the other, but I think you need
17	to amend the charter, which brings us to the
18	status of the 2013 audit.
19	I see Mr. Rossi gave an update as of
20	February 26. It appears the Scranton
21	Parking Authority submitted it's audited
22	financial statements since they are not
23	listed as an omission, which leaves the city
24	with having to do it's GASBE 45 and 47
25	post-employment benefit calculations, and

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1	that's a city responsibility, and the letter
2	ends, "The financial statements cannot be
3	issued until we have a received the city's
4	management and discussion analysis of the
5	financial statement, the city's
6	representation letter, receipt of attorney
7	letters, that's 19 letters, and an exit
8	conference is held."
9	Do we have a projected date for the
10	completion of the 2013 audit?
11	MR. MCGOFF: No.
12	MS. HODOWANITZ: For shame, that's
13	all I can say on that subject.
14	And finally, I was one of those
15	people who received a remember from
16	Licensing, Inspections and Permits about
17	rental registration. It was a form letter
18	not dated, not signed. It's one of those
19	computer-generated form letters where they
20	print in your name and your address and
21	basically it says, "Please fully complete
22	this enclosed application along with a check
23	or money order made payable to the City of
24	Scranton," and then they have the
25	application enclosed.

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1	So I went to the LIPS and I said,
2	"What is this all about? I have never been
3	a landlord, never will be a landlord and I'm
4	currently not a landlord, how did you get my
5	name?"
6	It wasn't a matter of, "Dear
7	Citizen, if you are a landlord please
8	register your unit, this is the annual
9	registration update," it was, "No, please
10	send us a check."
11	They told me my name came from the
12	County Assessor's Office who sent them a PDF
13	file of 8,000 names. I went to the County
14	Assessor and I went in there and they said,
15	"Say what? We don't know what you are
16	talking about."
17	So I talked to a gentleman there and
18	he says, "Well, I'll call Mr. Hinton and see
19	what's going on," because he had heard other
20	complaints. Interestingly, the letter was a
21	first class letter and I'm just curious did
22	Mr. Hinton send out 8,000 first class
23	letters on this? That would be terribly
24	expensive.
25	MR. MCGOFF: I'm not sure of the

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1	number that was sent.
2	MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, it would be
3	terribly expensive. What they asked me for
4	was a notarized letter saying that I was
5	living in the property and I told them where
6	they could put their notarized letter
7	because it was not my responsibility to seek
8	out a notary public. They told me Mrs.
9	Aebli would do it for me, unfortunately, she
10	was gone for the day so I let them make a
11	copy of my driver's license, which showed my
12	address and showed them my voter's
13	registration, and I told them I could bring
14	in all my tax documents to show I paid my
15	real estate taxes, but I wasn't going to
16	give them any notarized letter and they
17	could put it in their fourth point of
18	contact.
19	MR. MCGOFF: Ron Ellman.
20	MR. ELLMAN: I'd really like to
21	resume where I left off last week before I
22	was rudely interrupted by that bell, but
23	I'll just forego the arguments tonight. You
24	know, these gentlemen they just talk much
25	and say little. I tell you what,

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1	Mr. McGoff, just a approximations, how many
2	people are how many taxable properties
3	are there in town, 36,000 something?
4	MR. MCGOFF: I have no idea.
5	MR. ELLMAN: How much is the total
6	taxes when they are paid? In the millions?
7	I've never done this, I just think
8	listening
9	MR. MCGOFF: I don't have this
10	information to comment on.
11	MR. ELLMAN: I understand that.
12	MR. MCGOFF: So I can't answer you.
13	MR. ELLMAN: If you take the taxable
14	properties 35, 36,000 and the income and
15	keep dividing you'll come up with a figure
16	that is so monumental you will realize it
17	can't be paid, it's impossible. It's not
18	there. They talked in the paper last week
19	raising taxes maybe 50 percent to try to
20	achieve his goal. It's not there. It's
21	just the people just don't have it. A
22	quarter, let's just say a quarter of the
23	people of this city aren't making it.
24	You know, see, these guys don't care
25	where we get our money. I paid may taxes

Tuesday. Nobody cared where I got my money, if I borrowed it, if I stole it or what. I got a broken strut on my car, nobody cares that I got to buy two struts for a Cadillac, you know what that's going to cost? You don't care about that. You don't care about people needing a water heater or a roof on their house, all you talk about is raising taxes so we can achieve and we can drop it into this huge black hole where the money disappears every year. That's not the way to run the city. That's how it's being run.

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I know you don't know those figures but if you find them out and start dabbling with it you will see it's unachievable. It's impossible. When you were there a couple of years ago with Mrs. Evans they used to talk about owing what \$500 million? Whatever 36,000 properties divided in and then divided again it'd take 100 years to pay out that debt and it's increasing every year. It's time to be realistic and it just can't be done with the people here. You can't just keep going down this spiral we are.

18 1 You know, sometimes just like 2 beating your head on a stone wall coming in 3 here but I have to -- I really have to sort of admire Mr. Cross. When I worked for my 4 5 boss years ago I missed work, I was late to 6 work, I was sleeping at work, I was drunk at 7 work, and he never fired me, but there is a 8 man sitting there 20 something years without 9 one positive good result of his work. 0nlv 10 in America. Only in America could he just 11 stay on the job like that. 12 MR. MCGOFF: Just for the record, 13 Mr. Cross has not been here for 20 years. 14 There has been a change in the coordinators. 15 Lee Morgan. 16 MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council. 17 You know, I'm glad to see that the students 18 from Scranton Prep are here. I just hope 19 that they read some of the history of this 20 nation from it's inception and realize what 21 is so really wrong in this country as far as 22 taxation is concerned and, you know, with 23 the latest moves in the Senate and the House 24 in Washington on trying to ban ammunition 25 for weapons I think that there is a real

understanding that this country is on fire. They have had it with the elected officials that are bleeding them completely dry and even the government itself is afraid, and giving police personnel carriers and all of the silliness they have done isn't going to cause the problem because it's just going to come to push to shove and we are way beyond that.

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The City's recovery plans they were a fantasy from inception, read them if they are still at the Scranton Public Library. And, you know, when you see the grinding poverty in this city all around you, I had a discussion with Mr. Cross, he called me on a Sunday, he understood that the residents of this city have no money left. He understands the situation as it really is, but his way out was to tell me that in 2012 the city could have filed bankruptcy but it chose not to, so really what's going on here is that the elected officials of this city weren't concerned with the best interest of the voters, they were interested in somebody else's opinions and we have just continually

driven this debt to the point where, you know, Mr. Evans, I remember asking you to run for the council seat, I don't know what you are going to do, but I have to be very honest and tell you that I have signatures to put my name on the ballot, I wouldn't even think about. Wouldn't even think about it.

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Five council members over decades that couldn't come together and salvage a city, and as the council just acknowledged we have the highest elderly population probably in the country. Elderly people with no money and blight throughout the whole city, and the city that drove its own blight by condemning homes. You know, we can all assume what's happened, but, you know, when I asked for council to go upstairs and get the condemnation book and bring it down in public and let the people know what's happening and then compare it to some of the homes that aren't even listed in that condemnation book, this city has just been so mismanaged it's beyond belief, and the recovery plan, this one, that was

written around the police and fire contracts. That's why it took so long for it to get here and now they are saying to the council, "Expedite the process, suspend your rules and let's ram it through." But, you know, I have a question, can the people in this city go to the Court and ask the Court to set aside this recovery plan until the residents of this city can vote on it? It's my opinion that the Scranton Sewer Authority is worth over a billion dollars and everybody wants to sell it, but how much would it cost to dig all of these streets up and run all those lines to every home, and what about the investments that the public and the city made to create that authority? You know, and the Parking Authority, had an opportunity to speak with them that they were out of their mind. It's real

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the members there understood the last time I simple here, if two people in this city vote out of all of the residents in this city and somebody is elected do they have an obligation to move in the best interest of

all of the rest of the citizens? That's a question you should ask yourself because, you know, we have seem to have forgotten one thing, okay, how to represent the people. We have taken care off organized labor here because evidently we need them to win elections and they need them in Harrisburg, too, so we have shielded them, but everybody else they are going under the bus except the nonprofits who may have connections to the people we elect in Harrisburg.

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It's really very, very troubling where we stand and the last people we are worried about are the people who are the stakeholders in this city possibly for generations. They have lived here, their parents lived here, their grandparents lived here, and it's just very troubling to find out where we are today and, you know, the best thing that we could do in this city at this point is go into receivership and let a receiver come in here and then let a judge look at facts and reality and let there be a legal argument made by attorneys on what we should do because evidently when the council

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1	ran these last contracts through they tabled
2	them for one week and then voted on them and
3	had no information. Does that sound like
4	legitimate government to anybody in this
5	room? I hope not. Thank you.
6	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Bolus?
7	MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.
8	Bob Bolus, Scranton. It was nice to see a
9	dialogue back and forth question and answer,
10	but what I'd really like to see is a full
11	public meeting where the public, the
12	taxpayers, those that live here have a voice
13	in what's going on here. It's important to
14	hear from everyone, not just a handful of
15	people following a channel vision down the
16	road.
17	I kind of laugh, I sit back and find
18	it a real joke actually, it's called a
19	recovery plan. When did it start or did it
20	start with the bias and we didn't even see
21	it because we haven't gone anywhere but
22	backwards. There is no recovery here. This
23	is a liquidation of assets to people who can
24	show you how to make money with them. Yet
25	we the people and the council and the

administration and the people in this city can't make a bloody dime out of them and make them profitable, yet somebody with a business sense, Mr. Evans, Mr. Wechsler, we run businesses. We couldn't operate our business like the city is operated today. None of us would be in business. There would be no such thing called a business, and that's what we are doing to this city.

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You don't sell the Sewer Authority you make it make money, it's an asset, it produces revenue. You got to make cuts. You don't have people driving around in company cars, going home with them, doing this or doing that, or going here, going there, you make cuts. You make them efficient. There is no efficiency. That's our problem here.

Look how efficiently we were with the Ice Box. Did PEL tell you tonight a plan how to get that money sooner? No, you didn't hear that. Did PEL come out and say, "Geez, there is some creative ways out here, let's explore the leachate line coming from Dunmore, can we make millions on it?"

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1	We don't know that, but did we look
2	into it, did you hear that tonight? No.
3	Did you hear that we could possibly
4	take the police and fire department, we're
5	paying hundreds of thousands of dollars for
6	fire trucks, we are going out for \$15, a
7	\$100, \$500 to somebody that's a nonprofit or
8	a KOZ, let's get realistic the taxpayers are
9	paying for that. It's a business, create it
10	as a business. Charge what it's worth.
11	Charge with the manpower. That's how you
12	make money here. You take it off the
13	people. I didn't hear one thing about that
14	tonight.
15	And lo and behold did we hear about
16	the magnificent Taj Mahal called University
17	of the Scranton and the other KOZ's and the
18	nonprofits? Did they come up with a
19	suggestion today how to figure out a fee, a
20	creative fee that's passed across everybody
21	in this city including the nonprofits and
22	KOZ's? How to make it legal, how to make it
23	a work and bring in millions of dollars
24	rather than turn around and hammer the
25	people with another tax? Did you hear that
23	peopre with another tax? Did you hear that
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26 1 tonight? I didn't hear any of that. Ι 2 haven't heard one bloody thing in this 3 chamber over the years that's creative how we save our assets. 4 5 We blew the money at the golf course, it made money, we got rid of it 6 7 because it was political and we blew the 8 money and the people sweltered in the hot 9 heat because we couldn't fix the pools, we 10 couldn't run the zoo, we couldn't run Nay 11 Aug. We give everything away. That's 12 what's wrong here. We don't charge for our 13 services, but you want to make the poor 14 people and businesses in this city be the scapegoats for the misconception that we 15 16 know what we are doing, that we are a 17 business. The city has to be run as a 18 business. People say, "Oh, no, it's a 19 municipality, we can't do that." 20 You rush through contacts, and who 21 did you put the screws to, the DPW and the clerical unions. Why didn't you do them at 22 23 all one time? Why did you favor some and 24 not the others, is that fair? I don't 25 think. There is no fairness, there is no

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1	equality here. This ist a political chess
2	game and you are hurting the people in this
3	city.
4	Did you look at creativity,
5	windmills. No. Nobody bothered to do it,
6	it's been brought up hundreds of times. A
7	lot of ideas came here, that's why I want to
8	see a public heating with PEL there and
9	council and the administration and the
10	attorney and figure out legally from the
11	concept conceptual ideas, creativity.
12	That's the key word creativity. We don't
13	have that. The only creativity is how do we
14	put the screws to the people in the City of
15	Scranton and that's what's wrong here.
16	And I'm not here to insult, I'm not
17	here to berate anybody, I'm here to sa open
18	our eyes, gentlemen. You are the leaders,
19	as Kathleen Kane said, the Attorney General,
20	she doesn't know how real people survive
21	because they don't have the wherewithal she
22	has or others have. You are our
23	wherewithal. You are our checkpoint.
24	Remember, that you are our check and
25	balance. You need to take an effort and

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1	make things happen. You have to become
2	leaders, not just sit here and follow the
3	channel, become leaders and make it happen.
4	And my last thing is I brought up
5	about Carrie Newcomb the last time about the
6	derogatory remarks about me. She is a
7	public official, she sat in an important
8	position as the president on the board and
9	she made negative comments publically,
10	however they were. I had no issue with her,
11	she created an issue and I have asked
12	council to remove her from that board. And
13	I'm asking council again tonight to remove
14	her from that board. She made her bed, she
15	needs to lay it in.
16	And, Mr. McGoff, you can shake your
17	head all day long, I will take the action to
18	force the action to remove her. Thank you.
19	Do your job.
20	MR. MCGOFF: That's your
21	prerogative. Doug Miller.
22	MR. MILLER: Doug Miller, Scranton.
23	You know, coming here a long time, listening
24	to a lot, heard a lot, we have gone over
25	recovery plans in the past for those of us

that were here, we can all recall what took place in 2012, difficult decisions were made, tough -- a lot of pain and suffering took place throughout that time and now we fast forward a little bit and we are in a similar situation, but in this case it's gotten a heck of a lot worse.

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Now, in 2012 we had a council that implemented a recovery plan that called for tax increases, called for some cuts, but also had some alternative revenue sources but, unfortunately, we are a city with a mentality where we don't follow through on a lot of the enhancements that we put into place so now as we head into 2015 where we thought maybe we'd have a bright spot we have completely just backtracked and backtracked pretty far.

There is not one optimistic thing to look forward to. There is no light at the end of this tunnel. All we have is pain, suffering and misery ahead and that's exactly what's going to happen if this council intends on passing this recovery plan where I like to call it more of a

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1	suicide mission than anything because that's
2	exactly what it is.
3	You know, we heard speakers prior to
4	myself tonight, Mr. Bolus, Mr. Morgan, Ms.
5	Hodowanitz, Ms. Schumacher or excuse me,
6	Mr. Ellman, Ms. Schumacher who also comes
7	forward and offers a lot of valid points,
8	and we talked about a senior population with
9	no money and yet we come forward with a 19
10	percent tax increase this year, last year 57
11	percent. Now, we want to talk about
12	tripling the LST tax and selling assets off
13	and I step back and I ask myself are these
14	really solutions? Are these really common
15	sense solutions where we actually sat down
16	and took time to really come up with
17	something that made sense and are we really
18	protecting the interests of the residents of
19	this city? Because when you put garbage
20	like that forward it certainly doesn't show
21	it.
22	You know, Mr. Gaughan and Mr. Evans
23	I really appreciate the common sense that
24	they bring in the table. I wish their
25	colleagues would follow their lead, but the

problem in this city is really simple, we haven't had any leadership. We've had some leaders, but not many, but what we have dealt with are more of political lapdogs who carry at water for administrations, who carry the water for certain unionized labor and is that because they hand select our candidates for mayor and for council? Most likely. Is that why we went ahead and we have expedited those contracts before we initiated this recovery plan? I do believe that in my heart, yes, I do. I do honestly believe that and now at the other end we want to tell DPW and the clerical union to do more with less. Is that really the right thing to do? Whose interest are we really looking out for?

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You were elected to represent the residents of this city. Granted, when you have 23 percent of the voters come out to vote that is very disturbing as an understatement, and the residents have had an obligation themselves for decades to come out and vote, and they haven't done it. They have definitely failed miserably on the

report card in that aspect and I'm not trying to pick on anybody, but when we want to stand back and complain about what's going on that we have an inability to, you know, get anywhere the residents have to come forward and do their part and they haven't done that, unfortunately. And those that have come out and voted, you know, they have voted based on just utter silliness. Yard signs, political affiliation, you know, he is my best friend, she is my best friend, went to school with him or her, nothing based on reality, nothing based on qualifications or what they could bring to the table, this city needs independent leaders and we have lacked that for a long time.

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18 You know, I'm great for the 19 expertise that Mr. Evans and Mr. Gaughan 20 have brought forward and, you know, I 21 highlight these two because I feel that throughout this time, for the short time 22 23 that you have been here, I believe you 24 deserve the recognition. Do I agree with 25 No. I don't. everything?

But what I believe a leader needs to do is to step back and not be a political puppet, but to be open minded and take a look at the big picture. Where do we want to be not today but five, ten, 15, 20 years done the road. What kind of future are we going to have for the next generation? The young folks, the students here tonight, what opportunity do they have? Are they going to graduate and move outside of the city like thousands of other students are doing each vear? I can tell you half of the folks I graduated with they are long gone, they are not coming back. Why would they? There is no reason to, there is no opportunity here. We have blight all over this city, the neighborhoods are in decay, there is no

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the neighborhoods are in decay, there is no jobs, there is nothing here, just a dying, depressing city and it's really sad and pathetic where we are, but unless we do something quick, you know, we are pretty much on the Titanic and at this point we should just start talking about handing out life jackets because that's where we were right now and unless we get together here

and come up with a realistic solution to save this city, but it's going to take leadership, independence, people who put politics to the side and represent everyone not just the select few, but everyone and that's what we need to do. MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes to address council? MR. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, City Council. I'm Tom Ungvarsky. Tonight on the agenda you are going to vote to raise the parking fine violations. The only thing that it is designed to do is to raise more revenue for the city. This past year the city has raised salaries, increased benefits 16 and hired more people. You have also passed the quality of life imposing 27 new ordinances on the people and also raising the fees. You have raised taxes almost every year. You have raised fees every year and you have raised fines every year. Tonight PEL was here and the only thing I heard out of PEL was for you to sell

off whatever we have left to sell to impose

more fines and to raise rates.

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Tonight on the agenda was something else to raise fees. You wanted to raise the fees on people putting signs in their window or hanging a sign. Several months ago you joined SAPA with the idea of having the Abingtons send down the people they didn't want in their neighborhood to open businesses in our neighborhood. With that kind of fees and ordinances that you pass I can't see you are going to get anyone down here, plus especially with what SAPA has proposed again this year with a 56 percent increase over the next three years I think you are going to see a mass exodus. Thank you. MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer. I keep listening to these proposals and it does constantly raise property taxes and it's starting to put a bite. We have a county who wants to start a fair, a county fair, well, if you have to raise my taxes 38 percent like the baseball field skip it. It's getting kind of hard to afford all of

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these affairs anyway.

But what the bottom line is, and
I've been preaching it for awhile, I think
we need to find a way to sue the county and
the state under the 14th Amendment on excess
tax exempts in Federal Court. I think the
county and the state profits off of our
loss. We have 33 percent tax exempts and
growing and if somebody wants to buy
something like the medical center over on
the corner of Adams and Mulberry and Vine
Street they bought the whole block lock,
stock and barrel, and now we have to give
them the tax exemption. Isn't that lovely.
On the sewer plant, what is a
private corporation, profit driven private
corporation going to charge for sewer rates?
My sewer rate is, I just got a bill for two
months, about \$65. Is it going to go up to
\$200? Probably. Because that's what
service corporations do, they provide a
service and they charge the daylights out of
you on an essential service. Ford Motor

Company manufacturers cars, puts them on the

lot, gives 90 day credit to the dealership

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1	in the hope that you like that car, in the
2	hope that you like that car. So they got
3	skin in the game and a service corporation
4	that's owned from somebody in Dubai has no
5	skin in the game America. Period.
6	Now, I keep hearing about the DPW
7	and efficiency and all kinds of stuff and
8	just go some night when you have a heavy
9	barrel of trash don't dress too warm because
10	they are out there six or eight hours and
11	carry it back and forth ten times because
12	that's the thing that I'm thinking about
13	what it's like to perform a job that isn't
14	particularly a pleasure to do. It just
15	provides food on the table and hopefully
16	pays for a roof over your head.
17	And, once again, the pensions were
18	the paper and I agree in some cases, I mean,
19	there are so many holes that are just being
20	found that apparently that happened during
21	Mayor Wenzel where a 21-year-old could be
22	hired by the police department, he qualifies
23	for retirement by 46 years old, you are
24	stuck paying his medical bills for 20 years,
25	do you realize how much money that is? Even

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1	a crummy plan is \$5,000 a year, you know? A
2	crummy plan is \$5,000 a year.
3	And on the authorities, it would be
4	nice if they asked permission from council
5	to do something. We put a whole bunch of
6	facade on the one down on Washington Avenue
7	and last year there was a major portions of
8	the concrete falling and it had to be shut
9	down for a long period of time last winter
10	so structurally it wasn't sound it just
11	attracted a steakhouse, but once again we
12	are taking money out of the taxpayers'
13	pocket and putting into a steakhouse or some
14	fancy Philly thing that, you know, it's okay
15	for them but it cost me. Don't need it.
16	And I know I sound like a broken
17	record, but I love to see you folks start to
18	become lobbyists. Once again TTP is up and
19	two days ago I found that China is investing
20	\$100 billion supplied by the Chinese
21	government to corner the US Transportation
22	Parks market. The average worker has not
23	had a raise in 30 years adjusted for
24	inflation and two-thirds of the people who
25	lost their jobs since 2007 start back for 30

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1	percent less. Is there any further
2	explanation need as to why we can't provide
3	raises for the public employees on an
4	ongoing and open-ended basis? You know, you
5	are losing so much in taxes that could be
6	paid in wage taxes that forget about, all
7	you have left is the property taxes and who
8	knows. So whatever decisions you make
9	please keep the small guy in mind.
10	Don't forget to carry that garbage
11	can back and forth, dress rather scantily so
12	it's like eight hours ten times and
13	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.
14	MR. DOBRZYN: think about that
15	job. Have a good night.
16	MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes
17	to address council?
18	MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.
19	MOTIONS.
20	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?
21	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,
22	Mr. McGoff. Tonight I believe we did have a
23	starting point on the discussion about the
24	recovery plan. The thing that I'm taking
25	from that plan itself is that the emphasize

of our future efforts to get out of this financial hole that we are in is to avoid increases in the property taxes. You have heard several discussions that were at the breaking point now in terms of where we we're at with our taxes and we reached the point now that it does not add anything to the city to increase those taxes.

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With that in mind, I do believe even though there will be some opposition we do have to pursue the sale of the parking authorities and finding some way to get money out of the Sewer Authority. The concern that I have as we spoke before though is these things we are doing most of them are driven by the pensions and our pensions need a great influx of cash to make them solvent.

With that in mind, I was listening to the answers from Mr. Cross today and the first thing he talked about that we could do was to work on our pension ordinances and we had been taking about this for quite awhile, the issue that came up in the paper today -or the other day kind of accelerated that,

and even though we have been talking about it I would like the council and the administration to agree upon a deadline for having that review completed. You know, it is the beginning of March and I would like to see if we could get that completed by the end of April, that we could have this in place going forward. It is one of the things that we can do that we don't have to rely on anyone else and I think those are the things we have to concentrate on.

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One of the things that was talked about tonight is I am not too comfortable with accelerating the vote on the recovery plan. I understand that there is a time constraint on it, also, and if that is under consideration I would hope that we could have perhaps a special meeting earlier next week to just discuss and take comment on the recovery plan.

One issue this week that came up once again on East Mountain, there has been a series of activity up there that's quite disturbing to me. A single person has been looking in homes and trying to determine if people are home. Scranton Police Department has been working on this, but I also would like to commend my neighbors on East Mountain for taking an interest in this and policing it themselves and providing tips and information to the police department for the apprehension of this person. I would like to caution that person that East Mountain is not a place that you want to get in trouble, I can tell you that, and I think I'll just leave it at that, but I think everyone in this city has to be vigilant. In this hard economic time there are people that are desperate, that are other problems out there, but I think your home is where you want to feel safe and your neighbors should watch out for you as well as what we can do from the city's stand point. That's all I have at this time. Mr. Evans? MR. MCGOFF: MR. EVANS: Thank you. On the recovery plan again, I'm going to circle back to that, repeatedly I have said that we

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cannot pick and choose those items that we like or don't like. In fact, in the Amoroso

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1	plan it's stated, "It is vitally important
2	that the individual elements of the overall
3	strategy occur essentially in tandem."
4	I have remained steadfast and
5	consistent in my support for the plan. I
6	voted for Act 205, the commuter tax, because
7	it was part of the plan and consistent with
8	the plan. I didn't like it but essentially
9	I voted for the plan. I voted against the
10	police and fire contracts for many reasons,
11	including the fact that many parts of the
12	contract were inconsistent and in violation
13	of the language in the previous recovery
14	plan and the revised recovery plan but,
15	again, I voted for the plan.
16	Do I like this recovery plan? Not
17	by a long shot. It's a tough pill to
18	swallow, but the alternatives are large tax
19	increases and or receivership or bankruptcy.
20	Again, to remind everyone of the
21	position I spelled out during the budget
22	discussions, if the answer is more double
23	digit tax increases on our property owners
24	then we should petition the Governor under
25	Section 6 and 7 of Act 47 and declare a

fiscal emergency sooner than later. Again, I'm not recommending receivership or bankruptcy at this time, but I believe that another significant property tax increase or further increases in any of our taxes will send the city into an economic tailspin unlike anything we have seen during our distressed status. We can no longer simply tax our way out of this situation. The taxpayers can no longer absorb large tax increase upon large tax increase, five point million dollars in disability pensions, continuing structural deficits, union contracts with enhanced benefits and a government seemingly employee-centric when it should be taxpayer and citizen-centric. That's all I have for now. MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan? MR. GAUGHAN: Yes. Thank you. Ι had a conversation with Mayor Courtright last Friday regarding the clearing of bridge sidewalks throughout the city. Mayor Courtright explained that he plans on looking into trying to purchase special

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equipment to assist in plowing the sidewalks

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1	and he also mentioned he is working with our
2	business administrator, Dave Bulzoni, to try
3	and find funding to add casual employees at
4	the DPW that may help with the manpower
5	shortages.
6	I had a resident contact me
7	regarding truck traffic in Hamm Court
8	between Kane Street and Sander Street in
9	Minooka. The road cannot handle the traffic
10	and is in really poor condition. Our office
11	has sent correspondence to city engineer
12	John Pocius to inquire if it's possible to
13	put signs up to ban truck traffic in that
14	alley, and we also sent a similar letter
15	about truck traffic on Kane Street last
16	week.
17	Several residents inquired about who
18	is responsible for clearing the snow from
19	fire hydrants throughout the city. Chief
20	DeSarno responded to our office that each
21	engine company takes a hydrant list and
22	physically visits each one to clear them
23	manually, and this is done after a heavy
24	snow fall. In the case of sporadic snow
25	fall engine companies are directed to note

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the conditions of hydrants as they pass them
in the course of their duties during the
day. The fire department is not in charge
of maintaining the fire hydrants, however.
That responsibility lies with the water
company and I'd like to thank Chief DeSarno
for his quick response to those concerns.
And I will hold the rest of my
comments for agenda items. Thank you.
MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Just a
couple of quick comments, actually
responses. First of all, we all recognize
the fact that the 2013 audit is late, and
also that the RFP for the 2014 through '17
audit is I don't want to say late, but will
be difficult for anybody taking over the
audit at that time to really have it end at
the designated date. This is, as was
mentioned, has been an ongoing concern and
certainly something that needs to be
addressed, whether it's something that needs
to be changed in the Home Rule Charter,
whether it's an operational thing between
the city and the auditor, not quite sure,
but, yes, we do need to do something about

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1 the audit. 2 Right now the audit is being held 3 up, the completion of it, because there is a disagreement over a designation that the 4 5 auditor wants to make and that issue needs to be revolved before the final audit is 6 7 completed. 8 As far as someone making a comment 9 that none of us care about the city, 10 everyone on this council is a property owner 11 and a taxpayer with a real stake in this 12 The fact that we ran for these citv. 13 offices indicates that we care for this city 14 and the fact that we were able to go out and speak to people and get enough votes to be 15 16 elected to these chairs is another 17 indication that we do speak to people in the 18 city and that we do care for what's going on 19 in the city and I think it's insulting for 20 all of us that anyone would indicate that we 21 do not care about the citizens of the City 22 of Scranton. 23 As far as, the students have left, 24 I'm sorry, somebody said they should look 25 into the history of taxation in this

country. Just a reminder that the Boston Tea Party was held because England passed the Tea Act which reduced the tax on tea so our history is that we actually have revolutions when we reduce taxes, you know, just being facetious, but that is the truth about the Tea Act.

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Also, somebody suggested that there should be a business model for, you know, the operation of the city, most business models are based on either dictatorship or autocracy. I don't think we want to give up our Democratic form of government so that we can move toward a business model for governing the City of Scranton.

Also, a citywide fee has been investigated. It was investigated as a public safety fee that would be placed on everyone living in the city. This was investigated and found that it was not -- we are not able to do that. That is in violation of the tax exempt or nonprofit status of schools and hospitals and, you know, whatever so that type of fee we cannot enact and it has been looked at.

1	49 And as far as the contacts with
1	And as far as the contacts with
2	the I wasn't really going to mention
3	this, but as far as the contacts with any of
4	the entities in the city we as council
5	members by law cannot engage or initiate
6	contract negotiations. We are outside that.
7	That is the, you know, Laborer Relations Act
8	in the Commonwealth of the Pennsylvania so
9	to say that we should be involved in labor
10	negotiations is really outside of the
11	purview of our ability. That is something
12	that is incumbent upon the administration.
13	It is solely their power to negotiate
14	contacts, not ours.
15	And last, I'm on a rant, I guess,
16	there is nothing on our agenda to increase
17	parking fees, there is a piece of
18	legislation there that would allow for the
19	enforcement, greater enforcement of the
20	parking regulations that we have in the
21	city, and that's all.
22	MR. GAUGHAN: Could I add just one
23	comment just to piggyback on what you said?
24	A speaker did mention about the fairness of
25	the administration negotiating a police and

fire contract before the revised recovery plan and apparently the DPW and clerical are not getting that same opportunity, and I tend to agree with that speaker, but, you know, negotiating contracts, as Mr. McGoff said, is not our responsibility. That is the responsibility of Mayor Courtright, so I'm not sure the reason that Mayor Courtright chose to negotiate with only two and not all, that's a question that will have to be posed to him and his administration. 21	into the 500 of Lackawanna.
22	MR. EVANS: Oh, it says 131-133
23	North Washington so that's where I thought
24	it would be.
25	MR. MINORA: I think that's the

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1	Connell building.
2	MR. EVANS: What?
3	MR. MINORA: I think that's the
4	Connell Building?
5	MR. EVANS: Oh, so he has an office

11	MR. MCGOFF: At this time I'll
12	entertain a motion that Item 5-C be
13	introduced into its proper committee.
14	MR. WECHSLER: So moved.
15	MR. EVANS: Second.
16	MR. MCGOFF: On the question?
17	MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question.
18	The next few years are going to be extremely
19	difficult financially for the city. We face
20	the possibility of an \$8 1/2 million deficit
21	in 2016 and a \$19 1/2 million deficit in
22	2020. The cumulative general fund deficit
23	for the period of 2016 through 2020 is
24	nearly \$78 million. Our pension minimum
25	municipal obligation will increase from \$9

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1	million a year to \$17 million a year in
2	2017.
3	I'm hoping that the recovery plan
4	will search as a framework for this
5	administration to avoid receivership and
6	move forward towards a fiscally sound
7	future. It is unfortunate that we had an
8	original version of this recovery plan ready
9	to be put on the agenda in January and the
10	mayor decided to push the police and fire
11	contracts through. I think Mayor Courtright
12	missed a great opportunity to address some
13	of the workforce provisions in the recovery
14	plan to control costs in both departments.
15	The bottom line is that the police
16	and fire department spending accounts for
17	nearly 70 percent of our budget and it was a
18	major mistake to ignore recommendations in
19	the recovery plan that addressed some of
20	those major issues. Unfortunately, what's
21	done is done and the contracts are signed
22	and in place until 2021.
23	I do believe that there are
24	recommendations that will help the city
25	moving forward in this recovery plan such as

refinancing our debt, replacing the business privilege and mercantile tax, reducing the rate of increase in employee health care costs, examining the status of each property in the city that is tax exempt, restructuring the city staff assignments, updating our human resources management plan and redesigning pension plans for non-union city employees and investigating whether or not we can do that for our collective bargaining units.

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The easy answer, as been mentioned tonight, is to always go back to the taxpayers and ask them to give a little bit more, but in a year and a half on council it's quite clear to me that the taxpayers are tapped out. It's time that we do the difficult things to enable the city to be successful in the future and not just keep providing empty promises to the residents and businesses that pay for our bloated government and it's time for effectively leadership moving forward. Thank you. MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? MR. WECHSLER: Yes. I'd just like

to disagree with what my colleague just said, the police and fire contacts were implemented to begin savings that we can take advantage of right now. If these contacts were not approved there would have been no adjustments to the contracts until 2017. In the interim, we saw tonight that the plan requires savings in those years. Without these contracts in place, the only place that those savings could have come from or the revenue could have came from is increased taxes. So we did take the opportunity to make some corrections to the work rules, we did receive concessions. We did have to give concessions back as well. Those are off in the future, and as we heard tonight from PEL they are going to have to be negotiated, we know that, but I don't think that if we sat and did nothing for two years that this recovery plan, my idea, I think it would look worse than it did tonight when it was presented. MR. GAUGHAN: I would just comment

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MR. GAUGHAN: I would just comment and say that, you know, we are in no --Mr. Wechsler said that we had to give

concessions. I think what's quite clear after hearing from PEL and reading this recovery plan is that we were in no position to give up anything. We weren't in any position to give raises, we weren't in any position to give back retiree health care and some of the other things.

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Mr. Wechsler is correct we did gain concessions from the unions, and I appreciate that, but overall both contracts I believe were a bad deal, and extending them to 2021, which I have mentioned for the past month and a half, I think is going to come back to bit us in the end.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Brief comment on the recovery plan, Mr. Gaughan used a great word, it's a framework for recovery. I have always used it as a guideline for recovery. It is a living document, a movable, malleable document that can guide us toward getting out of our distressed status and hopefully toward, you know, recovery, economic recovery for the City of Scranton.

We need a revised recovery plan. By

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1	law we need to have one. If it's not this
2	one, then somebody needs to get to PEL and,
3	you know, have them make changes that would
4	be acceptable. This is something that in
5	order for the city to move forward needs to
6	be incorporated and passed and hopefully
7	that will take place over the course of the
8	next couple of weeks.
9	All those in favor of introduction
10	signify by saying aye.
