MS. HODOWANITZ: Interestingly enough, tomorrow morning at ten the bids will be open for the audits for the years 2014 through 2017 and I think that's going to be an interesting drill considering that we haven't had a completed audit since 2012. I'd love to see the engagement letter given to that auditor.

With regard to the sesquicentennial coming up next year, as many problems as we have financially in this city and with our history of broad waste and abuse over the years like many other cities, I think it's still important that we recognize the good that our citizens have done since its founding keeping in mind the role to Scranton played in the industrial revolution, the number of citizens that have served this country in time of war, so I think it is very important that we do have that celebration and appropriately recognize these contributions.

Since the city is so financially distressed I think it would be appropriate if our local businesses, nonprofits, and

civic organizations step up to the plate to fund those activities. After all, the city has done an awful lot to support them over the years. It's time for them to give a little payback.

I would also like to see our World War II veterans who are still alive recognized in some fashion. They are part of that greatest generation that we talk about, they are slowly passing away, I don't know if you ever had an opportunity to go to the Gino Merli Center, but these are an amazing number of people and they are a treasurer and they should be recognized as part of our celebration so I hope that in some way or fashion maybe the Times-Tribune could publish a page to identify these people because they are heros in my book. That's all I have tonight.

I just got so many things I want to say I'm afraid I'm going to offend everyone or say something and get you mad. Let me just ask, does anybody know what LJB Creative Strategy is? They got telemarketers phoning the city asking a list of questions, what do you think of Henry Amoroso and Mr. Courtright and selling the sale of the Sewer Authority. It takes about ten or 15 minutes to talk one of the girls because I did yesterday -- two days ago, I'm sorry. Nobody -- they wouldn't tell me nothing, but it must be awful expensive to have a bunch of -- to pay a company that has a bunch of telemarketers phoning people in the city.

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MR. MCGOFF: I know that it's not being conducted by council and I'm not aware of anything through the administration.

MR. ELLMAN: It's called LJB
Creative Strategies and that's all they
would tell me. I'm not against them, I just
don't know who pays them and what it is.

MR. MCGOFF: Uh-oh.

MR. ELLMAN: Oh, it's -- it's not -in Sunday's paper they referred to

Mr. Amoroso as our financial consultant, you
told me he was gone and not on the payroll
why does the newspaper keep referring and
using this?

MR. MCGOFF: I'm not sure what at this point in time I know that his contract with the Chamber of Commerce ran out at the end of 2014. Now, how it -- and I'm pretty sure that the Chamber was not going to renew that. I don't know what the current status is. As far as I know, there is nothing being done, you know, there is no payment from the city.

MR. ELLMAN: I don't know how big a job you call what he was supposed to do, but someone that was here a whole year and didn't have the slightest idea about double pensions, which is one of the things he was supposed to investigate, and the other -- he never addressed a minute little tiny bit of nonprofits. I just don't see, this man wasn't a necessity at all for this city and that's why I say in my opinion Mr. Courtright needs some better advice than he has been getting, he needs a good administration to drag this city out of the hole it's in, it's a downward spiral, and everything it seems that people come up with are counterproductive. Well, thank you. See, I didn't argue with you tonight. It's the shirt, I I'll go have a couple of cocktails and I'll have one for you. MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Bill

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, Scranton City Council. Good evening Kathy,

1 stenographer, Lori, Amil. One of the 2 reasons why I'm here is to thank all of the 3 people who sent me cards, telephone messages, and so on and so forth because I 4 5 have been sick for awhile and I didn't respond to those people because basically 6 7 I'm lazy. But, anyway, I just want to let 8 everybody know, people who had called me and 9 sent me letters and sent me cards and 10 visited with me I'm just thanking them right 11 now because I hadn't had an opportunity to 12 thank them, so thank you all, I appreciate 13 it, glad somebody was thinking about me. 14 Mr. Wechsler, is 8,406 days a long time? 15 16 MR. WECHSLER: Depends on what you 17 are adding up? 18 MR. JACKOWITZ: Mr. Rogan? MR. ROGAN: Yes. 19 MR. JACKOWITZ: Mr. McGoff? 20 21 MR. MCGOFF: With my life span, yes. MR. JACKOWITZ: 22 Mr. Gaughan? 23 MR. GAUGHAN: Yes. 24 MR. JACKOWITZ: Mr. Evans? 25 MR. EVANS: Yeah, I would agree with that.

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MR. JACKOWITZ: Do you know how many 2 3 days the City of Scranton has been distressed? 8,406 and we still haven't 4 5 gotten any results on it. We are still 6 arguing about plans and we are still arguing 7 about recovery plans and pension plans and 8 everything else, you know? 8,406 and 9 nothing has been resolved. Nothing. 10 mean, to me that seems like an awful long 11 time and I really believe that city 12 residents and taxpayers have waited long 13 enough and we need to get some answers now. 14 We need the answers by the end of the Year 2015, either affirmative or negative or 15 16 whatever they are, the citizens of Scranton, 17 even the transients are leaving, they don't 18 even want to stay here because there is 19 nothing here anymore. So I'm just asking 20 the city council, you guys, hey, talk to the 21 mayor, talk to the administration let's get 22 something going.

Next question, why hasn't Roseanne

Novembrino ever been called into city

council and asked questions under oath? She

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has been the city controller for this entire She has been the city controller for the city for almost 30 years, I believe, so why has she never been called into this chamber and put under oath and asked questions as to why things happened the way they did, why she agreed with things that were going on as her job as a controller, why she signed paychecks, why she did whatever she did that a city controller does, she has been here 30 years. I'm asking city council to call her in, put her under oath and ask her some very pertinent questions and maybe she could have some answers as to why we have been distressed for 8,406 days.

Okay, does anybody know do the residents in North Scranton pay taxes, do they pay property taxes and city taxes if you live in North Scranton? If you live in North Scranton you pay city taxes and property taxes?

MR. MCGOFF: Well, you are asking an obvious.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Well, the obvious

answer is why isn't anything done? The roads in North Scranton are the worst in the city. Now the Rockwell bridge isn't going to be repaired again, how long is that Rockwell bridge been out? How many businesses have been affected by that? The streets in North Scranton are terrible. If those people are paying taxes in North Scranton they should demand their money back because they are not getting their money's worth and, I mean, enough is enough.

I'd like to compliment Councilman
Gaughan and Councilman Evans because they
seem to be the only two councilmen that
actually stand up for the taxpayers in the
city and the residents of this city. The
grievance that just recently has been
negotiated with the police and the fire,
especially with the police I think it's
going to backfire and I think this is going
to end up costing the city more in the long
run, and if we have to go to Court we are
going to lose because we always lose. I
mean, maybe we got a 10 percent chance of
maybe of winning. But, again, I'd like to

compliment Mr. Evans and Mr. Gaughan for standing up for us.

And if anybody wants any good clam chowder or haluski or tuna fish sandwiches at the Dante Club tomorrow from 12:00 until 6:00 they will be selling them. A quart of haluski is \$7.00 or correction, a quart of haluski is \$6.00, a quart of clam chowder is \$7, tuna fish hoagies are \$6, also, and also in April we are going to have Night at the Races up at the club so come on out and support the Dante Club.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

MR. GAUGHAN: Good evening.

MR. MORGAN: The first thing I can say is, Mr. McGoff, I hope you start feeling better soon. You know, you must be struggling with something so I just wish you the best.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. MORGAN: You know, seeing where the city is and with all the discussions that have taken place here and, you know,

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looking I just hope that every resident in Scranton will go on the internet and pull up House Bill 1773-2014-199, and actually read that document and understand what it means because to be honest with you I have been telling people to -- that I think it might in their best interest not to sell their home but to go get an equity loan against it for all of the home will support and then abandon the home and leave because the truth of the matter is, like Mr. Jackowitz brought up, there has been no relief for the residents of this city for 8,400 days and, you know, it's not only that the streets are all torn up and they are mess but the machine we bought to fix them has just been destroyed and for all these years with all of these councils, look it, I really appreciate the way you dress, but it's not about dressing, it's about thinking, and rhetoric, political rhetoric and silliness doesn't mean a thing, and 8,400 days of that hasn't lead us anywhere, and the legislature, well, look it, they haven't done anything either, so I guess if you

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dress pretty and do a couple of selfies of yourself and pretend like you're, you know, you got something going behind you when you run for office and come up with a bunch of brilliant alleged ideas and then you get elected and do something else or do absolutely nothing, well, this is what happens.

And, you know, I received the same call in regards to privatization of the Sewer Authority or monetization of that and the parking garages, if you read this House Bill the first thing you will do is take all of the money you can get out of your house and run because there is really no way back for in city the way we are going, and all of the rhetoric and, look it, the police and fire contracts that came through here the council acknowledged they didn't know a thing they were voting on. They tabled it one week and the next one week it came back up and it ran right there. The people in this city needed an elected government that knew that it was time to restructure city government and change the way the government

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functioned, and it didn't happen.

And, you know, it's like I said before, even if only two people in this city voted did this council and this mayor and this state government have an obligation for all of the other people other than them two to protect everybody's interests? I think they did. But, you know, and another thing, Joan came up here and talked about veterans, you know, I hope people can understand during the Vietnam War when we made peace there we left some of our soldiers there in captivity and they never came home, and I think enough people don't talk about that, and I understand that we abandoned our own troops who went to war to fight for this nation and we turned our backs on them.

So, you know, I really think that the people need to get a reality check because the council, that's our council, that's not some other organizations, council for nonprofits and for the Harrisburg to tell you what to do, your obligation to us is to us and it's just never happened.

And when you look at the downtown,

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look it, great plans to make it a rental area because, look it, nobody is conducting business there. Store front after store front is empty, we can all talk about the great plans we have for economic development, but, you know, you have to look to Washington to understand why all of our jobs are removed from the country and sent overseas, and what's happened to the middle These are all people that were elected in this country to represent us, and it just hasn't happened, and here we are and at 56 years old soon I'm going to retire. Even social security hasn't been fixed and they have talked about that since I have been a child so what we do is we elect people that dress pretty and talk a good game but when they get elected there is no meat to anything that they legislate, and all the taxes are being shifted to the working poor in this country, not business.

And you know something, anybody can call themselves a businessman, but if you can't pay a living wage to your employee I don't know slavery and, you know what, the

to cut food stamps or EBT cards back to 2008 levels, you have to ask why we are going all over the world continuing to expand trade packs when our own people aren't working and where people in my generation never made enough money to pay back the student loans and they are going be collecting social security soon and never paid them and this is the flaw in our government and some day somebody should answer for it.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Bob Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.

Bob Bolus, Scranton. First of all, I'd like to comment on Mr. Jackowitz, I really didn't appreciate the comments I made regarding Roseann Novembrino. I have known Roseann Novembrino many, many years, well over 30, she has been the controller in the city, I don't think there is anybody more honest that's been in this city to administer what went on that Roseann has, and I take personal offense as a resident, a taxpayer

and a friend of hers in this city to hear the negative comments that I have been hearing. You know, anybody, Mr. Rogan, any of you on council that have some negative to say how many have you gone up to seen Roseann Novembrino at any given time, including Mr. Jackowitz. Her door is always open. I never yet known Roseann Novembrino to say, "Make an appointment with me."

It's always open, you can always get an answer, so unless you got a better solution, you know, I want to hear more on the positive side that's going on in this city than the negativity because it's a campaign year. It's not about campaigns, it's not about politics, it's about credibility. I don't think there is anybody more credible in this city than Roseann Novembrino so when you guys got comments to make justifiable comments, but don't make an ignorant comment because it's uncalled for.

You know, this recovery plan is basically an induced coma, that's what we are in, we're in a coma and we are not looking for any way to wake up, but it's

time to wake up because if we don't wake up now we are never going to wake up. You can't hammer the people in this city any more than you are doing and let nonprofits, other people skirt the issue. Go to your legislatures if you need to, but you need to make desperate changes, factual changes and you are not doing that so start looking around.

This leachate line, you want to sell the Sewer Authority go after the leachate line and make it a host community coming through the City of Scranton and Dunmore and put millions in your pockets because you are taking the leachate from New York, New Jersey and everywhere else so make your assets work, only fools give something away to somebody else that could turn around by it and make a profit. So what that tells me we are incompetent in this city to manage our assets so let's give them away and pay through the nose when they raise the fees. That's the induced coma, my friends. time to really look at what you are doing out there and what you are not doing.

windmills up. There is so many avenues to go here. Get creative. Think outside the box and you would be surprised what you see. Go travel around the United States, take a trip abroad, see how things are done, educate yourself. You got the internet, sit there and Google and travel around the word, come up with ideas because other people survive by being creative and we are not, we just want to beat the living heck off the people in this community.

You know, you increase the tax base you decrease the tax rate. I was at the commissioner's meeting yesterday and I gave them a suggestion, prison is overcrowded with non-violent offenders so I gave a suggestion why not the city, the county, take these non-violent offenders, sit with the judges, take them out of the jail and put them to work. Put them in the city instead of paying time and a half or double time fixing your potholes and doing the stuff. Here we need GPS's to get out of the potholes. Don't pay out of our pocket, ask them to come in and work for free, accredit

them for every day they work they get so much time off their sentence. It doesn't cost us a bloody dime and we reduce the cost of the prison, we reduce the cost on the taxpayers. That's just one suggestion, there are many other out there. We need to be creative and we could do that, each and every one of you.

The administration, we have got people here, we got brains, let's go to a think tank, listen to the people that talk, maybe you will all learn something because everybody has something to offer so don't close your eyes and be blind.

You know, occasionally I get the impression that sometimes I feel coming here is just a complete waste of time in all of years I have been coming here, but sometimes I do stand back and pause and I do say that to myself on occasion, that is coming forward to this council a waste of time? Because you just get a vibe in this room when you come in here, a real eerie feeling that there is just no respect from certain people seated on this council. You know, I really do appreciate the laughs, the snickering, the eye rolling, it's not doing anything to offend me, you are only making a mockery of yourself, most of all you are

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really just making a mockery of this city.

You know, we are beyond laughing, snickering and rolling our eyes, we are well beyond that. If you think it's a joke then we should just leave then because we face some real serious challenges and we just don't have any solutions.

You know, it's nice to go back and, you know, in regards to the quality of life ordinance, and I understand stand that certain individuals worked pretty hard on this, putting this together, if you want to say worked hard on it, and I understand the intention is to target blight and some other issues we have in this city, but, you know, it just seems it's just yet again it's another invert way to go back to same people to take something from them they don't possess. You know, we had no problem the last two years raising taxes 76 percent, and now we want to tell people because they have a blade of grass higher than the other they have to pay \$100. I mean, is that where we really are now?

I think the question we should

ourselves tonight is who really caused the blight in this city? Have the residents really caused the blight throughout this city when you walk through the neighborhoods and see porches falling apart and you see couches on people's porches and a blade of grass higher than the other? Did they really cause that or have the politicians that we have elected repetitively caused the problems we have today? Have they caused the blight?

Because I personally don't believe that somebody who has been living here for 40 or 50 years appreciates the fact that their porch is falling apart, but the problem is we have so many delusional people in our government that they haven't realized one thing, because we have gone back to them and we've just continued to put the screws to them year after year and we've just asked them to pay and pay and pay and pay how do we expect people to upkeep their properties? How could you literally stand up and take yourself serious and honestly think that people have the ability to pay anymore?

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I really don't understand where we are going here. Like I said, I understand the intent, but we are beyond that now. need to determine how we are -- how we are going to turn this thing around without taxes and it just seems that that's the only thing our elected officials understand are tax increases. There is no creativity in our government, there never has been. revised recovery plan in 2012 that there were some good things put into place there that unfortunately weren't enforced because the city has an inability to enforce things that it puts in the plan and, you know, just a lot of just outright mismanagement for decades.

I mean, just look at the fiasco we had a few weeks ago where we had thousands of people receive letters from LIPS in regards to the rental registration, individuals receiving these letters who don't even own property in this city and think of all the money that was wasted, squandered, the thousands and thousands of dollars that was wasted. That's just

incompetence and we've had an awful lot in this city, not just in the last few years, 20, 30 plus years, and yet for some reason we just want to keep blaming the wrong people and we want to blame the controller's office for our issues, we have a council and an administration that has an obligation to implement, we have a council that implements legislation, the administration sends it down, and the administration administers the city on a daily basis. That's how the city functions. We just play politics.

Free speech is violated, it happened to myself here two weeks ago and it's just totally ridiculous. The pension problem, I agree with Mr. Gervasi's statement, it is the city's problem, but you want to know the real sad part guess who is going to pay for it? The same people that you continue to put the screws for year after year and I just feel real sorry for the residents of this community, but most of all I feel sorry for my generation. You know, Mr. Rogan I don't agree with a lot of things he does, but it's his generation, my generation, Mr.

Gaughan's, a lot of the young folks in this community because we are going to pay for it, and unless we are willing to stand up and doing something about it now there isn't going to be anything left of the city.

Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Miller.

Gerard Hetman.

MR. HETMAN: Good evening, Council.

Gerard Hetman from Lackawanna County's

Community Relation's Department, good to see you as always.

To begin this evening, the third annual Lackawanna County Children's Bike Safety Fair will take place on Saturday afternoon, April 25, from 11 a.m. 1:00 p.m. at PNC field in Moosic. This is the same event that we've had the last two years at McDade Park and through a new partnership with the Scranton/Wilkes Barre Rail Riders we'll have the event at PNC field, that will include the ability for children to bring their own bikes and ride their bikes around the stadium concourse on a pre-organized supervised course. As we have done the last

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two years, all children will receive a free bike helmet compliments of PNC Bank. We'll also have free refreshments available for all, compliments of Gerrity's supermarkets.

One of the key components in our bike safety fair event is our annual bike helmet coloring contest. I have one of the entry blanks here with me, children that live or attend school in Lackawanna County can enter the bike contest by printing and turning in one of their blanks with the preferred helmet design that they color in. We have distributed this to all of the school districts in Lackawanna County and throughout the Lackawanna County library The forms are also available to system. download on the county website a www.lackawannacounty.org. They just need to be when they are completed either mailed or dropped off at the Commissioner's Office located in the Lackawanna County Administration building, 200 Adams Avenue, Scranton, Pennsylvania, 18503, and a few days before the event the commissioners will choose one male and one female entrant to be

the successful winners and those two individuals will receive a free children's bike, compliments of Cedar Bike and Paddle.

In addition, all children who are in attendance the day of the bike safety fair can enter a random drawing to win a free bike the day of the event, via compliments of Cedar Bike and Paddle. The only children ineligible for that event would be the two that win the bike helmet contest, we can't have two bikes going home with the same child on the day of the event.

All children in attendance will also be able to see free bike safety demonstrations, checkups on their bike and also free bike helmet fittings for helmets that they bring or receive the day of the event phone. Officers from the Scranton Police Department, the Pennsylvania State Police and the Lackawanna County Sheriff's Office present for that service.

And also, our department is involved in a small way on the Armed Forces week committee for the planning of, among other events, the Armed Forces parade that takes place on Saturday, May 16, stepping off at 11 a.m. at the Gino Merli Center on Penn Avenue in Scranton. I know this will come

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up many times during the upcoming meetings of council leading up to the event and council has been fantastic since we have been here to publicize the parade and I know I've seen many of you out at the parade so we would just like to mention the parade keeps growing year after year and anyone who is interested in entering their civic organization or group in the parade should call either Sergeant First Class Tammy Meslowski at 570-496-8908 or Joseph Besser at 570-961-2696.

And lastly, just to close, I do have one constituent concern that was brought to me by a woman in a downtown restaurant this week and she asked me to bring it up to council at the next meeting I attend, it's just a pothole on the corner of North Webster Avenue and Pine Street she told me. I know there is many road issues that need attention in the city and all of our municipalities and highways, but she asked me to mention this and I just wanted to bring it up to council, she described it to me as a threat to public safety. I know

that there is many holes and bumps that would fit that description but I promised her that I would mention it in service to our residents.

Is there any questions from council?

MR. MCGOFF: What was the date and
time for the Armed Forces parade?

MR. HETMAN: The flyer we have here that we eventually will leave with council is Saturday, May 16, and it steps off at 11 a.m. it's the corner of the Veteran's Center of Vine Street and Penn Avenue, caddy corner from St. Francis. Again, thanks to this council for promoting that over the years, I know it will be mentioned it again and always comes up here so our thanks.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Hetman.

MR. HETMAN: Thank you, gentlemen.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaragalia, citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonians.

Big headline in the paper today we might get sued by our firemen and police. I can understand the police, when you are any kind

of an official with the union you are a union member for all members retired and active, they have no choice to do what they have to do. Of course, you have a choice to you can either appeal it or fight it or whatever, go along with it, but they have no choice so you should never criticize them for that choice, they have none. There is something you take an oath to do they have to do what they had to do, but the other thing isn't.

The other thing has to do with pension requirement. In other words, they have to have 25 years and be 55. Now, you had the contract before you what less than two months ago, less than a month ago, I believe. Yous all had a copy of that contract and the city administration business or your law office sent down a copy of it and you have had it to study, how could you have missed and important thing like that being pensions were all over the paper? That's something that should have stuck to you like glue considering the articles that were written in the Scranton

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Times, but you just glossed over it. So what? But you passed it and now we got to live with it or fight another court battle when you got have put into the revised contract when it was there, but this is how the city works. We are always -- after the barn is closed we are trying to get the horses out. It doesn't work that way. You have to be more on your toes.

Now that Act 111, I guess it has to do with arbitration, the reason why we have arbitration is we took away the right to strike. The police can't strike and the firemen can't strike. You understand the reasons why. Now they set up a process of arbitration but they also set up a process where you can challenge the arbitration decision and go through the courts, and all them courts look at it. They are all different people, how they can figure that arbitration is fixed is beyond me. You have too many judges looking at it and they are going to take the award as it is or throw it out. Now they want to change it.

Any time you see change on anything

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that has to do with your rights you got to take action, you got to do more than take action you got to fight for your rights. keep telling you many, many times your government is your enemy not your friend. They can take food from your mouths, which they do quite regularly, and your weapon is your vote. There is no other choice. You passed a lot of laws, you are always -well, you mentioned one time that you march for a long time you weren't allowed to march. Well, I understand that, I understand the colonial system was pretty rough, but you are putting all of these same things that they did to your relatives back in Ireland on us today. You got new quality of life where if you do this and do that or do that that's what the British did. your land they raised the taxes up high so you couldn't afford to pay for your land then they confiscated it. You are doing the same thing. You are getting to be no different than what they did. Maybe that's the only solution there is, I know not, but I do know the people of Scranton are really

being oppressed further and further and further and there is no reason for it. We are all in the same boat, maybe if you gave up your salaries and then just came like we do because you love the city and use that money really to do something else maybe that's part of the solution.

We come before you because we love this city. Most of us -- - well, I have, I have lived all my life here, I never desired to live anywhere else. I love my mountains, I always did. I love the river, I love everything, but please look at what you are doing to the quality of life you are so concerned about up keeping because pretty soon there will be none. Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave
Dobrzyn, resident. Blight in the area, 1974
I'm trying to describe the events that
effected the working class, we had the Opec
oil embargo, in '79 we had the another
so-called energy crisis with the hostage
crisis, in 83 I lost a job while the
administration called the automotive
industry an expensive job's program, in '85

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we negotiated the apparel industry away for 20 nuclear power plants in China which I know not whether they were ever built or In '91 we had another incident. not. Ιn '98 we had the Chinese trade pack, most favorite nations, then we had 9/11. '04 or '05 we had the Central America Free Trade Act. In '07 we had the Wall Street collapse. In '011 we signed another trade pack that involved Panama, Korea and one other country, it's not on the tip of my tongue right now, and last year we exported 40,000 cars to Korea, only trouble is they exported 450,000 to us. Once again, ten cents on the dollar.

So I just try and try and try to get everybody out there in TV land to stop, tell the government to stop the trade packs because if our wages were double your income taxes would be double, a lot of our problems would be gone by then.

And on ordinances, a few weeks ago, a week or two ago, Pat mentioned that it seems like every week we are dealing with something new and what we need, I feel, is a

forensic review of all ordinances, bring them up-to-date with possible advice from civil liberty lawyers, eliminate all ambivalent language, make them people friendly, for instance, junk cars, there isn't a junk car that's sitting in the yard that isn't worth \$200 right now in scrap steel, so why not when you send that person over to say, "Move this car in 48 hours," give them a list of people that take these scrap cars and pay cash for them, you know, and sweeten the deal a little bit. I know a guy that's as poor as a church mouse and they took cars off his lawn and resold them It doesn't sound fair to me. for \$5.000.

And on these contracts it's really ashame, I mean, we are hiring allegedly educated people and it simply amazes me how many educated people can get themselves into so much trouble even though the fact that they are supposed to be smarter than the average bear, I mean, maybe we shouldn't be so conceited about our liberal arts diploma, it's only required reading and no more fast track on this stuff. We really should have

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sat down and read the contract just as Andy stated and we don't have access to a lot of this stuff, somebody complained about three week ago, I think it was Marie, that she couldn't get the quality of life ordinance up on the computer.

And downtown, I'll make it quick, we don't have any money to go shopping at the mall, so it just -- it's every year it's worse and worse. The utility bills go up, the tax bills go up, and I expect my whole income tax return to get swallowed by city taxes and fees now.

And, finally, paving. Are we going to allow the utilities to destroy our work without inspecting their work and they should be returned to a year or two later and make sure that all of the borders are still sealed and if not they come back. was up on Stafford Avenue the other day, the gas company was there and boom went my car, you know.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Four inches high.

Thank you and have a good night.

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MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,

Council. Marie Schumacher, citizen and taxpayer. Ever since you passed the MOUs for the police and fire I have been asking for a matrix that would keep us up-to-date on how we are doing on the concessions that are supposed to be benefiting the taxpayers and I didn't see anybody step up, so I thought I would file a Right-to-Know and at least find out on one item, which I did and I'd like to share because perhaps there is some reason for optimism, but also for keeping our eye on this. What I asked for was the overtime for the police and fire comparing last January 2014 and February of 2014 with this year. Now, the police in January of 2014 spent roughly \$81,000 on overtime. This year in January they spent 111 point eight-thousand dollars, and that's \$30 million dollars -- or excuse me, 31 roughly thousand dollars over last year, but February they have -- last year was 44.4, this year it's 34 even so it's about ten down, \$10,000 so that's a reason to be optimistic, I think.

Now, the Fire Department, however, cleaned the Police Department's clock because while they to went up 2015 over 2014, in the month of January the figures were 18.1 in January of 2014 and 43.8 this year, so they were up 25.7, but in February last year they were at \$29,000 and this year they are down 23.5 with a mere \$5,499.64 for overtime in February, so I hope that trend continues. I would hope one of you would pick it up to do this on a regular basis but if you don't I'd be happy to continue doing Right-to-Knows.

And I have to insert here that I agree with Bob Bolus' assessment of the Controller's Office, as long as I have been involved I have never, ever gone to Roseann Novembrino or picked up a phone and called her that I did not get an answer and it is the most open office in this building and I am happy to say that I support Roseann.

And I hope later on in next order I will learn what the percent of the trash bills were paid and unpaid in 2014 from Mr. Wechsler. And, Mr. Evans, did you find

out, I'd like to read just a brief excerpt from File of Council 199 of 2003 which deals with the pensions that we talked about last week. It says, "Contribute \$90,000 for the pension benefit for clerical employees who are hired before 1987, qualify for retirement and retired between January 1, 2002, and December 31, 2002. The city is further authorized to contribute \$30,000 toward the pension benefit for those clerical employees who fell within the retirement window approved by File of Council No. 131, 2003," which I'll get back to.

Were you able to check and see if that money was ever disbursed into the pension fund.

MR. EVANS: No, I wasn't able to get that information yet.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Because I say when the budget was prepared for the following year considerable time over July it had not been expended, so I just wonder what happened to that money.

And I was happy to see the council

president at the Pension Board meeting in person yesterday, that was nice, and I'd like to go through a little bit of a time line on the pension because I don't understand, and I think there is something you guys can do and it was brought up earlier tonight by somebody else, the importance of what you do. On January 1, 2003, in the Tribune there was an article entitled, "Two deals down, two more to go."

May I finish? Thank you. The article notes "The two that were done were the public works and the clerical union and of particular interest are two stated provisions, one in the DPW contract prohibits privatization."

Is that still in the current contract?

MR. ROGAN: It is. That's the reason I voted again the previous contract.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And number two,

"And one-time retirement incentive for those
of non-uniform pension allowing those with
25 years of service, but under age 55 to
retire at full pension. The pension was

also increased for those hired before 1987 from \$700 a month to about \$1,2000 a month."

Now, \$1,200 is obviously not double \$700, so I would like to know in the materials -- in the caucus I believe it was stated that you all provided a packet of materials to the Attorney General for the investigation he was doing, and was there anything in there that said the pensions got doubled? You didn't review those?

MR. MCGOFF: We provided to our -or I'll say in the city clerk provided to
the investigators all pertinent materials
that were requested. As far as our review,
I don't think anyone reviewed them before.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I just wondered if there was an ordinance or something that I missed because this -- and I have more on the timeline of the pension, but I'm out of time so I'll return with that next week and also some comments hopefully on that paving list because I think East Mountain is getting shortchanged, but that will be next week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone

else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Just prior to going to that I'd just like to make one comment, as far as the Controller's Office is concerned nobody on council said anything about investigating or, you know, impune the Controller's Office in any way. To even ask if there is -- you know, to conduct an investigation implies that there is something wrong or something has been done illegally or unjustly, I don't know what, but nobody on council has implied that or stated that and we have no intention of conducting any type of investigation into the Controller's Office. And I guess that was all. Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. McGoff. Tonight I'd first like to make a comment on the articles that were in the paper this morning. The first thing I'd like to say is that the council and the administration are in agreement that raises should not be given while the pensions are

the age requirement has been established as 25 years and 55 years of age for the police contracts. I feel today that the impression that was given in the paper is that only two council persons agreed with that and I have to say that that's not the case. We were not contacted for that story and myself I agree with the fact that we also want to get these things cleared up and that we are not in favor of them as well.

distressed and we are also in agreement that

And I also want to state that the administration, that the council will stand with the administration concerning litigation or arbitration on these issues.

In regards to the issues raised by Ms. Schumacher, Treasurer Beck was able to inform me there was 20,479 garbage bills mailed out last year. Due to some technicalities in how they are returned, they can't give me a final number on how many of those 20,479 were returned. He did provide me with dollar values that if you do the extrapolation based on \$300 per mailing that the dollar represents about 92 percent

of the garbage bills collected.

For this year, I have been in contact with Mr. Beck that I do want to be in contact with the person tonight we are going to work on the person that's going to print these bills, I'd like to get some information on how many was provided, the list for addresses, I also want to make sure that the bills are done about account numbers or if they are done by addresses.

I also requested that he allow me to be involved with the collection agency because I'd like to see how they determine this 20, 479 is the accurate number. I'm not sure if that's too many because some come back or is it too few because we are missing some companies. I'm not sure how the list is coordinated, but I think other references could be used, for example, and I don't know if we can access this, I'd like to know how many residential electric meters are there are in the city. No one gets free electricity from PPL so I'd like to do a correlation between the garbage bills and either electric bills, water bills or tax

bills as they are mailed out.

I'd also like to see that during the course of the year as a tax bills are mailed if there is a way that we can keep track more accurately of the amount mailed out and the amount that are returned. We also need a better system for verifying vacancies of the people that appeal their bills just to make sure that we are not penalizing people who have vacancies, but we are also not missing people who don't pay their bill and use that as a reason.

residents this weekend concerning problems, one was, one was some unkept property on 21st Street, the other was about some potholes on Doud Avenue and Corey Street back in Minooka. The DPW was back there to put some cold patch and solve those holes and I appreciate their efforts in doing that. Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, just a few very brief comments tonight. I would like to thank Councilman Evans for organizing the

caucus this morning and the mayor for attending as well. There was a lot of information that was given to us and I certainly look forward to reading over and forming an opinion on the two pieces of legislation that were provided to us.

Two other items, next Wednesday, as you know, council will be meeting next Wednesday as well. Prior to the council meeting the blight committee that myself and Councilman Evans are on that we spoke about last week will be meeting and we are continuing to work on proposals on Friday to streamline many of the ordinances through licenses and registration. I'm looking forward to that meeting, I know Councilman Evans is as well and we hope to have -- make more progress and we will continue to inform our colleagues and the public as those progress.

And finally, I normally don't read citizen's requests, but this came to me right before the meeting. Neighbors have called numerous times regarding violations at 2652 Cedar Avenue. There is number of

issues ranging from illegal vehicles, debris, paint cans, wood, etcetera, to motorcycles racing down the street in the summer. If we could please forward this to Mr. Hinton and have one of the inspectors go out and take a look at this. And that is all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. I agree with Councilman Rogan that I think the blight committee has great potentials and I appreciate the mayor trying to put it together and forming it and we look forward to some progress beginning next week. Our first session will basically be a brainstorming session but I think we are going to have something constructive over the next couple of weeks.

Before I comment on the articles on today's paper I did want to state for the record that my disagreements with the unions and at times the pension boards should not be considered a reflection on the great work that the public safety employees do for our citizens. We have the most professional

police and fire department in the northeast and that's something we can all take pride in, but back to the pensions. Yesterday there were two actions that were taken that continue to make matters worse. First, the Pension Board's decision to litigate the administration's decision not to pay increases for the retiree pensions points to the deeper issue of not fully understanding the severity of the matter at hand.

Sure, it would great to give pension increases to retirees, many deserve raises and more, but maybe if we weren't paying \$5.2 million dollars in disability pensions each year that would be possible. Maybe if we didn't have two to five years before those pension plans default or maybe if double pensions were not given out or maybe if the city was not fighting for our financial life just maybe that would be a good idea, but the pensions are severely distressed and I know this council has demonstrated by tonight's public caucus is committed to finding solutions and not being accelerating their demise.

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Secondly, the police union continues to threaten litigation for a clerical error and it's success will pretty much guarantee that Scranton will be forced into a fiscal emergency. Again, this council was in full support of the administration's position on this matter. Now, one would think that the number one problem facing the city is budget and pensions and from a financial perspective that would be true, but there is a different problem facing this city and maybe a more difficult problem to solve, while there is so many great employees that work for the city, they are assets and do a wonderful conscientious job every single day and the city could not exist without them, but over the decades and generations a culture that has been developed within the walls of city government that just does not allow our city to prosper and if that culture does not change and we cannot come to terms as we would have to do together to move Scranton forward I strongly feel this government may implode from the inside out.

Our government should be for the

people, all of the people, and should not exist for a select few who have highjacked progress, highjacked cooperation, and highjacked reality.

While I still think recovery is possible, my gut is telling me that this government may need to be totally overhauled and reinvented, maybe recovery is simply not enough.

And, again, while we continue to work towards recovery the decisions that are being made by some unions and pension boards to fight the city at every opportunity as if this government is somehow flush with cash, as if their pensions were not nearing default and they go about as business as usual is disheartening. Those actions among other issues will sooner than later drive us to receivership and ultimately bankruptcy. That's all I have right now. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. I would just like to echo my colleagues' sentiments to Mr. Evans thanking him for inviting Mr. Schuettler to our caucus

tonight. I thought it was very informative and I appreciate Mr. Evans' passion and share his passion about some of these important issues.

And just a few items, there was significant damage to the fence at the baseball field at McLane Park in North Scranton over the past week. It looked as if someone drove a car or ATV into the fence. Our office had contacted parks and recreation and Mr. Lynch, who is in charge, reported that the issue has been checked and the fence is in the process of being fixed so we on behalf of the residents over there I would like to thank him personally for his quick response to that issue.

I spoke to a resident in Minooka
whose son was involved in a very bad
accident at the intersection of Birney
Avenue and McDonough Street. Cars are
parking on the sidewalk near the
intersection of the streets and if you are
trying to pull out onto Birney Avenue from
McDonough Street is almost impossible to see
oncoming traffic. It's a very dangerous

situation that many in this section of the city are very concerned about including myself. Our office contacted Chief Graziano, who had the highway division of the police department look into that situation. After their review, the Chief asked DPW Director Gallagher to have a "No Parking Here to Corner" sign installed at that location. So, again, I'd like to thank Chief Graziano and the police department for their quick response to take care of that very dangerous situation.

We also received an update on the fraudulent parking permits in the Greenridge area that I reported on last week. There has not been any discovered as of yet but the police department are continuing to investigate.

And two weeks ago I mentioned that residents in the 1200 block of Woodlawn Street had a complaint that five permit parking signs were stolen and they were having difficulty with parking in that block. The five permit parking signs have been replaced by the DPW and the neighbors

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in that block are thrilled. So, again, I would just like to thank the department heads for their quick response and on behalf of the neighbors who are thrilled thank them for their service and their hard work in those areas. And that is all I have for this week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Again, very brief First of all, as far as the potholes and the condition of the streets, everybody realizes the severity of that, DPW is working daily to try and address some of the issues of the potholes. You have to realize that many of -- many of these are weather -most of these are weather conditioned potholes that I know for a fact that the ones that the ones at the bottom of River Street and Prospect Avenue I think have been filled three times. It just keeps -- these cold patches just aren't sufficient to, you know, last through the weather that we have had. With that said and hopefully warmer weather along the way, perhaps DPW will begin to address the issues in a more permanent manner, plus people have to

realize that we are looking at a \$2 1/2 million paving project this summer that will hopefully address the pothole issue, you know, over a longer period of time by the repaving.

So I know it's difficult, we drive every day through the city, we realize the problem. Hopefully, you know, just a little bit of patience and some of these issues will be addressed.

Second, it was brought up about the landfill again and council's responsibility or the City's responsibility, I would just like to say that we as a group have responded with a letter to I believe DPW -- or, yeah, DEP, sorry, with our response to the landfill situation and we have also done so individually as we had been asked by newspaper and other groups so we are concerned with that issue and we have made our response.
