MR. MCGOFF: Any announcements or comments from the council? Anyone? I do have a number of the things to mention before we start the meeting. First of all, the exit conference for the 2013 audit was held on Monday and the audit report should be posted to the city's website. I don't know if has been already, but it should be relatively soon. It's on the Department of Business Administration page if you want to look for it. There is a copy also available in the City Clerk's Office, and there should be a copy at the Albright Memorial Library.

The Harrison Avenue bridge schedule

closures. The bridge will be closed from Friday, April 24, at 10 p.m. and will reopen on Sunday morning, April 26. If necessary, it will extend until Monday morning, April 27, at 6 a.m. Emergency access for the bridge will be maintained at all times for emergency vehicles. Also, Scranton police officers will be stationed at all times and assist with pedestrians who still want to walk across the bridge during the closure. It should be noted that the Scranton police will be reimbursed for the project at no expense to the city.

Council has scheduled a public caucus as requested with PennDOT officials on the update for the bridge project, that caucus will be held on Thursday, June 4, at 6:00 p.m. and it will be in council chambers.

This Saturday, April 25, is the kickoff celebration of Scranton
Sesquicentennial. The event will begin on the steps of the city hall at 9:30 with remarks, proclamations and racing and the raising of the Sesquicentennial flag. At

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10:30, this is a.m., there will be a parade down North Washington Avenue to the Mall at Steamtown where there will be a full day of the entertainment, artisans, ethnic foods and fireworks at 9 p.m.

Just for note today, April 23, is the 149th anniversary of the City of Scranton, of the establishment of the City of Scranton, so today is the actual date in 1866 when the City of Scranton was established. Last announcement, yesterday was the Court, days get mixed up when you're retired every day is the same, so yesterday there was a Court hearing, the city presented it's case for the establishment of the LST tax or the -- making it \$156 rather than 52, that case, the decision, was handed down late today in favor of the city to pursue that increase in the LST and that was held before Judge Braxton and his decision was made. MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,

city resident and taxpayer. There is a God and there is a 2013 audit. It is 324 days late and, of course, the financial information captures the history of 16 months ago. There is no copy on the website yet and there is no copy in the library, my understanding is that should be corrected probably tomorrow. It is a lengthy document and it will take several readings to fully digest, but there are two issues which I wish to raise tonight.

I draw your attention to page 37 of the document, if you have it available, with regard to the Parking Authority. I could be wrong, but I think this is the first time the city has ever received an adverse opinion and this one concerns the Parking Authority. An audit of the Parking Authority of the City of Scranton was not completed for the year ended December 31, 2013. The city communicated their concerns to the receiver, trustee, bond insurers relative to the language in the bond documents requiring an audit of the authority operation. The parties did not

seek to authorize the completion of an audit.

Now, I don't know whether you are going to sell off the authorities assets this year and next year or ten years from now, but this issue is going to continue to haunt the city for some time to come. If memory serves, last November the city authorized a \$4 million loan for the Parking Authority and I believe the argument was that we needed to help the Authority recover its financial credibility because the city defaulted on the those loans and the city was responsible for that.

And I checked the minutes of council meetings and I think Mr. Evans said it best, "On a going forward basis this is about the future. It's about rebuilding our credibility in the financial community."

Well, I'm here to tell you that an adverse opinion will not go far to rebuild financial credibility anywhere.

The second issue that I want to point out was on page eight of the inserted from Robert Rossi & Company which is

attached to the actual audit and it refers
to accounting procedures, and I quote, "The
city should develop written accounting
procedures to provide for consistent
treatment of transactions and accounting
principles as determined by management. New
employees or employees temporarily
performing duties due to sickness or
vacation would benefit from such written
procedures which would provide consistent
financial reporting."

Now, we have had Baker-Tilly for a four-year period to perform functions that our finance and accounting personnel should be doing, basically preparing the information for the independent auditor. I still insist that we would be better served, the city would be better served and our employees would be better served if we establish the appropriate training program for them, document trained, got the procedures documented and then we would not have a problem with personnel turnover when somebody decides to retire or somebody becomes ill and falls out of the system.

Once you have got the procedures on paper, once you have dot everyone trained and cross-trained you lay that issue to rest. I do not see why we have to being hiring an outside firm to perform that duty for us and if we have to hire anyone I suggest we hire a junk yard dog and it that we set that dog free. Maybe we can put the fear of God into some people.

And, finally, I would like to know, I have asked this before, what is the deadline for the 2014 audit?

MR. MCGOFF: In the RFP it stated that the audit -- if the audit was not completed by October there would be a 10 percent, what do I want to say, 10 percent penalty on the auditors.

MS. HODOWANITZ: We can't let the tail wag the dog again. We have done this with Rossi, it needs to stop. We need a firmer commitment from the auditor, you are going to hire this auditor, it should be clear to him date "X" is when it's due, show cause why you can't produce it and it shouldn't be the city's fault again

1 especially if you are hiring another audit firm to do the work for you. That's all I 2 3 have tonight. Thank you. MR. MCGOFF: 4 Thank you. 5 Spindler. MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, 6 7 Council. 97-year-old woman she barely has one bag of garbage a week, it's ridiculous. Totally unfair and I still say, I have said it for years, I think it's illegal. We pay taxes to have our garbage picked up, we shouldn't be paying \$300 more. What do we pay taxes for? For services such as garbage collection. It's totally unfair to charge people \$300 and I own a double I pay \$600. I hope maybe this year council could look into it and maybe lower it.

Moving on, does anyone know when the street sweeper will be in the Tripp Park area?

MR. GAUGHAN: I have the list, I'll mention it in my comments. I'm not exactly sure, but I'll go through.

MR. SPINDLER: Thank you. Something I mentioned awhile ago, the street sign on the corner where I live, the Bullworth Street sign still hasn't been put up, North Rebecca is up but Bullworth Street doesn't exist right now.

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and Pettibone, the stop sign is white. You can barely make it out to be a stop sign. I think that's a safety hazard.

MR. MCGOFF: On that, if you would call either the Clerk's Office or DPW and just make them aware of so they are trying to work on those.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay. I tried call DPW in the past and could never get through. And I brought this up last year, Dorothy Street where the ball fields are and across from the playground, water collects there. There is a storm drain, the water doesn't make it to the storm drain, the pavement is dug up, it's just worn away, the water was six or eight feet out into the street and there is debris build up all along by where the storm drain is and the water just doesn't make it there. There is like a half -- it's a river about a half a block long and it just lasts there until it evaporates, but the way the weather has been it's just been sitting there so maybe Mr. Gallagher could get up there and take a look at that.

Another thing, a nice story on the news last night about a Scranton police officer helping a woman who was in labor and helped her deliver the baby, it was Officer Golden, I think Officer Golden deserves to come before city council and get a proclamation. I don't think delivering a baby is in his job description and I think he did a great job, and it was on the news last night and it was in the paper today, I think he deserves a proclamation.

And speaking of proclamations, I know this was brought up a year or so ago, maybe more, I know Council Rogan will remember, it was brought up about giving Matt McGloin a proclamation and it never happened so I'm just curious if that was still in the works or was it forgotten about.

When I came back real quick I had a

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junk carpet sitting a block from me for three or four months, I noticed it was gone, and Mr. Liptai on me two weeks ago so I cleaned up my yard, I know he must carry a lot of heat but this program sure had some quick results and all of those responsible for it I think it was a very good program to clean up the city. You know, you see such quick results.

I was glad to see so much people present tonight, I wish they could continue coming and I won't show up and bother everybody but, like I said, I said it a couple of weeks ago why are we supposed to be responsible for that state road, you know, nobody answered me. Why can't you just give it back to them if they gave it to It's a liability that we don't need and with all of this money they are collecting they can sure afford to pave it better than the City of Scranton, and right by my house on Throop Street, which is a very, very, it's excellent condition, they got equipment to work on it. I don't know whose idea that You go down Throop Street there is was.

nothing wrong with it. They got a grinder there to grind it. It's just such a waste what goes on around here, and then all we hear, well, we have to raise taxes. If the left hand knew what the right hand was doing we wouldn't have to raise taxes so much and if we had some competent people instead of this Amoroso plan we wouldn't have to raise taxes. You are just getting bad advice and getting worse advice and it just keeps getting worse. Like I have said a dozen times, you people just not in touch with the people that are paying the way. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who would like to address counsel?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I know you can't talk about the lawsuit but I spoke on this piece of legislation in 2006. I pointed out that 198 years was almost the length of the Republic. How could anybody in their right mind give out a contract like that, but council fell on deaf ears because I pointed out there is a little kicker

clause in this contract, both parties have to agree before any payment is made and you can see that no payment has been made for all of these years. It never will reach an agreement, the best thing you did was go to Court because that's the only way you're getting any action on it because if was up to me I would have never signed an agreement where I have to come up with \$600,000 but that's the way Scranton goes, but the question is who in their right mind did this and was it political? That's the question we have, was this all political? Because too many things were done at that time.

I don't know, you are not familiar with Briggin Henry, the drilling company that they torn down and built the Ice Box, they gave them all kind of setbacks and did whatever they could for this company, and then later on he came and asked for a KOZ for that front portion. Of course, the school board turned it down, but this is where we sit. Things were done by different councils and the mayor, mostly Mayor Doherty, that put us where we are today and

there is no question about it. I wish people used common sense when they vote for people. Mr. Amoroso's plan, I like it, he did get two pieces of his plan into effect, he gave the people higher taxes and he manages to get money from the nonprofits. Of course they went to him, but why not? This is the way Scranton works. We help the population by doing the best for ourselves and this is where we are today. There is too many people in this government that thinks only of themselves and not of the city as a whole, even though they profess they do, but anybody with common sense look at what's been done and they don't.

We lost millions of dollars to different entities, the Hilton for one, they came before council and said we want to subordinate your loan. Okay. The reason why we wanted to -- I forget whether I'll get another loan I think it was, and if we don't get that, we are going to declare bankruptcy. So then they want to the county and the county arranged for them to get the loan and we subordinated our loan and then

they declared bankruptcy anyway. This is how the city works. We lack common sense for the people of Scranton. You got to look at the people of Scranton as a whole, not of my friend, my name or who I know or who I don't know. We have been going downhill for the last 12 years and there is no question about it and the people really are fed up.

I realize that they complain about the \$300 garbage fee. The University has to pay \$300 garbage fee on every building they own but they probably hired a private contractor, but the city residents can't hire a private contractor to haul away their garbage, probably at a cheaper rate than what the city started. I always said, you got to make the city -- everybody in the city equal, businessmen as well as citizens. You can't just go one way or the other. You can't go all the way to the citizens or all of the way to the businesses. We are a combination.

I like socialism. I'm a socialist actually and I believe that the government should own a lot of things to relieve people

from paying taxes. I do believe that. I believe that's the only way we can keep taxes from skyrocketing is for private government entities to own different things, not too much like the post office, but there is a lot of things we can do and I hope you realize and do it.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes to address council? Ms. Schumacher, these are for you. You don't have to run.

They'll be here.

MS. SCHUMACHER: She might be timing it.

MR. MCGOFF: No, not yet. We'll start now.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. I was going to say welcome back winter, but I'd like to wake up tomorrow morning so I'll skip that. I was happy when I learned of the BRT Ice action, but I believe I remember being unhappy when the revised recovery plan came along because it had dropped seeking that \$600,000 and so I went to the website to find out what was in the revised recovery plan and there was nothing on our revised

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recovery plan, not in the BA's Office and not in the City Council's Office so I did contact PEL and theirs also was the August 2012 version, but I sent them an e-mail and I received a notice back and if I didn't leave half my brains on the kitchen table tonight I would give you what the website is, but it is available I think in DCED at the state level.

And I did print part of that out, I did not because of my time schedule and the time I got I didn't have time to go through everything, but one of the things that I did get to go through were some of the mandates, and again, I printed them out and they are sitting on my kitchen table, but I would like to know, there were simple things, like, you know, shared services, and I know this is a little bit off from shared services, but when you got a Recreation Authority, and I brought this up you when the city went out for their chemicals for the pool this summer I asked and nobody knew whether it included the Recreation Department, and then this past week I see

the Recreation Department is out getting bids for their own chemicals. asinine. And there are several other things that are in there for that are mandates for 2015 and then there is a section that are mandates for 2015/2016, and I would like to request, and it goes along with Mr. Gaughan's spoke during caucus, I would like to request that we get a monthly report maybe on the last Thursday of each month on the status of those mandates? I know there are a lot of things that are supposed to be accomplished and it would be -- I would really appreciate a status on them and I think some of the rest of the residents.

And now back to some follow-up. I thank you for the follow-up, these answers, if I have any further questions I'll come with you. I want to know if Mr. Rogan has anything tonight on the Jersey Freight building and the drop from 2014 -- or 2012 to 2014 in the --

MS. SCHUMACHER: I will certainly

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put in writing. And the other thing was the following up on verifying that all of the non-profits are eligible, and I know

Mr. Evans when he first came aboard offered to do the letter for the HUP test and take care of that and I think maybe we need to review those items and if go forth with that. I know you had people here on other things that might be happening, but they may not happen and that was -- I was pretty sure this was a 2015 item so I think maybe you want to talk about that a little bit next week.

And then where does our cash flow stand at the end of March? And one of the reasons I ask that I was doing a comparison of where the real estate tax revenue from what's estimated for the year and what's collected by the end of March and in 2012 it was 41 percent, in 2013 it was 55, and in 2014 it was 18 percent, and in this year so far it's 31 percent, and that's sort of jumps all over the place and I don't know you do a cash flow when it jumps that way, but I wondered if, Mr. Evans, if you have

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any ideas on why it bounces like that and how we stand on the cash flow at the end of March?

MR. EVANS: That has to do when the money comes in to the city coffers from the banks on escrow accounts and different things like that and when the tax bills actually go out. This year they went out later than they normally do, that's the impact on that, but I'll check that for you because I know we discussed it at the PEL meeting, but I don't have my notes from the meeting.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Can we get some of the figures, can we get the figures for the 2014 year end by budget line item? That would be really helpful in making some comparisons. I'll document them either later tonight or tomorrow morning. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave

Dobrzyn, resident, taxes paid. First of

all, I have been addressing some things

outside of our community, but we are caught

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up in the whirlwind here. It's a total economic system in the United States having to do with trade packs so I have a few phone numbers I'd like to announce because if people aren't earning money and people don't have jobs property taxes have to go up, if you are tired of property taxes going up call this number. If you are tired of no jobs for your relatives call this number. If you are tired of your retirement constantly being threatened because if somebody works for half the money they did last year then you get half the social security eventually you run out of money. So the first one is for all Congressmen Toomey, Matt Cartright and Casey, and Casey is, by the way, he has been against it, I'm a little uncertain on Matt Cartright and I'm sure Pat Toomey would just like another trade pack. 1-202-224-3121. Cartright, I'm not certain of this one, but I'm reasonable certain 1-202-225-5346, and finally, the White House, the most disappointing president that I have ever worked for at this point, 1-202-456-1111.

Enough said on that, I'm going to get to city issues now. First of all, I would like once again to remind everybody if you have that clunker in your back yard sprouting out maple shoots you can get \$150, 200 bucks for it. Call a salvaging tow company, there are several, and you can probably call City Hall here and get a list of them.

A week or two ago three people were cited on Alder Street for parking the wrong way and granted they are in violation of the regulation, however, they were supposed to park pointing up the hill in the 900 block of Alder and if you try that without a good going head start you will probably be replacing a transmission or an engine so we need to consider that at least during the winter and maybe it's time to back up a little bit or modify things.

And trash fees, now, a year and a half ago there was \$7.5 million were announced in unpaid trash fees. If it's Aunt Milly on her \$700 a month salary or social security then, you know, I think we could just leave a lien closed, I'm not sure

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of that, I'm not a legal expert, but we have plenty enough that we pay, but when somebody owes \$15,000, \$10,000, and they are bold enough to even run for city offices, shame on you, pay it. No more free lunches.

And once again, the Chamber of Commerce and this Amoroso plan and everything else, these organizations hire people to come up with studies that benefit them, the national Chamber of Commerce constantly, US Chamber of Commerce, Transpacific trade pack, despite the fact that wages have within stagnant for 35 or 40 years in this country and in the privately employed working class and it's not acceptable. It's no longer acceptable. It's like I said, that's also less taxes coming in in the form of wage taxes, and as much as we need our \$156 tax, EMT tax, it is revers progressive taxation because if you make \$100,000 that's about .15 percent of your paycheck, if you make \$15,600 that is 1 percent of your paycheck annually, and locally they are contributing the sprawl and the business property bubble. They get

grants to go move up valley and you have to have a car and these companies don't want to pay the wages. They don't want to pay anymore than \$9 or \$10 an hour, cars with 60,000 miles \$15,000, \$16,000, where is that going? Thank you and have a good night.

I'll be back next week.

MR. WALSH: Good evening, Council.

My name is John Walsh, I'm a resident. In regards to Judge Braxton coming out today and giving his response, yesterday when I was in the courtroom he said he was going to take two to three weeks to do it, and he shocked me when he came out, but I will be appealing it to the Superior Court and on to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania just to let you know. Thank you.

MR. MCANDREW: Good evening. My name is Sean McAndrew, I'm a homeowner. I'm here to talk about the pension problem that's been going on in the city. It's no secret that it's under investigation but, you know, this is taking a very long time and the issue with the time it's taking is every day that passes by more money is being

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wasted on people who are receiving benefits that weren't qualified for it in the first place and also the double benefits on top of that so every day that goes by we are losing more money and it's a really discouraging for the taxpayers, because as everybody else is talking about the garbage bill we got in the mail today, or this week, you know, that's money that we can use towards the roads or the garbage fees and, you know, I understand stand it's under investigation but we are kind of in the dark here. Hopefully, eventually we can get some insight on the process of it or, you know, what's been found or what's going on, and I've been trying to do some research myself. One of the members of the pension boards was on the board back in 2002 when the pensions were approved, happens to be our city controller as well Mrs. Novembrino. I have sent a three-page letter asking questions if her office has received any contact from the local authorities or have they been under investigation or are they aware of any of these problem that's been going on because

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what's quite alarmingly is somebody in the office, or her deputy controller back in the day or a family member got double pay. So, you know, it just doesn't look too right and I think it's a deeper issue that we need to look into. Unfortunately, I haven't gotten a response yet, it's been almost three weeks and, I mean, I could assume why I'm not getting a response, I don't really expect one, I mean, hopefully I'll get a response after May 19, but again, I'm just bringing this to an issue to see if there is any status on this or if we could maybe push it along a little bit because, again, every day we are wasting money that we don't have and we're on the verge of bankruptcy so every penny counts. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

McGoff. I have a few items this evening. I
was happy to hear that Judge Braxton did

permit the City to exercise its right to the increased LST tax, hopefully that will help us meet the budget requirement that we filled in for that item this year. Going forward, it will become -- the problem with this tax is that it is permanent, the commuter tax was something that was not going to be permanent, it was only going to be used for the pensions and would eventually go away, the LST tax I think is here to stay.

Also, the story that was out about the Boscov's and the mall, I'm very anxious to get that settled. To me, the mall represents a problem that hangs over the city's head constantly. There is some interest in the private sector and community sector of getting the mall moving in another direction and I would like to see this settled as quickly as possible that we can make some progress on that issue.

I did welcome the news that the city is pursuing litigation against the Ice Box.

Some of these items that have been hanging around the city for quite a few years, I'm

happy to see that they are being started to be settled one way or another so we can move on into the future projects that I think are important to the city.

I would like to take an opportunity to congratulate the Scranton High School Knights Show Choir, they finished second and third in some national singing competitions. The work that there moderators do, Lisa McGlocklin and Ronald Barrett and along with the work of the parents. These are something that these kids do on their own on their free time and using their contributions from their friends.

Also, the news that was also today about Officer Golden, I think our police department always does a fine job but in this case Officer Golden kind of went beyond the -- I don't know if I could deliver a baby on the street, I'm not sure about that.

And, also, in terms of the audit, as we heard about today I would like to see a monthly status report now on the audit as we go forward. Council came on this year and last year actually the auditing company has

always been in place and the problems with the audit and the process were still in place, also, so I am anxious to see improvement in the auditing process for the city to move forward.

And finally, I am very excited about Saturday, I have been part of the planning committee for the 150th anniversary of the city. There is a fine program prepared for Saturday. Also, the work of Scranton Tomorrow to get a group of ethnic food vendors and local talents to perform so far is an outstanding list and there is going to be many very exciting demonstrations on Scranton's history, this is the first event for the one-year celebration and, once again, I congratulate Scranton Tomorrow for the work that they have done in putting this together. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, a couple of brief items and then I'll talk a little bit more at length. I would like to echo some of what Councilman Wechsler mentioned, the benefit of speaking first is you get to talk

about all the good things.

MR. WECHSLER: I'll give you the bad stuff.

MR. ROGAN: But on a couple of other things, I'd also like to thank Scranton Tomorrow for the good work they are doing with the kickoff for the festivities.

Unfortunately I -- or fortunately I will be out of town, my brother is graduating from Pittsburgh University this weekend, so I won't be able to attend any of the festivities this weekend, but I am looking forward to future events.

Regarding the mall, there has been a lot of talk, and specifically on social media and local blogs about different ideas for what the mall can become and how that space can best be utilized. Many of the ideas that were brought up are great ideas, some of them are a little more out there, but other things really are good ideas that people in the community want to see and the list goes on and on and on, different businesses people would like to see come into the area, different concepts. The idea

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of a Reading Terminal-style venue is one that's very popular but there are others.

Regarding today's article with the mall, with the diagnose on for auction, I think part of the problem with the mall is Al Boscov. I think that Mr. Boscov cares about one thing and one thing only and that is his store. That's plain as day if you look at the vacancy rate. It appears there have been no attempt to attract new businesses into that mall. I firmly believe that Mr. Boscov is trying to devalue that property so he can buy it at a rock bottom price. It's not right what's being done. am very hopeful that in outside investor will purchase that property and develop it. If Boscov remains a part of it great, but we need to move in a different direction with this building.

The current concept of malls is not working nationwide. It's not a unique problem to Scranton that shopping malls aren't doing well. Viewmont is the exception. The Viewmont Mall is right outside of the city doing extremely well,

but if you look at shopping malls all across the country they are suffering and the Steamtown Mall in Scranton is in even much worse shape than many of them are. through that mall is like a ghost town. There are very few stores and it's a domino effect. Each store that closes that's fewer people than are walking there that might buy something else at another store, and it works in reverse. If a new developer comes in and puts one or two new ideas in there, things that are popular, we get people back into that building that will shop at all the stores in there not just the one new store that they are looking for.

So I'm encouraged by the progress in this regarding the mall, but I'm hopeful that we will see new ownership and that that will, you know, that it won't be Mr. Boscov calling the shots there anymore.

Secondly, the pension issues were brought up tonight and I spent a little bit of time reading through the minutes that we get from all of the pension boards, we receive five sets of minutes from all of the

different pensions composite, police, so on, but there is a few things that I did want to read, and I won't mention the people's names other than the attorney for the Pension Board, and I have been very concerned about this issue since it first came to light that people were receiving double pensions and months have gone by and we haven't heard any answers.

Even at the March 25 meeting a resident asked when a status report -- if a status report will be given as far as the investigation goes, and Attorney Durkin asked, "Maybe the Auditor General or the state police?"

And the resident said, "Either or."

Attorney Durkin, "No, they will have to speak for themselves. On our investigations other than what I said no. We have a hearing scheduled on -- "I'm not going to mention the name -- "in April and others are in progress. I do have a meeting today with the lawyers involved and some of the people. That is the extent of what I'm going to say about it. Thank you."

Another resident asks, "With regards to these hearings, are you going to inform the public?"

Attorney Durkin, "No."

The reporter from the Scranton Times then asks, "Unless the employees agree to it?"

Attorney Durkin, "Right. If the employees agree to it then that's fine. My position is that there are not open under the Sunshine Act because they involve investigations and hearings regarding personnel matters."

"If the employees agree," is posed as a question again. Attorney Durkin, "That is fine. Then we would do it."

The resident then asks, "Would there be some kind of public notice in the legal section of the newspaper?"

Attorney Durkin, "No. There will be a notice at the board about when the hearing is."

The resident asks, "What does that mean?"

Attorney Durkin, "Here, like we are

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today, like I'm telling you today there will be a notice."

The resident asks, "You will know?"

Attorney Durkin, "It will be known
when they are."

The resident asks, "Well, there won't be another meeting until April 17 so how would we know if the person wanted theirs open to the public?"

And the response from Attorney Durkin was that the resident would have to ask her. And these go on and on and with no answers on what's going on with this pension scandal. Looking through the Pension Boards are constantly in executive session and we are not provided with minutes on what goes on in executive session and even if we were we wouldn't be able to comment on them. think that the public has a right to know what's going on regarding these double pensions that have been given out illegally, and as I stated, many months have gone by and we know as much now as we did the day this story broke so I'm hopeful that very shortly these answers will be -- these

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questions will be answered whether it be by the Pension Board or by any of the other agencies involved, particularly, the Auditor General's Office, so we need to know what happened, what mistakes happen, so they don't happen again and who is responsible for this waste of taxpayer money and that is all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Mr. Evans.

Thank you. MR. EVANS: Just a few items, I'd like to circle back to House Bill 316 which addresses municipal pension reform at the state level. I find it interesting that what happened recently was a group of ten mayors from York, West Chester, Meadow Lynn, Lancaster, Kutztown, Easton, Harrisburg, Allentown, Pittsburgh and Erie felt the need to issue a press release basically calling out state reps and state senators to get on board and support House Bill 316 and Senate Bill 211. So with that in mind I'd like to remind our State Senator Blake, and State Representative Farina and State Representative Flynn to take a good hard look at House Bill 316 and Senate Bill

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211. It's time to act and time to get engaged. Municipalities in the state are floundering under a sea of debt and the pensions are crushing these municipalities including Scranton because we are number one on the list. So it's time to step up and get involved.

Secondly, when I became a city councilman I wanted to get some real change done, some tangible things, and it's just to effect positive change where I could help make Scranton a better place for residents, taxpayers and the business community. really wasn't much more complicated than that and over these past months working alongside these gentlemen to my right I have come to learn that we all share that common vision. We sometimes disagree on policies and certain issues, but we respect each other's opinions and viewpoints and we all sincerely want to make our city a great place to live and to work and we all want to find a way to create those positive changes sooner than later. We can no longer wait for change to come to us, we must find a way

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to act to make change happen.

Since I joined the city council we have been at the forefront of the discussions on pension reform, union contracts, the recovery plan, land banks, blight, pro-business policies, pro-neighborhood policies, tax exempt properties, reassessment and more. There is much to accomplish and as we know 2015 is the critical year in Scranton's future. should continue to strive to be partners with the administration because we know the mayor and his administration wants many of the same things we do, but we also must realize that time is of the essence and we can no longer wait on the slow, deliberate, palatial pace of the city government.

Over the next eight months of governing this year I hope you will see -- or continue to see a positive and an even more proactive city council. That's all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you.

Council received a revised street sweeping

schedule due to the recent weather this week. The street sweeper is scheduled to be in the West Mountain area Jackson Street to Pettibone Street, including North South Road from May 4 to May 8.

We have not received an official response from the mayor to the letter that council sent two weeks ago about forming an exploratory committee on land banks. I would like Mrs. Reed to send that again and ask for a response before our next meeting. That is a part of the recovery plan and I don't think we should wait any longer for official action to be taken.

In light of the LST increase, the final completion of 2013 audit and the recent retention of Henry Amoroso as a consultant to the mayor, I think it would be appropriate to request a public caucus with Mayor Courtright, Henry Amoroso and Business Administrator Dave Bulzoni to give us an update on how the administration intends to proceed with the plan developed by Mr. Amoroso and where we are within that process.

Specific questions I'd like to address include how the LST revenue will effect the plan overall, how the LST revenue will be allocated and distributed, what are the next fiscal priorities moving forward in the 2016 and 2017 and what measures are being taken to ensure that the 2014 audit is submitted on time. We had a similar caucus last year and I think it would be helpful to get an update on where we are within the plan and within that process and I would hope that we would send a letter to the mayor, Mr. Amoroso and Mr. Bulzoni asking them to come to a public caucus in the near future, and that's is all I have this week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. The audit seems to be -- now that it's completed there are still questions concerning the audit and what's going to happen and in the future, as far as the Parking Authority the receiver does not respond to the city and that's a problem, that's where the problem lies.

Mr. Washo is not employed by the City of Scranton, he is employed by the bond insurer

and, therefore, he responds to them and they are then I'll say unwilling or slow in producing the information that is needed.

Believe me, I have been at numerous meetings where this has been discussed and yet the bond insurers have not responded very well to the city.

As far as the moving forward, yes, we have employed someone to be involved in audit preparation. Part of that employment is a training component that the people in the Business Administration Office will be through the process of preparation be trained for those jobs. I think getting someone in to help with audit preparation is an asset to the city. It will help us to have the audit done on time. The cost for this audit prep is minimal when you look at the overall budget and if we can -- if they will help in having an audit done in due time I think that that becomes a great asset to the city.

And as far as the completion of the audit in the future, it was in the RFP that there would be a penalty. The RFP was

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accepted by the bidder and so that is within, you know -- now within the contract of the auditor. I believe that we will see the audit for 2014 done in a very effective efficient manner. I'm maybe being optimistic, but I would hope that, in fact, it is done by, you know, 2014, we do have in a timely manner, hopefully before October, but that remains to be seen.

As far as the Ice Box is concerned, this has been an ongoing concern. Since I have been on council it has been talked about. As one of the speakers said, it was no one here that was involved in that contract. Now that it's gone to litigation hopefully we will see some proceeds from the Ice Box, but remember that the developer did make marvelous improvements to that property, and once the KOZ ran out there are taxes now being paid on that property, probably I think at last it was, I forget the amount, but that property is an asset to the city. Yes, hopefully we get the money that is deserved, but also remember that, you know, the Ice Box is much better than

what was there before.

Yes, the pension is an issue that is ongoing. I think that it would be helpful for us to see some type of status report on the investigations. I think once the first hearing is held information will be more forthcoming, you know, once that first hearing is over we will kind of see what the situation was and sort of what happened that becomes public record then maybe we will have some more answers as to how that took place and what we are going to do to remedy that situation.

And the last thing on the mall, I'm glad Mr. Rogan spoke to that, now Mr. Boscov can get upset with Mr. Rogan. I'm already on the list. I think there is, you know, a no entrance picture on the entrance to Boscov's but, yes, something needs to be done. The ownership of the mall is what is in contention here. Until we can get a specific, that's a tough word to get out, I'm sorry for the impediment there, until we get a specific ownership there is no way that we can -- that anybody can move forward

on the development of the Steamtown Mall so something needs to be done and as Mr. Rogan said. I'm not sure that Mr. Boscov is the one to do that. He has known in the past as Mr. Rogan said that his primary interest is Al Boscov and I would much prefer someone owning that whose interest is in developing it so that it is a benefit to the City of We have had numerous -- Michelle Scranton. Dempsey was here and showed, you know, kind of a grandiose, you know, idea for the mall, but there are other ideas and we do need to move forward. We can't let that mall continue to deteriorate to the point where it's just an empty building. We need to do something and something needs to be done quickly, and that's all. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: I don't want to belabor the point, but one thing I forgot to mention, another item that would probably be actually worse than the mall staying in it's current state would be the county taking it over and turning it into office buildings. Some of the candidates for county commissioners are putting on a platform of

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bringing the county under one roof, and what concerns me with that is if they are considering using the mall as that one roof. That's prime commercial space in downtown Scranton. We don't need more government offices, it will be off the tax rolls. That is all.
