MR. EVANS: Yeah. The Connors Park memorial day dedication will take place on June 1, the time is yet to be set. It's going to be some time that day to dedicate the memorial at Connors Park.

MR. MCGOFF: This Saturday, May 16, at 11 a.m. the Armed Forces Day parade will be held. The parade route begins at Gino Merli Veteran's Center on Penn Avenue and proceeds throughout the downtown ending at courthouse square. Again, this Saturday, the Armed Forces Day parade, at the Gino Merli Center at 11:00 to the courthouse square.

Just to note, election day is

Tuesday, May 19, we encourage all to please
get out and vote. Even in a primary

election votes are important. It is your important to voice your opinion. On that day, city hall will be closed, however, DPW is working and there will be refuse pickup on that day.

Next Thursday, May 21, there will be a public hearing at 6:00 p.m. for the transfer of a liquor license for use at 306 Penn Avenue as required by the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board. That is Item 5-C on tonight's agenda.

offer that anyone who wishes to wear a red

TV and others so feel free.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
PARTICIPATION.

MR. MCGOFF: Charlie Charlesworth.

I would like to add, first of all, welcome back, Mr. Charlesworth. Mr. Charlesworth was at a caucus a number of months ago and with him is Mr. Bernie McGurl who we welcome back to our council chambers.

MR. MCGURL: Thank you,

Mr. President. We are here tonight just to let everybody know that we are working with the city in cooperation with the Lackawanna County River Corridor Association, our other affiliate, Lackawanna Valley Conservancy, and the Lackawanna Valley Chapter of Trout Unlimited on a project known as Sweeney's Beach, and we have a handout that we would like to give to the members of the public here this evening, and we have a presentation panel and I've got a sketch map that we have just provided members of council.

And what this project is, we identified about two acres of city-owned property that's actually part of the Pinebrook recreation area at Chick Feldman field and it borders on the Lackawanna River. It's one of the few spots in Scranton where one can approach the river over what is the approximate original topography and you are not separated by a retaining wall or a railroad grade or a flood control levy and the fact that it was

city-owned and it's accessible but it has been undeveloped, it gave us some cause for consideration. So we have proposed a lease from the city to our organizations and it's a 25-year lease and it's renewable.

And the reason for that is we are interested in securing funding to make improvements to the property both grants and private fundraising that we would do and the lease is modeled after other leases that the city has with various community organizations such as the Marine Corp League up at the Mattes Community Center on East Mountain, the United Neighborhood Centers in the Bellevue Center building, and the Forioni building up in West Side and several other organizations, the Keyser Valley Community Center for the Keyser Valley Neighborhood Association.

So it gives us equity under the law so when we are applying for state grant in often cases there may be a requirement that we have some form of equity in collaboration with the city to be the grant applicant, that would relieve the city of the need to

be the grant applicant and we have some perhaps a little bit more flexibility in securing some funds for it under those purposes.

So we have preliminary plans drawn up and the idea is to create a river access point where the public could go to actually access the river for fishing and boating.

We have basically a bend in the river where there is a nice gravel beach and you could safely land and launch canoes and kayaks, probably a couple of dozen at a time because it's a big gravel point guard at the bend in the river and it's also a nice spot to gradually wade into the river to go fly fishing or casting fishing.

So we are looking at making some improvements on the parking area that would use pave cuts millings so that rain water would infiltrate. We are looking at doing green technology, green infrastructure wherever we can here. We have salvaged boulders from the retaining walls at the old Linden Street overpass of the railroad that was out of commission for a few years. We

worked with the city and PennDOT to salvage those railroad abutment stones. We placed them on the property and we are going to be using them to create landscape terraces on the property. We are going to create a public assembly area, there will be pathways to access the river and parking areas and areas where we will try to suppress the knotweed invasive vegetation that's very prevalent down there, open that up and have a lawn area that can be mowed and then we are going to be doing plantings of native trees and vegetation so it will be basically enhance the whole park.

We will be looking also to make an access pathway up to the parking lot at the Chick Feldman field area as well over the long-term so right now we have got the preliminary plans made, we have permit applications to the county conservation district and the State Department of Environmental Protection for permits to work in and along the edge of the river in this location because we are and along the flood plane areas, and we are ready to go and get

the lease developed with the city and we've got some initial funding -- we have about what, 20 --

MR. CHARLESWORTH: \$22,000.

MR. MCGURL: \$22,000 of initial funds, some grant funds from the State Trout Unlimited Program and also from the Lackawanna County Reinvest Program and we are looking for additional funds. We have a potential initial budget of about \$130,000 o improvements that we would like to make over the next several years and we are hoping to make at least some initial improvements this summer so that the site can be a little bit more amenable when we have the Trout Unlimited National Convention here in September.

So we will be working over there this summer and we will be looking for volunteers, we will be sending announcements out saying we are going to need folks to come over help knock down the knotweed and clear the brush and there is some -- there is some homeless camps over there and we are going to clean that up in the next few weeks

as well.

So that's the situation, we just wanted to advise everybody that we are in it for the long-term and we are looking forward to working with the city on this project.

MR. MCGOFF: Would you or

Mr. Charlesworth wish to speak to the

convention that is coming just to let the

public know about that?

MR. CHARLESWORTH: Sure. First, I'd like to say that at its completion this will be known as an environmental education center and we will be offering the use of it to Lackawanna College and the two universities from the city and also the high schools in the city where if the students would be over there will be able to go over there and study environmental issues that have to do with the river and other environment issues that have to do with the water quality. The project will also increase the trout habitat that's in the river and will help clean up the water quality in the river and reduce the temperature.

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Convention is coming here September 16th through the 20th. We anticipate it being the largest national convention Trout Unlimited has ever had, and as I mentioned to council before, there is two reasons why Trout Unlimited is coming here and that is that the Lackawanna River has been listed as one of the 100 best trout streams in North America in a recent publication, a book that was published in November, and that and the fact that the population base between Boston and Washington, D.C., represents 25 percent of the total population of America and we are right dead center in the middle of the that and we are looking forward to having about 450 to 500 people visiting our fine

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you very much.

MR. MCGURL: Just one more item
while I have the podium for one second, I
want to invite everyone to Lackawanna
Riverfest which is going to be held
Saturday, May 30, and it's our annual canoe

race, starts up in Blakely and Archbald in the morning, but we have our finish line set up at the Olive Street bridge. There will be bands, there will be music, the show mobile, tents, food vendors will be there all afternoon. The canoe race is coming in. We have our regatta at 3:00 and we have the duck race at 4:00 so we would like to invite everyone to join us to celebrate the river on Saturday, May 30. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening,
Scranton City Council, Jamie, stenographer,
Lori, Mail, even though he is running out on
me, good evening to you. I'm here tonight
to promote a ziti dinner that's the Dante
Literary Society is going to be holding on
the 23rd of May from 4 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.
Tickets for the dinner are \$10. You can
either get ziti with meatballs or ziti with
chicken and broccoli. If you just want ziti
alone it's a \$7.00 ticket, naturally adults
beverages will be provided and be there and,
like I said, tickets are \$10, I have tickets

with me if anybody would like to purchase some tickets after the meeting, I'll be available after the meeting. Again, it's on the 23rd of May from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. takeout or sit in, whichever way you would like it.

Also, after the ziti dinner we are going to have a DJ upstairs, the Northeast Social Dance Club will be holding dancing up there and that will be from 8:00 until 11:00 p.m., so you can eat your ziti, have a couple of cool ones and then go upstairs and work it off by dancing, and I understand that most of the people on city council are good dancers so I'm sure we can get you guys up there with your favorite sweetheart and do some dancing, and the cost for the dance is it only five bucks, so it's from 8 until 11, and again, this is on the 23rd of May up at the Dante Literary Society at 1916 Prospect Avenue.

Basically that's about it, so I hope to see you all here, I hope to see some of you, I'd like to see you all up there on the 23rd of May, but I'd like to see some of you

up there, it's a good time to socialize with the public, get to meet some of the voters and residents of the city, have a good time, have something to eat and have an adult beverage or two and do some dancing so hope to see you there. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you,
Mr. Jackowitz. Jane Smedley.

MS. SMEDLEY: Good evening, Council.

My name is Jane Smedley. I represent a
entity known as 16th Ward, LLC, and we are
on your agenda this evening for a liquor
license transfer from Clarks Summit to
downtown Scranton. For simple location
purposes, it's in the 300 block of Penn
Avenue, and I just wanted to introduce
myself as well as our client, Mr. Stepkoff,
who is in the back in case you have any
questions. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Doug Miller.

MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council.

Doug Miller, Scranton. It's been quite

sometime since I have been present at a

council meeting, but I have certainly been

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well informed of what's transpired in recent weeks and, you know, unfortunately, not a whole lot of progress. You know, it's comes a point where you just have to step back a little bit because it gets to be just very frustrating when you see the events that have just transpired in this city for the last ten plus year. And now we elect a new administration and anew council and we hear the grand plan and the story line that you we are going to move the city forward and all of these things are going to take place and that the residents had some reason for optimism, but that just hasn't happened and, you know, when you look to try and see some light at the end of the tunnel at this point I just don't see that realistically at this time. It's not negativity, it's reality. That's where we are at this time.

You know, we listened to a few speakers earlier talking about the Lackawanna Heritage Valley Trail, and those are some of the good things that go in this community and we don't want to overlook those things, but ultimately we are in a

position now where we just see residents fleeing this city on a daily basis. You know, you have had the LST tax that this council has already passed, I wasn't here to speak on it while he was on agenda, but I certainly raised my objection prior to that. It's not a solution to turn this city around, it's just another added poison that councils and administrations just continue to inject into this city, it's just another way to just kill the city off once and for all. We can go back and continue to place this on the residents of his city because that's the easy way to do it.

You know, in the words of past council president Janet Evans I believe she used to use the term it's the lazy mans way of doing things and, you know, unfortunately, that's the philosophy we have in this city is we take the lazy approach to just about everything that comes forward to us because we don't have any creativity. I sometimes question the fact whether or not the people we have elected are even capable of doing their job, that's a scary thought

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but it's something that we really need to at this point seriously consider because electing somebody based on political affiliation or the amount of money they spent is not a vision for this city, it's only just going to lead us to a path of destruction and that's where we are right now.

You know, people may not appreciate the things I'm saying but it's come to the point where the truth needs to be heard. can't be sugarcoating things anymore. nice to talk about how we believe the city is moving forward and we believe that all of the taxes and everything else that we just keep placing on the same people over and over is going to ultimately put us back into some sort of fiscal solvency it's not going to happen and people are leaving. generation, forget it, they are done. are not coming back. We can say that much. They are done. Now we just have to worry about our seniors because they are ultimately what we have left here. make up predominantly for the most part the

majority of the population at this point and the fear that I have is that at some point we are going to lose that senior population not to, you know, sound morbid here, but that's going to happen some day and then what are we going to do? We are going to see the city's population go from 70,000 to 50,000 to 40,000 to 30,000 and then what's going to be left? We are not going to have anything to hold our heads up high over.

And, you know, I just don't see where we are going at this point. You know, we talk about the quality of life, there really is no quality of life in this city. You know, I appreciate the intent of the focus is to target blight, but we really haven't addressed those issues. We haven't really stood up and took responsibility for who really caused the blight in this city, and as I have said before, I think we need to ask ourselves one question, did the residents of this city really cause the blight or is it because we elected people who just continue to just take everything out of -- everything that residents have at

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this point and they have nothing left to give and they don't have the ability to maintain their property.

You know, tearing things down and condemning homes and citing people and fining them, again, it's the lazy man's way of doing things. We need leadership in this city and it needs to start now. You know, we have an election on Tuesday, you know, I'm hoping the residents of this city will go out and vote and those who weren't registered I'm hoping will become registered for November, and we need to start taking control of our city, this is our community and we can't tolerate what goes on around here anymore. I'm pretty fed up with it. have been fed up with it for a long time and I know a lot of people that come to these meetings are fed up, and a lot of people that you don't see here anymore they have given up, and I can't say I don't blame them.

And, you know, we blame the wrong people for a lot of the things that go on in this city and we want to blame the City

Controller for a lot of things that go on, let's keep in mind one thing, and I'll wrap up in a moment here, of all that's transpired in the city, we have gone through administrations and councils, but the one thing has always remained consistent and it's always been in that office, and I hope the residents will remember that. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
Scranton resident and taxpayer. Does anyone
have any idea how much we paid Rossi &
Company for the 2013 audit?

MR. MCGOFF: Offhand I do not. I know it's a matter of public record and could be easily obtained.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I know. I found out from the Controller's Office this week, we paid \$48,000 to Rossi & Company. That wasn't the cost of the audit, we also paid Baker and Tilly \$46,292 so that audit cost us \$94.292. Now, SB & Company who was awarded the contract for the 2014 audit put a figure of \$40,000. However, if you recall

we put out a request for bids for an audit company to help our administrative people work with the independent auditor to do the 2014 audit, so we have no idea really what we are going to be paying for the 2014 audit. I do not recall seeing legislation come forward to council on who is going to be the audit firm selected to help do the municipal audit functions upstairs. Is that legislation forthcoming or does anybody know? The bids were opened several weeks ago?

MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. Reed, could you -MS. REED: Yes, the legislation will
be forthcoming.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, thank you, because I will be interested to see, you know, who Mr. Bulzoni is recommending because we are going to be paying another high price for our independent audit for 2014. Do not under estimate the importance of a timely and comprehensive audit. It is

important to the city, especially one in financial distress that says it has the objective of reestablishing it's financial credibility so hopefully the 2014 audit will be completed before the end of this year, hopefully it will not cost \$94,000.

On a different note, Mr. McGoff, I thank you for publicizing the Armed Forces parade day on May 16. I do hope that those who have the time will go out and recognize the military personnel and veterans who participate in that event. We owe them quite a bit of gratitude. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: That thank you should go to Mrs. Reed because she put it on my cheat sheet tonight.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Lori, an oorah to you.

MR. MCGOFF: Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Thank you, Council.

Good to see everyone tonight. It's been brought to attention several times that sometimes I support Mr. Courtright and other times I badmouth the poor fellow. Let me say this about that, I understand that he

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undertook an extremely challenging job and he was young and inexperienced to me he is young. I know how much he must have wanted the job because I talked to him a couple of times, you know, before the election at meetings and all, instead of a good strong administration he failed himself with the people he got backing him. I'm trying not to offend anybody, I'm weighing my words.

Mr. Amoroso I was told this week by a very knowledgeable person that he is definitely a conflict of interest representing the city and being paid by Lackawanna College. You can't ask him for donations or whatever when they are paying him not to do that. I think he should return the money immediately or resign because you are going to have a problem with this, it's not going to go away and you people know it's not proper what's going on and that's part of your administration it needs to be proper, it needs to have integrity. You have lost a lot of integrity hiring Bulzoni. You broke your own law that was there to keep this from happening.

And I'd like to know as soon as possible you people when somebody stands here and asks you for something you say next week. I'm 79 years old, I might not have next week, you know? I'd like to know who paid Amoroso's company for that ten-minute telephone poll and I'd like to know the results of it. They asked questions for ten minutes and I never heard nothing, I didn't see nothing in the paper. It must have been quite an expense.

Well, the public has been disappointed with this administration since its start. We realize right away that our new futuristic mayor with all of these promises just wasn't going to happen. He is not meeting his own goals. I talked to some people say this administration can be turned around and I personally don't think it can but, you know, I'm willing to wait and see but Mr. Courtright needs to take the reigns of this city immediately. He is always in the background. People want to see him come out and do something for the city and he hasn't done that, you know. I have told you

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several times I don't have to live here, I've got places I could go. I'm here by I love this city. I wish I could show it like Mr. Bolus does, you know, do something big for it, but I don't have that kind of finances, but I tell you one thing I do that means a lot to me I miss my Thursday night wrestling and I have done watched them for 25 or 30 years, I gave that up to come here to bother you people and the Lone Ranger that I watch at 7:00. Now. that ought to impress you people a little bit how much I look forward to sparring with Mr. McGoff and how much I do love the city and wish I could contribute more to it. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I have this little piece of, well, literature in front of me of Sweeney Beach, am I to assume this is a flood plain? I don't see no elevations, how high this is above the river and without knowing the elevations

above the river I assume it's a flood plain.

And if we are going to poor money into a flood plain that's not a very smart idea. I would like to see the city engineer even look at that and attempt the elevations or the state or somebody check the elevations on this property.

MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Sbaraglia, that's in the legislation that when they do come forward with an exact plan he has to check that out so that is in the legislation.

MR. SBARAGLIA: But it's marked as a flood plain even on the literature they gave us and it's not very -- you know, it's not a very good idea to get rid of anything that's a flood plain.

Okay, let me get on. When you had amusement tax that you put out you had tweak it because the bartenders complained. I see Mr. Evans is complaining about the rental agreement, he thinks that should be tweaked, too. Why are you passing legislation that has to be changed? Don't you look at it and think of everything that could go wrong with it before you put it out there? A lot of

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the legislation you put out is actually ridiculous, and I don't think you are improving the quality of life in Scranton other than making people hate each other. That's about the only quality of life you have done. The only good thing about we are going to have election Tuesday, I hope somebody uses their head instead of going out and voting their name. That's the worst think you could do. The Democratic party has ruined Scranton, there is no question about it, even those who said they weren't Democrats went along with the Democrats. The city has been destroyed by one party and there is no question about that. You turn your back on anything. Mr. McGoff, you were in charge of the some of that pension, it falls back on you, too, because you were in charge giving out pensions with the Pension You are on that board along with roles and the mayor and various people I guess from the city.

Obviously, there was a huge failure in the pension system and you can't hide about the fact that it belongs partly to

We have been coming a long time before council. The only thing you are really pointing out to us is everybody has a nose and an opinion because -- an opinion, but we didn't give you opinions we give you suggestions. There is a big difference between a suggestion and an All of this trouble that the city has and to yet nobody read the contracts thoroughly on this ord understood them or anything. We lost a lot of money when we did the last selling our delinquencies. lost a lot of money when we took them 108 loans and set out there and never looked or followed through on them knowing that the city was responsible for them 108 loans that they were paid. These things came before you.

I know you are only part-time, but you still citizens of Scranton. Your children want to live in Scranton, I hope. I told mine to get out, but yours might want to, and they are going to be stuck with what

you are doing and that's the bad thing about it. The population of Scranton is probably around 72,000, I think. We got a thousand people on pension or active -- 600 on pension and another 400 active, meaning 1,000, and if you look at the numbers there it's one out of 72 people. You got 72 people producing one employee or partial authority or retiree of the city and out of that 72 how many are children or how many live in the high-rise? You got to look at the demographic before you start the grandioso plans.

I fought with Mayor Doherty many, many times, but the only thing I agreed with him is we can only afford half the government we can't afford, that was the only thing he really made sense to me.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you,
Mr. Sbaraglia. Anyone else?

MR. BERGERHOFF: How's it going, I'm

Dave Bergerhoff from the City of Scranton.

I wasn't going to speak tonight, but after

listening to Dougy Miller, and I know the

sentiment, I know it is depressing, let's

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just leave it at that, but if you trying to get people out to vote in the primaries you have you to be optimistic. There are good candidates on the ballot. If you don't like the people that are up there, you don't like the way the city is going then you got to come out. Dougy has a lot of complaints, a lot of people have complaints, that's all we hear is complaints, we don't hear solutions.

I would like to see council step up every once in while and come up with ideas. Maybe I don't know a lot about this new project or staying alongside the river here, but at least it's something that I can agree with because I think the river is important to the City of Scranton. I love Wilkes-Barre, I love what they did with their waterfront down there, I kayak the Lackawanna River, I kayak the Susquehanna River, I go onto Harvey's Lake so I appreciate these projects. Knowing that te city is broke I want them privately funded and I want them to get it through other people through charity. I don't think the city has to be involved in granting money to

him.

out grants because we always know that there is some working behind the scenes that got that money and that blood money where it went, just like when we are talking about these audits. Now, maybe it's all up and up fair, legal, whatever, but people don't believe that because the way the government runs.

I don't ever like when government puts

I don't want to get up here and be negative and I don't want to see negative campaigning. Tuesday is very important. People need to turn out, not 20, 25, percent for the primaries, maybe 30 percent in general, get out and vote. Vote someone If the people who don't vote would just vote for a completely different candidate they would run the city. It's so ridiculous to me that the people who don't vote even think they have a voice. I could sit here all day and insult you, you can't vote for or against me because you are not even registered. Stop your complaining, get out and get registered, vote make a difference in the general election, do

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something and if you want to be part of the solution that's the solution. You are not going to have a right in the city, you are not going to take over the world with communism or whatever these silly other ideas are. There is not much you can do in a country like this except vote and voting works when people actually go out and vote. Stop voting for names, stop voting for leaders. Thank you.

something happened today that I don't know
if it made me want to throw up or cry or

guy to school every morning there is a home
at the corner of Derby Avenue and Burke
Street and it's obvious that it's vacant
because there is some weathered telephone
books on the front porch, but other than

that it's beautiful. It's got a new roof, it's got new siding, and the only problem that happened is a couple of the weeks ago it had a pine tree that was very close to the house, it got uprooted and it's leaning against the house and as soon as I saw it I did write a letter to the woman hoping that she has her mail forwarded so I don't know if she received it, but nothing has been done about that.

However, when I went to school this morning I did see three white pieces of paper had been added including the -- blocking the "No Trespassing" sign that she has on her door. It, one, was a quality of life ticket for the tree, and the other was the code I guess on the tree, on the damaged tree, but the other was a notice that her property had been condemned since 2012, she had done nothing, and I apologize, I was going to take a picture of it and a picture of this so I could be accurate, but unfortunately my phone decided to stop working, and how delipidated it was and nothing had been done since 2012. I mean,

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anybody with 2020 eyesight could see something had been done with it. You don't have to look inside of it. New siding, new -- and it was signed -- well, I don't know about that, but the quality of life one was signed by badge number one, P. Hinton.

You know, I don't know what our LIPS Department does, I had that same thing happen to me. Perfectly good house over ten years ago, and maybe that's why it's tearing a scar off of what's going on and what's happening with this woman, perfectly good house that I had legal responsibility for, I think you have a constitutional right to have a vacant property as long as you That house was maintained. maintain it. go up and one day there is a condemned sign on it, and when I inquired I was told how terrible it was, the fact that there had been no heat on, that it would probably have to be -- it was deteriorated, it would probably have to be torn down and all of this stuff. Fortunately, I had brought up from Virginia the receipts for all of these utilities that had been paid. I also,

because the legal owner of it had deceased,

I also had a very current property

evaluation by a certified person that showed

it was in great condition and, you know,

this has got to stop, people. They are not

the enemies.

I mean, I feel bad for this person.

I don't know why they are out of town. I

don't know her. I did check, the taxes are

current. It's just not right.

Okay, now, I'll go on. Now, since the halfway point of the year will soon be upon us and because the revised Act 47 will kick off the 2016 budget process earlier than prior years and because you will be taking off the month of August, I feel it's important to review the promises made for 2015 in the budget and the revised recovery plan, as I started last week, so I'll start with revenue items this week and move to expense items next week, and I'll read the questions and I'll hopefully get the answers next week and I will provide later this evening a copy, a hard copy.

What is the status of the evaluation

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of migrating from a segregated land and improvements taxation to a single assessed total value millage? Keep in mind these are all things that the budget said we were going to do this year so you're aware. you satisfied that the refuse fee collection will meet or exceed that projected in the budget? How did EIT collections year-to-date compare with 2014? This is a little bit off the premise, will the budget be amended to reflect a full-year increased LST revenue instead of the 9 months revenue that was in the budget? What is the status of the LIPS fee structure review? there be a public hearing on any proposed The budget mentions a continued changes? expansion of the parking meter program in 2015, what is the status of this expansion? May I finish?

MR. MCGOFF: Please.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. Last

June the state agreed to buy the city

software. Has this happened and what is the

expected benefit? The HUD finance paving

RFP was in the paper, please provide the

assumed streets that are covered by the RFP? When do we expect a decision on the SAFER grant application award? Have any alternative funding methods to support the pilot program been identified and what are they? If not, when will these be identified? What percent of the parking meter revenue has been applied to meet the SPA debt and will this percent constant for the balance of the year? What is the status of the evaluation of meter rates by zone? What is the status of the Nay Aug user fee evaluation? Only two more. And is 5-D on tonight's agenda the result of the determination made of a city sale of delinquent tax claims, and I have on here and if so what percent of claim value will the third party receive; and finally, is the budget for lawsuit payments sufficient to cover the expected outflow? I would like the answers to those next week and I will have it in somebody's in-basket tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. EVANS: If I may, I'd like to

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comment on what Mrs. Schumacher mentioned about the condemnation policy, I am absolutely dead set against the current policy as it stands. I think we are condemning far too many properties and I certainly agree that vacant properties should not be condemned because they are vacant.

MS. SCHUMACHER: May I just, because what that said it was the property was going to be demolished. That's what that letter said.

MR. EVANS: I know the exact property you are talking about. I'll check with Mr. Hinton tomorrow and see if that's on the demolition list because certainly that is a building that should not be demolished. I agree 100 percent and I know council we are talking about this, you know, part of the mayor's blight committee was going to address the condemnation policy so we are hoping to get there soon because it's something that really has to be addressed, we have far too many properties that are being torn down that don't need to be torn

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down so I'll look into that for you.

MR. WECHSLER: Just one comment while you're commenting on that, Mr. Hinton has made considerable efforts to get ahold of this person who owns this property and has not returned any of his calls, any of his letters, so Mr. Hinton's hands are kind of tied if the owner of the property doesn't respond to these notices. The owner of the property has a responsibility to take that tree down. Where -- I'm not sure where you are coming on this. If a tree fell on my property, it would be my responsibility to take it down. I don't see why this person is relieved from that responsibility because they are out of town, I don't understand that.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Ungvarsky.

MR. EVANS: I would say though, too, I agree with what you are saying Mr. Hinton is doing a great job, but it's not the fact of the tree, I think it's the condemnation policy in general.

MR. WECHSLER: But this person has not responded to Mr. Hinton over repeated

months of contact.

MR. MCGOFF: I'm sorry,

Mr. Ungvarsky, please.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, city council. I believe there may be another one over in West Side that I have heard about under the same conditions. I wish to thank down for telling me about the dikes being mowed by a company, however, that was not the question that I was interested in. I was wondering where the two riding mowers, the brush cutter, and the pickup truck are. Does anyone know what happened to them?

MR. MCGOFF: I'm not aware of where they are at this point in time,
Mr. Ungvarsky. We can certainly ask DPW if they are in possession.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Well, they are probably with the asphalt paver and the cold patch truck.

On the quality of life, a few weeks ago I asked if the people would be given notice about the violation, I did not get a response, but apparently no, they are given the ticket right there on the sight. Also,

1 I asked how long they had to pay and I 2 didn't get an answer to that, does anyone 3 know? MR. MCGOFF: I do know that they can 4 5 cited on the spot. MR. EVANS: Correct. 6 7 MR. MCGOFF: That they can be handed 8 the ticket at that point in time. I do not 9 know what the time period is for payment. 10 MR. EVANS: If the problem is not 11 corrected within 48 hours they get another ticket, but the whole point is to use common 12 13 sense, the inspectors should use common 14 sense when they are out there, they shouldn't cite anybody that doesn't need to 15 16 be cited. If somebody is willing to work 17 with them they should work with them. 18 MR. UNGVARSKY: On the policeman 19 that's patrolling, does anyone know the 20 times that he is on - on what shift he is 21 working right now? 22 MR. EVANS: That's the COM-D 23 patrolman in the Hill Section? COM-D patrol 24 in the hill? 25 MR. UNGVARSKY: COM-D controls the

Hill section, yes.

MR. EVANS: And that's what you are referring to. I'm not sure, we'll find out for you.

MR. UNGVARKSY: But is he patrolling during the high crime times?

MR. EVANS: I don't know.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Does he work Fridays nights and Saturday nights?

MR. EVANS: Historically they did.

Now, when I was involved in the neighborhood association they used to work a 6 to 2 a.m. shift. I'm not sure what the current policy is, we could find out.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Okay, that would be great. This council has raised more taxes, more fines, and more fees. I understand now that it's going to be sued by a landlord here in the city, city council was warned about things like this. The thing is you do not take the time to explain. You sit up there, you read the agenda, you take your votes, and that is it. It's no wonder the people in this city are worked up and I believe, especially with this quality of

life, you are going to be finding more problems than you ever thought you've have.

Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MR. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A

MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. McGoff, just a few things this evening. First of all, I would like to thank the DPW for taking care of some repairs that were requested. They are doing a fine job, DPW doing requests in a timely fashion and they have taken care of the repairs that are being requested.

Today we had a few stories in the newspaper regarding state activity on pensions and on property tax relief, I'm hoping that both of these efforts provide us with some results because these two issues are major concerns of us, especially the pension plans. Finally, this is getting the concentration and the effort that it deserves on a state level. We have been working on here in our little corner of the

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world trying to do the things that we can do so, once again, I'm happy to see that this is happening.

In regards to some of the comments that have been made, the goal of the inspections are not to condemn properties, but when a person will not answer a letter or a phone call what are we to do? That tree is leaning on that property. I don't understand why that person is not responsible or held responsible to take care of that property. I don't think it's -- the city will do it if it becomes an emergency, but I don't think it's fair for the citizens to pay for somebody being irresponsible and not taking care of their property and that I don't understand.

I did receive a request from a constituent regarding some pothole problems on the 300 block of Hughes Street, I will be getting with Mrs. Reed about that later on tonight. That is all I have for right now. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Very briefly, I would

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just like to remind everyone to vote this Tuesday, it is your duty to go out an vote many people have fought and died for that right and I hope to see everyone at the polls. That's all. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans.

MR. EVANS: Very briefly as well, I attended the fallen police officers memorial service yesterday organized by the FOP, it was a somber, respectful reminder to all of that each day a police officer begins that shift, their shift, the potential for real danger is always there. In our current society there are have been many that want to demonize our men and women in blue. I would like to personally thank them for what they do for us each and every day. That's all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. The street sweeper is scheduled to be in the west Scranton area from Oram Street to Washburn Street May 18 to May 22. This past Saturday I took part in the Greenridge Neighborhood Association Scranton Notre Dame Club Crowley

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Park clean up. I was amazed by the amount of volunteers who came out and worked hard to clean up that park. I think that the city should sponsor neighborhood park clean ups each spring and summer. We should set up a program that focuses on physical service, local university and college engagement, youth development, and expanding volunteer opportunities. Local businesses could provide supplies like tools, paint, mulch and other things to demonstrate the concern for the quality of life in Scranton. Other cities in Pennsylvania and throughout the country have neighborhood park clean ups each year. They have registration on their website for individuals, groups and neighborhood associations. I think it would be beneficial to make this an annual event with support from local leaders.

On Saturday, I saw neighbors in the community unite for a great cause. I believe that if the city committed to facilitating the clean up of each neighborhood park every year the neighbors would love to be involved and would love to

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help out.

I am working on scheduling a meeting with Mayor Courtright and DPW Director Gallagher within the next week or two to discuss this idea and others.

I attended the Weston Field Bullshead neighborhood meeting last night, or on Tuesday night, there were several requests from residents that our office has forwarded to the appropriate departments. The residents of the neighborhood association are also interested in doing a neighborhood walk with members of the police department and Licensing and Inspections. Similar walks are held in North Scranton and South Side and have proven to be very successful. Our office has reached out to Chief Graziano to try and facilitate a neighborhood walk and Chief Graziano is going to get -- or the president of the Bullshead neighborhood association is going to get in contact with Chief Graziano.

We did request to send a letter to

Mayor Courtright for a public caucus with

Mayor Courtright, Henry Amoroso from HJ

Strategies, and Dave Bulzoni to update us on the state of the city and the state of all of the things Mrs. Schumacher had kind of touched on that were in the recovery plan and in the Amoroso plan. We have not heard a response yet and if my colleagues would agree I would hope we could send that letter again and get this meeting set up with the next few weeks because I think it's very important that we get an update similar to the one that that we had last June or July I believe.

MR. EVANS: If I may add, I talked to Mr. Amoroso at the state of the city address and he was very excited at the prospect of coming before council again so I'm sure that he would definitely want to come up so I think that's a great idea.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah, Mrs. Reed, if you could seen that letter again and ask that he get a response before next Thursday, please. And that is all I have for this week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Gaughan.

I was at my doctor the other day and he told

me that maybe the problems I have speaking would get better if I didn't talk as much so he told me that I shouldn't talk very much at the meetings, but some things just -- I just have to -- I need to respond to.

One of the speakers said that I was responsible for things that happened with the Pension Board and that I would just like to respond that I was not on the Pension Board in 2002 when all of this took place, I wasn't even on council at that time. All of the problems that with the Pension Board took place in 2002, they were discovered -- or around 2002, they were only discovered recently so that they can be addressed and I have been attending the meetings so we can address those problems.

Also, this council is not responsible for -- yes, we have raised taxes and some fees, not even close to what the prior council did, so to brand us as having raised taxes higher than any other council is incorrect.

And as far as information from council, I believe that we have been more

forthcoming with information on legislation than any council in the past. I have been here for nine years and I don't think that any council in the past eight years has been as forthcoming as we have been. We have held caucuses before every meeting, we have tried to provide information on every piece of legislation that has come before us and we will continue to do so.

And last, I agree with Mr. Gaughan, it seems as though the distance between the clerk's office and the mayor's office is getting longer, I don't know if they put in more steps or what the situation is, but we should have a received a response from the mayor as far as a caucus is a concerned. If the response was no, fine. Of course we did want to have that caucus, but we should have had some response and hopefully we will get a response quickly, and hopefully we can schedule that caucus in a very near future before it becomes -- you know, before we get into the summer or it becomes too late to address some of the issues that we have.

In speaking with Mr. Evans the other

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day, we talked about the idea that there should be -- from now until the end of the year there should be something, some plan for addressing the issues that are in the recovery plan or in the Amoroso plan. should be a timeline of some sort that we can look at. Now, we don't need to provide everything, but there should be a timeline. We are addressing the parking issue. You know, we are addressing, you know, the LST, where it's going, and all of these things we should have before us so that we can accomplish what is in the recovery plan, what is in the Amoroso plan and perhaps the caucus with the mayor and with Mr. Amoroso and Mr. Bulzoni we can work out something of that nature so that we can all be aware of where the city is going and the progress that it may be making. That's it.

Management is the purchaser of these liens, they say in their RFP, in response to the RFP, that they believe the best purchaser would be a local land bank, and they go onto say that in the event that Scranton does form a land bank these liens can be readily transferred to that bank. So I feel like a broken record because we bring up land banks so often, but it is something that I'm very passionate about and before my term is up I am hoping that I will see a land bank here in Scranton and Lackawanna County. Thank you.

MR. EVANS: Before my term is up I expect to see land banks.

MCGOFF: And one last thing, I did ask questions about prior, a prior sale of tax liens and the problems that the city had with that legislation and with that program and we were assured that with the current legislation and with the contractual changes that were made that that would not happen again and the city would not incur the problems that it did in the past.
