APRIL 28, MAY 5 AND MAY 7 2015.

MR. MCGOFF: Are there any comments? If not, received and filed.

Any announcements from council?

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, Mr. McGoff, I have one. In conjunction with Scranton's 150th anniversary yearlong celebration this Sunday, May 24, at 1:00 p.m. there is a wreath laying ceremony in honor of the coal miner's labor strike of 1877. The ceremony will take place at the historical marker located on the corner of the 400 block of Lackawanna and Washington Avenues. And part of this celebration council has prepared the following proclamation:

WHEREAS, on August 1, 1877, a riot

occurred at the site, in which our citizens fired upon the striking workers; and

WHEREAS, in numerous United States cities, violence caused by labor unrest was a result of the US depression of 1873 and the nationwide railroad strike of 1877 which also included ironworkers and coal miners and laborers; and

WHEREAS, four local men were killed,
Patrick Langan, Charles Dunleavy, Patrick
Lane, and Steven Phillips. Scranton's
Mayor, Robert H. McKune's jaw was broken and
many more were injured. The riot lasted a
mere three minutes from the time the first
shot rang out but the blood of the
workingman will forever stain Lackawanna
Avenue reminding us of the tumultuous labor
upheaval of 1877; and

WHEREAS, the period between April 23, 2015 and April 23, 2016, Scranton's 150th Anniversary will be celebrated and historical projects and programs will be presented to the community bringing about awareness and preservation of the City's history; and

WHEREAS, May 24, 2015 marks the remembrance of the workingman who helped build this city with their blood, sweat and tears.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that members of the Scranton City Council do hereby declare May 24, 2015 as a day dedicated to the Coal Miners' and Laborers' Strike and the men who lost their lives during the riot of 1877.

MR. ROGAN: I have one as well, next Thursday, May 28, at 5:30 there will be a public caucus in council chambers to discuss the vacant and foreclosed property registration. That's 5:30 next Thursday.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? I did announce last week that today is Red Nose Day and I thought it appropriate that --

MS. EVANS: There is always one.

MR. MCGOFF: But you have all probably seen the advertisements for Red Nose Day, but this week has been a little bit tumultuous for me with elections and all, and also, things caught up with me at my own house and I was out mowing the lawn

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the other day and basically not paying attention to what I was doing and the neighbor's dog happened to run across the yard right in front of the lawnmower and I cut off its tail, and in panic I just picked up the dog and I didn't know what to do, I picked up the dog tail and I took it to Wal-Mart right away.

MR. WECHSLER: Why do you do that, Bob?

MR. MCGOFF: Because after all Wal-Mart is the worlds large retailer. Ι cannot take credit for that joke, that was told at a meeting by Jean Suetta a number of years ago, Jean has now passed away and thank you, Jean, for that. There are a number of announcements that I can't see with it and I can't talk with it either, but this Monday, May 25, is Memorial Day and city hall will be closed in observance of the holiday. For note, DPW will not be working that day and, therefore, next week all refuse and recyclable collections will be delayed by one day. At a meeting with the mayor this week it was through council's

request for a caucus with the mayor and Mr. Amoroso regarding recovery plans. We are -- excuse me, we are in the process of finalizing the date, a date and time to do that, and we will announce that as soon as we do have that finalized.

There had been requests, early in the year we received a grant from the state. Part of the grant was to update the computer systems. That update is now being completed and it was this week that the new financial and information or reporting system has been completed in the BA's Office. Mr. Rogan did mention next week's public hearing, and I did have another announcement, but I know there are people here from the public library that will be speaking to that so they are much more informed than I and I will let them do that. And this nose is being taken off.

Gerard Hetman from Lackawanna County's

Community Relations Department, good to see

you as always. To begin this evening, on

May 8 the Lackawanna County Commissioners

announce their plans to engage county

residents to work out what we refer to as a

big idea as they pertain to improving life

in Lackawanna County and three areas of focus. First being to make the county a destination plan in terms of regional and national travel in terms of regional and national travel in terms of developing attractions that will bring visitors here for overnight stays, extended stays and to make it a travel destination for vacations, business travel, that type of activity.

The second would be an idea that was actually brought first to our attention recently at council, possibly organizing a county fair, and third would be investigating the feasibility of creating what's offered referred to as a stem or steam school, that being an institution that focuses on the education of primary or secondary school students regarding science, technology, engineering, arts, and math. course, that's an idea that will take many different forms and it's one that along with the other two have come across the commissioner's desks and also those in the departments and county tasked with economic and community development and commissioners

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view this as a way to explore those ideas from the community and to hear about ways that they may be applicable from residents with expertise in those areas.

Any interested residents can visit the county website at LackawannaCounty.org and download an application to serve on one or more of the big idea committees. Those committees will be tasked with exploring and evaluating these concepts. There is no application deadlines. The application can be downloaded on our website, as well as I have paper copies here, and they can be e-mailed or sent my snail mail or dropped off at the Commissioners' Office. There is no deadline to apply. We are looking at probably about two weeks from now until we round up the applications that we have and start to get organized, so we would ask any interested residents to, you know, apply ASAP.

The second item also relates to the big idea concept, that would be in conjunction with the May 31 summer smash event affiliated with Montage Mountain

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organized by 98.5 KRZ and featuring the music of R-5. The commissioners are asking children in the county send in their own big idea ideas to improve life in our community. Youngsters can submit their big idea through e-mail or video. If they wish to make a short vine or snippet and describe their idea by sending it to: Contact at LackawannaCounty.org by e-mail, and then we will enter them for a chance to win one of three four pass of tickets to the R-5 concert. Five big idea suggestions will be posted on the county website for the community to vote on and the top three ideas in that online voting will win tickets to the concert. Voting will run from Tuesday, May 26, through Friday, May 29, at noon. The winner will then be notified and be able to pick up their tickets at the will call window at the Pavilion on Montage Mountain the day of the show. We ask any entrants to make they include their contact information when they e-mail any ideas. So, again, any good idea that a young person may have we are asking for age 18 and younger to improve

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life in Lackawanna County is more than welcome and we'll see what goods ideas we get.

The other note we do have is our third annual Lackawanna County job fair will take place on Thursday, June 18, this year from 1 to 5 p.m. at PNC Field in Moosic and the job fair drill this year is very similar to what we had in the last two years. event is free and open to the public. Candidates of all ages and experience levels and industry backgrounds are encouraged to attend and apply. We ask approximately between 60 and 70 private sector employers to attend this, it's limited on space, but we bring in a variety of companies from across our region and a variety of different industries and they bring full-time positions, but also part-time, so anyone who is looking for supplemental work, possibly a student or senior citizen retired, also welcomed. Internships are presented there by the attending companies and also seasonal work so we see a variety of different job opportunities present their for the public.

We ask anyone to come to be prepared to interview, to bring resumes, work samples, of course, dress appropriately for interviews and professional conduct and, of course, there is free parking, also. We don't have refreshments this year, but again, it's open from 1 to 5 p.m. at the PNC field in Moosic so we ask anyone to attend that would like to attend, and then also just a housekeeping note, the county offices will be closed on Memorial Day, also. We ask everyone, of course, to pay tribute to our veterans and those that gave our lives to service of our nation. Thank you and that's all we have. Thank you.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. Before I go on with my weekly attack on council allow me, if you would, to read it tonight so I don't leave anything out. I know I starting off on the wrong foot right off the bat, but enough it enough. When is something going to be done to help the people of this city? You know, like I have

said, you people have a buffer. There is people out here there have been like 5,000 foreclosures here in the last ten years.

Neighborhoods are in decline. The paper today talks about an influx of the people coming in, they are not -- they are not the kind of people that are coming downtown.

They are not people that are going to be able to vote, they are just not, and this town is becoming like Hazelton. At least they had enough sense to try a new mayor.

Amoroso and his plan are just a complete failure just like it was -- he was to Newark. You can get on your computers and see what happened in Newark. He blew out of there saying I'm sorry, I guess, but that didn't help matters. You cannot consider selling everything that's left here like he wants. I think you ought to give a lot of credit to Jack Loscombe and Mrs. Evans for the demise of the SPA. What were we supposed to do, allow this illegal building to keep going and good God that place was a financial rape of the taxpayers year after year and it had to be shut down

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somehow, and to blame that for the city's problems is ridiculous. The city was going downhill with or without that. That would have just -- that was just a kick in the bucket, you know?

If you realize how many quarters that the SPA brings in here? It's well over a million and a couple of hundred thousand dollars a year. That's income. You want to sell that for a few million dollars? for crying out loud, we have talked over and over and over and again you sell that Sewer Authority, the rates will skyrocket. won't be able to flush a toilet anymore. You talk to a businessman when they buy something they are not going to keep the same rates we got now. They will skyrocket. Mr. Amoroso was hired I guess to assist our mayor, but it seems like he has replaced him. The mayor just doesn't seem to have any say so anymore. What were Amoroso's duties? The designated duties were to handle the pension plan, which he evidently never opened up a book on, because he didn't know nothing in the world what was going on

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with the pension plan, and he is supposed to address the nonprofits. They have bought -they owned him lock, stock and barrel. How could he fight? How could he say anything to people that are paying him? This is a direct conflict of interest. I don't care, there is no way you people can justify what's going on in this city any longer. He needs to be sent hiking or that money needs to be returned.

This isn't a personal thing with me and Amoroso, it's just business as far as I'm concerned. He is just absolutely just no -- has no credibility to the people out there that put you in those seats. You know, I might be an advocate for the lower income of the city, but I'm probably one of them. It's just getting where I can't afford some luxuries. I have been thinking, well, I was thinking about buying a later model car, I don't really need one, but I'd like to get one rather than spend 600 or 700 dollars for my repairs because of the potholes, but I'm not going to. And I've talked to other people that have plans that

library on the first floor because there wasn't enough room under the tents with the other food and the drinks, the entire first floor of the library was nothing but desserts, virtually all of which involved chocolate in one form or another. You know, you could not have just one gite from every dish that was offered and every dessert, you would have exploded. If you lived downtown there is no excuse for not attending because you don't have to worry about drinking and driving, if you don't live downtown get yourself a designated driver, but this is one of those events where you get bang for your buck and you serve a worthy cause.

Remember, the library does not charge for its services to the public, with one exception, if you make a copy on their Xeroxer, that's the only time you have to pay a fee. Everything else is free.

That having been said, with regard to Mr. Amoroso providing an update, if possible, I would love to see that scheduled before your August recess if at all possible.

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MR. MCGOFF: My understanding is that they are trying to schedule it as soon as possible.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Good. Good. And that's -- I am very interested in what's been said there, but I would really love if one of these days Mayor Courtright would schedule a town hall meeting. I would love to hear his view of things, not just his state of the city address, but I would like to see him address the public and take questions from the public. I think that would be very useful. I don't know if that will happen, but I would love to see it. would also love to see the city start posting more documents on its website, especially documents that have relevance to the financial status of the city, various accounting documents, the controller's report, for example. That could be scanned and put on the website. A lot of the background documentation for your weekly meetings could be put on the website. think the city in its current state needs to establish a sense of transparency in its

operations and dealings and one way to do
that is to put as much information as
possible on the city's website, and I know
that IT will put on whatever Mr. Bulzoni
directs them to put on so hopefully Mayor
Courtright and Mr. Bulzoni will consider
increasing the amount of information
available to the public.

And I have been watching, and not yet seen, legislation regarding a contract for a municipal audit firm. I hope that's coming soon. You've got to remember that until that legislation is passed and we actually hire a firm I don't know what work is being done upstairs to prepare for the 2014 independent audit.

MR. MCGOFF: It is -- I'm sorry, it is my understanding that that legislation will be on next week.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Good, because I don't want to be kicking the podium again every week for a year saying, "What is the status of the 2014 audit?"

I would love to be shocked and see it come in before Thanksgiving, but I am not

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holding my breath. And that's all I have tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Ms.

Hodowanitz. Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. Dave Dobrzyn, resident and taxes paid. Once again the Transpacific Pact in Washington. Please call and tell them to can it. numbers are for Congress 1 -- 202-224-3121, and the White House is 1-202-456-1111. you are tired of lack of the jobs and lack of participation in the work force call. you tired of the high property estate taxes If you are tired of threats to your retirement both in private and public call. And another little tidbit, if you are sick and tired of environmental threats that are shoved on you by the World Trade Organization call. They had a marathon, half-marathon in Beijing about three or four months ago, you know how they ran it? gas masks, Mr. McGoff, and then the people had to shower after they ran the marathon because the pollution is so heavily -- is so

heavy that it could be absorbed through their skin. Well, these are the kinds of threats that threaten the working class, so if you are tired of those young kids hanging out in the parking lot across the street from your house making noise all night then they'd be a lot tireder if they had a decent job to go to and some money in their pockets.

Now, to local issues. In the paper today there was a lawsuit lodged and two weeks ago there was a lawsuit awarded against the city on -- based on the actions of ordinances, and I have a question for Mr. Evans, can the city -- did I see in -- I only saw it once, can the city go in and correct the problem --

MR. EVANS: I doubt it.

MR. DOBRZYN: -- on the property.

MR. EVANS: Not if it's on private property.

MR. DOBRZYN: No? I thought I saw something where they could go in and clean it up and bill the owner of the property.

MR. EVANS: There is not a mechanism

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in place right now that I'm aware of, but we can check into that for you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Because it would seem to me that the issue that Mrs. Schumacher brought up last week that that would be a more logical -- especially if a person's house gets torn down, and I'll tell you the city has a horrible, horrible way to communicate with people. I literally went four times down to pay my trash bill. took me until about 2006. I bought the house in 2002 and I kept going back to the same employee, and the one time my address on the crumpled envelope because the computers were broke or something and all kinds of things and she said, "Who did that?"

I said, "You did."

You know, so that finally got straightened out, but all of that time it was being mailed to 1617 Vine Street, which was a rental that I rented the first year I was here. So, you know, they just didn't address it to my house and to whomever it may concern and send the bill there, so

every year I had to go down there and hoopla around and find out what the address was and make sure the right bill was being paid.

And, once again, on KOZs we need an exit analysis. How much did it cost us in dollars and how much did it award us in dollars because sometimes they just don't work out.

And I heard kind of like of an informal way ECTV funding did I see something happen with that, that they are awarded some kind of money from Comcast.

MR. EVANS: Who? Comcast?

MR. DOBRZYN: Yeah. Because I understand that there is some kind of hang up with money and I wouldn't want to see ECTV disappear.

And on our Amoroso plan, well, I don't want to beat up on the guy, but it doesn't hurt to have second opinions and keeping in mind that they were hired by the Chamber of Commerce and a few schools and so forth, so, you know, it would really be helpful if the commission wasn't to find that problem and even though we may be

MR. EVANS: Well, the administration 13 14 hasn't taken me up on my request. MS. SCHUMACHER: They have? 15 16 MR. EVANS: They have not, but there 17 are -- we have according to the recovery 18 plan to do a verification so I'll discuss 19 that with PEL and see if we can get that 20 moving. It's definitely part of the plan. 21 MS. SCHUMACHER: So it won't be next 22 Monday, when is the next meeting with PEL? 23 MR. EVANS: A week Monday. 24 find out anything before that I will let you 25 know next Thursday.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. And then the land banks have been talked about for several months, has anybody in the administration or you all met with the county because I understand that was a lynch pin was the county?

MR. GAUGHAN: I had several meetings with the county, I know that the mayor had met with county officials, we seem to be at some sort of a standstill now. We did hear from the mayor that he was going to try to form an exploratory committee on land banking, but other than that I have not heard anything as of yet.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Could we -- maybe could you maybe send a letter this week to the mayor for a status on that?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah, I did ask for a status and that's when he sent back. I actually have a meeting with the mayor tomorrow so I'll inquire further on that.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes to address council?

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MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. McGoff, just a few items this week. Saturday I had the honor of marching with Mr. McGoff in the Armed Forces Day parade. The weather had hampered the turn out a little bit, but the people that were at the parade saw a great tribute to our armed I think there was over 75 forces. participants of different groups and bands and things like that and as we walked the route you could see what a great impact this parade has on the people that were in attendance. We saw people very happy to see the marching and we also saw people that were touched emotionally thinking about their loved ones that had either served or gave the ultimate sacrifice in their life, so I would like to congratulate the organizers for the parade.

This week I was contacted by a few residents with some constituent concerns.

One was on Oswald Avenue and the other was

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on Davis Street so we will be working on those with Ms. Reed and the proper authorities.

I've also been in contact with the Treasurer's office trying to get a handle on the amount of delinquent garbage fees that exist in the city. A few months ago I met with the NRS, Northeast Revenue, and they were planning to do a mailing for all of the delinquent tax or garbage fee people. date, that mailing has not happened. The plans right now are for that to go out some time in June, but speaking with them there is a tremendous amount of delinquent garbage fees out there and I'm trying to get a determination on the dollar values that are It seems to me like it's a huge out there. amount of money and we have to start working on finding a way to collect that money. would be quite helpful to the situation that we are in in our city.

Finally, a few months ago Michelle

Dempsey was here with a vision of some

different ideas for some landmarks in

Scranton. One of the ideas that we were

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interested in seeing what we could pursue was turning the Harrison Avenue bridge into a pedestrian-type of a park. We contacted PennDOT and, unfortunately, it seems unless we want to pursue it a different way PennDOT does not recommend that that bridge be maintained as a pedestrian park, and they went onto explain to us why, I'll just read briefly in the summary, but they said, "If the City of Scranton elects to pursue this concept, the City will have to take ownership, make the necessary repairs and maintain the structure. Coordination and approval by the Public Utility Commission will also need to be performed as the railroad underneath is a stakeholder in what happens with this existing bridge. Department of Transportation understands your desire to keep this historic and symbolic bridge, but it doesn't seem feasible based on the current condition and A significant amount of money would be needed for rehabilitation and the bridge would continue to cost the city over the years as it will have to be inspected in

accordance with national bridge inspection standards and maintained."

I think the concept of this idea is very good and there are going to be a lot of ideas that come out and as we work on this to see which ones are feasible and which ones are not. I think we can still keep this idea on the burner, but I think perhaps we should start looking at other avenues and putting our efforts in there so that was the opinion that the state had on the bridge.

And that's all have tonight, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, a number of items tonight. I'd like to first start off by congratulating the election winners, Councilman McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: For his election. Tim

Perry also for city council, and our city

controller Roseann Novembrino. On the

county level I am very pleased that it

appears we will have two commissioners from

the City of Scranton. For five years myself

and I know members of the public and members

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of council have been pleading with the commissioners to do a reassessment countywide. It's been far too long and every time the Pennsylvania Economy League comes in or any outside advisors a reassessment is part of every single recovery plan that is put forward for the city because it's taxes need to be fair. Twenty some years ago, 30 years ago the values aren't the same as they were now and so many of them are inaccurate. We see every week we get reports from the Tax Assessor's Office where people file to have their taxes assessment reduced and it seems to be a race to the bottom. The tax assessments need to be fair and now with new incoming majority commissioners I think that now is the time to have those items moved forward.

Also, I know a land bank is another item that the county commissioners will be heavily involved in and very hopeful that with the change in leadership that the Mr. O'Brien maybe from the private sector and Mr. Wansacz being defeated at the polls

that we will now see movement on those issues.

High School project is moving along as scheduled. Anyone who drives by that area sees a flurry of action on that project. I actually saw just the other day on Facebook pictures of -- I guess before pictures from inside of the building, and it's a very nice building and I'm really looking forward to that project being completed and going through and touring it when it's done.

Next, while voting on election day a resident contacted me and stopped me on the 300 block of North Sumner Avenue. This is an ongoing problem for actually four years. There was a chimney repair that was done on a house, and I will provide the address, Mrs. Reed, there was a chimney repair that was done on a house and scaffolding was put up to make that repair. That was four years ago and the scaffolding is still standing and the wood is visibly gray, a number of the neighbors from that block mentioned it to me. When I was out looking at it the

gentleman next door came out and made a point to say how many years it was. So if we could let Pat Hinton and his office know about that issue.

One of the speakers brought up the Housing Authority, and this was on authority another matter, but on Earth Day, and I apologize for this being a little bit delayed, a resident who lives in the Housing Authority contacted me and they were upset because they are unable to recycle so I think if we could contact the Housing Authority and ask what their current recycling policy is and what changes can be made to promote recycling for those that live in Housing Authority developments.

Next, the Item 7-A regarding the sale of the delinquent real estate taxes I will be voting against this legislation. I do appreciate the thought being put forward and the more conservative approach than was taken when this happened under the Doherty administration, but I'm still not completely sold on the process. Obviously, last time it didn't work out for the city and if

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the goal is to have a little bit more money up front the thought of taking out a little bit a larger tax anticipation note at the end of the year I think the interest rate would be more favorable on that than the 6 percent that we would be paying regarding this sale.

Finally, I was very upset to read an article in the newspaper featuring Al Boscov talking about the mall. Mr. Boscov criticized and even poked fun at many of the great ideas that have been put forward by the residents of Scranton to rehab that building. Obviously the current formula that Mr. Boscov has the leading role in isn't working. I was just at the mall last Tuesday and it is, unfortunately, a ghost town. There are very few stores remaining and something needs to be done. I firmly believe that Mr. Boscov's store should have a place in whatever development occurs at the mall. His store is very successful. We certainly don't want to chase him out of town because it's a store that people like, but the overall mall concept is not working

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in downtown Scranton.

The idea of a hybrid -- having, you know, a farmer's market, a market place mixed in with retail is very appealing to a lot of people that I talk to. It's picking up traction on Facebook, it's picking up traction in the newspaper, and I know numerous people I talk to embrace that idea. It's worked other places. Obviously, we don't have, you know, the population that Philadelphia has with the Reading terminal station, which is great. It's a great place, you can eat anything you want there. You can go there and buy anything you want. That could certain be done on a smaller scale in the City of Scranton. increasing foot traffic into the mall the retail component, which could be Mr. Boscov, maybe another anchor store, will see increased would revenue because there is more people that will be walking through the door.

I believe that was the thought behind putting the Single Tax Office in the mall was that when people would come to pay

their taxes they would go and spend money in the stores in the mall. Again, with the change at the county commissioner level I hope that the idea of consolidating county offices in that building will be scraped. That building needs to remain commercial space and it's prime commercial space in the city. We just need a different vision in order to bring that that property back to what it once was. That's all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. On a lighter note, I would like to touch on something that Marie briefly discussed. If anyone was traveling last Saturday morning between the Hill Section and South Side, they were treated to something very different happening on the old Harrison Avenue bridge. Myself and some dedicated volunteers were yarn bombing the rusty metal fence on the south side of the bridge with crocheted flowers. We knew we are onto something special because as the display started to take shape every car or pedestrian would

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stop and offer support and say, "Great job. It looks terrific." Something you don't see every day in our city. Even cars entering the city on the expressway below were blowing horns and recognizing that something interesting was happening above them, so it was a great morning. And then it just took off on Facebook that people came by and posted pictures of the flowered fence on their personal pages. The best comment I heard was, and this was repeated often, I drive by the flowers and they bring a smile to my face. For that reason alone we are proud of our little project on the Harrison Avenue bridge. But, most importantly, I want to publically recognize those involved in the project, the dedicated women who spent the winner knitting and crocheting flowers or Ellen Muzzi, Cathy Ungvarsky, Susie Connors, Jessica Batton, and Sandy Batton. Of course, the crew that installed the flowers were myself, Nancy Evans, Ellen Muzzi, Susie Connors, Mayor Jim Connors, Donny O'Boyle, Adam Davis and Ann Chamber. Also, the Greater Scranton Board of Realtors

was kind enough to pay for all of the materials that were needed for the project so for better or worse all of are us are now called yarn bombers. So I would say stay tuned because there may be another yarn bomber in a neighborhood near you.

Also last week President McGoff
mentioned a request for a meeting in the
form of a public cause, which we talked
earlier, with Henry Amoroso and his staff as
well as the mayor and some of his staff to
get a handle on what the status is of
several important issues facing the city as
well as several mandated items in the
recovery plan. City council has been
extremely proactive trying to move forward
numerous initiatives so I fully support that
request.

City council and the administration need to put bench marks and create timelines for the completion of many of the initiatives within the recovery plan and other important legislation that may be outside of the plan. It's a sound business practice and one we should embrace and

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adopt.

Also, last week Councilman Wechsler mentioned that there was several bills presented in Harrisburg that could dramatically effect the city and its taxpayers. HB-504 addresses property tax reform, something very important to our property taxpayers. For the record, State Representative Flynn and Farina voted "no" against this property tax reform. state Senate side their was a bill presented addressing pension reform for municipalities specifically, again, very important to the City of Scranton. For the record, our state senator voted no against this pension reform However, I am still encouraged bill. because the conversation and a dialogue has begun, so let's hope somehow those in Harrisburg can find a way to put aside partisan politics and begin to work to tackle those large issues that we so desperately need addressed. That is all I have at this time. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you.

First, the street sweeper is scheduled to be in the North Scranton area from May 26 to May 29, Foster Street to Wood Street. I have a meeting scheduled with Mayor Courtright this Friday to discuss a number of different items including the land bank Mrs. Schumacher brought up and I will update everyone on that next week.

As Mr. McGoff of had mentioned, we did receive a response from Mayor Courtright on a potential caucus with Henry Amoroso an Dave Bulzoni, our business administrator, addressing some of the issues that were brought up tonight so I would like to thank the mayor for that response and look forward to that public caucus. I think it would be very informative.

I received a complaint about a boarding house in the Weston Field area that our office will forward to the Licensing and Inspections Department. There were some issues with parking in the Hill Section that I was made aware of and our office was in contact with Chief Graziano who immediately addressed the situation.

I did receive a letter from a resident about an empty overgrown lot on Parker Street and Brick Street. Our office will forward that complaint to the appropriate department. Also, received a complaint about excessive speeding on Sloan Street so we'll make Chief Graziano aware about that.

It was brought up at a neighborhood meeting I was at about where residents go to complain about a streetlight that's been out or a report a streetlight that's been out. When Joyce Electric had the contact with the city you used to be able to go on the website and report it directly to Joyce Electric. The new company, Metchulat, they are in the process of working with the city of getting that up on the city's website so that if a resident notices a streetlight that's out they get the pole number and they can report it directly to them on the website.

And I would just like to say that I hope everyone enjoys their Memorial Day and I'd like to thank all of those men and women

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who have served and are serving in the military. And that is all I have for this week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Just a few brief First of all, as far as the red nose was concerned, I don't mean to make light of what we do here, but the Red Nose Day was, you know, an event that seemed to gain some impetus. I'm told that it has been around for a number of years, but I believe it was Walgreen's that kind of took up the Red Nose Day concept and a number of other I'll say celebrities and the idea was to raise money for childhood poverty through humor and I guess there are a number of television programs and other things that were doing that to raise money, so a good cause and maybe it is something that will, you know, remain with us, you know, through the years. I'm told that the red noses sold out of Walgreen's almost nationwide. this past week was almost impossible to find a red nose so --

MR. EVANS: For the record, I did try to buy a red nose yesterday and couldn't

buy one at Walgreen's.

MR. MCGOFF: So, again, well, your opportunity to tell a joke was lost, but again, a good cause and a little bit of humor to a great cause.

Just to mention somebody brought up the Scranton Parking Authority debt, just for information's sake the payments on the SPA debt increased by about \$800,000 per year following the forced default of the SPA, so and plus the credit rating of the city was pretty much destroyed because of that, so there may have been other ways in which we could have addressed that problem.

An ongoing problem and, again it's been spoken about by almost everyone on council is the parking -- wrong side of the street parking. I don't even know how to phrase it, but tickets are being given to people that parking in the wrong direction on the street and this past week just received another series of phone calls concerning it maybe because the people giving out those say citations were now in South Side as opposed to, you know, West

Scranton where the problems existed before.

I think that is something that we really need to look into, some of the complaints are extremely legitimate especially elderly people who are faced with some difficult problems as far as parking is concerned, and I think all of the council is concerned with that and we have spoken with our solicitor and it just seems there doesn't -- it doesn't seem to be an easy way around it, but in the coming weeks hopefully we can do something that will alleviate this stress on the citizens of Scranton.

And lastly, I would like to reiterate what Mr. Rogan said concerning Boscov's. I shop at Boscov's, it's a great store, but I'll say that I believe that Mr. Boscov could have is a great businessman. He, you know, put together a series of stores that are very successful throughout the State of Pennsylvania and the northeast, however, I don't think Mr. Boscov has been very good for the City of Scranton. I think as this the mall goes to auction, and it would appear that Mr. Boscov is doing

everything he can to purchase the mall, he needs to be willing to consider options. As Mr. Rogan said, he cannot persist in the mall structure as it is. I hope that with enough lobbying Mr. Boscov will give up some of his obstinacies to change and that the mall in whatever nature it's reconstituted does contain a Boscov's store, but yet allows for greater use of that space. And I'm done.

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MR. GAUGHAN: On the question, since I have been on city council now for almost two years and chairperson for the Committee on Public Works, there has been one recurring issue that has been raised by residents and that is pave cuts. All you need to do is drive on our city streets to experience an enormous amount of bumpy, uneven pave cuts that drive city motorists crazy. It has not been uncommon in the past to drive down a newly paved city street one week and the next week find the street has been dug up by a utility company.

For months now there has been legislation in the works to addresses the issue of pave cuts by amending our streets and sidewalks ordinance and tonight we will vote to introduce it and hopefully alleviate this problem. Amending this ordinance will do a few things, which I'd like to take a minute or two to explain.

First, the ordinance provides for an additional inspection fee based on the amount of work being done on a city street.

Upon completion of the street paving project

by any entity, such as a utility company, the city will not allow the street to be excavated for any reason for five years except for emergency situations, this includes any and all activities defined as upgrades, improvements and/or maintenance to utility system. It also provides for the requirement of anyone excavating the city streets such as a utility company to replace any and all pavement markings such as traffic patterns and crosswalks that are preexisting, and this was not required in the previous ordinance.

Most importantly, this ordinance mandates improved and expanded requirements to restore the road surface in an effort to eliminate the negative effects of multiple pave cuts. If the utility company tears the street up, they have to restore the road curb to curb and ten feet beyond the farthest point of the pave cut edge in any direction. This will hopefully eliminate multiple unsightly uneven pave cuts that dot our city streets.

Also, within the legislation it says

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that if any street or court with a surface area older than five years that has more than 10 percent of the surface area of any one city block, any one city block limits following excavation, the road surface shall have the same restoration requirements that I just mentioned. If two pave cuts are made less than 100 feet apart, the entire area between the two pave cuts, including the two pave cuts, shall be milled and resurfaced as described above for a width of one-half the street or court nearest curb to center line. If the repair excavation crosses the center line off the street or court, then the mill and resurfacing shall be for the full width of the street or court curb to curb for the entire length of the work area.

The ordinance also provides for increased documentation by city employees in an effort to track all activity that is occurring on city streets in order to maintain a high level of accountability and compliance and this will come in the form of a work order inspection tracking ticket.

I'm confident that this legislation

will address the city's aging infrastructure and maintain the integrity of newly paved and older streets and finally solve the problem of those annoying and pesky pave cuts. And that is all I have thank you.

MR. EVANS: On the question, there is lot of great things, I worked on the previous one when I was actually worked for you the utility company so I was just wondering were the utility companies contacted during the drafting of this?

MR. GAUGHAN: I believe that they were, yes. I think they were, and I know that DPW Director Gallagher has been in touch with the utility companies.

MR. EVANS: The other thing I had a question, you mentioned that the inspection fees are going up, can we get a copy of the last ordinance, the previous ordinance so we can compare those fees to the current fees --
