First, just in regards to what was in the paper this morning, in regard to the parking garages, and just yet again just more baffling and just outright in my opinion just lack of any common sense in our city government. Here we are discussing whether or not we want to tear down assets in this community, where is the leadership? Where is the common sense in this thought process? We have a moneymaking opportunity throughout the downtown in these parking garages, millions of dollars we've invested in these parking garages and we are going to tear them down? I don't know why we deem shaking our heads, I think to anybody it would be common sense if it doesn't make any sense whatsoever.

MR. MCGOFF: Because, Mr. Miller, it was because that was the report from Desmond and gave three different scenarios for the

garages. It did not say anything about the city considering tearing them down.

MR. MILLER: Well, that's what the proposal is to look at a report and consider the possibility, that's what a study would be done for. Obviously -- you're obviously going to review that and consider that; correct?

MR. MCGOFF: Actually, it was prepared for the bidders on the parking garages.

MR. MILLER: Well, evidently a report was done, of course, it had some sort of endorsement through this administration for any report to be done and my point is we have gone through and brought all of these consultants in and we've done all of these reports for years and years and years and where has it lead us? I mean, the fact that we would even consider that possibility is just stupidity.

We already gave away the golf course, I mean, the South Side complex, and now we are going to give away our parking garages or evidently tear some of them down

This is a debit and credit, this is a business decision profit and loss There is no other way that we can

I've had engineers look at it already, we know what it needs, we know where we are going so don't come in here and say, "Oh, mea culpa, we should have did this or did that," you should have did it.

You are a businessman, this is

Scranton and you helped kill it. It's dead,
you got to bring it to life and all you guys
sitting here, the mayor and everybody else
who wants to play political favoritism and
play the game and put the screws to the
people in this city. When they have the
opportunity to make something happen.

Now, over a year since I brought this here and it's frustrating. This is my city just as much as it is to you guys. I'm born and raised here, I have developed here, we have all lived here, don't you think it's time we got off our butts and did something for the people in the City of Scranton

safety concerns about the Scranton Crossfit who has their gym in the 1500 block of Albright Avenue. It is the practice of this gym that several times a week, usually during the early evening hours between 4 and 6:30 p.m. they have members of their gym run down the middle of the 1500 and 1400 block of the Albright Avenue, some times two and three abreast, there have been times when traffic has been backed up in both directions. I can't understand why they do not have their members run in and exercise on the former Gelbin Company property, which is right next to their gym. Having them run down the middle of the street is very dangerous for both the motorists and members of the gym. There are three other gyms within a one block radius and they are great neighbors. I hope Crossfit Scranton realizes the safety concerns they are causing and nuisance from the members running down the middle of the street.

You can't imagine we had 60 trucking companies here, I think there was four airways came into town, there was six railroads, we were a hub. We still are, but there is no one takes advantage of it anymore. We were a marketing hub and all of this is gone now because of lack of

The colleges, I don't have anything against them, but the point being that if you attend that college you are also getting an education paid for partially by the taxpayers and it's time that they start to -- the state starts to -there is no reason why they should be paying They are tax nonprofits that's taxes. understandable, but, once again, the state tells us that this is the way it has to be, how about sending some money. Marie Schumacher. I'd like to start tonight by thanking the DPW for coming out and fixing the seam between Stafford Avenue and Hemlock Street, which was a real tire buster at the seam and the East Elm Street where the -- not the last one, but the prior big storm washed out the open gutters and took a good portion of the road with them with it and they were up there today fixing it and I want to thank them for that.

And I also would like to know,

Mr. Gaughan is not here, but maybe somebody
else knows what are the rules with pave
cuts? I go down the streets and I try to
count them, how many pave cuts before
utilities have to repave that block and how
many, I mean, is it all utilities or is it
only one utility? Where are the rules so
that I could look them up?

MR. MCGOFF: That would be something that DPW would need to answer.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. I will do

that. And then, Mr. Rogan, have you been able to get the loan information yet on the loans going back to 2002 and how many have defaulted and what the amounts are?

MR. ROGAN: Which ones, the ones that were referenced from the CAPER or these additional ones?

MS. SCHUMACHER: No, all of the loans that were made from 2002. If you need a list, I guess I could probably do that for you, but -- okay. But one in particular -- or two items from OECD -- through OECD, the SRA loaned the Marquee theatre \$500,000 -- or \$700,000 and as we know the status of the Marquee theatres I'm wondering if that was ever paid, could you find out whether that was paid and if so if it's not fully paid what the balance is?

And then, also, we did within the last probably certainly 10 years, but less than probably the facade of the Linden parking garage was redone and I remember there was pretty some internal work was done and was the amount of the investment in that Linden parking garage that OECD made?

1	MR. ROGAN: Regarding the Marquee
2	theatre there was a \$700,000 loan, it looks
3	like it was not paid. The total balance,
4	there is three that are listed on the saved
5	line item here, they come to a total of \$3.5
6	million, which is the total balance owed by
7	Steamtown Mall Partners so it doesn't look

MR. GAUGHAN: I had asked, we had sent correspondence to the DPW director last week, I think, I believe Friday after the meeting, but we have not heard anything.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Well, maybe next week then I would like that and then as I stated or I requested that some of the metrics from the two MOU's that were extended like almost forever, earlier this year, some of those metrics could be reported on regularly and since that wasn't done I volunteered to take the overtime and it's a little distressing because the numbers for March, April and May for the fire department is \$35,503 over what it was last year, and the police are \$5,222 over in overtime over last year, so I would like to know if there is any rational if there was something special that lead to that or not and then.

MR. MCGOFF: We do not have the ability to answer those questions. Those are something that would need to be answered by the departments.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. I thought you all were the coordinators on those and you all had specific departments that you coordinated with.

MR. MCGOFF: We do, but the questions you ask, Mrs. Schumacher, these are things that would need to be answered, most of them, by the specific departments. We, as council, do not have answers to most of those.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I thought it would be --

MR. MCGOFF: And our staff, if we were to pursue all of the questions that you ask our staff would be unable to do the work that it's supposed to do.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I'm just really disappointed then that you are not -- I mean, these are all things -- the things I have asked were things that were pulled out of the budget that you agreed to that were

going to be done. I would think you all would be interested.

MR. WECHSLER: Mrs. Schumacher, may
I just make a comment, because I have been
in contact with Becky McMullen, the
personnel director, about these same
questions that you had and I am meeting with
her next week to go over the numbers.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: And just a quick comment, I have spoken to both chiefs about it --

MS. SCHUMACHER: To -- I'm sorry?

MR. WECHSLER: I have spoken to both Police Chief Graziano and to Fire Chief DeSarno to get an understanding of where the overtime is generated and is it necessary, isn't it necessary, so just like in reference to the -- especially the fire department, a few weeks ago we had several major fires so there was a lot of overtime then, but I am going to meet with her and the chiefs next week to get an understanding of those numbers.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Is there anyone else who wishes to address council?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler.

MR. WECHSLER: That came kind of fast, I wasn't ready so after last week's meeting the response to some comments that we made about advertising job openings on the city's website were in the newspaper. I have been investigating the logistics for making that happen. From speaking too many people of the public last week, they understand that there is an authority that the mayor has to do hiring, but I think a lot of people would feel more comfortable if those jobs were posted and we are pursuing that.

In regards to the comments and the story in the paper this week about Boscov's, I'm not really going to speak generally about that, I was disappointed that we were not as a council involved with knowing about that prior to that, but I am looking at this and I'm trying to always find a positive in

these type of things. To the best of my knowledge this is the first time in 18 months that there has actually has been some discussions about economic development within the city. For the most part, the administration and council has been tied up with pensions and budgets and recovery plans and haven't really focused too much on economic development so that was a good thing about it. For me, I would remember see us invest our time and efforts in this with if we are going to do any loans or tax relief, which I don't know how we can for the state that we are in, I would rather see the city pursue companies that are already within the city, for example, something like Delta Medix, looking at them we should pursue them with tax credits and loans to encourage them to stay in the city and expand.

And in terms of what was discussed, I agree with a lot of the speakers that the mall as it stands has to be reworked, and such I'm not sure that I agree with putting more money into it as it stood.

This week I was approached by a constituent who had a rather novel idea and I am going to pursue it further, this person mentioned to me that the DPW workers, especially the garbage collectors, are on every street in the city at least once a week and this person thought it would be a good idea if they would be the people who kind of generated the ideas about what vacant properties or problems or which streets in the city have severe potholes, so I am going to pursue that a little more to see what we could do with reporting from the DPW and also from the police department to generate ideas on what problems needs to be fixed in the city, and that's all I have right now, Mr. McGoff.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. A couple of brief items and then something I'm going to talk at length for a little longer. Two quick items, first, I'd like to congratulate Dave Gervasi. Today he retired after 29 years as a Scranton firefighter. I have known Dave very well, he has been a regular speaker at city council meetings throughout

the years and I know without him, I know much of what I know about the Scranton Fire Department I learned through talking with Dave and current union president John Judge so I wish him a happy retirement and I hope he enjoys his time off.

Secondly, I was contacted by a resident on East Mountain that was concerned about gypsy moths. I know this is something that was on the news in Luzerne County and the Hanover Township area has been inundated with these moths. They eat trees, they kill trees, if people get them on them they could cause very bad rashes. One of my coworkers actually was at his son's baseball game and got a terrible rash from these moths.

I know the process only because of talking with officials in Luzerne County about it is the county needs to request the state to do spraying if that area has a problem. So if it's agreeable with my colleagues if we could send a letter to the county asking if they have taken any action regarding this problem. Obviously, it's much worse in Luzerne County than it is here

currently and we don't want that to happen in Scranton or anywhere within Lackawanna County because it's not only a problem to individuals but from what I understand it will kill the trees, so it will eat all of the leaves off the trees and will kill the trees so if we could do that just to make sure the county is aware of it so we can stay ahead of it unlike Luzerne County who fell behind and then was never able to get caught up to the problem.

Next, regarding the article that was in the paper regarding the mall and Mr. Boscov, I have spoken quite a bit about this issue through the years, I'm going to speak a little bit more about it tonight. Today we received a letter from the mayor, it was actually we were copied on a letter from the mayor to Al Boscov, and I'm not going to read the whole letter because it is over three pages long, but there were some things in there that I was happy to see. The one I mentioned that Mr. Boscov's company currently owes \$18 million to the City of Scranton and that nothing further

- '

would come from the City of Scranton until that is satisfied. That's something I completely agree with. That amount is staggering, that \$18 million of economic development money through various loans have gone to, I don't want to say Mr. Boscov, to Steamtown Mall Associates who the principal investor was Mr. Boscov.

Moving on with the letter, it says,
"I want to be perfectly clear to ensure
there are no misunderstandings between you
and the city. We will not move forward on
the grant loan application for new financing
for the mall until we have sufficient
assurances that all outstanding issues you
have with the City of Scranton are resolved
in the city's. Rest assured, if you do not
resolve these issues, my administration will
not support any additional funding for you
on your project. I would strongly suggest
you come up with a plan to address all of
these issue in advance of any request for
funding."

And it mentions that this was discussed some months ago at a meeting that

the mayor had with Mr. Boscov. Like I said, I'm not going to read the whole letter. I don't have a problem with the -- even though I disagree with the initial letter that was sent to DCED, I understand how letters of support work, generally governmental officials bodies are asked to send them out and they send them out for any economic development projects within their city.

I know we just recently did one for a grant as well. So I don't have issues with the letter being sent out, but I do have an issue with Mr. Boscov and how he does business. I did a little research, actually a lot of research this week. Last week I mentioned when I was referring to the article that was in the Times-Tribune regarding "Donor's Brother Gets Job," why the Scranton Times, and not Mr. Lockwood in particular, because he was not the reporter during this time, didn't investigate other campaign contributors that received jobs or different perks from the city.

So I started looking into that and I actually wound up going in a completely

different direction than where I planned on because of this mall issue. I discovered a website and for those of you out there that want to check it out it's www.AlBoscov.com.

Sounds pretty simple. I figured it might have been Mr. Boscov's website, but it's certainly not. What this website says across the header, "Al Boscov. Exposing the Pennsylvania's Number One Tax Pimp." And it goes onto state all of his political donations to political candidates throughout the state, and they are numerous.

Mayor Doherty, former Mayor Doherty, received a total of \$17,500 from Mr. Boscov. Now, that isn't surprising considering Mr. Boscov has donated over the course -- since he was bailed out by the State of Pennsylvania in total Mr. Boscov has donated to political candidates \$549,893.15. That's over half a million dollars that Mr. Boscov donated to various political candidates throughout the State of Pennsylvania including, as I mentioned, \$17,500 to Mayor Doherty, \$31,000 to State Senator Blake, another \$2,000 to former State Rep Kevin

Haggerty. They were the only ones I noticed in our region. Former Governor Corbett, hundreds of thousands of dollars, and former Governor Ed Rendell, hundreds of thousands of dollars, and you have to question what is Mr. Boscov receiving because of these donations?

So I did a little more digging, and not to mention the fact that the State of Pennsylvania has bailed him out, Mr. Boscov, under Ed Rendell, to multi-millions of dollars, and all of these political donations were after the state bailout. So going back to 2009, now, I was not on city council at this time, "Boscov to city, Guaranteed Loan to Keep Store Open. Retail Chain Owner Seeks City Approval for \$3 Million and \$47 Million HUD Loan."

The first line of the article from the Times Leader, "I promise we will pay you back." The first line in the article. \$3 million. We have not been paid back. It goes on and on about it, but, again, this is Mr. Boscov using his political influence to receive favors.

In July of 2011 I was on city council at that time, another article, "Council Extends Mall Loan Repayment Schedule. With a 4 to 1 vote, Council amended the 2003 Section 108 loan agreement before the City and Steamtown Mall Partners, LLP for the refinancing of the Lackawanna Avenue mall project by extending the agreement until 2013."

I was the loan dissenting vote. It goes on after, some back and forth between myself and some of the previous members of council, I referred to the loan as a bailout and my colleague said, "More of a forbearance."

And I replied, "I shouldn't use the term bailout, I should have used the term state of execution."

And it turns out in 2011 to now I was correct. I wish I wasn't, but we are still on the hook for \$18 million, the taxpayers of Scranton. That money could have been used for so many other economic development projects within the city that could be seeing results from instead of a

mall that is desolate and barren and it makes me wonder, why Mr. Boscov is able to donate over half a million dollars to political candidates throughout the state, including some in our area, but he can't pay back the \$18 million he owes to Scranton taxpayers. For one, I will note vote to give Mr. Boscov a cent, whether it's city backed dollars or even if it's state grant I would like to see state money come into Scranton to help that property but not under the current management of Steamtown Mall Partners or under the management of Mr. Boscov. That property needs a new business plan and it needs to be completely revamped. And that is all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans?

MS. EVANS: Thank you. I guess I'll continue on with comments about Mr. Boscov and the mall. Mr. Boscov has effectively cleared the deck for bidding in a few weeks for the purchase of the Steamtown Mall. Unless there is a surprise bidder out there he will gain sole ownership of the mall at a

dramatically reduced price. It really is a bizarre scenario where a partner in the company that owned the mall and that defaulted on the mortgage allowed to go into foreclosure would now have the opportunity and the inside track to become the new owner. To say that Mr. Boscov is a shrewd businessman would be an understatement, but with that said without a commitment from him after he is the new owner to totally reinvent the mall and to pay the millions of dollars still owed to the taxpayers it would not even be close to be a sound investment by the City of Scranton to spend one taxpayer dime on the Boscov-owned Steamtown Mall.

As I mentioned earlier, because

Mr. Boscov will most likely own the mall at
a severely discounted price there is no need
to commit anymore tax dollars to the mall.

It is time for this project to finally stand
on its own and stop being propped up by
other people's money, particularly when that
money is for the taxpayers.

On another topic, HP-316 it is no

secret that I have been discussing the need for pension reform for almost a year, so I was extremely happy to learn this week that HP-316 passed in the state government committee and may be headed to a full vote on the floor of the house soon.

This pension reform bill would among other things place future public safety employees into a cash balance plan which is a hybrid pension plan with similarities to the 401-K. There is also an optional 457 plan available to new hires. What also will make the current practice of spiking which occurs when an employee has worked extensive overtime in their final years raising salaries to use to set pension payments.

Also, those employees would not be eligible for post-retirement health care and the retirement age would be raised to age 55 and you must also have 25 years of service, still lower than the private sector.

In April of this year, the ten

Chester took a Democratic council seminary to task for failing to overhaul the states municipal pension system and for not working with Republican lawmakers who are advancing pension reform. Those mayors are simply asking for bipartisan efforts on reform.

This city council sent letters dated April 15, 2015, to State Representatives Flynn and Farina asking for their support as If he hasn't done so already, I would ask Mayor Courtright to publically state his support for this bill and to personally lobby our state representatives to support this important legislation. I would also like to mention that Carbondale Mayor Justin Taylor who showed his support for the bill by personally visiting the capital on the date of the committee vote. This message from these mayors -- or those mayors and the city council should be loud and clear. Municipal pension reform should never be a partisan issues and for cities like Scranton mired in pension obligations, it may simply be a matter of survival. That is all I have at this time. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. I would just agree with Councilman Evans, I do think that we should send correspondence to Mayor Courtright to have him publically support this bill, I think it's important, as we know, as we've talked about for the past year and a half pension reform is critical to the city's success moving forward financially.

I had the pleasure of attending a book launch event at the Lackawanna Historical Society today at 5:30 just before our caucus. The book is called "Scranton's Hill Section." It is a textural and pictorial celebration of the history of Scranton's Hill Section neighborhood. book was written by Jack Sheen, a native and resident of the Hill Section. I had the pleasure of having Jack as a student when I did my student teaching at Holy Cross High School. Jack wrote the book during his senior year of high school and will be attending Penn State in the fall. He is an unbelievable student and a great person. would encourage everyone to purchase this

book and you can buy it online at www.arcadiapublishing.com for \$21.99 and this is the book that I have right here. So I would encourage everyone to buy that and support Mr. Sheen.

The street sweeper is scheduled to be in the East Scranton area from June 15 to June 19 from Arthur Avenue to Taylor Avenue. A resident had a question and contacted me this week about curb cuts throughout the city and I thought it would be informative for anyone else who was curious. Curb cuts or curb ramps are required on any construction project where federal funds are being used, including paving project.

A gentleman called our office about speeding on Sloan Street. Residents would like the speed limit placed in the area and extra patrols so we will be contacting chief Graziano about that. There was an issue two weekends ago that I was made aware of about adults throwing quarter sticks of dynamite into the Lackawanna river killing nearly a dozen fish, just below Sweeney Beach, and I guess this is not just an occurrence not

just with sticks of dynamite or M-80's. Firecrackers and other things, but this is reprehensible and cannot be tolerated. The police were called, but we will be having a conversation with Chief Graziano to see if this sort of thing -- patrols could be ramped up near the river.

Also, I had a conversation with Charlie Charlesworth, who was in and spoke about the Sweeney Beach legislation about two weeks ago. He would like to talk to city council about enacting an ordinance making the area from the Poplar Street to the Olive Street bridge catch and release, artificial lures, single hook only, no triple hooks or double hooks, which are harmful to fish, and he would like it to cover the whole green way from Poplar Street to the city limits below Elm Street. will be having that conversation with the next few weeks and encourage continued development long our river, which is a great economic asset, to the city.

Also, in caucus we spoke about, and I mentioned a conversation I had with Ron

Koldets, who is the Tax Claim Bureau director of Lackawanna County, to discuss the county's offer to collect the delinquent taxes for the city, distribute proceeds on a monthly basis and conduct sales for the city just as they do for the school district.

So we did discuss that as a council in our caucus tonight and we are planning on having Mr. Koladjeski in for our caucus to give us more information about that. I think it's very interesting.

In regards to the newspaper article, many of colleagues have touched on about Boscov's applying for a RACP grant in the amount of \$10 million and a \$50 million loan, as my colleagues have already said, council was never approached or consulted by Mayor Courtright regarding a letter he submitted pledging unanimous support for this project. Council was referenced in the letter yet known us knew anything about it. I spoke to Mayor Courtright Wednesday morning by phone to get an explanation and he did apologize, but this is just another example in my opinion of a total lack of

communication and transparency for Mayor

Courtright. At best, this is another sloppy
display by the mayor and, quite frankly, bad
government.

And as it pertains to Mr. Boscov, I think on a personal level when you talk to your average person on the street what they understand is how can somebody get a loan or a grant or any type of money when they still have outstanding debt. So I think I would agree with my colleagues that the debt has to be paid before that could even be considered. And that is all I have. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Just a couple of responses to people that spoke at the podium. First of all, in regard to the parking garages report that was in the paper this morning, that was an engineering report provided by Desmond. It was part of the monetization process and it's required as part of the monetization process from the bidders. The report was prepared for the bidders specifically, not necessarily for the City of Scranton. The City of Scranton

did not go out to Desmond and say, "We want to demolish the garages, how much is it going to cost?"

Desmond simply gave or provided a report that included a number of the different scenarios so that the bidders would then properly evaluate the bid that they might provide to the city in this monetization process. The city at no time was necessarily considering the demolition of the garage. It was simply something that was a part of or required report for the bidders in this monetization process.

As far as the mall and the idea of a casino for a mall, this has come up repeatedly from Mr. Bolus. First of all, we do not own the mall. Right now the mall is in receivership and likely to be owned by Mr. Boscov since he was the only bidder. We cannot force Mr. Boscov to put a casino in the mall.

Secondly, a casino needs an applicant, the city cannot apply for a license for a casino. If Mr. Bolus wants to apply and then look for support from the

city so be it, but there is no applicant for the casino license. Mr. Bolus is simply asking the city to do things that it cannot do.

Last, the Scranton plan was brought up, the Scranton Plan was a great idea and it worked until all the jobs started to move south and then to Asia. I would like, you know, Mr. Ellman gave a number of the businesses that came in under the Scranton Plan, I would like to know how many of those businesses still exist.

Yes, the Scranton Plan was a great idea and maybe we need something like that, but what types of businesses can we attract to the city, to the area at this time and how many can we keep in the area.

Lastly, as I think it's almost unanimous in our disfavor with the letter that was sent in support of a loan to Mr. Boscov. I had two problems with that and I spoke to the mayor on Wednesday, morning, Mr. Gaughan was part of a conference call at the time. I said that there were two things that I thought were

wrong about that letter. First, we had no knowledge of the letter. We had been trying to build a rapport between council and the administration. We had been, you know, doing our best to use that rapport with people in the banking community, you know, business community, and things like this simply aren't good as we move forward. How do we tell people that there is a communication between the administration and the council and a working relationship when this type of thing appears in the paper? It's simply was not a good practice.

Mayor Courtright had said, "Yes, it was a mistake on my part, I should have notified council," and we all agree with that, but still the image is out there and we are going to have to work to repair that.

My second problem was with the parking garages. The letter, which nobody has mentioned, said that we would give \$10 million to Mr. Boscov to repair the garage when we are trying to sell the garages that we own. To me, that's just giving your competitor money is not a good business

practice. In the letter that Mr. Rogan referenced, there is a mention that the city did ask or said to Mr. Boscov that they would agree or part of the agreement was that he would not provide long-term parking in the garage, that it would be for patrons only, that is a concession that is okay, but again, giving \$10 million to your competitor I just don't think that that is a good idea, and as everybody has mentioned, I think it's about time that Mr. Boscov starts spending a little bit of his own money and not everyone else's. And that is all.

MR. GAUGHAN: Can I just have -MR. MCGOFF: Sure.

MR. GAUGHAN: -- a point of clarification, too, and this was brought up in the caucus because this was a point of confusion I think in the article and many people are under the assumption that Mr. Boscov is asking the city for a \$15 million Section 108 loan, and I think, Mr. Rogan, could you just clarify exactly what -- since you are OECD, because when I read it I was under the assumption and then

I did -- we did ask Ms. Aebli what our lending capacity was because I thought there is no way we would be able to lend out \$15 million.

The 108 loans are what MR. ROGAN: Mr. Boscov has used in the past, well, actually Steamtown Mall Associates, which Mr. Boscov is the principal of, to obtain financing. The letter of support that was referenced in the Scranton Times' article was to the state for RACP grant I think of \$10 million. Any funds that come through those programs generally are voted on before council before they will given to the applicant. Any funds from a Section 108 loan or any sort of loan that would come from OECD would also come before city council for consideration and I don't see either one having the votes to pass city council at the current time.

MR. GAUGHAN: Right. But, I mean, is he -- is this a Section 108 from the state or --

MR. ROGAN: Section 108 if it were to be pursued would be through the city's

•

OECD office.

MR. GAUGHAN: Okay.

MR. ROGAN: That's maybe one of Mr. Boscov's long-term goals, but at this time that's not something that's going to be --

MS. EVANS: Basically a loan, it's a loan that we guarantee.

MR. ROGAN: It's a loan guaranteed -- a loan from federal dollars guaranteed by the city and in an instance of a default it comes out of our programming money, which we saw last year when we had to amend the CDBG allocations. Luckily those funds were paid back at that time, but moving forward, you know, how much debt is Mr. Boscov going to take on? He already owes us \$18 million, so let's get that \$18 million back before considering anything further.

MR. MCGOFF: And I would also add to that that I spoke to Mrs. Aebli on Wednesday morning about the \$15 million and she was unaware of anything that was in the application. It was a 400-page application, by the way, so in some cases you can't see
