MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. MCGOFF: Bill Jackowitz.

MR. JACKOWITZ: Good evening, Scranton City Council, Jamie, stenographer, Lori, Amil. 8,451 days we have been distressed. After listening to that caucus today, I haven't heard so much double talk since the last time Mr. Boscov was here. A lot of double talk going on, I didn't think a lot of the questions were answered completely. Working together, we have heard many times through council about how the administration and city council is working together, then how did we get a convicted felon hired at DPW and how did a letter get to Mr. Boscov that city council didn't know anything about if everybody is working together and cooperating with each other?

If someone could answer those questions during Fifth Order I would appreciate it. The rental registration, it's been 15 years in progress now and we still haven't gotten it off the ground yet. Again, we have been distressed for 8,451

days. Is it going to 8,451 days to get the rental registration off the ground and work properly? I think blight in the city, I think it's actually gotten worse instead of getting better, I have been driving around the city all week and some parts of the city is really terrible so I think we need to really concentrate a little bit harder on that if we can.

Experience does not matter. That was said by Councilwoman Gatelli one time. Well, it also appears that maybe a convicted felon or felony record doesn't matter either in the City of Scranton in order to get a job.

Roseann Novembrino, she has been in office for 28 years now. She has been on the Pension Board and yet she has never been brought in here to be asked any questions as to what happened because she would be the one who would have most of the answers because she has been in office for 28 years and the entire time -- the entire 8,451 days that the city has been distressed so I understand there is an investigation going

on, but she should have been brought in a long time ago because she is on the Pension Board and she should have answers as to why some votes were taken, what votes were taken, what she did, so on and so forth because I believe she is still on the Pension Board.

Let Boscov's go as far as I'm concerned, it doesn't really sound like he was being very straightforward our upfront. I agree with one thing that Mr. Boscov said, he said maybe you don't believe in it and you think it's going to fail then why do it. I agree with that wholeheartedly. We have plenty of examples of that here in Scranton, like the budgets that have been passed in previous years which we knew were going to fail but yet they passed anyway. recovery plans which we knew were going to fail, but they passed anyway, so the City of Scranton has a lot of experience in that and most of the people in the city believe that they were going to fail, but the residents and the citizens did not have the vote, council and the mayor were the ones

who made the votes on that and they failed. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Before the next speaker, I just had one other announcement that I forgot to make earlier, I was told that the pool at Connell Park may not open this Saturday, they were redoing the surface of the pool and it needed some warm, dry days for it be finished and because of the rain in the past couple of days or past weeks it may not have dried completely, so that pool may not open Saturday, I'm not sure, I haven't heard.

And, I'm sorry, Mrs. Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANTIZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
Scranton resident and taxpayer. I was both
amazed and disappointed that neither the
mayor nor Mrs. Aebli attended the caucus
tonight. Were they extended an invitation?
Did they know about it?

MR. MCGOFF: They knew about it, I don't know that it was necessarily an invitation was made in any way.

MS. HODOWANITZ: That speaks a lot about the mayor. Speaking of the mayor, has

1 he given you a date when he will appear in caucus? 2 3 MR. MCGOFF: In speaking to the mayor on Monday, a tentative date of July 9, I 4 5 believe, he and Mr. Amoroso were to be here. MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, in addition 6 7 to Mr. Amoroso I think the mayor has a 8 little bit of explaining to do about his 9 conversations and correspondence with 10 Mr. Boscov. I, too, was a little bit 11 confused about what I heard tonight, but 12 we'll see. 13 With regard to SB and Company, our 14 independent auditor for 2014, does anybody know what deadline the city has given them? 15 16 MR. MCGOFF: I'm sorry, what was the 17 question? 18 MS. HODOWANITZ: What's the deadline 19 for the 2014 independent audit? MR. MCGOFF: I'm not sure that one 20 21 has been established. 22 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. I'll give 23 you one deadline, the Home Rule Charter says 24 it was due on May 31, we are now 18 days 25 late. Is there a reason why we are not

seeing any updates? I recall that

Mr. Rossi, if he did nothing else right, he
would give an update which went into the
council's background papers about every two
weeks starting in January. Have we received
anything from this new company? Has anybody
asked? Is that put in the engagement
letter?

MR. MCGOFF: I know that they have been engaged as has been the BA's Office, I'm not sure as to what has been accomplished and what has not been accomplished.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, I will be your usual irritant and ask the question every week from no on until I see an audit. April of 2014 council passed a resolution authorizing a contract with PFM group in Harrisburg for professional, advisory services from March 9, 2014, through March 8, 2018. According to an article in the paper, on April 17, 2014, their services were to include analysis of our existing debt structure and recommendations on financing alternatives, recommendations on

current and future debt obligations, assistance for the City's Act 47 coordinator, help improving the City's relationship with the banking community, and assistance in the sale and/or lease of city Their fees ranged from \$225 to \$300 per billable hour. The fees for 2014 were to be deferred until 2015. I had been checking with the Controller's Office but I have been unable to find any invoices for This is because they have not provided any services or they have just not billed us If the bill is pending, how much do we owe them for 2014 and up to now in 2015? Exactly what services, if any, did they perform for us? If you could answer that in Fifth Order.

If not, I will leave these questions so that you can reply next week. I will tell you that I'm getting very frustrated asking questions and never hearing a response.

Since it's on my computer, I will start printing them off every week and asking them again and again. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Prior to our next speaker, many of the questions that are asked, as I said last week, are things that council does not have answers to. They are things that we do not handle. questions are things that would be better asked of the particular departments that handle those particular items. It's as simple as that. All of us, or most of us, work and have jobs, 9 to 5 jobs. It's very difficult for many of us to acquire those answers as it is for the staff in our office to acquire them on top of the work that they So if you're frustrated in getting answers from council that may be the reason Gerard Hetman. why.

MR. HETMAN: Gerard Hetman. Good evening, Council. Gerard Hetman from Lackawanna County's Community Relation's Department, good to see you as always. To begin this evening, in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, the Lackawanna County Area Agency on Aging is distributing it's farmers market nutritional vouchers for the 2015 season. Senior

residents of Lackawanna County are eligible to obtain up to four vouchers valued at \$5 each to be redeemed for fresh produce at local farmers market under this program.

Distribution takes place at each of the senior centers, the adult daytime activities centers around the county, and they begin at 9 a.m. on the dates for each center and continues until the supply of vouchers for that center is exhausted. Dates for the senior centers in the City of Scranton or as follows:

Thursday, July 16, for the West Side Senior Center. Monday, July 20, for the South Side Senior Center. Wednesday, July 22, for the Jewish Community Center Center, and Friday, July 24, for the downtown senior center. We should note that residents in the County can go to any distribution site in the county to get their vouchers. They don't have to go to the center nearest to them or to the one that they normally visit. There are other dates that are available on County's website at LackawannaCounty.org for time's sake we won't read them all now, but

we can go to another senior outside the city if someone finds that more convenient.

Those who qualify are Lackawanna County residents who be 60 years of age or older by December 31 and whose annual household income does not exceed \$21,775 for a single person, \$29,471 for a couple, or \$37,167 for a three-person household. Proof of age in the form of a driver's license or birth certificate must be provided along with proof of Lackawanna County residency in the form of a utility bill or a driver's license. Seniors who are unable to visit the site may appoint a proxy to pick up their vouchers for them. Proxy forms are required and can be obtained by visiting the Area Agency on Aging in the County's administration building, visiting your local senior, or on-line at LackawannaCounty.org. If anyone has any questions about the program they can contact Lackawanna County Area Aging on Aging at 570-963-6740. Again, it's 570-963-6740.

Then there is two event series that the County Parks would like to mention for

this summer. The first are entitled are fit and fun days. This is an evolution of the last year family fun days series. partnership between Lackawanna County, the Wright Center for graduate medical education, Geisinger Community Medical Center and other community partners focused on individual's health and wellness. Ιt will feature various events and activities including guided walks of the trail systems in the county parks, yoga, tai-chi, Zumba and other dance activities and information from the Wright Center and Geisinger on tobacco sensation, oral health, nutrition and exercise and other wellness topics.

The dates for the fit and fun days are, which run from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day that they are held are June 27 at McDade Park, July 11 at Covington Park, July 25 at Aylesworth Park, and August 8 and the Merli Sarnwoski Park.

Mr. McGoff, you know, last week I didn't know you were so knowledgeable about the first Scranton Plan. They raised I think \$3,200,000 I think 50 years ago. don't know what that is equal to now, probably what, 15, 20 million dollars, I They raised all of that money don't know. here in the city privately. There is not a reason in this world that this council instead of -- instead of helping anybody, not just Mr. Boscov, we could have that mall. You people are in the best position of anybody to get loans and grants and so forth, and I don't care what anybody says a market place in that mall would be very successful. I have been several times since the wintertime when I mentioned this to you, I have been to Allentown, that mall is packed every weekend. It's only open I think Friday and Saturday, maybe it's Thursday and Pottstown is the same way. There is only 25,000 people in the area of Pottstown, that mall is packed and it's big.

You know, you could have a bowling alley. There could be a gas station outside. There is all kinds of uses.

Mr. Boscov he just thinks of shoe stores and maybe men's clothing stores, he is a dinosaur like me, you know, except he might be great at merchandising, but it's a different world. He is in the 50's and 60's. This is 2015.

And I think if you people investigated it like you have got the ability to do this city could own that mall. We out to have all the grants and loans instead of helping everybody else get them.

You know, when he was sitting here he said himself this isn't the most important thing they got going. I don't even know why there was a meeting today. Let him go to the bank if he wants money. Maybe if he paid some of that money back, there was 639 people that were in foreclosure, maybe just one of them could have made his house notes or whatever.

He sits here and brags how successful it is here and in Wilkes-Barre,

Sunday I was told that he is upside down in Wilkes-Barre just like he is with us. He is a taker, he is not a giver. I don't care how successful he says he is. He just -- he doesn't have any ties to this city. These people that got out to support the marketplace they are local people, they have got ties to this city. They are voters and paying taxes. They are the youth that you want for the future in this city.

Mr. Bulzoni he has no ties to the city. Nothing. Mr. Cross doesn't have any ties to the city. If he had an honest job and worked for somebody like Donald Trump or somebody they would probably fire him the first 15 minutes. 20 years and not one positive event for the city and Amoroso he just got a brain dead stupidity of a plan, raise taxes and sell everything. It's time we bought something and keep we got and not sell it.

Mr. McGoff, please think about this, and you are so knowledgeable of this you could do something for the city, something great if you ask me. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

Citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I
guess Boscov stood up taking I know now, but
I'm more concerned with the mall partners.
How did Boscov acquire the Sampter's

garage that used to belong to down the
street there, used to be a Nissan in there?
Them three properties were originally part
of the mall. How did Boscov acquire them
from the partners? Obviously, they sold it
within themselves. I wish somebody would
look into that to find out how he acquired
it.

Now a long time ago, I asked for the mall assessment, and the mall at that time was assessed at \$400,000, which to me was ridiculous. Now, Mr. Boscov quoted I think 300 and some thousand in tax and real estate tax, I believe, I assume that was on Sampter's, Oppenheim, and the garage, but I have no other way of knowing but, of course, I'm not a sitting up there or I would know.

That's the leases that he True, he had to deal with the referred to. leases, he sold them to someone else and that was there. No one ever really kept track of what he was doing with the mall partners other than coming and asking for money. I want to ask when Mr. Boscov was going bankrupt with the stores and you loaned him or the mall partners, I don't know which, I asked that question, where was the loan made, to the mall partners or to Mr. Boscov separately? No one can answer that questions and you should have answered it because we all know that mall is going into receivership because there is no way. I watched them things being done. They were brought up when them properties were spun off by Mr. Boscov, I shouldn't say Mr. Boscov, but the mall partners. referring to that because he was -- he was the mall partners, but anyway, these things

were done all along. The writing was on the When you start handling out money to people knowing that they are going to fail that's wrong. You are the reason why the city is in trouble, the worker's. The people who are hired to protect us is the ones that put us where we are and there is it no question about it. It's just a sorry state of a fact. Affairs that nobody really looked at the total picture why they did things.

I'm sorry, I don't think -- I think we are going to get that 20 percent tax hike this coming year and there is no way out of it. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Prior to the next speaker, just a clarification on something that was just mentioned, first of all, when Mr. Boscov talked about the \$300,000 in taxes, he was talking about taxes on the store and when we are talking about loans the loans were made to Steamtown Mall Partners as was the extension on the loans. There was never a separate loan to Mr.

Boscov. I think he was pretty clear on that when he spoke, which means that when Steamtown Mall Partners goes bankrupt we have no way of -- when they default and go bankrupt we have no way of collecting on that and that is why it was sometimes difficult because Mr. Boscov did go back and forth on talking about the Mall Partners and Boscov's itself. Sometimes it was difficult to discern which he was talking about which leads to some of the confusion I would say that, you know, people may have and some of the confusion that we had with, you know, what he was saying, but, thank you.

Next speaker is Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Lee Morgan. You know, I just hope that -well, the first thing I have here is we are
talking about there was a brief discussion
here today become office workers in the city
and they all went to Moosic because their
companies didn't want to pay the taxes to be
here anymore and when you walk around this
city and you see the overwhelming amount of
blight in the city and the overwhelming

And, you know, truthfully I think the residents of the city just tread so lightly when they walk that they don't realize that other people are walking on top You know, I think Mr. Boscov made of them. a couple of points here tonight that I think a few people might have missed. A congressman wanted this mall and a governor. This was a political mall filled with political money, and it wasn't made in the best interest of the residents of this city or anybody else because everybody knew in the 1980's that there was 27 square foot of mall space for every person in this country and that mall space was already overdeveloped. A lot of people made a lot of money, a lot of connected people made a lot of money, but the ordinary, every day

people in this city they didn't make anything and that's the sad state of affairs.

And when Mr. Boscov talks about the way the downtown looked prior to the mall he is absolutely correct. The downtown looked like Berlin in 1945 after the bombings. was just a horrendous, disgusting mess and when you take a look at the \$25 million that was invested on the other side of Lackawanna Avenue that money will never come back to the city because it will never raise enough tax revenue to make it possible. This city has been so theoretically and politically looted that it's beyond belief. And we look to the same failed Democratic and Republican party that's going to come and allegedly save us when the people are that throwing us in the water without a boat and without a life jacket on. I mean, it's just ridiculous.

And I find it very troubling and when we start talking about who owes what to who, it's obvious that Mr. Boscov doesn't owe anybody \$18 million, and I know that,

Mr. Rogan, you tried to make a point, but I 1 don't know if it's your age or your lack of 2 3 understanding of things, but I think that Mr. Boscov definitely tried to give you some 4 5 good information that you didn't really want to hear and, you know, grandstanding and 6 7 politics is a beautiful thing but --8 MR. ROGAN: Mr. Morgan, Mr. Boscov 9 was here for his own interest. 10 MR. MORGAN: You are absolutely 11 right, he was, I agree. 12 MR. ROGAN: The four of us up --13 MR. MORGAN: I agree --14 MR. ROGAN: -- try to save the city 15 as much money as we can. 16 MR. MORGAN: City money, this wasn't 17 city money invested in the mall. 18 MR. ROGAN: They were federal dollars. 19 20 MR. MORGAN: You're right, they 21 were, and a lot of federal money has come 22 into this city and it's been wasted. 23 you should take some time and go look at the 24 South Side Sports Complex. That was built 25 with 108 funds. It was illegal to sell

1	that.
2	MR. ROGAN: We're talking about the
3	mall and we agree on that issue.
4	MR. MORGAN: Okay, well, we can agree
5	
6	MR. ROGAN: We're talking about the
7	mall. Weren't we supposed to you're
8	criticizing me for asking Mr. Boscov for
9	payment of that money, what are we supposed
10	to do, say it's okay?
11	MR. MORGAN: He wasn't personally on
12	the hook to pay that money. He wasn't
13	personally on the hook to pay that much. I
14	would think if I was a councilman
15	MR. ROGAN: He was the principal in
16	Steamtown Mall Associates, he even admitted
17	it.
18	MR. MORGAN: He owned 18 percent and
19	he explained in the business they all took a
20	beating.
21	MR. ROGAN: So we should just
22	MR. MORGAN: They all lost money.
23	MR. ROGAN: So we should just let it
24	go and take it out of our city coffers?
25	MR. MORGAN: That's not what I'm

1 saying to you, I'm saying --MR. ROGAN: That is what you're 2 3 saying because you told us not to pursue it. MR. MORGAN: No I didn't tell you not 4 5 to pursue anything, I told you he wasn't obligated to pay that money. There is a 6 bankruptcy, that has been discharged, okay? 7 8 When the city had the right and the 9 obligation to make smart decisions in the 10 beginning, and it's something that the city 11 has failed to do, okay, they backed the 12 hotel in the city and then they gave away 13 all their options to collect it and they 14 were left with beds and bed linens and they 15 had nothing to collect, and what I'm saying 16 to you is that this city has made a lot of 17 very unintelligent choices on what to fund, 18 how to fund them and how to protect 19 themselves if something happened. 20 MR. ROGAN: And I'm not disagreeing. 21 MR. MORGAN: Well, there is nothing 22 to disagree with. 23 MR. ROGAN: Then why are you 24 criticizing myself for making --I think if I was a 25 MR. MORGAN:

councilman -- here's what I'd worry about if I was a councilman in this city, I would worry about the blight in all of the neighborhoods, I'd get my head around the budget and cutting it by 30 percent like I asked you to, I'd wonder whether people can pay their bills in the city under the burden of taxation they face and I'd stop worrying about grandstanding and politics because that's lead us to a road of utter destruction. That's where we are in this city. The city is just collapsing around you and you are talking about selling parking garages and the Sewer Authority off.

After that's done, what's left of our city, that's the question I have and I thank for your time.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Morgan.

MR. ROGAN: Just as a point of reference, the Section 108 loans, and we went through this last year, Mr. Morgan brought up blight as an issue, the funds that Mr. Boscov and Steamtwon Mall Partners stick the city for, part of the funds that will be cut out of that are for blight

removal, they are going to the Boys and Girls Club, they go to the little leagues, they go to the organizations that help people in Scranton. So it's not just money going into a black hole in the city coffers, this is program money that is used to throughout the city and there were a number of organizations that didn't receive those funds last year because of this default by the Mall Associates, in which Mr. Boscov was one of the principals of. That was the point that myself and I know many of my colleagues and the mayor through his letter were trying to make.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Quinn.

MR. QUINN: Ozzie Quinn, president of the Hill Neighborhood Association. I'm here for another reason, but in a way I feel vindicated, but I don't want to feel good about it because I was the Chairman of the Scranton Redevelopment Authority when the properties were being acquired and I was arguing back and forth and I was the only one at that time and I was ostracized. I was an obstructionist. If you go back and

look at it, you know, because of the fact that all they wanted to do was they thought the mall was just going to be the jewel and that's going to save everything and they want to poor all of that money in there.

They didn't care where it came from and anybody that argued was, you know, but that's just a little side note, you know, because I know what has been going for a long time.

All right, why I'm here tonight, I appreciate being here tonight because of the fact that the city is in debt no doubt about it, but when they are so much in debt that they cannot buy chlorine for Nay Aug Park to go swimming that's as low as you can go, okay? I don't know if you can't buy chlorine then you might as well go bankrupt, file bankruptcy, all right?

Now, we have a situation where last year we raised \$18,600, Allied Services gave \$10,000, and we raised \$8,600 and that was before, a week before -- not a week before, but we knew for months we had to raise that money, not like just what happened, okay?

That \$5,000 that Allied Services gave to you, you have a resolution tonight, that money according to the Recreation Director or Chairman told me today that's open to anybody. It doesn't matter what income or whatever. Last year it was all low income, so I don't know how much that \$5,000 is going to go, but I'm very worried because I met with the mayor on May 12 and I was told that there was \$10,000 he was getting and that was going to go for, you know, swimming for low income.

Now, I was there when he told Kay to call Weston Field that when we start the swimming you are going to have show that you have an Access card or reduced lunch or something like. Man, I took it all in. I even went back to our membership and told them I feel good about that, all right?

I was at a membership meeting again, the acting chairman of the Bureau of the Recreation Authority stood before us and said this is the first time the membership, telling the membership that we are able to give free swimming. Today he denied that.

He said, "I was talking about kids under 12."

Talk about being lied to. Come on. All right, now, here we are, we are going to try to raise some money, all right, and it's going be tough because we only learned in the last week that the mayor didn't have money, he said he was going to do this and he said he was going to do that, well, we are not getting it, okay? So, I do know and I told the mayor this, okay, that there is UDAG money RE-RE accounts, right, all the UDAG comes into the city, UDAG, a redevelopment action grant is misnomer, it's an urban development -- actually, it's a loan, and I guess you all know that, but the fact is that these people have to pay it back, it goes back into the account, and stash money for the mayor. He can do whatever he wants. Whatever he wants and he has done it. Santa Clauses they have done, Santa Claus parades, First Night, dog walks, anything you want to do with it.

So I'm asking the council tonight you are going to approve \$5,000 from Allied

Services, and that's good for Allied
Services to do that for the city, but I'm
asking the council and Mr. Rogan, you are
the community development chairman, do you
know how much is in that UDAG account?

MR. ROGAN: It's a very small amount, the last time I remember it was less than \$10,000, but we actually did discuss this a little bit last week and I am checking into it.

MR. QUINN: You discussed it with who?

MR. ROGAN: We all discussed it regarding some other issues with some findings in OECD.

MR. QUINN: Well, you know what, when I called OECD they said there is enough money in the UDAG account for swimming.

That was before I went in and saw the mayor, okay? And you are talking about money going out last year and what not, you know, but not one single cent went for low income swimmers.

Now, it's really ashame when kids can't go swimming, okay, that, you know,

they can't afford it. Now, we are saying under 12 no admission, but under eight, eight or under you have to have a guardian, okay, obviously, you know, but that guardian has to pay \$5 so what good is that? You're still taking \$5 off a low income person. Now, ten years old and 9 years old, if you had a child 9 or 10 years old and they live over in Keyser Valley would you have them come to Nay Aug to get a free admission? Come on. It's all a bunch of lies. You got to do something about the fact that there is low income people out there that don't have two nickles to rub together and their kids are suffering and they want part of Nay Aug. There is it something wrong when we try to use Nay Aug Pool, a public park, as the country club and basically that's what's going on.

You know, I have been told that there is bad people that will go up there if we give them free swimming. Well, you know, you have lifeguards, if your lieguards could say, "You are out for a week," you know, whatever, okay, but please, please, do

something about this here free swimming, okay? I mean, we are going to try to raise it, but when you don't have money for chlorine and you are talking about millions and millions and millions, I don't know what's going on here in the city. I really don't, okay? Thank you very much.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Quinn.

THE COURT: Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good afternoon.

Marie Schumacher, evening, one of those.

I'd like to go back to April when I started asking about the revised recovery plan and the mandates that were in it, I read some of them, there were mandates for 2015 and there is a section that are mandates for 2015/2016, and this is verbatim, and I would like to request, and it goes along with --well, "I would like to request that we get a monthly report maybe on the last Thursday of each month on the status of those mandates."

I followed that up with more information on the recovery plan and then I asked for the items that that were supposed

to be addressed in the revenue section of the budget and in the expenditure section of the budget throughout this year, and I looked at the budget, the annual budget, as a microcosm of the recovery plan. It's the first year of the recovery plan, so I see no difference between those two items, but then after I'd asked on the 14th of May I believe I had asked for the revenue items from this year's budget that had been promised for status. And quoting -- Mr. McGoff, quoting you, you said, "In speaking with Mr. Evans the other day we talked about the idea that there should be, from now until the end of the year, there should be something. plan for addressing the issues that are in the recovery plan or in the Amoroso plan. There should be a timeline of some sort so that we can look at it. Now, we don't need to provide everything, but there should be a timeline. We are addressing the parking You know, we are addressing, you know, the LST, where it's going and all of these things we should have before us so that we can accomplish what is in the

1 recovery plan, what is in the Amoroso plan 2 and perhaps the caucus with the mayor and 3 with Mr. Amoroso and Mr. Bulzoni we can work out something of that nature so that we can 4 5 all be aware of where the city is going and 6 the progress that it may be making. it." 7 8 So in essence, Mr. McGoff, you 9 agreed that we need to know that 10 information, yet you told me last week that 11 council doesn't have the answers and you 12 tell Joan tonight that council doesn't have 13 the answers --14 MR. MCGOFF: Mrs. --MRS. SCHUMACHER: Now, maybe -- let 15 16 me finish. Thank you. 17 MR. MCGOFF: May I respond since you 18 are questioning what I said? 19 MS. SCHUMACHER: If it's not charged 20 against my time, yes. 21 MR. MCGOFF: You presented council 22 with a three-page list of questions. 23 MS. SCHUMACHER: Yes. 24 MR. MCGOFF: That's very difficult to 25 take care of. Many of the questions --

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, if I could --

MR. MCGOFF: Many of the questions that you asked are for your own personal edification, they have nothing to do with what council needs or wants. As far as my comments about a timeline or something to update the recovery plan, that is why we are having a caucus with Mr. Amoroso and the mayor. So I stand by everything that I say.

MS. SCHUMACHER: We can agree to disagree on that, but I tell you that the budget, whether those -- the questions were legitimate from the budget from either savings through the expenditure side or increasing revenues through the revenue Now, I have no problem doing a Right-to-Know, ask the business administrator and he can tell you, but there are things that are covered by the Right-to-Know law and there there are things that are not. When I ask for the status, I mean, here we are. We are in the sixth month of the year. A status report I think is something that you owe we, the taxpayers, you are elected by you -- by the taxpayers

and you each have administrative departments for which you have charge, so you keep telling us what a wonderful relationship you have with these administrators now for this year and last, so I would think it would be appropriate for you people to ask those questions. They don't have to answer us and I, frankly, don't think we should be taking their time.

MR. MCGOFF: And I think we have been very open and made every attempt to answer questions that are pertinent to the legislation that is before us, and to the recovery plan and to the budget.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah.

MR. MCGOFF: By problem is that when I get three pages worth of questions that is going to take a very -- that's going to take a lot of time away from the duties that we have and yet they add nothing to what we are doing.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. That's where we agree to disagree because I believe they do have pertinent -- whether or not we are going to meet the budget for this year, how

much we are going to be taxed for next year and whether or not we are meeting our revised recovery plan. So we can definitely agree to disagree, but I do think that it's owed to we, the taxpayers. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs. Schumacher.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer. Once again, on the Transpacific pack please call Congress and tell them to can if. We have enough joblessness. 1-202-224-3121 for call senators and representatives in Washington.

And 1-202-456-1111 for the White House.

And, by the way, I found out recently that the State Department negotiates trade packs, who was in the state department? A current person that's announced her bid for the presidency, good luck at getting me to vote for you. I will be voting for somebody else. Bernie Sanders hopefully and if you are tired of no jobs and you tired of the high property taxes, tired of bankrupt city governments, tired of threats to your retirement, tired of being a

public employee and begging for raises that you are never going to get or have to fight for and put up an estate for. Tired of 50 percent of the pollution in California is compliments of China, give it a call. You can't go wrong.

Now, a few weeks ago there was an incident, and I'm not commenting on the way an employee gets hired, but an employee with a criminal record, anyone, and this is my opinion only, anyone completing their sentence and taxable should have full rights and benefits of all Americans, within reason. In other words, Reverend Keiker's wife got a shotgun and shot him while he slept, well, I don't think she needs her second amendment rights, but as far as when you're out in society it's time that we stop the cycle of crime by at least allowing people to earn a living in both.

Parking garages, I might just comment quickly that I was at a concert awhile back and they couldn't bill me on their new swipe machines for the credit card, they had to let me go for free.

Smart.

And, again, I would like to entertain, we have five taxing bodies in Pennsylvania, maybe the tea party is right, we have too many governments.

Now, on Lackawanna Avenue an eastbound lane at Lackawanna and Washington there used to be a turn arrow painted on the pave in the right-hand lane and now there is a straight white line, and I noticed that if you try to obey what you know to be the traffic pattern you have somebody coming up along your right-hand side that just went straight through, so if we could ever get a sign on the turn signal post that gives a right-hand turn only. again, the Chamber of Commerce it's time for a second opinion because they are still building malls up the valley and here we are with all of this and the Taylor mall is going bankrupt, the Pittston mall is going bankrupt, some day Wallymart will buy them up for a pittance and we will be the ones out. The Montage Mall is having empty spaces, and it's really ashame because we're overbuilding commercial properties and storefronts like Mr. Morgan says 27 feet of space in the 80's, well, probably now we have 100 square feet of space for every person and there is no money in our society with these trade packs and also with mechanization of many of these jobs and then on top of it we have undocumented aliens knocking back the wage rates a dollar an hour at the very least, so until the public has the money all I get when I go to a mall and I have money to spend is annoyed, you know? I'd just as soon find something else to do so we need a second opinion on Amoroso and a lot of the Chamber of Commerce opinions on our city because they are just

not with the current trend for what's going on.

And, finally, I would like to file suit against the PA to compensate for 35 percent tax exempt burdens imposed upon Scranton, and some day I hope to rejuvenate the taxpayers and take that on since Ozzie left. Thank you and have a great evening.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

McGoff. Usually when we have a caucus we come out of the caucus much more informed than when we went in. I'd have to say that tonight is not the case. The issues that were discussed, a lot of the questions that came up remain unanswered so I believe as we go forward as a council and the administration as a business community we are going to have to get some straight answers to this money that they keep referring to as not paid back.

There is no denying that money has been lost, we understand that, but there is

no sense for the city to be chasing after \$18 million if it's gone as a result of a bankruptcy settlement so I think what we have to do is get down to the true facts of what money really exists. There is no denying that the 108 loans, the payments on that are coming out of our COM-D money, there is no denying that, and as Mr. -- I get a little nervous when Mr. Boscov refers to it as a donation. I don't think it's a donation, I think it's an obligation that he pays that to the city because it does take money away from the deserving programs that money goes to so going forward I would like to say I would like to see a discourse on this money so we can talk about real numbers.

I also disagree with Mr. Boscov when he says that bringing office space to the mall is not an attractive alternative. I think having 400 or so medical personnel working in downtown Scranton would add much more foot traffic at the mall and having that as a truly just retail mall, as Mr. Evans mentioned during the caucus, I

think that has proven to be a recipe for failure. The mall as it stands probably does have a life as some sort of smaller retail store with Boscov as the anchor, so I'm little concerned that if Mr. Boscov purchases the mall, sticks to his solely retail operation are we going to have wait 10 years for that to fail as well before we can get into something positive for the city.

Just a couple of other items, we have been sending requests for potholes to be repaired by DPW, they are making progress on the list, but it was quite extensive and they are still following up on that.

I have been in contact with Pat Hinton about some blight issues and his staff has been handling those as well.

This week Mr. Gaughan and I attended an impromptu meeting of the East Mountain Residents Association. A few issues were discussed, I think Mr. Gaughan will talk about that in his motions.

On a sad note, I would like to offer my condolences to the Mike Lallo family.

Mike Lallo was an East Mountain resident who, unfortunately, passed away yesterday at the age of 56 years old. Mike was very active in scouting, he was a businessman and number one he was a great family man, and the people of East Mountain and especially the scouting community are going to miss Mike very much. And that's all I have tonight, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan?

One brief item and then MR. ROGAN: I'm going to talk about our caucus a little bit. A little bit of a strange request, but I'm sure this is something that Councilman Wechsler is familiar with, it's in his neighborhood. A resident contact me, she lists on Yesu Drive on East Mountain and her address is often confused with a neighbororing Yesu Lane, and there is only one home on Yesi Lane, which is now up for sale because the owner is currently in a nursing home, and she would like to see if this one block street with one home on it can become part of the adjoining Short lane. This would end the confusion for emergency

vehicles and anyone attempting to find homes in this area.

So, Mrs. Reed, I do have this request, I know it would have go to the DPW, but I also think it has to go to the County 911 Center as well to see if this is something that we could get taken care of and the post office as well so I do have this and anything we can do to try and get this straightened out.

Regarding the caucus, boy, I could talk all night on this, but I won't. I had a list of other questions that I planned on asking Mr. Boscov, but I know myself and I think all five of us every question we asked we got the same answer, that Boscov Department Store doesn't own the mall and that -- it was the same answer over and over again. And I think that Mr. Boscov was being somewhat disingenuous regarding the relationship between him and the mall when he was one of the driving forces behind that mall and in the waning days of the Steamtown Mall Partners, Mr. Boscov was the face of that partnership and there is no question

about that. Whenever there was talk of bringing a new anchor store or doing something to revitalize the mall under the old ownership it was Mr. Boscov that people was turning to. He took that leadership role and now that things didn't work out the way we wanted to he is pretty much claiming that I had nothing to do with the mall, I only had something to do with Boscov store.

And there is no question that
Boscov's store is a successful store, I
think the vast majority of residents in the
city shop there. I shop there, my family
shops there, it's a great store, but the
mall, Mr. Boscov had his hands in as well,
as well as Sampter's building and the
Oppenheim building and they were also loans
that were due on those buildings as well,
but my phone died on me when I was pulling
up the document, it was I believe \$1 million
plus interest for one of the buildings and
\$749,000 plus interest for the others, and
those are owned by Mr. Boscov from the Mall
Associates, and it's a very complicated

situation and I think in tonight's caucus Mr. Boscov -- they say if you can't dazzle them with brilliance, baffle them with, you know, and I think that's what Mr. Boscov was aiming for, because we didn't get any answers to any of the questions that we have had, and he is willing to make a donation the Section 108, but the other loans were still payable to the city. For instance, the UDAG, that's the money that I believe Mr. Quinn brought up, when that money gets repaid twice that's when it can be used for other items.

And I was wrong, I did check on that, double check on that balance it's closer to \$100,000 not \$10,000, so I did have that wrong initially.

Mr. Boscov kept saying, "Well, it's not the city's dollars, it's not the city's dollars," and he is right in that the city didn't write the check to Steamtown Mall Partners a/k/a Al Boscov and his partners right out of the city coffers, but these were economic development funds that were given to the City of Scranton and then the

City of Scranton gave them to Steamtown Mall Partners and Al Boscov for redevelopment. Those funds can have been used for an assortment of other projects throughout the city. They didn't have to be used for his project. And the way these loans are structured is many times the money comes back. With the 108 they come back, it gets repaid to HUD. If they are not paid, it comes off of our line of credit, which is what we use for numerous programs. Paving in low to moderate income areas, neighborhood police patrols, little leagues, parks programs, and the list goes on and on and we see every year when we do our CDBG allotment all of the good programs that are funded through that allotment and when the Section 108 loans are not paid it's a huge hit.

On the larger issue of what's going on with that property, although Mr. Boscov claims he is not intentionally devaluing the mall I do not believe that. I believe that the Mall Partners previous debt was just for round numbers was well in excess of \$100

million and now you could buy it for \$700,000? Why would he not buy it at that bargain basement price. That would be like the five of us up here owning a piece of property for \$100,000, defaulting on all of the debt and then one of us buying it for \$70,000. It's the same type of thing that will happen if Mr. Boscov buys it for \$700,000, \$1 million, free and clear with all of the other debts washed, with the banks out, the city out, and him left with the property for maybe only \$700,000.

And you put that into perspective, look at the price of a house in the City of Scranton, you could by a nice house 70, 80 thousand dollars, compare that to the size of the mall, just to put it into perspective how good of a deal Mr. Boscov could be getting if he does, indeed, purchase that property for \$700,000 or a \$1 million. If he does purchase it, I wish him the best, I hope that his plans work, but just judging by my research and that of others of malls throughout America that it doesn't work in this old strictly retail sense.

There have been a lot of good ideas with mixed views used that have been brought up and I think Mr. Boscov is being foolish for not exploring those. I understand that his bread and butter is in retail, but by bringing in people and having a marketplace, by having other events they are going to go in there and shop with the other stores. If you walk through that mall now, you have pretty much one successful store in that mall, which is Boscov's, and the rest of the mall is a ghost town.

So I guess we'll see what happens with the sale. If Mr. Boscov wins the bid I am hopeful that there is another developer out there that will bid against Mr. Boscov have and hopefully develop it into something more modern and something that could be used in many other facets, but still have a retail component, still have a Boscov store, have another anchor store. I guess we'll have to wait and see what happens, but I am hopeful that through this process something good will happen, but I am concerned regarding the debt that is owed to the city.

And is that all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans?

MS. EVANS: Thank you. I'm not going to comment further on the caucus, I have already Boscoved today. On land banks, again, I'm very happy this concept is moving forward. I would like to know that while everyone involved is now giving them high five's, it was this council, and particularly Councilman Gaughan, who beat the drum for land banks for the past 18 months and kept this issue very much in the forefront.

I have a couple of comments and requests for, Mrs. Reed, so sorry. Can we contact the mayor's office to get an update on any discussions on the monetization of the Sewer Authority, and also can we find out if there is an agreement between the City of Scranton and Geisinger CMC that allows for employees and construction workers from CMC to completely use three, sometimes four lots in the Nay Aug Park every day.

And, finally, can we send a letter

to the mayor asking that he join other mayors from across the state and this city council and publically support House Bill 316, a pension reform bill, that addresses municipal pension reform. And that's all I have.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. A few things. The street sweeper is scheduled to be in the Bunker Hill section of East Scranton from June 22 until June 26, wheeler Avenue to Matthew Avenue.

I received a letter today from a woman on the 1400 block of Fig Street about the awful condition of the street. We did a few months ago send a letter to the DPW asking that they patch the potholes and possibly put the street on the paving list so we will resend that and see if there is a way that we can get this street on the paving list in the future. That's very important to the residents of that block.

Mrs. Schumacher had asked me a few weeks ago about the flood control employees and their duties, the equipment that was

purchased from the 2015 Governor Rendell grant, we did send a request to DPW Director Gallagher on June 5, we haven't heard a response yet, but I'm hoping within the next week we will hear something on that.

As Mr. Wechsler mentioned, we were up on East Mountain for a neighborhood meeting. Mr. Rogan mentioned last week about the gypsy caterpillar problem. I did witness it firsthand and it is a major, major issue up on East Mountain and I'm sure in other parts of the city. We did send a letter to the County asking that they contact the state to spray to get rid of these gypsy moth caterpillars. The only problem is, as you might have read in the Scranton Times, it's too late to spray this year so they'll need to prepare for next year.

If you do have this problem in your backyard or your front yard, you can call Mike Chisdak who works for the County Commissioner in the Parks and Recreation Department. His number is 963-6850. If you get a message leave your phone number, name

and address he will return your call.

Sometime in August apparently he will come to your address to count the egg masses, give the report to the state and hopefully this will enable Scranton and Lackawanna County to have the area sprayed via a flyover. So, again, it is a major problem and hopefully next year it will be taken care of.

There also was a major issue at 1413
Maple Street on East Mountain. Councilman
Wechsler and I heard a great detail about
this property, thankfully Pat Hinton from
Licensing and Inspections went up the next
day and is in the process of taking care of
this issue for the residents up there.

Also, a problem with the East

Mountain Road steps leading down to the

people's properties it was put in a couple

of years ago during the East Mountain Road

project. We did ask the city engineer and

he said it is the responsibility of the

homeowners to replace these steps down onto

their property. Many of the people, as

Councilmen Wechsler and myself heard when we

were at this meeting, are very upset. They do not think it is their responsibility. We are asking the city if there is a possibility of using liquid fuels money or some kind of creative way to try and fix the steps for flexibility so that is in the process.

The 2015 paving project using OECD funds will start within the next week or two and there are 12 streets that are being paved and they are all located in West Scranton.

Councilman Evans mentioned land banks, I was very, very pleased to see that it passed final reading in the county and I look forward to working with my colleagues, the mayor, and the county commissioners on this land bank authority and look forward to working on the intergovernmental cooperation agreement so that we can get this authority moving and helping to eliminate blight in our neighborhoods in the city. And that is all I have for this week. Thank you.

He can say a lot and not provide necessarily the answers that you need, but we will continue to monitor what goes on with the mall and with Mr. Boscov and especially with this grant application that, again, it kind of danced around the idea that if they get this grant they also need the city to, you know, apply for what is it, Section 108 loan, in the amount of \$15 million. That's something that I think that we really need to be concerned with.

Just to go through, I would like to thank Councilman Gaughan for his dogged efforts on behalf of a land bank. It was reported in the paper that the county and the city have agreed upon a countywide land bank authority, I don't think that would have taken place had it not been for the efforts of Councilman Gaughan, I know he
