Jednota, meaning union or fraternity, is a
"union" of hundreds of branchs throughout
the United States and Canada. Although
founded by men, today 40 % of the membership
is female; and

WHEREAS, this year - 2015 - marks
the 125th anniversary of the founding of the
First Catholic Slovak Union; and

WHEREAS, the main purposes of the
First Catholic Slovak Union/Jednota were to
improve the moral, mental and social
conditions of its members and to uphold,
preserve intact, and perpetuate the
doctrines of the Holy Roman Catholic Faith;
and

WHEREAS, since its founding, the
First Catholic Slovak Union has supported
Slovak families by maintaining a "Poor Fund"
to care for widows and orphans. It was
instrumental in helping to found the
religious order of nuns, known as the

1 Sisters of Saint Cyril and Methodius, and WHEREAS, for many years the First 2 3 Catholic Slovak Union has awarded college scholarships to deserving members and 4 5 currently grants 75 scholarships annually. The City of Scranton will focus on the status and interaction of six fundamental conditions within the region. The sale of rental or dwellings, public or private. The provision of housing brokerage services. The provision of financial assistance for dwellings. Public policy and actions effecting and approval of sites and other building requirements, the administrative policies concerning community development and housing activities which effect opportunities and minority households and select housing inside or outside of areas of minority concentration and where there is a determination of unlawful segregation or other housing discrimination by a Court or finding of non-compliance from HUD.

Any interested parties or organizations are encouraged to attend this public hearing to discuss potential barriers to fair housing choice and to provide suggestions on actions that the community can take to address these barriers. If

I want to start with complimenting the League of Women Voters for hosting two debates on Tuesday night, one for county commissioners and one for city council. Even the county commissioner issues were important to city residents and I would also recommend that everyone that is a qualified voter take time on November 3 to actually go out and vote. That is your right and it's a civic duty.

The 2014 audit, it was mentioned a

week or so ago that Rainey and Rainey had completed 90 percent of the audit preparation which doesn't really tell us how far along SB & Company is in the preparation of the actual independent audit, do we have any idea where we stand right now? Okay. I ask largely because the audit should be one of the key tools when preparing the next year's operating budget, and if memory serves that draft budget was due to the council not later than November 15, which more likely will be November 12 since that's

At any rate, there is still some outstanding issues other than the audit, which impact on the preparation of the that budget. The first one is the status of the monetization of the Parking Authority. I saw in this week's newspaper that incumbency certificates have been granted, but I seem to recall that we were trying to get this parking authority action pretty much completed by the end of the year, is that still our goal?

MR. ROGAN: That is still the goal.

I had a conference call, and I believe

Councilmen Wechsler did as well, with Bill

Conaboy, who's handling a lot of legal

issues in the transaction and they are still

hoping to have this passed through council

before the end of the year.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. As you may recall, in April of 2014 we hired a company called PFM to assist with this action and there was no budget for them in the Year 2014 so apparently they agreed to defer all of their fees until 2015 and their fees ranged from anywhere between \$225 or \$300 per hour. Have we got any idea how many billable hours they are going to sock us for? That's a lot of money. Okay. I wouldn't be surprised to see anything other than six figures come in on that bill when it happens.

Then there is the status of the Sewer Authority and where we are going with that, the status of the Greenridge goop or the creature that lives below Dunmore. The status of obtaining a bond to pay the \$24 million court award, the status of the

double pensions and how that's going to be resolved. The MMO that's due at the end of the year. The status of the rental registration lawsuit. The status of the union retirees lawsuit for their COLA, which would have been effective January 1 of this year, and probably a number of other lawsuits of which we are not aware. All those actions will effect the numbers that are projected as revenues and expenditures for next year and whether or not they are guesses, shots in the dark or realistic numbers.

And I bring that up because there are two milestones that we are going to hit next year, the State Auditor General will again audit our municipal pensions, and the coordinator -- the revised recovery plan coordinator is going to have to recommend what to do with the city sometime next year. Four choices, either we come out of distressed status, the city should be disincorporated, the secretary should request determination of fiscal emergency, read in receivership, or we devise a

three-year exit plan, let's hope B and C are not one of the choices selected.

And I remind all of the citizens that next Wednesday morning are all of the pension board meetings, and I believe at 11 will be the consolidated pension board meeting at which perhaps we get some more information on the status of the remaining double pensions. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Les Spindler is our next speaker.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. I have to shake my head, for weeks I have been coming here asking for hero fighter John Rivers to get a proclamation. I come in tonight, and I have nothing against these people here tonight to get a proclamation, but I didn't hear anything about them running into a burning building and saving four firefighters lives and they get a proclamation. John Rivers has still yet to get a proclamation. man is a hero, he saved four firefighters. If it wasn't for him they wouldn't be with

us anymore and it's fallen on deaf ears.

That's all I have to say about that.

Two weeks ago when I was here a woman came up and spoke about businesses in the University of Scranton maybe being taxable. I brought this issue up many years ago in front of the previous city council, Councilman Rogan, I don't know if you remember that or not, but I think you were on council, and nothing was done. I think it's a legitimate question. I think these are taxable businesses, they are non-nonprofits, they are for profit businesses, and they should be able to be taxed.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Spindler, we did
look into it. What needs to happen is there
needs to be a change on the state level on
how nonprofits are determined. I agree, I
have been saying for years that there are
components of the University that should be
tax free, the classrooms, things of that
nature, but Chick-fil-A and Subway are for
profit business and they should be taxed and
council -- -

MR. SPINDLER: They have nothing to do with the University, they are for profit businesses. They should be able to be taxed.

Okay, moving on, you know, it's only been approximately three short months since John Basalyga bought the Steamtown Mall and I was really happy to read in yesterday's paper and the hearing the news I think he is moving ahead tremendously in three short I knew about What the Fork months. restaurant moving in and yesterday I just learned about a gym is going into the mall and now the theatre is going to have a major upgrade, which that sounds tremendous to me. It's going to be something really different for this area with the bar and restaurant in there and reclining leather seats. I think this guy is doing a tremendous job and I think he is going to bring this mall back to life. Hopefully get some retail shops in there now, that's what we need, but he is doing a tremendous job and I wish him all the best.

Lastly, this will be the last

meeting I attend before election day, I want to urge everyone that can get out there and vote, it's very important. The voter turnout the last number of elections has been terrible, it doesn't take much to get out and vote, so I hope everyone gets out and votes and votes for honest, truthful people not for people that don't tell us the truth, we don't need on council that aren't truthful, so everybody that watches these meetings and comes up to me and I hope they listen and just vote for the right people on election day. Thank you for your time.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council.

Unfortunately for us council doesn't listen to the people and you never have.

Unfortunately for us again, a quarter, maybe a third, of the people of Scranton are retired or low income. These are property owners that the people that are in rental units. I realize that your past performance is a guide to the future, but so far what have you done to make the city better?

Nobody seems to come up with an answer to

that. Council, the mayor, this whole administration, you are more worried about what's going on at the mall or Lackawanna College than you are the city. Just a couple of weeks ago, two, three weeks ago Lackawanna College you were supporting these people after all of the millions of dollars they have stolen from the people in taxes at this last piece of the property they have, this is just senseless. They just -- the reason we are in trouble is partly because of them and the University and some of these other phonies, nobody has done a thing to help the people of this city with all of these phony nonprofits.

Just think of the millions of dollars, and then some of them brag they got this benefit and that benefit like keystone does. You know, what have they given us? Amoroso, that's a curse. That man is a curse on this city. If you ever get out there and talk to the people you'd know what I'm talking about. It's a shame. If Al Capone paid a cop not to oppose him it would be called bribery. Here, Lackawanna College

gives him \$60,000 not to oppose them and nobody seems to care. You don't think it's conflict of interest? You don't see nothing wrong in it. That's shameful. Somebody needs to get on the computer and tell the truth what's going on in this city to the whole state.

And now I'll come to my latest asinine gross act of stupidity you are engaged in reassignment. Reassessment.

Whose house hasn't gone up four or five times in taxes the past 50 years? I have talked to, I don't know, eight, ten people.

Every one of them taxes are two, three times what they were 15, 20 years ago, and here you talk about reassessment. You ought to be ashamed of yourselves.

MR. ROGAN: The point of reassessment, and you are right, that taxes, unfortunately, have gone up, what reassessment would do is make it fair. At the current time you may be paying hundreds more in taxes on your land and your property than somebody who owns a parcel that's exactly the same size and exactly the same

condition.

MR. ELLMAN: Nobody's taxes would go down, you know what will happen, they will be 10,000 people downtown protesting as soon as it's over with. They have already reassessed my house when, in '06 or something? I held the tape for some girl to measure how long my house was and everything.

MR. ROGAN: They never finished it.

They started the reassessment and never finished.

MR. ELLMAN: I never heard nothing about it, but I don't know how many houses they did, but it's been reassessed once.

MR. ROGAN: No, it hasn't. It hasn't about reassessed in 50 years.

MR. ELLMAN: Just a month ago in this very room when we are talking about taxes or going to go up maybe a couple of hundred dollars and you talk about reassessment? That's as needless as a doorknob, you know, that doesn't make sense. I'll tell you what, you guys were nice guys until you got up there. Sitting up there

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, he has a point, you have been reassessed in the City of Scranton every time you raise That isn't reassessment. It's not one from the county, but if it was from the county I'd go and say lower it like everyone else did. The reason we are in trouble is you let people lower their taxes. It had nothing to do. They assessed at the county. Millions of dollars were lost, a lot of properties were taken over by nonprofits and so forth and so on so don't cry about reassessment. Get your business in order and you don't.

You said we got a lot of money from

the people who weren't paying their refuse tax, I think paper said you collected around \$200,000 or something like that, which was a plus, but how much of that did we actually get? Because they are out on contracts, contracts take money, they don't do it for free and never do we get the actual money that poured in the city minus the fee caused by the contractors.

And as far as you got to do something with that \$3 million, you cannot left that city there, that \$3 million is an sore. Everybody says you cannot protect the family you got to protect the city, and you don't do it, all you are interested in is family? I feel sorry for them, true, but I always feel sorry for everyone else that had to pay up from even that \$150 fee or the \$300 fee. I feel sorry for them, but you ain't out there doing anything for them except thinking about how to raise it more.

You are the worst council that ever came before the city. Even Evans, I think she cried when she did it, you sat there with a straight face and did it. You voted

We always knew that the parking garage would never pay for itself, but then you took on a debt. Now you are cry they want to give it to a nonprofit. We talked a lot about nonprofits, you want to create another

They are in business to make money and they are going to make money, depending on how this contract goes. I see it going under emergency certificate. That's how you are going to write it down, it's going to come up in the last day in December and you are going to say to us like tonight, put it on an emergency certificate. This is what you do to avoid really people looking at what's there. We stand to lose millions of dollars in parking revenue that you have no way of making up instead of slapping higher on the fine and other people that park.

I don't know, I haven't seen the contract, but I'm against even a contract with a nonprofit. That's ridiculous. You should be out there looking for somebody that's going to pay at least your mercantile and business privilege tax that everyone else has to pay as a business. Why do you think they should be exempt is beyond me,

but that's the ways yous work and then that's why people don't trust you because you don't make sense. You don't make common sense. They look at what's happening in the city and say how could these people look for a nonprofit to run the parking garages?

Well, we had a nonprofit running the parking garages called a Parking Authority. I don't understand it. Well, I'm not going to try. I know what's happening and the Legion of Doom was right.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. BANHOFF: Marty Banhoff, a resident of Scranton, well, the Minooka section right up from Billy's mom and dad. First of all, I'd like to get a pat on the back to whoever is responsible for finally paving some of those roads back there. I have lived back there for 37 years and I never remember hem being paved before.

Okay, much for the nice side. I have a couple of questions, what about the rental inspections that got put on hold when

that gentleman, I forget his name, that owned 65 rentals, you know, buildings that -- I mean, I think that was budgeted money for those inspections, and another one now paying, the Pennsylvania Natural Gas is complaining about they don't want to pay the money for the pave cuts.

MR. ROGAN: The first part I can answer the question on the rental registration, right now everything is on hold pending the lawsuit that was filed, but to your point if the lawsuit isn't in the City's favor, which most people think it won't be, it will create a hole in this year's budget and moving forward we need to come up with a plan, Councilmen Evans and I, have been working on this and pushing for it for well over a year now to have a fee that is reasonable for the inspection. current fees are much higher than the actual cost of the program and that's the basis of the lawsuit.

MR. BANHOFF: Now here is my biggest peeve, what about dog licenses. You know, it used to be in 2009 I believe it was,

right, we got our dog, well, it was actually my mother-in-law's dog, she passed away, we kept the dog, right, it was \$9. Doherty upped it to \$20, I was mad, but I paid it. Unfortunately, you know, we had to have the dog put down last year, then this year after I was pretty much being over wanting another dog I had some medical problems and my wife and daughter got me another dog and now it's \$35 for a dog license and instead of it running from May 1 until April 30, you guys all voted on it, now it's \$35 and it goes until the end of the year. So that's what, maybe about 125 percent increase? It doesn't cost that much for me to go and prove that my dog had my shots, whereas you are saying, you know, it doesn't cost that much for these people to have their apartments or whatever or houses inspected, I think there is something wrong there, and maybe we can get on Facebook and get a bunch of people and say, you know what, let's file a lawsuit over the dog licenses. You know, I'm just, you know, mad over the dog licenses. That's my biggest

thing. I mean, we have to start facing reality here. You can't just keep crucifying all of us for, you know, throwing -- I'm trying not to say bad words, you know what I mean. The dog licenses, that's a big thing with me and I will go on Facebook, I'll get a bunch of people and we'll file a lawsuit just like the with the apartment house did, you know? It's ridiculous. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Well, the last speaker, look it, I just
think you can just keep right on crucifying
us because after 20 plus years there is no
resistance and there is just no excuse where
the city is and nothing is going to change
until the state comes in here and puts you
guys out of business and maybe puts us into

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave Dobrzyn, resident. A few weeks ago I mentioned council and the possible letter endorsement for Steamtown to get their funds replenished. They have been locked up, and a little note, one of the council people mentioned that somebody from Steamtown should come over and that isn't possible they will lose their jobs, they are not allowed to do comments so, Joe, I think you were over there, you mentioned it, if you -please, consider just a letter to Congress, to our representatives to get that because a lot of these plans get altered after the institution is already here and then the results aren't the same, we don't have the hotel state, we don't have the restaurants, so then on top of it we wind up losing tax money.

On candidates, last week I mentioned tax brakes not justified when taxes are raised on the majority. Mainly, I was

talking about non-incumbent idea on cutting taxes, people that are running, if you are out there please listen because my taxes are raised every year, if that's the way it has to be that's the way it has to be, but I don't know want somebody else having some kind of preferential tax cut.

On reassessment, once again, it's supposed to be tax neutral and if I'm not mistaken, and I read an opinion by

Mr. Amoroso so that they can get another 35 percent more that way and that's not the way it's supposed to be, and he is seriously mistaken if he thinks that he is going to raise taxes 35 percent in any given year and not at least be given a prebus ticket out of town. I'm ready to pass on that because myself and we can maybe round up some money to give him a bus ticket back to New Jersey.

The winter is coming, and the bridges and areas around the entrance points to central city, the sidewalks, something has to be done with them. They are a total risk and people are going to start getting killed there, too, just like they are killed

on Wyoming and Lackawanna Avenue, and I'd also like to remind the administration that every Friday swiping up our recycling crew to clear the downtown is not acceptable, they have to spread the pain or otherwise you poor people are going to have a group of other people ripping from my neighborhood because we had literally hundreds of pounds of recycling that was never picked up all winter, and we throw it in the trash, you'd find it. If you put it out even during the spring, we had a wet spring, and you couldn't put papers out then with all of the cardboard boxes and stuff I had it packed in.

And on the Parking Authority, years back Andy mentioned about over a quarter of million dollars being handed out to a hotel interest and free parking, and I also wonder if these freebies still exist because with them being bankrupt there is no reason whatsoever for them to do so, so it would be interesting to find out if these freebies exist and it's time to pull the carpet.

On the Sewer Authority, I think it

will be a disaster, the Parking Authority is a mess but the Sewer Authority has a AAA bond rating, as I read in the Scranton Times and so there is no real trouble down there other than the trouble we make for it, and as far as the PUC regulating it it's totally ineffective. I'll cite Roseland, I'll cite Water Regulations, we pay for the mall and I'll also cite the current electric bills, we have \$350 under deregulation. entities proclaiming to be able to sell electricity in Pennsylvania and if you are stupid enough to buy into it you might find your rates up three or 400 percent in the middle of January when there is not much you can do about it. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MS. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, city council. I'm Tom Ungvarsky. Last week we had a visitor from Boston visit us. She had left Scranton about 40 years ago. We took her for a ride downtown and walked around. She asked, "Where are all of the people?"

She remembers when people were

walking the streets downtown and they would be standing out in front of the Globe Store and out in front of the Scranton Dry, now there is no one there.

In three weeks you are going to be getting the year's budget. Last year was the first year that you had a chance to have some input on it. I don't believe city council came up with anything. I hope this year city council can come up with some recommendations for the new budget.

Perhaps, the population wouldn't be quite as angry with you should you cut their taxes or cut the expenses of the city by as much as you raised our taxes.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

Good evening,

MS. SCHUMACHER:

Council, Marie Schumacher. The city increased the 2015 contingency budget by \$400,000 to compensate for the potential reduced SAFER grant. However, the city did receive a SAFER grant and I would like to know if the \$400,000 in contingency budget will then bee used to pay a part of the contract award interest that's been

accruing. May I have a yes or no answer from any member who knows the answer?

Now, if a member of the clerical union losses their job because of the downsizing or outsourcing, and they have not fulfilled all of the requirements for their pension at what point will they be eligible to begin collecting their earned pension? If anyone can provide a concise answer please do so, otherwise, I will ask it at the Pension Board meeting next Wednesday.

MR. ROGAN: If they didn't meet the requirement they wouldn't receive the pension they would receive their contributions back in a check.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. Now, I asked that because in the January 26, 2015, article in the Times-Tribune it was reported that when Mr. Courtright entered office in 2014 he faced monumental problems including a severely distressed pension system and the arbitration and backpay award remaining unpaid and growing at which time that stood around \$23 million. Supported during his election campaign by the unions,

Mr. Courtright brought in an outside consultant, Henry Amoroso, whose recommendations including seeking concessions from the police, the Fire Department and DPW and the clerical unions. Mr. Courtright decided to negotiate with each union one at a time starting with the police and then moving on. To date, there has been no mention of the clerical union, although the current contract expires at the end of this year, and I find this curious, I have heard rumors that the city is currently negotiating with the current third party to outsource all or part of the LIPS Department Is this true, and if so when was to them. this opportunity advertised, and is it going to be all of LIPS or is only going to be components?

MR. GAUGHAN: I haven't -- I don't know.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Mr. Evans, are you aware of anything of that nature?

MR. EVANS: I hear the rumors like everybody else does, but I don't know anything. I know there is an RFP being

1 proposed for the rental registration 2 inspection part of that, but that's all I 3 know about the third party inspector. 4 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Mr. Rogan? I am under the same 5 MR. ROGAN: impression as Councilmen Evans that the 6 7 rental registration inspection will be 8 outsourced. 9 MR. SCHUMACHER: What would be, the 10 inspections would be outsourced did you say? 11 MR. ROGAN: Correct. 12 MR. EVANS: For the rental 13 registration portion. 14 MS. SCHUMACHER: Oh, okay. Mr. Wechsler? 15 MR. WECHSLER: I haven't heard 16 17 anything about it. 18 MS. the overtime for the third quarter this year, so we will be working on getting that answered in a few weeks.

This evening in my correspondence I did get some information back from the Lackawanna County Emergency Management group about the response to the Sandone fire. I just received it tonight, I'll be reviewing it and commenting on it later on next week probably.

As several speakers mentioned tonight, I am very encouraged, also, by the good news at the Mall at Steamtown. I was down there yesterday and it's quite noticeable on the improvements, just the appearance of it is quite inviting. I'm most encouraged by speaking to people who are employed by Boscov's and some of the other stores who are very optimistic about the improvements that Mr. Basalyga is making there and it seems like they have all been brought into that.

I'd also, just one other comment, I

did receive a call from a constituent

Street and Wintermantle Avenue to place a drainage culvert and that resident was inquiring when the final paving on that was going to be done. before. Everybody would go inside of the mall, there was not enough stores on the street side so I think that's a very big positive that they are focusing on that first.

A lot of talk tonight about the taxing of properties, I will ask that I asked for this to be put into the recovery plan, verification of property exempt as taxable or nontaxable properties. received a matrix tonight from PEL they basically said at this point it's not been undertaken for 2015, but they are having discussions with the coordinator to the design and nature of this survey. I urge PEL and the administration to get together and get this thing done. It's not that complicated. You send a survey to the property owner, they can either justify the tax exemption or they can't. It's that simple.

others things, and I will speak to the DPW director this week to try and rectify these issues.

We received a letter from PennDOT explaining that funding was recently secured for safety improvements at the following inspections: Pittston Avenue and Elm Street, main Avenue and Shift's driveway, Johnson Technical Institute driveway, and Meridian Avenue and Luzerne Street. scope of the work will be limited to replacement of incandescent signal heads to LED signal head a back plates and upgrading pedestrian signal heads to LED and countdown pedestrian signal plates. This will increase safety by providing better visibility of the signaling equipment to motorists and also reduce energy costs and there is no cost to the city.

I received a call this week about traffic issues in the Tripp Park area at Dorothy Street and Everett Avenue.

Mr. Rogan I know has also received the letter. Residents would like a stop sign at this location. There is serious traffic

issues during school hours. We have forwarded this request to Chief Graziano and our city engineer for review.

Yesterday, I was up walking around
Nay Aug Park and I noticed that several
signs near the Kanjorsky bridge have been
tagged with graffiti and this is simply
unacceptable. It takes away from the beauty
of the park and the invites more criminal
activity, so I will be asking DPW to take
care of this situation up at Nay Aug Park.

We did receive a status update on items in the recovery plan that Mr. Cross e-mailed me this morning. It's quite a lengthy list and I'm still reviewing it so I will update everyone, I'm sure Mr. Evans will, also, at next week's meeting, but if anyone would like a copy please let me know and I'll make that available.

In the letter Mr. Barrett writes, "In cooperation with DEP for the last week or so the Scranton Sewer Authority has been conducting an inspection of all industrial commercial facilities that utilize the subject line. Enclosed is a sample of the inspection report along with the entities being inspected. In cooperation with DEP, the Scranton Sewer Authority is making every effort possible to determine the source of the odor issue. All of our sample and tests are undertaken by an outside third party independent laboratory. As I understand it, the DEP has taken it's own material testing laboratory in Harrisburg.

The Scranton Sewer Authority system consists of 350 miles of collection lines both combined, sanitary and storm water, and separate sanitary lines in over 7,000 catch basics and manholes. Absent someone being caught in the act, it is virtually impossible for the Scranton Sewer Authority

to prevent the illegal discharge of environmentally harmful material into our system.

On behalf of the Board of Directors and our 32,000 ratepayers, I can assure you we are making a very concerted effort to determine the source of the odor."

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Rogan, I'm not sure if Mr. Gaughan was going to get into the Sewer Authority letter so can I just make one comment on it?

MR. ROGAN: Sure.

MR. WECHSLER: I agree with what Dr. Barrett said about the extent of the Sewer Authority, but this was not somebody dumping a pale into one of the storm drains. This was a major violation of the Sewer Authority and the regulations involved with it, so I don't think saying that unless somebody gets caught I don't think that that's an acceptable answer. This was a large spill with a huge smell, so it's not just something random that just happened. So like we talked about before, if it didn't have a smell we wouldn't even know it happened. So, like I said, while I appreciate Director Barrett's comments, but,

I don't think that's an acceptable answer.

MR. GAUGHAN: I mean, there is more to the letter, I just didn't want to read the whole thing because it's really lengthy, but I would agree with you that the whole situation is unacceptable, especially for the people of Greenridge and really the City of Scranton and it goes back to the larger issue of the landfill and I would hope that we could come to some kind of an agreement in the future and that these type of things don't happen ever again.

MR. ROGAN: And on that issue, I wasn't going to comment but since it was brought back up, I know for myself I was always under the impression that that line was primarily actually only from the landfill. I didn't realize how many other businesses, commercial businesses do look into that line along the way. So it's definitely a major issue for the residents of Greenridge and throughout the city as a whole so hopefully there will be an answer.

To me, it seems like it should be easy to find out where it came from if

MR. EVANS: I couldn't agree more, home ownership is far too important for it not to be a major priority of the city and I think that city council by doubling down on homeowners is sending a message that that's how important we believe it is, too.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Rogan, I'd just like to add my comment, I am planning on voting for this amendment, but I would like to make it a priority for this council and the administration to monitor the progress. If the amount of money that we've added this year is not consumed by next year I think we also have to take a look at why it didn't happen, but I think this is something that has to be looked almost on a monthly basis to see the success.

if the city isn't capable of running a successful first time homebuyer's program is having one of the other nonprofits in the area run it. Neighbor Works NEPA is one that comes to mind and they do great work for consulting homebuyers and working with those who have been in distress with their mortgages, so this program one way or another has to get off the ground whether it's through city hall or whether it's through another entity, it is far too important to just let it go by the wayside.
