First, please note

that Election Day is Tuesday, November 3, and city hall will be closed on that day.

DPW will be also be off on Tuesday.

Refuse collection and paper recycling will
be delayed by one day next week.

This Saturday is Halloween, we want to wish the children to enjoy a safe night, but please be extra cautious while driving in the neighborhoods, and also on Saturday night, unfortunately, daylight savings times end so please remember to turn your clock back one hour and check your smoke alarms and Co2 detectors.

Next, two announcements that I received from State Representative Marty Flynn's Office. The first one is home heating help begins in the State of Pennsylvania on November 2. As colder weather moves, in the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program known as LIHEAP opens on Monday, November 2. LIHEAP helps low income families pay for their heating bills and deal with heating emergencies such as broken furnaces, fuel, shortages or utility

shutoffs. If you think you may be eligible for these programs, please contact your State Representative or State Senator's office.

And secondly, college financial aid information will now be available on-line through the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency. This is a regarding a number of grants, scholarships, loans and other programs to help families pay for college. And that is all.

MR. EVANS: Can I just make a brief announcement, sorry. This is from the Lackawanna Historical Society. On November 6 there will be a special promotional event for the new board game version of Lackawanna County Historical Society local history game show "You Live Here, You Should Know This."

So we have been asked to provide a game show team to play that evening, it's going to be November 6 between 6 and 8 during the First Friday at the Library Express at the Mall at Steamtown, so I guess I'm probably going to ask you guys if you want to join me because Joe and I were part

of the team that made it to the semi-finals so if you can join us, and anybody else that wants to come and watch it's going to be very interesting and a lot of fun.

MR. ROGAN: And I will be looking forward to it. I missed it last time, my brother was graduating, but I love history and it should be a good time.

MR. WECHSLER: We surprised ourselves how smart we were to be honest with you.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
PARTICIPATION.

MR. ROGAN: The first speaker tonight is Cara Seitzinger.

MS. SEITZINGER: Good evening, council. Cara Seitzinger, city resident, employee of the city, taxpayer, all of that. I really am going to very brief. I spoke to this body a couple of times relative to the Delta Medix/Highmark issue, health insurance issue. I come today to speak to you. I have received a response from the Pennsylvania Insurance Commission that I think is important for council to know,

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especially we are going into budget time and I know you guys have your plate filled, I really do.

Additionally, I had had, you know, tossed around some ideas when Mark first had his scope that we thought was going to be clean about perhaps Delta Medix going out to the public and getting some type of press as far as social media or making a commercial. I had said social media, obviously Facebook was my first thought. I did not do that because, obviously, on the 27th -- or the 24th we had some bad news and then the first surgery. I just -- I need to let you all know that I have created a Facebook page called NEPA Supporters of Delta Medix. And I did that for the reason that a few days after the article appeared about Mark, which was September 1, the day of his surgery, a few days after that a gag order was placed on Delta Medix. They are -- so people are now calling asking about, you know, their continuation of care or new care or making appointments and simply put even to me they can't speak to anybody. So the Facebook

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page is a forum for that.

You know, Margo Sosnik is the CEO of Delta Medix. She is obviously extremely upset about the fact that she thinks, you know, people -- the perception out there is that the Delta Medix doctors, the Delta Medix CEO simply don't care about their 13,000 plus employees and that really isn't the case. They were told that there would no further negotiations. They signed a confidentiality agreement so when people do call Delta Medix they won't get anywhere, but through the Facebook page it's amazing the amount of people that have reached out to myself and my husband, one of which I'll speak to about in a second, with questions so I'm kind of trying to -- you know, when I'm up making dinner at 4:30 in the morning for when I get home from work I try and field what I can, because as Mark had said and I say, it's about more than us.

So to that it brings me to the fact that one gentleman reached out to me from California. This gentleman is UCLA graduate. He is a business management

graduate who his name is Ben Quirk from
Quirk Health Care Solutions. I had posted
on -- because I'm just that kind of a girl,
posted the Delta -- or the letter from
Highmark -- or the Pennsylvania Insurance
Commission about Highmark. In that letter,
and I'm going to quote to you just one or
two lines from that letter: "Please be
advised your plan is administered by
Highmark Blue Cross of NEPA under a
self-funded contract and is not insurance
that is under the jurisdiction of the
Pennsylvania Insurance Commission."

This gentleman had contacted me and said, "You better talk to your employer if that's the case."

So I kind of tossed it around but I think a lot of these questions Attorney Minora is probably going to have to pose or answer for you. The little I do know we do have some SIR's throughout the City of Scranton, and I had e-mailed Jessica Boyle today, who is tremendous girl. If she doesn't know the answer she is going to find the answer and I think we have a real asset

in her for the City of Scranton, so I had posed several questions to her and, you know, again, I think that it's very important that you all ask these questions, but her one response specifically was that was I asking was Highmark the third party administrator. They are, in fact, the third party administrator. In other words, the city is either the insurance company quote/unquote or we have to pay somebody to administer the plan.

So it really comes into play because for if that is the case, and I'm 99.9 percent sure that that is the case for us as a city, the problem then becomes if there is a stock loss for catastrophic or unplanned medical the city would assume that liability. In other words, the City of Scranton will now have to pay insurance bills that Highmark arbitrarily does not cover.

Additionally, when I spoken to this body the last time I talked about speaking to the gentleman at Blue Cross Highmark and he kept telling me back and forth yes, we

are Highmark, then he said, no, we are Blue Cross. Jessica did confirm with me today in writing that the merger does not take effect until January of 2017, so we have a real -- I'm not trying to be difficult at all, I'm just trying to inform you, inform the public, I'm so grateful, again, for our health insurance, there are so many things that we have to get done here in the city and I know this is low on the totem pole, but it speaks to the issue of costs.

A couple other questions that I have, there is only three four that I'm going to ask you if, in fact, number one, do we employ an administrator or are we the administrator? That's number one. I have asked, and you can do what you want to obtain copies of all health insurance contracts between the city insurance carriers for the past five years, at the very least, we had Aetna prior to Blue Cross some years ago, and they are pretty much obsolete in the area, determine the term for each contract and cost paid each year.

I would suggest or ask you to

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suggest that really urge the mayor, HR director, BA, from signing any contract with Highmark or any other party that can't give us significant time tables and significant contracts. Again, finally, have we obtained quotes from other insurance carriers within the area.

So I know I'm kind of jumbled here, but really this was a spur of the moment thing for me to come, but I really do think it's an extremely important think. Μy homework is self-funded, and I questioned somebody from New Jersey and also the California gentleman, with a company as big as the City of Scranton you have to go to self-funded. It is more cost effective to do it that way, but now with this Highmark issue in the picture, which the University of Pittsburgh had their issues with it and I think really, again, it something for the state legislature, I think that we -- you really need to take a quick close look and have someone from Highmark -- the city is probably one of their biggest accounts, so I think it would behoove the Highmark

1 administration to really pinpoint and set this up, you know, what their cost 2 3 reimbursement is because I know for sure, and I'm sure that you gentleman would never 4 5 want an insurance executive to tell you what test you can take, what doctor you can see, 6 7 what your quality of care should be. 8 So I thank you for your time, for 9 the extra time, and I have the questions if 10 somebody -- if you want me to send them to the your e-mails I'll be happy to do that. 11 MR. ROGAN: Could you leave a copy 12 13 of those with Ms. Carrera? 14 MS. SEITZINGER: I would love to but they are scribbled, but I can e-mail them to 15 16 your e-mails. I'll be happy to do that, 17 okay? 18 MR. ROGAN: Thank you for your 19 advocacy on this. 20 MS. SEITZINGER: Thank you so much. MR. ROGAN: It's important to the 21 22 city. MS. SEITZINGER: 23 Thank you. 24 MR. ROGAN: Next speaker is Joan 25 Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
Scranton resident and taxpayer. I, too,
would urge all qualified registered voters
to get out and vote on November 3. We have
two key local elections, city council and
the county commissioners and we will only

What is status, if any, of the 2014 audit? Are we any closer to seeing a product? No? Do we know whether or not Rainey & Rainey has completed all of the audit prep work? We were at 90 percent last heard.

MR. EVANS: Yeah, they are nearly done and then SB will be stepping in, but SB has been getting this information all along as well so they are further along than we anticipated so I think we are going to get this --

MS. HODOWANITZ: They are still going to be behind the draft budget though?

MR. EVANS: Oh, of course, yeah.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, hopefully next year they will be even faster.

When I was sitting in the caucus as a fly on the wall one of the last things spoken was an allusion to the LST going back

1 to Court, what was that all about? 2 It's yearly. In order MR. ROGAN: 3 to have the higher LST rate the Court need 4 to grant it on a yearly basis. 5 MS. HODOWANITZ: Because we are distressed. 6 7 MR. ROGAN: Yes 8 MS. HODOWANITZ: So we're going to 9 go back to Court to get \$156 LST for 2016 as 10 part of the operating budget? 11 MR. ROGAN: Yes 12 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. Speaking of 13 the operating budget, you also mentioned 14 during a caucus you alluded to scheduling a public hearing for November 19, can I assume 15 16 for that that you will be presented the 17 budget not later than November 12? 18 MR. ROGAN: It's just a proposed 19 budget at this point. We haven't --20 MS. HODOWANITZ: That's the draft 21 budget, so you are expecting it 22 approximately November 12? 23 MR. EVANS: I would say so. 24 MS. HODOWANITZ: And probably a 25 public hearing on November 19; correct?

Please encourage, beg, besiege, coddle, insinuate, offer, bribe to get that document on the City's website. I understand stand there is a copy in the library and on the City Clerk's desk, but it's usually about 100 pages largely of spreadsheet information and it is not practical to be either in the library or at the desk just trying to analyze that data. And at 25 cents a page both at the library and here in city hall that's an expensive proposition. I know because I have had it Xeroxed before so if you can get that done.

Any update on the Greenridge goop?

MR. ROGAN: There was one in the
newspaper today. I don't know it was in the
newspaper today or if was just breaking
news, but we also received -- there was a
press release I believe we all received, it
seems that they are saying it wasn't from
the leachate from the landfill.

MS. HODOWANITZ: We still got a mystery dumper somewhere. And the update on the leasing of the parking garages?

MR. ROGAN: We are still hoping to

have that done by year's end through city council. We will be continuing to work with the administration on that.

MS. HODOWANITZ: And the sale of the Sewer Authority?

MR. EVANS: Nothing new on that.

MS. HODOWANITZ: The bond for the \$24 million court award?

MR. EVANS: Nothing.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, i will be back next week. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, city of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, as you pointed out Tuesday is Election Day. I have come to this podium many times saying your government is your enemy, your weapon is your vote. You have been surrendering your vote. This is why we got the 100 percent tax increase. I keep telling you, use your brain and not your name. There is too many people that vote their name instead of their brain, and that's where we are. We have

good viable candidates within the city, but they don't come forward, and that's the problem. The party is very strong within this city, the Democratic party we are referring to. They have destroyed the financial ability of the city. The newspaper didn't help either. When the Legion of Doom came before you 15 years ago and told you that is what's going to happen people just dismissed it. They pointed out that Nay Aug looked real good up there, we put a bridge up there across the creek, but it looked like good.

Contract. Contract, contract, contract and every one of them contracts somebody probably did something for the administration or for the party. You don't give a contract out in this city unless you get something back. Peters showed that to you, Peters contract was lower you just threw it away. You said well, I'm going our approvement person who is getting the city pension. How in the world could you do that? But you did it, and you do it so many times. You really don't care about the

people of the city, you care about yourselves and there is no way out of it.

Mr. Evans, at least I can say you came forward, you said you wanted to reduce your taxes, but didn't get rid of the mercantile and business privilege, I can understand that. Everybody in the city wants to get rid of the monkey off their back with taxes and there is nothing we can do about it because we let a group of people control the city.

And the newspaper, I don't have no respect for the newspaper at all even though I do buy it. I read everything in it with a grain of salt because of the fact is they ridicule people that were making sense and saying what was going to happen, and they made fun of them, made fun of Janet, made fun of anybody that tried to stop Mayor Doherty from doing what he did, but he did it with the help of the council. That's where you say, Mr. McGoff, I'm glad he is gone. McGoff sat there and did lot of damage to the city. There is no question about that, and he is not only bad he is

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still is grabbing a salary. I came forward and said you want to cut costs have a three man council instead of five because the five is no longer any value because it's not done by a zone it's at large, so you can run that counsel with three people as well as five and save a few dollars. All of these things could have came to fulfillment, but no one really wanted it. The party is very strong. You are willing to plagiarize th \$3 million misappropriation knowing that we have to come up with \$50 million to put into that pension fund. That's the sad part of it. They ruined their own pension and now we the city, the people of Scranton, have to bail them out. Is this right? No, it's not right. I told you before you should call for a special prosecutor to examine that whole system and let their recommendations come before you so you can wash your hand of what was said. Well, we didn't do it the special prosecutor came forward like with Amoroso. You blame him for all the trouble we are having because he had a recovery plan. We all had recovery plans. A long

time ago we gave you plans to recover, but instead you sold off assets then and you are going to plan to sell off assets now.

I'm not going to say much more because there is no sense getting into it, you are not going to change. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. MORGAN: The first thing I have here is, you know, a long time before I started coming to those meetings there were other people here. They talked about this city, and they talked about the truth, and I guess they didn't live long enough because sooner or later you die and people just forget what you said and we just keep going down this path to -- we can't even say self-destruction anymore because we have already been destroyed so, you know, why even waste your time using that.

But you know what I have here is,

Mr. Rogan, in 2012 the city could have filed

bankruptcy because it met all of the

requirements to do it and you were on

council at that time so maybe you can explain to the residents of this city why you didn't do it.

MR. ROGAN: We couldn't. In the State of Pennsylvania if a municipality files for bankruptcy it must be approved by the state. Governor Corbett at the time it was proven with Harrisburg that it would not accept municipal bankruptcies.

MR. MORGAN: Did you petition the state to do that?

MR. ROGAN: No, because by doing that what would have happened to the City is we would have the negative stigma of bankruptcy in the banking community and the community in general without the protections of the bankruptcy law rights.

MR. MORGAN: So do you actually think that any of the residents in this city have any protection from the harm this council and this government has done to it?

MR. ROGAN: Though bankruptcy?

MR. MORGAN: Through your incompetence.

MR. ROGAN: Well, you mentioned

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bankruptcy.

MR. MORGAN: No, I didn't, but I'm just asking in that frame because evidently you believe that --

MR. ROGAN: The voters ultimately put us in these seats and they decide who sits in these five seats and they will on Tuesday decide who sits in two of the seats.

MR. MORGAN: The sad part is that Pennsylvania doesn't have recall, and the other sad part is that I'm amazed that we can't bring an investigator in here who looks at all of the legislation that this council has passed and sit down with councilmen and ask them what they know about that legislation and when we find out you don't know anything we take your house, your bank account, your pretty suit, and we throw you in jail because what's going on in this country is absolutely a crime and, you know, it probably seems funny to this council, but, you know, you know, it's just beyond belief how incompetent you are and you have no excuse for it. You have accomplished nothing as a body. Absolutely -- and you

1 are not the first ones and, you know, you can criticize Janet for some of the things 2 3 she has done, but at least she stopped the borrowing because that was the problem. 4 5 And, you know, the other thing I have here is for Mr. Evans do you know how 6 the last American Anglican agreement was 7 8 terminated and who made the payment that 9 made it possible to terminate this 10 agreement? MR. EVANS: 11 No. 12 MR. MORGAN: So you want to go and 13 create another agreement and you have no 14 understanding of the last one of. Do you have an understanding of that? 15 16 MR. EVANS: Well, I had some 17 understanding of it at the time, but I'm not 18 sure exactly what your question is. 19 MR. MORGAN: Well, they had to pay 20 money to terminate the agreement. 21 MR. EVANS: Right. MR. MORGAN: Where did that money 22 23 come from? 24 MR. EVANS: The taxpayers. 25 MR. MORGAN: I think that maybe

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before you vote on anything you should go out and try to figure out where that money came from.

MR. EVANS: Certainly.

MR. MORGAN: And the other thing is I think you need to look at the old American Anglican agreement and, you know, it helped us last time, it's not going to help us this time, okay, selling all of these assets. You know, we have to ask ourselves what would the city do if it actually had it's parking revenue? What would the city do if somebody that we sent to run the garages actually did it? And, you know, Mr. Scopelliti had good ideas to run that authority but, you know, call it like you will, like the previous speakers spoke, you know, politics, but it's not just the Democratic party that's done it, it's the Republican party, too, because the Republican party used to throw their own candidates under the bus to please the Democratic administration to get favors for themselves, so this city has a real twisted political history.

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But the most twisted thing of all is that we are going to elect two councilmen soon and I just hope that some people would have listened to David Burgerhoff because he might be, and I know I asked you to run and maybe you will do the right thing some day and actually follow, you know, the dominoes and come to the conclusion that, you know, selling off the assets or monetizing them is just a suicide mission, it's just ridiculous. It's just beyond ridiculous, okav? But at least he made statements that he would have to see facts, and from what I have seen of this council over an extended period of time I think we voted on things with no facts and it really didn't matter because somebody told us how we were going to do what we were going to do, and we're the good soldiers, we're going to walk in there and just do it. And when you ask councilmen a question about anything that has to do with this city, that's why I don't ask questions here of council because I know you can't answer them and why waste my time asking questions that you can't answer and

in the end you will never come back and answer. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident. I noticed tonight

we didn't mention about the St. Cat

fundraiser, so if during motions maybe we

South Scranton and neutering them, so, you

know, like ten cats, if they had four

survivors the last three years see what we

would have.

MR. DOBRZYN: We would have more cats than people, if we don't already.

Okay, I'm going to talk about policy tonight. I watched the debates and just certain things, and these people aren't horrible people for stating such things, but, you know, some times I have a question, aren't you better off with some grumpy old

geezer like me or Andy paying our taxes with no kids in the school system and, you know, we pay quite substantially and paying all our fees and such or a family with two kids keeping in mind that two kids in that school system cost \$25,000 per year. So I'm not saying we should keep them out, but don't speak of it like it's some kind of asset like you would want kids hanging off the front porch of every house in the town because it's not economically sustainable.

And on re assessment, in 2007 Mike Washo came before the taxpayers and accused the majority commissioners of scheming large tax breaks for both land owners, land that sits and doesn't do very much and it's real cheap to keep the tax alive it's just going to just get kept and nothing will ever happen with it, very possibly there might some day be some environmental violations because of it, for instance, like the steam plant and we still don't know where that other thing came from recently here, some type of petroleum spill, and it was a volatile compound that can being explosive

in the sewer so you don't even want to think of what something like that can cause.

And a little deviation from city issues, privatizing the prisons equal cash for people. Nobody, nobody served the kind of sentence that they should have served over that Kids for Cash in Wilkes-Barre. No one. A year? Give me a break. Give me a break. How many lives did you ruin? Lucky I'm not the judge, he would never see the light of day.

And, finally, the state feeds off our tax exempt city property through our state constitutions and in my opinion nothing is ever going to straighten out until we address that and possibly a civic group within Scranton that could raise some money and get it into the Courts would be better off than you people alienating the government officials.

And on the Anglican, I would point out that there is no citations and we were fined \$2 million for the American Anglican activities, but before we do anything with that we need pension reform. We need to

keep it out of the hands that are going to grant double pensions, we need it out of the hands of people that are working next to each other every day of the week because that's just not proper. I don't want to insult anybody, I have fire alarms all throughout my house, fire extinguishers, and I'm home so often I don't think I look like the kind of guy you would like to mug tonight, you know, and seeing as I'm home 99 percent of the time or somebody is home you should see my wife at the trap shoot. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,
Council. Marie Schumacher. First question
tonight, when do you expect an answer from
the DEP on what measurements and the
readings from those measurements as a result
of the Sandone tire fire?

MR. ROGAN: You'd have to ask DEP.
We are waiting just as everyone else is.

MR. WECHSLER: We had requested the

1 information but they haven't gotten back to 2 us yet. 3 MS. SCHUMACHER: Have you followed up and ask what the hold up is? I mean, 4 5 that's been weeks and weeks ago. Certainly they know what they measured by now. 6 7 MR. WECHSLER: It is a scientific 8 study, it does take a little longer. 9 MS. SCHUMACHER: It's not a study, 10 it's measurements. 11 MR. WECHSLER: It is, but they have 12 to be analyzed. 13 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Let me just 14 read a few things I told you I would bring this. One is from DEP, "Tire fires, 15 16 although infrequent, are serious situations 17 that are difficult to extinguish and 18 expensive to clean up. Oil that exudes into 19 brown and surface water as a result of tire 20 fires is a significant environmental 21 pollutant. In some cases, this may trigger 22 super fund cleanup status." 23 Certainly not in this instance 24 though. "Air pollution is also produced by 25 tire fires and emission may include

. .

Polycycline aromatic hydrocarbons, benzines, styrene, phenols and butadiene. For more information on toxic pollutants generated by tire fires go to EPA's toxic air pollution website."

And from another source is,

"Emissions from open tire fires have been
shown to be more toxic than emissions from
an incinerator regardless of the type of
fuel. Airborne emissions from open tires
can have a serious impact on the health and
the environment."

I'll let you read them, I'll give
these to Kathy, but we need that
information, we don't need it yesterday we
need it now. We need to know what went into
our water and we need to know what went into
our lungs.

Then I wasn't going to talk about this tonight, but I was downtown this afternoon with my little charge and we were crossing Lackawanna Avenue at Wyoming, and I guess the question I have is why is there a green light simultaneous with the walk sign, a green light for those who are making a

left turn at Lackawanna Avenue and a walk light at the same time? We almost got -- I mean, it's a fact, it's green and we almost got clipped by a guy. We had like 14 seconds left on the walk light and he wasn't even going to slow down and so --

MR. EVANS: I certainly agree. I think it's one of the worst intersections in the city.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, there are others. I almost got hit the weekend of the Italian festival at Mulberry and Jefferson.

MR. EVANS: Yeah.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And then one of them crossing -- even worse crossing back somebody had demolished the one to push when you were going the direction of the Mercy Hospital.

MR. EVANS: I think some of those intersections like those they should do or at least study what they do at the University at Jefferson and Linden. They stop all traffic at one time so pedestrians can walk and that's --

MS. SCHUMACHER: Something needs to

be done that's for sure, and the other what 1 2 is -- I thought there were delivery times 3 for the trucks downtown. When you come through here I time before 10:00 in the 4 5 morning there is trucks double parked all over the place making deliveries and I'm 6 7 quite sure that we had a -- do we have a 8 regulation and I'm wonder if that's being --9 if anybody ever checks on that. 10 MR. EVANS: We could find out, they 11 may, but I'm not sure. 12 MS. SCHUMACHER: Are we going to 13 have a shortfall in 2015? Pardon? Do you 14 know? MR. EVANS: Well, these are just 15 16 projections so we don't know. 17 MS. SCHUMACHER: It's balanced? 18 MR. EVANS: We don't know at this 19 point, but we are still anticipating revenue 20 coming in so we don't know what the 21 shortfall is going to be. 22 MS. SCHUMACHER: But you are 23 assuming there will be one. 24 MR. EVANS: Well, I wouldn't say 25 that.

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Marie Schumacher brought up about almost getting hit by a car we all know that a woman was killed by a car in the intersection in front of Boscov's. I really think that Chief Graziano should speak to his officers because the people drive around the City of Scranton like they are on a wild mouse ride. Just zip, zip, zip, and they pay no attention to people crossing the street and the last time I knew the law said that pedestrian had the right-of-way. Ιt doesn't mean you have the right-of-way to jaywalk, it means you have the right-of-way to cross in areas so marked.

And if anybody wants to go on
Lackawanna Avenue across from the
Renaissance 500 and use that crosswalk I
have news for you, there are signs up there
but they are not being adhered to at all,
and I have seen people drive, I don't have
anything to calculate it with, but appears
to me that they are driving faster on
Lackawanna Avenue sometimes than they are
allowed to on 81.

And I think the city could be

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enriched because there certainly must be some sort of a law that they are breaking. And Marie is right, you have the pedestrian with the right-of-way and you also have the vehicle with the right-of-way and a vehicle with the right-of-way he should cross and is unaware that you have 20 seconds left on that ridiculous time clock. They are just going to run over you or blow the horn or do something, but I think that people in the city should monitor the way the people drive. They have terrible driving habits and some of them appear to not have an ability to parallel park, which they must have demonstrated when they received their They park with the front driving license. of their cars in towards the curb and the rear out in the middle of the road and it seems as if when the light is changing they step on the gas so God forbid that you should adhere to the lights in your favor because they are really trying to squeeze the limit out of that yellow, and I think it's time that attention was paid, and a woman lost her life because we people aren't

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paying attention. Thank you, gentlemen.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. EVANS: Have we ever sent anything to the chief or the traffic division to look at that intersection? Can we do that, send a letter?

MR. WECHSLER: I'll have something in motions on that.

MR. EVANS: Okay.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, city council. Last night I attended a meeting for the Hill Neighborhood Mr. Wechsler was also there addressing the people in attendance. He spelled out pretty much what was going to happen with the parking It seems like it's already a cut garages. deal. Perhaps tonight he can tell us and you can elaborate on just what is -- I understand it's going to be a 40-year deal and we are going to be responsible in the end for the maintenance of it, in other words, the repair to the garages whatever they may need. It will be deducted from what they pay us. Perhaps we'll get a heads up on what's going on. Thank you.

1 MR. EVANS: Thank you. He knows 2 more than I do. 3 MR. ROGAN: The parking deal hasn't 4 been finalized as of yet, there is a basic 5 framework that has been provided to all of us on council, but there isn't a final deal 6 7 as of yet. 8 MR. UNGVARSKY: We know it's not 9 finalized of yet, but it's already pretty much a done deal. You know what's in the 10 11 agreement --12 MR. EVANS: No, we don't. 13 MR. UNGVARSKY: You have a good idea 14 of what's in the agreement. MR. EVANS: No. we don't. I don't. 15 16 MR. UNGVARSKY: Somebody did. 17 MR. WECHSLER: The information that 18 was provided last night was from the website 19 that was published when the deal was first 20 announced. 21 MR. UNGVARSKY: Okay. Explain that 22 then to us, it's good to know something 23 about it and I'm sure you gentlemen have 24 been discussing it. MR. ROGAN: All of the information 25

that was on the website has also been reported in the newspaper as well pretty extensively.

MR. UNGVARSKY: In other words, we are going to get stonewalled again. You people sit up there, you take the questions and you sit there and sit there and never say anything to the people about what's going on. So far this year this council has not voted down a single thing that's gone on the agenda. Everything that's been proposed you people have voted for.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Wechsler, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. WECHSLER: Just to clarify, I did attend the Hill Neighborhood Association last night and I did mention some information that is available on the website. That website was published about a month ago, I believe, for preliminary information for everyone to read. It's available to everyone who is interested in

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seeing it, so there wasn't -- there is no deal, we are still waiting to hear about it, there is a framework for a deal and that's about where we are at so the information that was discussed last night is available on the website and it's known. No one is hiding it or stonewalling it or anything like that.

The comments that were made this evening about the pedestrian problems in the City of Scranton showed their head again together when another pedestrian was struck on Lackawanna Avenue and Penn Avenue today. Once I heard about this I immediately contacted Mayor Courtright who contacted Chief Graziano and we discussed the immediate need for a study of the crosswalks in downtown Scranton. Parts of the study, also, would have to be to contact PennDOT as well because some of the crosswalks are maintained by the state and some of them are the responsibility of the city, but this is something that we are going to have to get a handle on because it's just happening way too often.

I occasionally walk in downtown

Scranton, also, and to me the traffic -- the

crosswalks are confusing to me as well, so

we do need an upgrade on that.

And I did speak to Leslie Collins today, we are trying to put something together as an educational format for pedestrians and drivers in the city to make some improvements to stop this problem.

As also was discussed tonight the DEP has determined that the chemical mixture of the ooze that was determined in the recent spill but the identification of the dumpster has not been identified yet, but the mix that they have been determined should help us to understand and limit the amount of companies or individuals that have access to those types of chemicals.

The bigger problem was, once again, as was brought forth the potential problems with the leachate line. The Sewer Authority and landfill still need to review their procedures for reporting on how and why then the line is used. Both parties must be responsible to reestablish a confidence that

we can have that the citizens know that the line is being properly used and does not represent a threat to our community.

Some of the questions that are being asked to us we don't have the answers for. It's up to the DEP and the Sewer Authority. These are technical issues that have to be reviewed and some studies take quite awhile to complete. We are pursuing this, we constantly ask questions about it, but we only -- there is only a couple of agencies that can answer our questions so we are pursuing this, and as soon as we find something out we have been relaying it to the citizens. That's all I have.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Mr. Evans, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. I'll be very, very brief tonight. I would like to urge everyone to vote next Tuesday, November 3, it is Election Day and remember, I'm going to borrow line from Joan, she said it before, by not participating you only get the government that we deserve. So please be part of the process and part of the

solution by voting. Franklin D. Roosevelt once said, "Nobody will ever deprive the American people of the right to vote except the American people and the only way they can do that is by not voting."

So, again, please take a few minutes out of your busy day next Tuesday and vote.

Thank you very much and have a good evening.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Mr. Gaughan, any motions or comments?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you, just a few. I have been asking for a few months now for an update on the savings from both the police and the fire contracts that were passed last January and February. The mayor proposed a \$4 million annual savings from each of these contracts and I'd like to know if we are going to meet that savings and how we are tracking these savings.

I have sent numerous correspondence to the mayor's office without any reply. I continue to ask about this because I think it's extremely important, especially as we are quickly approaching budget time. The mayor extended these contracts for four

years and touted that they would save the taxpayers a significant amount of money. I just want to see where the savings are. So hopefully next week we will get some kind of response from the mayor.

We did receive a letter from a concerned citizen, it was addressed to Mr. Rogan and I'd like to read it. It says, "Dear Mr. Rogan, I am shocked to think that Mayor Courtright and Chief Graziano would allow political signs of a current office holder to be stored and displayed on public property. I have enclosed pictures for your review. The storage and display of these signs are violations of the city's ethics policy and the Hatch Act."

And the building she is referring to is the training division building on Ash Street, a former firehouse, and she did provide pictures of signs of Mayor Courtright when he ran for office, so I would like to send correspondence to the mayor and ask for an explanation to see if we can get some kind of answer on this. It is very concerning if that is the case so I

with like to investigate this and see what the explanation is. And the letter goes on the end of the letter and says, "What could possibly be more important, ethics or politics?"

So I appreciate the letter from this concerned citizen and I will look into this and hopefully we will have an answer by next week from Mayor Courtright.

MR. ROGAN: I can actually answer those now if you would like.

MR. GAUGHAN: Hold on, just let me finish and then you can speak. I have also requested in the caucus tonight that when we do receive the budget next week that the mayor present it and explain it in front of city council at a public caucus and we are sending -- did discuss sending correspondence to the mayor asking him to be present when the budget is presented. And that is all I have this week. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: First to address the issue that was brought up, I did receive that letter and there was a radio show host that was talking about this issue as well,

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despite what's mentioned in letter about signs being displayed they certainly aren't being displayed on city property. What's been explained to me that the police department when they do shooting exercises they use old political signs often from previous campaigns, and I know looking at the pictures you can't tell so much in the picture in the black and white that we received, but there were multiple candidates signs from the past elections in storage, not displayed, obviously, they are used for target shooting. Personally I think using recycled materials is a good use of money if that's the reason, but they should be blacked out or, you know, some kind of white put on them prior to being stored, but that was the answer on that issue.

Another end of it was brought up, I forget to mention this during announcements, and the St. Cats group will be have a fundraiser Sunday from 2 to 6 p.m. at the St. Mary's Center. It's \$15 for an adult and \$5 fro children under 12. There will be a 50/50, a DJ and raffles. Our office did

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contact neighboring boroughs regarding copies of the ordinances regarding stray cats, but the difficulty is the cats aren't licensed so it's hard to prove if a cat is a stray or if it's somebody's pet, and the city's animal control officer is not a humane officer to enforce statewide laws, but I encourage everyone to support the St. Cats' group because they are doing a great job with their program to help control the stray cat populations within our neighborhoods. What they do is they -- it's trap, neuter and release, TNR program and they trap stray cats, neuter them so they can't reproduce and then they are released back to the area where they are living, but it stops the reproduction, which is most important.

And finally, the Parking Authority
deal was mentioned, as Councilmen Wechsler
mentioned there hasn't been a deal finalized
yet and as soon as there is you will be the
first to know. When we had our first
meeting regarding the possible deal with the
Parking Authority the first thing that all

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of us asked was that when a deal is finalized that it's presented to the public at a city council meeting, and the administration quickly agreed to that because this is the very large deal and it's very significant to the future course of the city so we need to make sure that we get it right, that the public is made aware of what's going on, and the website that Councilmen Wechsler mentioned and the newspaper articles as well has put out information on the entire Parking Authority debacle from too many garages being built to SPA default to where we currently are and it certainly is a long, sad story of how we got there and where we are now with assets that -- some may call them assets, but actually they are liabilities because they cost more money to maintain and operate than we are bringing in revenue, so something certainly needs to be done on that front.

And, finally, as Councilmen Evans mentioned and I mentioned at the beginning of the meeting, Tuesday is Election Day and I encourage everyone to go out and vote and

make their voice heard. There are numerous important elections at the local level and it's unfortunate that the voter turnout many years, especially in the local elections, is 20, 30, 40 percent, when the local elections effect you and I more than national elections do. So it is very important to come out and vote in the local elections, especially city council, county commissioner, statewide judge elections. There is number of races on the ballot and I'd like to encourage everyone to go out and vote, and that is all. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: I'd like to add one thing, I understand the explanation that they are using the political signs for target practice, but I still would like an explanation from the mayor and the administration on what went on and these pictures that were taken because I think it's important, especially for this concerned citizen, that she gets an official explanation from the mayor, and I also would hope in the future that the police department can find something better for
