Francis of Assisi Kitchen. All sizes for both and men are needed. Since 1978, St. Francis of Assisi Kitchen has been serving nutritious meals to hungry people in downtown Scranton. It's clothing room is available to people in need.

I'd also lake to take a minute to recognize a great event that will be going on January 30. In 2014, friends of Shannon McDonough held it's inaugural polar plunge event "Splashin' with Compassion." After two successful years having donated to six young individuals battling cancer last year, they plan to host their third annual polar plunge on Saturday, January 30, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Montage Mountain in Scranton. The event is free to attend, but there is a \$35 fee to take the plunge in support of the cause. They are calling on caring businesses and individuals alike to support their community event seeking gift cards and gift baskets which will be displayed and raffled at the event. They are also offering sponsorship opportunities, and I would hope that everybody would try to make

it out to this event to battle cancer. 1 2 Thank you. 3 MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else? MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' 4 PARTICIPATION. And I'd also like to 5 mention, council president, the speakers if 6 7 they would please state their name for the 8 record and as a reminder there is a 9 five-minute time limit. 10 MR. WECHSLER: The first speaker is 11 Jerry Reidenbach. 12 MR. REIDENBACH: Sir, I'd like to 13 address council on some of these issues that 14 I have. MR. WECHSLER: Please state your 15 16 name? 17 MR. REIDENBACH: Oh, Jerry 18 Reidenbach. The reason what started all of 19 this a lady fell on my sidewalks last year, 20 all right? What I was trying to do is 21 correct the problem, all right? First of 22 all, there was speed bumps down in the alley 23 at the rear of 1428 Cedar Avenue. They were 24 removed by the city, all right? They were 25 put in there 17 years ago because there was

a problem. All of a sudden speed bumps are illegal in Scranton, but I still see them remaining over on the side of Tech. They are still going through that alley, so something has to be done because all of the cars are flying through the alley to avoid the red light at Smith's. That's why they were installed years ago.

Now, another thing what came about was after the speed bumps were removed, all right, the water flows down the alley.

There was a two-foot wide river flowing down the alley, all right? I talked to Dennis

Gallagher about removing -- when he was going to do the speed bumps. He said, "I will cut them out and I will put a curb there."

Me, trying to help Smith's out, the lot was graded towards my house. The guy across the alley has a bug truck. By backing in and out every day he created ruts, the water would flow down through there. So in the mean time what I was did I was building up a lot, all right? They came over, they removed the speed bumps, Dennis

Gallagher looked right at the lot and he said, "There's a problem."

He said, "That's above grade."

As I gave you a copy of the city ordinance about the grading he had me grade the lot back towards my house, all right? I gave you guys pictures. Did you receive them to look at, all right? Now, is that acceptable a two-foot wide river coming down your front sidewalks? And the damage that was done to my sidewalks, all right?

So I talked to them and nobody would do nothing about it. I called the Sewer Authority, they came over, they looked at it, in less than two days there was a curb. The first thing they said was the alley was graded the wrong way. It was graded towards the lot and there was no curb, but they put it in, all right?

I called up Jack Sweeney and I said, "Jack, they put the curb in."

He said, "Oh, I was talking to

Dennis Gallagher, as a favor to me he was

going to put a curb in."

I said, "It's already put in." I

said, "Now the guy across the alley and who has a tree service is running it over."

I said, "Jack, could you go over and talk to them about that?"

He said, "The Sewer Authority put that in, they are responsible for that now."

They did that as a favor to the city he said. Now, what I'm asking now is something has to be addressed at the It has to be a one-way, there has to be a curb put this, and the sidewalks as of now, I'm speaking to you, I'm putting you on notice, anything that happens with them sidewalks through the water damage I'm not responsibile anymore. Legal advice told me, like, to tell you that, all right? like, I can't actually believe somebody who works for DPW come over and say the lot is graded the wrong way when it is actually the right way that it was graded, and he would not to nothing to help me out.

Like, I don't know what's going on here. And, plus, as a favor it was supposed to be done, but it was already installed. I don't know how we can address this problem,

but it has to be addressed because I'm not going to put up with this.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Reidenbach, we discussed your problem in caucus earlier this evening and I believe that Mr. Evans and Mr. Gaughan both have been in discussions with you and also we noticed the correspondence from Mr. Gallagher and City Engineer Pocius, I believe, so for us right now we can only discuss and assemble all the information that we have received to date, trying to put it together to see if there is something that we can do to.

MR. REIDENBACH: Well, I guess they can because, you know, when the Sewer Authority came out very quickly and they said they looked at it and they knew it wasn't even their problem. They were there the next day. That curb wasn't even in there six hours, the guy across the alley, Allen Craig, ran it over. The guy couldn't believe it. They were going to come back and they were going to put in the barriers for the parking lots. They couldn't do that because of Smith's parking lot. Leave it be

known, too, that parking lot was never zoned as a parking lot. Every day back and forth he goes with the trucks digging ruts. have a bunch of pictures that I can leave with you so you can see exactly what is on the daily basis. I don't know if the house if it's zoned for commercial for a lot like that because at one time there was a house there. When they demolished the house for the parking lot 150 feet of curb came out along with that. They did cover over some of the existing curb where the sewer plant put in so there was a curb there, there was a problem, and I told Jack Sweeney, once the curb gets put in is it going to be the same thing back and forth over it and destroy it again? I don't know if it's zoned for it because Jack tried to say something about a grandfather clause. A grandfather clause is an existing business that was there. Thank you very much.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, and we did send a letter to Denny Gallagher, the DPW Director. We copied, as Councilmen Wechsler said, John Pocius, the city engineer, and

the city solicitor Jason Shrive so we will be waiting for a response in writing from them to see what we can do to take care of this problem.

MR. REIDENBACH: Thank you very much.

MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, city taxpayer. Mr. Perry, welcome to city council. I wish you much success.

MR. PERRY: Thank you.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I'm very, very pleased to know that the city was able to pay the end of year MMO for the pension funds on December 30. Mr. Bulzoni accomplished that by transferring funds from end-of-year accounts that had cash balances. Unfortunately, I don't think that's going to work again this year or next year when the MMO increases to is 11.4 million and 18 million dollars. We are just not going to have that much money to play around with again.

Speaking of the pension funds, I attended the meetings of all of the pension

boards yesterday morning and I don't know if Ms. Reed has had the opportunity to brief you on the information provided during the Composite Board meeting, but Mellon Bank briefed -- gave it's January investment review for 2015 and, as you know, the Pension Boards assume a rate of return of 8 percent on investments to fund future payments to the retirees. I don't know if you realize it, but for 2015 the rate of return was not 8 percent, but point 3.9 percent, okay? Not good. That doesn't take into consideration what the market has been doing in January. That was just year 2015.

I would strongly encourage all five of you to drill down onto this pension matter and remember that the state auditor general is coming back to do his two-year audit. You should be working on that right now and we should find out this summer the level of distress of these pension funds, and I have a feeling that the news is not going to be good.

Speaking of Mr. Bulzoni,
Mr. Wechsler, you are council president, can

you tell me who will replace him and when? 1 MR. WECHSLER: Currently there has 2 3 not been a replacement named for Mr. Bulzoni and currently right now Mr. Bulzoni 4 5 continues to operate as the business administrator of the city. I have spoken to 6 the mayor about his plans for Mr. Bulzoni 7 and I have also spoken to Mr. Bulzoni. 8 9 of today right now they have not given us 10 any idea of how they plan to address this issue. 11 MS. HODOWANITZ: 12 Does the mayor plan 13 to request another waiver? 14 MR. WECHSLER: Like I said, the 15 mayor has not told me how he plans to 16 address the issue. 17 MS. HODOWANITZ: In my opinion, that 18 is totally unacceptable. He should be able 19 to find a qualified candidate willing to do 20 the job for \$90,000. 21 And the 2014 audit, Mr. President, 22 what's the status? 23 MR. WECHSLER: Speaking again to 24 Mr. Bulzoni, the final draft should be 25 available January 22.

MS. HODOWANITZ: That's a draft.

MR. WECHSLER: A draft.

MS. HODOWANITZ: When will the final product be ready.

MR. WECHSLER: After the drafter is prepared.

MS. HODOWANITZ: It's already 228 days late according our own Home Rule Charter, the state will never get its annual financial audit, which was due on April 1, and which they were reminded again and asked for it by December 31, you are not going to get that audit until they can extract the numbers from independent audit so you are also holding up that thing and DCED can deny you funds based on not having that audit filed. That's unacceptable. Remember, we hired Rainey & Rainey to train the people upstairs how to prepare the information for the audit and Rainey & Rainey has been paid at least renege \$22,527.50, probably more since their invoices haven't all cleared. We also paid SP & Company \$40,000 for that audit so I want some value for my tax dollar, I'm not getting it.

I noted the article that the Times did about the city hires that the mayor made for the positions that he created,

Mr. President, have any of those positions been advertised?

MR. WECHSLER: Not that I know of, no.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I recall your comments from also June where you said you need to start advertising them even if they weren't union positions, has anything been done to change the ordinances of that -- those things become advertised so that citizens who are not political cronies can have a chance at them?

MR. WECHSLER: Well, I find offense at the word "political crony", number one.

Number two, I do still believe though that those positions should be advertised.

Unfortunately, though, that is an administration decision and we don't have the power to change it right now.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, there will come another election. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

"Little league," hey, Williamsport.

"Liberty Bell", Philadelphia. You say "Electric City" well, we say Scranton but if you're outside of our area nobody knows about us, so this is our keyboard, Electric City. We have a huge sign outside, we should build on this, and I'm not going to propose a million dollars idea because I seen too many of them from other architectural firms in our city and other people that want to make this building pretty or this lot nice and, believe me, the city doesn't have millions of dollars to spend, the county doesn't have millions of dollars to spend, and the state won't give us a million dollars so I'm going propose a very small idea. I want to see in 2016 our anniversary to light up our city, and what I'm proposing is very simple. I'm sure you have seen buildings with the lights on them that go across the top or down the sides and they light up. What I'm proposing is that we take the downtown to light up our buildings, using simple LED lights like a C7 and light up the side of the building and

the top that are facing our downtown area. I'm counting our downtown as Penn Avenue to Lackawanna to Jefferson to Mulberry. specific area, let's start around courthouse Now, if you will see on the last page I tried to do a little idea of the courthouse square with lights on, it's tough to draw -- print out a picture at night with lights with a printer, but it gives you a little bit of an idea if you look closely at This idea has a lot of merits. it. There is one building, that bank building on courthouse square now that has lights across the top. Another building, the bank building at Dunmore corners was beautifully lit up with lights on the roof this year which was nice.

My thought is that we start the lights from 15 feet above the floor, above the ground level. This way vandalism won't attack or kids won't be playing with them, run vertically up the side of the building, across the top and down, and only do the faces of the building that face the streets. If you have a corner building then you have

two faces you have to do.

Now, I was looking at this and knocking around some prices, we could have a price in a catalog, a C7 light strip for a 40-foot wide building four stories high you are going to spend \$70 in lights. That's not a big cost doing business and for all the electronic supply houses we have in the area I'm sure we can get that down to a really cheap price knowing how many buildings we have in the area, and LED lights are very cheap to run. And with a little timer on there or a photo eye there is no maintenance really.

One of the big advantages of this and why I'm proposing this is "a" it's cheap. Two, it's going to give you us a lot more light in the city. There are some streets even downtown you walk on that are a little dark and dingy even with our adequate lighting that we have, and the biggest plus of it is going to be that when people drive on 81 and the turnpike the city is actually going to glow. The glow or the light haze over the city at night is going to make

1 people look over and say, "What is that down there?" 2 3 And somebody is going to say, "Hey, that's electric city Scranton." 4 That's going to really get out. And 5 I just think it's a very short, cheap idea 6 7 at helping us get along and I just want to 8 go a bit further, maybe in December council 9 or the city could give a prize for the best 10 decorated building, but I give you an idea 11 free of charge and I didn't yell at you. 12 Thank you very much. I hope you --13 MR. WECHSLER: Just before you go, 14 would you be able to e-mail this to the city clerk? 15 16 MR. MOSKOLEVITZ: Sure, anybody you 17 want. 18 MR. WECHSLER: The reason being I would like to forward this to Scranton 19 20 Tomorrow and to Leslie Collins. 21 MR. MOSKOLEVITZ: I tried to get to 22 her four times, but she is never in the 23 building over at the Tripp House. I have 24 been trying to get to her. I'll definitely 25 take one over so you don't have to forward

1 it. 2 MR. WECHSLER: Yeah, if you could 3 e-mail it to us and then we can forward it 4 to Leslie, this is something that the 5 downtown committee would be very interested in. 6 7 MR. MOSKOLOVITZ: Sure, I'll be glad 8 to give it you. 9 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you for idea. 10 MR. MOSKOLOVITZ: Thank you very 11 much for your time, gentlemen. 12 MR. EVANS: Good idea. Thank you. 13 MR. WECHSLER: Les Spindler. 14 MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Council. Les Spindler, city resident and 15 16 homeowner and taxpayer. Councilman Perry, 17 congratulations on winning your election. 18 MR. PERRY: Thank you very much. 19 MR. SPINDLER: Good luck on your 20 term. 21 MR. PERRY: Thank you. 22 MR. SPINDLER: At one of the last 23 meetings in December it came up for a vote

holding your nose. Well, during the previous administrations we had our taxes raised 25 percent as high as 56 percent, were you holding your nose at those tax hikes, too, because you should have been down here like I was and many other people arguing against that. But, oh, I forgot, you were supporting those tax hikes because you supported Chris Doherty, but you are holding your nose for a 5.7 tax hike. To me, that's being a hypocrite.

Moving on, you are voting on this garbage fee tonight, for years I have come hear and argued I think it's illegal, we already paid taxes to have our garbage collected, this is a double tax, and it's a tax, not a fee. People cannot afford \$300 when they are already paying taxes. I think you should vote that down. I know you won't, because you never have in the past. You people never do what's right for the citizens of this city.

Moving on, Mr. Bulzoni, I know you're all against him staying on, I think it was wrong for you to force him out.

was here much, I stated this before, he was never forced out, he left on his own, so I think you are wrong for forcing Mr. Bulzoni out, and as is being proven you are not going to find anybody to replace him that's as qualified as him, so you want to try to make the city better you should keep qualified people in their positions. You shouldn't be forcing him out, I think you are making a huge mistake. But, like I said, you don't listen to what we say anyway, so I'm sure you are going to do what you are going to do.

There was a precedent set when George Parker

Luzerne Street, Councilman Rogan,
I'm sure you have traveled that, from Main
Avenue down to Meridian that is a disaster.

MR. ROGAN: I had a conversation with the mayor about this over the break because that area and the area when you get into South Scranton was a mess. Luckily, that was finally taken care of down by the South Side shopping plaza. That work, and I did ask when it was going to be paved, it's not the city that's doing the work,

obviously, it's the utility companies, and that won't be paved until next year.

MR. SPINDLER: Oh, yeah, you can't do it now.

MR. ROGAN: So we can get in touch with the utility to see if they can make more legitimate repairs because you can't go down that street more than 10, 15 a miles because of the divets.

MR. SPINDLER: No, and there's one corner, I think it's the corner of Ninth Avenue and Luzerne.

MR. ROGAN: By Brownie's Pizza.

MR. SPINDLER: No, it's the block up, but I forget, that's Ninth or Tenth, there is huge potholes, I mean, the pavement is coming up, it's just awful and I know they can't do anything in the winter now, something should have been done. It's a terrible, terrible job.

The last thing I have to say, with all due respect to President Wechsler, I think Councilman Rogan should have been voted president. He is the most senior councilman up there. I stated that a few

years ago when there was a vote. He is the most senior, I think he is the most qualified, I think he should have been president. I don't know how it was decided, but, again, nothing is done fair in this area so why should I be surprised. Thank you for your time.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Sherry Scramstad.

MS. SCRAMSTAD: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. My name is Sherry Scramstad. I'm a citizen of Scranton who currently resides at Morgan Manor since last September because Clover management, the out-of-state builder and operators of the Greenridge Senior Apartment Complex located on Dickson Avenue has forced this 73-year-old to move after they refused to renew my lease without any form of explanation on July 15, 2015 for what I believe to be my activism on behalf of myself and other residents of the complex after having been lied to and mislead by that greedy and predatory corporation.

Very many of us were told before construction even had begun that there would

not be an automatic raise in rents at the end of the expired lease. That it was rare when it did happen and when deemed necessary it would only be a ten or 15 dollar increase according to the cost of the living adjustment. That proved to be anything but the truth with raises of \$50 per apartment, a \$25 raise for those who have rented garages on the property, and a raise of \$5 for those who rented storage sheds from them at the end of their first lease for, and for the end of this current year's lease there is another planned increase of the \$35 more per unit.

A good portion of the men and women who reside in the Greenridge community are former community servants comprised of retired nurses, teachers, firemen, veterans and small business owners. Though they are not impoverished, most live on fixed incomes which do not allow them to access subsidized housing, but whose limited incomes also do not allow them to hire lawyers and fight lengthy battles in Court.

Many residents gave up much to move

to the Greenridge complex that is exclusively for seniors 55 and older. sold their lifetime homes, others moved at great expense from states like Florida, Nevada and Virginia and many gave away much of their furniture and collectables of a lifetime because the apartments are so small compared to their prior homes so that they could live in a friendly and supportive community of their peers which also allowed them to bring the pet members of their families, something of great importance to many elderly persons. It's not an easy thing to find in rental communities today and those of us with pets paid extra for them each month at Greenridge.

The Greenridge senior apartment complex does not receive any federal or other government subsidies and so believes that legally they cannot be made to answer for any of their decisions no matter how fraudulent and unfair it may be to any of their residents.

I know that this body held hearings before issuing a permit to this greedy

corporation to build in this city and it's my hope that after hearing only a fraction of the lies to which they have subjected their residents that you will rescind their permit to operate the property and force them to sell to a local owner who hopefully will have more regard and concern for the elderly of this city.

My problems with Clover Management began when I was elected the president of the pet club within the complex. Many promised items such as six pet weigh stations being put up around the complex were not installed after eight months. In addition, I was asked by management to revise my minutes of the pet club meetings not to reflect the actual concerns of the members that were discussed at the meetings, but to make the minutes "positive and uplifting", if you can believe that.

I shared my concerns and suggestions with better management of pet owners concerns to management and realized that they were not welcome. Upon finding out that rents were raised so high despite so

many of us being told that they never would be, I contacted Matt Courtright's office and sent a letter to vice president Joe Biden about the situation. I believed this activism on my part played a huge role in having the notice of "Non-renewal of lease" left in my apartment door to the hallway without been given any reason for such a decision despite asking numerous times and in various ways.

I may ask if I cannot finish reading this may I leave this with the council so they can share it?

MR. WECHSLER: Yes.

MS. SCRAMSTAD: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: That is the end of the people who signed in, is there anyone else who would like to address council.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonians.

We are contemplating the sale of the Sewer Authority. The City divorced themselves from the Sewer Authority when they set up an authority. We had a sewer system, they set up an authority, they said they are

independent, they are allowed to do whatever they want except that we could put people on the board so the city's responsibility was only to board members.

Now, a new partnership has existed between the Scranton Sewer Authority and Dunmore and the ratepayers since most city equity now in the Sewer Authority was don by the people who paid for it. There is no reason why should the Sewer Authority be sold that some of that equity should be turned back to the ratepayers. There is no reason why the city should claim sole authority, sole custodian of the money. The money belongs to all of the people who actually put money into the system, which is the ratepayers. So I don't know if a -- the time comes we have to file class action with the federal government or not, but something should be done to address the ratepayers. That money that we put into it, it's like putting it into a bank, otherwise, it would just be another tax that you imposed on us and that was not right here so something -of course, it isn't sold yet, but should a

class action suit be filed against the Sewer Authority and the dissolution of the money don't be surprised because, as it is, the city really divorces us. The only equity the city had was the original equity, not all of the equity that has increased since then.

Maybe somebody could explain this a little better. I think it's 5-G, tax exempt for certain people and properties, are you telling me that I can put in for a tax exempt for ten years on a property so that people could move into the city that's what you put in there, for providing for exceptions, for stimulating residential development.

MR. EVANS: That's for new construction.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I realize that. Are you telling me that people who are renting to the University of Scranton, Keystone, the medical college are getting a free ride again? Why can't they pay for their own building and pay for their own real estate tax? Why should we have to take care of

that? I mean, that \$175,000 from the University is a joke. You just sit up there and laugh when you think about it, the amount of property that they own, and the amount of the equipment we have to have available for them. Don't you realize most of our costs with the fire department is caused by the "U" and the high rises? That's where the cost is. You are charging them nothing. They are getting a free ride. Most of these nonprofits are getting free rides, too.

The people in Scranton are being oppressed, I always said this. You are the most oppressive council that ever sat before the people of Scranton. You think this is Dublin. You think you are British and you're oppressive. The people in Ireland didn't suffer as much as we did. You are suffering everybody. You are causing people to lose homes, being sold at tax sales, that people buying them for \$900 or \$1,500, \$2,000 because they are in tax arrears and you have to go to Court to fight it. You are the worst possible council that ever sat

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident. Did you miss me?

Probably not. I also would like to express concerns on 5-G. You know, years back we had the Tripps Park development a lot of new houses are built, they got ten years tax exempt, and what did they holler for once they started? We want a brand new school and they got it, and every year we -- every day you pick up the paper, it seems like the school district is scurrying to figure out how to pay the bill for all of these new schools.

And, furthermore, if somebody moves in and they pay \$5,000 in property tax and \$5,000 in wage taxes and wants to come down here and complain, well, my compliments to them, but if you have one or two kids in school there is already probably double that missing from the budget so, I mean, I have to really express concern about tax exemptions, I'm tired of it. There is no reason why somebody that's paid like a green grocer for 11 or 12 or 50 years or 20 years should have to makeup the difference for somebody to move in and act like they single handedly revitalized Scranton.

A lot of stuff in the paper on the Sewer Authority and I kind of regard that as practically a done deal no matter how much somebody wants to drag their feet, but some of the comments in the Scranton Times editorial section I'd like to specify, if anything happens with that money it could be to get caught up and the bills, and one of the things in their editorial about ten days ago was that they should thumb their nose up at the settlement or the unions with the

wage payment and that's not going away, so I'd like to see if anything the bills get paid that were originally the reason that it's being sold and not some frivolous exercise in spending because it just can't keep going on, we are running out of assets to sell and that is not going away. It's a accruing money every day or every month or whatever, it's accruing interest and it just has to be paid. It can't -- it's not that it's necessarily right that somebody gets the 5 percent raise when everybody else is going back to 60 percent of what they used to earn, but how did you duck it from there?

If the Times can figure that out they would have a -- catch my eye a little better, and I seen an article once again on trash and recycling and I would give Scranton a failing grade for recycling, but the easiest way to get people's ire is to start penalizing the people that do it every day and, I mean, if a dog food can has paper on it, it get torn off and put in the paper trash. So the point being I don't want to hear anymore about this, please, no more of

this per bag. I lived in two separate towns. The last two towns I lived in I would come home and find trash all over my lawn, you report it, who put it there? The girl upstairs they had 50 bags of trash laying out in the front of the apartment house and she told the town policemen and the mayor that it was our trash so I walked in after work and my wife says, "I want to get the hell out of here."

I had just rented the place, shelled out about \$700 bucks in security deposits and she wants to get the hell out of there, you know? Like, she had the town cop and the mayor badgering her about the trash in front of the place and it was some other neighbor's trash so the point being that I don't have a 24-hours a day to stare out my window and worry about who is to tossing trash around, and hopefully a coordinator will help that.

And, by the way, I'll just take another second here, it was privatized trash removal so when people run out of it, you get this little stupid bag, it breaks and

1 when people run out of money they just start 2 throwing it on somebody else's lawn, and 3 that's unacceptable. It's the biggest safety issue and it's police and fire. 4 5 Thank you and have a good evening. MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. 6 7 MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, Council. Marie Schumacher. I want to get 8 9 to some of the agenda items, but first, and 10 I don't know what the assignments were made 11 because they weren't announced tonight, 12 which I think is not very good, but am I 13 assuming correctly, Mr. Evans, that you are 14 still in charge of the finances? MR. WECHSLER: I want to hear the questions. We had agreed before that these questions would be issued to us in writing.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I issued questions in writing on the budget back in November, like the 10th, and I still have not heard word one, so I don't see any point in doing that and when I am asking a question I see nothing -- we shouldn't have to wait a week. If you people are up on what is going on in this city we shouldn't have to wait a week for an answer, but thank you, I'll continue with my time and I'll just speak then I'll stop asking questions.

But I will tell you one of the things that a matter with this city, and that is if anybody read on November 18, Lora Scratchnook had an article saying, "See the

tax bills of the three who will lead Lackawanna County next year." And I will read the last couple of paragraphs. says, "We can figure out what the minimum each will pay next year in local income taxes next year based just on the base salaries of the commissioners and where they live, but we still don't know about their outside income. In Scranton, the income tax is 3.4 percent," and then this is what was stated, "So Mr. Notarianni and Mr. O'Malley will pay \$2,584.58 on a base commissioner salary of \$76,017 a year. The commissioners serving the board Chairman receives an additional \$2,819 which would mean another \$95.84 in income tax if either Mr. Notarianni or Mr. O'Malley is the chairman. That's a total of \$2,680.42 for the chairman. In Old Forge, the income tax is only 1 percent so Mrs. Cummings would pay \$760.17 if she is just a commissioner, \$788.36 if she is chairman. No chance of that."

So there it is in a nutshell. That is -- that's true of any surrounding

community that borders our city, just think of that. \$2,584 versus \$760 just for living outside of the city. I highly recommend that to anybody. I love Scranton, but what's happened to this city and the way it's being dragged down and things given to the wrong people is just a travesty.

I would like to know, again, I would like to state on 3-F, which is the trash tax, I think that it is incumbent upon the city to prove to us that that is a tax -- is a fee and not a tax. It's not up to us to prove otherwise. That should be able to be proven.

On 3-G, and I will submit these in writing, I don't expect answers because I don't get them, but I will, what are the certain areas in 3-G that are going to get this ten-year no property taxes?

MR. ROGAN: It's not ten years on the property taxes, it's a two-year abatement on new construction only for owner occupied within the city.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And 5-H, the real estate tax hike -- wait, do we know if we --

I think you should probably wait to pass this because you may need to change the 2016 budget. The 2015 budget was based on I believe a 78 -- or an 87 percent collection rate. You upped that to 89 percent I still believe just to avoid going over the 6 percent threshold in the property tax. I will return next week. It's going to be a rough year. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Can I just say one thing?

MR. WECHSLER: Sure.

MR. GAUGHAN: Mrs. Schumacher, and to anyone else, if anyone has a question relating to my committee, which is public works, I don't have a problem answering it if I know the answer. If I don't, I'll try to get it for you. Thanks.

MR. WECHSLER: And as a general comment, what we are trying to avoid is questions that are strung out and that sometimes have no relevance to city council business or personal questions such as we are asking all our salaries. We are trying to --

MS. SCHUMACHER: I didn't ask about salaries, I asked about whether we ended up with a surplus or a deficit last year. I think that's legitimate, and I'll follow up next week. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Once again, we are just trying to restore the practice that's been practiced here for quite awhile that questions are referred to the chairman of the meeting. If the other council members would like to answer the questions that are asked, they are free to do so.

MR. UNGVARSKY: Good evening, city council. Tom Ungvarsky. Six months ago I accused this city council of raising more taxes and more fines and more fees. Several council people took offense at that, but if you needed proof just look at today's Last year this council passed every agenda. ordinance that was presented to it. You did not vote down a single one. If there was ever a rubber stamp council, it was this council. I believe this council will probably be one to put the final nail in the coffin.

Several people came up here tonight with problems. Had you people had a meeting last week they could have aired problem at least one week earlier. I don't know how many weeks you had off last year and look at the way you started this year, I wonder if we really need a city council.

MR. ELLMAN: Ronnie Ellman. Yes,
Mr. Perry, I got your letter and I saved it
to throw it in your face if I get mad about
something you wrote here some day.

MR. PERRY: You have every right.

MR. ELLMAN: I hope you won't let these other four influence you.

MR. PERRY: Not at all.

MR. ELLMAN: It happens, you know, everybody seems to start out with a bang and end with a whimper around here. Let me just -- this Amoroso plan last year in the city we had 639 foreclosures the first week. I know everybody has seen this, the first week of this over 100 foreclosures to start the year out and everybody just you don't do nothing, nothing to help the people of this city. The neighborhoods are declining all

over the place, what do we hear? Mr. Durkin threw more money downtown. We don't care about the neighborhoods, downtown is where the money got to go, you know, the hell with downtown. What about my neighborhood? have been there 21 years. There is just remnants, there is big old slate sidewalks part of where I go every day with the dog. No curbs. The yards flood. No money has been spent there that I know of. The paving job, I don't know, must be ten years old. The sewers were never filled up. People go all over of the place by habit, and now you got the same thing on the rest of it. don't know who paid -- who approved to pay for the paving job from Taylor to Providence but they ought to be fired. It's like an obstacle course that would test the best of drivers. And in case somebody doesn't know who Mr. Durkin is, he is the president of the Scranton Chamber of Commerce, not the Dickson City Chamber of Commerce, the He seems to have more sense like Mr. Bulzoni and all, he doesn't want no part of Scranton. No one in their right minds

seems to want to buy a house around here.

Look at what happened with the school board.

They bring up a secretary up here from

Atlanta for \$150,000 and she goes -- the

city is just -- you people have stolen the

city have the taxpayers. They tell you what

they want and nobody listens. Nobody

listens to a thing. There is just a, I

don't know, and unparalleled absence of

leadership. I guess that sounds all right.

You know, I don't know how many of you remember when Mrs. Fanucci and Mrs. Gatelli were here and it used to be a riot out here with the policemen and all, but it just seems like the city was in better shape what's that, six or eight years ago. It's going downhill. You have got \$96 million you are ready to throw into that big hole. No relief for the taxpayers.

Nobody -- you don't even want to put any money up for street signs so you know where you are going around here. The 16, 1,700 block of Sanderson is like a war zone.

Luzerne is terrible and here money is going to be thrown away. What are you going to do

next year when there is nothing left to sell because of Amoroso plan. You are going to have to find something. What you ought to do is just sell this building and get rid of everything, sell the fire trucks or something. The city just has such a lack of leadership it's disgusting.

And in closing real quick, I was looking for something a couple of weeks ago and I found a '67 tax statement from Roseann's parents' house in Blakely and I'd say it was 20 years ago it was like a \$200,000 when I saw it, this was 1967. The county tax was \$10, the library tax was \$6 and the Borough was \$7 and the school tax was \$49. \$72 a year for taxes on a beautiful home and I don't know about garbage collection and all of that, but look where we are going.

You know, why I'm so irritable? I have been up since 4:00 this morning listening to this junky, smelly, diesel truck in my driveway that nobody cares about. Nobody wants to do a thing about this painted up billboard that I have to see

every day, morning, noon and night. That's why I just don't -- I just don't have no more use for it, what's going on in the city and for you elected officials.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Don't join them, Mr. Perry.

MR. WECHSLER: Is there anyone else that would like to address council?

MR. ST. FLRUR: It's been --

MR. WECHSLER: Sir, please state your name.

MR. ST.FLRUR: Oh, my name is Gary
St. Flrur. French. It's been almost a
month before I was here and talking about
the budget that was passed which only Bill
Gaughan saw fit to vote against and, anyway,
I said before you any elementary person who
is in accounting knows that it's a farce but
it was passed anyway, the reason we'll never
really know they did. Since then, I have
been on the radio, I have been television, I
have been on local publications making my
feelings known as far as they would go. I

spoke to political directors of parties and these are not my feelings alone. They are the feelings of the Scranton people. are outraged at the status quo and business as usual thinking has pervaded the city for far too long. The conversations continue. In fact, it is widening that countless Scrantonians reaching out to talk about what can be done. The fact is in this seemingly complex situation is not an excuse to do The fact is that we can prevent nothing. was is happening in Scranton. Let me be clear, the people of Scranton may be political apathetic, but this is because of the government of Scranton has made them so.

One thing is certain that they are not stupid. They know that Scranton government is corrupt, that nepotism and malfeasance rules the day. They know the government is beholden to political factions and secret groups of whatever nonsense that goes on in the city, and that the financial situation, the turmoil, has been the result of these political intrigues. The city is crippled, 90 percent of the budget goes to

compensation, and we stand on the precipus of a major decision when one of the public's precious assets are being sold just to pay for the political and financial boundoggle that has been perpetuated continuing in the city. The people of Scranton should not bear the brunt of a lack of innovation, incompetence, and an inability of Scranton government.

It should be varied people who voted for these things and the administration who brought them to the floor. The city is gutted with blighted hopes, closed businesses, and so much blooming prospects that I have not been met one student who wants to stay here upon graduation.

A quick search on the internet yields descriptions like "Scranton sucks," as a Facebook page, is a running gag to talk about the completed utter incompetence in Scranton government and how Scranton is a place where dreams go to die. The reason for all of this being the government and the way it is managed.

The good news is that there is

I believe it's the gas company that's putting the new lines on Luzerne Street, but the repairs that were made prior to doing a full pave haven't been Mrs. Reed, would be able to added quick. contact Denny Gallagher as well as the pave cut inspector to ask that Luzerne Street be looked at and that adequate repairs are made especially now with the snow coming and plows on the streets as well that's only going to make the situation even worse. am happy to see that the Sewer Authority finally did complete a project, that was the South Side shopping center. It was the same kind of issue, it was actually worse than Luzerne Street, believe it or not, where the new Popeye's was put in, there was some additional drainage that was added to that lot across the street and that was a disaster, but that one has been repaired so good work by the Sewer Authority on that.

And finally, I was contacted by a resident, I did speak to PennDOT very briefly, as of all you know the Harrison Avenue bridge is being reconstructed, the old bridge has had a number of structural issues and an idea that was brought up that I think we should pitch to PennDOT formally in a letter is to have a "Welcome to Scranton" sign on the bridge. As you drive into the city coming down the Scranton Expressway, there is a "Welcome to Scranton" sign currently but it's a very small sign, it's off to the side of the road, it's not very visible, and I think when I went to other cities, other larger cities sometimes you will see a very nice display on the way in that new Harrison Avenue bridge I think this is a good opportunity to have a very nice welcome when people go into the city.

I know there are historical concerns with the bridge coming in so we can work with the historical board as well to make sure that it's tastefully done. With my colleagues' agreement, I would like it send a letter to PennDOT requesting that they

explore putting some sort of welcome greeting on the bridge as the progress continues on that. And that is all I have for tonight. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.
Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. We know that this year may be the most critical year in the city's history. As we face decisions on monetization of the parking authority, rental registration, pension reform, fee reduction and elimination of the Court award payment and other initiatives while continuing to pressure the county on much needed reassessment, but the monetization of the Scranton Sewer Authority is clearly something that we have to get right.

As elected officials, the best you can do is hope for somehow to effect positive change during your tenure. This is the year that history will meet reality. We will participate in decisions that will change the course of this city forever. If we get it right, we will create a scenario for long-term fiscal stability. We will

create a new business environment that will attract and grow our business community and our tax base. We will also create an environment that will foster home ownership as a way to stabilize and beautify our neighborhoods and we will create a government that is both responsive and efficient if we get a right.

In 2016, we can't shy away from the moment, we cannot make decisions looking through a political prism and we have one chance to get it right. That's all I have for now. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Evans.
Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. Just a few items. First, I'd like, Mrs. Reed, if you could send a correspondence to Linda Aebli, the executive director of OECD, I would like an update on the land bank meetings, I believe there is has been one held so far. I'd like to know what has taken place and what kind of strategic vision they have and efforts are going on with the land bank movement. I'm very

interested in that.

Also, I have received several complaints about pave cuts on River Street in South Scranton and we are going to send a correspondence to the pave cut inspector and DPW director to find out when those are going to be taken care of and that street is going to be repaved.

I received a complaint about the 2,600 block of Division Street. The intersection of Division and Keyser Avenue. The road is falling apart and there is a three-foot deep drop off so we have been in conversation with our DPW director about that.

I'd like another letter sent, this will be the fifth or sixth time asking the administration for an update on how much we saved currently from the renegotiated police and fire contracts. It's been almost a year now so I think that we deserve an update to see how much we have saved on those.

I'd also like an update on what the time line would be for rebidding the paving project. That was supposed to occur last

summer and that will occur this spring.

I received a complaint about a ditch in the area right before the entrance to the Sewer Authority on Cedar Avenue, and we will notify the DPW about that.

A resident brought this up tonight, I have also received numerous complaints about faded street signs and stop signs throughout the city. I have noticed several signs which you can barely read or that are completely faded out. I'd like us to send a letter to the mayor and DPW director asking that a full inventory be done on the signs throughout the city that are faded and need to be replaced. If we don't have the money in our budget to replace them, then we should be aggressively pursuing grant money through the state. And that is all I have this week. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

Gaughan. Just a few comments on some of the items that were spoken about tonight.

Council did have a meeting last week, it was on Monday, it was our installation of officers so we did have a meeting last week.

As part of being the new council president I'm faced with the challenge of managing these meetings. One of the things that I am going to have difficulty with is comments about corruption. Mr. Perry has just joined us and I know Tim for awhile, but I know these gentlemen and I sit with them, the term "corrupt" as applied to us it makes my blood boil. None much these men up here are corrupt and I have to bite my tongue when that comment is made about us being corrupt because we are not.

In terms of questions, it has always been in the Rules of Council that questions should be addressed to the council president just as a matter of decorum for the meeting, and as I stated before, all of the council members can answer any questions that they like, but I'd also like to make a point that the city council office is open five days a week. Our e-mails are out there. I have a Facebook, my phone number is in the book, so people that have questions, supply questions to us all week long. We get many questions from people who never attend one of these

meetings, and we do make our best effort to answer those questions and the concerns of the citizens, but once again we also have the situation that I have been struggling with since I became a member of city council, I know that city council is the forum for people to come and speak, but a lot of the questions that are submitted to us or requested from us actually should be asked of the administration, that the administration is also here every day and the office is open, the department heads are here and I found that myself and the department heads when they are able to are very happy to help all of the citizens.

So we are not trying to restrict comments or questions or even criticism here, I find that criticism that we receive at city council it's not that it's well founded but it is sort of the conversation. It is America. People are free to express their ideas and if they don't agree with what they are doing they have a right to say that, but as I'm out in public I meet as many people that are positive about Scranton

These are people are out there working. They are not here at the podium, but each week they are having meetings, they are helping citizens, and they have a positive attitude about their neighborhood, and I understand that we have problems, I understand that. Part of the reason I ran for city council is because there is so many problems and we do want to make an attempt to solve these issues, so as myself being council president I do encourage debate, but questions that are either surprise questions to us or questions that would be better asked to the administration I'm going to encourage those questions to be answered by the administration.

And just one last thing, as we

talked about the abatement programs, one example to look at, I know the city has done many KOZ's and things like that for businesses and the businesses take advantage of it for ten years or whatever they can get and they leave the area, but when tax abatements are given to property owners, the property owners that receive the tax abatement are the original recipients, but once that person decides to move or moves on the property remains. If you take a look at the Tripp Park neighborhood in West Scranton, that is filled with brand new homes and paying very high taxes, so to me when we give out an abatement the city doesn't have a lot of cash on hand, but if we give out a tax abatement for property owners or investment that's money we are investing into the future, so I look at this as a positive plan to help advance the city.
