MR. WECHSLER: Are there any comments? If not, received and filed. Do any council members have an announcements at this time?

MR. EVANS: I have one. Friends of Connors Park at 515 Orchard Street will hold their first annual chicken barbecue Sunday, June 5, between noon and 4 p.m. All proceeds will go to the installation of a handicap accessible play equipment. For tickets you can call 570-561-7584. The donation is \$10. Tickets must be purchased in advance. That's all for right now.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else? The Council would like to recognize and congratulate Mrs. Sally Locker, confidential secretary to the city solicitor who is the 2016 recipient of the Harold Miller award for her dedication and support to the legal profession. Sally began her career in the city in 1998 and has served under three mayor and eight city solicitors. Council's office and the city law department work very closely together and we can't thank her

enough for all she does on a daily basis.

Congratulations and best wishes to Sally and her family and I know Sally is --or maybe she is watching so I'd like to give her a big round of applause, and this is a very prestigious award and I have been informed that Sally is the first municipal employee to ever win this award so it is a great honor to her and the work that she has done for the city so congratulations.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, city resident and taxpayer. With regard to Item 5-D, the nomination of Steven Prendergast to Midas, was that put on the agenda in error?

MR. WECHSLER: Not that I'm aware of.

MS. HODOWANITZ: All right. Well, a quick check of the Treasurer's database shows that Steven J. Prendergast, 122 South Hyde Park Avenue, let's see, he has a delinquent tax bill or tax bill of \$964.23

for 122 South Hyde Park Avenue, and the delinquent real estate taxes of \$476 for 124 south Hyde Park Avenue, and delinquent refuse bill for \$124 South Hyde Park Avenue of \$406.32. Now, either these are an error on the city's database, in which case they need to be cleaned up before his name comes forward or he owes the money, he should pay it like the rest of us taxpayers. So I hope that you table that item and send it back to the mayor for appropriate action.

with regard to Item 5-H, the extended loan for United Neighborhood Centers, I looked at the background on that and it appears that the loan is going to be extended for 69 months, it was a \$300,000 loan and instead of getting 4 percent interest we are going to allow it to go interest free. I would like to know during motions exactly how much interest money we are going to loss if that passes.

I saw a very interesting article in the newspaper on the 18th, "Senate Takes Up Municipal Pensions Again," and according to Robert Swift Senator Blake is against a Bill

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that's just making it's way through the Senate, he voted "no" because he does not want to see the damaging effects on Scranton's finances. He says that transferring the pensions to the Pennsylvania Municipal Retirement System would result in the lower assumed rate of investment return for the fund. Well, that means that we no longer will see an 8 percent interest rate, which is ridiculous, and that the City's unfunded pension debt will go from \$194 million to \$251 million dollars. It's a quarter of a billion dollars. He says it's all unfair to the police and firefighters because they don't collect social security when they retire. Well, had they paid FICA tax like the rest of us did they would be able to collect social security so that was an error on their part.

2014 audit has not been posted to the City's website, it's been over two months, that's a disgrace. Are we ever going to see any status on the 2015 audit from SB & Company or is it going to be nil

heard until it surfaces next year?

MR. EVANS: I'm working on that.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I went to the mayor's office and asked the secretary when we will get the 2016 state of the city address from the mayor she said, "What address? I don't know nothing about no address."

Tomorrow, May 20, is when they will open the bids or the RFP for the pension trustee and fund manager. The city of Mellon is the winner again and see if there is any progress on our RFP for the third party administrator, which we badly need.

I'm also awaiting to see if the mayor is ever going to appoint someone to the Firefighters' Pension Board so that they will a quorum and can handle the requests for pensions. That's a disgrace.

With regard to items 5-B and 5-C, during motions would you please explain what the cost of each one of those items is so that the taxpayer has an idea of what we are being asked to pay. And I'll take your answers during motions. Thank you.

1 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Les Spindler. 2 3 MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, 4 Council. Les Spindler, city resident and 5 homeowner and taxpayer. Last week there was an article in the paper about city employees 6 7 supposedly didn't pay their garbage fees and 8 council looking into whether the wages could 9 be garnished. I want to read a quote here 10 by Councilman Gaughan, and I quote, "If the 11 allegations are true, then this is an 12 absolutely disgrace." 13 Well, what's an absolute disgrace is 14 a video I saw on Facebook last week of a councilman drunk in a bar --15 16 MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Spindler --17 MR. SPINDLER: -- acting 18 inappropriately. 19 MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Spindler? 20 MR. SPINDLER: What? 21 MR. WECHSLER: That is your opinion. 22 MR. SPINDLER: It's a lot of 23 people's opinion. Videos don't lie. 24 MR. WECHSLER: Well, I would ask you 25 not to state that that's certainly someone.

4	what you are talking about.

8	and Beyond? What is it?
9	MR. SPINDLER: Just go on Faceback
10	and put that in and you will see.
11	MR. GAUGHAN: But what is it? What
12	is Lackawanna and Beyond?
13	MR. SPINDLER: Go on it. This is my
14	time.
15	MR. GAUGHAN: Do you run it?
16	MR. SPINDLER: Do I run it?
17	MR. GAUGHAN: Are you in charge of
18	it?
19	MR. SPINDLER: No, I am not.
20	MR. GAUGHAN: Oh, okay.
21	MR. SPINDLER: Now, for quite awhile
22	I'm talking about Luzerne Street, and there
23	was a speaker here two weeks saying it was
24	paved, well, it wasn't. Today it was. I
25	went down today and got caught in the

traffic, but I wasn't complaining because I was glad to see that it was finally being paved. I just hope it wasn't the city that paid for that, I hope it was the utility that dug it up and was the cause of that.

And speaking about paving, Spruce
Street from like Washington Avenue down to
Meridian driving on that avoiding the
potholes and the rest looks like a washboard
that's terrible. Also, Penn Avenue, so I
hope those two streets are on the paving
list.

Moving on to the garbage fee again, I'm going to keep talking about this until it gone away, and as I said two weeks ago, the reason it was put in was to pay off the tipping fees, which we'll be paying off the end of this year so there is no more reason for the garbage fee to be in there. We pay our taxes for that, and that's all. The only thing we should have to pay is our taxes, not an extra fee.

Lastly, the smoking ban in the parks. I'm glad to see that, but I don't know why the ban isn't at Nay Aug. Just

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because it's under the Recreation Authority,
I said for years the Recreation Authority
should be disbanded. They are no use to the
city at all. The city should take over Nay
Aug and put the smoking ban in.

That's all I have to say tonight.

Thank you for your time.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Gerard Hetman.

MR. HETMAN: Good evening, Council. Gerard Hetman from Lackawanna County Community Relations Department. To begin this evening, on behalf of the Lackawanna County Commissioners I'd like to thank the Scranton Police Department for assisting with our recent Bike Safety Fair. Officer Namiotka and Officer Buzone complete with his bike and bike patrol gear were present at the PNC Field last Saturday, May 14, for our Bike Safety Fair. The two officers gave a bike safety talk to just over 100 children along with accompanying adults in attendance, so we can thank them again for their cooperation. We have had the Scranton police along with several local and state

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police agencies come out in the past, but
this year none of the other agencies could
make it so their cooperation was more
important than ever. Again, we thank
Lieutenant Namiotka and Officer Buzone and
Chief Graziano and all of the good work that
Scranton Police do every day, including our
Bike Safety Fair.

Second, regarding the meeting that we discussed before on the sale of the Globe Store to Lackawanna County, earlier this week the Commissioner's Office forwarded estimated figures on the financial impact of this transaction on the City of Scranton and the Scranton School District. Through Council's office as well as the Office of the Mayor, the Business Administrator and those equivalent offices in Scranton School Districts. Our office took this approach because we wanted city and school district officials to have a complete picture from the County's perspective of this transaction for a meeting. That way you can come in and see everything that we have to present before the meeting and come in fully

prepared to ask any questions or give any feedback on the sale before meeting with county officials. Our office will be reaching out in the next couple of days to set up a meeting to discuss this transaction. Ms. Reed will probably hear from Tracy Hart, she is the assistant to our Chief of Staff, Mr. Andrew Wallace, and we'll be in touch probably within the next week to set that up, and we look forward to any feedback from council or, again, the Business Administrator's Office or the Mayor's Office and the school district on this transaction, which will come up soon.

Third, our Parks and Reaction camps and clinics are now open for registration for the summer programs that we run in our park system. This includes our youth basketball clinic series, our adult tennis league, our youth tennis league and our youth basketball clinic series -- excuse me, our gymnastic clinic was the last one on there, I said basketball twice.

We also need lifeguards for all of other county parks. Each of our four parks

has water amenities, either a pool or lake to swim in. We want to try and get them all open this year so if you know anybody who wants to be a lifeguard they can apply by calling our Parks and Recreation Office at 570-963-6764, and it seems to be, I don't want to call it a dying profession for summer work, but we struggle it seems like every year to find a full compliment of lifeguards, so if anyone is interested, college students, others home on summer break or who may be visiting the area for the summer, we encourage them to check it out and apply.

And lastly, the topic of no smoking policies and ordinances. We were informed earlier this week in the Commissioner's Office that earlier in the week the Colt's Board of Directors of the County of Lackawanna Transit System voted to ban smoking on the Intermodal Center property earlier this week. They expect the smoking ban at the Intermodal Center to go into effect around June 1. They are just waiting for proper signage to come in and Colts is

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also doing their own press release and media blitz to let people know about this. also pass out information and make sure riders are aware that smoking will not be permitted anymore on the Intermodal Center property. This ban follows, of course, the steps taken by city council to ban smoking at city parks, and also in April applying to county parks in Wilkes-Barre city council and the city government there banned smoking at the Intermodal Center in downtown Wilkes-Barre so this is a trend we see now and we just want people to know this was sent to the Commissioner's Office and then Colt's, again, will be publicizing it just as a heads up probably on or at shortly after June 1 there will be no smoking at the Intermodal Center property, also.

That's all we have for this week and, again, we look forward to talking with council and other city offices regarding the Globe Store sale in the near future. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Ron

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MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council.

Firstly, several people asked where in the world I have been for awhile, I just gave up on you all and council and the city, it's coming down here to me is like beating your head on a stone wall, you don't listen or nothing. And, secondly, I went to Memphis for a week for our golf and meeting that we have once a year. There is still ten or 12 of us left that have been together over 60 years. One boy came from Paris and another from Rome just for the week. In fact. Rosie and me went Saturday to spend an hour and a half, two hours with a boy in Philadelphia from Hawaii that was passing through. closeness is something that you don't see no more. Well, I just thought I'd throw that in there.

I think that this idea for the Globe Store, because I haven't been here and I don't what you all say, is a good idea, but none of us would live long enough for it to pay for itself. You are talking about all of these millions of dollars that we don't have and I feel the same way about that

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It would be wonderful for the city to have that but there is no money. here you are talking about asking for a grant on one page and loaning money to a someone on the next page. That's what's wrong with this city. People call for reassessment by your own words a third would go up a little bit. You are going to spend eight, ten million dollars, it would take 50, 75 years to overcome that expenditure. I just don't see how -- you people just don't think things through for the next couple of generations it seems to me. hear this once in awhile. You are not thinking of your children and your grandchildren that, unfortunately, for them will be stuck here. You know, one of your obligations you are supposed to be serving and protecting the people. You are not supposed to put future generations in these kind of situations.

I'd like to thank Mr. Courtright for coming to Ozzie Quinn's dinner Thursday night. We are still on speaking terms believe it or not. I know everyone

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appreciated seeing him there.

And lastly, I want to unequivocally say how much I agree with Mrs. Cummings on her thoughts about this bathroom and gym This is terrible for our school situation. system to have to have something like this I guarantee you, President Obama arise. wouldn't subject his two girls to a situation like that and I never would believe that Hillary would subject her daughter to a situation like this, but it's a double standard our of Washington. what's good for the goose is good for the gander. The school system, everybody should fight something like this. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. ELLMAN: And I don't think I need any sensitivity training about it.

MR. WECHSLER: Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Anything?

MR. WECHSLER: It's your time, Mr. Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Okay. I just don't want, you know, to deny anybody the

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opportunity to express their thoughts and their feelings from that side for any reasons. I'd like to go back to a couple of issues that are being discussed, Ron just brought one you, okay, and you know what's happening in this country, we are discussing none issues because we can't discuss the real ones. We are talking about a nation that's so driven into debt by a lack of leadership that it may not be possible for the young people sitting in this room today to satisfy that debt. Now, these council -you as a council, to be bluntly honest with you, don't decide very much of anything because the money either comes from Harrisburg or Washington, and they tell you spend it and do what you have to do, and when you take a look at where this money is being spent it really benefits very few people and not only does it benefit very few people, but if they look to see how much that money was actually spent in the project and how much evaporated into the thin air, and I think it's time for people to realize that as long as you stand idly by and allow

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your government to walk all over you they are going to do it.

Now, my thoughts come from Free Constitution America when we were part of the crown, the British Crown, and the people stood up a couple of times, but at the last time they were successful, and I think it would do a lot of good for people to understand the amount of people on the British side and the American side that were assassinated, murdered in cold blood. mean, even George Washington who himself was almost kidnapped, and sooner or later it's going to come to place in this country where, and I think that time has already come, where the average person feels like they are not being served by their government at all, and just from looking at just a mountain of things that this council has done it's all in contradictions to the best interest of the citizens of this city, and it's not just the Scranton Sewer Authority sale, it's just -- it's just so many things that it's impossible to talk about all of them here, but they are

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expressed many times in many different viewpoints, but they are still very valid.

You know, this city may be a billion dollars in debt, not a half a billion, and when you take a look at 70,000 people wrestling with that and you watch the utter silliness that's taking place not just with this council but previous councils, when the council locked the front doors and put a metal detector at the back door, and brought police up here and, of course, they borrowed tons of money, too, and they had great ideas and then they didn't want speakers to speak and, you know, free speech isn't free, but at a time people need to find their voice and sometimes they have to step behind their The people who freed us did it voice. honestly by pushing the British out of here and killing enough of them until they left.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Morgan, could you refrain from talking about killing and shooting.

MR. MORGAN: I'm talking about history.

MR. WECHSLER: I understand that.

6	from that because honestly those are my
7	ideas and my opinions, and I'm not talking
8	about shooting you, I'm talking about
9	history and how this nation was created and
10	you may not appreciate that
11	MR. WECHSLER: I appreciate history
12	quite a bit, but I would just like to keep
13	the focus off of violence, from violence
14	MR. MORGAN: I'm not talking about
15	that, I'm talking about reality, and if you
16	feel infringed on
17	MR. WECHSLER: Reality is not
18	violence.
19	MR. MORGAN: Well, isn't it? You
20	don't think they killed the British and
21	threw them out of this country?
22	MR. WECHSLER: That's what I'm
23	MR. MORGAN: Well, that's what I'm
24	asking you.
25	MR. WECHSLER: I'm asking you to

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please refrain from your comments about violence.

MR. MORGAN: Well, that's my freedom of speech and that's my opinion. I don't want to waste my time arguing with you because your viewpoint really doesn't mean very much to me --

MR. WECHSLER: You can continue, I'm just asking you to try and refrain --

MR. MORGAN: Yeah, I just think the longer the people in this country rely on a government that has no respect for their rights sooner or later it's going to come to that and it's going to be tragic and, you know, it shouldn't come to that, and this council is selling the Sewer Authority, it shouldn't come to that either, okay? And it's just this government is a mess, and you know what hiding in the back room and not having public discussions is a problem, and hiding everything and piling people with debt that they just can't pay anymore is a problem and just keep borrowing and borrowing and borrowing. That's my point.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. There is

a signature on here that I'm having a hard time reading, is there a Matt who wants to speak? Matt, could you just state your last name when you get up to the podium?

MR. SOLIMAN: You want me to spell it for you?

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, please.

MR. SOLIMAN: S-O-L-I-M-A-N.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. SOLIMAN: Good evening. First thing I have a question about is the parking enforcement cars that have been going around in Scranton and particularly in the residential areas in Greenridge. I was wondering if there could be any kind of motion for a handicapped person to be able to park facing the, like, the other way of the street even though that is opposing traffic I know that's against a law if they have a concrete slab in-between the sidewalk and the street because that would be what they put down.

MR. ROGAN: I can answer that for you, I actually looked into that situation with our attorney when this parking

enforcement first took over, there were residents in South Scranton on a hill handicapped who had the same issue.

Although, we would love to do something like that within the city, our attorney did research it and it is a state law. It's not even a city law, and I don't know if Attorney Minora or you want to speak to that a little bit more, it's something, you know, it's a common sense thing that we would like to do. Our hands are tied when the state laws prohibits us from doing so.

MR. SOLIMAN: All right, thank you very much. The next thing, I thought the purchase of the Globe Store was -- that was a good purchase and I was wondering what will be done with the building I think it's on Spruce Street and North Washington on the corner there. I don't know if that's owned by Scranton? I was wondering if that --

MR. EVANS: No, that's Lackawanna County.

MR. SOLIMAN: Oh, so do you guys not deal with that?

MR. EVANS: No.

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MR. SOLIMAN: Oh, okay. And I just wanted to mention about the potholes, there are a ton in Greenridge that have not been fixed for awhile, just thought I'd put that out there. Thank you very much.

MR. EVANS: Thank you. Thanks for coming.

MR. WECHSLER: Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia. Citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, up for final passage on your 7-E, that contract you are going to give out, could you tell me how much they are going to get the information if not from our Scranton tax collector? I mean, how are you going to go around and say to the people who is paying the mercantile tax, I mean, this is pertaining to the mercantile tax without going to the Scranton Tax Office that really should have the records of it? They should be able to tell you who is paying and who is not paying. They claim there is 2,500 that aren't paying that tax, and I don't see how you can even consider it, considering that

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you are asking certain people who pay more and certain people to pay less, plus it's open to a lot of figures, I mean, That's magical bookkeeping. bookkeeping. That's the best way to describe it. have no way of telling you if a guy has got an employee working underneath the table or not, but yet you are going to tax somebody maybe that has 500 employees or 200 employees and force them to move out. do you think the brewery moved out that used to be in town that we have the truck rental place there now, that moved to Old Forge because of our tax situation and you are not helping anybody with this tax like you probably do. Mr. Evans says he is going to pay less, that means somebody has to make up his difference, somebody has to pay more. You are asking people to pay more and other people to pay less with very little in return other than the fact that people are paying the most is going to get out of the city, and I don't blame them if you are starting to tax more than they are paying now because you claim that this is going to

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give more money. How do you assume it's going to give them more money is beyond me being the tax itself is close to being neutral, and don't tell me people are going to flock in here with businesses and we are going to have this huge hiring. That's a dream. That's a dream that's long since gone.

That's the problem with council, you got to look at things as they are. You are going to buy a lot of trucks. Did you know years ago we actually went to New York to buy the used trucks to try and save money? I wish they had followed through to find out if we actually did save money, but we bought our trucks in New York at one point. is how we try to save money, but this administration has no intention to save money. I really think you are going to loot all of the assets and in the end declare bankruptcy anyway, but in the mean time people are going to make a bundle, but not the citizens. They are going to be struck with such a huge hole the only way they can get out of it is by getting get back to the

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mines and hope to flow up the water somewhere else in the Chesapeake, I guess. I mean, it's ridiculous the things you do. Common sense tells you we are looking for money from a grant. A grant. We got our hands out for money. Now, true, we should always stick our hands for any kind of free money but it's not really free, it comes from somebody else. Unfortunately, the only people that makes money is the Treasury, and they are not giving a lot of that away. But somewhere along the way we got to get fiscal responsibility beyond that. You should have already had that. You should already said don't spend a penny without absolutely being necessary. Dire need, but not the way the city works. We look for ways to increase

Now, the smoking is ridiculous.

Some of the parks have no children. All they are is a place for some old guy who sits and smokes his pipe. Now, how you can figure that's a danger to the city beyond me, but it pays 25 bucks if you catch them and that's the danger, you may catch them

smoking his pipe.

MR. EVANS: It depends on what's in the pipe.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I mean, this is how this city goes. Thank you. I'm glad I'm getting old.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,

Council, Marie Schumacher. First a little

bit of a housekeeping. I have been meaning to bring this up since the tree project for the 150th anniversary of the city came about. I know you are all aware of the work that Tony Santoli, has done for this city free of charge, puts hours and hours in, probably has saved us some injuries because of the trees that have come down, and I think it would be appropriate for the council tonight or soon to make a motion and buy one of those 150 trees and make it --

Next, following up on some questions from last week, I already saw Mr. Gaughan.

Mr. Evans, what is the projected 2017 MMO 1 should the funding reach the 50 percent 2 3 level? MR. EVANS: I don't have that yet, 4 but I have some other information. 5 MS. SCHUMACHER: Still don't have 6 7 that, okay. Now to the agenda items. First 8 of all, since it's in Seventh Order the 9 Turnkey, I believe that's the one that's in Seventh Order. First of all, the business 10 11 privilege tax how much did we collect? was due on April 15, how much did the 12 13 collect this year to date? 14 MR. EVANS: Yeah. I don't know to I don't know what -- as of that date 15 16 is, but it was estimated at point five for 17 both business privilege and mercantile. 18 MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah. I think that this should be tabled until we have more 19 20 information. I think we need to know why 21 the school district managed to collect \$6 million while the city collected \$2.6 22 23 million for those two taxes? 24 MR. EVANS: Because the rate is much 25 higher, it's three times higher than the

city rate.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, and today's paper says we are allowed to do this because of the switch under the Act 47. If Act 47 goes away, will we no longer be able to do this wage tax and have to go back again?

MR. GAUGHAN: No.

MR. EVANS: No.

MR. GAUGHAN: If you can keep the payroll tax.

MR. EVANS: If you do it in that time frame, yeah. After you exit you can do it.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Now, what we may collect more we will also lose some, for instance, rental property owners will no longer be paying so there is some money taken away. I do agree the business privilege tax is an evil tax. The business owner provides the capital, the labor, pays all the bills and the government comes in and takes the first cut, I think that's obscene and I don't like it. However, we already have a wage tax that's been tripled over most of the other -- it's tripled most

of the other municipalities around us and I don't know how we can go back and take more on wages without having more companies leave this area rather than come into the City of Scranton and we certainly need them.

On 5-H, I, too, was -- scanned the backup on that, that loan and it's for contracting. We are supposed to collect interest and we didn't collect the interest and apparently the recipient of the grant did not have a very good contract administrator either, and I don't believe in rewarding incompetence. I think that that's no excuse and then to reward the organization that benefited from the mistake is just ludicrous in my mind and I don't know why they need an extra 69 months. We have been very generous with that organization.

On "H" -- on "I", I would like to know the fifth whereas in that says that it is in the best interest of the City of Scranton to enter into that MOU. I would like somebody during Fifth Order to explain why that's in our interest. To me, it's

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another report that's going to be put on the shelf to collect dust. We know what we've got to do if we want to encourage people to come here and that's get our taxes down, especially our nuisance fees and all of those. Okay, I'll be back next week. Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer. I have a question on this mercantile taxes and so forth, why is this such a collection problem? I mean, it's like taxes that don't get collected, trash fees don't get collected, people obviously wind up paying extra on the trash fee because 22 percent of people just seem that it's not pertinent and in my opinion we have a lot of favorite sons in town, and they take the bill and they are entitled to throw it in the garbage or they are never even counted on a bill for years this has gone on. This is not just your issue. It's like last week I mentioned somebody, four, five or six rental units and they owe \$15,000 in back tipping fees and probably not collectable, and it's just we

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have to get a better system going here. think we really need to do an intensive study on what's going on because it's not fair and if you do cover trash with taxes the people with the upscale houses, whether they can afford them or not, are going to be stuck with the bigger portion of the bill by millage. So, you know, if you live in upper Greenridge there or on East Mountain or something like that you are definitely going to pay -- you might pay \$1,000 a year more so I agree that since they are we really have to start collecting on the people that we are not collecting. If they don't have -- actually have the money to pay, it's like I said, it would be great if we could carry over a lien until it becomes a Medicaid house or something like that.

And with the mercantile tax, last year in South Side, last 2015 to be exact, I brought up the subject of recycling not being collected and this was every week for seven or eight weeks that recycling wasn't collected. I left my cans and bottles down in front of the program, but then the papers

would have been a frozen pile of mush so I got struck carrying them back and forth and hopefully in the merchants appreciate the fact that what we are put through some of the taxes might be warranted as far as mercantile tax and special sales taxes to take care of these snow removal and overtime can be required, any reasonable amount, so it could just be an instance where the city doesn't feel rich enough to pay or whatever, but that's been established for years, union or non-union, reasonable amounts of overtime can be required.

Now, once again we seem to have people that can't -- they are more worried about what somebody else is doing than what their own personal lives are about. I guess they have a lot of extra time or something, but I don't see any point. I read finally the no smoking ordinance and it's crazy and, furthermore, a lot of money gets sunk into these parks and if some old geezer wants to sit on a bench of puff his peace pipe, provided that it hs the correct legal tobacco in it, I don't see anything wrong

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with it and it's really egregious with the money that got spent on those parks, 30 different parks, that people are just going to get fined. And, furthermore, I think we owe the police department enough money already that we don't have to have them chasing a wayward cigarette smoker around. It's entirely ridiculous. I don't know what that was all about. My daddy didn't love me enough to quit smoking from the Lung Association or whatever, but or a new parent neurosis I don't know, but it's silly. entirely interested and tired of unlibertarian issues being passed by city councils and states.

Okay, well, we'll consider it next week. Oh, Joe, that is Wechsler; right?

MR. WECHSLER: Correct.

MR. DOBRZYN: You know how you could tell whether people were poor in the old country? If they didn't have money to buy a vowel.

MR. WECHSLER: That's it. Anyone else?

MR. YOUNG: Good evening, Council.

Albert Young. As you all have noticed, I gave you the estimate some time today, it came in late last night, so I am of the opinion that you can look it over at your leisure and proceed from there. I understand, also, that everything has been forwarded to Harrisburg and around for the powers to be to look at it, also.

I did have a call from the mayor today and it was the same rhetoric as last week, apparently our senator is not in tune with what we here are in tune with the emergency program, he is more interested in the overall state of repair on that situation.

If there are any questions on the estimate, feel free to call. I will not be available next week so you have my phone numbers, again, feel free to call.

MR. WECHSLER: We appreciate the information that you provided us and we are diligently working on repair.

MR. YOUNG: I know you are diligently working on it, I have had calls from a couple of the council members and Tom

Welby has been in touch with me, also, so it's not a sleeping dog at this point, it's an ongoing project and, again, I thank you for working on this as feverishly as you have.

MR. WECHSLER: I also followed up with the mayor today, also.

MR. YOUNG: Well, okay. All I know is that I had a call from him and it just seems like it was the same rhetoric, but whether he was in tune with Senator Blake or not I don't know, but thank you again.

MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Young?

MR. YOUNG: Yes.

MR. GAUGHAN: And we spoke on the phone about -- my understanding is that the administration is looking or was in talks with DEP and supposedly they are trying to get emergency funding. The city would have to design the plans, DEP would have to approve them and then I believe they are trying to look in different escrow accounts from the flood -- former flood projects to try and allocate money to take care of this situation.

MR. YOUNG: That's what I understand, also, but this outfit is the contractor that was recommended through Pace to me and they are DEP acclaimed and registered so there is no problem with this outfit.

MR. GAUGHAN: We should be a step ahead of the game.

MR. YOUNG: We should be a step ahead of the program at this point. I don't know whether we are or not, but again, if you there are any further questions please call. Thank you again.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. PERRY: Mr. Young, I know you have been working on this for over four years and, you know, it's been your tenacity that's kept this moving, you know. We are happy to do whatever we could possibly could do, sometimes we are limited on what we could do, but it's been your tenacity on this subject that this -- to where we are at today so I applaud you.

MR. YOUNG: Well, thank you. Thank you.

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MR. PERRY: You're welcome.

MR. YOUNG: 47 years of work, I told the mayor's office today that this file goes back to Senator Kanjorski so you now how long I have been battling it. If it was Dan Flood it probably would have been taking care of, but unfortunately not. Good night.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry, do you have any motions?

MR. PERRY: I just have a couple.

First, I'd like to thank the VFW tonight for leading the Pledge of Allegiance, that was very nice. Although, I did not serve myself a lot of family members of mine did serve, father, grandfathers, uncles, you know, the list is pretty massive and, you know, also we have the parade on Saturday, I'd like to see as many people get out there as possible, rain or shine it goes on. If you are working we understand, if you are not, you know, stop by down town and support our

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veterans and our current military.

There was a comment about 5-B and 5-C, I will look into the cost of both of those and get an answer for you on the fire equipment, and also from the police so I'll get that for you hopefully we'll have the answer next Thursday.

Also, something was brought up about collection rates within the city, I would like to know, I mean, there is no such thing as 100 percent collection rate, there is probably nothing close to 95 percent, but I would like to personally ask around and just see what our collection rate in various areas of fees and taxes how does that measure up with local municipalities are we the ballpark, are we not in the ballpark and that's going to kind of help us know where to go. Are we deficient in that or are we where we need to be and are we happy with that so I think that was a good comment that was brought up today.

And also, lastly, the Young Lungs was brought up by two different speakers and, unfortunately, I think that, you know,

this program has really gotten off on the wrong foot. It was never the intentions to fine anyone or to have police officers hiding behind trees to catch anybody smoking. The sole intent of that legislation was just to protect, as it says, young lungs of children at play.

Sometimes you need a sign to state the obvious, not to spoke when there is children playing.

Now, I think we used the reference of the old man on the bench with a pipe smoking a cigarette, our intention is not to walk up to this guy and give this person a fine, it's just the intention of the self-police department and hopefully make people more aware, you know, there are children playing, let's give them a break, let's walk somewhere else and do something else, this is their time, we had our time. And that's it. I don't anticipate a special police force walking around parks giving out fines. I certainly hope that's not the case, but that's all I have to say about that.

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MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Rogan.

MR. ROGAN: Yes. I would also like to thank our VFW vets for coming and leading us in the Pledge of Allegiance today and thank all the veterans in our community for serving us and keeping us safe.

I'll comment on agenda items as they come up, I do want to mention, I know luckily it hasn't been brought up in a while, but the rental registration. This week Councilman Evans and myself did meet with City Solicitor Jason Shrive and Pat Hinton from the Department of Licensing and Inspections to try and hammer out differences between what Councilman Evans and myself have been putting together and with the administration believes it's the right way to go forward with rental registration and it was a very productive meeting, I think we were very close to an agreement that it can work for everyone and avoid future litigation.

We obviously need to be more business friendly with this ordinance,

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that's what landed us in Court, it needs to be fair for landlords and also needs to be fair for those in the neighborhoods as well so that's the balance we are trying to strike and looking forward to have a finished product shortly. That's all. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. I'm sorry Mr. Young left, I want to circle back to our weekly conversation about the hole in I did visit Mr. and Greenridge. Mrs. Young's property last Friday and I had several takeaways from that visit. First of all, you can't fully appreciate what this family and the neighbors have been going through without seeing what is actually there, but with said I also was struck by what I viewed as a very doable project to correct. We just need to find the commitments from those who can help and we just have to make it possible, but what we have seen, indeed, is years of government paralysis by analysis and it's time for action. I'm really tired of kicking the can

down the road on these type of things when you have a property owner and neighbors that have been there for 50 years asking for our help and they are no getting it.

With that said, you know, fresh from that meeting and that visit at the Young home I had a spirited and productive conversation with Business Administrator Bulzoni on Monday afternoon and as a result of that I feel there is a sound strategy, and I think Councilman Gaughan touched on some of the key components of that strategy and I think that in the very short time if everybody does what they need to do we can get this resolved for him finally, and him and his family and the neighbors can move on the way we should have done quite awhile ago.

Some speakers tonight want to play gotcha politics and I think this is not the place for that. We are here to talk about city business and we are here to talk about agenda items. We are not here to talk about nonsense. That's all I have for now.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Gaughan?

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MR. GAUGHAN: Yes. Thank you. Just a few items. Last week I brought up the issue on Greenridge. I attend the Greenridge Neighborhood meeting last week and a couple of the residents up there were concerned about homes being used as bed and breakfasts. We did receive a response from the Director of Licensing and Inspection, Pat Hinton, and he did attach a letter sent out by the zoning officer Jack Sweeney, so they are, as Councilman Evans mentioned last week, they are aware of the issue, they have been working on resolving it, and just to answer some other questions that I have gotten in the past week, bread and breakfast is not a permitted use in an R-1 zone, so the Licensing and Inspection Department is aware of it and they are taking steps to correct that issue.

MR. EVANS: Can I interrupt one second?

MR. GAUGHAN: Sure.

MR. EVANS: I got some information on that I can forward it to you as well from the operator of that particular house and I

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think it's a good idea to try and get their side of what's going on along with the City's side and try to come to some positive conclusion, but I think nationally and internationally AirBnB, Virgo, Ahoy, these are positive things and are good for the city and if we manage them properly and regulate them properly it's something that I think we should encourage with keeping in mind, you know, what happened with neighbors next door to one, but there are regulations already in place from different cities so I hope that we have a -- instead of having a one-sided conversation we have actually a dialogue with a lot of different people on this matter. That's all.

MR. ROGAN: Just to add on that, and I also apologize for cutting in on your time, John Stossel, if anyone watches, he did a piece on these issues AirBnB and in particular and in New York I guess it was a big issue as well, and I agree with what Councilman Evans mentioned that we have to walk a fine line on not trampling on somebody's right to use their property as

they wish, but also keep the neighbors in mind, and I think that's the same balance we are working towards on the rental registration, kind of falls in the same vein so there is a lot to discuss on this issue.

MR. GAUGHAN: Right, and when I did speak to the residents at the neighborhood meeting their concern is the degradation of the neighborhood. You know, they don't know who these people are that are coming in from out of town, North Carolina, New York, Pennsylvania, they also have young children are playing in the neighborhood, it's 22 to 30 dollars a night to stay, so I do understand their concerns so I'm glad that this issue is coming up and we are discussing it.

I spoke to a resident the other day who has complaints about the condition of White Birch Drive and Oakwood Drive. The roads are a mess and there are serious drainage problems when it rains so we are going to forward that issue to the DEP to see if they can take a look at it and try to rectify that situation. 3030 Division

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Street there is a storm sewer that has been overflowing and causing water issues in this area. We have just paved Division Street, so I would ask if we can send something out to the DPW. The gentlemen said he called the Sewer Authority and they told him to call the DPW so hopefully they can get out and try to rectify that issue.

I have been speaking to some residents in the Minooka area lately about the unsafe conditions of the two-lane stretch of Birney Avenue that goes up into Davis Street. The street is a speedway and becomes very narrow with cars parking on both sides of the street. In the past. there were conversations and plans of making this into a one-lane road. I did send correspondence to Representative Flynn's Office to see if we can get that conversation started again and to see if we can get the state to improve the safety of this area of Minooka. This highway runs through a residential area and I would like them to take a look again at the makeup of this area and how traffic is regulated

because there have been many accidents in the past couple of years and, as I said, there are children that play in that area and it has been become a major issue.

Also, last week we talked about city employees who possibly owed garbage fees and other things and we did have our solicitor work into possible garnishment of wages if the employees did not come up into a paving plan and if Solicitor Minora could give us an update on that issue.

MR. MINORA: I will. I spoke to the city solicitor's office in Philadelphia and they have a collection method, it is not garnishment. Garnishment is not allowed, however, in the first class city code, which only includes Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, the controller is allowed to direct the Treasurer to withhold a certain percentage of municipal employee's pay to go towards payment of back taxes or service fees so they are able to do that.

I looked into Class 2 Code which includes Class 2A, which is what Scranton is, and we do not have that authority so

it's statutory that Philadelphia can, it's statutory that we cannot do it that way so employees here who fall behind would fall into the same category as any other citizen of city.

MR. GAUGHAN: Okay. Thank you for the update. One final thing, I received actually just today, I received an update on the recycling program in the city from the Business Administrator so I hope we all received it. I will be reviewing that and hopefully we will be able to update everybody on that next week. That's all I have thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Just a follow-up about the Armed Forces parade, the Armed Forces Day parade will take place this Saturday, May 21, starting at 11 a.m. at the Gino Merli Center. The parade will travel on Penn Avenue toward Lackawanna Avenue and Lackawanna Avenue to Linden Street. And as always, when there is a parade downtown please expect traffic delays due to road closures.

To follow-up on the discussions that

that the city has available to it is to pursue the lien process for anyone that doesn't pay their garbage fee, and currently that is what we are doing as a council. We are working towards fine tuning the ordinance and our next step will be to evaluate the lien process because right now this the only option available to us to make people take responsibility for what they owe. 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MR. EVANS: On the question, as we know, a competent of this grant is for a storm water study, that's why I'll be voting to move this forward. This council has been pressing for some sort of study and plans on storm water for months and I'd like to think that this legislation is partially our responsibility because we have been pressing so hard for this, and in all fairness, I'd like to recognize that Marie Schumacher from day one has been instrumental in bringing this issue to our attention. Even though we would have got there anyway, it was brought to our attention much earlier than I think we probably would have reviewed it. contrary to popular belief, we do listen to our speakers. That's all I have on that right now.

MR. ROGAN: I have mixed feelings on this piece of legislation. I will be voting to introduce it. I will continue to read a little bit further and research it a little more as to some of the other aspects before casting a final vote.

MR. WECHSLER: All those in favor of

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introduction -- I'm sorry.

MR. GAUGHAN: That's all right. Yes, on the question, I am taking Mr. Bulzoni's comments into consideration. Ι also understand that he storm water study is a mandate and we have to get that done. Also, the acquisition of a server for the Police Department I can also understand The one part of the grant where I am having a little bit of difficulty is the salary increases. While I would agree with Mr. Bulzoni that all of the people that are getting the salary increases deserve them, you know, the root of my concern with a grant like this is that it's like buying something on a credit card so we don't have to pay it today, but down the road the bill is eventually going to come due and while it may not be a large percentage of the overall budget, when you are a financially distressed city every penny counts, so that's my initial concern after looking at some of the increases, but I will be voting to introduce and send it along for a final vote next week.

MR. ROGAN: I agree, and they are the same concerns that I have as well where there is two components to the grant, well, actually multiple components, the salary component and the everything else component. Obviously, the other items all need to be done one way or another. And the salary items, although the vast majority of the people on that list certainly deserve a salary increase I, too, have a problem with giving those increases at a time when taxes are increasing.

Last year, many department heads contacted all of us on council and pled their case for salary increases and we had to tell them that, you know, now was not the time. I still don't believe now is the time, but obviously there is more than that component here so I will continue to hear the business administrator and administration out and research this legislation.

MR. EVANS: On the question, I might as well weigh in on this salary issue as well. I'll be honest with you, I think our

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salaries for our cabinet members and some of our leadership people are a disgrace and I think they are an embarrassment. They are way too low. They have waited since 2011 for any kind of increase. It was a mistake when they were rolled back the first time and I think that -- I don't think that the salaries that are being proposed, especially with a grant, are going to have one effect, little effect at all on the budget going forward especially in relationship to a tax increase. It just doesn't match up so I may be taking an opposite viewpoint of popular position on this issue, but I really think that we get what we pay for and we have good people, we deserve to pay them an appropriate salary and the salary they are receiving right now as compared to the private sector is just no match up. again, I'll be voting to move this forward.

MR. PERRY: Yeah, on the question, and I fall on the same side of the fence with Mr. Evans on this, when you have a group of employees that are the heart and soul and put in the time to run their office

and their end of the business it's very difficult to replace that. I'll give you an example of the audit department. When we lost some very, very key people in the audit department what happened with the 2014 audit, what happened, what's going to happen with the 2015 audit? We really fell behind when we had some turnover in that department and we can't afford to have that type of turnover.

Now, I do also see the sides of Mr. Gaughan and Mr. Rogan where taking on extra salary at a time when we are in Act 47 is the easiest pill to swallow, but I think what this does for us with the grants it give us no increase in 2016, it only gives us a 33 percent increase in 2017, and a 66 percent increase in the salary in 2018, and that gives us three years of planning to figure out what we are going to do with this extra salary, and the extra salary is not --it's not we are dealing with \$100 million, but it's nothing that -- and if it did and if the taxpayers they were going to feel a pinch because of it I would absolutely not

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be for it because I wouldn't want to pay the extra, but this is something that I believe is the right thing to do. That's all I have.

MR. WECHSLER: I agree with all my colleagues that we do need to do some review on this in terms of a cost benefit analysis. I don't think we can automatically be against paying increases because the city's budget is tight. I work in a business where we evaluate salaries all the time and sometimes we need to pay more to get more productivity and also to get more of a better candidate, and this case necessarily I think we have the candidates on hand, and we are asking people to do more work. are starting to see the benefit of the first round of grants that we applied for and received in the Business Administrator's Office. We can see there has been benefit to that cost. Our reports are being filed on time, we are getting more respect in the financial community, so we are starting to see some of that dividend from those first grants that we applied for so it is very

difficult to increase salaries, but sometimes we say we want to look at the city as a business, in business sometimes you do have to increase salaries. It's just a requirement to get the most out of your business and of your people so I will be also voting to introduce this evening and proceed from there.

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preparation tax is a broader, fairer tax by all standards then the mercantile and business privilege tax we presently have, and also primarily because the legislation now gives a deadline for the implementation and conversion to the payroll tax. There is now a commitment to a changeover that I didn't feel existed with the previous legislation.

Additionally, Senator Blake's further commitment to work on legislation at the state level to have the Scranton School District included in this we can see in the foreseeable future we can become a city that is finally free of the mercantile and business privilege tax once and for all.

It should be noted, none of these things would have happened if this council did not reject the original legislation. I want to thank Mr. Bulzoni for making the necessary changes to the original legislation that allowed this come back for a vote and moving this forward. Finding ways to compromise is something that rarely is on display in government these days but

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it is today. That's all I have.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question, I would agree with Councilman Evans. be voting for final passage of this legislation. We did reach a compromise with Mr. Bulzoni and the administration after much discussion. I am okay with this contract, and just so people understand this is a complimentary program. This is not designed to replace any efforts on behalf of the Single Tax Office so I will be looking closely at the results of this program and in three years we will be able to look back and see what kind of progress we have made. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: I voted against -- well, as we all voted against this legislation last time around and I'm still not convinced for a number of reasons and I strongly agree with what Councilman Evans said regarding the mercantile tax business privilege being a noose around the necks of businesses in the City of Scranton, but the city portion is one-quarter of your total bill. Obviously, we need to do our part.

My concern is that this legislation will be used to ramp up collections on these taxes and they will never go away. As well as I also have concerns that much of the tax collection and in this case audit discovery services can be outsourced in a more efficient manner than in a piecemeal manner by having a third party do one portion and have a government agency do another. My fear is that we are paying twice for some of the same services.

MR. PERRY: On the question, anything that gets rid of the business privilege and mercantile tax I'm certainly in favor for it. You know, we did vote this down but it did come back with enough amendments this time around to satisfy me for a "yes" vote and that's, as Mr. Evans said, he gave us an end date where I was not comfortable with a three-year run running contract with this company because what if we didn't get what we wanted and we are stuck with them for three years and it's just more money we are just throwing away, so I liked the fact that we changed it that

they have a one shot deal one year with the ability if we want to engage in other year and the fact that we now have a hard commitment that study will turn into a payroll prep tax which will get rid of the business privilege and mercantile tax. So for those amendments and for that reason I will be voting yes for this.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, our goal was to get closer to the payroll prep tax and I believe that through compromise we have accomplished this. I'm also anxious to see what is discovered. My opinion is that I personally don't believe that we have this many companies that pay this tax, but I would be happy to be proven wrong or sad to be proven wrong one way or the other, but I just don't see that many companies being able to avoid this for this long a period, but perhaps I may be wrong with that, but we'll see.
