14 I don't agree with his per bag fee, but at

15 least he had an idea. You people are to

16 blame for this lawsuit, you and previous

17 councils. Nobody wants to listen. It's

18 just going to cost the city money and that's

19 unfortunate.

Moving on, I was a little upset to see that two more sores are moving out of the Mall, Victoria Secret and Bath and Body

23 Works, two of the main staples in that

store, and it was on the news that they aregoing to be replaced. Well, you know, I did

- 1 agree with Mr. Basalyga when he took over
- the mall, I thought he was doing a good job,
- 3 but I disagree with what he is doing. I
- 4 think he is trying to make that an office
- 5 building instead of a mall. Instead of
- 6 finding replacements, why didn't he do his
- 7 best to keep these two businesses in the
- 8 mall? He should have given them incentives
- 9 to stay there instead of saying goodbye and
- 10 trying to get new businesses. I was
- 11 impressed in the beginning, but I'm not
- 12 anymore. I don't know think he is the one
- 13 for the job.
- The safety issue now, I live in
- 15 Tripp Park I walk my dog down Dorothy Street
- 16 ever day by the ball fields. At the very
- 17 end of the ball fields, there is batting
- 18 cages. At the end of the fence, there is a
- 19 storm drain, right next to the storm drain
- 20 about two weeks ago a big hole opened up.
- 21 It's about two-feet wide, two-feet deep, and
- 22 it's right off the sidewalk. I think that's
- 23 a safety issue. When I saw it, I wasn't
- 24 sure if anybody called. I figured I'd
- 25 mention while I came here. You know, it's
 - right at the end of the ball field on the
- 2 grass, you can't miss it, just past the
- 3 batting cages.

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- 4 Next thing, I think it was last
 - month, Councilman Perry, you made a motion
- 6 to adjust legislation about the left-turn
- 7 lane on Oram Street and Main Avenue, I
- 8 think, I know I spoke about that. There is
- 9 another one I also spoke about it's on
- 10 Jackson Street Main Avenue, we need a left
- 11 turn lane there going south.
- MR. PERRY: I'm familiar with it
- 13 right on the intersection?
- MR. SPINDLER: Yes. It's headed
- 15 south. There used to be one there then
- 16 after they paved it they never put one
- 17 there. I have brought that up before. And
- 18 lastly, I know in Tripp Park people put
- 19 their Christmas trees out, they used to have
- 20 them down at the end of Bulworth Street by
- 21 the ball fields, I don't know if they still
- 22 have that anymore, but I noticed the people
- 23 in my area they are just putting them out on
- 24 their lawns waiting for garbage pickup. I
- 25 don't think the garbage men will take them,

- 1 but I'm not sure. I don't know if anybody
- 2 knows anything about that. For years they
- 3 have been put down by the ball fields. They
- 4 only have to go to one spot to pick them up
- 5 and recycle them. I don't think they should
- 6 be taken by the garbage, I think they should
- be taken somewhere and recycled.
 - MR. EVANS: I agree.
- 9 MR. SPINDLER: If we could look into
- **10** that.

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- MR. ROGAN: I did see in my
- 12 neighborhood a couple of trees get thrown in
- 13 the back of the garbage truck,
- 14 unfortunately, and --
 - MR. SPINDLER: That's not right.
- MR. ROGAN: No, it's not.
- MR. SPINDLER: They used to grind
- 18 them up and use it for mulch and stuff like
- **19** that.
- MR. EVANS: Right. I thought I read
- 21 somewhere in the paper that that's what they
- 22 were instructing everybody to do was put
- 23 them out on the curb. I agree they should
- 24 be recycled.
 - MR. SPINDLER: For years, like I
 - said, where I live they have been taking
- 2 them down by the ball fields.
- 3 MR. EVANS: They should at least
- 4 give somebody the option of doing what
- 5 exactly what you are saying, take them some
- 6 place in a central area, if you want to, so
- 7 they will be recycled.
- 8 MR. SPINDLER: All right. If you
- 9 can look into that. Thank you.
- MR. WECHSLER: Bob Bolus.
- MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.
- 12 Bob Bolus, Scranton. You know, I was out of
- 13 town and I come back here and, you know, I
- to town and I come back here and, you know, I
- 14 started reading some of the things that went
- on here, I have never seen more inefficient
- 16 leadership than what we are seeing now.
- 17 Your business administrator, the guru of
- 18 finances, doesn't know what the heck we are
- 19 getting, how much it cost, doesn't
- 20 understand debit and credit, two plus two is
- 21 two, two minus two is zero, to know how much
- 22 money we are getting out of these sales? We
- 23 are totally clueless. Nobody has a
- 24 direction of what we are going to do, where
- 25 we are going to do, how we are going to pay

1 it off. What are we going to do in the 2

future?

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And then simplicity, and the 3 absolute joke in I don't know what that is, 4

I can't even read it, "D" and "E", we have

two authorities, what are we doing with the 6

Sewer Authority? I thought we sold

everything. What incompetent individuals

sold the assets and then you have an

10 Authority that you are going to beg people

or have people on a payroll.

MR. WECHSLER: There is no one on

13 the payroll. It's just a board.

MR. BOLUS: Why do we have even have

15 the authority at all?

MR. WECHSLER: Because there is 16 outstanding -- outstanding litigation and 17

outstanding bills. 18

MR. BOLUS: That passes onto the

other end. You don't need people in the 20

Authority to sit there on outstanding bills 21

22 and issues. That's your business

23 administrator should know what the hell he

is doing. 24

You also got the same issue with

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your Parking Authority, keeping the Parking

Authorities. What do we need all of these

authorities for those operations? It's

ludicrous. On this here, I'd like see \$3.5

million put back into where the golf course 5

money came out, like it should have stayed 6

there perpetually and the interest only 7

perpetually to be used for park and 8

recreation. That's common sense. 9

You know, it's like asking you guys, 10

how many of you guys have millions of 11

12 dollars to throw around and just squander it

13 here and squander it there and then wonder

if you are broke tomorrow. That's what we

are doing here. I just get sick to my 15

stomach watching stupidity that goes on with 16

17 this administration downstairs. Your

business administration is a great guru, he 18

can save this. You don't sell assets that 19

can make you money and then squander the 20

money after you get more assets other than

the Taj Mahal here of higher learning, is 22

23 that what this is? You know, I hate to come

in and insult people, but I have lived in 24

this community my whole life. I have been a

business here, I know what it takes to be a

builder, and what I see here between counsel

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the administration you are not builders, you

are actually destroyers of our tax base.

You are destroying it. You gave \$5 million

to the mall for parking. Who the heck cares

if somebody comes to Scranton and parks in

the mall? Put it towards your pension fund,

put it towards something else. Put it

towards tax reduction to the people. You 10

11 give it to the mall? You give him almost \$2

million to pick up a parking garage to fix 12

it? That's \$7 million. Would you spend 13

your 7 million bucks like that? I don't 14

15 think so, but this is what's wrong with

what's going on, so let look at it a little 16

differently. It's up to you gentlemen and 17

the mayor to reassess the mall. It's still 18

assessed at \$3 million. Complete ludicrous 19

actions of what we are doing. I don't know 20

care how much Basalyga makes, all the money 21

22 he makes doesn't put it in your pocket,

doesn't give you a million dollars. Doesn't 23

give anybody out here a million bucks or 24

25 \$1,000 or anybody to go anywhere else, but

he will buy more and more and more because

of our stupidity and our leadership and the

trust we put in people. I'm asking here and

now that you people push to reassess that

mall at what it should be. 5

When I bought the Holy Cross Church, 6

just like that they reassessed it at a half 7

a million bucks. A church they were going

to tear it down, a hall that I let the kids

play free in, yet, nobody said nothing about 10

it. I want the mall reassessed. That's our 11

12 right in this community and that's your job.

13 Your job is to build a tax base, not

decrease it, and you just can't keep doing 14

and doing what's going on here. I mean, we 15

are going bullied every day we walk into the 16

17 city.

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Now, as you know, I brought the

Trump organization to Scranton, I brought us 19

20 into the limelight worldwide, not locally,

worldwide. I was proud to say I was from 21

Scranton, but let me tell you something, 22

23 what I can see now, I'm ashamed of myself to

say I'm from Scranton when I see the 24

incompetence of the leadership and there he 25

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wants to drain the swamp. Here we need to

drain the mines and get action, get

aggressive, and do what leadership is

supposed to do, that's lead by example. You 4 5

are not doing it.

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MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. BOLUS: Assess the mall, let's

be fair for everybody in this town and 8

that's your job to do and I think the mayor

10 has got to get off his butt and start doing

11 something instead of talking. And as far as

12 Amoroso goes, I wish he went back to Newark

where he belongs because he's not the kind 13

of guy to build this city. You do not get

rid of your assets, be left with a pension 15

debt and a future debt. You guys have no 16

17 idea how much you are going to pay it.

Thank you. 18

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Bolus.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. I

22 phoned a friend of mine last night in

23 Hawaii, it was 84 degrees. I just thought

I'd throw that in. In the paper last week 24

25 was a little article from 50 years ago it

20

says the Scranton School Board and the

Council were trying to get together to

3 figure out how to recover some lost taxes.

Fifty years went by, still nothing is done.

That Pennwood Manor is full. I don't know 5

how many been through there, they owe

7 \$52,000, why won't somebody just close it?

They are never going to pay us. Why don't

you close it and squeeze some money out of

them. That bad D & D is over 100 real 10

estate companies in developers, some of them 11

12 are receiving our taxpayer money in gold and

13 grants and loan forgiveness. They owe

hundreds of thousands of dollars, some of

you saw it in the paper. Why don't they do 15

something? Why can't these houses be 16

17 condemned until they pay us for these

properties. You go after somebody who was 18

in the same paper for \$300 while these

people owe hundreds of thousands. You guys 20

need to do something to earn your keep up

there. I don't know. I don't know what we 22

23 are getting for our dollar. I'm not

24 scolding you, it just comes out.

Our mayor mistakenly shouts praises

for the Amoroso plan. This is one of the

biggest causes of the whole mess financially

that we are in. From the rooftops the other

day everything was the Amoroso plan and how

great it is, how great the city is doing.

It's not. You know, all I hear you're just

interested in wasting more money downtown

and taking care of the mall. You don't take

9 of our neighborhoods. My neighbor pays \$100

10 (unintelligible), he is out of Avoca. You

11 have allowed him to destroy a whole

neighborhood without lifting a finger. 12

Nothing, and nothing is being done about all 13

14 of these people and there is no doubt that

15 the people are just going to be hit terrible

by the new skyrocketing rates. You won't be 16

17 able to flush a toilet or something, it's

going to be -- this deal is just rushed 18

through without any thinking, without all of 19

the knowledgeable people that were involved 20

and gave advice and knew what to do. 21

22 This is the Amoroso plan at work,

23 6,000 people in foreclosures. Money just

being wasted, just like the giving away of 24

25 the parking garage. Our voices aren't

heard. People tell you things up here week

after week and they just go in one ear and out the other. This administration doesn't

hear a thing that people say or do or

comment. It's like a factious regime down

there that just won't hear the individuals

no more. We put you in those seats and you

don't care. You don't care what everybody

says in here. There is all kinds of great

suggestions week after week after week that 10

go nowhere. They are not even mentioned in 11

12 the paper. This is a -- this no way to run

13 a city, I tell you.

> I get the Memphis paper every so often and they don't have problems like

this. They don't have the runaway, 16

17 out-of-control school board, there is over

800 teachers for over 10,000 people, pupils. 18

What's that like, a dozen pupils for every 19

teacher and all they do is whine and 20

21 complain they can't handle what's going on

and then we have to listen to this nonsense 22

23 about pensions. They create poverty. They

24 create these problems just like you have

done up there. You are not taking care of 25

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the city like it should be. Thank you. 1

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. ELLMAN: And I expected to see 3 you at the blight meeting and you weren't 4

5 there. It was very good and I really

6 learned a few things I didn't know nothing

7 about, you know. It was a very good meeting

and you need to congratulate them. It's a 8

9 good plan.

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MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

You know, tonight, you know, I just hope 13 that the residents of this city would pay 14

attention to the things I'm going to say 15

tonight, not that you don't generally pay 16

17 attention to every speaker, but there is an

election year coming and it's so vitally 18

important and, look it, don't let 19

personalities come into this, you got to 20

clean house this time. The three council 21

22 members that are seated are going to be up

23 have to go. The mayor has to go. We just

can't create another authority in this city 24

25 and we have got to realize from the give and

take that we have had here in this chamber

that none of the people that were elected to 2

represent us had any idea what this deal 3

meant or how it was structured. 4

Now, I will acknowledge that, you 5

know, they probably didn't have the 6

7 experience necessary to understand that, but

8 they could have reached out to the people

and they never should have even introduced

this legislation and that goes to the 10

council president because I don't think a 11

12 council president should introduce

13 legislation he doesn't understand, and I

don't think that legislators should vote on

something they don't understand. 15

And what's happened in this city for a long time is too many people in this city came up with excuses why we kept following this train and there was really no need for it because the decline in our neighborhoods

was caused by the voters, and it's time 21

really, really time to stand up and vote all 22

23 of these people out of office and everybody

over the top of them. 24

Now, we just through Hillary Clinton

in the water nationally, okay? She never

should have came out, Bernie Sanders should

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have came out but, you know, they are

talking about how the Russians hacked us.

You know, look it, America has been playing

in other people's elections for decades, but

now we really know the stuff that's going on

behind the scenes. All of the pay-to-play

9 politics and all of the corruption, and I

10 have to say to the seniors and the young

11 people in this community, why do you have to

live like this? Why do we have all of this 12

blight in the neighborhood? Why is all of 13

14 the money going into the downtown? Where

15 did Mr. Amoroso come from? Why were these

assets sold? Why are we trying to discuss 16

17 where the proceeds from this sale are going

to go when the pension is so severely 18

underfunded? Why? I don't even understand 19

why a lot of these things even took place 20

considering that they haven't made the city

22 solvent and they haven't answered one

financial problem this city has, and I have 23

to ask why we are not cutting the budget. 24

And the city doesn't even have a

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plan for the storm water collection system, as a matter of fact, in the deal they gave

away the money to maintain the storm water

collection system because it was already in

the old rate, but then we have elected

officials here who have no concern for the

people who elect them, have no concern for 7

the legislation they introduced in this

chamber, and the damage they do to our city

and our neighborhoods, and they all look 10

good with their little pretty suits on, but 11

12 like I said here once before at this podium,

13 we sent the monkey around the earth in a

space suit but he wasn't an astronaut. 14

And, you know, when you listen to 15 the silliness and the questions asked here 16

17 week after week and no answers, why would

they care what the surfs say as long you do 18

what you are told? And that's exactly what 19 it's come to in our country, is that our 20

elected government thinks that we are their 21

servant. They take our pay, they tax it, 22

23 they waste every dime they collect and then

24 we put people in cheap suits in front of us, well, probably expensive suits, but they 25

27 offer no meaningful legislation, and here's short, why was the letter sent to the

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the city that's been distressed for over 25

years and don't have one answer and neither

does our state representatives or our state

senators, and what did our federal senators

6 and federal congressmen have to offer us?

7 Nothing. It's very troubling, extremely

troubling. So do we really have an elected 8

government by the people for the people, or

10 are we just cash cows that you roll out and

11 patronize at election time and rob us the

rest of the time? Because we still have no

storm water collection plan ahead of us, and 13

14 the truth of the matter is the city has to

15 cut it's budget to fund that, okay? We

don't need another authority, we don't need 16

17 anybody else borrowing and borrowing and

piling more debt on us, look at the average 18

homeowner in this city, their properties are 19

worthless basically, and then we have a 20

21 council that's talks about reassessment.

22 Well, Mr. Bolus just brought that up at the

23 mall, but I guess it's who you are connected

to and whether things work for you or not. 24

25 Thank you, and I hope the people vote all of

these people out of office.

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2 MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

3 MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

Marie Schumacher. I, too, was confused when 4

I opened the paper and saw in the legal 5

section that the Scranton Sewer Authority's 6

7 meetings, they're quarterly meetings now

8 instead of monthly for the Year 2017. I

think you are sending mixed messages to us.

10 You terminated it, are you trying to tell us

that this sewer deal is going to go on 11

12 through 2017 or God forbid five years?

MR. WECHSLER: The obligation of the

14 Sewer Authority will, yes.

MS. SCHUMACHER: They will do what?

MR. WECHSLER: The obligation for

17 the Sewer Authority, I'll read an

explanation later on. 18

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. I hope 19

you are available for questions after that. 20

The list of the questions last week you said 21

that you were going to ask the mayor whether 22

or not he knew about the shortfall before 23

24 the -- second before it hit the papers and

we found out at the closing that we were

Scranton Sewer Authority instead of the

mayor? 3

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4 MR. WECHSLER: Because the questions

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that were generated from council were really 5

6 questions for the Sewer Authority because

they handle the negotiations.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Can we get a copy

of those questions? 9

10 MR. WECHSLER: If council doesn't

11 mind, yes.

12 MR. GAUGHAN: Well, it's a public

13 document, so --

14 MR. WECHSLER: And we just give them

15 the courtesy to get the questions answered.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I would like 16

17 a copy. Also, can we get a copy of the RFP

or at least the statement of the work for 18

the 5-C contract that you will be voting in 19

favor of next week for the storm water? I'd 20

like to know what's in that and a 21

22 Right-to-Know isn't going to do anything, so

23 if you have that I would like to get a copy

of that to review. Thank you. 24

It's been a couple of the weeks 25

since I reported on the home sales, or the sales of property I should say. Through

today's paper, there have been 2,129

properties in the county that have been sold. Of those 489 or 23 percent of them

have been Scranton properties and of those 6

7 489, 48 percent have been below the common

level ratio. I mean, that's been pretty

consistent, but what blew me away is when I

posted the sale of the Samter's building. 10

11 Now, I was happy that Mr. Jefferson got it

12 because he seems to do very good job with

13 every property that he has, but that

14 property, improvements on that property with

just the building itself \$10,000. Now, if 15

16 that doesn't scream for reassessment I'd

17 like to know what does. I mean, he

bought -- first of all, he buys the building 18

19 for 5.3, an actual ratio of 5.3, not even

20 close to the 6.94 CLR and, I mean, that is

21 totally crazy.

22 Now, what I'm going to ask you 23 people to do you, as a taxing authority,

24 have the ability to go to any of those

meetings, you have the ability to ask for a 25

31 1 reassessment of any property up or down, would you start taking advantage of that? 2 This is crazy. I mean, I just -- I'm going to go down and check the card because I 4 can't believe that posting would be real. 5 6 MR. EVANS: Yeah, I can't either. 7 That can't be right. MS. SCHUMACHER: Do you have the 8 breakdown of the costs of the parking lease 9 10 transaction that were associated with that 11 and the Sewer Authority sale to date? MR. EVANS: Well, some of the -- we 12 are working on those costs for the Sewer 13 Authority, but I don't have it for the 14 15 Parking Authority. That was one of questions in our letter. 16 MR. GAUGHAN: Someone with the 17 Parking Authority, and we just got it in our 18 mail tonight, somebody sent us this. I'm 19 just looked at it briefly before the 20 meeting, but someone sent us a breakdown of 21

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what we paid for that. MR. GAUGHAN: I believe this is it, but I'd have to look at it for you. MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I don't know, I mean, I don't know where they got that -you received it. I would prefer that you validate that first with the authorities before you do that.

the legal fees for the Parking Authority.

incidentals, whether it was legal fees or

financially, anything that was associated,

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, all of

Is that what you looking for?

9 10 Also, you approve over the course of a year a lot of grant applications 11 12 submittals, if I may finish this, I would 13 like to request that you start tracking those and let us know what happens so that we can -- whether those grants are actually 15 obtained or whether they expired. I don't 16 17 know, does a grant applications expire? I would assume there is a closure date? 18 MR. WECHSLER: It depends. It 19 depends where you're applying. 20 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, could we 21 start tracking those and having the office 22

keep a log of those? 23 24 MR. ROGAN: They don't expire. They are either approved or denied at the end of

1 the grant, particularly the LSA's or the -2 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, that's what I just said. So, okay, if that's true then I would ask that you would start tracking those. If I approve them, we should track them. Thank you. I'll be back next week with the rest, good Lord willing. MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. 8

Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer. First, I'd like to mention tonight our Lackawanna and Wyoming "T" in the road by the mall, something has got to get done with that. MR. EVANS: You know, I agree 100 percent.

15 MR. DOBRZYN: People got -- knocked 16 over a guy with--17

MR. EVANS: I understand that, but if you're going down Wyoming Avenue, the light turns green, people walking across Wyoming the light is green, if you're walking across Lackawanna you have the walk sign. It's bizarre. I know they made some changes but that --

MR. DOBRZYN: I had a lady, I had about three or four feet to stop in a week

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or so. 1 2 MR. EVANS: I don't know why they can't do what they did at the University of Scranton and Linden Street and Jefferson, just stop traffic from all points of that intersection --6 7 MR. DOBRZYN: It's a must. MR. EVANS: -- for people to walk. 8

MR. DOBRZYN: It's a must. It's 9 gone too far. I have a big foot and it 10 seems like the design of my car, the size 12 11 12 shoe fits right over both brakes and 13 accelerator and I have to watch that all of the time, but that lady had about five feet 14 and I was already making the turn. It's 15 bad. 16

One of the things I caught in the sewer thing was there was -- out of that 38 million there was 12 million allegedly done in upgrades, and I don't know why, but apparently the water company didn't consider that work paid for, there's a little concern there 12 million. And with these trash lawsuits from

24 landlords, first of all, we still don't know 25

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how many units they have in many cases, so

I'll mention that on behalf of the city, we

have to find out, but landlords especially

have a lot -- or potentially a lot of people

to the school system, and it's very 5

expensive. We had two families move into a

four-unit that I was renting years ago and 7

that's when the consternation started, and 8

up in the country it's not the Sewer

10 Authority, it's the septic tank, so we are

11 getting really to a point where there were

12 ready to just shut us down and tell us we

had to move over, and when I heard between 13

the lines, because I got to know a lot of

people in town, I live here about 13 years, 15

lucky number, but the house caught fire in 16

17 13 years, it was more of an issue of a lot

of people moving in with children. They 18

didn't want the amount of children 19

increasing in the school district thanks to 20

a landlord, so -- which it is an expense and 21

22 it's not spread out very well, the whole

23 system isn't.

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Now, just briefly, I have a little thing here, I got some bad news I'm okay,

but I had to stress test because I don't

know what's going to be happening with

insurance in the future, so I thought I 3

would take advantage of it, it's been a long

time since I had one, but I got this little

form on Geisinger, "You may qualify for

7 assistance if your household income is 300

percent or less than current federal poverty

guidelines. To determine if you qualify for

financial assistance, here's the income 10

matrix book as a guide to determine whether 11

your income is less than -- " well, yada, 12

13 yada. Household size 1, 35,640 -- \$36,640,

so the point is our Congress is messing

around with the insurance and plans to 15

repeal and whatever, but this is based on a

17 law that was enacted during Ronald Reagan

years and because people were laying out in 18

the ER room and not dying, you know, outside

of the ER room. I'll try and bring this 20

back next week, but the point being get 21

ready and if that be the case you might be 22

going to a third rate hospital some day even 23

24 though you are paying off a grand for

insurance. Thank you and have a good night. 25

1 Don't believe everything you hear.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia,

citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians,

you claim that had nothing to do with the 4 sale of the Sewer authority, didn't you,

every one of your members vote for the

recovery plan, and didn't the recovery plan call for the sell of the Sewer authority? 8

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, it did.

10 MR. SBARAGLIA: Selling the assets and leasing the assets, so you can't wash

11 12 your hands of it. Your hands are in there

just as well as anyone else, plus you

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concurred with the people that are put on 14

15 the Board that did sell the Sewer Authority.

And another thing is you cannot

17 dissolve the Sewer Authority unless they dissolve it themselves. I was told the only 18

way an Authority can be dissolved is they 19

have to do it, and they were given \$5 20

million to forget about doing it until that 21

22 money is gone. This is what I mean. That

23 deal was not a great deal. I just got a

letter, I guess every resident in Scranton 24

25 got one, too, saying you will not be billed

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once a month for the sewer cost. Now, I haven't seen the actual cost of it, but I

don't know, as you know, there is a fixed

cost associated with it. Currently we're

paying \$5 a month for the fixed cost. I

don't know what the fixed cost will be under

the water company. Did you ever ask what

the fixed cost would be? No, I don't think

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you did. You weren't interested. 9

10 You got to look at or the citizens a lot better than you are doing. There is lot 11 12 of elderly in Scranton, many, many of you 13 got mothers, I don't know how you can turn

14 your back on them. You got to look at

everything associated with costs. I don't 15

know how bad the water costs would be for 16

17 the storm drains. I'm mentioned it last

meeting, you said there will be not costs, 18

but the thing is maybe I didn't explain it 19

properly. I was talking about the dedicated 20

21 lines for the water, not the sanitary, but

for the water and they have plans to charge 22

us for any work they do on them lines. Did 23

24 you not know that? I told you about it, you

should have looked into it a little better 25

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- 1 or pay a little more attention to it because
- if we get costs for any of them lines that
- 3 has to be repaired, and we have no way of
- 4 repairing them at the present time because
- 5 we do not have the equipment. The equipment
- 6 was all sold off, and if you have any idea
- 7 what kind of equipment we are going to need
- 8 for that storm drain all you have to do is
- 9 ask what equipment we sold and we are going
- 10 to need some of them, maybe not as many, but
- 11 we are going to need the same type of
- 12 equipment.

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13 And then you plan to come up with 14 another Authority, Scranton needs more

- 15 authorities, there is no question about it,
- 16 we don't have enough authorities. We need
- 17 more and more independent governments hiring
- 18 more people and more lawyers and bringing
- 19 the cost of living in this city to a sky
- 20 high amount. I don't know how you can do
- 21 that. I don't know how you can look at an
- 22 elderly person and say, "We are going to
- 23 increase the costs of you living in the city
- 24 so you can't live in the city."

I hope none of you buy any property

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- from the land bank when they go up for sale.
- 2 That was awful bad if you raised the taxes
- 3 real high and then got property from the
- 4 land bank. That wouldn't sit too right with
- 5 the people of Scranton. There is no more to
- 6 say, the damage is done.
 - I told you before, selling the
- 8 garages for a dollar, like Mr. Bolus pointed
- 9 out, is -- his church cost was \$500,000
- 10 something or like that he said, but we sold
- 11 the garage that it costs million to build
- 12 for a dollar, and plus gave we gave another
- 13 \$2 1/2 million to repair the garage, and
- 14 that gave them 4.1 million for leasing space
- 15 in that garage, and I told you the liability
- 16 we have is tremendous. If for some reason
- 17 that mall should close, we are responsible
- 18 to keep that garage open. We are
- 19 responsible for keeping all of the garages
- 20 open even if they fall apart. How are they
- 21 going to be in 10 years, 15 years? No one
- 22 knows, but we going to be stuck with the
- 23 costs.
- MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?
- 25 MS. GAUGHAN: Good evening. Mary

- I Gaughan, Adams Avenue, Scranton. Since the
- 2 last council meeting another pedestrian has
- 3 been killed in the City of Scranton. If
- 4 that is not indicative that something needs
- 5 to be done, I don't know what is. We had
- 6 someone killed in front of the mall last
- 7 year, we had someone in the last two months
- B die in the hospital that was hit by a
- 9 vehicle at Court and Main.

Now, I don't know and I'm not here

- 11 to say who is responsible, but I think that
- 12 the police they have lot of on their plate
- 13 but they better look to see the way the
- 14 people drive around the city. Sometimes I
- 15 think we are at the Pocono 500, and it's not
- 16 fair to anyone and there are far too many
- 17 people who try to squeeze the yellow out of
- 18 the yellow out light to the point that they
- 19 going through red lights. Recently, a woman
- 20 hit the Trifecta down at the courthouse.
- 21 She breezed through a light, hit an off-duty
- 22 state trooper that was on his way to testify
- 23 at the courthouse, and then some other
- 24 driver, so I don't know what the answer is
- 25 but I think someone should seriously think

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1 about it.

2 And tonight I traveled on Cedar

- 3 Avenue in the vicinity of Pennswood Manor,
- 4 that is probably a state highway, but it was
- 5 like somebody bombed the street. Someone
- 6 suggested it was PAWC pave cuts. Whatever
- 7 it is, it should be addressed.

8 And, also, there are still far too

- 9 many streetlights out in the City of
- 10 Scranton. I'm not applying for the job, but
- 11 maybe you should have a temporary
- 12 streetlight inspector that goes out in the
- 13 evening and sees where all of the lights are
- 14 out because they are considerable.

And on a positive note, I was at the

- 16 mall today, I want to commend the city
- 17 fathers because things are definitely
- 18 looking up, and all of the time you receive
- 19 blame but in this instance I think you
- 20 should get kudos. Somebody is doing
- 21 something right. Thank you.
 - MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.
 - MR. WECHSLER: Mary, we did submit
- 24 your list that you provided to me, I gave it
- 25 to Mrs. Reed and she submitted it to

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MS. GAUGHAN: Now, I noticed this evening there were lights out in the block of Wyoming Avenue, I guess it's the 300 where the Cathedral is. I think we ow it to our pedestrians and our drivers they could see at night in the winter.

MR. WECHSLER: Just for your own information, that Wyoming Avenue section there by St. Luke's Church and the Cathedral, that's all being reevaluated for a whole new system there.

MS. GAUGHAN: Well, what do you in the mean time? Let people hit people with their vehicles? I'm not being sarcastic.

MR. WECHSLER: No, that is something, the light fixtures themselves are broken so replacing the lights aren't an option.

MS. GAUGHAN: Well, I'm telling you, 20 travel around the city in the evening and 21 22 you are going to be quite surprised. There 23 are lights out on Wyoming Avenue down by that Freidman Electrical. I'm not speaking 24 25 of one or two lights, I'm speaking of maybe

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MR. WECHSLER: Right. 2

MS. GAUGHAN: Thank you. 3

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

MOTIONS. 5

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry? 6

MR. PERRY: Yes, thank you. A 7

8 couple of things to talk about from last

week, there was a gentleman here from Keyser

Valley that spoke on the ongoing flooding 10

issues that they are having, so I promised 11

12 him I would like into the two new pumps that

13 were installed on Merrifield Avenue and the

drainage pipe issue, too. I had time to

speak with director of the DPW, Mr. Rendell 15

-- or Mr. Gallagher, there was a "G" stuck 16

17 in my head somewhere, Dennis Gallagher, and

he did say that when they did tests on the 18

19 two pumps there was one pump that was

working at 100 percent and the other pump 20

that was only working at 15 percent, so the 21

pump that was working at 15 percent has to 22

23 be replaced with a brand new pump. Both

24 pumps have been tested. They are now

operating at 100 percent and there should be 25

1 no problem moving water from that retention pond into the creek close by.

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The drainage pipe, that's the other 3 situation that we need to get to. My 4 colleagues and I in caucus discussed the drainage pipe and what the best action to go at right now we need to determine is it a

sewer line, drainage line or dual usage. It

is dual usage, it will fall under the 9

10 American Water Company responsibility to 11

maintain, fix, repair, what have you.

So, Ms. Reed, if you would, if we 12 can have a letter sent out to the American 13 Water Company, I believe it was Jerry Hall, 14 15 if I'm not mistaken, to find out if that drainage pipe on Merrifield is, in fact, 16 their responsibility. If so, then we can move forward with the fix on that. 18

Some new business, Doherty Street was brought up with the ball field, a hole opened up, and that's something that's a little bit more time sensitive. If we can make a call in the morning to DPW about that situation just to we can get some boots on

25 the ground over there to see what the

situation is if it actually needs something

immediately done, I don't want that to go on

a couple of days or over the weekend if

there is an issue, especially if it's at

that field, and if we could maybe send

something out, copy Mr. Fallon at parks and

Rec to get him involved just so he knows 7

8 there is an issue there as well.

And as far as the turning lane on Jackson Street, Jackson and Main, is that the corner there where the old bank was? 12 Okay, if we can send a letter out to the 13 engineering problem and Mr. Pocius and see if we can follow the same line that we did 14 to get the one by Oram Street corrected, maybe we can get this one resolved in a timely fashion like we did the other one.

A bit of good news, I have had my e-mail filled up a little bit with people having some issues with TV's, computers not being picked up, some people have TV's on the side of the road that's outside of their house that's been unsightly, I sent some communications to the mayor, he has gotten back to me. What the Department of Public

- 1 Works is going to offer in this spring they
- 2 are going to do it one time in the spring
- 3 and one time in the fall, they are going to
- 4 put a dumpster outside and that's going to
- **5** be used free of charge for Scranton
- 6 residents to get rid of old TV's and
- 7 computers and big electronic that garbage
- 8 men won't take and there is nothing they can
- 9 do with it. So, again, it's going to be set
- 10 up, it's going to be free of charge and
- 11 that's going to be -- the date hasn't been
- 12 set, but it's going to one for spring
- 13 cleaning and then right before the winter
- 14 hits they are going to set the dumpster up
- 15 again outside the DPW facility. All we need
- 16 to do is show our Scranton badge, Scranton
- 17 ID, what have you, and it's going to be free
- 18 of charge. That's all I have this week.
- MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Mr.

20 Rogan?

- MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you. A
- 22 couple of items. The first one is the
- 23 double pension issue regarding the subpoenas
- 24 that city council issued probably over two
- 25 months ago at this point. I did have a
- 48
- lengthy conversation with Attorney Minora
- about this earlier in the week, him being an
- 3 attorney he can explain much better than I
- 4 can a summary of that conversation and where
- 5 we can stand so I'll turn it over to
- 6 Attorney Minora at this point.
- 7 MR. MINORA: The counsel for the
- 8 state police filed a motion to quash the
- 9 subpoenas, I think I mentioned this to
- 10 council last week, and today we filed our
- 11 answer to the motion to quash. The council
- 12 for the state police cited what's called
- 13 Criminal History and Information Records Act
- 14 as a bar to just releasing that without a
- 15 Court order, so in producing the motion and
- 16 our answer we have brought that issue to a
- 17 Court, I presume we are going to have a
- 18 briefing schedule and perhaps an argument in
- 19 which case the Court will either issue an
- 20 order or not based on the act that I just
- 21 talked about, and if so then we -- the state
- 22 police would be obligated to either turn
- 23 that over to us or take an appeal. I can't
- 24 speak for them, so I don't know and the flip
- 25 side of that is if we are denied an order

- our choices are to either take an appeal or
- e abandon the effort. So I'll keep you
- 3 abreast of anything further, the answer was
- 4 just filed today.

5 MR. ROGAN: Thank you very much,

Attorney Minora. And again, this has been a

7 longstanding issue that we have been trying

8 to get answers on, I think there is maybe

9 light at the end of the tunnel following our

10 day in Court, but I'm very anxious to see

11 what is in those state police reports. I

12 know the public is, and it's something that

13 the whole double pension issue is something

14 I'll be keep pushing hard on regardless of

15 the outcome of that Court case.

Next, it was reported in the paper this week with the Lincoln Jackson school in

18 West Scranton, and I was contacted by a

19 number of residents in that part of West

20 Side following that article. Those who

don't know, the Lincoln Jackson school

22 closed many years ago and it has since

23 become an eyesore in that neighborhood. The

24 school district, I believe, it was about

25 five or six years ago actually offered that

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- 1 building to the city to make a park.
- 2 Obviously, the city being as cash strapped
- 3 as we are, and to boot the neighbors weren't
- 4 in support of having a park. They wanted
- 5 the building to remain and have it be
- 6 rehabbed. There is much sentimental value
- 7 in that building where a lot of people in
- 8 that neighborhood actually went to school
- 9 there and also it's, you know, a sturdy
- 10 building. There is nothing wrong with the
- 11 building as far as the structure goes.

12 The school district did have an

13 assessment done on the building, an

14 appraisal. Bids were received, but they

were far below what that appraisal was. The

building was reappraised so from talking toAttorney John Minora over at the Scranton

18 School District, it seems there is a very

19 good chance that it's going to go back out

20 to bid, and I hear the neighbors are very

21 excited to have somebody purchase that

22 building and rehab it and have something in

23 there again.

So if my colleagues are agreeable, I'd like to send a letter to the Scranton

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school directors at the request of the

neighbors in part of West Scranton asking

that they do pursue as quickly as possible

getting the Lincoln Jackson school back out 4

to bid so a buyer can be found and that

property can get back on the tax rolls,

number one, and to eliminate that blight in 7

that neighborhood. So if everyone is in

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agreement, if we can please send that 10 letter.

11 Next, following up on something that

Mr. Spindler mentioned and Mr. Perry as 12

well, the Christmas tree issue I was 13

14 planning on addressing this. In my

15 neighborhood garbage is picked up on

Mondays, and as I was going to work I 16

17 noticed one of my neighbors had a tree out

and went in the back in the same garbage 18

truck that my garbage just went into. I was 19

very upset to see this, and I remember being 20

younger that there was a certain date when 21

22 the trees would go out and they would

actually go through the neighborhood and 23

mulch them and I would like to correspond 24

with the DPW director and first see what the 25

current DPW policy is on Christmas trees.

What I would like to see happen is these

trees can be made into mulch, and the city

and Parks and Recreation are spending money

on mulch every year in the parks, so it

sounds like it really could one of those 6

situations where we can save money at the 7

dump, help the environment and save the cost

on purchasing mulch for our parks in the

10 city, so that's something that I hope that

we can get to the bottom of and come up with

12 a solution whether it's, you know, certain

13 neighborhoods, dumped in certain parts, or a

citywide pickup. 14

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And, I'm also very pleased with Mr. Perry reporting about the city we are now going to electronics. The garbage dump will not accept old TV's, and you may notice throughout a lot of the neighborhoods the

garbage men do not take TV's, where if you 20

put one out for -- in your garbage, and it's 21

not that they don't want to do it or they 22

23 can't do it because the dump won't accept

24 them. So I think this iis definitely a step

in the right direction to allow the city

residents a couple of the times a year a

place to dump electronics legally and/or

hopefully they will get recycled, again, to

help the environment and to make it easier

for the residents to dispose of these items.

That is all for tonight. Thank you very

7 much.

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MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.

Mr. Evans? 9

10 MR. EVANS: Thank you. Councilman 11 Rogan and I received an e-mail from Jennifer

Spitler, Director of the Neighborhood 12

Development for Neighbor Works with an 13

14 update on the Scranton Homebuyer Assistance

15 Program. If you recall, this is the program

that was developed to use the proceeds from 16

17 the foreclosure registration fee to assist

new homebuyers with exterior improvements to 18

their homes in Scranton. To date, we have 19

approximately \$30,000 in the account for the 20

21 program and the e-mail reads in part, "We

22 have four applicants in progress, two

23 applicants are approved, one for roof

24 replacements and one for siding replacement.

Work for both homes likely to begin by the 25

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end of the month, but the first two 1

approvals both are first time home buyers in

Scranton, and both applicants explained that

the funds they will be awarded was a major

factor in their decision to purchase their 5

homes in Scranton." 6

So if anybody wants more information 7

on the program, you can call Jennifer

Spitler at 570-558-2490. This is a great 9

program and all of us should be proud that 10

the initiative came from this city council. 11

12 On the arts, I don't want to comment

13 directly on the arts in today's paper, but I

would like to at least express my viewpoint 14

15 on the arts and culture. First of all, a

vital art and culture climate brings 16

17 vitality to a community. Some of the direct

18 outputs that are arts and culture bring to a

community are, it will improve a community's 19

competitive edge. It creates a foundation 20

for defining a sense of place. It attracts 21

new and visiting populations, also, known as 22

23 tourists, and that's a good thing. It can

24 also help to integrate a vision for the

community. The America Planning Association 25

cites in a briefing paper on this subject

that "Economic development is enhanced by 2

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concentrating on creativity through physical

density and human capital. By creating a 4

concentration in firms, artists, cultural

6 facilities together an economic multiplier

effect can result. The recognition of a 7

community's art and culture assets and 8

marketing of them is an important element

10 and driver of economic development."

So we should never take light of the value and impact that comes from a strong arts and culture community. In many ways, that's who we are as a community today and

15 who we want to be in the future, so I'll be

keeping an eye on what's happening over at 16

17 then county courthouse, or the county

administration building, but, again, we'll 18

let them sort this out, but I want to 19

express my viewpoint that the arts and 20

culture in the City of Scranton are alive 21

22 and well and need to be fostered and

continue to be fostered by all of us. 23

That's all I have. 24

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MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Evans.

Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. Just

on Mr. Evans' point, I would agree with him

100 percent. I, too, think that art and

culture is so very important not only to our 5

city but to our county and to our region, 6

and I actually think that we should put even 7

8 more of the focus on arts and culture in

Scranton and Lackawanna County and, you

10 know, when you look at all of the downtown

events that we have and the events 11

12 throughout the county and we have a lot of

13 talented people in this area, and I think

that we should invest in them and not cut

any funding for arts and culture. 15

Just a couple of updates on a few 16 17

things. First is I received numerous

complaints from residents in Minooka about 18

Colliery Avenue and the condition of that 19

street, so we did hear from our pave cut 20

inspector and he reported that the 2600 21

through 3000 block of Colliery Avenue have 22

23 permanent restoration to the trenches that

were created on that street. Leeward 24

Construction was able to do that work

because they have their own blacktop plant, in case anyone was curious.

The 2800 through 3100 block of Cedar 3

Avenue has gas company work and that's going 4

to be paved in the spring, so there is a few

6 other rods in Minooka that are in pretty

rough shape, but we were assured that they

are going to be paved in the spring.

9 Second thing, last week I mentioned

10 that they there were couple of dangerous

11 trees up on Wintermantle Avenue on East

Mountain and our city forester did make it 12

13 up there and he marked 10 to 12 trees that

are very dangerous and will probably have to 14

15 come down, and I'd like to thank our city

forester. I know his name has been brought 16

up here before, Tony Santoli, and he 17

actually volunteers his time, he does not 18

get paid a salary, and for all of the work 19

20 that he does and how efficient he is and

responsive he is to this council and the 21

22 people in the neighborhoods, he is

invaluable to this city. 23

I did discuss back in the caucus and 24

25 few weeks ago a letter that we sent to

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PennDOT about the dangerous conditions on 1

Birney Avenue in Minooka. It basically is a

two-lane speedway and I have been approached

numerous times by residents and businesses

that are located on that block. We did

receive a letter back from PennDOT and they

told us that the city would be able to put

8 crosswalks there and other measures to

increase public safety so we are going to

reach out again to the city engineer to see 10

if we can get started on that possibly in 11

12 the spring.

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Councilman Wechsler and I attended a

Greenridge Neighborhood meeting Tuesday 14

15 night and, again, the issue of crosswalks

was brought up, especially in the area of 16

17 Woodlawn and Penn Avenue there is a school

18 there and there needs to be increased safety

measures in that area. Also, there was a 19

dangerous speeding brought up on Electric 20

Street. Chief Graziano was there and he did 21

address many of the neighborhood group's 22

23 concerns, so we want to thank him for that.

I would like to read the questions 24 that were sent January 10 to Attorney 25

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- Conaboy of Buchanan, Ingersoll and Rooney. 1
- The law firm that worked on the Scranton 2
- Sewer Authority transactions. These are
- some of the questions that my colleagues and
- I had been bringing up in the last few 5
- 6 weeks. The questions that we posed, the
- first one was an accounting of how the \$12 7
- million in Scranton Sewer Authority cash 8
- reserves was expended since the start of the
- 10 Sewer Authority sale. Also, we would like a
- 11 breakdown of legal and consultant fees that
- were paid out in connection with the Sewer 12
- Authority sale transaction. Copies of 13
- correspondence between the Scranton Sewer
- 15 Authority and any law firm or consultant who
- worked in connection with the sewer sale 16
- transaction. A detailed breakdown of the 17
- amount expended on legal fees and consultant 18
- fees in connection with the transaction. 19

Also, was a payout of approximately 20 \$1,000 made to Sewer authority employees 21

- 22 prior to January 1, 2017? If so, from that
- account did this money come from and what 23
- was the total cost and reason for this 24
- payment? And a list of all of the equipment 25
 - that the city received from this Scranton
 - Sewer authority as result of the sale, and
- 3 we asked that these questions and
- information be furnished by January 18. 4
 - Not included in the letter, but I
- would like to follow up on this, if my 6
- colleagues would agree, is I mentioned last 7
- 8 week, I would like to ask Mayor Courtright
- when he knew that the sewer sale proceeds
- would be lower than had been touted for the 10
- last year. I am still concerned that this 11
- 12 council was left in the dark by Mayor
- 13 Courtright. If you remember, I asked for
- the dissolution of the Authority to be put
- on hold because the transaction had been put 15
- on hold for at least a week or two, so I was 16
- 17 concerned about those issues and I did ask
- for that to be tabled, but it failed, so 18
- this notion that nobody was asking
- questions, I have been asking questions for 20
- weeks about this deal, but we have not 21
- 22 received any.

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- 23 Also, the question about the
- dissolution of the Authority, I'd also ask 24
- that week because we did find out from the 25

- Solicitor Minora in his discussion with
- Solicitor Shrive that there was other
- business that the Sewer Authority would have
- to conduct. So I did ask what other
- business was that and what the timeline was
- for the final dissolution. Mrs. Reed sent
- us an e-mail, she had a discussion with
- Attorney Shrive and confirmed that the Board
- 9 and Authority are not actually dissolved.
- 10 They may be required to stay active for
- 11 possibly two more years. There is a board
- and solicitor only, there are no employees. 12
- The Sewer Authority still has liabilities, 13
- outstanding indebtedness, accounts 14
- 15 receivables, old uncollected bills, vendors.
- They still have outstanding easements that 16
- 17 they have to procure and the Authority, as
- we all know, is part of the class action 18
- lawsuit by the residents of Greenridge over 19
- the easements, and the city Sewer Authority 20
- 21 and the water company have recently been
- 22 sued by the Greenridge Neighborhood
- Association. So those are the facts that we 23
- received from Solicitor Shrive this week. 24
 - You know, when we are at this

neighborhood meeting on Tuesday night, the

- sale of the Sewer Authority had come up and there was some intense discussion about it
- and various questions that were posed. I
- have also been receiving phone calls and
- e-mails about different things related to
- the sale, and one of them, and I have been
- 8 asking this for months, but I would like to
- know at this point since the sale is
- complete, what controls, procedures are the 10
- city DPW currently under? What do they have 11
- 12 in place to manage storm water? Many
- 13 residents are concerned because we have a
- lapse in coverage, I guess you could say, 14
- because the Sewer Authority was taking care 15
- of most of these issues, so should we get a 16
- 17 flood the residents in Greenridge, the
- 18 residents down in Weston Field and other
- places in Pinebrook are very concerned. 19

20 So my question is very simple, what are we going to do between now and the time 21 when a Storm Water Authority or something in 22

- this realm is completed? I would like to
- 23 24
 - get an answer by next week, if we could.
 - We did receive a letter announcing

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that Allied Services Geisinger and 1

Lackawanna College are funding the continued 2

retention of Henry Amoroso and HJ Strategies

as a financial consultant for 2017. I did 4

request, and I would like to request again, 5

6 to see a contract if one is in place, so

basically what I'd like to know is what are

the deliverable for this year, what is their 8

specific role, and how did they play in the 9

10 day-to-day operations in the city?

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I also received a question from a citizen about our exit, possible exit from Act 47, and what the timeline would look like. If you are remember, back when we passed the last Recovery Plan in 2015 there was a clock that started ticking on whether or not we would exit Act 47, so I did e-mail Jerry Cross from PEL and he provided the following response:

"The 2014 amendments to Act 47 require that the coordinator report to the secretary of DCED within 180 days from the beginning of the last year of the five-year period from the adoption of the last plan prior to December 2014. For the City of

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Scranton, that means that the coordinator 1

must report to the secretary in February of

this year. The Act requires the coordinator

to report on the City's current financial

condition and to recommend either

termination of Act 47 status, a distinct

corporation of the municipality," which is 7

not applicable in our case," and declaration

8

of a fiscal emergency or a three-year exit

plan from Act 47." 10

> The coordinator has been in contact with DCED officials and a determination on this issue is likely to come very soon as has been reported. And, I think as Mr. Evans had mentioned, PEL will be presenting their revised Recovery Plan to council very soon so we should be seeing that on our agenda.

Somebody mentioned land banks, I attended the meeting that was held, public meeting that was held at North Scranton Junior High School concerning land banks and I came out of that meeting also very impressed. There was a number of

24 neighborhood groups, officials from the county, and other people that are interested and have a stake in the City of Scranton.

I mentioned this before, but if even 3 furthered my understanding that this program 4 is going to make a major impact in this city

in the areas of blight, neighborhood

stabilization, affordable housing and

economic development. The most interesting

part of this presentation was the large map

10 that they had of the City of Scranton, and

11 in red you can see each property that was in

tax foreclosure in the repository, and 12

everybody knows that you have one property 13

on your block or your neighborhood that you 14

wonder who owns it, is anything ever going 15

to be done with it, the grass is six-feet 16

17 high, this program is going to address that.

And what I heard from George Kelly who, again, I think is an invaluable asset to the city and to the county, is that they

are going to take a strategic look at the 21

22 City of Scranton, so we are not dumping all

23 of the properties from the repository into a

land bank and picking things out like we 24

25 would pick numbers from a lottery. There is

going to be a strategic move here to make

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these properties reusable and get them back on the tax rolls. And particularly exciting to me and

other people that have been following this

land bank project is the side lot program. 6

I know in my own neighborhood in North 7

Scranton over in Minooka, West Side, all

throughout the city, there are lots that are

not big enough to build a house on at this 10

point, so the houses have been torn down, 11 12 the lots sit there vacant. So the side lot

13 program will work with adjoining property

owners to get that property back on the tax 14

rolls and to do something with them. 15

The other interesting thing that I 16 17 think people should know about this is that 18 there is a website for the land bank, so

this is all public information. You can see 19 the properties that are being put into the 20

land bank, how you bid on these properties 21

and how the procedures are being put into 22

23 place. I would ask if we could reach out to

the administration this week and see if we 24 can put a link on our website so that people 25

can get to this land bank website and take a look at it.

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Also, something pretty interesting about the streetlighting program. I will be attending a meeting in the near future on an initiative that I have been involved with since 2014 and that is something called Smart City. It was a component, if you

9 remember, of the streetlighting program, and10 it was an optional component, but one I

11 think that we should seriously consider.

So what is smart city? Smart city 12 enables communities to be better connected 13 to their citizens. This platform uses 14 15 information kiosks to create a better connected community where citizens can 16 easily discovery events, programs, deals and 17 other relevant and important information as 18 they walk down the street, and you see many 19 cities across the United States that have 20 these type of the things in their down and 21 22 it's been a great success.

The system also allows public safety and Homeland Security officials to not only see and assess emergency situations, but

also to broadcast alerts and provide mobileupdates to residents in targeted locations.

3 The most exciting part of this whole deal

for me is that this program can serve as a

5 significant revenue generator for the City

6 of Scranton. There is an opportunity for

7 the city to generate revenue with this

8 program. Advertisers can develop targeting

9 content and pay premium fees to broadcast

10 there individual content and this revenue

11 opportunity can net up to several hundreds

12 of thousands of dollars for the city that

13 can be used to pay for lighting,

14 infrastructure improvements, public

15 services, or it can be reinvested into the

16 smart streetlight system. So, again, I'll

17 update everyone once I have attended that

18 meeting, but, like I said, it is pretty

19 exciting and I think it's something that the

20 city should seriously consider.

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My last point here is I would like to remind everyone, as Mr. Wechsler did in the beginning of the meeting, that Monday is

24 Martin Luther King Junior Day, and in a

25 light of the volatile, violent and

unpredictable world that we live in, I would

2 like to read one of my favorite quotes from

3 Martin Luther King Junior, and he said that

4 we must develop and maintain the capacity to

5 forgive. He who is devoid of the power to

6 forgive is devoid of the power to love.

7 There is some good in the worst of us and

8 evil in the best of us. When we discover

9 this, we are less prone to hate our enemies.

10 Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

13 covered. I don't have to talk about that so

14 I like that. Also, part one of the

15 questions we did request information from

12 Now, the one thing that is probably going to come up in all of this is that the 13

firm that was picked submitted a much higher

price than any other firm. The total price 15

is \$124,000. Now, keep in mind, that we 16

17 have a \$35,000 grant from -- through the Act

47 program, and I spoke to Mr. Bulzoni today 18

via e-mail and he is expecting we will be 19

able to get further grant money that will 20

probably take care of the rest of the bill 21

22 here, so we are probably going to end up

23 paying nothing for this analysis, but why

would we pick a firm that would ask for so 24

25 much more money? Well, Mr. Bulzoni details

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in his letter, and I want to make this

point. He says that while Arcadis' fee is

3 greater, the firm provides what may be

considered a complete comprehensive approach

to the evaluation of storm water

optionality, including the development of 6

the utility. Therefore, while the cost may 7

8 be greater, the proposal offers the greatest

dollar to the city. The firm also provided

the only proposal to address each of the 10

request's criteria in detail and according 11

12 to the format requested by the city.

And I can attest to that, in looking through the different proposals, this one was much more detailed than the other ones and they have dealt with a lot of communities and helping them create a utility or an authority and dealing with a different storm water management issues that are continuing to crop up, so I would agree with that.

I think Mrs. Hodowanitz asked what 22 23 the timeline was. The proposed timeline for the project completion provides a draft 24

identifying seven major project components,

and it will take roughly nine months to complete those components.

I would just like to read a little 3 bit more from this analysis. The City of 4

Scranton, like many other communities

6 throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

and the United States, possess a storm water

and flood control management infrastructure

that is under capacity and is reached or is

10 reaching the end of it's useful life. This

11 infrastructure needs to be rehabilitated or

replaced and it some cases new systems must 12

be built to improve storm water conveyance 13

and maintain flood control management 14

15 services.

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To develop a comprehensive program 16 for providing storm water management services to address current and future water 18 quantity and quality issue, a dedicated funding mechanism for storm water must be developed and appropriately supports both

22 regulatory and performance requirements.

This funding mechanism is critical to the 23

future stability of the storm water and/or 24

25 flood control management program.

Recent changes to legislation in

Pennsylvania and the organizational

structure within the City of Scranton Sewer

Authority, have provided the city with the opportunity to restructure it's storm water

program. Arcadis has extensive experience

6

developing storm water utility and utility

8 fee programs across the United States,

including integration of GI storm water and

billing data basis and forging an active 10

connection with storm water management 11

12 departments, so just a little built of

13 background.

14 Now, if we are looking at what other stakeholders are going to be involved here, 15 there are subconsultants that are going to 16 17 be a part of this team, Penn Strategies, 18 LLC, and Lackawanna River Corridor Association. As we brought up many times at 19

these meetings, the Lackawanna River 20

21 Corridor Association had done an evaluation,

an initial evaluation of these storm water 22 issues back in 2013, so this analysis will

use some of that information and build off 24

of it, so I thought that was important to 25

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If we are looking at what's involved in this analysis and what's involved in the scope of work, there are seven tasks that I mentioned at the beginning of my remarks. I just like to run through these pretty quickly.

The first task in the scope of the 8 work is review of current storm water services and activities, and again, some of 10 11 this had been completed in the initial report in 2013. So upon initiation of this 12 project, this group is going to meet with 13 the City of Scranton staff to determine what 15 the program looks like, what they currently do, which is what I have been asking, and 16 17 they are also going to interview staff, look at available documents, permits and budget 18 information among a number of other 19 different things. 20

The second task is to form an incorporation of new storm water management service provider.

Task number three is a storm water management program development, which will

o analysis so the

be the crux of the whole analysis, so theywill be looking at program priorities and

3 requirements, and a financial planner on how

4 of all of this get funded. In the financial

4 of all of this get funded. In the illiancial

5 planner, basically it's going to be based on

6 all of the information that this analysis

7 requires, so they are going to prepare a

8 financial plan presenting five years of

9 available requirements for the proposed

10 storm water program including costs

11 associated with the converted storm water

12 assets, and the financial plan will include

13 the following elements: Capital

14 improvements program, debt analysis, funding

15 sources, and revenue unless.

Task number four is a Stakeholder Advisory Committee, so they will be convening all of the different stakeholders across the city, and possibly outside of the city, to discuss how they can work together.

Task number five, which has come up many times here in these meetings and in the newspaper, is the rate structure, so the basis of billing. This company typically

25 recommends using as the basis for their

storm water program fees impervious land area of an equivalent residential unit, so they may use that methodology or other ones that are mentioned in this report.

Also, they are going to look at rate structure alternatives, so they are go to discuss when the city the option of using uniform rate or tiered rates for residential customers, and they are also going to talk about the credit system.

11 And, finally, they are going to evaluate the city park system for a green 12 infrastructure, which I know has been a 13 topic of interest for a number of people 14 15 that I have talked to. Now, back in 2013 when the Lackawanna River Corridor 16 Association created that report, they looked 17 extensively at the city park system and how 18 we can incorporate green infrastructure into 19 that, so they are going to build off of that 20 in this analysis. 21

Also, they are going to create and organize and workshop to present all of these findings and from the basis of billing analysis reviewing of all alternative rate

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1 structure, the development of credit

2 policies and the comparison to other storm

3 water fees across the state and across the

4 country and potential for installation of

5 green infrastructure, as I've said, in the

6 city park system, so the workshop is going

7 to look at an review the advantage and

disadvantage of all of these different

9 methodologies and rate structures and the

10 preferred organizational models.

Task number six is going to be appeals process, so this company is going to work with the city to develop a set of guidelines for allowing ratepayers an opportunity to appeal the storm water utility fee if that's what the city decides to go with, and so they are going to review existing appeal policies for the city to determine if those processes are potentially

applicable to the storm water fee appeals
process.
