MS. REED: 3-C. AGENDA FOR THE BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS MEETING TO BE HELD FEBRUARY 8, 2017.

MR. WECHSLER: Are there any comments? If not, received and filed.

Do any council members have announcement at this time? I have two. There will be a public hearing next Thursday, February 9, at 5:45 in council chambers for Item 5-B on tonight's agenda, closing and vacating portions of Irving and Crown Avenue between Saginaw and Connell Street.

Also, there will be a fundraiser for the West Scranton Little League this Friday from 7 to 10 at Pixie's Bar at 1420
Lafayette Street. As everyone is aware, they had a fire there last week so they are going to need some help replacing their concession stand before the season starts.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
Scranton resident and taxpayer. Just so we

are all keeping track, there are 278 days
left until the general election on November
7 and we are all looking forward to the
results of the Arcadis study water analysis.
Also, there are 148 days until June 30, the
deadline for the 2016 audit. I'm really
looking forward to that one.

With regard to the LST tax, I know there is a hearing scheduled for February 13, I still think though that you should not wait for the results of that, you should be mulling over in your minds a Plan B, as should the administration should there be any problem with that LST tax. If that were cut back to \$52 a year instead of the triple tax, that's like a \$3 million loss of revenue that we had predicted, so I would like to see a Plan B at least tossed around in your mind. It would be good news if we get it, but if you don't, it will be a problem.

During Fifth Order if you could please update the public on the status of your web page since we have been waiting for that for some time.

1 Also, what is the status of pending 2 legislation or any legislation with regard 3 to pension reforms? I haven't seen anything about that for a long, long time. 4 Ιn 5 addition, I'm still looking for the RFP for the third party administration of the 6 7 pension plans, I haven't seen that. 8 MR. EVANS: My understanding is that 9 is going to be coming down shortly. 10 MS. HODOWANITZ: Good. It's long 11 overdue. Also, when will the public be made 12 aware of the plan for the distribution of 13 the sewer sale -- the sewer sales proceeds? 14 How far down in the year are we going to get that kind of information? Is that going to 15 16 be relatively soon or that going to be 17 summertime? 18 MR. EVANS: I would expect that in the first quarter. 19 20 MS. HODOWANITZ: First quarter? 21 MR. EVANS: Okay. Any change on our 22 rental registration legislation? 23 MR. EVANS: The lawsuit you mean? 24 MS. HODOWANITZ: Not just the 25 lawsuit, but are we just in a holding

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pattern until that lawsuit is resolved?

MR. EVANS: No, I think -- no, they are moving ahead with the new ordinance.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, is that going to be maybe first quarter?

MR. WECHSLER: The new bills are going to be mailed out soon.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. All right. Like many people I was saddened to read by Mr. Boscov's medical condition this morning. However, as you recall several years ago when he had attempted to retire he had to come back into the company because his department store chain got in real trouble, almost had to declare bankruptcy, so my question is if he has to withdraw or something happens to him, and you've got to remember he is the genius behind that chain of department stores. He is the number one reason for their financial success. goes, whether it's simply to retire for medical reasons or he passes away, I would be very concerned about the future of that chain as well as our anchor store at the marketplace and what would happen to the

marketplace if that store had to close?

That's another thing we should be looking at because we put a lot of eggs into that basket and I'm wondering what the ultimate impact would be on the city coffers if Boscov's Department Store ever had to close at least in the near future.

And just to make everyone smile today, I got my property tax bill and I was -- as I expected, there was no change in my city tax, there was no change in my county tax, but my school tax went down, so when you get your property tax bills everyone should compare their tax totals to last year and hopefully everyone will get the same pleasant surprise. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Jeff Zick.

MR. ZICK: How are you doing? This is for council, I'm going to ask for a little help from Mandy, my fiancee, if that's fine? She is going to hold up the pictures depicted if the camera wanted to catch what is going on here.

All right, first thing, we have is Scranton's police badge, the narcotics

badge, I mean, it is 2017. Hemp is now legal in the State of Pennsylvania, you know, if your town wants to collect taxes off of illegal medical Cannibis business then what message does this narcotics badge send to the public? You know, that hemp is heroin. Medical Cannibis involves needles. Cannabis causes death. You know, why the childish skull? Every other badge on here is pretty professional, and it's a great police department and I'm not badgering the police here they do a great job.

. Second page, is a recent WNEP poll talking about Wilkes-Barre's decriminalization. Wilkes-Barre has already decriminalized paraphernalia. Scranton still charges for roach papers as paraphernalia. Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, and State College have already decriminalized small amounts of Cannibis. Reading, West York, Lancaster, Stroudsburg and Wilkes-Barre are considering ordinances. Scranton, as the progressive city, should probably take the lead and an enact it's own ordinance.

On the third page is Scranton

All right, page four. Page four, black and white arrests in the City of Scranton. This is rather disturbing, I don't know this until I crunched some numbers. All right, whites make up 78.6 percent of Scranton's population. They account for 62 percent of 2016's arrests of small possession of can business. Blacks make up 6 percent of this city, but account for 38 percent of possession arrests. I don't find that all right, I'm sure nobody in this room finds it all right, I'm not even going to ask for a show of hands, all right?

Page five, opiate and cocaine possession arrests in the city. Cannabis users are 64 percent more likely to be arrested in 2016 than opiate and cocaine users combined. What is Scranton's

priorities?

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All right, page six. The top ten 2 3 Lackawanna County Cannibis arrests in the City for 2016. Scranton fuels the war on 4 Cannibis at 28 percent of all arrests in 5 6 Lackawanna County. Scranton is supposed to 7 be the progressive city. This sounds 8 regressive. Scranton accounts for .6 9 percent of the statewide population. 10 Scranton's Cannibis possession arrests 11 account for 3.4 percent of the states 12 possession arrests. This is 550 percent 13 more likely for a person to be arrested here 14 in Scranton than anywhere else in the state for Cannibis possession. Scranton is on 15 16 record pace this year for arrests of small amounts of Cannibis. January new numbers 17 18 came out, they arrested 14 adults. You times that times 12 months that's 144 19 20 arrests this year. 144 arrests times \$1,266 21 is around \$180,000. You spent \$17,724 not 22 writing tickets. Philadelphia, Harrisburg, 23 Pittsburgh, already do this. The sky is not 24 falling on their heads. I'm not saying -- I

love Scranton. I'm moving to Scranton in a

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week. I pay taxes as a worker here, I'm going to pay taxes as a citizen now. This is something that -- I don't want my -- I thought I'd never see my children go through this. This is something we can take care of. I would like a meeting between the mayor, council, and the district attorney and if we can take care of this that would be great. Thank you for your time.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MS. FRANUS: Fay Franus, Scranton. First, I'd like to say I think it's -- I hope you approve the legislation for the Lackawanna Heritage Trail about the big flashing lights because that's a very -it's a big safety hazard on Elm Street, and even on Broadway, if they could possibly some day get one there on Broadway. Lackawanna Heritage Trail is phenomenal. Ιt gives everyone some place to go. Exercise, walking, biking, taking your dog, I mean, they get so much exercise and it's so healthy and it's a beautiful, beautiful trail and Natalie Gelb should be highly commended for the works that she has done on

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this trail and her workers. It's positively beautiful and I hope that you approve this because it's very much so needed.

Mr. Wechsler, last week I heard you mention about the -- you are going to send a letter to Jason Shrive to get som information, you were hoping you would get it and Billy Gaughan mentioned a Right-to-Know and you suggested that that would be good because it would take 30 days and it's like a stall tactic they said, like, they would put it off. Well, then, I'd like to know how come you tell all of us when we have a question to do a Right-to-Know? I know why. Because, first of all, you don't want to get us the answers because you don't want us to know so we have to do a Right-to-Know, and then whoever is in charge of that they don't every reply.

Marie Schumacher must have ten
Right-to-Knows that never got answered.
Then you say go to the state. There's more
stall tactics so it's more not letting the
people know what's going on in the city.
Mr. Evans on purpose, by the way. Mr.

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Evans, is that -- for the garbage fee is that 10 percent still going to be -- going to be --

MR. EVANS: Yes.

MS. FRANUS: -- \$30 off if you pay by the first time?

MR. EVANS: Yes, it is.

MS. FRANUS: Last week you

mentioned, a little sting, asked and answered. You said for anybody asking that question I go and I get the answer. Well, I have been asking you for two years, if not longer, and I have all of the minutes of the meetings and all of the tapes to prove it, that I have been asking you time after time, you know this, how much money was coming in for the garbage fee and how much money was being paid out. You never ever gave me an answer. Then you said there was going to be a study because the DPW didn't have their records and you couldn't do a study. Well, the study they got their money in June, they didn't start it until December. Now, you said you didn't have any say as of when we they were going to do it, but you do have a

say because you council, you are the ones
that wanted that study. You certainly could
pick up that phone and say, "Hey, where's
the study?"

When you told me about this study, way back, way back a year ago, you said you wanted to get this study for this year's budget, this year's budget it would be less than \$300. They didn't even start the study until December so they know they couldn't get the \$300 for this year's budget again.

MR. EVANS: I can't address the motivation of why the study didn't get done but I will tell you that I requested the study from the time we knew about it until the time it was enacted.

The fact is he should tell you he knew about it long before you did and he didn't want the people to know. Same thing with the -- I got my tax bill, it was like \$34 less, which is wonderful. Next year we are going to get clobbered because the only reason we don't have a tax increase this year so Billy Courtright can get elected. Don't be fooled, people. MR. ELLMAN: Last night I was having a couple of cocktails at the club, when I went to the bathroom -- people talk to me in the bathroom all of the time for some reason. A fellow was talking about acquiring a new property and all of the work it needed and all, and he told me, I don't know where he lived, but it was in that area, he said he didn't want to look and see a bunch of fire trucks and automobiles and all he said they never had that problem when the Army Reserve was there. I have no idea

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what's going on, but to me it's acquiring another money pit when we can't fix fire stations. You know, there was a big article in the paper about all of the work the fire stations needed. Well, this was just a brief encounter about that. I know I have mentioned a couple of times those 6,000 foreclosures, I'm not talking about the house foreclosures, there is -- if you go through that list there is hundreds upon hundreds of properties owned by realtors and developers. This one guy, Talerico, he got dozens of properties here in the city, he owes five, six, seven thousand dollars on each one. His name is all over that sheet. I think I mentioned just once before, just four people I got here, four people now owe \$900,000. These are companies. Scranton investors on Boulevard \$484,000. This is -whoever heard of getting away with this? They come up to my house when I paid the taxes twice and I can't get, I think it's \$1,800 or something. I never seen nothing like it. Here's a man \$484,000 and nobody bothers him. Under him I got this

Wintermantle Reality \$141,000. Thomas Hill \$161,000 and Ed Langer \$100,000. Why can't you condemn their properties? They are rented out. They are making income, why can't these real estate licenses just be taken away from them?

You know, besides that, these same people are buying more property. They hide it under this LLC. The same people that aren't paying for what they got are allowed to get more property. This is senseless when the city is so broke. You know, we hear every week we can't pay this, we can't pay that, and here is tens of millions of dollars sitting there that no one is collecting. Amoroso is not very busy anymore, he sold the last thing we got. Why can't he do something. I understand his standing with the city, too, but he can do something.

What about Bulzoni, \$100,000. He doesn't have to pay any house taxes or school taxes, why can't he do something about this? This is what's wrong with this city? It's just hundreds of thousands of

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dollars from each one of these people and not nothing being done to collect it. Nothina. The reason you just didn't fall back on Amoroso's plan and just raise taxes when we need something. We don't have to do any work and hard work and go after people, we'll just raise taxes on the rest of you. It's gotten where there is just nowhere else to go for a lot of people and you know it but you don't do nothing. Has one of you done anything about those 60,000 foreclosures? No. I brought it up a couple of months ago. Millions of dollars sitting there uncollected taxes. Like I said, take away their licenses and their real estate licenses and condemn their houses and see how fast they pay. That Pennwood Manor owes \$55,000, they are loaded to the gill with people.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Why, thank you for letting me let out steam. See, I didn't get off on you tonight. I'll save it.

MR. WECHSLER: Lee Morgan.

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MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Tonight, you know, I just would like to ask people to remember the exchange between Mr. Bolus and Mr. Wechsler tonight when Mr. Wechsler said that you could -- this is your five minutes and you can ask questions and I think people have to understand why this council sits here. When elected officials move an agenda through a city it has to be done legally and lawfully. doesn't matter whether the people who sit on the council are competent or incompetent, as long as they legally hold the votes they can make all of the mistakes they want and it's legal and they don't have to answer any questions at all. They can just ignore you like they have done to the residents of this city for quite a few decades.

And, you know, the real problem is you need to take a look into this much further. You know, a remarkable article was in the Scranton Times newspaper, and I'm just going to touch it in generalities, but there is three council members here sitting for reelection and one of them is married to

1 a former Democratic Committee woman, and 2 there were some questions about what was 3 taking place at the school board and I guess the question was, you know, with 4 5 Mr. Sheridan sitting there why didn't somebody do something with him and this 6 woman said she couldn't take a chance on her 7 8 husband's reelection chances here in the 9 city and, you know, that says a lot about 10 this city. 11 MR. WECHSLER: I think it says a lot 12 about my wife. 13 MR. MORGAN: Well, I mean, that's up 14 to you to take credit for that, but I think it just goes to show how corrupt and twisted 15 16 this city is. 17 MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Morgan, I will 18 not let you call my wife corrupt. 19 MR. MORGAN: I didn't call your wife 20 anything. I'm talking about a --21 MR. WECHSLER: A wife of a 22 councilman --23 MR. MORGAN: You know, Mr. Wechsler, 24 please sit there and be quite, you are the 25 council president --

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$  WECHSLER: I'm not going to sit--

MR. MORGAN: And I didn't say one word about your wife being corrupt, you did.

MR. WECHSLER: No, you stated about my wife and you then you said corrupt.

MR. MORGAN: Do me a favor, stop my time and then you carry on on your own.

MR. WECHSLER: You are carrying on, sir, not me.

MR. MORGAN: No, I didn't say she was corrupt, you did, but you know it just goes to show how twisted this system really is. All of these residents they are here, they're hunkered down, they're losing everything they own. You know, it's just ashame that a city has been distressed for 25 years and we go further and further in. When Mr. McGoff was president of council I asked him to cut taxes by 30 percent, cut expenses by 30 percent. Nothing. Over all the course of this time I want the residents to look around their neighborhoods and look at the streets signs and see how they are faded and can't be read anymore. They were

restoring your pride, and the millions and millions and millions of dollars pumped into city parks they were restoring your pride.

And the Scranton Sewer Authority, you know, I think the people need to take a good look and ask who paid to pump all of the water in the houses and all of the sewer lines into houses. The people did. But who controls it now? Corporations. Because they couldn't afford to do it so now you elect people and their only agenda is they do exactly what they are told. Somebody tells them and they do exactly what they are told or they just don't know anything.

Now, Mr. Wechsler, you said that you were against the sewer deal when you introduced it, you know, so somebody has to ask, sir, how can introduce an ordinance or anything else for that matter that you're opposed to because if you don't introduce it, it can't be voted on.

And my problem is that, you know, you read all of these articles and all of this silliness and it all comes from here and this council and previous councils have

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destroyed this city and they have done the same thing across this country because we elect one political hack after another who has no allegiance to the people at all, not one drop, not little spec of respect for the people who elect them, and like you said to Mr. Bolus here tonight, you have got five minutes to talk, but I'm not going to answer you, and nobody has come here and received an answer on just about anything because the people we elect you don't have the answers. That's the problem.

And every time after something happens you turn around and say, "Well, I didn't know that." And the Home Rule Charter gives you a way to figure out everything that takes place in this city, but, like I said once before, you know, they put a spacesuit on a monkey and he went around the world, okay, but he wasn't an astronaut.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,
Mr. Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: And I didn't call your wife corrupt, sir, you did.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher.

I haven't done a property transfer or transaction report in awhile so I thought I'd start with that tonight. Since I stopped doing the detailed one roughly in mid-March of last year of the properties that were sold only 23 percent of them were in Scranton and of the properties that did sell 49 percent were sold at a price below the common level ratio.

Unfortunately, sales are up just a little bit the first month from the 31st of December until today, 29 percent of the properties that have been sold in the county or in Scranton but of those 62 percent of those were below the common level ratio. It's really, really sad and I think taxpayers are stressed and you need to be aware of that.

And with respect to 6-B, I guess I want to go there next, I think it's disturbing, first of all, the \$250,000 that you are voting on was that in response to the request that was made last year for the

state grant from the gaming funds which was a request for \$600,000? If so, we have really gotten a little bit of it.

Also, last year, there was a preliminary review received on the first of February, almost a year ago. It did not specify estimates of renovations. When did the final report come? If that was a preliminary review, when did we receive the final review that includes that information?

MR. EVANS: I'm not sure, probably about four or five months ago.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Funny nobody ever spoke about that. Didn't answer these -- let me just take a different attack then, did it answer these question? Did it include the specific needs that this city has for that building?

MR. EVANS: Not that I'm aware of.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Did it have a comprehensive environmental assessment?

Yes, no? Just yes or no. Do we have one on the grounds?

MR. GAUGHAN: I have asked for it and apparently it's in the Law Department,

some sort of paperwork so I did ask for that, but I don't have it on me.

MS. SCHUMACHER: But a comprehensive environmental assessment has occurred and we know what the conclusion is but you can't share it with us right now? Is that --

MR. GAUGHAN: I don't know if one has occurred, I've asked that question and the chief said it's something in the Law Department. What means I don't know, that's why I asked.

third one do we have a funding development plan and a detailed operational plan? As I recall, that first one said it needed a new roof and there were just lots of things. I would certainly suggest that you put this on the back burner and until we have the answers to all of these questions. I really think the last thing we need is to spend -- it's really easy to spend, even I can do that, but making the cutbacks not so much.

And did we receive a response on the Scranton Sewer authority?

MR. WECHSLER: No. I'm not sure if

1 you didn't hear we are having a meeting with Director Shrive on the 10th. 2 3 MS. SCHUMACHER: I mean, a hearing -- I mean. here? 4 MR. WECHSLER: Councilman Evans and 5 I are going to have a meeting. We sent the 6 7 questions to Director Shrive last week, we 8 requested he give us an answer today. I 9 spoke with him today, we are going to meet 10 with him on Friday next week. 11 MS. SCHUMACHER: Are you going to 12 get the answers to the questions? 13 MR. WECHSLER: That's why we are 14 having the meeting. MS. SCHUMACHER: I don't recall what 15 16 all of these questions were but the one I 17 would like to know the answer, one of the 18 many, did Jason Shrive receive any 19 compensation over and above his city 20 solicitor salary for the work that he did on 21 that transaction? 22 MR. EVANS: I'll ask him that. 23 MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. 24 backup, speaking of -- if I may, the Air 25 bNb, did you -- you said you are going to

investigate to see if we have only pursued one of the many in the city.

MR. EVANS: Yeah, I talked to
Director Hinton and he has responded to the
complaints that have been received from
other Air bNb situations, but they are not
actively pursuing going online and searching
them out.

MS. SCHUMACHER: What other ordinance do we have on the books where you have to get complaint from somebody before you send somebody out?

MR. EVANS: I agree.

MS. SCHUMACHER: You know, that's troubled me this whole week. I just cannot believe because this is what happens when you get big government.

MR. EVANS: Yeah, I agree.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Big government at the small level they just pass any kind of law you want and then don't enforce it for your friends and go after, but make sure you have got it there so if you want to go after one individual you can zero in on them and ruin them.

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MR. EVANS: That was the answer he gave.

 $$\operatorname{MS}$.$  SCHUMACHER: And this is awful. I think that is a terrible way we are going and I --

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. Dave Dobrzyn, resident and taxpayer. me that bell. Give me that bell, young Just kidding, but at any rate, it rang last week and I kind of reviewed the meeting at home on Sunday night or whatever, one of the issues with insurance that I have is when indigent care is taking care of it's not done in the past at government expense, it's done at policy premium expense, and a number of years back Ed Rendell and George Bush were in the newspaper together and they were providing CHIP insurance with the excesses that were paid into Blue Cross, and I'm certainly not against CHIP insurance, but the point is that you have this person appropriating -- a politician is appropriating money that somebody is paying

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out of the pocket. It might even be a sick person that's paying out the wazoo for this insurance and then they are playing the hero for it, you know, like a robin hood or something so that's what I wanted to say.

Once again, the storm water, I talked to somebody on the storm water and at this time, and I hope it's followed through, there won't be any storm water rate for undeveloped land. I hope that stays the way it is because once again I got my taxes today for my spare lot and they went from \$333 when I first bought the lot, they are up to over \$600 a year and every five years I'm paying once over again to the City of Scranton and the county and the school district for that land. Before I lose it and, you know, maybe I'll donate it to Hell's Angels motorcycle club for a party center if they don't behave themselves.

The Serrenty Center, Ma Schumacher brought this up, there was a pollution issue with the school. We are supposed to tear down or get rid of Audubon School and it turned out that that piece of land because

of the US military and all of the masses that they deal with in defense wasn't suitable, so that's my major concern. I'm not against acquiring it and we already have our vehicles, I seen in the newspaper and everything it's -- but therein again, please don't stick us with a superfund site and find out beforehand because it could be if you buy something and the land is polluted a lot of times the owners, new owners get stuck with all of the problems from it over the years.

And there was an editorial in the paper, I brought in the Times, last week it was mentioned that University is applying for a \$5 million grant to improve a baseball field. Well, here is some nice statistics, I believe we are about \$60 millionish less than what it was before the great recession for public universities, and adjusted for inflation it's less than 14 years ago, and when the system was founded in 1982 the state contributed 67 percent of the system's budget and that had shrunk to 25 percent, so the point is that we have a sectarian

institution here and I'm basically not a sectarian person, but it's a concern of mine. For instance, I mentioned on 501-C-3's and C-4's and how they are getting away with a lot of improprieties and in 1958 the Congress wrote the IRS law currently on the books that they had to be strictly for public welfare and the treasury secretary or somebody changed it to primarily, so some of these organizations are a little less than -- or quite a bit less than primarily.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Thank you and have a good night. Don't forget, we got DINKS, too, income and no kids, and HINKS, high income and no income. So, Wayne, up in the Hill Section, up in South Side, maybe they are all over, you know? Paying their taxes and not taking anything. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I got the little ad here saying, "The parking plan wizard who council unanimously adopts

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deal for the Parking Authority." Now, when yous go to the neighborhood association do you ever tell them that that deal costs us over \$150 to \$200 million either in lost revenue or liability? Do you tell the taxpayers of Scranton that you gave away that much money? No, I don't think you would because then they would know exactly what was done. I'll give you a little The fees and the parking revenue breakdown. amounted to about \$3 million a year. You gave them away for 40 years. That's \$120 million down the drain. You are borrowed another 30 to \$33 million for what you call stranded debt. You gave, I think it's NDC, I think that's what it's called, a gift of \$28 million in the form of a lease. gave a lease that we are responsible, the citizens of Scranton are responsible for the lease and that's adds to the debt. So when you go and explain to something don't pat them on the back and pick their pockets at the same time, tell them the actual cost of some of these deals that were done.

MR. PERRY: Mr. Sbaraglia, I don't

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want to interrupt you, but we're having a hard time hearing you with the mic if you just want to adjust the mic and move it down a little bit. There you go. Thank you.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Yeah, for some reason it does come over, but that's some of the costs, not even the lawyer's cost, and the worst part about it yous keep bringing up the default, we paid two lawyers to arrange that default. That didn't just happen, that was created and then you find fault. What happened? Why did we come out on the back end of that stick after paying two lawyers to arrange it? Nobody knows, or it was the other default that they keep bringing up that you don't mention, the default that you paid off, that \$4 million to the bank that the Scranton Parking Authority did default on. Our default was arranged, I think it was what two days or three later, three dates later that got the money.

Something is bad in the city.

Something actually stinks in the city, but this deal stinks worse than any of them.

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They should have an investigation into this whole deal. I'm talking about the gifts to Mr. Basalyga, 300 and some thousand dollars a year for 40 years, I'm not bringing that I'm not bringing in the gift of \$2 1/2 million to the garage that was built at the same time at the mall, but you considered it only a dollar. I'm not going to bring that up, but somebody should bring it up in the state government, and how PEL can sit there and let that happen is beyond me. million I estimated the cost of that deal, and I know it's a lot more. I don't know how you can do it, but yous all did it and they reference this here. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MR. ST. FLEUR: How you doing? My name is Gary St. Fleur, Scranton resident. I just have a couple of questions I'd like to ask you gentlemen. Are you aware that there was a response filed to the Court's regarding the Act 511 taxes last week?

MR. EVANS: Yes, we are.

MR. ST. FLEUR: Pardon?

MR. EVANS: You asked me if we are

aware there is a lawsuit filed? 1 MR. ST. FLEUR: Yes. 2 MR. EVANS: Yes, we are. 3 MR. ST. FLEUR: Were you aware of 4 5 the ordinance that states that there is cap on the amount of local taxes? 6 MR. EVANS: Yes, I am. 7 8 MR. ST. FLEUR: Were you aware Mr. 9 Amoroso came up with a plan to use taxes and sell public assets to recover Scranton's 10 fiscal distress? 11 MR. EVANS: You will have to ask 12 13 Mr. Amoroso that? 14 MR. ST. FLEUR: When he came up with this plan, I'm asking you, were you as a 15 16 city council who voted for this plan aware 17 of this? 18 MR. EVANS: I wasn't on council at 19 the time when the plan first came, but go 20 ahead. 21 MR. ST. FLEUR: Were there any other 22 persons who were --23 MR. WECHSLER: Mr. St. Fleur, as I 24 told Mr. Bolus this is your comment period. 25 If you have questions, submit them in

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writing. Otherwise, thi sis your comment period.

MR. ST. FLEUR: Oh, so this is not for ask questions --

MR. WECHSLER: It's not a question and answer period. No, it's not. It's public comment.

MR. ST. FLEUR: So my comment is that if the plan for recovery concerning Scranton' financial distress included the increasing of taxes and the selling of public assets, but there is a cap on the amount of taxes you can increase and it would seem the person who is responsible for coming up with this plan was not in a position to actually advise the City of Scranton on how to recover, and if the city council signed off on this plan it would also show there is incompetence on their part that they know of this, so currently we are wasting for a response from the city government about these taxes. The current budget states that local taxes has an overage of \$10 million based on this local statute. Once we prevail in Court, then you

will have to find that \$7 million from somewhere.

I would state that it's obvious that the City of Scranton and government does not have any money and this is just further evidence that they need to make some serious changes at the government level. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

MOTIONS.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?

MR. PERRY: Yes. Thank you, Mr.

Wechsler. I have a couple of things, something that's been held over for the last week and a half, we are still trying to get our onsite meeting with the water company, our city engineer and our DPW to the Merrifield Avenue drainage pipe. We are just waiting on the American Water Company right now. Council, we're committed to be there, as well as the city engineer and DPW as soon as it's good for the American Water Company to get their people out there we will have that and I'll let everybody know when we set that date.

The Serrenti building. We, myself, Councilman Rogan and Councilman Evans, Mr. Lockwood was there as well from the Scranton Times, Chief Graziano and some members of the police department took us on a tour of that building. We saw a lot that day. I think, you know, we'll all probably speak on it. That building, as I can tell you right now, is housing some serious, serious equipment, some valuable equipment, and I just want to give you a rundown of how we got to where we are right now today because this has been going on for awhile now, well over a year.

The federal government has been letting us use that building to house some of our sensitive equipment, our climate controlled equipment that just can't be out in the elements. We have been using that from them, now they want to sell the building, they couldn't sell it, they want to give it to us. We had the Highland Group go through and they had some costly needs of the building and some costly recommendations for the building. We applied for a grant,

the grant wasn't actually received by us yet, so there really wasn't anything you can do, the city doesn't have the on-hand cash to go ahead and accept that building and put money from the general funds into it, so the city went and we tried to go a different route.

We looked at a pole barn structure which we were going to place behind the police department. The estimates for that came back at close to \$1 million and the building was going to nowhere near the structure that the Serrenti building is going to be. It was actually only going to have a 20-year shelf life for that building at \$900,000, so now we get the grant. We have the grant funds in front of us right now for \$250,0000. What that grant would cover as of right now it would fix the roof and replace the HVAC and get the water back into that building. Those are the basic needs.

It would completely keep all of our equipment in there safe. There is really no other place to put this equipment, and the

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other question that I know all five of us had was the ongoing costs. I believe it was Councilman Evans who had the idea of the firehouse on Ash Street, if we sold that, put that into escrow, because the training department would leave Ash Street and join the armory. We could sell that, set up an escrow account, we could use that to offset any ongoing utility costs for that building.

We'd put in LED lights, we put in a way better efficient heating system. We are talking we are going to get a lot more money for the Ash. I'm not well, I'm very sick, I'm sorry, I'm trying to get through this, the Ash Street firehouse.

Now, with that said, the issue of the pollutants is still out there. That's something that we definitely have to find out what the situation is. I mean, I can't honestly see myself going forward with something if we are going to inherent something that was just not safe. So, you know, I will do my research into this this week, but overall let me just say that building it's a sound structure, it does

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need a roof. It does need heating,
ventilation and the air conditioning, but
that's all going to be covered by this
initial grant with more grants to follow for
other projects.

Something else I wanted to touch on was the prearrest drug treatment program right now that we are going to get moving with the Scranton Police Department. Carl Graziano's, Chief Carl Graziano's brain child, and I think it's a very good program and there is going to be more coming out of that within the next couple of weeks. think the Scranton Times already has an article out about it encapsulating everything, but it's to steer people out of jail and into treatment. Too many times, and I'm sure it's such a problem right now that I'll use that the word epidemic, that it's almost touched everybody's life and they are not necessarily criminals, they are people that need help, and this is a way that we can get the people that need help instead of getting them to stare at a jail cell, which really isn't going to help them.

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They are going to get out and they are going to have a hard time finding a job and that's going to lead to more depression, it's going to lead to more drugs, so this is a very good and very progressive program to keep people out of jail, keep their record clear, and get them what they really -- they don't need more trouble in life, they need treatment so I'm very excited to get more into that as the weeks follow.

Finally, I know I have had some -- a lot of negative things to say about Al Boscov the last year or so. I disagree with a lot of his business decisions, but that by no means should deter the fact what he did to the city, his faith that he had in our city, and the jobs and the people that he employed, and as we know he is not well on this day and I just want to send my love and prayers out to him and his family in this most difficult time. That's all I have today.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Perry. Mr. Rogan?

> Yes, a couple of items. MR. ROGAN:

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First, I just want to say some of the comments made by one of the speakers attacking a councilman's wife tonight were completely out of line. You can come here and attack the five of us all you want, but our wives and our families should not part of the public discussion, and I think you handled it appropriately, Mr. Wechsler.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: I think he was completely out of line and it's certainly not appropriate for our meetings. I would also agree with what Mr. Perry said about Mr. Boscov. I would like to wish him well as well. Nobody would -- a cancer diagnosis is something you wouldn't wish on your worse enemy. I also have had my differences with Mr. Boscov regarding city issues, but again, our hearts go out to him and his family as well.

The Serrenti building, as Mr. Perry mentioned, a number of us did tour the building this week and I know Mr. Wechsler did the previous week. I thought it was a very eye opening tour. First of all, just

to see some of the equipment that the police department has that I think most of us didn't even realize we had, and hopefully we will never need to use it, you know, this is equipment to disable bombs. Gear for riots and active shooter situations which, again, hopefully will never be used but we need to have it.

The tour was very eye opening, especially regarding the condition of the building. I expected the building to be in much worse shape than it actually was. Now it's not pretty cosmetically going through it, it certainly needs a coat of paint and some touching up here and there, but it's a very solid building, and as Mr. Perry mentioned the cost of just building a new building to store our equipment would cost more than the ongoing with this property.

And, additionally, I agree we do need to get the documentation on the environmental issue. I do know Chief Graziano did mention it in one of our caucuses that there are no -- there aren't any major environmental issues at that

property. I believe it was a neighboring property where there were environmental issues. I think that was reported on, also, but we'll get to -- before final vote next week that's something we certainly should get.

And, finally, on that project, we did receive an e-mail from the president of the Hill Neighborhood Association and their members seem to in support of the project mainly because they don't want a vacant building in their neighborhood, and the increased police presence by having a police substation is something that will only help the residents of the Hill Section.

Finally, this is a little bit off
topic of items that I would formally talk
about, but WNEP had a piece on last night it
was reported again today regarding the
Harrison Avenue bridge, that State
Representative Kevin Haggerty is proposing a
bill to name it after Vice President Biden.
I love Vice President Biden as much as
almost every other Scrantonian, but this
bridge was actually already named, and it's

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named after a veteran.

Going back, I believe it was three or four years ago, we had a caucus right here in these chambers with representatives from PennDOT regarding this project and we asked if it could be named after veterans or Senator Blake and his staff took a veteran. that request and ran with it. I knew a bill was proposed, I didn't realize it actually became law. Obviously, State Representative Haggerty didn't either. Earlier today I did speak with representatives from PennDOT and representatives from Senator Blake's office, and they did provide me with a copy of what was a Senate Bill which is actually now a law because it was signed in. This is Senate Bill 890 from the 2015/2016 session and it was actually a standalone bill so it wasn't added onto some larger package. And it reads, was done all on it's own. "Colonel Frank Duffy Memorial Bridge Designation Active October 30, 2015." I'm not going to read the entire Act, but some of the highlights are Section 1, Colonel Frank Duffy Memorial Bridge, findings and

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declarations. The General Assembly finds and declares as follows:

Prior to serving his country in World War I, Colonel Frank Duffy, known as the fighting Colonel, was well respected in He served as the president of the Scranton. Scranton Engineers Club and head of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad. After the United States entered World War I, Colonel Duffy formed Company F of the 103rd Engineers. On August 18, 1918, Colonel Duffy was tragically killed from an explosion of an enemy shell and was buried in a small French village. Colonel Duffy was the highest ranking soldier from Lackawanna County killed in World War I.

Designation. The bridge carrying
State Route 611, Harrison Avenue, over
Roaring Brook in the City of Scranton and
Lackawanna County to be constructed on or
after the effective date of this section is
hereby designated the Colonel Frank Duffy
Memorial Bridge. The Department of
Transportation shall erect and maintain
appropriate signs to indicate the

- -

designation under Section 2.

And it says this Act will take effect in 60 days. So if my colleagues agree with me, I think we need to reach out to Representative Haggerty and I would like to see a form rescinds his bill to name the Frank Duffy Memorial bridge the Joe Biden bridge and look for another way to honor Vice President Biden, which I do agree needs to be done and he should be honored for his achievements, but those achievements wouldn't be possible if it wasn't for heros like Frank Duffy.

So if my colleagues agree, if we could send that letter to Representative Haggerty's Office, and that is all I have for tonight. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. Briefly on the topic to decriminalize marijuana possession, while I have a fully formed opinion to shed I think that is definitely something that needs full discussion and a full conversation so I think we will

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continue to talk about that.

I would like to offer some brief comments on what the role of city council might be. City council, of course, is a legislative branch. We are not the executive branch and we are certainly not an extension of the administration. All of us on city council have full-time jobs outside of this position so a 80 to 90-hour workweek is not abnormal to me or my colleagues. That's not a complaint that's just a fact, but it does offer some perspective. As my colleagues and past councils have noted many times before, council is far more than the two to three meetings every Thursday. fact, most of what we do is beyond this meeting, beyond these walls, and beyond this building.

Councilmen President Wechsler last week touched on a few success stories of city council and I would like to expand a little bit on what's been happening over the last two plus years. For example, we took a proposed two-year tax abatement program for new homes only and expanded it to three

years and included condo, townhouses and apartment to condominium conversions.

Conversations are ongoing with several developers about condo conversions and new condos and I would expect within the year that will be some news along that front because of this ordinance resulting in a dramatic increase in our tax base and more homeownership downtown.

We created a program for first time homebuyers with the proceeds of the foreclosure registration fee paid by the banks and returned to the community at no cost to the taxpayers and it's early success is very encouraging. We stepped up and finally passed legislation to move SAPA forward after it was left languishing for several years with no hope that it would ever happen.

We created quality of life tickets, a great idea that is an effective tool in fighting blight. We also recognize that it still needs some improvement and tweaking and something we will be looking at more. We wrote the new rental registration

ordinance that focuses on registration and will save property owners money and while creating revenue for LIPS for the cost of the program and increasing refuse bill collection at the same time. We continue to endorse the idea of using a third party vendor to gather data to increase the level of landlords registered working alongside city employees.

We created a 10 percent discount for the refuse bill which will help property owners and increase cash flow to the city. We have been at the forefront of pension reform. In fact, those words were mentioned in these chambers by this councilman hundreds and hundreds of times. Because of our prodding and insistence, there has been actual reform or reform to come and additional pension reforms soon to be determined.

We have amended and we broke a stalemate on the contractor's legislation with new legislation on the arisen for the electrical contractors that have been brought forth by council.

We are soon to be online with a program called Granicus, a paperless agenda tool that will bring additional transparency and efficiency to city council, and tonight we will vote "yes" on the final reading of legislation reducing the real estate transfer tax. To my knowledge, it's the first tax reduction of any kind in the City of Scranton in decades, and there are many other issues that we deal with on a daily basis, but more needs to be done absolutely.

We will continue to lead on the following issues: A countywide reassessment. The proper appropriation of the Sewer Authority sale proceeds. A new zoning code, a new condemnation policy, a new vendor's ordinance, a full review of every fee the city currently charges while looking to reduce and eliminate many more. The completion of the refuse study, the completion of the storm water study, renewing the idea sessions, and addressing the nonprofits per this council's recommendations in the revised recovery plan and I'm sure there will be many more things

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we haven't even thought of yet.

So that's all I have for this evening, but every once in awhile we need to tell our story. That's all I have for now.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Evans.
Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. Just on the updating the zoning ordinance, we received an e-mail from Denise Prowell, who kind of lead the charge on implementing SAPA two or three years ago, and apparently the County's regional planning division is now taking steps to work with SAPA communities. They are assuming administration of the SAPA They hired two additional people in plan. their office and they are going to coordinate seeking funding through DCED to update these zoning ordinances in conformance with the SAPA plan so it was good news there.

Just an update on the street
lighting project, within the last few days a
totally of 40 fixtures were retro fitted,
Mulberry, Davis, Linden Street and the work
continues in the south and east sections of

the city, and as we travel to the different neighborhood meetings it seems like the street lighting project is being received very favorably.

We did receive a request last week that I mentioned about a resident who wanted a "No Parking" sign on Silex Street so we did send that to Mr. Pocius, our city engineer, and we are waiting to hear from him on that.

I did attend the Oakmont

Neighborhood Association meeting on Monday
along with Councilman Wechsler, and we
listened to a number of different concerns
from residents. The main concern was in
regards to cars being broken into, a rash of
crimes in that area, and Chief Graziano was
there and he addressed many of these
concerns. Some additional things that were
discussed were putting up neighborhood watch
signs, and reflectors on the stop signs in
this section of the city.

I'd also like to send, if we could, correspondence asking the city to make sure to include Oakmont in their lighting

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assessment. As I was driving up there, the street lighting is very sporadic and very dangerous driving at night. Also, there are several streets that we are going to need to submit to the DPW for pothole patching and to be included on the future paving list.

Again, several complaints this week regarding faded street signs or a lack of street signs throughout the city, I again would like to propose that the city develop some sort of street sign replacement program, a concerted effort, a strategic effort to replace these street signs throughout the city, whether it's on the website where people can submit a faded street sign or one that has been taken down or badly damaged or even a hotline where residents can call in and report these damaged, faded street signs, and this is definitely a public safety issue and it's one of the number one things I hear about each week, so I'll be getting in touch with our DPW director to see if we can work something out there.

We got more good news on the street

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lighting project, the city is going to receive a rebate from PPL for the energy efficient lighting project. Right now the amount is estimated at \$141,000.

I also received a complaint about a pile of debris at Yesu Lane and East Mountain Road, a really large pile.
Residents are concerned about that so if you could send correspondence to the DPW to possibly clean that up.

In regards to the issues and the letters and the questions that we sent about the sale of the Sewer Authority, the \$12 million. Apparently Councilman Wechsler had mentioned in caucus and earlier tonight that him and Mr. Evans are going to meet next Friday with Mr. Shrive to discuss these questions. I am disappointed by this. think that this meeting should be held in a public caucus. We all have questions for Mr. Shrive, we submitted those questions, but I don't think that a meeting should be held behind closed doors. This issue is too important, there are too many questions, too many concerns, and I do feel like it should

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be a public caucus and that should be held, so I would hope that this meeting could be held in caucus out in the public. And that is all I have this week. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Gaughan. Just to give my response, and I shouldn't say response, in my opinion this meeting is the best way to get the answers. The questions have been floating around really since the beginning of January. have not gotten any responses yet. In my opinion, as council president, I feel this is the best way to get the answers. answers that we get we will share them with everyone, but, like I said, in my concern I'm not so concerned with the questions I'm concerned with the answers that we get and this is my first attempt to get the answers that we need, and we discussed in caucus if we are not satisfied with the responses that we received after that meeting we will have to change our tactics to get the answers that we'd like.

As Mr. Gaughan said, we attended the Oakmont Neighborhood meeting and we go to a

lot of these meetings and it was an amazing turnout there, there were over 50 residents at the meeting and they actually found someone to become the new president and I'd like to congratulate Jessie Rosell who stepped up to become president of the Oakmont Neighborhood Association. I formerly was the neighborhood president, it's a difficult job, people expect a lot of you. When you help them out it's very rewarding, and as I told Jessie if you look at it more of a social thing than a work thing it will be very successful, as I think he will did a great job.

I spent a lot of time with Chief
Graziano this weekend. I attended the
neighborhood summit meeting. It was very
well attended. Also, there was
representatives from North Scranton, the
Hill Neighborhood Association, South
Scranton, West Scranton, the Plot,
Greenridge, Oakmont and also East Mountain.

As Councilman Rogan mentioned, I did reach out to the Hill Neighborhood president there to get us her feedback that she had

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received concerning the Serrenti Center. tonight we are sitting here talking about the Serrenti Center, and I think my other councilmen mentioned it, there was a site at Serrenti that was used as the motor center where oil changes were done, transmissions were changed. That site is not a part of what we are talking about here. That site was separated from the current Serrenti Center, sold off at a separate auction years ago. So there is a study in terms of the environmental impact at the Serrenti Center, but it's more or less what we would be in a garage or something like that. brownfield, per se, and I'm not sure whether it is a brownfield, that is it not part of this piece of property.

Getting back to the neighborhood summit, Chief Graziano reported on a couple of different items that he is working on they have installed some speed-timing devices and they're planning on buying two more in the area, and what the speed-timing devices do is they collect data on traffic, and in West Side during a three-month period

9 percent of the vehicles were traveling within the speed limit, so we get a lot of complaints and concerns about speeding and justifiably so, so these areas where we get this complaints we'll be able to put these monitoring devices in there and collect real data and then put some real emphasis on battling speeding there.

The chief is also working with the county. They are developing what they are calling an active shooter program, and that program would inform departments and citizens what to do in case of a shooting in a public place. Unfortunately, this is where we are at in society now that we have to be concerned about shootings in public places. Although we can't combat these random acts of violence, we can try to be as prepared to them as possible and I congratulate the chief on getting this program going.

He is also planning on establishing a junior police academy for sixth, seventh and eight graders. This would be a seven-week program with one hour a week

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trying to reach out to kids, and they are also going to conduct their normal citizens police academy.

At the meeting the other night our chaplain was there. Right now the chaplain they are adding four more chaplains to our The chaplain program in Scranton program. is becoming a model for these programs across the country. The last class that they gave the chief said a chaplain from Nebraska came here to take advantage of the The chief sat down with the Chief training. of Police of Baltimore at the Martin Luther King event and compared notes and our program actually is ahead of what Baltimore is doing right now. Very progressive, active plan for our Scranton Police Department to participate in this, and the chief is also working on using a record management system once again to control trends and analyze trends in terms of crime fighting.

Also at the meeting, besides Chief Graziano, was District Attorney Shane Scranton and I did approach them, this is,

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Mr. Zick, you and I have had some Facebook conversations about this, and I did approach them about what their opinion was on the decriminalization of marijuana. Both of them felt that it's something that should be discussed and they will follow along with what legislators say, but they personally both were against it, both men stressed that they have a fear that it's a gateway drug and that they -- that's the opinions that they have, so I think they are open to discussion and we'll have to, you know, go from there, but DA Scanlon had some very disturbing data about opoid deaths in Scranton, Lackawanna County over the past couple of years. In 2014, there was less than 40 opoid deaths. In 2015, there were 69. In 2016, there were 99 opoid deaths and there is 17 autopsies pending. The opoid crises, as we can see, is becoming -- it's always been a serious problem, but it's becoming worse. I'm not saying it's linked to anything else, but I think it's just a problem we have address.

In speaking with the chief, he is

open to discussion and some of the statistics that you presented we'll take a look at that and see what they mean --

MR. ZICK: Would a town hall be appropriate?

MR. WECHSLER: We'll see what we can do. We'll see what we can do, but the chief is very good at stressing the use of statistics and analyzing them, and he is open to discussion, so we will see where that gets us from there.

I just like to touch on, and various councilmen mentioned Mr. Boscov, and we heard tonight there is fear if Mr. Boscov passes what would happen. I think Mr. Boscov has left a legacy, especially in this city, if you go over to Boscov's it's always busy over there. There is people constantly there, and I would hope that his survivors would be able to carry out his legacy. Mr. Boscov took a chance on Scranton when nobody else was interested in doing it, and we owe him a debt of gratitude. He owes us a little bit of money, but that's two different things and

It's anticipated that this \$250,000 grant will cover the roof, the plumbing, and new heating systems. With new high efficiency heating systems and a plan to convert it to LED lighting throughout the building, I feel the utility costs could be covered by the sale of Engine 15 for at least ten years or more and would not be a

major expense after that. The building really is in good condition. Once the major and most important issues are corrected, the grant I think for the main renovations are very doable and it could be done over time and in a cost-effective manner as grant money becomes available with little or no impact to the taxpayers.

I had previously asked that the idea of a pole barn behind the police station be reviewed and am comfortable with idea or the fact that it was fully vetted and found to be cost prohibitive. With that said, this building gives the police department far more in terms of space and potential than pole barn concept would have.

I would like to thank Chief Graziano and Captain Dennis Lukasewicz and Detective Sergeant Robert Mark for the tour, their knowledge and their vision for the space.

It was really quite impressive, so I will be voting "yes" for this tonight.

First of all, I think it's important that we continue to institute safety measures in the areas of the trail throughout the city and I just want to note what was already reported in the paper, but maybe some people didn't

see. There was a report that was just issued that the use of the trail by people in Lackawanna County and outside of the Lackawanna County has risen from 128,000 in 2009 to 315,000 in 2016. That's a 146 percent increase.

Researchers from a consultant, Urban Partners, also found that direct economic activity ranging from people buying water, sandwiches, shoes, bicycles, grew from 28.3 million in 2009 to 64.6 million dollars in 2016, so a 126 percent increase. So I think it's important that the city continue to work with the Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority, continue to make it safe and accessible to people and continue to add to the trail, spur economic development, and possibly develop more of our riverfront. Thank you.

MR. EVANS: On the question, it's very important that we continue to support this type of enterprise. It tells you what kind of city we are and what kind of city we want to be and also lends to our quality of life. So I congratulate Natalie Gelb and

all of her hard work and all she has accomplished and this really is a very, very positive situation for our city and I look forward to getting lights down there and being even safer for all of the people to use it.

MR. WECHSLER: And also would tie in very well with the proposed new development along the Lackawanna River. We talked about the trail before and it is making Scranton a walking and biking city bringing opportunities that really weren't here a few years ago, and as we have just heard it is well used, it's free, which is always good, and the thing I'm impressed about is people take care of it. For the most part, it's trash free, it's graffiti free and people are taking pride in it.
