MR. PERRY: I have one quick announcement. Colts, the County of Lackawanna Transit system, is going to be running free rides on parade day this year, as they do every year. There will be some detours set for Saturday due to the parade route. Those could be found online, but again, Colts will be running free bus rides during the parade which is going to be, when is the parade again? This Saturday? Saturday at 11:00.

MR. ROGAN: I have one as well. On Easter Sunday, Buona Pizza will be having a free Easter lunch from 12 to 2 p.m. and all are welcome to attend.

MR. WECHSLER: Just to follow-up on Councilman Perry's remarks about the parade, just to repeat it again the St. Patrick's Day parade will be held this Saturday, March 11, at 11:45 a.m. The route begins at Mulberry Street on Wyoming Avenue, taking a left onto Lackawanna Avenue to Jefferson Avenue then onto Spruce. The reviewing

Avenue and Linden Street. Parking is available at all city garages for \$5 for the day. That includes the Marketplace at the Steamtown garage. Colts will be offering free bus transportation on all routes parade day. Please expect traffic delays if you need to travel through the downtown. One other announcement. Council will hold a work session tomorrow evening, Friday, March 10, at 4 p.m. in the Governor's room in city hall to discuss the proceeds of the Sewer Authority sale. That meeting is open to the public.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, city resident and taxpayer. Just out of curiosity, did any of you have a chance to go to the book sale that the Friends of Scranton Public Library ran last week raise

your hand? Gentlemen, for shame. Hang your heads in shame. You know, the proceeds went to the children's programs for the library system and just so you understand, Jim Lockwood, who just won a national award as a reporter, he came twice, bought books and CD's. Commissioner Patrick O'Malley came, filled a bag of books, and last but least, Commissioner Laureen Cummings came and I want you all to think about that and hang your head in shame, but write this down, the next book sale is June 6 through the 11 and you should try to redeem yourselves.

Okay, 243 days until November 7, the general election. 113 days to June 30, the deadline for the 2016 audit. I was one of the few citizens that attended the PEL hearing on Tuesday, March 7, on Scranton financial condition and I was really embarrassed because I think there were --well, there were three of you councilmen were there. Wayne, you were there, Bill you were there and, Joe, you were there, which I thought was wonderful, but there were only what four citizens? Marie, myself, Tom

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Ungvarsky, and Dave Dobrzyn, I think, and I just couldn't understand. It was 6:30 at night so everybody was out of work. after happy hour, so I couldn't understand why there wasn't a better citizen turnout, you know. A lot of citizens will, you know, give you their two cents on what's wrong with Scranton, but they won't take the time to come and see what's going on there. had an opportunity to make comments, which we cannot do tomorrow when you have your work session, what's going to happen to the proceeds from the Sewer Authority sale, which is going to be what 4 p.m. tomorrow afternoon in the Governor's room, and I agree with Mr. Gaughan who mentioned in caucus tonight that the acoustics in that room is terrible so you will excuse me, I'm a little old lady, I'm old enough for Medicare, and I'm going to stand up and I'm going to be sticking by head right in the middle of the table because I'm going to hear what people have to say and I don't care who gets offended among your guests. Ι think, you know, the one thing that this

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administration falls short of is transparency and full disclosure and if I have to stand up and approach the table to hear, I'm going to do it.

I saw articles in the Times-Tribune this week, and an editorial, about the nine municipalities in Lackawanna County that got together to decide what they want to do about storm water management and how they may cooperate and work together to reduce costs, and the one municipality I didn't see mentioned was Scranton. Have you had anything from the administration as to why Scranton didn't try to get into that effort? I thought that was a boat missed, that was an opportunity missed. I understand that the Arcadis study is in progress, but that should not have precluded this administration from sending somebody there even just to sit as a bug on the wall. could not believe that you have Dickson City and, what, Jessup and all of these other places and no Scranton and what's the one major shortfall on the sale of the Sewer No one else has storm water Authority?

costs and, you know, to have passed up that at that opportunity I think we shot ourselves in the foot once again.

Speaking of shooting ourselves in the foot, where is the RFP for the third party administrator for the pension plans?

The one that was in the pipeline?

MR. EVANS: It's still --

MS. HODOWANITZ: In the pipeline?

MR. EVANS: Yeah, it's still in

MS. HODOWANITZ: Is it like Roto-Rooter.

that --

MR. EVANS: It's in the pipeline.

MS. HODOWANITZ: It's in the pipe -you know, the Army has a term BOHECA. Do
you know what BOHECA stands for? Bend over,
here it comes again. BOHECA. And speaking
of pensions, why haven't we seen anything
about ordinances from pension reform like,
you know, having people on disability,
having their disability reverified or what
are you going to do about somebody who gets
hired doing the same job elsewhere getting a
disability pension, whatever happened to

that?

MR. EVANS: That's going to be a lot of heated discussion moving forward.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, congratulations to Councilman Gaughan. I love Granicus. The best thing you ever did. Now, if you could just get IT to put the January controller's report on the controller's webpage I'll be happy. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Lenny Serebro.

MR. SEREBRO: Lenny Serebro,

Scranton resident. Did anybody review the fire stick recording I gave last week?

MR. PERRY: I did not, no.

MR. SEREBRO: I handed it to her. I was hoping you would look at a five-minute video of the flooding in progress that we deal with in Keyser Valley there. You know, I truly considered coming here and getting down on my knees and begging for somebody to help us with the flooding problem. Now, here I'm going to talk about the same thing I did last week. In the February 25 storm that we had, a 12-inch water drainage pipe

right in front of my property in the street right at the curb ruptured and the water was gushing up above four feet, was coming right into my yard on my property, washed away the topsoil, opened up about a six to eight inch hole going directly into my cellar. repeating what I said last week that the cellar flooded, I called DPW. They came out, looked at it, confirmed a broken drainage pipe and they put in a request to the Fire Department to come and pump out my cellar because at this time of the cellar filling up the pump I have, because it's a common problem for flooding in that area, it stopped working. In the middle of that storm, I had to run out to get another pump.

Now, the fire company never came, nobody called, here it is two weeks later and that broken pipe the ground washed away so you can visually see the broken pipe, nobody has come out. Next time it rains, it's going to be the same scenario, my cellar is going to get flooded. I had to fill that hole with modified to seal the hole but the water is going to find another

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way into my basement, so there is that hole right there. I would consider it a dangerous situation, nobody has come out to do anything about it. I had to get a steel plate myself to put over the hole, I got a safety cone to put in there.

I have been on the phone almost every day calling DPW since that time what they are going to do about it if they can fix the problem. You know, nobody returns my phone calls. I feel like I'm blacklisted. Now, that nothing has ever is ever getting done about the 36-inch pipe that's plugged solid or about two-thirds of the way with debris, now I'm calling about something else, I feel like they have a the call identification that, oh, it's Lenny Serebro again. I have -- I have left messages with DPW various times during the Like I said, every other day I called the mayor's office, I left a message with the director, a detailed message of this Now it's another problem. even worried about the big drain pipe, but oh, my God, next time it rains what do I

have to do to get some kind of -- somebody to come out?

Now, I feel like I'm getting blacklisted because I don't mean to talk bad about DPW, but all I'm doing is stating my issue. I know that you people know I don't come here and be flipping out, you know, and I talked to -- leave the messages with DPW, you know, about the problem in a very civil way of, you know, like I normally talk, but nothing is getting done.

And, see, you don't even want to look at that video that shows the terrible flooding that's going on at the time, I just feel like I'm blacklisted because instead of keeping my mouth shut I just can't sit there and take it all, and I spoke about the garbage truck that comes through. Now it's going on our -- not just mine, but two other people's property putting deep ruts because the road is washed out from the flooding, and I don't mean to talk about bad about the garbage truck driver, but he tries to avoid those deep ruts and comes on our lawns and it's really destroying the lawn. See, I

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spoke about that last week, too.

I mean, what did you guys do? you do anything? This has been since last summer I have been pleading my case. I have had all of the neighbors here, we had a See, nothing. Absolutely nothing caucus. has been done. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Serebro. We have been in contact with DPW, we are trying to make it work. Personally, we don't do that. That is the responsibility of Director Gallagher and the administration. All we can do is put pressure on them, that's what we are doing.

MR. SEREBRO: The usual.

MR. WECHSLER: Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,

Council. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. Councilman Perry, I want to thank you for something else again now, I'm always thanking you, we got that left turn lane on Main Avenue to Oram Street.

SPINDLER: That's what I said. 21 22 At least look into it, it doesn't hurt to 23 look into it that a precedent was set there. 24 MR. EVANS: Mr. Spindler, I wasn't 25 here two weeks ago, can you refresh -- could

you tell me what that was about?

MR. SPINDLER: The town of
Princeton, New Jersey, sued Princeton
University, to have their nonprofit status
taken away and they won.

MR. EVANS: Oh, wow. Okay.

MR. SPINDLER: That was brought to my attention, I didn't see it, but Councilman Rogan --

MR. ROGAN: There is an article, I can send it to you.

MR. SPINDLER: I think it's definitely something that should be looked into because a lot of us have been complaining about the nonprofits not giving their fair share for years and years and years. The university has taken away taxpaying properties and it's got to stop. They have to pay more than they are paying because they are giving us nothing compared to what they should be.

Okay, for quite awhile now

Greenridge residents are coming here

complaining about properties caving in and

flooding and this and that, and I feel bad

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for the Youngs, but this didn't happen overnight. As the speaker said last week, this has been going on for 30 years and even the Young's attorney says it's going on for 30 years, where were these people before when Chris Doherty was in office? weren't they complaining then? He was in office 12 out of those 30 years and I was here all of these years, not one person came and complained. God forbid they come and complain about Chris Doherty. They would have been exiled out of Greenridge probably. The Seitzingers are always here complaining. Oh, I forgot, they worked for him so they couldn't complain, but I don't have any pity on them, they just started coming out of the woodwork now, it's been going on for 30 years, they should have been here the 12 years Chris Doherty was in office. stuff didn't happen overnight.

Lastly, there was an article about the double pensions last week in the paper that these people aren't going to get it anymore, that's another thing, these people should go after Chris Doherty, not the city.

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It was in the paper, he is the one that offered the incentive for double pensions and it was wrong, he never should have done He didn't have the right to offer that. double pensions, so these people should go after ex-Mayor Doherty who personally killed this city, but nobody listened to us that we were coming here all those years saying that he is going to do that. They called us the Legion of Doom because we always talked against King Chris, but everything we said was true. Our taxes got raised, the fire department won a big settlement, that's killing the city, nobody wants to listen, and that's all I have tonight. I hope everyone has a happy St. Patrick's Day. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Bob Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.

Bob Bolus, Scranton. It's nice to see young people showing up here and get an understanding of what government is all about, good and bad. You guys will get an education here, believe me. It's your future we are dealing with.

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You know, I was in here a long time ago, I came in, if you recall, Mr. Wechsler. I was asked by Albert and Elaine Young to address their issues and you told me I can't speak for them. I had to shut up basically and let them talk, which they were very uncomfortable. It was about the water problem in he Meadow Creek, Meadowbrook Creek disaster, the issues they had then and then you hear this gentleman here today coming in here talking. Now, you people sit here and say it's up to the administration, did you ever think of holding the administration hostage by not passing his legislation and doing his bidding so that these people get the service they desire? That's what leadership is about. Not sit here and push the football around, these people here they are -- I'm speaking them, they have never been taken care of, it's been going on for 20 years and we did nothing, but you guys can sit here and sign off on millions and millions of dollars for legal fees to lawyers for the Sewer Authority, Conaboy for the parking garage, a

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million and a half dollars, and you sign off all of this stuff and they look like at you don't know what the heck is going on.

What's going on with the parking garage? You gave him 4 1/2 million, almost \$7 million for parking spaces so the people could park. Is it my understanding that Basalyga is now charging \$10 a car for the St. Patrick's Day parade for people to park there? Do you have any idea of that? that going to be permitted? Those are our parking spaces we just paid millions of dollars for, and I better not see a sign telling anybody that's going to pay \$10 on that mall to park there, then you people should make sure that doesn't happen because that's our money that should be refunded back to us if he is abusing the gift you people gave him, and I mean it's a gift. Ιt was just the most ludicrous deal I ever saw in this city, and these are the issues I came here for.

I came here for a lot of other reasons, and what bothers me why when -- we had this all about women yesterday, why

young women, women like this, don't run for seats there. Janet Evans set some precedent, why don't they run for mayor in the City of Scranton or other Boroughs. They have the leadership skills, probably some of them have more damn common sense than most of us and look at things that can get things done. Just remember when you were a kid it was, "See your mother, not your father," who took over and did something.

So I'm reaching out to all women, start getting involved here. Don't sit home, come here and get involved, you can do a better job than a lot of people here. You know, I don't want to see backdoor deals here again in the backroom. This is what is here. We got plenty of room here for people to talk. Mr. Wechsler, you want to have meetings privately and then you are going to come out and you are going to tell us what you think we should hear or what we know or what you remember. I don't want to hear from you. I don't want to hear from any council member that sits in a back door

meeting. We want you right here. That's where you belong. That's where the mayor belongs. He sat on this council, he belongs here, but he is not doing his job.

When you are done with the money put \$3 1/2 million back in the golf course money that was taken that was put there, and the interest was the amusement parks and recreation, we won't have empty swimming pools, we won't have a park in disarray and you will have a cushion of 3 1/2 million and the interest being used. That's common sense. That's what you owe the people.

I got involved here because the zoning board, I had a meeting here over the containers at my house. I had people saying from East Mountain Neighborhood Association, which you and I used to be involved in, if you recall that, and I walked away from it because I couldn't stand them then and now I can't even stand them more, and they came in here with Hinton saying my containers are a threat or an issue. I'm 700 feet away. They don't bother anybody, but we are playing a stupid game again and we are going

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to go to Court and spend money and we are going to go on.

To see this here going on just turned my stomach. I watched today at Linda Kay's restaurant, the contractor was working there, he takes a couple of minutes and he is trying to do some work there and they came out and said they couldn't do it because it wasn't residential work. If you had two apartments it's okay to do residential, if you work on a third one you are considered commercial. That's what's going on here in the City of Scranton. a travesty. Total mismanagement. confusion. And that's one of the things that bothered me, we are never going to get out of distress. In three years you squandered every bloody penny here because you spend millions.

That's the reason that I seen what Mr. Wechsler has done, hammer people out, disrespect people --

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: And you can do it, but

I'm going to finish one more thing here, and

1 I don't want you every thanking me --MR. WECHSLER: One minute is to 2 3 finish your thought, not to --4 MR. BOLUS: No, Mr. Wechsler, 5 understand something it's reasons because of you, people like Hinton that I elected to 6 7 run for mayor again in this City of 8 Scranton. 9 Thank you, Mr. Bolus. MR. WECHSLER: 10 MR. BOLUS: Because if anything 11 needs to be cleaned up and the stench of 12 mismanagement that you people have signed 13 off on needs to be addressed and addressed 14 now and you need to be held accountable more than anybody else. 15 16 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Bolus. 17 MR. BOLUS: Don't thank me because 18 you are going to regret this, don't ever 19 thank me for nothing because if it's the 20 last thing I do it will be to see you on 21 this seat again. 22 Thank you, Mr. Bolus. MR. WECHSLER: 23 MR. WECHSLER: Ron Ellman. 24 MR. ELLMAN: That's another hard act 25 to follow, but you gentlemen know that the

Didn't know it? Where is this money going?

You know how many cars are towed in daily?

Can you imagine how people that need

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Well, before I explode, I'll let it go. I didn't show up last week because I didn't want to get in a -- confront that Charlotte Lewis about making this is a sanctuary city. I can't -- where do these people come from?

And you, Tim Perry, you advocated this in the paper, who did you think comes to a sanctuary city?

MR. PERRY: No, I didn't --

MR. ELLMAN: You think an architect is going to come or a brain surgeon?

Criminals come, that's who needs sanctuary.

That's all we need around here.

MR. PERRY: Well, I didn't advocate it.

MR. ELLMAN: I read the article in the paper, you advocated it. You didn't see nothing wrong in it.

MR. PERRY: No, I didn't --

MR. ELLMAN: Can you imagine this city, we are already like Hazelton with problems, making -- I don't know. I just can't imagine somebody thinking like this at this day and time. We hear every day about things in Chicago, problems. Philadelphia,

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San Francisco, their crime is rampant. I remember that letter you wrote me how things are going to change voting for you. Boy, that was a mistake.

MR. PERRY: I'm sorry you feel that way.

MR. ELLMAN: That's one of the biggest mistakes I ever made. That's why I threw that letter down right there. All of those promises. Well, to change the subject again, I was reading about the three bridges that may be repaired, I probably won't live long enough to see that, you know what they need to do is fire that Mr. May from PennDOT with his circles. I have been lost going to the airport. I never seen nothing so ridiculous and having to drive around and figure out how to get there. They ought to hire DeNaples. They probably get it done in a couple of days and save tens of millions of dollars. PennDOT, you know who works for PennDOT? People that aren't good enough to work for engineering companies. That's why PennDOT is in such disarray continuously, and I don't care who likes it and who

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doesn't. You know, what we have here is a city that is so badly mismanaged it's running out of control, and here we have an administration that thinks we are good, that we are well off. We got three men running this city. We got Henry Amoroso that works for the nonprofits, we got Gerald Cross from PEL, and we got Mr. Bulzoni from Mr. Courtright. You realize these three -none of them were elected, not a one of them lives in the city and pays taxes and house taxes and school taxes, but they have all of the power over us? This has gone too far. We need a new council and we need a new city administration starting with the mayor. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Ellman.

MR. PERRY: Thank you.

MR. FOLEY:

MR. WECHSLER: John Foley.

John Foley, Scranton.

Property owner. First, let me apologize
because I have not been here before. I
probably should have been here a month ago,
but we winter in Florida. However, I was

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able to follow the events of Scranton, specifically with respect to the sale of the sewer plant, and it is somewhat disturbing because seems that the biggest focus is on the professional fees. Well, I can't tell you whether those professional fees are reasonable or not. I will tell you some of the people, like the Uron Consulting Group, was in the same line of business that I ws in, so I'm familiar with it. The lawyers, those fees didn't shock me either, but what did shock me was the \$12 million that nobody knows what happened, and I say that because all you have received so far is an explanation. Those explanations I found to be wholly inadequate.

Let me explain to you. There is \$12 million short of cash. There was a cash amount established at the beginning of the transaction and at the end there was about \$12 million short. What are the things that impact cash? Not a lot. Let's say loss from operations, that's possible, but I looked at the operations for the Sewer Authority for the last three years and in

December 31st of 2015, and frankly, they had profitable operations, so I know unless something drastically changed in 2016 that wasn't it. I looked at the capital expenditures, including those under the consent decree. The amounts looked reasonable from year to year. One might have been, but that blip was caused by something unusual, but you borrowed the money, they borrowed the money to do that.

So I am now at a lost. Where could the money have gone? It doesn't appear it was from operations, but it might have been, but if it did something happened, something that did to the happen in the previous three years. It could be significant operating expenses, maybe maintenance expenses, and maybe those expenses were to improve the sewer plant. Maybe there are capital expenditures. Maybe they relate to the plant itself. Maybe some repairs, some modernization other than what was routinely being done year after year.

Now, then comes the question, why did they do it if those are the issues,

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which you are not going to be able to find out until you start digging. Now, I equated if it turns out that a lot of money was spent in that \$12 million for maintenance that was not done in the past to improve the plant or for capital expenditures I would equate it to no different than council entering into an agreement to sell your house, but at some point in the future you and the arm's length buyer established a price, but in the interim between the day you entered into your agreement and the closing either you on a benevolent basis or at the insistent of the buyer then you renovate your kitchen and your bathroom without an increase in the sale price. Ιt doesn't seem right. That's just not good sound business.

Now, council has done a couple of good things, and the first was getting something in writing. You asked a couple of questions, and I love people to do things in writing. Paper has always been my friend. I used to do a lot of litigation defense work for law firms, none locally, across the

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United States. I did work for the Department of Justice in pursuing people that defrauded the government, so paper has always been my friend. You got it first. Now, here is what I believe the key is. want to find out what happened? You need to take a look at the records, all of them, not just the financial records, but all the I have heard a whole variety of things. I have heard that, well, you sent the letters, you got written requests, I hear special council, and attorney/client privilege. I will tell you in my experience, particularly doing work for and against the DOJ, one of the things that worked really well for them was asking those people who said they did nothing wrong in the spirit of the transparency to ask them to waive attorney/client privilege.

So what I would urge council to do is send a demand to the mayor, who should also send a mayor to the Sewer Authority board and, frankly, is politically controlled, asking to waive attorney/client privilege. I believe you need to bring

something in from the outside. There is too much collegiality among Lackawanna Bar. You need to bring in an outside consultant and a lawyer to find out what happened to the \$12 million and, frankly, I don't view it as my \$12 million. I view that \$12 million as money that could have been put into the union pension plan.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Foley, unfortunately, your time is up. Thank you.

Anyone else?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, well, you know I have been calling for an investigation into this whole deal for quite awhile not only with the Sewer Authority but the Parking Authority, and in the Parking Authority way worse than the sewer deal. We lost millions of dollars with the parking. Not only did we take out a loan for \$30 million, we are paying almost the same price back to what we would have had if we bought the place in the first play, which we should have done. How you can say that a person that doesn't put a penny in it when it's a

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good ole' Joe you are going to give him a lease. You don't charge him for the lease. You give it to him. Give your good friend and he is going to do things for you. How dumb do you think we are? The guy that put a penny into the deal you gave him a lease for \$28 million because you like him, and then he turns around and hires another company to run it.

Now, you never said whether that company that's under it is a profit or a nonprofit. I will assume it's a profit because if it's a nonprofit what good would it be to you? Not only did we do that, then we turned around and gave a garage for a dollar, which was nothing wrong with your Maybe the Globe parking ripped up ethics. was a little run down, but the annex certainly wasn't. It wasn't condemned, it was bringing in I think they said around \$300,000 a year, but you thought that was worthless. Yous all thought it was worthless. Then you turned around and gave \$4.1 million to lease space in his garage knowing that you are tearing down space in

your garage. Did that make sense? No.

I called for an investigation. I wish there was more lawyers that would come forward and demand an investigation. We spent more money on these what you call selling of assets and ridding of assets than it would be if we kept the assets. It's going to cost us more than if we kept the assets, but I don't know how you didn't see that.

You are looking at figures, I know there have been \$4.1 million here and another \$1.2 million here for lawyer's fees and bond fees and these fees and that fees, something made out real good. Did the citizens of Scranton make out real good?

No. It's just too bad they don't realize what was done and how it was done and for whose benefit it was done, but not for the citizens. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

You guys got kind of white when that guy was talking about investigations. I think he unhinged you a little bit. You know, I'd

like to say this that, you know, St. Patty's Day is coming and I think the people really need to think about that for a minute because I think Scranton is lot like Ireland, believe it or not, before they left there they had the lace curtain Irish and the Shanty Irish. Well, the Lace Curtain Irish are running the city, and the rest of the Irish, which is the rest of us, whether you are Irish or not, well, you're the Shanty Irish, and the Lace Curtain Irish just keep abusing the Shanty Irish because what are they, just stuff to be walked all over.

I mean, driving to council today was almost ridiculous. I'm just sorry that I didn't drive my Ford Ranger truck because it would have did a much better job of getting their considering the beating the suspension took to get here, and we didn't have a hard winter, but things that take place in this city are beyond corrupt, they really are.

Two councilmen meeting, either with the solicitor or whatever you want to call, you know, the gentleman running the Sewer

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Authority now, whatever title you want to give him, holding meetings and talking to other people. It only skirts the sunshine It's all things that the public laws. should know, but the people we elect they have no concern for the people they represent because they really don't represent them, and it's gone on for a long time and we sit here and we watch certain council members smile about the silliness that's taking place here and I don't find it disrespectful, because some people are ignorant and some people don't understand what getting elected to a public office should mean, because I believe a lot of people who get elected think it's pay to play time, and with a lot of decisions that have been made in this city, I had a conversation with Mr. Cross, the head of the PEL, whatever title you want to give him, I called him on a Sunday, and he must have had an ID on his phone and he called me back, and he told me the city could have filed for bankruptcy and told me the year and everything. He said that's over.

were elected to represent us, could have took the city that way but they didn't, and all of the borrowing and all of the selling of public assets and public parks. I mean, what would the city do is the federal government came in here and said, "You sold the South Side Sports Complex and it was illegal because it was built with Section 70 funds and we want the money."

And what would this council do if what this gentleman standing here actually was speaking about came true and the Feds came in and wanted to start talking to you gentlemen and the mayor and various other formerly elected representatives of people and the sale and the mismanagement of our assets? What would you say to that because I know you wouldn't be that ignorant to them because somebody would sit you down in a chair and tell you, "Shut up and listen and we are going to talk to you and you going to talk back to us and then we are going to determine what we are going to do with you and this is the crime we think you

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committed, we may have take you to Court, but how would you like to go to jail?"

And then I think you would all sing a different tune because your suits would be all different because it's obvious from what I have seen coming here for almost at least 25 years I don't keep track of time, but nothing good has come here. Nothing. Absolutely nothing. There is nothing that you can say that's taken place in this city in the last 25 years that was good for the residents, and I can judge that by my own children who won't live in the city an by all of the children I grew up who left and never came back, and then the couple of us that stayed here and thought we would make a living, look it, I have no complaints. pay almost \$70 in tax just to live in this city so by that tax you can see the kind of money I earn. It's amazing and I could double that but I won't because I live here and I can understand the pathetic people we elect to represent us because the people in this city don't understand what good representation is. It's all about who you

know, and don't worry, he is our friend, she is our friend, and they are going to take care of us, and you can imagine what you can do with a suit on. Look at yourself in the mirror some day, but also look at this city and see what it looks like and smile about it because, look it, the sewer deal was terrible, the parking garage deal was terrible, the sale of our assets was terrible, the tax increases are terrible, our roads are terrible. Think of something nice though. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher.

Well, I want to thank Mr. Gaughan for ferreting out Granicus. I come close to saying it was worth the wait. It would have been nice to have it a long time ago and saved a lot of time and energy and quarters, but it is good that it is finally here and it's working and I hope it will continue to work.

Now, first, I'd like to question why tomorrow's working session is being held in the governor's room instead of here in

council chambers? Not only are the acoustics terrible in the governor's room, but holding this important meeting in council chambers would allow for the session to be available on ECTV for those unable to attend the meeting. This is your chambers. I don't know why you are not meeting in here and I will be shoulder to shoulder with Joan leaning in to hear, it's that bad, especially -- and I'm sure the fans will be put on so that it further causes hearing problems.

Okay, next, I would like to say I was very happy to read in the paper this morning that Judge Gibbons overruled the City's preliminary objections to the lawsuit filed by the Young and Kennedy families. I trust this case will proceed expeditiously and the properties will be returned to their original condition as promised by the Scranton Sewer Authority at the meeting held at Lackawanna College on the issue of property rights. It's the right thing to do. I congratulate and thank Judge Gibbons for what is he doing. I don't like the city

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has to spend the money, but if the city probably would have done this sometime, you know, in the last 40 years that he has been complaining it probably wouldn't cost as much as it is going to cost now so I will be not happy, but at least my tax money will be going to something right.

And this poor gentleman, Mr. Serebro, and I don't know what happened to that poor little widow lady that was also getting flooded every time he got flooded and it just -- it's just plain not right, neither is 307 right. I mean, taking down horses doesn't fix anything. I would urge you to go up and walk along that shoulder where the drop off where the white line at the end again is after two years of having been filled in, is crumbled away and measure just what it is. If you go off there with your tires. It just plain isn't right and it's going to be a big bill to fix and I hope that we hear tomorrow how much is going to be set aside, although I'm not really a fan of escrow accounts because it's pick, pick, pick and soon it's all gone just like,

you know, \$500,000 there. I think Mr. Rogan had something last week \$108 thousand for a project in West Scranton, you know --

MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, I understand, but there are other flooding situations, I think they all need to be looked at and we need to know what they are all and we need to cover them. All of those fees that were paid in that you are treating as a windfall, weren't a windfall at all, guys, that was our money and we are going to have to pay it again because now we have to pay in the PAWC.

The double pension meeting last
Friday, when, if ever, will we get to the
bottom of what really happened, what was
offered to those people? I mean --

MR. ROGAN: Our subpoenas are still tied up in the Courts, so we are waiting to get a determination on that regarding getting the state police records.

MS. SCHUMACHER: When?

MR. ROGAN: Hopefully we get them.

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MR. WECHSLER: I think that is just how it happened, the testimony on what they were offered I think that's all part of the Court case. What they were offered and I'm sure those people made that case during the testimony.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, you know, I have no way of knowing that but I would like to know. I mean, I have heard everything from it was for a couple of years until they reached a certain date, but even, you know, it was hard listening to some of those people and I didn't get here at the very beginning, but what also I found was less than classy was the fact that the mayor sent his proxy, it was the city solicitor, or the HR person, I'm not sure, I guess it was the HR person. Mr. Wechsler, you sent Lori, she had to vote against those people who were here, and Roseann Novembrino, our controller, was not here, she had a proxy. I think it would do you all good once in awhile to come and sit in on those meetings, and I have lots more but I will have to let it go for another week. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident. A few weeks back, we had some people in talking on law enforcement issues and last week, last Wednesday night, Marty Flynn threw a seminar over at the Hilton, they had free sodas and stuff, that wasn't the reason I went, it's PA with the advice of Governor, PA Board of Pardons guide, and if you can get in touch with Marty Flynn and get some of these pamphlets you could familiarize yourself with what it takes and how long an arrest record can follow you around and dog you into an early grave because it just goes on and on.

What this book says is that if you are arrested for any significant crime it will follow you until you are 70 years old, then if you are not -- haven't been arrested for ten years you can get an instant pardon. Otherwise, file the paperwork, run back and forth to Harrisburg, go on year after year, three years you might get a hearing and maybe you don't because they only give a

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couple of hundred away a year, so it's something you want to consider.

Yesterday, I saw some rather stern faces over our Auditor General comments on legalizing whacky packy, but the point being that we really want to consider what we are condemning somebody to before we arrest them and see if there is an alternative and also consider the fact that if you do get a concentration of people with arrest records and so forth, and this was absolutely free you went over the Hilton and it wasn't a wining and dining, but it was a very interesting conference and if you can get in touch with Marty Flynn maybe we'll be lucky if they left a book of these around or a box of books, these little pamphlets.

And next summer, every summer for the last seven years or eight years, I attended the People's Law School. It's thrown free by the Bar Association, it was at the mall this year, last year, and it has different things of interest and you can also talk to people from the D.A.'s Office, they have a crime night and elderly law

night, which I would think would be very helpful to somebody in the council position, so enough said on that for now.

Flooding, please, do what you can to help these people, they are getting kind of hyper pitched here and Mr. Serebro, who would like his video back, he told me to mention that quick.

And pension investments, now, I'm not against using the money for the pension, I want the money used for the pension. I want right to be done by the employees of this city and for retirees. We do need some reforms, but my major concern is that it will be handed out to Wall Street and the sharks will just jump on that hunk of meat and devour it in a matter of months or years and we'll be even worse off than ever.

5-F, we have a thing there about recycling and coordination, well, we haven't had any progress report and I don't want to be critical, I don't know what the people are up to, but I would be willing to listen to the progress report, and my point is that I don't see lot of progress, I see large

cardboard boxes out in front and behind houses along with garbage cans and stuff like that, so I'd really like to see some kind of progress or something gets started and some kind of program because I'm sure a good portion of that \$300 a year is just going all off for wet card board and that's not right. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

Dobrzyn. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?

MR. PERRY: Thank you. Where to start today. Let's start with the sanctuary city that was brought up. I don't know how else to go on the record by saying I'm against being a sanctuary city. When I was I interviewed weeks ago, weeks ago, by the Scranton Times I just didn't know enough about it one way or the other so I didn't want to give a state yes answer or a no. I mean, sometimes it's okay to say I don't know and that's basically what I did, but after my research I don't think you are

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going to find anybody that is more consumed with public safety than I am. It's my top most widely -- the government's top most function that they have to their individuals, to their taxpayers, to the people that visit the city, to people that visit this country is safety. If you are not safe when you are here, you are not going to want to be here. And let me tell you, if you think for one second that we are going to give safe harbor to somebody without, without the ability to extradite them there is no way, you go somewhere else. There is not type of city that I want so that's my answer for a sanctuary city, and not to mention there is federal funding that we would lose which makes no sense at well, so let me just get that out of the way on the record.

Also, what else do we have? Oh,
Lenny, I feel for you. It's not enough.
It's not an answer you want to hear, but
what I tell you that every day I'm working
on something, making a phone call, sending
out letters, having Mrs. Reed contact

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people, if I knew how to fix the problem myself I would put gloves on and do it. I don't. But it's not done by it's not for lack of trying by myself and any time I ask for help from any of my councilmen they are more than happy to help me push, but we are I do pushing as hard as we could. apologize, it's not done yet, but I don't want you to think indication that somehow, someway that the people up here don't care because I know we do, and it hurts. feel. When you feel pain we feel pain and I just wish there was absolutely more we could do for you, but that doesn't mean we are going to stop.

I'll keep making my phone calls as you do, you are hitting the same road as I am which doesn't go far, and it's starting to turn into multiple problems and I understand stand that, too, but that doesn't mean we just shut down and let it go away. We'll keep calling, we'll keep writing letters, we'll keep showing up, we will do what we have to do until we get the problem fixed. I can't promise you it's going to be

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fixed by tomorrow, but I can promise you I'm not going to stop until it's fixed. I wish it was -- I could do it on a more timely basis for you, I really do and I hope you believe me.

What else do we have? Just item 5-C tonight, which I want to do some research on, it's for an application for a grant for the Scranton Police Department anti-terrorism, it's going to fall under the umbrella of anti-terrorism. It's a \$45,000 grant which is going to be spread out three years with a company that it comes up with a software to help fight -- it's kind of a like a tactical software program that the military uses. I had the pleasure of talking to Sergeant Carroll today about it, he is the front runner on this grant, and basically what it is, is we will use St. Patrick's Day parade, this software could grid the parade and account for every police officer on that parade route, so the CO or anybody who has basically a cell phone who has this app they know where every police officer is and they know who the closest one

to the issue, and if there is an issue and it's going to make just manpowering a certain situation that much easier Sergeant Carroll explained to me, and it also works with other municipalities around the state program, whether it's Carbondale or Taylor, Moosic or whoever has this -- even dispatch could be aware of where the police officers are.

If there were, God forbid, an active shooter in a local school somewhere, not everybody knows where the chemistry lab is.

Not everybody knows where all of these -- this software will drop the blueprints right onto the map and that way the dispatcher and the responding officer and officer in route know exactly where everybody is, and that's kind of the triangulation point for this and he said there is -- he was kind of telling me, I could talk about this for a half hour, there is a lot of applications, but that was kind of to sum up.

And the first year it's \$15,000, which the city would front, then the next three years would be \$45,000, which the

grant would pay for. Any time if we are not happy with the software or where this is going on we could opt out. We could reallocate the remaining grant money to some other anti-terrorist funds that we see fit.

What else do we have today? All right, so one of the biggest issues right now we have, which is tomorrow at 4 p.m. in the governor's room is where we are going to find out the ultimate review of the modeling process that's been going on by the administration on where they find is the best resources for the funds for the Sewer Authority. Now, I can't encourage enough people to show up to that meeting.

Now, originally the meeting was going to be a one offer or two offer with a councilmen, which personally I was not satisfied with. That was something that I just -- I just did not want. I wanted it presented from the administration to the council all at once so we can ask questions. I feel we work much better as a body than we do individually. Something I might say might spur Mr. Gaughan or Mr. Evans might

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say something then Mr. Wechsler will say. I believe we should be together.

Now, with that being said we are going to be in the governor's room. Is it going to be in chambers? It's not going to be, but it is going to be a public meeting. The newspaper will be there, Mr. Lockwood will be there. I do expect and hope that as many people as possible come tomorrow at 4:00. 4:00 on Friday is a tricky time, I know I had to make a special request of my boss to leave work earlier, but it's important enough that I'm going to be there and I hope as many people as possible can be there. Again, is it the best time? not, I'll admit that, but I am happy that it's going to be in public. I am happy that everybody that wants to go can go and I'm happy that we are all going to be together instead of this one off which I don't think anybody was in favor of.

Finally, before I give up my time here, I just want to say that Saturday is the parade day. I want to make sure that everybody is out, having a good time, dress

warm, stay out of trouble, but enjoy your heritage. If you are not Irish, pretend you are Irish and just have a good time. It's one of the better days that we have in our city so please enjoy yourselves and thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. A couple of different items. First, I'd like to echo what Mr. Perry mentioned about the parade. As an Irish Catholic growing up in Scranton I think everyone's favorite day was parade day. I would just like to ask that everyone celebrate responsibly. As Mr. Perry mentioned earlier, Colts is offering free bus rides and I believe some of the cab companies do offer free rides on parade day as well so please enjoy responsibly and don't drink and drive.

Some good news, the West Scranton
Intermediate School once again won a
national C-SPAN student competition. This
year they were the first place finisher.
This year's theme was on gun violence and I

would like to congratulate them on their first place finish and I would like to also thank them that with that first-place finish they were awarded a \$3,000 prize and they donated half of that \$3,000 prize to charity. So I would like to congratulate the West Scranton Intermediate School and I was able to attend ceremonies they had in past years regarding the same program, the same competition and the intermediate school really has a track record of success in this national competition and it really speaks to the great work that our teachers and are students at the intermediate school are doing.

Earlier in the week, I attended a format at the Jewish Community Center regarding safety, particularly within the Jewish community and nationally there have been attacks and there have been threats made against Jewish Community Centers throughout the United States, I believe it was close to Philadelphia there was vandalism at a Jewish cemetery, and it was good to see our law enforcement community

come together, city leaders, county leaders to reassure the folks in our Jewish community that the city has -- that the city has protections in place and there are a number of the items that the city is doing and will be doing to keep them safe.

So it was a very good forum. The mayor was in attendance as well as Chief Graziano from the city, and the county, Sheriff Mark McAndrew was there, and representatives from the Federal Department of Homeland Security and the state police, so it was a very well-attended meeting and I think everyone left there feeling a little bit better about their safety.

Also, this week a number of us attended a special meeting on the parking in the Hill Section, and I know some of my colleagues will comment on that a little bit further. I will say it was a very frustrating meeting I believe for all of us that it's something that's been going on for a long time and there is very few answers. We are hoping that there could be some progress, but like many of the things that

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council does, and Mr. Perry kind of mentioned this regarding the flooding in West Scranton, Mr. Serebro's neighborhood, the most frustrating part of being a council member is we cannot physically go out and do things sometimes. We can't physically go out and hang the handicap sign or, you know, fix the pothole, and believe me, a lot of time it would be easier if we could. know, one of the biggest parts of our job is citizens' request, and the vast majority of citizens' requests that I receive you never hear about. You get a message on Facebook, get an e-mail, send it to our city clerk, who does a great job relaying those to department heads, sometimes call the department head directly or an employee directly, and I have to say the vast majority of citizens' requests that I receive are handled in a timely manner.

On the other hand, there are some that are extremely frustrating. I helped a resident on Washburn Street get a handicap sign that was waiting six months. That's completely not acceptable. And, again, the

frustration on our part is the same as what you are feeling that you know it needs to be done, unfortunately, we can't go out and fill potholes and we can't go out and hang up handicapped signs or go out and dig a trench to fix the storm water problem. I wish we could. It would be much easier for us, but we are helping, we are doing everything we can, particularly with your issues, Mr. Serebro, and just because we didn't watch the -- personally didn't get a chance to watch the video, I was in your neighborhood just last week and I did see you had a sign up your tree, I was checking out the area.

MR. SEREBRO: It's taken down there.

MR. ROGAN: It was there a week ago, but I was out there. You know, I was out there and looking everything that was going on and the lay of the land and, you know, we need to get all these issues resolved, so you are definitely not forgotten about, but we understand your frustration and we feel it as well with citizens' request a lot of times when we are trying to get things done.

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Finally, the last thing I want to mention, last week, this week actually, I had a social function and ran into the mother of Officer John Wilding, and we had a conversation about John and about the city and I would just want to mention she did give me this bracelet that I promised her I would wear tonight and I did want to mention that I know we are coming upon a year and a half, two years since the tragic passing of Officer Wilding, but I think we forget to say this enough during the course of the year when something tragic doesn't happen is to thank our police officers for the work that they are doing, and particularly those that lost their life serving to protect the citizens of Scranton. That is all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.
Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. Last week

Marie asked a question about have there been
any new permits issued for the new tax

abatement program and the answer is sadly
no, but we are monitoring that. Clearly

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there is disconnect between the ordinance and the getting the information out to the public, so I still believe we have a valuable ordinance, a valuable marketing tool, but if no one knows about it then really wants the point. So to recap the ordinance, any new construction in the city, an addition, a new home, a new garage, a new commercial building or an addition, a converse from apartments to condominiums would qualify for a three-year tax abatement program for the program on the assessed improvement value and corresponding tax. The school district, the city and the county are participating in the abatement so I'm going to request the administration to see if they can do something on the marketing approach to some of these ideas that we put forth out there in the public so we can get some activity and growth in the city.

On the meeting tomorrow in the governor's room, I certainly would have preferred that to be -- we all would have preferred that meeting to be in city council chambers, but our invited guests have

indicated they prefer the governor's room so the topic is just too important to cancel or not have at all. As the Rolling Stone song says, "You can't always get what you want, but sometimes you just get what you need," so hopefully we are going to get what we need tomorrow night.

On pension reforms, following up on my comments last week, I would like to offer a basic outline of some of the reforms I would like to see relative to the pensions and some of their comments about pension reform itself. Clearly, the number one thing that has to be done is the hiring and the implementation of an independent third party administrator who will have specific duties relative to disability pensions.

This has to be in place prior to any infusion of the funds into the pension plan.

I also think it's imperative to reduce the current rate of return. It's currently at a rate of 8 percent, which is too high and certainly not sustainable.

When we don't reach that number, it has a negative impact on the MMO. Conversely, if

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we lower the rate of return to say 7.5 percent, and we exceed our expectations we can actually lower the MMO with the excess proceeds beyond the rate of return. To take it further, I would like to see any excess proceed or some of the excess proceeds received beyond the rate of return to further buy down that rate until we reach an even more realistic rate of return This is something that the assumption. Auditor General was adamant about in his report about Scranton's pensions. One of his recommendations was to call for, and I quote. "The use of honest estimates of

But for the city to get even a .25 percent reduction it would take almost \$4.5 million to buy that reduction, but I think it's money well spent because the effects of this will be positive for decades. We can't continue to have a short-term view on everything that we do. We need to look at our decision with a view towards long-term impact as for our city and our taxpayers.

investment returns."

Another reform that I would like to

see would be a clarification of the quota funding only after the plan reaches the 50 percent level. The current the plan is not absolutely clear and does not even percentage level. While this may require legislation or may require and MOU with the unions, this is something that the Courts have viewed in our favor in the past and I think it's something that we all agree can happen relatively easily.

The current rules that govern the pension boards are, quite frankly, all over the place and disjointed at best. I feel a comprehensive ordinance that codifies all of the rules of the pension fund should be developed and passed as a single new ordinance. This is something that we can discuss with Attorney Durkin when he comes to visit us at our caucus next week.

I would also like to see some changes in the makeup of the pension boards. My goal, at the very least, would be to add another board member to each pension board who would be a citizen representative, someone who is clearly independent of the

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board and the pensions and who has a background in finances and/or accounting.

In addition, or as an another alternative, I was suggest creating an independent board of an investment experts that can be used as a resource for the existing pension boards. Once reforms are made, I would further recommend that the funds from the proceed of the SSA sale that are dedicated to the pensions be placed in a trust and managed outside of the current pension board structure. There may be additional reforms to be discussed as well with some of my colleagues and hopefully some from the administration. If not, even offer additional proposal as time moves on or as the coming weeks approach, but we also have to keep in mind that because there has not been fiscal reform done at the state level, some of what I discussed may occur in oversight by state statute and may not even be allowed so we are going to find out. are going to ask Attorney Durkin and we will ask Attorney Minora when he returns to see if we can reconcile those reforms with some

of the state laws that govern the pensions.

To that point, clearly there has been a lack of vision or commitment on the state level in dealing with municipal pension reform. For example, in California, specifically San Diego, state statutes allow for a complete restructuring of San Diego's pension board so that the majority of pension board members are, in fact, independent members with financial and investment expertise as opposed to union and city representatives who have an inherent conflict of interest when determining the pension benefits.

In Rhode Island, state law dictates that COLA adjustments were suspended for pensions if they were funded less than 80 percent. Our state law doesn't define a number.

In Michigan, as far back as 1997, all new hires with the state were automatically enrolled in a defined contribution or 401-K style plan in which the state contributes 4 percent to each employee's salary. That was nearly 20 years

ago. When I came before and said 401-K for new hires at the state and local level they seemed like it sent shivers does the spines and the backs of every bureaucrat I talked to. We are shortchanging new hires and future employees but not offering this option, as well as our taxpayers.

As an example of how employees may feel about the difference between a defined benefit plan and a defined contribution plan, again, a 401-K-type plan, when you have a choice you only need to look at the State of New York. Nearly 100 years ago, the State University of New York had adopted a pension system that allows workers to chose a traditional defined benefit plan or to chose a defined contribution plan or a 401-K. In 2010, 71 percent of all university employees were in the 401-K plan.

At the end of the day, we need to move forward to our pension management system that should be apolitical, transparent, and performance driven. While this may be a work in progress, I would remind all current pension board members

that they have a fiduciary duty to preserve the plan's long-term sustainability and to make decisions about pension reform that reflect that duty now and in the future.

We are all in this together and we all want a healthy, sustainable pension plan for all current and future retirees, while balancing our obligations to our taxpayers as a primary consideration. It would be irresponsible of us as elected officials to infuse the pensions with cash without reasonable and long lasting reforms. That's all I have on that tonight. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Evans.
Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you, quite a few items tonight. First of all, I'd like to thank the students from Scranton Prep for coming to our meeting, especially Logan Munley. Who is Logan? Is Logan here tonight? No? I think he is. A very popular guy, I knew he was coming so I want to thank Logan and all of students from Scranton Prep for being here tonight.

The second thing, I want to thank

our staff, especially our city clerk Lori
Reed, Cathy Carrera, Jamie Marciano, for all
of their help in finally getting our
Granicus project up and running. As Mrs.
Schumacher and Ms. Hodowanitz pointed out,
it's a totally different system and it took
a lot of work to get it up and running, as
you well know. So Mrs. Reed really ran with
the project and if it wasn't for her hard
work none of this would have happened, so I
want to thank her especially for all of the
work that she put into it.

I also want to thank the IT

Department, Frank Swietnicki and Larry

Abaldi for all of their help and their hard

work in getting this project up and running.

I also want to thank the business administrator, Dave Bulzoni. About two years ago when I came to him with this project we knew it was going to be a lot of work to get it off of the ground, he stuck with it and I really appreciate that.

And I also want to thank my colleagues for being a part of this. Just to remind everybody, you know, what this

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project is, it's called Granicus and Granicus is a website platform, so everything that we have in front of us, in this packet, you used to come down to city hall, like Mrs. Schumacher and Ms.

Hodowanitz, anybody who wanted a copy of a piece of legislation and you had to pay 25 cents a page for a copy. Now, this is just one example of what the packet looks like. We have had packets with hundreds of more pages, a lot of paper. Now, all of this is on our website so you can go on Scrantonpa.gov and you can see everything that we see. So we have made our office way more transparent, way more efficient, we are going to save roughly \$30,000 a year with this program. From an environmental perspective, we are going to save anywhere from three to five trees a year, and it's going to make us, as I said, much more transparent and much more efficient, so I want to thank everybody once again for being a part of that project and I'm so glad that

As to Mr. Serebro's issue in Keyser

it's finally up and run.

Valley, I share everybody's frustrations with this issue. I would ask that we send a letter to the city engineer, to our DPW director, and find out what has been done, what they are planning on doing, and what a timeline looks like and I would like that in writing so that we can find out exactly what the plan is because I hate to see people get jerked around continually.

Another couple of citizen requests, the 2200 block of Winfield Avenue in South Scranton there is a lot of issues with abandoned vehicles and a vehicles in people yards so we had to send something to the Licensing and Inspections Department and the Police Department.

I'd also like to ask my colleagues if he would agree to send a letter to the administration asking that they consider paving the 500 block of Campbell Street up to the 600 block of South Webster Avenue. A resident sent me photographs today. They have no curbs, no storm drains, and major issues with that street literally falling apart. The potholes are extremely large and

something has to be done up in that area of South Side.

Also, a letter was sent, Mrs.

Robinson was here last week, about

conditions found at the 800 block of Hampton

Street. The empty lot is overgrown with

high grass and there is a major snake

problem. I was trying to help her in the

summer but obviously that didn't work out,

so we did send a letter again to the

Licensing and Inspections Department Monday,

March 6, so hopefully that gets taken care

of.

A woman who has been, and I can't remember her name, but she has been coming to the meetings once in awhile, she's from the Hill Section, she was kind enough to compile a list of street signs in the Hill Section which are faded and/or missing so I'm going to forward that along to the DPW, it was quite an extensive list, I know she is not finished with it yet, but we need somebody from the city who is going to take on that task and we need -- I think we need a comprehensive program to go neighborhood

to neighborhood because from what I have seen this is a major public safety issue, especially in the Hill Section. I get complaints about it every week. South Side, West Side, there are street signs that are faded and missing. Stop signs the same way. So I really think we should develop some sort of program within the DPW to deal with this issue at least so we have some sort of inventory.

Regarding the special meeting that we attended in the Hill Neighborhood meeting, there is obviously major, major issues on Prescott Avenue regarding the Hindu Church, parking issues, more so loud music coming from the church, trash among a number of different things, and I believe that something has to give up there because people are obviously not happy who have lived there their entire lives so I would ask that we send a letter to the administration asking that they enforce the laws, that they send the fire inspector up to the church to make sure there are no fire hazards up there. There are several

residents that complain that they may be violating the fire code so I would like that to be looked into.

Also, there were several concerns about a bell tower on top of the church with pigeon feces that is apparently in the process of being taken down. I would like a copy of all permits that have been pulled for that project and I would like to see if any environmental remediation has been done on that bell tower. Again, another pretty serious topic that residents were concerned about.

We have repeatedly here on council talked about the condemnation ordinance and the fact that we need to review it and we need to change it, and we did get a very interesting proposal from the director of the Lackawanna County Tax Claim Bureau, and I'd just like to read some of what he said and then I would like our solicitor took a look at this so we can possibly form legislation. He goes onto say in this e-mail to council that, "We have had success selling property in the City of Scranton,

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however, I am getting less activity on condemned city dwellings because of what I believe is a legislative glitch in city condemned property ordinance. Let me say, I believe your ordinance is fine to hold landlords who have let their properties being blighted in non-compliance with the city codes accountable for their actions by a posted bond prior to securing a building Where I take exception to this is when a new owner from the county judicial sale is held to the same standard. owners were not the ones that put in the property in condemnation. These people are the ones trying to get it out of condemnation, repair it to code, sold or leased and back on the tax roll and blight eliminated.

Therefore, I am requesting that city council consider amending the current legislation to simply add a section that speaks to the new owner being given a six-month grace period before they would have to post a bond. The new owner would be issued a building permit and would have six

months to substantially finish renovations. If that happens, then no bond would be necessary. If not, the city would reserve the right to impose the bond after the six-month grace period. As you are aware, most bonds must be collateralized usually dollar for dollar."

So I think that we should take a look, a serious look at this and I would like to ask, Attorney Minora is not here tonight, but next week if we could ask him to take a look at this and get together with the city administration and work on reforming that ordinance.

I'd also like to ask in Fifth Order tonight we have piece of legislation where we are going to renew a contract with Joyce Hatala, who is our recycling coordinator. We discussed this in caucus. I would like ask before we take a final vote on that to ask Mrs. Hatala and Mr. Lynch, who is the recycling coordinator, to come into a caucus, a public caucus, and update us on the recycling program, what progress has been made before we take a vote on retention

for another 18 months.

As for the Young issue, the hole on Wyoming Avenue, I wasn't here last week to speak about this and I would just like to touch on it briefly, I was very disturbed by the article in the paper regarding this issue that has consumed the Young's backyard. In my opinion, the mayor, again, has failed the Youngs and residents of this city by his blatant, careless attitude on this issue and two of the quotes that I almost fell off my chair, "We're not sure if this is the City's problem" and "it would be a vast strain on City's resources."

Yet, when I look at the some of the things the city are doing and we seem to have no problem paying attorney's fees, taking care of the mayor's friend, political contributors, we could have taken care of this problem a year ago so it's pretty sad now that it's wrapped up in the Court's so I continue to be disappointed on that.

I did receive a response from the executive director of the Sewer Authority,

Attorney Shrive, he did let me know that he

is compiling the documents that I have requested. I requested a copy of all invoices for legal work that was done. I also have an additional request, I'd like to know what services were rendered for a bill from the law firm that is related to Henry Amoroso, who is the city's financial advisor, dated January 23, 2013, in amount of \$39,000. I would like to see a copy of this invoice as soon as possible.

And I want to reiterate, as one speaker came up, how outrageous I think this whole thing is again. It seems to me like this sale has been a piggybank for the attorneys and Mayor Courtright's political contributors and his friends. Where are the invoices, where are the hourly rates, where are the fee agreements? The public has the right to see this information.

Also, in looking over the Parking
Authority lawyer's fees, Ned Abrahamsen of
Abrahamsen, Conaboy and Abrahamsen received
\$200,000 like he did for the sewer deal, I'd
like to he invoice on that. So what was the
hourly rate, what work was done for that

fee? It seems pretty high to me.

And, lastly, we were informed by Councilman Wechsler that there will be a meeting tomorrow between city council and the administration Friday March 10 at 4 p.m. to discuss the allocation of the sewer sale proceeds. This meeting will take place in the room next door, the governor's room, rather than in council chambers. I requested that this meeting take place at that table in council chambers with the television cameras on, but apparently Mayor Courtright and the administration refused.

I also find it coincidental that this meeting, which is very important, is taking place on a Friday at 4 p.m. I am asking my colleagues to demand that this meeting be held in council chambers and be televised for the record the public. I just heard my colleagues say that they would prefer that it be held here. Well, it should be here. Why are we having it in the governor's room? Why are we having it where it is hard for the public to hear what was going on, it's hard for councilmen to hear

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what's going on because the heat that goes on in that room, we were at a meeting there two months ago, it's very difficult to hear, so why would they refuse to have it in council chambers? I just find this whole think outrageous. You know, this isn't an issue about a street sweeper or a pothole, this issue is about spending ten of millions of taxpayer and ratepayer money. extremely significant, so significant that it should not be held in the governor's room where there are no cameras and where it's extremely difficult for anybody to hear what is going on and to hear the conversations that are taking place. I don't understand why Mayor Courtright and his administration is afraid to meet with us in council chambers. I truly do not understand it. Не was a councilmen for six years. In fact, I think he sat here or in this seat. not understand that the public would like to be included on one of the most important issues the city faces and not everybody can make it down to the governor's room on a Friday at 4 p.m. So, again, I am

disappointed and disturbed that the mayor of this city continues to play hide and seek with city council and the public on this issue and a number of other issues and the lack of accountability and leadership is frightening. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

Gaughan. Just to comment, the issue in regards to the bonds, the condemnation bonds, I started that process two weeks ago. We submitted a letter to the city solicitor to start looking into it so I agree with your idea and I think we should support that because I think that is a major detriment to the condemnations of the city.

In regards to the meeting tomorrow evening, we did request that the meeting be held in city council chambers and televised. Unfortunately, we don't have the ability to demand the mayor to do anything. We can suggest, we can ask, we can cajole, we can do whatever possible way we can do it I did try, but last week consulting with my colleagues, Mr. Gaughan was absent last week, we did discuss the meeting and, once

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again, in my regards it's the same thing we talked about before, we have to get the information, this is when all of the players are available, this is just a work session, this just an initial description by the administration of what they are going to propose, it's not set in stone yet, and I would really like to focus -- I'd really like to focus on the details of the plan instead of the how the plan is being presented. The meeting is open to the public. I believe it will covered by the Times. I'm assuming that perhaps other local media will be here at well. I wanted to have this meeting prior to Attorney Durkin coming to our session next week and this is just the most, even though it is a Friday afternoon, it was the most readily available for all of the players to be there, so I just want to get this information out as soon as possible and this is the opportunity that presented it best.

This evening, it's always surprising that sometimes that I disagree with our speakers, the one thing that I did disagree

with tonight was about the comments about PennDOT. I have worked with PennDOT on several different projects, large projects, and I found the engineers to be very professional. I have found the engineers to be very courteous to residents who have been effected by different projects within the neighborhoods, and I totally disagree with the fact that PennDOT are engineers that can't find work anywhere else. I would like to compliment the PennDOT engineers.

Ms. Schumacher, you know how hard they have worked on the East Mountain Road project. They are working very hard on the Harrison Avenue bridge project. They have managed to get the Rockwell Avenue bridge project near completion with all the problems with that and I do not think they deserve that criticism.

Last evening, I attended 85th anniversary of the UGL Company. I would like to congratulate them on their success over 85 years. They have been managed to stay in the Scranton area and provide family sustaining jobs to their employees. They

have a great local flavor to their management company and I would like to congratulate them on their success.

Just touching base following up on the meeting that we had on Prescott Avenue, this is a very delicate situation. There is conflict between a church and residents.

The church is growing perhaps faster than it can control. We do have to a find a way to protect the interests of the property owners and we do have to find a way to not tread on religion in the area. A very difficult situation.

I'd like to thank the councilmen that were there last night just to get some information and try to get started so we are going to -- as Councilman Gaughan said, we are going to contact the city officials to see what can be done in terms of license and inspection. Chief Graziano was there, I think Chief DeSarno was supposed to be there, but got called to something else, just so we can make sure that the building is up to code and that it's serving the purpose that it's designed for without

impacting the neighbors. We are going to talk to -- there is some leadership at the church in addition to -- in addition to the pastor there. There is a committee, and that person isn't local so we are going to contact that person to see what we can do to come to some sense of cooperation in the neighborhood there and that's the main goal and hopefully we can get something worked out. That's all I have.

MR. ROGAN: I apologize, I have one thing to -- and I know I would get yelled at if I forget it, I would like to give a big shout out to Chris Kayes and Tom Pattison from the South Side Neighborhood Watch.

There was a number of buildings that were covered with graffiti over the course of the week and they acted quickly and were out and covered it up and I was actually on the phone with Tom while he was covering up that graffiti so I just wanted to give him a thank you and I apologize for forgetting to mention it under my motions. Thank you.
