lose. I don't know why you are pushing for a reassessment at this time. The truth is, you force the mayor to follow the state recommended guidelines for taxes, but yous don't, you got your head in the sand and that's not right.

I told you when yous all came out there to sit the first time to talk about oppression I talked about this many times, I kept pointing out Scranton is not Ireland and you are not the British, but you are doing the same thing to the Scrantonians as the British did to the people in Ireland and I don't know how you can stand to do that. You have been oppressing the people or you haven't been oppressing the people, but I don't know how you can sit there and stand and not force the mayor to do that, to ask for a lousy reassessment. You have no trouble going to the courts, real fast (unintelligible), but oppression is more serious.

This is backbone of the whole democracy. You cannot oppress people and think they are going to stand idly by and take it. We are not. You got the lawsuits against you now, the only thing is you got for force this on to the Supreme Court and get a ruling one way or the other. A city that sits there and tries to avoid one way

So she told -- she tells me to go to my bank and get copies of my two checks, back and So now I have to go to the bank tomorrow to get copies and I have to pay for the copies and I have to waste my gas to come here again to prove I paid for the garbage tax; is this right? I have to waste my time, I have to pay for the copies, I have to waste my gas and then I have pay \$300 for a garbage tax. You know, are you going to lower this garbage tax this year? Nobody?

MR. GAUGHAN: At this point, I don't think -- there was an effort underway with the recycling initiative to see if we could

move to a pay as you throw program so you would only pay for the amount of garbage you put out. Unfortunately, that study has not been completed yet. When Mr. Bulzoni was here last week he should said it would probably be done in the first quarter of 2018. Unfortunately, at that point, we probably wouldn't be able to go back anyways because you would have to implement the program, so to be honest with you at this point it's probably go to stay at \$300.

MS. KRAVITZ: It's ashame because I can't afford it. I'm selling my house and I'm getting out hopefully next year and I don't know, I think this is terrible. I just want to know where my money went to. Did it go to another bill? MR. ROGAN: When Brunetti's was there it was always painted "One way" on the building and people like us who live in West Side our whole life we know that, but people from out of town or just -- they don't know. So you can't even fault the drivers a lot of times, they just don't know.

So if we could send a follow-up to PennDOT and, unfortunately, this one is a PennDOT road so the city -- there is nothing the city can do, but it's a dangerous situation that the state needs to address.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay, something I mentioned last time I was here and I have mentioned for 11 or 12 years now dangerous doing legislation. I think it's time the people have to do something. I'm sure you heard about the tragedy two weeks ago at Petsmart for that tiny dog was ripped to sheds by a pit bull and I hear people say, oh, pit bulls turn the are not bad dogs, it's how they are trained and how they're

All of those ideas are welcomed in the process and is meetings a chance to address those directly to the groups involved with the park developments. There is a stop at each location, but it wraps up with the big one at Steamtown and we have seen several hundred folks come out there, families and children of all ages. We will have music and refreshments, live music and visits from santa at each stop. It's really neat to see santa show up right at the historic site on a locomotive, really great afternoon.

The county Christmas tree lighting

on Thursday, November 30, 6 p.m. at courthouse square on the North Washington Avenue side of the building. There will be a brief ceremony featuring live Christmas music and refreshments.

Also, the Scranton Made Holiday
Marketplace at the Globe Store will take
place on Friday, with the opening on Friday,
December 1, 5:00 p.m. We will have the
public lighting of the building. If you
drive by there today you will see a lot of
decorations are up and are going up, so we
are having a public lighting in the open
marketplace December 1 on First Friday at
5:00 p.m.

The Holiday Marketplace is going to be open Friday from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m., Saturday 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Sunday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. That's, of course, the first, second and third, it's just that weekend for those hours.

The annual Festival of Trees opening reception, once again, the Festival of Trees benefiting Toys for Tots takes place on Friday, December 8, 5:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

In other words, it didn't say that even though they billed it as senior affordable housing, there was nothing in there that said you couldn't go above a certain rate so that was unfortunate, but I'm hopeful that this meeting will provide some kind of answers to these senior citizens who are obviously having a lot of difficulty.

Hodowanitz rather, I'm pretty sure a meeting was held today between Pennsylvania Water and the Arcadis regarding the storm water study so I would like an update on their assessment and then find out, you know, a timeline on when was report is going to be complete.

One of the other things that I want to briefly mentioned, and I have talked about this before and I intend to bring it up to the mayor to see if there is something we can maybe start in 2018, when you are looking at what other cities do in regards to the blight, I don't think we need to reinvent the wheel. The approach that Scranton has taken over the last, you know, couple of years is to condemn a house, to knock it down, to send an inspector out to give a quality of life ticket. Other cities take a completely different approach and while they still do those things they come up with -- or Boston, rather, came up with something called the Boston Shines Program and I think that the City of Scranton should try to model it after the City of Boston.

Boston has a bigger population, they are different, obviously, in many ways than the City of Scranton, but one of the things that they have done is neighborhood cleanup efforts that are coordinated by the city, which I have been a proponent of since I started on council. So they are looking at revitalizing neighborhoods one block at time.

The interesting thing they do is something called a Love your Block main grant program. They work with the neighborhood groups, they work with the neighbors to plan park and block cleanups so there is an organized effort which I think has been missing in the City of Scranton over the last number of years. There is also something on the city's website where you can actually submit a request to host a cleanup in your neighborhood park or on your block and then the city helps determine the best project, there is an online form that you have to fill out.

So there is a number of the different things here, I won't go through

all of them, but I am going to try to meet with the mayor on this to see if it's something that we can investigate and try to accomplish in 2018.

Also, just an update on Smart City
Media, there is an attempt to set up a
meeting at some point in December to get
this project going. It was kind of a rider
on the street lighting project. The meeting
is going to be held and review the system
features, detailed program objectives
associated with the kiosk project and one of
the great things about this is that we are
going to get revenue from this program and
that may fund the program, as I just
previously mentioned, so we will be excited
to get started on that.

Just an update on the street
lighting project, all power issues have been
taken care of as of November 13. The
fixture on Railroad avenue has been replaced
and they are working towards a complete
close out of the project. So it is still
going on, they are in the very final phases
of it. The 500 block of Lackawanna Avenue

retrofit is being scheduled along with the Davis Street area, and according to the report any outstanding deficiencies are being taken care of.

City council right now we don't have answers to those questions because we just received the budget, so many of the questions that are submitted to us we are going to forward those to the administration because they will have the answers, we don't have the answers for that.

One concern that I have, there was some talk about some realignment within DPW, part of the questions I have is how many people are going to be assigned to storm water management because independent of the Arcadis study, the city still and always was responsible for storm water management. Always was. They were assisted by at that time the Sewer Authority so the city has always been responsible for storm water management but the city is not responsible for the entire storm water management, Pennsylvania American Water is still responsible for the combined sewer system. So as you drive through the city and you see these green lines identifying SSA that's Pennsylvania American Water Company putting that out there.

So the city is responsible for just storm water only. We have always been responsible for that, so I am anxious to see what personnel are going to assigned for that duty from the DPW, and they have been doing it right now and I would like to see more of a prescribed/SRAOEUBD plan for that.

The last couple of weeks we have been given the county a hard time, but I would like to give the county a compliment this week, Mr. Hetman. I saw yesterday, I think it was yesterday in the paper they are planning on paving North-South Road.

Councilman Rogan had brought that up a few weeks ago about businesses having a huge investment in the industrial park over there and the County is stepping up and doing the paving over there on North-South Road and we appreciate that tremendously.

This week I attended two community meetings, Mr. Evans attended the one with me NRN is a -- we had a meeting concerning the program for developing some improvements into downtown Scranton. It was a meeting of community leaders and members of Scranton Tomorrow. Very positive meeting, a lot of community leaders that are pushing their support of down town Scranton, hopefully this will bear some fruit for us as we move on down the road.

Based on my initial review of the budget I do have several questions, some of which I discussed with my colleagues back in the caucus tonight. The first question that I have for the administration is taking a look at the recommendations in the three-year exit plan I'd like to ask which of these recommendations are underway already just to give us a list of those, which of those recommendations are expected to be completed in 2-18 just to give us a general update and timeline. A comprehensive update on the

status of those recommendations.

One of my initial concerns is that the expenditures proposed by the city in 2018 are \$91,692,110. The exit plan projections are \$88,184,000 for a difference of about 4 percent, so \$3 million so according to PEL's letter we are almost 118 percent over capital expenditures, so my one question I did pose this in the caucus, and I'd like clarification on this, for all of the increases in capital expenditures where are we -- are we reimbursing that in the budget through the proceeds from the sale of the Sewer Authority and how is that going to work or are we just taking it out of the budget? So where are we using the Sewer Authority proceeds where we are increasing all of these capital expenditures.

Under departmental earnings

narrative, it says that there will be a redefinition of the enacting ordinance defining procedures for utility companies, interactions with the city which should create a more effective program. I would like to ask for a timeline on this. What

does this redefinition include because we did revamp the old ordinance, we have had numerous discussions on a pave cut ordinance, so I just wanted to know what this redefinition would include and why isn't the program effective now. We were told by the administration months ago that it was going pretty well.

I also brought in up in the caucus the real estate transfer tax, we are lowering this again by two-tenths of a percent and I just have an initial concern about whether or not we are going to be able to hit our revenue projection, which is around \$3 million similar to what it was in 2017. Mr. Evans said he was going to provide more data to back up that claim so I'd appreciate that for November 30.

I'd also like an update on the civilian parking enforcement program from Chief Graziano, \$197,500 was budgeted in 2017, we are not -- I don't think we are going to hit that budget projection and in 2018 we are only budgeting \$100,000. I did notice in the budget that there are going to

be two SIT clerks in those positions so I would just like a historical update on this program because two years ago it was promoted that it was going to be really successful and bringing in a lot of money so I would like to know or receive an update on that program.

Also, I'd like an update on the quality of life program from Licensing and Inspections Department, we have kind of gotten that in dribs and drabs. 2017 we were budgeting \$42,500, 2018 we are only budgeting \$35,000 to collect in quality of life tickets, but we are adding a housing inspector so I'd like to get the rationale behind that.

Keeping with the pave cut ordinance under departmental earnings, this is one thing I didn't understand, under the line item for pave cuts for the gas company we budgeted \$251,910 in 2017, as far as August 30 we have collected nothing, and in 2018 we are budgeting \$195,000 so I'd like to know why we have haven't collected anything yet as of August 30 this year, and I'd like to

know how the \$195,000 figure was arrived at for 2018.

The mayor's proposing to make the Parks and Recreation specialist position a full-time position at \$49,000 up from \$32,000. I would like to know if there is going to be additional responsibilities for the \$17,000 increase and I would like to see a copy of a job description for that position and all of the other positions that have been added to the budget.

Under the Business Administrator's Office, I would like to know if we have an estimate on how hiring the health insurance administrator will effect the projected 5 to 10 percent increase this clerical and non-union health insurance.

In the Human Resources budget, and I did mention this last week when Mr. Bulzoni was here and he did refer me to the Law Department, so I would like an explanation from the Law Department if they could provide one on the increase of 23.6 percent in cost related to the city's property and casualty insurance and settlements

associated with law office activity, so I would like to get more detail on that and what exactly that activity was.

Under Licensing and Inspections, it says that the department will provide a more user friendly method of permit issuance and payment, I would like to get a timeline on that if that's possible for 2018.

Under the Police Department, the overtime is over budget by \$133,360 as of September 30. I would like to know how much of that overtime is reimbursable. Capital expenditure increase of \$160,000, the reasoning being sidewalk replacement at police headquarters for safety reasons and apparently the city's insurance risk manager is requiring this. I would like a little bit more background on this because I was under the impression that a few years ago the one of the unions stepped up and replaced the sidewalks out in front of the headquarters if I'm not mistaken at little to no cost, I think they provided the labor so I would like more of an explanation on this on why those -- what happened to the

sidewalks.

Also, under the Police Department, the other salary is budgeted at \$401,00 for 2018. This is a large increase from the 2017 budget figure of \$267,00, so I'd like a clarification on what the other salary constitutes and why the large increase.

The Fire Department budget there is an increase in overtime from 250,000 in 2017 to 275,000, not a large increase, but I would like to know the reasoning behind that figure.

Also, the narrative says that the budget funds the remaining costs of firehouse improvement -- the firehouse improvement project above the \$1.5 million that was given last year, and also replaces concrete pads and sidewalks at each of the firehouses. I would like to know what the remaining costs include and are the sidewalk replacements and concrete pads necessary, so a little bit more clarification on that.

Also, under the Fire Department, other salary 2017 is budgeted at \$285,000.

As of September 30, we have spent \$423,000,

roughly \$423,000 for an over budgeted figure of \$137,299 so I'd like to know why that is, and under other salary in 2018 we are budgeting that \$450,000 so, again, I would like to know the reasoning for that.

\$300,000 under DPW for the

Novembrino Pool Complex, so that's coming
out of the budget. I mentioned this in the
beginning of my questioning and I'd like to
know if we are going to be taking some of
the proceeds from the Sewer Authority money
and using that towards the \$300,000.

Under boards, commissions and nonprofits, we are going to install sidewalks at Mt. Pleasant development site for \$50,000 and a \$10,000 annual contribution to the Scranton Plan. Again, I'd like a little more background on this and is the donation for the sidewalks necessary and why couldn't other funding have been provided?

The Scranton Tomorrow budget, we are giving a \$75,000 contribution, so that Scranton Tomorrow could be the downtown economic development coordinator and I have

said this before, I don't necessarily disagree with this, but I would like to know what we are now paying OECD for in some respects anyways. Is the OECD taking on less responsibility because in the budget that position is due for a raise, so I'd like an answer to that.

Under the Human Resources budget, stationery and office supplies we see an increase from \$500 in 2017 to \$25,000 in 2018. There is a reason for this cost.

It's for equipment acquisition associated with the department safety and environmental review which is authorized by the City Safety Committee which I think is a good thing, but I would like clarification on or if they know this yet what kind of equipment we are purchasing for that amount.

In the License and Inspections

Department, again, there is an increase in the demolition program from \$35,000 to \$65,000 because of greater activity.

Through September 30, and this number could have increased obviously, but we have only spent \$12,540 on the demolition program so

I'd like an update on the progress of the demolition program using money from the budget and not OECD and the rationale of this whole program and that increase and is there a targeted approach to this program.

Also, one of the interesting things that I noticed in the budget was the professional services is going from \$7,500 to \$15,000 mainly because they are going to do an energy efficiency evaluation of the DPW facility. I'd like an update on this, more information and exactly what it entails and if they know yet what kind of savings we might see from that program.

I see Mrs. Jefferies in the back there, there is an increase in sign and paint material from \$12,500 to \$50,000, so obviously there is going to be more of a focus on replacing the street signs throughout the city, at least that's what I'm assuming from looking at that.

So my question there is is there a new sign program, what is the methodology behind this increase, how is the department approaching the replacement signs throughout

the city, are they keeping an inventory, are they doing it by neighborhood, is there documentation of all of this so I would like an update on that because I'm interested in it myself and I think it's a hot topic throughout the city.

Under the Highways Department there was an increase in parks and recreation supplies from zero dollars in 2017 to \$62,000 in 2018 so I'd like to know the reason for that.

Garage increase in capital expenditures to \$25,000, I'd like to get more details and explanation on that.

For contingency we are increasing from 2017 we had \$585,000 and now we are going to have \$705,799.10 for 2018 so I would like an explanation behind that increase, and the Court award increase from 2017 was \$200,000 and we are budgeting \$350,000 in 2018 so I would like an explanation behind that as well.

And there is many other questions that I have in here that -- or clarifications I should say rather, but I

will be submitting this to the administration, and just to end my comments what I would hope for in the future, and Mr. Evans had mentioned this to me earlier and I think it would be beneficial. You have to remember, you know, Mrs. Schumacher was asking us direct questions. We only received the budget last Wednesday. I'm assuming the election played a role in that, then Mr. Bulzoni came Thursday, which we appreciated, but at least from my perspective I didn't have enough time to come up with all of these questions and, you know, my need for further clarification on this budget. So in the future, and Mr. Evans had proposed this as well, I would like to see a work session where we sit around that table for two or three hours, however long, so we can go through all of this stuff in detail because we have vote on it.

So I think moving forward that would be a little bit more of a planning and questioning so we have the business administrator in front of us and any other
