III. Shade Tree Commission Business

- Mayor Wenzel made a motion and Mr. Riccardo seconded to approve the April 2019 minutes.
- Bob Gattens Chairman of the Scranton Recreation Authority came to the meeting to discuss planting of trees at Nay Aug Park. He was asking Mr. Santoli about what variety of trees to plant and where to plant them. The Recreation Authority will pay for the trees and planting of them. Mr. Santoli will make a plan for Nay Aug Park as to what verities of trees and where to plant them in the park for the Recreation Authority. Also, the Shade Tree Commission commended the Recreation Authority for the new handicap parking at the treehouse.
- The downtown tree project is completed and all of the 20 trees planted are surviving and doing well.
- 40 Arborvitae and 5 hardwood trees were planted at the DPW site to hide the
 equipment from view of public for a more pleasing appearance of the facility.
- 350 3' high trees were planted along the Heritage Trail on Arbor Day and 150 were planted along Olive Street near the trail. Students from Northeast Intermediate, South Scranton Intermediate and West Scranton Intermediate helped to plant the trees.
- 2850 dead and dangerous trees were taken down in the City of Scranton within the past 17 years, 60 are targeted to be taken down in 2020.
- The Connell Park project will be started next week on November 6, 2019. The bid went to a company from Harrisburg Marpal.

- Paper Street and Allies were discussed when a dead or dangerous tree needs to be taken down that exists on a paper street or ally the City of Scranton is not responsible for taking down of the tree.
- 600 trees in the City of Scranton will have branch removal work done in 2020.
- Joe Riccardo will work with the coordinator Denise Nytch to apply for Tree City USA before the end of 2019.
- Mr. Riccardo will put a proposal together to send to PPL for money for the purchase of trees to be planted in the City.
- A plaque at Duffy Park will be dedicated on November 12, 2019 at 11:00am. A light was placed at the base of The Doughboy statue so that in the evening the statue can be illuminated.
- Mr. Riccardo will put together a letter of commendation for Pat McCabe with Penn DOT for all of his hard work and working with the Shade Tree Commission at Duffy Park.

Dear Mrs. Reed:

I was provided a copy of your February 12, 2020 correspondence addressed to Mr. John Basalyga which you forwarded on behalf of Council for the City of Scranton who requests an update of repairs to the Electric City Garage. Mr. Basalyga asked that I respond to this inquiry.

Electric City Garage Co., LLC ("ECPC") has been conducting capital repairs and maintenance at the Electric City Garage either directly or through third-party contractors since its acquisition. As I believe some members of Council already know, each floor of the Electric City Parking Garage requires substantial repairs. When these repairs are being done, including demolition, it must be assured that the integrity of the structure remains intact. This prohibits all floors or even a whole floor from being done at one time. Instead, the work on each floor must be done in sections. This obviously takes time. The anticipated completion date of all repairs to the parking garage according to an Agreement entered into with Community Development Properties, Scranton, Inc. ("CDPS") is September 30, 2020. This date is also in compliance with the extended escrow period.

A proposed construction schedule and specifications for the project was submitted to CDPS for approval. As you know, CDPS is the local subsidiary of National Development Council ("NDC") who, as your letter indicates, recently met with Council. The Parking Authority of the City of Scranton ("the Authority") assigned all of its rights to manage and operate the Electric City Garage to CDPS. Therefore, all schedules and specifications have been provided to CDPS for approval by NDC, and then the Authority. Once approval is given, ECPC will resume the capital repairs. As stated, NDC is in possession of all the schedules and specifications, and there is no objection to it providing same to you as I believe it already does with the Authority.

Additionally, in your letter you state that the "City paid [Mr. Basalyga's] firm \$2.85 Million towards renovations of the Electric City Garage." ECPC was not paid and has not received \$2.85 Million from the City or anyone else related to repairs at the Electric City Garage. Pursuant to the Construction Escrow Agreement, the Authority was to place \$2.85 Million into an escrow account. However, on August 20, 2016 the Authority assigned all its rights and obligations under the Lease Agreement to CDPS which, it is my understanding, required CDPS to place the aforementioned money into escrow. An escrow agent was appointed for that account and money may only be disbursed in accordance with the Escrow Agreement. That Agreement only allows disbursement of escrow funds for completed work.

It should also be noted that Mr. Basalyga provided a personal guarantee related to the completion of the work at the garage. Therefore, he has a vested interest in seeing that the work gets done timely and correctly.

Prohibition of certain dog breeds

At City Council's February 25, 2020 public meeting, a question was posed to Council regarding whether the City could ban certain breeds of dogs, including pit bulls.

Breed specific legislation does ban pit bulls in some places in the United States, including certain public housing developments. In Pennsylvania, there are several municipalities which describe pit bulls or other breeds as inherently "dangerous" or "vicious" dogs. These municipalities place certain requirements and/or restrictions on owners at the outset of ownership, including licensing fees specific to the breed, rather than waiting for an issue with the animal before these restrictions are put into place. However, it does not appear that any municipalities in Pennsylvania outright ban pit bull ownership.

The following are examples from two municipalities which take this restrictive approach:

(1) Sample legislation from the City of Clairton located in Allegheny County.

As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

DANGEROUS DOMESTIC ANIMALS

Any animal bred for fighting or any animal which will attack or which has the propensity to attack an individual or individuals or any animal which displays the traits of a reptile, including but not limited to alligators and crocodiles or those of a Staffordshire terrier, American pit bull, pit bull or rottweiler. The aforesaid list naming certain reptiles and dogs shall not limit the definition of dangerous domestic animals for purposes of this article to reptiles and dogs.

OWNER

When applied to the proprietorship of a dangerous domestic animal, shall include every person having right of property in such animal, and every person who keeps or harbors such animal or has it in its care, and every person who permits such animal to remain on or about any premises owned by that person.

POLICE OFFICER

Any person employed or elected by the City of Clairton, the commonwealth, or by any municipality thereof, whether full-time employee and/or an authorized agent acting pursuant to oral or written agreement whose duty it is to preserve peace and/or make arrests or to enforce the law. This term shall specifically include state constabulary, dog, game, fish, and forest wardens.

§ 179-16 Prohibited acts.

<u>A.</u> The running at large of dangerous domestic animals within the City of Clairton to the annoyance or inconvenience of residents, pedestrians, or operators of motor vehicles using the streets or highways of the City is strictly prohibited.

B. Dangerous domestic animals are considered dangerous animals and potentially hazardous to the community. Dangerous domestic animals shall at no time or under any circumstances be permitted to wander or run loose in or upon the City of Clairton. Any dangerous domestic animal wandering or running loose in or upon the City of Clairton shall be subject to restraint, confinement, impoundment, and/or destruction by any police officer or other authorized persons acting on behalf of the City. It shall be the duty of any City police officer or other authorized personnel acting on behalf of the City to take whatever action is necessary under the circumstances to properly secure and restrain any loose dangerous domestic animal, including the immediate destruction of said animals, and the within article shall authorize said officer to do so.

§ 179-17 Licensing; fee.

<u>A.</u> No person shall own, keep or harbor any dangerous domestic animals in any household, residence or on any property whatsoever within the City without first obtaining a license from the City of Clairton.

<u>B.</u> Applications for a license shall be filed with the City Manager and shall provide the following information:

(1) Name of applicant;

(2) Name of owner of the dangerous domestic animal if different from the applicant;

- (3) Address where the dangerous domestic animal will be kept;
- (4) Number of dangerous domestic animals to be kept or housed on premises;
- (5) Exact location on the property where the dangerous domestic animal(s) will be kept;
- (6) Method to be used to secure or restrain the dangerous domestic animal(s) on the property;
- (7) Name of the person who will be responsible for the care and confinement of the dangerous domestic animal(s);
- (8) Any other information requested by the City.

Editor's Note: An application form is included as an attachment to this chapter.

- <u>C.</u> All applications shall be accompanied by an application fee of \$50 per dangerous domestic animal per year, which is nonrefundable. The fee includes the cost of processing the application and any inspection prior to licensing.
- <u>D.</u> Dangerous domestic animal licenses shall be issued by the Council for the City of Clairton or its duly authorized agent only after the appropriate fees have been paid and if the applicant has complied fully with all applicable codes, statutes and regulations, including Chapter <u>337</u>, Zoning, and the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture regulations.
- E. Revocation of license. If the applicant, owner or other person responsible for any dangerous domestic animal kept within the City violates any provision of this article or any other applicable code, statute or regulation, then any license issued hereunder shall be automatically revoked. The City Council reserves the right to refuse to issue or reissue a dangerous domestic animal license to any person who has violated any provision of this article or other applicable code, statute or regulation.
- <u>F.</u> Change of address. If there is any change in the status of ownership, location where the dangerous domestic animal is to be housed, or of any other information required in § <u>179-17B(1)</u> through (7), the licensee must immediately notify the Code Enforcement Officer of these changes. Failure to notify the Code Enforcement Officer of any such change will cause the automatic revocation of the dangerous animal license referred to above.

§ 179-18 Confinement and warning sign required; leash and muzzle.

A. All dangerous domestic animals must be confined in a secure building or enclosure.

B. Dangerous domestic animals may not be kept, housed or harbored in an exterior yard without first obtaining approval from the Code Enforcement Officer of the City of Clairton. In no case are dangerous domestic animals permitted to be kept, housed or harbored in an exterior yard unless the area is secured by a fence, the material and dimensions thereof having been approved by the Code Enforcement Officer or his/her authorized agent. Said fence must be at least six feet high if not constructed with a roof and shall also require approval by the Code Enforcement Officer.

<u>C.</u> All entrances to and exits from a property where a dangerous domestic animal is confined must be posted with a warning sign, the size and type of which thereof having been approved by the Zoning Enforcement Officer.

<u>D.</u> Any dangerous domestic animal which is removed from its area of confinement into or upon the public ways of the City of Clairton must be kept securely leashed and muzzled at all times.

§ 179-19 Removal or destruction of animal.

Any dangerous domestic animal which bites and/or attacks a person for any reason may be destroyed at the owner's expense or permanently removed from the City of Clairton. The destruction of the dangerous domestic animal shall only occur when a police officer and/or authorized agent of the City in their discretion believe that the destruction of the animal is the only alternative available to stop an attack by a dangerous domestic animal. If said dangerous domestic animal is not removed from the City or destroyed, it shall thereafter be subject to seizure and/or destruction by the City or its duly authorized agents.

§ 179-20 Violations and penalties; seizure of animal.

<u>A.</u> Any person violating any provision of this article shall be subject to a fine of up to \$500 and/or imprisonment of up to 30 days.

B. In addition, any person violating the provisions of this article shall be subject to immediate seizure of the dangerous domestic animal. Any dangerous domestic animal having been seized shall be thereafter transferred to the appropriate animal protection agency to be held in custody. Any person recovering possession of any dangerous

domestic animal, heretofore having been seized and turned over to the appropriate protection agency, who brings that same animal back into the City of Clairton shall have committed a second offense.

- <u>C.</u> In addition, any person violating any provision of this article shall be subject to the following:
 - (1) Revocation of dangerous domestic animal kennel license and retention of the license by the City; and
 - (2) Prohibition from obtaining another dangerous domestic animal kennel license for up to five years.

(2) Sample legislation from the Borough of Collingdale located in Delaware County:

PIT BULLS: Includes any of the following breeds of dogs: Staffordshire, Terrier, American Pit bull, Pit bull, any dog that fits into the above American Kennel Club definitions, dogs displaying the majority of traits of any of the above breeds, and any dog bred for fighting.

§ 120-17 Pit bulls running at large.

Pit bulls are considered dangerous dogs and potentially hazardous to the community. Pit bulls shall at no time or under any circumstances be permitted to run loose in or upon the Borough of Collingdale. Any pit bull running loose in or upon the Borough of Collingdale shall be subject to restraint, confinement, impoundment and/or destruction by any police officer or other authorized person of the Borough. It shall be the duty of any Borough police officers or other authorized personnel of the Borough to take whatever action is necessary under the circumstances to properly secure and restrain any loose pit bull, including the immediate destruction of the dog, and they are hereby authorized to do so.

§ 120-18 Licensing of pit bulls.

<u>A.</u> No person shall own, keep or harbor any pit bull over six months of age in any household, residence or on any property whatsoever within the Borough without first obtaining a pit bull kennel license from the Borough of Collingdale.

- <u>B.</u> Applications for a pit bull kennel license shall be filed with the Borough Manager and shall provide the following information:
 - (1) Name of applicant.
 - (2) Name of owner of pit bull if different from applicant.

- (3) Address where pit bull will be kept.
- (4) Number of pit bulls to be kept or housed on premises.
- (5) Exact location on the property where the pit bull(s) will be kept.
- (6) Method to be used to secure or restrain the pit bull(s) on the property.
- (7) Name of the person who will be responsible for the care and confinement of the pit bull(s).
- (8) Any other information requested by the Borough.
- <u>C.</u> All applications shall be accompanied by a fifty-dollar application fee which is nonrefundable. The fee includes the cost of processing the application and any inspection prior to licensing.
- <u>D.</u> Pit bull kennel licenses shall be issued by the Borough Manager or his duly authorized agent only after the appropriate fees have been paid and if the applicant has fully complied with all applicable codes, statutes and regulations, including Chapter 310, Zoning, of this Code and the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture regulations.
- E. Pit bull kennel license fees are as follows:
 - (1) One pit bull: \$500 per year.
 - (2) Two pit bulls: \$1,000 per year.
 - (3) Three pit bulls: \$3,000 per year.
 - (4) More than three pit bulls: \$3,000 plus \$3,000 for each pit bull above three.
- <u>F.</u> Revocation of license. If the applicant, owner or other person responsible for any pit bull kept within the Borough violates any provision of this article or any other applicable ordinance, code, statute or regulation, then any license issued hereunder shall be automatically revoked and the license fee shall be retained by the Borough. The Borough reserves the right to refuse to issue or reissue a pit bull kennel license to any person who has violated any provision of this article or other applicable ordinance, code, statute or regulation.

<u>G.</u> Bond requirement. Any person who owns, keeps or harbors a pit bull must post a twenty-thousand-dollar bond with the Borough of Collingdale to insure payment of any damages or injuries which might be caused by said pit bull.

§ 120-19 Confinement of pit bulls.

A. All pit bulls must be confined in a secured building or enclosure.

<u>B.</u> Pit bulls may not be kept, housed or harbored in an exterior yard without first obtaining approval from the Zoning Hearing Board of the Borough of Collingdale. In no case are pit bulls permitted to be kept, housed or harbored in an exterior yard unless the area is securely fenced with a fence approved by the Borough Manager or his authorized agent. Said fence must be at least eight feet high and shall also require approval by the Zoning Hearing Board of the Borough of Collingdale.

<u>C.</u> All entrances to and exits from a property where a pit bull is confined must post a warning sign, the size and type of which must be approved by the Borough.

<u>D.</u> Any pit bull which is taken off or removed from its area of confinement into or upon the Borough of Collingdale must be kept securely leashed and muzzled at all times.

§ 120-20 Destruction of pit bulls.

Any pit bull which bites or attacks a person for any reason must be destroyed at the owner's expense or permanently removed from the Borough of Collingdale. If said pit bull is not removed from the Borough or destroyed, it shall be subject to seizure and/or destruction by the Borough or its duly authorized agent.

§ 120-21 Violations and penalties.

A. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of this article shall, upon conviction thereof, be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than \$300 per day, each day in which any provision of this article is violated constituting a separate offense and the fines therefor being cumulative, and/or to imprisonment for a term not to exceed 30 days.

<u>B.</u> In addition, any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this article shall be subject to the following:

- (1) Forfeiture of their bond.
- (2) Revocation of pit bull kennel license and retention of the license by the Borough.

(3) Prohibition from obtaining another pit bull kennel license for up to five years.

COVID19 Update

Governor Wolf announced today at a press conference that there are 2 cases of COVID19 that tested positive, one in Delaware County and the other in Wayne County. These tests will be sent to the CDC labs in Atlanta for confirmation, but are expected to be confirmed.

The patients that tested positive are under quarantine and contact tracing of them is underway. The Cases are not considered to be Community transmissions and instead are suspected to be from travel.

The City recommends the following precautionary measures for City employees and Scranton residents:

- Encourage personnel to stay home and not come to work if they are flu symptomatic
- Encourage 20 second hand washing
- Encourage all personnel to avoid touching their face
- Continuously wipe down surfaces near their work stations
- And practice social distancing

The City will continue to review its continuity of operations plans. The City and its community partners are continuing to develop and work their individual plans to operate with the expected workforce shortages that potentially could come and to ensure they have an appropriate level of supplies to operate should supply chains be affected.
