MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I listened to Mr. Bulzoni telling them how they figured the per capita debt to each resident of the city. Mr. Gaughan, you got two small children, don't you?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, I do.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Each one of them is saddled with \$1,400 of debt. Now, you double that up to 28. If your wife doesn't work that all falls on you. The way they calculate the debt should be on the individuals in the city who are working, not per capita. We got so many people living in the city that doesn't work. So, hence, that debt per person is a lot more for the working person of the city. That's the reason they don't want to come in. cannot do what you are doing. You got to say this is what it is, not what per capita and spread all over the kid that's what 18 months or one that's just born. That's not the way it do things.

And another thing he was talking

about \$4 million in escrow for the parking garage for the repair, did he explain where that 4 million came from? Was it from our share of the debt or from the lessees borrowing, and if is from our stranded debt, that garage deal, I keep telling you, is worst deal ever perpetrated upon the residents of Scranton. You bought the mall for a developer. You gave them a garage that will make him a multi-millionaire and saddle the people of the Scranton with an unpossible debt. There is no way we can pay off the debt that we lost. He didn't mention how much we lost in parking fines or how much of meter revenue. He didn't discuss that at all because that's gone. It's gone to a lessee, and how that lessee ever got to be a nonprofit is beyond me. don't know how the government could say he is a nonprofit. First of all, you got three politicians on the board. Now, since if any money comes out of that board it would be into a political fund, even though you might say you are not political, but you are I hope the government looks at political.

Another thing that I have, you wanted to change the building trade to identify codes again, I don't know if that's for the benefit of the developer, or actually to the benefit of the city. looked it as more to the benefit of the developer, and that's what I find wrong with the city. It just -- like a friend of mine would say, it's a crying shame, but that's the way the city operates and it's a downhill slide.

I have listened to a lot of the budget, some of it I understood, some of it I didn't, but when he start saying things that may happen, or could happen, or could not happen then I worry. Then I worry. Pipe dreams are not a way to run a budget. You can't bank on money you don't have. You got to look realistically at the budget, that that money is coming in and how it's going out. I thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Matthew Pendrak.

MR. PENDRAK: Good evening, Council. My name is Matthew Pendrak, I'm have

Jefferson Township. I hold a master electrical license with the city and I'd like to read a statement, and if I could share it with you as well you are welcome to a copy of it, and I thank you for taking the time for letting me read this.

"Dear Council members, I'm a
licensed master electrician with nearly 30
years experience, two time past president of
the local chapter of International
Association of Electrical Inspectors, it's
the Keystone chapter, state certified
building code official, CCO certified code
official. I also have over 400 CEUs related
to my profession.

I was stunned to learn a few months ago, and again a few weeks ago, that City Council is considering changing the current requirements for master licensing and, thereby, possibly compromising the safety and welfare of it's residents that they are sworn to protect and serve. Sensible governing bodies are elected to insist on mandating that the highest standards available be followed by the most qualified

professionals. I hope you agree. To do otherwise, Council will be unleashing possibly substandard, unqualified, handyman specialists on its residents.

Nearly ten years ago, as past president, I contacted and petitioned the secretary for the Department of Labor and Industry, not only for a local keystone chapter, but the International Association of Electrical Inspectors, but also the other five chapters across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to be recognized as one of the official continuing education unit providers by the department. It was a success.

After that, Mr. John Bannon, former electrical inspector for the City of Scranton, had the wisdom and the good sense to initiate and implement the requirement of the 12 CEUs in order to maintain and renew one's master electrical license each calendar year. Another success. I know hundreds of journeymen and scores of master electricians who not only view this requirement, but embrace the CEUs as necessary and mandatory to keep current with

the latest codes and standards.

This requirement, along with professional examination, proof of knowledge, letter of recommendation, is not too onerous. For council to do otherwise, would be purely pernicious. Please don't compromise the safety of its residents that you are sworn to protect and serve.

What is safety? Safety is reducing the risk. Council will be reducing the risk to its residents it serves by keeping the highest standards and qualifications possible for professional licensure in the City of Scranton. Respectfully submitted, yours truly, Matthew Pendrak."

And I'm glad to hear that you tabled this and hopefully you are reconsidering, reconsidering opening this up and I just hope and pray to God that you are not going to loosen up the requirements. I studied my tail off to take that exam. It's difficult. This book, the National Electrical Code, which the city has adopted, it's not an easy article -- standard, rather, to read. It's written by attorneys, but it ensures safety

for the installation and safe use of electricity and use of electricity. It's a great standard, it's also difficult. I studied my tail off. The city has been good to me. I'm privileged to be able to work here. I just hope and pray to God you are not going to loosen up any of the standards. Please think very carefully about this.

Some of the requirements for the licensing that come to mind, requiring before you even take the exam are to get three letters of recommendation. That's pretty tough to go three gentlemen and say, "Hey, I'm gong to be your competition, you know, give me a letter of recommendation."

You know, maybe loosen that up from three to maybe one, but, please, keep the testing in place. A good standardized testing. The requirements for the CEUs, you know, maybe offer to another licensed individual whether it's through a state or another city or borough with the same standards that the City of Scranton now has give them a one-time permit and allow him to work here. Please give this thoughtful

consideration, I know you will, keep up the good work. If you have any questions --

MR. WECHSLER: I'm not sure if you know that we voted that down in the spring. The original ordinance that came to us for the exact concerns that you are talking about.

MR. PENDRAK: Okay.

MR. WECHSLER: The new ordinance came back from this slight changes that for council as of right now aren't satisfactory to us to make it any better. We have reached out and investigated some other city's ordinances that seem to be -- too address your concerns and that's actually why we put this on hold right now so we can evaluate those and actually all five of us right now, I don't think I'm speaking out of turn, right now all five us are interested in getting testing back into the ordinance.

MR. PENDRAK: And I'm sure you are going to do a great job. Thank you, gentlemen, I appreciate your time. Who can leave this with?

WECHSLER: Probably not Tuesday 8 either. 9 MS. HODOWANITZ: Wednesday? 10 Thursday? 11 MR. WECHSLER: Maybe Wednesday? 12 MS. HODOWANITZ: Before Christmas? 13 MR. WECHSLER: Before the end of the 14 year for sure. MS. HODOWANITZ: Oh, great. 15 16 Reed had an astounding amount of background 17 papers for tonight's council meeting of this 18 eight-page agenda, but on those first few 19 pages I guess the Tax Assessor's report for 20 one of the October dates, I saw something 21 that really surprised me, Steamtown, LLC 300 22 had a reduction of \$666,000. Does that ring 23 any bells with anybody? I mean, it happened 24 before the zoning board? \$666,000 25 reduction?

MR. EVANS: They wouldn't go to the zoning board, they would go to the --

MR. WECHSLER: Well, it's on the Tax Assessor's report. Isn't that a major reduction for Steamtown Mall, LLC 300?

Let's see, and back to the budget, I know there is not enough time for me to go into it with only five minutes, but I'm still curious as to why we do not use more interns in the city and why don't we consider alliances and partnership with all of the local colleges that there is a whole lot they can be doing for us other than giving us PILOT dollars. In fact, I'm convinced that perhaps the service they can provide would be far more valuable to the city than just mere tax dollars. Why not a

And I don't know, if you want more tax dollars through the universities that's one thing, but I think that the services they can provide the city would give you much more bang for the buck

And I got to tell you, I really don't believe that we are not going to incur storm water management costs in 2017. think something should have been said in the budget about that. I mean, just to kind of say, well, we are doing a study, it will be ten to 12 months and, you know, if we have to have another storm water management authority, I didn't buy that explanation one bit. I'm really concerned that the issue of storm water management wasn't addressed. I'm not even happy with the way there was no explanation for the proceeds of the sewer authority sale. You can't on one hand say that, you know, we are reducing debt service and debt in anticipating the Sewer Authority sale, and then you don't show those revenues in the budget, and by this time the people upstairs should know how to use a spreadsheet. There should be no \$12 million discrepancies between the revenues and expenditures. Excel does not make math errors, people do.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer. I was briefly watching some of what went on earlier on television at home, but I need to watch some more to have better opinions, but one thing that stood out was PILOTS and nonprofits and tax exempts, and once again I don't see any solution. All you can do is ask, and they can say no, and we are burdened with 35 percent tax exempt now, and it seems to be growing again.

And, once again, my idea is to check into the feasibility of getting the Federal Court taking the state constitution to task that this is an excessive burden, that we are being volunteered for by other entities, such as the county and the state. If they want to go beyond the certain reasonable threshold, they should replace the money. That's all there is to it. I don't see a solution otherwise because you can ask, but they can just say no under the current law and all you can do is hold your breath and get rid of it based upon it. You can't do anything about it.

We not ahead in any way, shape or form and I hope that the PUC has really looked into it and I sincerely hope that that they stop this asset transfer or sale. We, as taxpayers or ratepayers, are going to be in a lot worse shape when it's completed than we are now.

And, again, would somebody please get the assessed value, the residential assessment. Last year as of the 15th of -- or the first of December and this year, the

1 first of December and this year and see if it's gone up or down? And one final thing, 2 3 if I may, the budget again said, "The amount of sustained budgetary remains constant in 4 5 2017," but I thought our MMO was going up in 2017 because this was the last year the 6 7 state could kick in that amount, so we have 8 another 4.4 million, so I don't know how 9 they can say the state budget contributions 10 have remained constant for next year. Chief Graziano, and I did, about the police record management system. Just to give you a little head's up on what this is and what it does and the overall cost of the project. The overall cost of the project it's a \$800,000 cost which is spread out into two years -- or four years at about \$200,000 payments. This is system is going to be relative to our city for 15 years, which breaks down to about \$50,000 a year, which is about what we pay right now for our old antiquated system which is over ten years The training is included, any software updates are included with this and we are piggybacking, the county is already using this and a lot of local municipalities that are on board with this and piggybacking with the county we are going save about \$200,000. For purchase of this software by itself, it would be excess of a million dollars.

So with that out there, what this software is going to do, it's a software that's going to be used inside of the police vehicle. It's going to be used for filing reports. You can view reports for mapping.

It's going to be connected to the FBI database. Anything that was scanned into evidence you can bring that up. Any type of alarm systems that are throughout the city, whether public or private, would be tied into there. They won't have to get calls to go dispatch to alarms. It's also going to be -- you will be available to look up warrants in your vehicle and the most I think pertinent thing is it's a shared information. If it's something on anybody's database who uses this, they are going to be able to bring this up. They are not going to need to go though dispatching or call in and wait for information. If somebody is getting pulled over and there are running a plate or they are running a tag, they are going to know right away if there is a warrant without having to wait for dispatch to get back to them. All of this is going to be done in the car on the spot.

It's going to redefine how the police do their job and it's something that, obviously, I'm for. It's going to make their job better and easier. It makes us

safer.

Other than that, I want to thank Mr. Bulzoni for coming out today. We had a lengthy budget discussion with, obviously, a lot of questions, a lot of answers. questions and answers I need to go -- we have another week on this, and a lot of paperwork to look over. My mind was eased on several items, but there is some items that need to be definitely dug in deeper and looked at when it comes to specific salaries. I'm all for paying people what they are worth. I believe you get quality work when you pay a fair salary. I think a speaker brought up about Rainey & Rainey and are we just throwing money away that we should we be doing that ourselves. I think eventually we should, but that comes at a That comes at a cost of paying people their fair value. And the public sector, we have a salary matrix. We have mid-year We have annual reviews. I think reviews. the city is a big enough entity that we need to start implementing those things to get on board with what really how a private

industry works, and not just kind of using, you know, terminology like key employees. It's too vague for me, so I would definitely like to see in the future some kind of salary matrix, mid-year and end year reviews for our employees to make sure we get the best employees, let's do the best job, let's pay them fairly and enough for them to stay and attract quality employees when they leave. With that, I'll wrap it up and I'll turn it over. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, thank you, because our agenda is a quite lengthy I'll be very, very brief tonight. First, I would just like to congratulate and thank our Scranton Fire Department for their fundraiser, again, Operation Warm. Today they have distributed over 400 coats to students at Willard School. This is a great fundraiser that the Fire Department spearheads every year. I know myself and many of my colleagues attended the fundraiser that they had for this event. I did see a number of the pictures on Facebook when they were

distributing the coats, so I would like to thank each and every one in our fire department who not only does a great job of protecting us every day but gives back in the community in a great cause such as Operation Warm, and I would like to add all of those coats are made in the United States, which is something you can't find every day so that's something very good to hear.

And, finally, sticking with the theme of the Fire Department tonight, the emergency issue was brought up, and I do want to read the emergency declaration regarding Engine 7 in West Side and Engine 10 on East Mountain, and I do agree the condition of these firehouses has been an emergency for a long time so it's long overdue for repairs to be made, but I will read the emergency declaration.

It says, "This is to certify that an emergency situation exists at two City of Scranton fire stations. Engine No. 7, located at 1917 Luzerne Street in West Side, and Engine 10 located at 1900 East Mountain

Road on East Mountain. Both have had their roofing systems patched and maintained over the years, but are now in need of immediate emergency temporary roof repair. Drew Markanovitch, project manager for Highland Associates, and Tom from Eastern Roofing, visited both sites and recommended both are in need of immediate emergency temporary repair.

Engine 7 has a flat roof and some suspect areas were found that only need simple tar patch that may suffice for the winter months. However there is a large hole in the roof that needs immediate attention now that the winter weather is here. Agent 10's recommended temporary fix to the TPO roof membrane secured to the roof deck and seams that can be taped or heat seamed.

It is in the best interest of the City of Scranton that these roofs receive immediate emergency temporary repairs to avoid further damage to the building and equipment and for the safety of the firefighters and the citizens who visit the

first stations."

So that is the emergency declaration regarding these two firehouses, but as I mentioned in our caucus with Mr. Bulzoni, one of the many areas that the city has neglected over the years, particularly over the last 15 years, has been the infrastructure in the city, particularly police vehicles, firefighter apparatus and the actual firehouses themselves. many years ago when the former Mayor Doherty was closing firehouses that was a huge issue in the neighborhoods, and Scranton is a very large city geographically and it's very important to have neighborhood firehouses so when there is an emergency the response times are quick, and the firefighters that work to keep us safe deserve safe equipment and a safe building to work in.

So that was the reason for the emergency declaration, and I'm hopeful that moving forward as money has been allocated for long-term repairs the firehouses will all be upgraded as has been reported and, you know, I can mention we have some of the

best fight firefighters in the country and they deserve the best working conditions.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. EVANS: Thank you. As you know, I have talked a lot about being business friendly over the time I have been on city council and I think this is something that we have all tried to concentrate on as best I know we spent a lot of time over we can. the last year, you know, dealing with the parking monetization and the sewer deal and the budget and pension reform, etcetera, but I think 2017 has to be all about really getting down to business and being business friendly, particularly to the small business owner. That is where we will achieve the most growth for our economy.

So I would like to offer an example.

This is from the budget. This is a spreadsheet, there is over 40 different permits and licensing that is done by the City of Scranton. 17 of them generate \$10,000 or less. I mean, that is not

business friendly. I find it ridiculous. So hopefully, you know, and there may be something in the state statute that we have to do, I admit that, but if they are not I really have to take a look at this to consolidate reduce, eliminate some of these and stop sending the message that we don't want to do business with you if you are a small business owner or a business owner in general.

Last year about this time, we asked License and Inspections to do a study of this, I know they are busy and maybe it wasn't a priority at the time, but I think it should be a priority and maybe something that we have take on ourselves. I think it's symbolic of having a mindset and culture that really doesn't understand what it means to sign the check on the front versus signing the check on the back. So ultimately it goes down to the saying if you want something to get done right you have to do it yourself so hopefully come 2017 that will be another initiative that city council will take on. A simple initiative, but

something that I think will send a proper message to this business community, especially the small business, that we are open for business, we are paying attention and we are listening. That's all I have for tonight.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you, just a few items. First, a streetlight was approved for Rachel Place off the 200 block of South Sumner Avenue. To give an update to everyone on the street lighting project, the pole painting is complete throughout the city, the retrofit and installation of the lights will start mid-December and this will take roughly ten to 12 weeks depending on the weather.

Mrs. Reed, I would like this week to get an update on the Rockwell Avenue bridge project, I have been getting a lot of calls from neighbors in that area who are not concerned but just curious about how things are going down there.

It was brought up tonight that an

emergency was declared to patch a hole in a firehouse roof. We also have an emergency certificate, the mayor deemed it an emergency to approve a peddler's license, so we are going to do that all in one night, and I find this amazing that we are deeming all of these things emergencies. We are going immediately to fix a hole in the roof of a firehouse, but we can't seem to find the time to address the hole that exists in that gentleman's back yard on Wyoming Avenue, I know I keep bringing this up, but when I saw in the paper that we deem that an emergency and immediately were going to start work on it, I was incensed.

I actually spoke with the Youngs today and we are talking about raises in the budget, we are talking about adding positions, we are talking about deeming things emergencies and these people have to spend thousands of dollars on an attorney to fight to fill a hole in their backyard. It doesn't make sense. So everybody is giving kudos to the administration and giving all of these people raises, and we are ignoring

a major problem, not just for the Youngs, but everyone in that vicinity. It's a major public safety issue, and I don't want to see somebody get hurt, and I continue to be amazed that this is being ignored and these people when they tried to get a meeting with the mayor they were told go see the law department. So I just find that completely utterly irresponsible.

Also this week, it was brought to my attention a dangerous situation that exists on the 500 block of Linden Street, and I would like to just take a second and go over that. The gentlemen is actually a taxi driver, and he did mention in his e-mails that taxis, Ubers, cars are double parked with their flashers on and that they're lined up in front of Levels on Linden Street and Back Yard Ale House and this is causing a huge traffic issue. The other problem e have is that intoxicated individuals are walking out blindly at ongoing traffic and it's just made worse by the fact that there are taxis and Ubers that are double parked. So he did suggest possibly increasing the

lighting on Dixs Court and tying to find out some kind of -- trying to rectify the situation with parking. So we did each out to Chief Graziano and they are going to take a look at that so I appreciate that, and I'll save the rest for agenda items. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. Gaughan. Following up on your comments, I received the same inquiry and we never would have known about that because it all happens at 2 a.m. in the morning so that's why would have never known that if the Uber driver didn't inform us so I appreciate his comments to us.

This week the biggest problem that we have come across is the pickup of the leaves throughout the city. We talked about having a plan for the leaves and, obviously, the plan was not as successful as we would like it to be. We had some confusion as to whether the vacuum truck was going to be used or not used or if they were going to be bagged or not bagged, so we kind of collectively the information that we were

provided changed as it went along so we provided some information to correct it, so the best thing I can tell you right now is if you have an opportunity to bag your leaves please do it. I know that they are wet right now, but the best way to do that would be to bag them actually and it's not a desirable situation, but they may be picked up as trash instead of recyclables, but it actually may be cheaper to do that than pay overtime to go out and pick them up, so if you have leaves to rake and bag them please do, the DPW has been out this week trying to correct some different situations using a front end loader and some trucks and some backhoes, and they are trying to make the best of a situation that we still have to get a better handle on.

I think part of this problem, also, is kind of indirectly related to the global warming because the leaves don't fall off the trees as late as they used to. Really until we had the storms over the weekend my trees still had the majority of the leaves were on them so I don't think we can do much

leaf pickup prior to towards the end of
November, beginning of December or else you
will have to do it twice, which is another
problem. So I sense some frustration that
people are having out there with the leaves,
but we are trying to find a remedy to that.
The DPW has been trying to assist us, but
they are doing the best that they can with
everything they have and I appreciate their
efforts in trying to do that.

In regards to the budget, as we listened to Mr. Bulzoni tonight, as he was saying, this year is a transition year and I'm very proud of the fact that our budgets right now are becoming more of a plan than just something that's put together to make the numbers match. There is a philosophy now on trying to manage things better and I do appreciate that with Mr. Bulzoni.

Of course, the big thing that we are waiting for is the Sewer Authority deal to either be complete or not be complete. All indications are right now that the Sewer Authority deal will be complete. We don't know when, but as discussed tonight it will

give the city an opportunity to pay down some debt, put some money in the pension and also get into some capital improvements. MR. WECHSLER: At this time, I'll entertain a motion that Item 5-D be introduced into its proper committee.

GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question, I'm going to be voting against this and all of the companion pieces for a few different Number one, I don't think this reasons: should be introduced because I think it's irresponsible to go though with this deal until we know how much storm water management is going to cost this city. heard tonight from the Business Administrator, and while I appreciate his comments and his response, it still doesn't make me feel comfortable dissolving an authority and selling the authority when we don't know how much storm water management is going to cost us. I don't believe that we have a plan for day one and, you know, the other thing that really causes me worry

is that we have trouble now managing leaf pickup, so can you imagine when we assume all of the duties that come along with managing storm water. So I do believe that there should be a plan in place, I haven't seen it and I have other concerns about the Sewer Authority deal, but I don't think we should dissolve the Authority, and I don't think it should be introduced until we know what the true cost is because as, I think Mrs. Schumacher said, the bill eventually is going to come due. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Regarding the Sewer
Authority sale, just very briefly, anyone
who has followed the seven years I have been
on council I have been in favor of this
before it was even a thought. I think the
most critical question and most critical
item us and the administration has is how to
use the proceeds in a way that benefits the
most taxpayers. Mr. Bulzoni mentioned some
options, I know we have all discussed it a
number of times at this meetings, and as
I've stated personally I would like to see a
number of our outstanding debt issues paid

off with those proceeds that can provide tax relief to the residents of Scranton.

A number of the bond issues that were -- that the city borrowed years previous have dedicated millage to them so as soon as they -- as soon as those bonds get paid off that's a tax cut for the residents of Scranton and that's the route that I think we need to go in.

As I mentioned a couple of weeks ago, it's great that the budget this year doesn't have a tax increase, we finally were able to stop the bleeding and now we need to be able to move forward and have some pro-business friendly and family friendly policies that can reduce the tax burden on the residents in Scranton.

So when those funds do come through that's a large part of where I believe it needs to go. Obviously, shoring up the pensions is another big part of what we need to do and by shoring up the pensions that reduces or minimum payment which, again, alleviates stress on the budget which would benefit the taxpayers in the form of a

difference with the taxes.

And, finally, the infrastructure in the city, as I have mentioned three times, is in disrepair. As much as we would love to use a very significant portion of these funds for that, infrastructure repair through these funds need to be very limited. The majority of these funds need to be used to create long-term sustained success for the City of Scranton. Like I said, we are paying off debt and shoring up our pensions are two items that are sorely needed.

Regarding the storm water issue, it is a large issue in the city and whether we keep the Sewer Authority intact or it's sold, it's still a storm water issue. The fact that our storm water system is over 100 years old and many of the storm pipes and sanitary pipes are combined is a major issue. It's a violation of the federal law though the Chesapeake Bay Act and they need to be separated. When you get a heavy rain there is discharge of raw sewage into the Lackawanna river and that needs to be -- from an environmental standpoint and to

comply with federal law that needs to be addressed whether the Sewer Authority says intact or whether the city takes over the storm water management. So that is very large issue that's going to need be addressed regarding this, but I do believe that the positives regarding budgetary relief for the taxpayers of Scranton will outweigh any negatives of this deal.

MR. EVANS: My only comment, and I will keep it to storm water, the only way to truly resolve storm water is through the sale of the SSA. That's the only way we are going to get our hands on some money to actually allow us to do some initiatives on storm water. I would not be against money in escrow, a certain amount of money, to make sure that that happens. We are responsible for storm water anyway, but if we don't sell the Sewer Authority, the Scranton Sewer Authority is under no obligation to take care of our storm water system, we are. That's our responsibility. So, anyway, that's my two cents for tonight and I'll talk more about this as we move

forward.

MR. GAUGHAN: Just add to that, and I understand everyone's concerns, but if you look back at the report that was issued in 2013, before the sale was being talked about, there was a recommendation in that report that, and Mr. Evans is correct the city owns the MS-IV permit so regardless of any of this we are in charge of the storm However, historically we water management. haven't done much because we haven't had the manpower or the wherewithal to do it. have relied on the Sewer Authority, so one of the recommendations in the report was the possibly transfer the MS-IV permit to the Sewer authority, and we could have a debate about that so there was another option that was mentioned in that 2013 report that things should have been explored a little bit further. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Fortunately for me, my colleagues have pretty much said everything I want to say about the storm water issue. Echoing what Mr. Rogan said and Mr. Evans, the storm water issue is

going to have to be addressed one way or the another and because it's a federal mandate so there is going to have be an investment in the storm water system and I was encouraged this evening there was a hint that there may be an intergovernmental cooperation on that, because as we look at the city as a whole, it's the same Lackawanna river that our water goes into, so I would be anxious to make sure that our Up Valley cities and our county are also sharing the same concerns and perhaps we can make some efficiencies by working with this together instead of having separate authorities up and down the Lackawanna river so I am encouraged by that.

In reality though as we look at this introduction of this ordinance. In order for this to take place, we do have to move this ahead this evening if we do want to make benefit of this by the end of the year. I will be voting for this this evening to move it ahead, and in reality looking forward at our budget and our future this money is going to be needed for us to

satisfy the recovery plan and also to give us that influx of the cash that we need to do some of these projects that we looking for. So no one likes to sell our assets, but in this case this asset is here to help the entire city. All those in favor of introduction signify by saying aye.

from the administration that we have made financial gains and that's pretty clear. do still have some concerns over salary increases, number one. If you look at the way that it was done they are talking about equilibrium and I think there is no such thing as equilibrium with what they did. It's for key non-union positions. again, I think that creates dissension in the ranks and, quite frankly, if you are not happy with your job because you can't get a raise I know a hundred people right off the bat that would love to have a job in city hall and take the health care, so I don't really agree with the sentiment that we should be that concerned about giving out raises when we are a distressed city and we have all of the budgetary issues that we have.

The additional positions that are added, in some respects I think are unnecessary. I will go into that in more detail next week, and I do think there is a concern about again being over budget if you look at what PEL had presented with
