MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS
PARTICIPATION.

MR. ROGAN: Our first speaker tonight is Joan Hodowanitz. And I apologize for that, before you start, one other announcement, an executive session was held prior to this evening's meeting regarding a matter of litigation.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, city resident and taxpayer. I want to remind everybody that the Friends of the Scranton Public Library are currently conducting a book sale at the Steamtown Mall in the Library Express on the second floor. It will run through Sunday, December 6th. We are selling books for one to two dollars a piece. This includes things like New York Times Best Sellers. It's a wonderful way to cross off gifts on your Christmas list. So go there and get your money's worth. I

noticed in Fifth Order and the agenda, there are introducing two ordinances. Does that mean that we will have council meetings on the 10th and the 17th?

MR. ROGAN: The plan is to meet on the 10th and adjourn. That will be our final meeting for the year.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, then you'll be doing some kind of an emergency certificate to clear this off?

MR. ROGAN: Not an emergency certificate. We would just advance the reading. Emergency certificate is--

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, so the 10th will probably be the final council meeting for calendar year, correct?

MR. ROGAN: Correct.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, I would like to remind people that the last meetings of the pension boards will be on December 9th here in City Council chambers for those who like to keep abreast of what's happening with the pension funds. Having said all that, can you tell me what is the status of the 2014 audit?

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MR. EVANS: Well, the pre-audit is completed. And SB and Company is in the building working. So we expect that to be, again, a draft by the end of the year.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, that's still very disappointing. When you consider that we hired Rainey and Rainey to assist in the preparation of the data to go to the independent auditor and now we're still waiting when the Home Rule Charter calls for the audit to be completed by May 31st. So we're only six months behind the power Not much of an improvement from last year when it came out in February. Again, you know, I understand that there's a draft copy floating around, but that document should be out for public review because it does affect the budgeting process. what's the rumor mill on the next BA?

MR. EVANS: I've got nothing for you.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Is this Mr.
Bulzoni's last day at work or what? Once
the budget gets passed, he's out of here?

MR. EVANS: He's still around.

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MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, so I won't say, I'll be good. I'm not going to say it about how I could get -- how people can get to be hired, but we all know how that works. Okay, I saw a very interesting article in the Times this week on the Sewer Authority, the status of the potential sale or lease. And, of course, it's still frightening to realize that no matter what happens with the Sewer Authority, we rate payers can expect a swift kick in the pants. So I hope that some good comes out of this. And I hope we get more than 20 million dollars to stick in the pension funds because we're going to be paying through the teeth. And with regard to the 2016 budget and future budgets, I think you should push for more partnerships between the city and various organizations like the universities to get services in kind to help bring down the cost of operating in the city. I don't think we have pursued that one thought aggressively The University could come down here and run the BA's Office in all honesty. And maybe that wouldn't be a bad thing.

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like everyone else, I hope that Mr. Pierson has a speedy and swift recovery. And I hope that the next person that tries to pass a DPW truck or otherwise injure another employee goes down the deepest pothole in the City of Scranton and stays there. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you, Ozzie Quinn? MR. QUINN: Good evening, Ozzie Quinn, Hill Neighborhood Association. want to pick up off of two weeks ago in regards to the city budget in relation to free swimming for all city low income children, youth. Look at the budget, it's 132 million point two or something like that. And I got the figures from the--and I sent them to all the Councilmen in regards to the payment for the chlorine at Nay Aug Park only and actually it balances out to about annually \$26,000 round figures. if you look at the budget, 132 million dollars, I would say my calculation on that would be .02 percent of the budget. what it would cost to have all kids swim for free .02, not even a half a percent. That

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prompts me to ask, why are you guessing? Could you answer me anybody? Why? \$26,000? Well, obviously you don't want to answer anyway, you know. Well, you know, I'm not a lawyer and you know that. However, I did finish paralegal school. And I know a little bit about what goes on in the world of law. And I know that I was--when I was saying the fact of discrimination, I know that discrimination has a connotation effect. People think of racial or slur or something like that or sex discrimination or anything. So, actually, to make it a little lighter, to change the language, I want to put de facto segregation. Define it, okay, according to the law book, okay, according to the law book, Barron's. "De facto segregation is segregation which results without purpose, purposeful action by government officials. Actual segregation from social, economic, psychological conditions." That fits right in there with the swimming, I think, doesn't it? no law that says you have to do it. it's so obvious. It's right underneath the

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top of the lake, you know, meaning to come It's a shame. I mean, there's no law. It's a moral law. But you don't talk about moral law in government, do we? Always we don't with the shape of the world today. But anyway, this concerns me and it concerns a lot of people. And you know what? these low income children are not given the equal opportunity to do something such as swim with their peers, okay, studies will show that they're poor in their social life, they're poor at home, they're poor in education, studies. It all filters, it bothers them. You know, their self esteem is really bothered. And why? Just at Nay Aug Park. Well, I would hope you reconsider it. It's just got my mind shattered. And I'm going to keep on fighting for it. Because not from the fact that these kids deserve the right to go swimming at Nay Aug Park. Now, I could walk down, you know, the old proverbial park and say, oh, don't worry, we're going to get a private corporation, we're going to get the UDAG refunds or we're going to get OECD money

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transferred over. I've been that route. I've been that route soliciting funds every year. And this cannot go on forever. got to end. If you just tab that in there. And it will end it. Lastly, I want to say, I hope--I want to recommend to you as a taxpayer that you urge or you recommend or you direct the Scranton Municipal Recreation Authority to do a full blown audit, not a compilation audit. A compilation audit is a balance sheet. It's okay, they say the state accepts an audit. An audit gives you the findings, deficiencies, okay. I want to tell something, there is no control over the money collections at Nay Aug Park pool or Christmas display lighting. It's just a hand me out. No control. And I think it's something that you should look into. And please, do something about that .02 percent. Please, you'll sleep a lot better at night, I think. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Next speaker is Josh, I apologize on your--

JOSH: No, I won't be speaking.

MR. ROGAN: Okay, that's the end of

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the sign-in sheet. Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, City of Scranton, fellow Scrantonian. As vou know, we all got together and did something to raise money for them kids up at Nay Aug to swim before housing got the other grants. We washed cars. Those people--and whatever. But you and I know that the reason they put that into the authority was to take control for any kind of a project they want to do up there and give it to who they wanted to. That's the whole idea, the blind, the people of Scranton. That's the whole--that's the whole thing of the authority. An authority is a separate government. They run by whatever they want to do. If they want to bankrupt the city like with the parking garage, they go right ahead and do it. who helps them? The people we elected. But I know what's been going on. I've been saying this a long time ago. The people of Scranton don't know who the heck they're voting for or what they're even voting for. Okay, let's get onto the TAN. I see we're

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borrowing. I got the figures here, \$12,750,000. Does anybody know how much money we have to pay back? I mean, you're going to be voting on this, you must know what the amortization chart says, how much we've got to pay back? I know we ain't paying no 7.75 interest. But when you tack on the added cost, it boosts that up to a point or so. But to sit there, it doesn't matter. People got to--people don't give a darn anyway. If they did care, they'd be here. You're right not to speak about it. Just go ahead and do whatever you want to People in Scranton don't give a darn. do. Now, we're going to lose our business administration. I hope we're not losing it so we can facilitate the borrowing that has to be done. Because more money could be made on the borrowing that never could have been made at the salary. And that's a sad--I hope that's not the reason. I hope he stays away from all the borrowing of the But I doubt it. But I hope so. Evans, you don't buy homes that are foreclosed on, do you by any chance?

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1 MR. EVANS: Not generally, no. MR. SBARAGLIA: But you do do it? 2 3 MR. EVANS: I have in the past. MR. SBARAGLIA: That makes sense. 4 5 Now, we know why things are being done. reason or not reason or how it works out. 6 7 It's perfectly legal to do what he does. Ιs 8 it moral? You don't raise taxes and then 9 buy foreclosed homes if you sit on council. 10 You don't do that. Morally, it's wrong, 11 even though it is legal. MR. EVANS: That makes no sense 12 13 whatsoever. 14 MR. SBARAGLIA: What did you say? MR. EVANS: That doesn't make any 15 16 sense. 17 MR. SBARAGLIA: What doesn't make 18 any sense? Being moral or being legal? MR. EVANS: Your comment that it's 19 20 not moral to buy foreclosed properties. 21 MR. SBARAGLIA: It isn't moral to 22 sit on Council and raise peoples taxes and 23 then buy foreclosed homes. It just isn't 24 moral. Whether you believe it is or not, 25 that's up to you. You have to live with

your life. I don't. I think it's immoral.

MR. EVANS: I buy them so they can go back on the tax rolls and improve them.

MR. SBARAGLIA: You don't, you take peoples homes. It takes them out. Old ladies that can't afford to pay their taxes, they've been coming to me and asking, why are they doing this to us? And I said, I don't really know why they're doing it. It's because they're not Scrantonians. A Scrantonian wouldn't do it. Somebody that claims to be a Scrantonian may do it, but not a Scrantonian.

MR. EVANS: For--

MR. SBARAGLIA: People who believe--

MR. EVANS: For the record, my office was a foreclosed property. And I brought it about seven years ago and turned it into an office. I think that's a very good use of spending money. I am investing in the city.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I'm not saying that.

I'm saying that now while you sit on

council. What you did before is perfectly

legal.

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MR. EVANS: Okay, well.

MR. SBARAGLIA: And is it moral?

It's just that you're sitting on council.

You shouldn't--you should avoid that practice.

MR. EVANS: I'll do my best.

Because it doesn't MR. SBARAGLIA: look good. Especially when some little old lady comes up to me saying I can't pay my Why are they doing this to us? tell you why they're doing it to us. consider the voting block more important than the citizens of Scranton. You've got a thousand people plus maybe another couple thousand associated, related, so forth that votes as the block. And this is the block you're protecting. You ain't protecting the other 70,000 Scrantonians. You're making it harder and harder to live here. You're making it harder for the people who are handicapped. I won't say anymore.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, council,
Lee Morgan. You know, I'd like to invite

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people to find Lee Morgan on Facebook or Lee Morgan: The Alliance. Because you know what's actually taking place in this city as far as I'm concerned is criminal. You know, we have councilmen that won't tell you how much they earn. We have another councilman who--at least I could be wrong, Mr. Rogan--but I thought you hosted a party for Mr. Barletta. And now you tell me you're a Democrat and you won't even acknowledge at one time you were Republican. Not that it really matters because both parties are so corrupt they're not even worth the space they take up. But, you know, the thing that really gets me here is, last year, I asked council, I gave them a certified letter petitioning my city government to cut the budget by 30 percent. It fell on deaf ears. Even though council had the authority to write their own budget. I think this year once again we're going to do the same thing. But, you know, the troubling thing is that over 30 years, we have to ask, what did our state representatives do to sanction the city or punish it? Why didn't Mr. Blake or

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Mr. Farina or Mr. Flynn come forward and do something to city government to force them to make the cuts necessary before it reached the point now where we're going to give the Sewer Authority away for free basically and the parking garages away for free. And they were assets owned by the residents of this city. Now, you can ask yourself, why the residents of the city don't come here? I have to say that I generally believe that they fear their government honestly and truthfully. And that's a terrible thing, you know, when you consider exactly what's taking place in our country at this time. It's really quite pathetic, to be honest with you. And, you know, for a council not to realize that it had an oversight obligation in the budget. And then, you know, to grant summary relief to the residents of this city. And follow this thing, as you know, as it moves along and look at the poverty levels in the city. you know, Mr. Evans, you brought up the property you bought. Well, the Scranton Times did a couple of articles on that house

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and how people had--if it's the one that's on Pittston Avenue. The people that bought it, they were painting it, they were fixing it, they were going to do great things with that property. You know, the truth of the matter is that the city has been so mismanaged over such a long period of time. And there's not one--not even one councilman that will stand up and speak the truth to the residents of this city. Because even after the Sewer Authority is gone and after the parking garages are gone, the city still can't fund itself. So, we're going to throw away the last of our assets to the wind. And leave the city being nothing more than, you know, taxed, just basically out of existence because it can't fund its own operation. It has no answers to any of the problems. They've sold off, you know, the South Side Sports Complex, multiple other assets the city has. And when it reaches the point that, you know, the bond holders pay that Sewer Authority over a long period of time. And then, we have the American Anglian deal when Mr. Conners was in office.

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And we had one council after another who didn't do one thing. Except I do have to say--and some people may disagree--I think Janet Evans did a great thing when she forced the Parking Authority to financially But as far as anything else, this collapse. budget, it's almost laughable. And you know something? We've blamed the wrong people. We used to blame Adrian Barrett for the poor people in the city and what was happening in the city. She was just somebody working with the poor. You have to be honest with yourself and see exactly what's taking place here. And the other people we blamed, well, we blamed the Scranton Times for the way they reported. But you know the truth of the matter is, we've got to blame the people with the cheap suits and the blouses. Because they have an obligation to protect our standard of living and our way of life. And now? I don't know. You just see all the shootings taking place and some people trying to get their mind around it. you know, the one thing that troubles me in my country is as a young man, I grew up

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during the Vietnam era. And I never remembered Americans being so afraid as they are now of ISIS and all the things that are going on in our country. But you know something? When you go to war with somebody, you kill your enemy wherever you find them. And you know, the truth of the matter is that we've been sending cruise missiles into the Arab countries for a long time creating collateral damage. And now we have people that may be trying to do the same thing to us and we don't like it. So, but, in regards to the budget, I just hope somebody goes into court and forces a judge or somebody to do something. Because it's just incompetence right from the top to the bottom and you wonder why people don't vote.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Dave
Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer, fee payer and
whatever payer. I would also like to agree
somewhat with Mr. Evans on--or Morgan, Mrs.
Evans made one big mistake. And that was
telling people what they were really worth.
And they were very powerful people. And
they weren't worth much to the average

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person, like I said. I'd like to mention that it seems like our Sewer Authority is moving along, the sale of it or whatever. And you may get the EMT tax next year, but you're not going to get it the year after that if you sell that sewer plant. that's at least three or four million dollars not going to come in the front door. I'd also like to note that the reason our police and firemen pension are in the most distress is because 26 million dollars was lost back in 2008. And that being said, that should have grown by 5 or 8 percent, 10 percent a year. That it's already 2015. that's 7 times 8 percent, let's say, lost money. But that's even worse, you're probably talking--it could have been 36 million dollars by now. All lost by Wall Street on phoney securities. And nobody suffered, not really, only the poor jerk that brought it to somebody's attention that this person was being given a loan with no justification for it for a McMansion out in the Poconos or something. Now, on city business also, we have before us the rental

registration again. And it seems to me that there's no penalty if I just refuse to sign up my rental registration, my rental property, no penalty whatsoever. How about a \$1,000 fine when somebody's running four trash--a three or four trash disposal from units and getting away with \$900 a year. How about a \$1,000 fine if they don't want to register and pay their dues because the people cost money.

MR. ROGAN: That's what we're looking to do is to, you know, the hope is to do a one year kind of exemption where people could register and one over what's in the past. And after that point, the fines have to be steep and they have to be heavy to get people to register their properties.

MR. DOBRZYN: Well, I'm tired of playing around with some of these people and seeing them. You know, it's time they start to pay their bills and we'll be in all the better shape for it. We need to borrow a big hammer to smash down on them. And also, on the Sewer Authority and that 20 million, you're probably looking at a cost plus the

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system. So even at 20 million, you're probably going to be paying 8 percent profit at least or interest. And taxes first. The State Constitution requires us to just accept all these tax exempts. It's like some kind of endangered species or something. It's illegal to kill it or chase it out of your backyard. But I mean, I've got a crocodile in my swimming pool. it's endangered, so I have to just sit there and watch it try to eat my dog or my kid or whatever. It's--nothing is ever going to--ever going to improve till we get the State Constitution overthrown in the courts because the outlier citizens won't go along The two thirds of the county with it. outnumber us. And we'll just keep getting saddled with more and more tax exempt situations. Now, the Globe store is on the tax exempt block. We have the school bought the medical building over on Adams Avenue. Nothing's ever going to happen. We're missing probably millions and millions of dollars every year. And as a final test, don't forget you two youngsters, don't trust

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addition of a recycle coordinator at thirty six plus thousand dollars plus the benefits when we have a consultant who I understand is doing that job for \$5,000. So, I think that position needs to be eliminated. the first time, this year's budget provides the assessed valuations on which the property taxes are based. It appears the collection rate of 88 percent was expected this year. Last year, about 8 percent of the total real estate receipts were received in the last quarter. If you apply that to this year's actual list through September, we will not meet the budget for the real estate taxes this year. And the collection rate will drop to about 87 percent or maybe Therefore, I see no reason for even less. using an 89 percent collection rate for 2016 except perhaps to keep the tax increase at 5.7 percent instead of 6 percent. willing to place a bet with anybody on what that turns out next year if you approve this It appears the wasted tax revenue for 2016 continues to assume at a collection rate of about 75 percent. Mr. Wechsler, a

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year ago tomorrow you stated that this year in 2015, "We were going to get the audit done on time or extend the due date, if reality means we can't get it done." So I'd like to know what--in Fifth Order, I'd like to know exactly when we will be expecting the 2015 audit next year. And also, went onto say, "We already put things into place to be more efficient in collecting our refuse tax, keeping track of who paid, who didn't pay. So there's a lot of things going on that may put us in better shape." I believe we've been at 75 percent collection rate like forever. And I don't find that 75 percent rate palatable. have any of you read the Gannett Flemming long range plan for the Sewer Authority? Okay, well, no place in that document that I could find does it mention needing outside management for anything. So, that is a bother. The other thing that's a bother, which I've talked about before, is the Mayor advertising that he would be happy with 50 percent or 50 million dollars, excuse me, for the Sewer Authority. Back in--that was

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back at the end of September, I believe, the 26th. As I stated before, it's already been reported in the newspaper that the -- a financial report for the Sewer Authority says they have 120 million dollars worth of assets and they have, I believe, 69 million dollars in long term debt. And that is already covered in the fee structure. clearly, 50 million dollars is a steal. if it's not 75 million dollars to get us up to the -- up to the level of where our pensions are funding at 50 percent, that should be a real concern. I don't think the Sewer Authority should be monetized. don't think we're going to get the value out of it. And look down the future. we have? Next year, we'll finally repay the three years worth of the landfill. But next year is the last for the EIT tax tripling before the commuters goes away in 2017. The MMO with this budget--the reduction for the MMO expires with this budget. So we're going to have to pay full budget or full MMO next year. It's going to be larger.

MR. EVANS: Yeah.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And what's going to fill that hole? You sold all our assets.

We should keep the one valuable asset we have. And I fear that we are going down the same road with Mr. Amoroso as the last city that he saved which was Newark, New Jersey.

Two recent headlines, "Newark budget woes makes state take over more likely. And Newark debt downgraded to junk bond status."

Remember what he did. He went into Newark, he sold their assets. And here's where they are. And this, I predict, will be where we are if we sell that Sewer Authority asset.

MR. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else who would like to address counsel?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Wechsler, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. WECHSLER: Just a few right now. First, in regard to Ms. Schumacher, even though the audit has not been completed on time, we are in better shape than we were

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last year. I know it's not much of consolation, but we are in better shape than we were last year. And we will continue to try to make improvements on the audit process.

AUDIENCE MEMBER: Just tell us a good day when.

MR. WECHSLER: If I knew the answer when, I would let you know. But we don't unfortunately. As everyone else was here, I was surprised to see the announcement of the public hearing for the Sewer Authority in the paper the other day. When I get my paper at 5 am in the morning, I try not to get surprised. But that was quite a surprise when I saw that. The day that the article was in the paper, City Council contacted the Scranton Sewer Authority to see if they would consider moving the meeting to a p.m. time that would allow more people to attend. We also offered them the invitation to use council chambers for the hearing. And as of yet, we haven't heard back from them yet. And I mentioned just a couple times, unfortunately, I work in

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Mountain Top. I don't get back into the city until around 4, 4:30. And a hearing at 1 p.m., it's very impossible for me to attend. I'm sure that's true for a lot of working people. So I would advise if they can't move the location, at least change the time to a p.m. hour where more people could attend. Because this is a major issue that will affect both Scranton and Dunmore. in both--in terms of our long term future whether we go along with it or not, if we don't go along with it, we'll have to find other financing needs. And if we go along with it, it will help us as we move along. So it's too important to have the meeting at 1 p.m., I believe. On Wednesday, November 25th, there was a meeting held concerning the traffic problem within the city. Graziano sent me this correspondence to list some of the information that came out of that meeting. According to the Chief, "PennDOT is going to add time to the pedestrian crossing on Lackawanna Avenue side of Wyoming intersection. When someone pushes the pedestrian crossing button, there

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was a three second delay where all lights stay red while the pedestrian light is activated. After adjusted by PennDOT, there will be a 6 to 8 second delay allowing pedestrians more time to cross with red lights activated in all directions. will also be an education aspect to this for pedestrians as we are surveying the intersection. Virtually no pedestrians were activating the pedestrian crossing functions. If a pedestrian crossing button is not depressed, there is no delay in the lights turning green and certainly does not help with the problem here. There has to be a balance between keeping the lights red in all directions for pedestrians while not letting traffic back up on Lackawanna Avenue. So, I was happy to get this information from the Chief. So there are improvements looking to be made on Lackawanna Avenue where we had so many problems in the past. The other comments that I have, I will keep till later in the meeting. Thank you.

We often forget the dangerous nature of the job that the DPW employees do on a day-to-day basis. I would urge all motorists to use caution when approaching a DPW truck. Let these gentleman do their job. I've personally witnessed within the last few days people that are in a rush flying around DPW trucks while the employees are trying to pick up the garbage. This is unacceptable. not want to see another incident like this occur. And I would hope that Mr. Pierson

makes a full recovery. It has been a very somber two weeks here for us on city council. We endured a great loss with the passing of our council president, Bob McGoff. Bob's leadership, discretion, kindness and sense of humor will be missed. He was dedicated to providing good governance and was passionate about the City of Scranton which he loved. I enjoyed working with Bob McGoff and I learned a lot from him. He was a colleague, but more important, he was a friend. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Just a couple quick remarks about Bob as well. It's funny, when I first ran for City Council in 2007, Bob was my opponent. And obviously, he won the election. And two years later, luckily I was elected. And we sat right next to each other at the time. Bob sat in the seat that Joe sits in. And many times, we were on opposite sides. Actually, most times we were on opposite sides of many issues. But Bob taught me something very important. That politics, political disagreements doesn't mean that

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you can't be friends. And to leave differences at the door. And that's something that Bob taught me my first year on council. My bigger concern is the unions have remained silent on if they would allow the interest that's been accrued to the ending award to be used for pension plans, their own pension plans. This money is not part of the principal amount. could be argued that it really is not due

them, although legally it probably is.

There's more than enough money in accrued interest to be put into some pensions. And maybe the rest actually could be put towards the improvements in some of these buildings that we're going to be studying sometime next year. So, I will actually be voting for this amendment.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, I share the same concerns. As we discussed, we saw this amount of money that was set aside for the repairs of the firehouses, it also included the one in East Scranton that we're not sure what we're going to do there yet. We're looking for improvements on how we perform services on our website. constant complaints about the service from the LIPs Department, that phone calls aren't returned and certain properties aren't We still have some difficulties inspected. in getting information from the Law Department. We also are trying to improve the recycling, our recycling. So I take a

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look at each of these positions. actually, it's going to--hopefully go to some of the issues that we have been bringing up. But I also want to suggest that, once again, the government that the city has--the Mayor, a strong Mayor form of government -- the Mayor is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the city. And the day-to-day operations of the city, just like in my job, I have to make sure that the people that are working for me are performing the jobs that they're assigned. So as we look at each of these added positions and as we look at them as we move to 2016, I think we are going to have to see where there was a significant improvement in services or significant improvement in increased revenues to the city. And as we look at these going into 2017, I'd like to say that if we don't see the return on these, then we actually should eliminate them the next time around or two years from Also, when questions were asked about these positions, the business administrator, the Personnel Department supplied us with

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job criteria and definitions for each of these new employees. And I think for me, that's the first I've ever seen them detailed the way that they are. actually, they are prepared so well, I think they're almost ready to go out to be posted somewhere so we can increase the pool of qualified candidates for these positions. I'm not sure if it's something that we do on our website or if it's something that we actually advertise in the local media. These positions are going to be very important to the success of the city in delivering services and increasing revenue as we move into 2016. So I think we should take advantage of the hard work that's been done in organizing these positions.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you, anyone else?

MR. EVANS: On the question. On the jobs, first of all, we did receive the requested job descriptions yesterday. I had requested them on November 12th. I think

Councilman Gaughan requested them as well.

So we wanted them received by November 19th prior to the public hearing, so I'm not

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really happy about that. That's not the way to run a 132 million dollar corporation. asked for documentation, we asked for back up, we should receive it in a timely manner. And by the time we finally got them, they were professionally done, I appreciate that. But we asked them, we want it for a certain date, we should get them. I think council deserves a little more respect than that. On the budget, while the tax increase is 5.7 percent within the guidelines of the Amoroso plan that I, of course, have steadfastly supported in an effort to get our financial house in order: it does meet the minimum requirements that I suggested we support for the 2016 budget when we passed the 2015 budget last year. I said last year that I would not vote for a budget that had a tax increase more than 6 percent. So it's no coincidence that the tax increase is just below that number. However, there's no celebration from this Councilman. There's certainly no victory dance. In fact, I apologize for not finding new ways to move the administration to bolder, broader

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decisions in 2015. While our taxpayers, particularly our property owners, continue to take the brunt of these increases. 2016 must be the year where we finally change the way we do business. We have to find a way to grow our city, to be prosperous, to expand our tax base. We can't continue to be a city that no one wants to do business We're small business owners to large We have to remove the corporations. restrictions, unleash our potential and get back to being a user friendly city with a vision for the future. Continuing tax increases and just being average should not be our goal. Growing our economy, reducing taxes and excellence should be our goal. We are the technology, educational, medical and cultural center of Northeastern Pennsylvania. We should be acting like it. Let's stop being defensive, stop lowering our expectations and diminishing our value. It's time to act like a city that welcomes new businesses, that welcomes new residents, that welcomes new homeowners. Let's act like a city that expects growth and expects

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prosperity. So while I have to hold my nose again and vote for this budget because it met my minimum standards for 2016, this cannot be repeated next year. I have seen first-hand the impact of these continuing tax increases on real estate values in our city. And we cannot sustain this path and still be a viable city. While I will continue to work for changes in 2016 and be as vocal as I can where I think I can affect those changes, we have to show we are capable of doing more than one thing at a So for the record, my new minimum goal and standards for the 2017 budgets are a zero percent tax increase in 2017, a real reduction in what seniors pay in the refuse bill, the beginning of the elimination of the mercantile and business privilege taxes and the reduction and elimination of all unnecessary fees. We have no choice but to turn it around. Everyone needs to understand that 2016 is a make or break If it means that we have to become a leaner, more efficient and effective government to make that happen, then count

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me in. All in. So that's all I have on the budget for now.

MR. ROGAN: Go ahead.

MR. GAUGHAN: Sure, over the last two meetings, I've raised several questions and concerns regarding Mayor Courtright's 2016 budget. In particular, I'm concerned we haven't received a straight answer from the Mayor on exactly how much we've saved from the re-negotiated police and fire contracts. The Mayor told us we'd see almost a million dollar savings from both. The Mayor said we'd receive \$375,000 of new revenue from the parking enforcement And we've fallen well short of program. The Mayor is budgeting over \$200,000 in revenue next year for the program. Again, well short of the original anticipated amount of \$375,000. We will also most likely fall short of our projection of collecting over 4 million dollars from the LST Tax. I have serious concerns about the additional positions which I've made several amendment to take them out, increases in discretionary

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salaries and expenditures in additional debt included in Mayor Courtright's 2016 budget. Mayor Courtright has significantly increased departmental expenditures and non-departmental expenditures by 25.7 This is a continuation of last percent. year when over a million dollars was added to the budget. It's my firm belief that a city in a dire financial position that we are in, we should not increase the budget. We should find a way to hold the line or decrease expenditures. As we continue to ask our residents to pay more and do more with less, we should practice what we preach. We have the highest rate of employees receiving disability pensions in the state, over 50 percent. Mayor Courtright vowed to make changes to the pension ordinances, yet nothing has been The city owes a 27 million dollar award to the police and fire union with daily interest piling on. The 27 million dollars accounts for over 25 percent of the city's revenues. Mayor Courtright's budget is balanced using the 5.7 tax increase as

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well as a 29.1 million dollar loan to cover capital improvement and a union award, a loan that is anticipated, but far from quaranteed. The Mayor has failed to achieve the most important part of his own plan, a much needed restructuring of city government. It seems that we're content with running the city like we have a population of 140,000 people and industry is Times have changed. And we need booming. to change with them. My fear is that Mayor Courtright and this administration want to continue to do things the way that they've always been done. It's for these reasons that I cannot vote in favor of this budget. Thank you.
