MR. ROGAN: Thank you. City Hall will be closed on Friday, July 17th to honor Officer John Wilding. His funeral will be at 10 a.m. at the Cathedral Church on Wyoming Avenue. Expect road closures in that area. And secondly, Council did meet in a brief executive session prior to the meeting to discuss a matter involving litigation.

MR. GAUGHAN: And Mr. Rogan, just note that although City Hall will be closed on Friday, the DPW will still be picking up

garbage.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS PARTICIPATION.

MR. ROGAN: The first speaker on the list is Joseph Schimes.

MR. SCHIMES: Good evening, thank you for your indulgence. If I may approach, counsellor? I brought some things for the Councilmen to look at. And I'll let you see them first, so you can assure them there's nothing there that's of any consequence. No subpoenas or anything like that.

MR. MINORA: Okay.

MR. SCHIMES: Thank you. The single page handout that I just gave you, the purpose for it is so that you can note the third paragraph down listed as composition. That specific paragraph details who is required to sit on the Pension Board of the Non-Uniform Pension for the city. You will note that the Mayor and President of City Council are required to sit on that Pension Board. With all of what's going on currently with the pensions, someone might

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want to start paying attention to the fact that the Mayor and City Council President rarely, if ever, attend, let alone Subsequently, there's been participate. several lawsuits filed; several of which the city has lost in part because of that fact. Now, for the benefit of the public, the union and the non-uniform pension fund are two separate entities. One has nothing to do with the other. The union that's being referred to in some instances is the IAM Union which represents the clerical workers has nothing to do with the pension. pension was founded in 1922. The union didn't come into being in City Hall until 1972, some 50 years later. So just want to clear some of that up. You do, in fact, have remedies for this current situation with this financial disaster that you're in because of this pension issue, particularly the non-uniform pension. I can't speak to the police and fire issues, I have no knowledge of them. But the non-uniform pension, that money may, in fact, be But it's going to have to be up recovered.

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to you guys and your solicitor to work that out. Gentlemen, I thank you for your indulgence.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you for your time.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, a resident and taxpayer. The Library Express is going to have a special blow out book sale Saturday, July 18th and Saturday, July 25th, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the former Disney store on the second floor of the Steamtown Paperback books will sell for one dollar, hardcover books for three dollars. And you can fill a bag like this for only \$20. There are 35 books in this bag. With regard to 6A and 6B, the ordinance that would raise the threshold for bidding on city contracts. I have a problem with this. According to a story in yesterday's paper, these ordinances would reverse a 2010 decision that lowered the threshold in an effort to reduce costs by increasing competition while simultaneously increasing transparency. The Courtright administration

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believes that a higher threshold will cut advertising costs and expedite the procurement process. Did the city experience any cost savings under the 2010 ordinances? If not, how much money can we expect to save with these changes? support measures that save the taxpayer money, but not at the expense of transparency and public disclosure. speaking of contracts, I take issue with Mr. Amoroso's assertion that he can maintain his independence from the non-profits that pay his salary; specifically Allied Services, the Geisinger Foundation and Lackawanna College. These organizations have their own agendas. Those agendas are not necessarily compatible with the agendas of this city or its taxpayers. If we must avail ourselves of Mr. Amoroso's services, an assumption to which I do not subscribe, then he should be hired by the city and accountable to city officials, not the Chamber of Commerce and not non-profit organizations. Remember, city officials in theory answer to the The Chamber of Commerce and taxpayer.

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non-profits do not. Next, I am not convinced by Mr. Amoroso's claim that the city is hitting it's 2015 revenue and expenditure projections. For example, we have yet to receive even one bill from the PFM Financial Services even though they were hired in March of 2014. We don't even know whether we'll be able to meet our December 31st MMO obligation to the pension funds. know spin when I hear it. And I heard it last week. And finally, if the sale and/or lease back of the Scranton Sewer Authority is still part of our road to recovery, what happens if Dunmore refuses to play ball? we have a Plan B for that scenario? I'll step back to hear your answers, if any, during the course of the meeting. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Just one that I could give you now because we discussed it earlier today. Regarding Dunmore, they do have one vote on the board and it would require a vote of the board to pass. And Dunmore does receive a certain percentage of any sale or lease. So Dunmore would have a vote on the

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board, but they do not have a veto.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Les Spindler?

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,

Council, Les Spindler; city resident, homeowner, taxpayer. First off, my thoughts and prayers go out to the Wilding family. It's an awful tragedy. And I hope the criminals responsible for his death are prosecuted to the fullest extent. And I hope DA Jarbola brings murder charges against these people. They shouldn't see the light of day again. Okay, first of all, I haven't been here for a few weeks. a little disappointed that the meeting two weeks ago was changed because of the 4th of July. Well, the 4th was on a Saturday. The meeting would have been Thursday. Why was the meeting changed to Wednesday? couldn't attend Wednesday. It's ridiculous. It's like going back to years ago when the meetings were changed for any reason at all. That's just my opinion. One thing, I haven't been here since Mr. Boscov was here to speak. And I have an issue with some

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Council people up here that said he purposely devalued the mall so he can get it at a better deal. And I agree with what he said, people that think that, that's really Why would he do that? He'd be--that would be like cutting off your nose to spite your face. If he purposely devalued the mall which he couldn't do anyway, he doesn't run the mall. So making comments like that is really stupid. devalued the mall, he'd be chasing customers out to not shop in his store. So that's just ridiculous comments by whoever made Next thing, I wanted to bring this up two weeks ago. But as I said, the meeting was changed. "City Seeking Fresh Ideas." This is Councilman Evans. I think when I saw that, I think it was pretty laughable. I've been coming to these meeting for 13 and a half years. Myself, some people here, many people that don't attend anymore because we've been coming with ideas for 13 and a half years and it's fallen on deaf Now, all of a sudden you want to hear ears. ideas from the community? I said, I find it

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laughable. We had ideas for 13 and a half years that I've been coming here. And nobody--and a lot of them are good ideas. And they were just talked upon. Now, we want good ideas from the people? I--

MR. EVANS: Would you like me to comment on that?

MR. SPINDLER: Well, after I'm done.

MR. EVANS: Alright.

MR. SPINDLER: The next thing, 7B. And I won't be able to attend next week, so I'm going to speak about it now even though it's tabled. I don't think it should be tabled. I think it should be taken off the agenda. We have a city that's millions of dollars in debt and we have legislation about storage containers? Don't we have more important things to worry about than worry about people who have storage containers on their property? I think this is one thing and one thing only. It's a vendetta against Mr. Bolus. And I think it's wrong. We have much more important stuff to worry about. And I don't think it should ever be on the agenda. That's all I

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have tonight. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Bob Bolus?

MR. EVANS: If I may while Mr. Bolus is coming up to the podium, in my remarks about the idea sessions, I specifically said in those remarks that we need to do a better job--a much better job of listening. And that includes on Thursday nights, Thursday evenings. So I do recognize that there are plenty of ideas that come forth every week and we have to do a better job of listening to the ideas that come forth at the podium. That's all I have. Thank you.

MR. BOLUS: I didn't understand what you said, I'm sorry.

MR. EVANS: That's alright.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Bolus?

MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council,
Bob Bolus, Scranton. It's nice to see we
have some residents here from East Mountain
tonight which makes it even that much more
interesting, that is, to the issues that are
going on. My issue is the containers. I
brought it up last week with what the legal
use and illegal use was. I've gone through

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hell because of certain neighbors up there. I removed, I complied with a court order, I reinstated my containers. They're a legal use, grandfathered in and I resent anymore comments and negativity and harassment by certain individuals. I'm going to get down to some of the comments that I did not appreciate last week. And I didn't hear it, Mr. Wechsler, said you've been making a lot of comments about good neighbors and bad neighbors. You said something about the fact and I saw it on the review that I must have thought I was a bad neighbor. Well, let me set you straight once and for all what a good neighbor and bad neighbor is, what I've done to this community. you're not even in the position to question who I am or what I am. First of all, let me tell you a little about myself. And I never wanted to come in for praise from anywhere else, but you need to be put in your place once and for all about failure to tell who is a good neighbor and a bad neighbor. may come out in a court hearing in the future where you'll be compelled to tell

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that, including your neighbors. I received a proclamation from the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. I was awarded a Hero's Medal by the American (sic) Association and was given this proclamation by the House of Representatives for saving over 7 lives of I received a victims on the interstates. proclamation from the City of Scranton for feeding over 3,000 people over the last 20 years. And my last, it was over 3,000 people on Christmas Day which I fund and I sponsor individually. I want the kids to play free at Holy Cross Hall. When I bought the Holy Cross Church, I paid \$35,000. was going to be torn down, I saved it. The kids play free there, yet the city assessed me at a \$500,000 value and there's \$50,000 in taxes I have to fight over right now. But the kids still play free at that facility because I refuse to throw them out and put them out on the street. I have a mission to Iwo Jima. I was part of a documentary several weeks ago out in Illinois where a Japanese film crew who came from Japan to film the historic flag raising

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issues in the family and myself on the mission to Iwo Jima to recover Sergeant Genaust's remains from Iwo Jima. He filmed the flag raising on Mount Suribachi. mission I'm funding myself. And I've been offered and asked and given permission by the Emperor of Japan personally to come back to Iwo Jima and continue the search. allowed the students from Scranton Knights Lacrosse when they got thrown out of the University's property to come to my facility in Jessup and they played free along with other groups that played free on my facilities. Because I won't charge kids because I believe in the culture in the city. I just recently received a certificate of appreciation from the Florida Highway Patrol for preventing a tragedy on I-75 for my heroic actions in preventing a catastrophe when a drunken wrong-way driver came down I-75 by Bradenton, Florida in the passing lane and I put myself at risk and stopped that vehicle from a potential tragedy. When it came time to bring the Steamtown trains, I brought the first

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locomotive into Steamtown from New Hope, Pennsylvania. Then, I moved the museum from Bellows Falls to Scranton free with my transportation operations. Never asked anybody for praise. Never asked anybody for a damn dime. When I was on East Mountain, I used to be a director with some of the people that are here and when Wechsler was on the board. We used to have a dirt bike up there. We used to have a fishing derby which I was cosponsor on it. And we don't have the derby anymore and the kids don't fish there. That's the leadership of East Mountain. When East Mountain Lake was drained to look for the rifle to the guy that killed the young lady on East Mountain, I offered to cut the stumps at our expense and bring the lake back to the pristine condition it was years ago. It was challenged by East Mountain. When you sit here and you start talking about who's credible and who isn't, the issues you make, the comments you make: I donated many, many containers such as those at my home during the last flood up and down this whole

valley, Bloomsburg and everywhere, free, they were delivered free. I don't ask anybody for a dime. And they were numerous. They were in Nanticoke, Montrose, Berwick, Bloomsburg. And yes, Mr. Wechsler, I do consider myself a good neighbor. response to your comments last week that I thought I was a bad neighbor, I never employed a whole family of illegal immigrants as you did. I considered you a bad neighbor because you took jobs from people in the city. Don't tell me about electronics, here's the whole thing about 50 grand that cost your company. It's about what you didn't do. It's about your comments about who's a good neighbor and a bad neighbor. And I have to right to sit here. You're a public official. And I can challenge you --

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Bolus, thank you. Your time is up.

MR. BOLUS: And I understand Mr. Wechsler don't like it. But right now, I really don't care what he likes.

MR. ROGAN: Mr. Bolus, your time is

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up.

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MR. BOLUS: I understand that. I'll be glad to sit down in a second. you consider the fact, Mr. Wechsler--and he can smirk because down the road that smirk is going to get at issue. What we have with you calling neighbors bad neighbors, we have the pot calling the kettle black. And this isn't over by any stretch of imagination. My containers are going to stay where they are and it will take a legal challenge to do it. It will take people like this over this who want to discredit me like Ms. Dunleavy and - -

Mr. Bolus, please don't MR. ROGAN: attack residents. You can attack us, but please don't attack the residents.

MR. BOLUS: This is a city issue. And one final thing about good neighbors, when I asked you guys to pen a letter to put a casino in Scranton, none of you did it. And you were the guys at fault that are allowing the city to go down the toilet where it is. Thank you.

> MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Doug Miller?

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MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council,
Doug Miller, Scranton. Now, just in regards

to the legislation on the storage

containers, just real briefly because I find

it--I kind of get a kick out of the whole

thing. I feel it's a complete waste of time

with all the issues that we have going on in

the city that's basically bankrupt. To

think of the fact that we are even

considering it is a joke. But you can pass

all the legislation you want, anybody that

has an ounce of knowledge with the way city

government works and ordinances work, it

really doesn't matter what your opinion is.

Ultimately, a Judge will determine what's

legal and what's not. So we'll wait and see

if this is challenged by what a Judge says.

Because this comes down to what a Judge

says, not you. And that's fact. You know,

in regards to last week, the caucus with the

Mayor and Mr. Amoroso, you know, just came

out with more just baffling thoughts

wondering where we really are. The only

thing we heard from ${\tt Mr.}$ Amoroso was

liquidating assets, the few remaining assets

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we have left at this point; the Sewer Authority, the parking garages. But the thing that really gets me is that everything always resorts back to the same old recipe. And that's raising taxes. And that's once again what we heard from Mr. Courtright who claimed he was going to get us back on track, had all the answers and what we were going to get from the Messiah and Mr. Amoroso. And if that's really the solution of where we are, well then we are headed for a bankruptcy and that's where we need to be. Because if you continue to put the screws to the same people year after year and expect them to keep paying and paying something they don't have is just completely ludicrous. And I don't know when you people are going to finally get that. Whether it's Council, the administration. commonsense. Any of you that paid an ounce of attention in the last 10 years, 12 years should have figured that out by now. ran for office. You claimed to know what was going on. You claim to have solutions. And we elected you, not Mr. Amoroso. So

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quite frankly, I really am not interested in his plan because at this point it's a failure. There's not one promising aspect of that plan whatsoever. It's not a plan. As I said before, it's a suicide mission. And that's where we're headed. And is that ultimately where we want to take this city? Is that the fate? Is that the legacy that you people want to leave? That you failed and let us down. You're good at the sound bites, but you lack a lot of ability to put solutions together to turn this city around. And that's what we need. We don't need political parasites continuing to pull this city down. And that's what we put up with for a long time. And that leads me to the next thing on the agenda, 6-A, in regards to the lowering--or now we want to raise the threshold for bidding in the city. And what this comes down to is just more of the same pay to play politics that's just destroyed this city. You know, I believe it was a few years ago, it was Mrs. Evans and the supermajority Council that lowered that threshold to \$10,000 to level the playing

field to make things more transparent and accountable and it allowed people to have their fair share and to take away the blank checkbooks and get rid of the good old boy club. And what we're doing here with this is we're just--we're bringing that back, that same mentality back. Mr. Rogan, you were part of it. You were all for lowering the threshold. And boy oh boy my do the times change. And you're really starting to show your true colors.

MR. ROGAN: I haven't said whether I support or oppose that legislation. But I will address it, since you mentioned it.
When we did lower the bidding threshold, I do like and I still do like the idea of having more bidders. That creates competition and that lowers prices. On the other side of the coin is advertising costs.
The Scranton Times was the biggest benefactor of that legislation. Now,
Councilman Wechsler made a suggestion last week that I think gives us the best of both worlds. By putting all of those bids online and advertised on the city website basically

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free of cost other than the cost that our IT Department incurs by putting them online and then them having above this threshold in the newspaper, I think that is a good compromise to save money on both the advertising and keep it open and honest.

MR. MILLER: Yeah, my thoughts on it as far as the advertising because that seems to be the argument being made to pass this legislation is the progress in the city for years is, you know, we've been paying these fees for a very long time as far as advertising is concerned. So guite frankly, to me, that's not the issue. Essentially, my concern is what we're doing is we're going back to the old ways of the way we handle business in the city. And that's basically going back to no bid contracts because we owe favors to political contributors and we can certainly twist it however we want. This is the reality. mean, anybody has said, you know, you may think you are fooling people, but you certainly aren't fooling me. Because I know why this was initially reversed in the first

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place was to do away with this and we're going back. And I'm not interested in the advertising fees because we've been paying them for a long time. This is taking care of the elite few. This is the good old boy club. I guess the political contributors need to get their money back. And it's just pathetic where we are. And this is our leadership. This is what we have. Yep, we should be really proud of ourselves.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Ron Ellman? MR. ELLMAN: Got a new face down there. Ronny Ellman. Hello, Council. First, I'd like to say, that great sadness about losing an officer. As tight as I am, I wrote a little check today. And I hope each one of you did the same. I imagine you did. Last week, you mentioned that there were subjects that Council had no power to act in. It appears to me that Council needs to rephrase that, that there are subjects that you have no interest to act in. You can relate to these antiquated city codes. But when it comes to something that you want, it can be done immediately. Like hire

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Mr. Bulzoni. Or now we're into the pods. To me, most of these pods are--they're people who are trying to clean up an apartment where someone's left a dwelling and probably left the city. This is almost a necessity. And I certainly agree with Mr. It's just one more way you people found to rape property owners. This is shameful. Mr. Amoroso was hired, one of his jobs is to go to the universities, these phony non-profits, he hasn't touched them. But here, you're worried about \$50 on a pod or whatever the amount is. This is shameful. What was it, 639 foreclosures? Four or 5,000 in the past 8 or 10 years? And nobody's worried about them, those people. You're worried about a pod paying, getting the \$50 or \$100. I think you five people got an allegiance to the people that put you in those seats, not to this useless worthless administration that hasn't done a thing for the people of this city except infest us with people like Cross and Amoroso and Bulzoni. It's a good thing that Cross works for Obama. He's just--20 something

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years, who would hire someone and keep them 20 something years without one minute positive type of thing? And Amoroso, a year and a half, he sits right there last week bragging. He hasn't done a thing for the city in a year and a half. What do you call it when you get \$60,000 for the people you're supposed to go ask for money? You He--this could only happen in Scranton. know, it wouldn't happen in Denver. don't have it happening in anywhere. time there's something in Scranton, all these adversities just fall on us and nobody You know, it's a shame. It's like I said week after week after week, you people just aren't in touch with the people of this city. And I'm surprised at you. You're trying to sell houses here. And you're part of this event chasing us out, chasing people out. There's no quality of life. nobody cares about that. Nobody cares about diminishing home values. You're worried about charging for pods. You ought to listen to Mr. Bolus because he seems to have a --on this subject, he's right. Thank you.

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MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you, is there anyone else who would like to address Council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I would too like to add my condolences to that police officer's family. It was tragic. Let's talk about C and D. Them are two lots being sold. I hope they're not the lots between the Tauras Club and Stirna's Restaurant that are being sold for this ridiculous price. Because people park I don't know if that's the lots, but from what the address is. it sounds like it And I don't know if we offered Tauras Club the right to buy that property for these ridiculous prices before they're sold. I hope it's not that. But there was also a building there somewhere right around there that we tore down. I wonder if we put a lien against the property and we tore it down, if that's the spot? Does anyone know if it's actually the spot between the Tauras Club and Stirna's Restaurant? A box in

there? No answer.

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MR. GAUGHAN: I believe it is.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I believe it is too.

But this is the way

MR. GAUGHAN: Okay.

MR. SBARAGLIA:

the city goes. I have never believed in my life that we would sink so low as to offer them parking spots. Some of them are public parking spots too. For a ridiculous price. So we're bad. This is the way the city goes, worse, worse and worse. People have no confidence in you at all. I have never heard anybody speak decent of these people on Council or even the Mayor. And I know the Mayor's family very well. But they don't speak highly of him. And I can see What has he done? He has done nothing and will continue to do nothing. Now, the threshold, Mr. Rogan, you know why they changed them, the bidding process. You were there when you got all them bills that weren't paid, piles and piles of bills that weren't paid because nobody knew them contracts were given out. So we're going back to the same way. Why don't just loop

the city open? Say, everything in the city is up for grabs. We might have more respect for you.

MR. ROGAN: We're not going back to the same way. We're actually moving further by looking to do it on the internet which is something that was never done before.

MR. GAUGHAN: And if we just add--

MR. SBARAGLIA: Listen, the Mayor has the right to give out contracts, are you asserting the property of the Mayor, the duties of the Mayor?

MR. ROGAN: No, this legislation came from the administration.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Yeah, but you're wanting to change it.

MR. ROGAN: When City Council began reviewing it, we talked about it last week in caucus in front of a Times reporter and members of the public. Councilman Wechsler--we all had reservations. And Councilman Wechsler brought up an excellent idea which was to put those bids on the internet. Which certainly isn't a step back to the way things were. It's a step

forward. The internet is more accessible than the Scranton Times where anybody can go online and access what is--what services the city is in need of.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Are you telling me that the city--that the Council has the right to give out them contracts and the Mayor doesn't?

MR. ROGAN: No, the Council isn't acting on--the Council does not give out contracts, the administration does.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Okay, so they're non-bidding contracts up to that price. I don't care what you do on the internet, if the Mayor has the power to give out them contracts and you can't stop him, then they're going to be given out. So it's no different than the way--you realize that it was Mayor Doherty that changed it. He's the one that changed it from the original to what it was that you took back to where it was that you want to bring back up again. So we're going back to the Doherty administration. And the only direction we have from the Doherty administration is

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down, down, down.

MR. GAUGHAN: It should just be noted that these--what we're raising the threshold to is in line with Labor and Industry and every other Municipality that is similarly situated near the City of Scranton. So we're not exceeding what the state says is allowed.

MR. ROGAN: And I would just add there's definitely nobody on this board here that was a bigger critic of the former administration than myself. Regarding this issue, Council tried to do something at the time to increase competition. That's the reason why the threshold for advertisement was raised. We could still obtain that competition by advertising online without paying the Scranton Times for all these ads. That's the balance that can be struck to save money on both ends, by having the increased competition and saving on the advertising. That's why we're looking at not doing that. In it's current form without an amendment requiring online advertisements for the ones that are

changed, I wouldn't support it. But that idea was brought up, it's a good idea and it makes a lot of sense. And it's moving forward. It's certainly not moving back. Because we did not have the internet 30, 40 years ago. Mr. Morgan?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Mr. Rogan, with all due respect to you,
whatever criticism you take today, don't
worry because you still have a pretty suit
on and everything will be okay.

MR. ROGAN: It is a nice suit, isn't it?

MR. MORGAN: Yes, it is.

MR. ROGAN: That's my best one.

MR. MORGAN: It's a shame though that Councilmen have such a low regard for the residents here. And I think that Councilmen should really tone down the way they dress to be honest with you. Because me personally speaking, I'm not impressed by someone by how they dress. I care more about how they think and what they do. And this Council over an extended period of time has done nothing. It's had the power of

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subpoena. It's had the power of investigation. The pensions are under water. Mr. Amoroso has come in. I really think that the greatest thing that could happen to the city is what's happening to the Mayor of Harrisburg, but I'd like it to go further than that. I'd like the Federal Government, the State Government or somebody in the government to come forward and take a look at every vote that was ever taken in Council. Because Council, with all due respect to you Mr. Gaughan, you're the only one that said anything about the lots being But, you know, too often we come here and we have no idea what you're even talking about. You have no idea what you're passing. You have no idea what's on the agenda, have no idea what the back up is. And you know the sad and pathetic part of it is now. Because look at, I've come here a couple of decades. And I've watched it all happen. And I've watched the city fall apart. And I've watched all the slogans people ran for. And you know, I never disrespect people. Because I think the most

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important thing you can do is you can disagree with somebody, but you always have to respect them, you don't talk bad about people behind their back. You say what you have to say to them up front, right to their face. And, you know, the city government has been such a failure for so long. Because with all the power, the Home Rule Charter and all the abilities they have and with all the administrations that came in, the pension fund was looted. The Council did that by removing Melon Bank and putting someone else there to administer the fund. And not only that, you know, look at the city? Hundreds of millions of dollars dumped into the downtown. But you know the one question I have? And it's not a criticism of any one individual, but what are the super voters in this city thinking? Because they're going out in lock step and voting for fantasy. And the neighborhood leaders, why aren't they educating the people in the city on what the city's real fiscal situation is? You know. America has become the United States of Greece. Because

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our financial situation is much worse than Greece's. Much worse. And you know? You've got old people and children not being able to feed themselves. We've got problems. We just don't want to face them. And you know, I mean, I studied a lot more about city government than just Council. Look at the rats nest that Family Court is. And they took a guardian out. And they put--that had capabilities. And had a psychology degree and was a gifted lawyer that the state came and investigated her and said the program worked quite well. then, they put a woman in there, the gender doesn't matter that much, who has no idea how to even run the program. And we've got hundreds of children falling through the cracks in the court. And what's the court doing? You know, Trish Corbett. You know, the former Assistant District Attorney. people we elect. Look at, the problem we have here only as it were Council, the whole government is in a free fall. Nobody ever addresses the hard issues. We all go off over fluff. And it's such a pathetic thing.

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And the residents of our country, I really don't know what they're thinking. Today they're talking about all the former military people committing suicide every day, 22 people a day. And we're fighting wars in the middle of the desert that we started ourself and have no ability at all to stabilize anything. It's all make believe, all make believe. But the pathetic thing is that Mr. Amoroso has a plan to sell assets that belong to the residents. Sewer Authority has to be worth a billion dollars minimum. Because of all the connections that come to it. And we did the sewer deal once before and it didn't work. And now, we're going to sell the parking garages? But Council has no idea how much they cost either. Because I've asked. And ignorance is not a reason to support something, okay. All the money that was invested in those garages and those are assets that belong to the residents. time to move onto bankruptcy. You've never used your ability to subpoena. You've never investigated anything. You just look at

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putting your suits on. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to address Council?

MR. HARTMAN: Hello, Council, Todd Hartman, resident of Scranton, taxpayer, also President of the East Mountain Neighborhood Association. I'm here to talk about some pods. Pods are not what my good neighbor has. My good neighbor has Conex's. Conex's are construction containers that hold equipment, things like that. They're also things that you see that go on ships, those big things, those big carriers that they put on ships and send them across the That's what these are. I built a house in this community five years ago, okay. And for five years, I've been looking at trailers. I spent my own money, thousands of dollars, to have a court order to have them removed from the side of my property, which I ate. Numerous times in court with my good neighbor, numerous times, five times. I'm sure it won't be the last. I'm here to ask you for the good of the

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community, for the good of East Mountain, for the good of South Side, West Side, North Scranton; these are not pods. They should have a timeframe on them, charge accordingly. Whether you charge or you don't charge, that doesn't bother me. they are not pods. If you'd like to come up and look at them, all you have to do is come up to Mountain Lake, walk along the back of it and you will see them. And as far as the fishing derby, yes, we do still run that, Robert. Evidently, you're just not invited. But, please, Mr. Evans sells real estate in this community. I put in my home almost a quarter of a million dollars. I'm going to have a hard enough time selling because of the taxes up there. And our taxes up there range from 4 to \$8,000. Not 2, not \$1,000. 4 to 8. I'm not here to complain about my taxes. Everybody deserves a fair chance, whatever they pay in taxes. But these things don't belong in our community or they should have a timeframe to be removed. asking for the last 5 years to have these things removed. Please remove them.

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have to take other matters into my hands to have them removed. And it's sad that it is an R1 Zone up there and this occurs. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address Council?

MS. DUNLEAVY: Good evening, My name is Mary Dunleavy. a resident of the City of Scranton and the Secretary of East Mountain Residents Association and former member of the Zoning--or Zoning Board. The reason why I am here this evening is to applaud you guys for tabling that motion regarding the pods. I am in full support of the pods. And back in 2009 right before I think I resigned from the Zoning Board, the issue of pods was just starting at that time. We were recognizing that pods were becoming more prevalent in the city and that they were going to become a problem. And there were no zoning laws regarding that. And Mr. Wechsler and I were on the Zoning Board together. And we were

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starting to recognize that legislation needed to be put in place regarding these things. Over the course of the last six years, it has become more apparent that it has become a growing problem in the city. This is not a silly issue. It's a quality of life issue. As neighbors, there are people in our neighborhoods that are actually very good neighbors. They would like to know how long could they have these storage containers on their property. an episode in my own neighborhood where somebody had it on their property for well over a year. One of the neighbors spoke to They were totally unaware that there was an issue and that they weren't allowed to have them on their property for forever. And they immediately removed them. legislation, I believe for the City of Scranton does need to be put in place. Ιt is my opinion that it needs to be put in I applaud you guys for taking the time to make sure the T's are crossed and I's are dotted and I hope that you will follow through on this. It's a quality of

life issue. Many areas across the country have already dealt with this. So, this is not a new issue. This is a progressive issue. And like I said, many states across the country already have legislation in place. How about let's come up to the 21st Century and let's do that here in Scranton. I appreciate all of your time.

They were rewritten and expressed by EMS Jeff Kowalczyk shortly after Officer Wilding's passing. "End of watch 7/12/2015. This shouldn't be. shouldn't be Scranton Police badges in John's name in thousands of social media posts. The officers down Memorial Page shouldn't have to know John Wilding. friends shouldn't have to be dealing with the worst call they've ever had to complete.

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The great men and women of the Scranton Police Department shouldn't be feeling like they've lost a piece of themselves. wife and beautiful children shouldn't have to be having the conversations they are having this past weekend. John should be walking the beat and sharing that smile and his wave on a beautiful night like this. should all be just trucking through another shift with our minds on our plans for an upcoming night's off. We should all be able to go back to thinking we are invincible, that things like this don't happen to those of us that give so much. To think that great kind hearted souls like John's could ever leave us so early. Faith is hard to come by today. Not a lot of hope to be had. The air seems different. The breeze a bit lighter. And the sun just a bit dimmer. It's hard to smile and ever harder to answer the question of why do we do this for a living? Why, so many whys. But no matter who you ask or how loud you say it, there's never an answer. The coming days will be hard, nights being harder no doubt. The

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goodbyes that will have to be said can already be felt like a lump in the back of the throat. History has taught us though that in the end, we will find that there will be no shortage of love and support. Our thoughts will eventually provide some warmth instead of hurt, laughs instead of tears and eventually peace instead of anger. Peace from all of our fond memories of a short, but noble life. Memories of a friend, a brother, a son, a husband and a father. Most of all, memories of a hero who will live forever in our minds and our hearts. Fly high, brother." Thank you very much to EMS John Kowalczyk for those heartfelt words. And to the family of Officer Wilding, God Bless. That's all I have tonight. Thank you. MR. ROGAN:

I would also like to send my condolences to the Scranton Police Department. They are grieving over the loss of one of their fellow officers and they need our prayers and our full support. We should never forget the difficult job that our police officers have and should always be thankful that they put their lives on the line to protect us in our city. Thank you.

May when Police Departments all across the
country were receiving undue bad press, I
felt compelled to send this letter to
Scranton Police Chief Carl Graziano. At the
time, I was ready to thank all of the
Scranton Police Department for putting their
lives on the line to protect the residents
of Scranton daily. Little did I know that

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just two month later, Scranton would tragically lose Officer John Wilding while fighting to keep us safe. Officer Wilding gave the ultimate sacrifice in order to protect the city. He put the duty of his position above all else. It is quite troubling to see that these actions were from three juveniles which led to the untimely passing of one of Scranton's finest. I trust that the legal system will punish these reckless thugs for their actions which left a young woman a widow, two children fatherless and a community in mourning. I did reach out to Chief Graziano to extend my condolences as well and to ensure him that if there's anything that City Council can do to prevent tragedies like this from occurring in the future, to contact us. You can go on there and find out anything about the city. Scranton has some basic information and that's about it. So this is an area where technology could save us money. It could

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save us the money on bidding. But at the same time, these issues could still be out there so contractors could know exactly where to go without having to go and buy a newspaper and without the city having to spend money on advertisements in the newspapers. So I think by having a combination of what the administration proposed and along with Councilman Wechsler's idea of putting this on the city's website, we can continue to remain transparent while saving money at the same time.

MR. EVANS: On the question as well, I know that our solicitor is looking into the language of how we amend the ordinance and I would urge that the word mandatory must be included if we're going to advertise now on the website.

MR. GAUGHAN: You would still have to advertise it in the newspaper, correct, Solicitor Minora? Because I think in the administrative code, it says that you have to advertise in the newspaper, am I right?
