MS. FRANUS: In the very beginning, but how did you pass an ordinance next week, I believe? How did you pass an ordinance up there if you don't know what the fee is? Like, it's going to be passed, but if you don't even know the answers how are you going to pass the ordinance before you know the answers?

MR. WECHSLER: That's why there is one more week.

MS. FRANUS: So you will have the

answer next week? Okay, then here is something else I'd like to address, I believe at the Greenridge Neighborhood Association meeting last -- two weeks ago or something like that, Mark Seitzinger went around in the neighborhood and got two and a half sheets of people that needed quality of life fines and, Mr. Gaughan, you thought that was good, there was like 30 people, I don't agree with that. I think this quality of life, first of all, I don't believe neighbors should be squealing on neighbors. It causes a lot of dissension in the neighborhoods. I think they should not -- a lot of times people are in the hospital, a lot if senior citizens can't do the work themselves and they can't even -- they couldn't even try to find a young boy or somebody to do it for them so what are these people supposed to do? Why can't you change this to give them a warning for at least two weeks to get the work done, not just give them an out and out fine?

And another thing, when these policemen or these city inspector, the city

inspector Jack Mattise, he's the best Scranton's ever had, but if the policemen go by and these other parking officials go by on the ticket that they give the person, whoever it is, they should say, "I drove by today," name them, police officer, officer so and so, "and I saw year grass was too high or your couch was on your porch," and name the person. Otherwise, these people with the neighbors are calling up on them and that's not right. So instead of like everything else you are doing, you are doing all this, this ordinance has been in effect for like 30 years and you have never enforced and now you need money that you can't pay your bills so you are going after the taxpayers again. It's outrageous.

So in 1995 we had an ordinance for my neighborhood, Bellevue, for trucks, \$300 fine. It's a cave area. The house behind me caved in, my garage caved in, the house down the street caved in, not one truck was stopped since in 21 years. You need money, why don't you go over the trucks going through Bellevue. There are signs every way

you get in, Luzerne Street, Broadway, Third Street, everywhere you look. I asked the policemen at the ball field, "Are you here to stop the trucks?"

He said, "What trucks?"

So I went to see Chief Graziano and they said something about the weight truck. Well, Clarks Summit they have a weight truck. Patty Lawler, the mayor up there, they are stopping trucks right and left so why can't Scranton when we have a danger, when a truck goes down my street my house shakes so is there something you can do about that and get this weight machine going again? I mean, this is 21 years and not one truck is stopped. I'm telling you, there is going to be a lawsuit. I mean, I have been in council at least six or seven times telling you about this and not one thing is done.

So instead of negative enforcement, fining people all the time, why don't you do positive enforcement. Why don't you take like \$100 or so of our garbage fee and recycle, why don't you encourage people to

recycle? Take money out of their garbage fee instead of fining them \$300. You already said at these meetings we are already paying too much, the \$300 garbage fee is more than that we should be paying but we still have to pay it. My friend lives in Clarks Summit, she's a senior citizen. She pays like \$92 four times a year, but because she is a senior citizen she only has to pay \$51 four times a year. That's a big discount.

And, Mr. Evans, you said there was going to be a senior citizen discount, but I don't think hear anything more about that.

I heard about you pay your garbage fee by the first payment in May you get 10 percent off. That's \$30. Big whoop. That's a nothing.

MR. EVANS: Well, to a lot of people it's a lot of money.

MS. FRANUS: Pardon me?

MR. EVANS: To some people it's a lot of money.

MS. FRANUS: Well, what happened to the senior citizen discount? Clarks Summit

they give you 40 some dollars off a senior 1 citizens. 2 3 MR. EVANS: That's why we are pursuing the study and see if we can do a 4 5 per bag, but technically that's your senior citizen discount. 6 7 MS. FRANUS: Would you consider a 8 positive reinforcement for the garbage for 9 recycling? 10 MR. EVANS: I absolutely agree with 11 that. Absolutely. MS. FRANUS: Well, then there 12 13 shouldn't be a fine then so before you do 14 this ordinance next week why don't you consider taking money out of the garbage fee 15 16 and not fining anybody for recycling? You 17 will get a lot of people recycling that way 18 so don't you think that's worth it? 19 MR. WECHSLER: I think actually the 20 fee is intended more for commercial. 21 MS. FRANUS: No, but the fee will 22 still apply to residential. We will still 23 have to pay. Can I ask one more question? 24 How are they going to -- are they going to 25 go through our garbage to see if we don't

cans out to the people.

MS. FRANUS: Well, that's not the point. The point is you can't tell the people that aren't recycling because they don't have stuff out in the trash.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, city resident and taxpayer. In never occurred to me before but Item 3-D, the check received for \$50,000 from the Housing Authority in payment in lieu of taxes, I wonder how they come up with the figure of \$50,000 because doesn't the Scranton Housing Authority have acres and acres of housing with Hilltop and Valley View and Midtown apartments? Does anybody anyone have any idea how they come up with the figure of \$50,000? Because if that was all privately owned real estate I think the tax bill would be considerably higher. It's just an aside.

The 2015 city audit is 51 days late, as you well know. Also, next month when you are on recess I expect that the State

Auditor General will be presenting his

report on his latest audit of the municipal pension funds and I hope that there is another public press release that the citizens can attend and that hopefully some of you will attend to see what he reports as to the health of pension funds. Hopefully there has been a significant improvement.

Also, right behind the August recess will be the 2017 operating budget cycle, and coming in fast and furious. Now, I have to agree with recent comments made by Marie Schumacher and an editorial in the Times-Tribune with regard to long-term funding of pay increases and new hires that we have been relying in the past with grants which would pay for something like the first three years, then after that it falls on the shoulders of the taxpayers, and I'm not opposed to new hires and I'm not opposed to pay increases where they are warranted, but we have been using grants as a method of getting these things passed without regard to how do we maintain payments into the future for many years to come, and I think it's time to starting with the 2017

operating budget that the administration is asked to come up with a policy for how we are going to sustain those payments, and this goes back to 2014. If you recall, the business administrator was given a significant pay raise which would paid for by a grant. I think it was something over \$23,000. Now, this is the third year, so starting next year that pay raise comes out of taxpayer's pockets.

And, again, those pay increases and new hires they may well be justified but we have not addressed the issue of how we are going to pay them in the long run.

Also, the June controller's report is out and I was surprised that it did not reflect the \$40 million bond for the police and firefighters' Court award. That's not reflected in the June report even though I understand it was completed in the month of the June, even some of the checks may have gone out in the month of June. I would being looking closely at the July report to see if that's been corrected and those figures have been adjusted, and in addition

to the wage tax that we should have been receiving from those four award payments and the pension fund contributions including that whopping \$1.6 million that went out in July.

One interesting thing I saw in the June report, however, was Rainey & Rainey under professional services in the BA's Office, \$1,681.25. This is the second and final year that we have a contract from Rainey & Rainey to assist the BA's Office in the preparation of the annual audit. And, again, it is late again this year, hopefully it will done before the end of the fiscal year, but I'm wondering how is the BA's Office going to fair next year when Rainey & Rainey is not in there to hold their hand. It will be interesting.

And, finally, I agree with the recent editorial in the Times, if the city is not going to sue the Sewer Authority and Keystone Sanitary Landfill with regard to the leachate line and the recent incident, I agree with the Times that council should consider holding it's own hearings. Since

you have subpoena power, you need to then, you know, continue with this investigation because the public has both a right and a need to know what happened. This is not just a Greenridge issue, this is a Scranton issue and it affects every resident and taxpayer in the city. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Before the next speaker comes up, I would like to ask members of the audience if they are going to have conversations please have them in the hall. It's quite disrespectful to the speaker at the podium and it is distraction to us as well, so if you are going to have a conversation I'd like you to have it out in the hall, please. Thank you. Dave Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident. Once again, call
your senators and congressmen. Call the
president, tell him to can their trade
packs. They have resulted in nothing but
poverty and unemployment problems. You
can't launch a career at 55, 58 years old
because your plant to wherever.

I'd like to thank again council for

sending their letters regarding Steamtown and requesting -- requesting replacement of the appropriations that this evaporated after the sequestered and one little thought came to my mind possibly the Chamber of Commerce. They are the biggest lobbyists in town so I think it's a good idea if you could.

Now, onto recycle, first of all, recycling is a good policy. If you throw a can today in the -- an aluminum can in the recycle there is a good chance that it will be in somebody's refrigerator by

Thanksgiving. Once again, somebody Adams or whatever from the aluminum. But, also, I think there should be ample warnings and we consider smaller fines if that's the way it's going to be to start out. You don't want to go hog happy and have everybody going crazy on it.

And on anything with per bag, first of all, it should be per barrel. And, secondly, trash removal is as important safety as police and fire. You could have rats, skunks, animals of all types dragging

diseases like rabies, there was just a rabies case what up at Lackawanna State Park a few days ago, so you really don't want that element coming into town and I don't mind when I come up here on having numerous times come home and trash thrown on my side of the apartment house or whatever and in other place a girl couldn't pay her bill and she just piled it up in back of the adjacent property. My dog got sprayed by a skunk. It got to the point where you couldn't walk out on the porch without a skunk wandering It attracts the wrong things and, furthermore, if somebody tosses a bunch of trash on your lawn and they are smart enough not put their utility bills or something in it that it can be traced, who pays for it? Who gets struck paying for it? You know, I called the police and say, "Well, we would like to help, Mr. Dobrzyn, but we really can't do anything about it. We can't run a big investigation here," and so the small businesses in town are paying as much -close to \$1,000 a year for trash removal and I talked to one person and he thought it

would be a great idea if we could put all of the cardboard boxes out and paper products and stuff like that and have it removed by the city for a much smaller fee. Ιt definitely goes without saying that he could save a lot of money there, and if he don't pay that whatever it is, \$70 a week or whatever it comes out to or \$30 a week or \$70 a month or 80, they don't take it. know, they just stop after the first month. That's it. The trash piles up. Like, I lived through 60's when I was a young kid and I remember the trash strikes in New York. You might remember it, Wayne, you old geezer, right? And, I mean, it was just piled, piled, piled. The whole sidewalk was just a path so you really can't have trash not being removed. I don't want anybody's trash not being removed or if they have to pay for it they decided to move it up the block.

And I just like to make one quick statement on the apartment houses, do we have an ordinance that if a rental property goes empty a year it goes back to a single

dwelling. Many of our houses are just too large and have that.

MR. EVANS: Reverts back to the zone.

MR. DOBRZYN: We need to reconsider that ordinance. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Gerard Hetman.

MR. HETMAN: Good evening, Council. Gerard Hetman from Lackawanna County's Community Relation's Department. To begin this evening, the Lackawanna County three-on-three basketball tournament will take place from Friday to Sunday, July 29 through 31, set in the 100 and 200 blocks of Wyoming Avenue once again. The tournament is open to teams for boys and girls. We have age three to four -- or grad three to four brackets, excuse me, up to Deadline to register adults open divisions. is Monday, July 25. You can visit lackawannacounty.org for registration forms and more information, and this year just because of some logistical issues we moved Normally, it coincides it back one week. with first Friday in August, but this month for this year's tournament it does coincide on Saturday with the Scranton Native Arts on the Square that takes place during the day and early evening, so we still should a very good downtown vibe on Saturday with that. Lots of cross traffic and a really fun evening and afternoon in downtown Scranton.

Second, as most of us know, Scranton Tomorrow driving downtown movie series starts tonight with Star Wars, the Force Awakens on courthouse square and there are two other dates scheduled as of now. There will be Descendents on August 4 and Zootopia on August 11. All show times begin at 8:45 p.m. and this is the sixth year for the

series. Again, we appreciate all of the folks that come out downtown and enjoy the evening of movies during the summer.

Our third item is actually comes courtesy of the Pennsylvania State Police. This is something we have seen shared on social media. Over the last few years the PSP has really upped their social media strategy and we enjoy seeing that because they put out a lot of information. The item tonight is one of their community awareness bulletins that deals with the Pokemon Go craze. I think we have seen this, even if you not into Pokemon, as I never was, you still catch on, everybody is playing it, people of all ages.

The bulletin really gives you a concise one-page summary of the many positive aspects that you see with a development like this, but also some of the potential dangers and pitfalls that could come in various forms with using the game inappropriately, whether it be wandering out into traffic, trespassing onto people's property, be particularly sensitive to

emergency facility or a military installation, and also some of the features within the game that if used improperly to expose the user to potential stalking or robbery if someone tried to track them, etcetera, etcetera, I won't go into all the details here, but we'll leave a copy with Council. It's also available on our Facebook and Twitter page with the County, and again the PSP social media.

We encourage everyone to follow that along with Scranton Police, had a real good growth in social media presence. We see that from a lot of law enforcement agencies locally, across the country and around the world, so this is just the latest example. We though it's a really good summary of that. We see a lot of people on the courthouse grounds playing it at all hours, most of them have been very respectful. We just ask them to keep that up, especially with regards to emergency vehicles coming in and out of the processing facility.

And our last county item for this

month, Penn State Extension serves a food safety service safety, food service and safety course taking place two days in the month of August. It's Monday, August 1 and Monday, August 8. Both of those sessions day are at Penn State Worthington Scranton's campus. The cost is \$185 to register. The deadline to register is Wednesday, July 27. Participants can register online at foodsafety.psu.edu or call Nicole at 570-421-6430 with any questions.

And during the break, I'll certainly keep in touch with councils office and if anything comes up in particular please feel free to contact me or the commissioner's office in general and we'll be able to keep your office posted on any developments. Any comments or questions from council?

MR. HETMAN: It wasn't me. No, I never caught on back then. I was playing Wolverine back in those days, but like I said, we see a lot of people playing in downtown sometimes in front of this

building, again, a lot at the courthouse.

Many have been very respectful and have done it in a very safe fashion. We hope to see that continue not just here, of course, but anywhere. Like I said, this is a really good one-page summary on that, probably as good as you will see put together so hats off to the PSP. We just wanted to share that information.

MR. ROGAN: I never thought I would be commenting on Pokemon at a city council meeting, but downtown business owners have told me because of this game they have actually seen an uptake in business because of the people in the downtown playing the game. There are safety issues as well, as far as safety invasions --

MR. HETMAN: Sure. I think it's like anything, I try to explain to my parents, it's like any good innovation, there is a lot of good things with it, there is also some things you have to make sure you avoid or use properly to make everybody has a good time so thanks, folks.

Pay raises, but yet you pound the living hell of everybody in the community, those living here with astronomical tax increases. You overtax people that don't even live here that come here to work. If I were doing that I'd boycott, I'd get the hell out of there, too, and now you are talking about penalizing people if they don't recycle. If I was -you know, my recommendation for this city is boycott that. I wouldn't pay anything until you people actually learn once and for all that the solution to this city's problems

isn't forcing people out of their homes, but you don't comprehend that up here and you never will because you're political hacks and that's what political hacks do.

We need independent thinkers in this city. People like Marie Schumacher, people like Joan Hodowanitz, people like Lee Morgan, Andy Sbaraglia, Bob Bolus, people that have been coming here for decades who have lived it, who have lived here their entire lives, 40, 50, 60 years, who know what it's like. You people don't understand because you are politicians.

You know, Mr. Morgan made a nice comment a few weeks ago that we sent a chimp to outer space with a spacesuit on, didn't mean he was an astronaut and just because you come here every week with your nice Joseph A. Banks suits on doesn't mean you know what you are doing. You play good to the camera, but this city needs leadership.

No transparency. We talk about audits. It's all make believe. You need an audit at this point to tell you you are bankrupt? I mean, it's just ludicrous.

It's not negativity. You know, people think I come up here and think negative, no, I'm being realistic, there is a difference. You want to play make believe like we are actually going somewhere. Keep following that yellow brick road and see where it leads you. I'm in reality and so are these people when we know that you have us on a suicide mission.

Where is Amoroso? The messiah. He was going to save the day. Where is Mr. Courtright, the sixth councilman? What happened to the mayor that campaigned and talked about selling assets was a last resort. Seemed like that was the first thing he did when he took office, that was his first mission. That was part of the grand Amoroso plan. Just ridiculous. And, you know, just don't know where we go from here.

Just in regard to 5-C on the agenda, I find that comical. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Bob Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: If I may, I'd like to

1 hold my comments until Mr. Gaughan comes back? 2 3 MR. WECHSLER: No, Mr. Bolus, your time starts right now. Thank you. 4 5 First of all, on "C", MR. BOLUS: Carrie Newcomb. I adamantly oppose her 6 7 reappointment to the zoning board. In the 8 past, Carrie Newcomb made derogatory and 9 scandalous remarks regarding me and 10 Mr. Miller that was carried nationally on 11 television. She is another disgrace to what 12 leadership is in this city. She brought it 13 on herself. She opened her big mouth up and 14 made her comments. She should not in any way, shape or form continue to represent the 15 16 growth in this city and I want that on the 17 record. 18 Gaughan and Mr. Wechsler were at the 19 landfill meeting the other day; am I 20 correct? MR. WECHSLER: Yes, we were. 21 22 MR. BOLUS: Gaughan came in and he introduced himself as a Scranton City 23 24 Councilman: am I correct on that? 25 MR. WECHSLER: Yes. he did.

MR. BOLUS: Was Mr. Gaughan there on 1 official business of the City of Scranton? 2 3 MR. WECHSLER: No, he was not, I 4 was. 5 MR. BOLUS: But you didn't speak. MR. WECHSLER: I did speak. 6 MR. BOLUS: Did you speak on 7 8 official business on the City of Scranton? 9 MR. WECHSLER: I read a letter into 10 the record from city council. 11 MR. BOLUS: You spoke on behalf of 12 the city then? 13 MR. WECHSLER: I spoke on behalf of 14 city council. MR. BOLUS: The city council. 15 16 MR. WECHSLER: Correct. 17 MR. BOLUS: Mr. Gaughan represented 18 himself as a councilman. Was it official 19 business? No, he spoke personally about his issues. He should have introduced himself 20 21 as Mr. Gaughan, a Scranton citizen. Okay? 22 You guys don't speak for us. Knowing what 23 the landfill is and issues there is not one 24 of you guys sitting here that will leave a 25 bag of garbage in your house for a week or

two sitting in the house. The first thing you want to do is throw it the heck out the door, coming in there and making comments without a foundation, you didn't come in with a solution, you didn't come in and say what the alternative would you be, you didn't do anything progressive but figure out how to alienate the people at the landfill.

Keep in mind, they control the garbage bills here. You continue to alienate people and they tell you to take your garbage elsewhere. They don't need you, we need them. We need alternatives to what the garbage is. We need creativity and you didn't present none of that. You didn't go to DEP and tell DEP, "This is your situation, this is your problem."

You didn't do any of that. You only talked about, oh, it's harmful this and that, but they are all unfounded. There is no scientific evidence to what you guys babbled about. You spoke in a vacuum. You can't do that, okay? And I think it was totally what yous did. Come in with a

substernal argument, gentlemen, and we'll go somewhere, but don't come in like you God of the mungies and think you are getting somewhere, you are not. There's a whole group of people. Let DEP make the decisions, they are professionals. They are the police of the landfill, it's their responsibility. And keep in mind Scranton, Scranton dumped their garbage in those dumps before they were called landfills. realize you may be held as accountable as Dunmore and Throop for cleaning those old dumps up? Have you taken that into consideration? I raised that issue the other day. What are you going to do if you get hit with millions of dollars of clean up costs or the landfill decides now to raise the fees?

You sold the parking garages, you gave them away. You paid for the parking garage. You bought his parking garage, you guys should have bought it first. You haven't done one thing in the city for a future. You have shown in this city you can't manages assets. It's easy to dispose

they can manage them, and they can make money. Gaughan bitched about, oh, the landfill is going to be 40 years and this and that, but you blew 40 plus years on the garages. None of us are going to be around here but, Mr. Gaughan, your kids are going to suffer. Mr. Wechsler, your grandkids are going to suffer. All of your kids are going to pay the price of this folly by giving away what you've done.

You gave the Sewer Authority. You think they are going to sit back and lose money? They are not stupid, they are intelligent people. They are taking it because they can make money, and that's the difference here. You blew a lot of opportunities and you will go down in history for it, trust me when I tell you, but you know all of the money you pay to give this guy and gets a tax break, \$3 million assessment on a 20, 30 million dollar property, but you won't go after nonprofits. You won't go after anybody else and put a fee on them, yet you bury the heck

out of the people. You are going to chase everybody out of here. You will drive the nail in the coffin of the people.

And one other thing I have, with the Hilton down here, we parked the Donald Trump trailer here tonight because there was a Trump rally, yet the Hilton come out and said, "Oh, you can't park here on Adams Avenue by our hotel."

What are they paying the city to have exclusivity to that parking on Adams

Avenue when there is a sign there that says,

"Hilton Parking." How much are they paying for the space that they are taking up there for buses and everything else. \$500 a month? \$1,000 a month? We are being shortchanged. These are just some of the little things that you lose in this city as we go on and on and on with the problems.

You have to let DEP make the deal,
you have to hope and pray to God the
landfill doesn't shut yous off. Figure a
solution, but don't come in barking. You
don't represent me and you don't represent a
lot of the opinions of the people in this

You brought up a landfill issue, in my lifetime the city had two landfills, one at the cemetery, Cathedral cemetery, and the other on top of Snake Road, the one that you have to keep cutting the grass on. were our garbage dumps at one time, but you talk about recycling, do you know what a high rise is and how the high rise gets rid of their garbage? They drop them down a chute. Whatever you got in the apartment you want to get rid of you drop down that There is no way they could sit there chute. and take papers this way, cans this way, paper this way, they just can't do it. can't separate their trash so you are going to fine Scranton Housing authority for not

separating their trash? I don't know. You got to look at a lot of these things before you do things.

I know you are going to take your sabbatical, vacation, whatever you want to call it, I always said you should take six months. how to oppress, and that's what you have been doing. Like the mall, you gave away hundreds of millions of dollars to his company to manage the garage and you sit there and tell me you are not?

MR. WECHSLER: Freedom of speech is your right to be, but no one can be more wrong than you are right now. Marie Schumacher.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher, city resident and taxpayer. I would like to start out with some happy news tonight, I did run into some people who live on Greenbush Street and they are overjoyed that the street is finally repaired and the water issue is resolved and hopefully the street will be maintained for a long time coming, but that sort of segues into what I had planned to talk about tonight which was storm water. It's been since December 10 that I came to you with questions on the storm water issue and how we are going to I will have questions for you handle it. next week and I hope that you all have answers this time because you had ten months

-- or ten months, seven months at least to look into that issue and I will be looking for answers next week.

Third, how much do we get for the grants? How much did we get last year for the 904, Section 904 grants? Two million tons means nothing to me, how much did we get in the grant? I believe that whatever we get for that should be used to offset the \$300 fee and not used for anything but that if you expect people to go on.

And the other thing that concerns me somewhat, I believe it was Mr. Rogan who brought this up awhile back about the fact that the people who work at the recycling center sent things that are mixed or they decide are mixed to the landfill instead of be recycled, who decides what is recyclable? I mean, I put my papers in, I put cardboard in, I also keep a bag there anything, empty envelopes, everything I put in. I compost personally, but you know, am I wasting my time doing that because somebody is going to say, "Wait a minute, that wasn't the right kind of piece of paper so we are going to

send the whole thing to the landfill?"

MR. ROGAN: No, mostly it's certain specialized plastics not so much food and beverage, you know, light fixtures, different items that are not a food and beverage related often are recyclable.

MS. SCHUMACHER: But you had said that -- so a whole thing would go to the -- my whole thing in my blue thing if I put the wrong in would go to the landfill?

MR. ROGAN: No.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And did you say those people work for Mr. DeNaples, and which would benefit going to the landfill?

I think you made that statement one time in the past?

MR. ROGAN: I don't recall talking about that, but i do remember reading off the list and just from knowledge they pick it out piece by piece, it's not -- you know, a whole truck wouldn't go because of one or two items. They have people that actually pick it out.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, and then I'm somewhat troubled by the fact that last week

in the caucus Mr. Gaughan asked about the fee and he was reassured by several of you that there was no change, but I see a big change. The old one said, "Any person who shall violate any provision of this division shall upon conviction of a first offense be sentenced to pay for a fine of not more than \$25, and costs for a subsequent offense be sentenced to pay a fine not more than \$300 and costs of the prosecution or a default of payment of such a fine and costs to undergo imprisonment for not more than 30 days."

That's a big change to go from \$25 up to \$300. I'm glad the imprisonment for 30 days has gone away, but that to me is very big change.

And now I've got a lot of issues. I came in and got a copy of this and it seems to be a hodgepodge of quick pickin' from the old one and coming up with some new things, but it's deficient in a lot of areas, but section one, the last sentence says, "Collection, regulations and fees must be established to implement the program."

So we already have a \$300 garbage

fee, are we now going to have another fee for recycling? If anybody cares to address that later I would be love to hear that.

And then the definitions section, resident. Do residents include group homes? I know we have lot in my neighborhood and they put out many and I don't know how they are classified, but they are not dealt with in here so --

MR. EVANS: The use of the group home is classified as a single-family home so they should be recycling and they should be paying the normal garbage fee.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I have a lot mover that you might be interested, but I'm not going to waste my time next week, but you might want to read it carefully because there is spellings of the same thing different places, there is things that aren't in the definitions, for instance, what is white goods?

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MS. SCHUMACHER: You really need to look at this, it's not good.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Lee Morgan. You know, Mr. Sbaraglia tonight was fairly upset and I think it was justifiably correct to be upset and generally speaking, you know, the public thinks there is all kinds of deals taking place by this administration and councils, present and previous, and I don't believe how council walks away from their responsibility to the public because the public in Scranton has no rights and that's because they elect people to council, you know, who basically could do a much better We have discussions now taking place about the leachate line and council using its powers of subpoena, I heard that mentioned today. The council should have used that power of subpoena long ago for many different issues and it never happened and, you know, whether you are talking about the city's pension problems or sale of public assets, or a host of other things this council has not moved to benefit the public in anyway whatsoever.

As a person who has been here over

two decades, I really find it comical, really, really find it comical that people in this city can elect people who have no idea what government is and how government should function, and then when they elect them they are amazed that nothing good is happening. And, you know, you take a look at all of the grant money and where it's going, it would be really interesting. There's a lot of things that would be really interesting if you had a council that really wanted to look at what was taking place in the city, but one of the most remarkable things is that when you are paying this 2.4 percent wage tax and you are a city resident and you are paying between 60 and 70 dollars a week to live here, you have to really look at yourself in the mirror and wonder if you are out of your mind because you are paying for absolutely nothing.

And another person here tonight spoke about your children and your grandchildren being here in the future, I hope that's not true and I hope you give your children and your grandchildren money

and send them out of here because there is no reason to be here, there really isn't, because this city is strapped for the next 40 or 50 years in debt. And bankruptcy, well, it's a nice sounding thing, but that's not going to give the kind of relief that people might think it will.

What would have gave relief was having councils, not just this council but previous councils, pay attention to what was taking place and, you know, I don't think it's fair to say that Mr. Evans said that he was going to hold his nose and vote for things because you know something he is the not the first one person that has done that and, Mr. Evans, you are a realtor and a businessman, and some of these deals were just beyond belief.

And where the city is going it's not beyond belief because there is so much despair here, so much poverty here, and it's not just here there is communities in our country that have 30 to 40 percent of his population at or below the poverty level, and foreign manufacturers are coming to

American to manufacture cars and finish goods because America's labor rate is cheap, because what the politicians have done to us is destroyed the whole fabric of our society and then you take a look at some of the shootings that are taking place and some of the -- look it, it's just not police that are being killed, it's bailiffs, judges, it's the whole bed rook of the political system that is under fire in this country, and then you have got a president of the United States -- I mean, a candidate for president of the United States, which is Mr. Trump who is running not so much as a Republican because he put the whole Republican party to sleep by himself. candidate and all of the money they threw at that candidates made no difference because Mr. Trump, i.e., the American public put every one of those candidates to sleep, and I pay a lot of attention to what's going to happen in the next election because I wouldn't be surprised if Mr. Trump wins this election by a landslide because the American people are tired of the games that this

The first order of business is if, Mrs. Reed, you can send a letter to the police department, I had a couple of complaints on the corner of River and Cedar Avenue about tractor trailers making the turn and getting stuck and apparently this isn't the first time, it's always about where they bottom out if they try to turn up River and they are going to need assistance with a tow trying to get out

so I guess the question is is there an ordinance outlawing tractor trailers on that street and if there is not can we please get a study done to see if you could put an ordinance in place? Thank you.

Also, if you can send something to the Housing Authority for me, I want them to contact me personally. I want to thank them for their PILOT, but then I also want to have a little conversation about how they come up with that PILOT. I know they don't really owe us one, an explanation but, you know, I would like one to see if there is any kind of system to it or is there a dartboard that they throw, but either way just to know and also to thank them for their donation, I guess you can say.

Also, this past week I want to commend Officer Golden for his act of bravery, if anybody who has read the paper or watched the news he was almost -- he was almost run over trying to make a drug bust in the city and the video is frightening if anybody has seen it, he was -- as he reached in the car he was dragged out of the parking

MR. ROGAN: Yes, two very brief comments. Regarding the recycling, it isn't the intention of anyone on this council to issue fines for people for not recycling. We need to increase our recycling in the center. It's not only environmentally

sound, but it's good business of the city since a tremendous amount of money to make these every year. When we could help the vision and save money same time that's what you call a home run so we need to do everything we can to expand or recycling program and make sure there is full compliance throughout the city. A lot of it rests on us, on getting out recycling that is to residents both the blue and the red bins, on getting the education out on which weeks, you know, which recycling is picked up each week and on getting out on what you can recycle and what you can't recycle.

You know, every dollar or every ton of waste that's going to the recycling center it's coming back to us in grants and it's saving us at the same time of not having to pay at the dump, so there are a number of items that need to be accomplished to increase recycling, but I think we are on the right track.

As I mentioned during the caucus,
I'm a proponent of per bag fee or per can,
however you want to phrase it, that would be

used mainly to help senior citizens who only have a very small amount of trash. I have always been frustrated at the neighbor that has 30 bags and he is paying the same price the widow who has one bag. Also, by having a per bag fee everyone would recycle. If you are paying based on how much you use that would put people in shape very quickly as far as recycling goes.

And, finally, to echo what Councilman Perry mentioned, I think we shared each other's notes, I did want to give a shout out to Giovanni Piccolino, the owner of Buona Pizza for his good deed that has been well-publicized, and as Mr. Perry mentioned, this isn't a one-time thing that Mr. Piccolino has done, he has always given back to the community, whether it be a Thanksgiving dinner for those in the city or just, as Mr. Perry, said bringing a couple of pizzas to somebody who is sick or having a bad day. He is a great guy with a great heart and businesses like Buona Pizza really are what make Scranton great. Thank you.

Thank you. A couple of MR. EVANS: brief comments, several decades ago I formed a group called the Anti-Graffiti Network and it was basically a loosely based group of volunteers that went out every Saturday and with five gallons of paint and several brushes and rollers and covered up graffiti and it was very, very effective, and I want to take this opportunity to thank Councilman Perry to who did the same thing last week on his own, covered up an unsightly graffiti sign right on the expressway, a little fanfare, I'm sure he is not happy I'm telling you that he did this, but I want him to know we appreciate what he did on his own and we need more people involved with things like that.

This morning I attended a round table discussion on the subject arts for social change. It focused on the arts and the economy. It was moderated by Marlin Williams, deputy director for the Lackawanna County Arts and Culture Department and Laura Petitchi, president of the Scranton Area

Foundation. It was a very informative session, and there was a great cross-section of participants, including Karin Foster who is here tonight. Particularly, which is consistent with what I have always felt, is that the arts being a tremendous asset in driving economic growth in the city. We see it all of the time, especially with events like First Friday. As an elected official, I see value in the arts the same as I see the value of our historic buildings and architecture as far as having a positive influence on the economy.

Many cities with an active arts, culture and historic district component have translated those successes into tourism and tourism for cities like Scranton and our small business owners means simply increased revenues. It really isn't much more complicated than that. Art, culture, history equal tourism, equal dollars. So we should do everything we can to continue to foster those type of activities, the arts, moving more culture, more historic preservation within our downtown and the

rest of our city. That's all I have tonight.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes. First, just to clear something up, I am positive that the bidding threshold is in line with the state and the Department of Labor and Industry so just to clear that up. That was a false statement that Mr. Sbaraglia made.

Paving update from the city engineer was provided to me this week. All of the paving is done throughout the city except the intersection of Penn, Capouse and Olive Street. Pike Street, the drainage pipes were complete, grinding work has to be completed, and then that is going to be paved and I have received several complaints about manhole covers along North Main Avenue between Providence Square and Parker Street and the city engineer did tell us that those are going be evaluated, so I want to thank him for that.

I would like, Mrs. Reed, if you could, an update on the implementation and

changes regarding the third party
administrator, the police and fire pensions.

I would like to know where we are with the
changes that were agreed to by the police
and fire unions in regards to new disability
language.

About a year ago we discussed legislation requiring that all city job openings be publically posted and advertised, and I'm not sure exactly what happened to that, but I do believe that this is important and I would like to see this accomplished and ready to go by the time we get back from the August recess. Many local government jurisdictions have established local procedures for hiring non-civil service employees and typically those provisions require posting and publication of the employment opportunities and the procedure to interview applicants so I think that we should be looking for the best and brightest to fill any positions in city hall so I believe that we'll have to look at amending the Administrative Code in that respect.

I got two citizen complaints I'm forwarding, a building at 129 South Cameron Avenue in West Scranton condemned over a month ago, there is garbage all over and grass and very high and there is foul odors that are concerning the neighbors in that neighborhood. And 1207 South Main Avenue, this will be the second request sent. The property there is people that are dumping there, animals, broken windows, bushes and hedges are very high so if you could send another correspondence to the Licensing and Inspections Department.

Also, I requested the number of quality of life tickets that were issued this year and those which were paid, I haven't received that yet, I'd like to send another request on that. And I had a question from a citizen about how these signs are being paid for that are posted along newly paved streets as part of our paving project that say "Your Tax Dollars at Work" and have Mayor Courtright's name on the, so I sent that request July 13 and I have not received a response yet so if we

could, again, send that, also. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. Gaughan. Just a few things, I would like to congratulate the organizers of the addiction awareness rally that was held Sunday at courthouse square. It was in memory of Sammi Henehan. Ms. Henehan's parents were there to speak and gave a moving commentary on the passing of their daughter. Based upon what they said there were actually some people that were at the rally that went into rehab that day because of that celebration, and I would just like to thank the organizers of that and if we did help one person it was well worth it.

This evening there was some comments made about Mr. Gaughan and my attendance at the Keystone Sanitary Landfill hearing. We did attend it, I was there to represent city council. All city council members have expressed their opposition to the landfill so I did read that letter into the record. The comment was made that we shouldn't have been there, but even if we weren't there, there were 39 other speakers who expressed

their displeasure with the landfill as well as several hundred other people who attended just to support those speakers, and as we sit there and discussed it the opposition are aware that there are possibilities of reduction or changes on how our garbage will be handled if the landfill doesn't expand and that is a consequence of this action, but the expansion of the landfill may offer consequences much worse than that.

So I was proud that city council was one of the first groups, elected bodies of officials to stand up and not listen to the landfill. Mr. Gaughan went and spoke about his individual situation with young children on the way, so I think that the community when we hear about there is nothing here in this community, the hundreds of people that showed up at the meeting the other day they are there to fight for what we have and when I hear speakers say there is nothing here, they should see the commitment of those speakers at the meeting the other night.

I try not to point out when someone is wrong as a council speaker, but tonight

I'm going to do it. I'm not a Joseph A. Bank customer. This is LaSalle Sportswear on Webster Avenue, and I'm sure there is some other councilmen, also, who wear LaSalle sportswear. The speakers have a right to say what they like, and I have said this a thousand times, I agree that they have the right to speak I think they bring an energy to council, they keep council on their toes, but I find it disrespectful to accuse us of being dishonest, and whether it was suggested or not said I worked with these four councilmen for many years, Mr. Perry just came on board, I find it disrespectful to accuse us of doing illegal things.

You pay not agree with us, this is America, you can disagree all you want and in 40 years we'll find out who was right, council or the opposition that comes to these meetings, but I find it disrespectful to accuse of us of being corrupt. I find that unacceptable. I would not say that to any of you and it just it makes my blood boil, and I know it's not proper for me to

comment on it, I shouldn't do it, but I will stand up for my colleagues that I work with every day who tirelessly go out and to be called not Scrantonians, like I said, I can't imagine anything more wrong than that statement. That's all I have this evening.

MR. GAUGHAN: Can I add one thing?
MR. WECHSLER: Sure.

MR. GAUGHAN: You just jogged my memory, are we going to send -- last week we discussed sending a letter to the administration regarding the leachate issue, do we -- Solicitor Minora, do you want to jump in there?

MR. MINORA: I sent everyone an e-mail this afternoon to take a look at and I was just waiting to get the comments back.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Minora did send us that letter this week, I think we just got it early this morning, I think we will review it and it is our intent to issue a letter before the end of this term.
