MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
Scranton resident and taxpayer. We are
rapidly approaching the August recess so
with that in mind I haven't seen any input
yet from Rainey & Rainey or SP & Company.
Hopefully if not by next week certainly the
first week of the September can we expect
some kind of status on how the 2014 audit is
progressing?

MR. MCGOFF: I will ask.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Thank you. Because we are rapidly approaching the budget process for 2016 and I wouldn't be surprised if they are already working on it. I saw also that the June controller's report, which you all have, is also on the city's website. In looking forward towards that operating budget for next year, I decided to

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sit down and create an Excel spreadsheet and see if I could track by department and non-department the status of expenditures and then look also at revenues. I was surprised that my numbers didn't match what was published and I found out why. because the Controller's Office receives a number of adjustments from the BA's Office continually and those have to be massaged into the report at a later date so apparently what the Controller's Office does is it will adjust the total for revenues and expenditures, but it's not able to go back and republish the prior month's report so that the Department figures are going to be So if anybody is using this and, you off. know, wants to see, well, how much did the city council spend in the first six months of the year they may not get a current figure, even though the total expenditures for all of the administration may be close to correct, individual departments will not. Hopefully there will be a way to fix that in the future, perhaps a running total showing cumulative adjustments by department, but

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right now those numbers can be a little off.

But it's good to see that it's on the website and I concur with I believe it was you, Mr. Gaughan, that said last week that we under utilize the City's website. Ι think you have all mentioned this at one point or another. I would like to see a lot more information relative to the City's financial status regularly put on the website and I think the administration needs to understand that perhaps a document like this is addressed to the mayor and to city council but it's information that the taxpayers has not only a right to see, but a need to see, and I think that's why God invented the internet that we me measly citizens could see this kind of information and that's what representative governance is all about. You know, you represent us, but we have a need to make informed judgments ourselves.

And last, but not least, it's been about a month does anybody know who bought the mall?

MR. GAUGHAN: Wayne?

HODOWANITZ: How can we find 6 7 out, is there a certain database or is there 8 a certain official that we can flag or --9 MR. EVANS: Well, one it's finalized 10 they have to record the deed. 11 MS. HODOWANITZ: But isn't it supposed to be finalized in 30 days and 12 13 wasn't the bid made on June 24? 14 MR. EVANS: So we are right there, aren't we? 15 16 MS. HODOWANITZ: So, you know, there 17 are 31 days, yeah, 30 days is tomorrow. 18 MR. EVANS: Yeah. MS. HODOWANITZ: So shouldn't 19 20 somebody fire up a rocket, you know, have a 21 press conference? I hope there is no truth 22 to the rumor that a local non-profit has 23 scarfed up that mall. 24 MR. EVANS: Not to my knowledge. 25 MS. HODOWANITZ: Good.

MR. MCGOFF: There is all kind of rumors.

MR. GAUGHAN: There was a rumor that Mr. Evans bought it. We can put that to rest.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I hope we also don't end up tomorrow that the 30 day passes and nobody is saying anything. If it falls through we go back to square one? Oh, joy. Thank you.

MR. HETMAN: No problem. Good evening, ladies and gentlemen, Gerard Hetman from Lackawanna County Community Relations
Department. To begin this evening, on behalf of the Lackawanna County
Commissioners and other county officials and staff I wish to express our condolences on the recent passing of Scranton Police
Department Patrolman John Wilding. I never had the pleasure of meeting Officer Wilding while he was on the job in the capacity of a police officer. I can only say I rubbed

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elbows with a few times when we were both out on the town in the city, many times when he was in the company of his sister, who is a friend of mine, but even without knowing him well, Officer Wilding's passion for his job and for making our city a better place to live every day and night was apparent in the hours following his injury and the hours and days following his passing.

And I can say from a little bit of personal experience, that as one of the folks that monitors the County's Facebook and Twitter and social media sites that, again, the hours and days following his injury, and especially after his passing, were able to share many message on social media from law enforcement agencies across North America, from near and far, even north of the border, many police departments and other law enforcement operations gave tribute to Officer Wilding and offered support to him and his family and to the Scranton Police Department and to our city and were able to share many of those messages on Twitter and so other mediums and

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we believe one of many contributes to his service to our community.

And also while he lived his life and did his job to his fullest right up until his final moments with us. His passion for service and for living his life to the fullest that I will always remember him by and I know our city and our region will always pay tribute to him for it. So, again, my thoughts and thoughts of my family and everyone in the county government, certainly with the city, even though it's been a week since the services, will always remember Officer Wilding and I even though I didn't have a chance to meet him on the job I know his service was exemplary and I certainly mourn his passing as many of friends and colleagues. So our thoughts and prayers continue to be with him and his family and the Scranton Police family for now and into the future.

Some of our summer events, this coming Monday, July 28, will be the final installment of our four part Art in the Park series. Each the four county parks. This

one takes place again Monday, July 28, at McDade Park from 10 a.m. to noon. It's a late morning and early afternoon free art activities for children and accompanying adults. MCGOFF: I can't participate 7 8 this year. 9 MR. HETMAN: I know you were tearing 10 up the nets out there a few years ago. 11 Officer Wilding, as I said, I never met him 12 on the job but I have known his sister for 13 many years from the media work that I have 14 done and any time someone passes away on the job in the public safety, especially here in 15 16 the city, as a life-long resident I have 17 seen the good work our public safety 18 departments do each and every day so thank 19 you. 20 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you very much. 21 Doug Miller. 22 MR. MILLER: Good evening, Council. 23 Doug Miller, Scranton. I'd just like to 24 begin by reading a letter that I had in the 25 newspaper yesterday, a letter to the editor,

I'd like to just have it on the record my statements in regard to the legislation wanting to change the procedures of the bidding process in the city.

"I'm appalled by city council's recent consideration of an amendment to the City's current bidding procedures. In March 2010, council lead by Janet Evans passed legislation lowering the competitive bidding threshold from \$20,000 to \$10,000. The intention was to boost the competitiveness and transparency in order to get the best deal for the taxpayers. For many years the common practice was for contracts to be awarded to political cronies and those associated with the good ole' boy club.

Councilman Pat Rogan was a strong supporter of the new policy. He went so far as to say he was not only pro-taxpayer, he is pro-business as well. Now things seem to have changed. Mr. Rogan and his council colleagues have indicated that they will consider raising the bidding threshold from \$10,000 to \$19,400. He believes it will cut advertising costs and increase transparency

by advertising on-line. The city has paid for advertising for decades. Mr. Rogan is trying to take the taxpayers for fools. I won't fall for his games. If council amends the 2010 ordinance it is simply endorsing no bid contracts, removing transparency, and continuing the City's long tradition of pay-to-play politics. I get a kick out of how Mr. Rogan has changed his tune on many issues. He is now showing his true colors. I suppose he finds the changes pro-taxpayer."

And that was a letter that I had submitted to the Scranton Times that was published in the Wednesday, July 22, edition. You know, just again to continue on my thoughts of this particular proposed amendment, I would like to take us back to March 16, 2010, when this issue was -- when this amendment was up for adoption in Seventh Order back then and, you know, I have always said the beauty part of these meetings is having the stenographer here because when we have these printed they're in black and white and minutes don't lie, it

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speaks the truth, and when someone goes back on what they initially did or what their thoughts were on an issue we can always go back to the record, and I'd like to go back to that. I took time to pull up the minutes from the Tuesday, March 16, 2010, Scranton City Council meeting, and in Seventh Order this amendment on the bidding process was up for adoption. There were only three council members present that evening, Mr. Joyce, Mr. Loscombe and Mr. Rogan. Mrs. Evans and Mr. Rogan -- I'm sorry, Mrs. Evans and Mr. McGoff were absent at that evening, and I would just like to quote a statement made by Mr. Rogan on the record, this was when it was on the question.

"I would just like to reiterate my support once again. I believe that this will make government more open, it will be, as I have said before, both pro-taxpayer and pro-small business and I urge the mayor to sign this into law."

That was Mr. Rogan's statement on the record and that's what I cited in my letter yesterday and also came from the

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Scranton Times article published March 3, 2010, when this was introduced initially in Fifth Order. So it's all in black and white where Mr. Rogan stood on the issue.

In fact, Mr. McGoff is also on the record for stating his support of that amendment at the time. Although, he was not there for the final vote, there are minutes indicating his support at the time. of back and forth went on as far as the cost of advertising, and that's been the practice in the city for years, decades, we have spent money on advertising whether it was thousands of dollars, whatever it was, but the bottom line is what it comes down to is the positive aspects of the whole thing including, most importantly, the transparency far outweighs the cost of the That's not the issue, but, advertising. unfortunately, our political officials want to jamb that down our throat as a way to just play us for fools. This is far beyond This is about transparency, this is about pay-to-play politics that's basically had a stranglehold over this city for many,

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many years and has lead to us where we are today, and that's where this council simply wanted to take us back to. Not interested in the idea of advertising on-line. You can advertise on-line all you want, that has nothing to do with the fact that by doing what you are going to do is going to just go back to the smoke and mirrors.

You know, the previous council took the action to restore the transparency and the accountability and this is just simply taking it away and, you know, I just find it completely insulting and appalling to do that to the residents. I think you need to take a good hard look at this, and it just amazes me how people just change their tune on so many issues. You know, five years ago one thing was said, and here we are in the present day and I just really find it amusing how people change their tone on things and I think it goes to show that we have people who are inconsiderate, they are in it for themselves, they are not in it for the residents of this community and it's just more of the same pay-to-play politics

18	MR. BOLUS: I've learned that from
19	Attorney Minora and other people by saying
20	no comment. Bob Bolus, Scranton. Just one
21	thing I'm going to start off with here, I
22	have been very impressed with the people of
23	the community and the outpouring of support
24	for the family of Officer Wilding and
25	Corporal Dickson. You know, it's just you

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can't be prouder of our people for what they are gone out and done and the respect they have given to our officers for a job that they are really never given real credit for and I'd really like to applaud them and thank them for what they have done. It shows who we are in Scranton and it's proud to say sometimes you are from Scranton.

Starting off here, I hate to keep getting into this because I'm kind of sick of if after awhile but, you know, we sat here and we changed how we did business in the city and on 7-A and B this is wrong. You can't change it, you can't go ahead and make it easier for checks and balances not to be accountable, that's why it's put in The harder it is, the better we can here. control it. Mr. Wechsler may like to sit by a computer and dilly-dally, and other people may want to do something stuff on-line, a lot of us don't have time. Don't ever ask me send you an e-mail or sit by a computer for you because I'm too busy, and many of us are. We read it in the paper or wherever we are, what we are doing, that's what we take

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our time to do, and I think just because we are saying, oh, it's better to put it on the computer and mitigate costs, look what happened at Mid-Valley, computers and everything up there what happened to checks It's a fool's move to and balance there? make that change backwards in the city when it took us years and years and years to get rid of smoke and mirrors and the backdoor The professional fees that went out without bidding and everything else. Don't go backwards, Mr. Wechsler, move forward. While technology is out there and it has its place, it doesn't have its place in what we need to do in this city. Look at the past and learn from it. So I would ask that you don't waste time on that. Let's move back what's positive and protects the assets of the people of this city.

What went on here is a lot of nonsense over containers. Let's week we heard from Hartman, Dunleavy, they are cronies of Mr. Wechsler. I was part of this board at one time and I had to walk away because I didn't like the politics but to

come in and say, oh, he moved in the neighborhood and this happened and that happened, well, he moved into my neighborhood, I didn't move into his. I was there for many years way before him. My containers were already there so it wasn't no secret, it has been there before. I have tried to do many, many things for that area, but to know avail because of the politics.

I allow to people to walk around the lake, East Mountain Lake, I own the other half of that whole shore, but because of the controversy that has come thanks to Wechsler, Hartman and Dunleavy I am now forced to fence it off because I am not going to allow the public liability of somebody getting hurt there so, Joe, you can thank yourselves for what you have accomplished. You have done a hell of a job and it's hard for me to do it because for 20 some years I have let everybody walk there, but you want to go after me, let's take it on.

When you were on the Planning

Commission in 1993 when the legislation was

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put on about a tractor and trailer and a trailer of a tractor you guys did this. didn't make it happen, I just complied with it and now you want to try and change it and get the city into a substantial legal battle that's going to be not just for me but for many other people that have these. see parking on the street is an issue, absolutely. I'm one of the most safety minded people in the industry. In fact, I just received a certificate of appreciation from the Florida Highway Patrol for diverting a one-way driver on Interstate 75 that was headed out to kill herself. yeah, I know what risks are, I have been in towing recovery for over 50 years and there is a place for everything.

I'm over 250 feet off the highway, okay, and I'm paying personal attention to it. What happened here is wrong and I'm putting it on the record today because we are going to have hearings on this and we are going to argue and it's going to go on and on and on and it's not going to get over with any time soon, but if we sit here and

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we stop and take a look at why we are heading in the wrong direction and why we are fighting here I'm going to ask you, Mr. McGoff, I ask you guys, each and every of you, take a pen and send a letter to a legislator, a stupid little ballpoint and ask them to consider a gaming license for the City of Scranton. You know what, gentlemen, not one did it here and not one of our executive people out there did it and that's a shame because you want to save Scranton get on the right bandwagon. what we are, be who we are, be proud of where we're going because the only thing that will save this city is a casino. You are not going to put retail space here, it's not coming. Travel around the country.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: One final thing I want to say. Wayne, you and I have been, as I told you, friends. You said you wouldn't run, people voted you to vote, you agreed to do it, but the bottom line is in your own words right here in the paper you are running. You are running for a council

seat. I want you to live up to your word as a gentleman and don't accept that position.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you.

MR. BOLUS: Because you are running and you represent the city and, remember, we all grew up in the same role, a man's word is his bond and if his word is no good don't believe what anybody else will tell you.

Thank you, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Lee Morgan.

MR. BOLUS: We just have to get rid of the double standards, that's it.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Lee Morgan. You know, I was thinking about here the threshold and bids and all of the other things that are really transpiring here driven by council in some instances and the administration and others, you know, maybe Mrs. Gatelli had it right when she wanted to post a policeman at all of these meetings and have metal detectors put in because I think that she realized that city government wasn't moving in the best interest of the residents then and it still isn't. Nobody wants to save this city, I

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mean, not elected wise and the voters they don't want to do it either because, like I said previously, the super voters have just abdicated their role in my opinion because they have come out continually over decades when everybody else stopped voting, and the city has just kept going down and down and down and, you know, you can think anything you want about where the city is going, but, you know, look at the community development money we are going to spend allegedly over at Novembrino's pool, we are going to put a splash park in and an amphitheater. the most ridiculous thing I have ever heard in my life and I think the greatest thing that could happen is, not that it will, because politicians in Harrisburg or Washington they don't want to investigate anything. I think the feds should have been here the minute the city sold the South Side Sports Complex, which was blatantly illegal and the legislature knew it couldn't be sold either, and then you take a look at the running of the city, you know, look it, it just makes no sense, it just shows no

respect for the people who live here. They can't afford their property tax, we don't have a council that can figure out how to turn the city around when all it really takes is a total reorganization of city government and then only employ the people the city can afford to pay. It's real simple here.

I mean the city's population has been declining for an extremely long period of time. We keep pumping the same money, every dime we have into the downtown. Look at all of the vacancies there. It's just ridiculous. Businesses just fleeing the city and, look it, I live over in an allegedly stable part of South Side and people are moving in and out, I mean, being a landlord in this city has to be a nightmare because how did you collect rent off of people who can't earn a living wage.

Nationally one in six people live in poverty. Scranton is even higher than that. We have elected officials who sit here in council and we have a mayor and you mean to tell me that over these decades we couldn't

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elect a city government that understood that
we have to fund our pensions and spend the
community development money wisely and we
are still throwing it away?

Just like the blatant disregard we showed for Nay Aug Park when we tore the bathhouse down and built something that was just so tiny it was remarkable and all of the money that was thrown away in this city, and now you look and you see where, you know, property values, I think Mr. Evans should present how much homes are actually selling for in this city and how long homes are on the market and that some homes don't ever sell. Some people are trying to auction their homes to get out of here and other people they are just walking out and shutting the door, they know they will never be able to do anything with the property. Maybe they pay the tax, maybe they just abandoned it, just makes no sense.

I know somebody that bought a house right across the street for himself. He put a home equity loan against his house, bought the house across the street because it was

all remodeled and fixed and he bought it so cheap and he let the bank take the house across the street and he said why would I want to invest in a home that has no value and I can take all my neighbor's money by buying his house off of him for nothing and moving across the street? That just goes to show you how pathetic this city government is it.

I would like to see council up and get the condemnation book and bring it down at a public meeting and open it and let's discuss were homes were condemned in the city and then you should bring your attorney, Mr. Minora, in to the conversation and ask how council wrote laws that had to do with property in the city and how, you know, how this whole mess has gone on and then talk about the bidding process of tearing houses down and how that works and where that money is coming from and talk about a whole host of other issues that have never been talked about in this council chamber in all of my time that I have come here because, like I asked you before, if

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only two people vote in this city do the councilmen at large have to represent all of the residents or just the very narrow view of what's taking place. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who wishes to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, when I was reading some of this legislation I had to think is Mayor Doherty still in office? Because this is the same type of legislation he sent down to council many. Many times. We are going to loan some -not really loan, lend \$150,000 for a man who can hire people to open a bar and they don't even have to be Scranton residents. could be anybody, is that what we are going to do with \$150,000 from our own program, but I guess we are. This is the same legislation we used to get from Mayor Doherty for Whistle's, was it Molly Brannigan's, and some other places that are no longer here. It's the same thing. Five people \$150,000 and they don't even have to be residents of Scranton, he can hire

anybody. Do you think that's a good investment of that money? Some does because I don't really know why something like this even came about. I assume somebody is in the know, like a few things in Scranton you got to know somebody to get something. That project I don't know, we don't need another bar.

Let's go with the lots between the Taurus Club and Stirna's. Them lots are paved. They are parking for the people from the Taurus Club and from Stirna's. Stirna's wants to buy them. I don't know why, yet Mrs. Gavin there is the owner of Stirna's. The Taurus Club tried to buy it they said and were told the money was done with federal money and they couldn't be sold, but apparently they can be sold because you are selling them and for a ridiculous price.

Mr. Evans, that's prime real estate in the business district of North Scranton, true it's a little run down, but do you believe them lots are worth so little? And I don't even know if they are taxable or not? I don't if they were ever registered

for somebody to buy them on the tax sales.

I wish you would check into it before you okay stuff like this.

Now, as far as down the line fine, then let Stirna's have it, but the Taurus were using that for their affairs and that's going to effect their business.

MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Sbaraglia, it's in this legislation that this is going to be kept a public parking lot and it was reported in the paper as such, also.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I didn't read it in the paper and sorry I didn't. Why would she buy parking lot is she is going to keep it as a parking lot?

MR. GAUGHAN: All I know is that --

MR. SBARAGLIA: Is she going to restrict the parking from the Taurus Club?

MR. EVANS: No, my understanding is that the Taurus Club has been meeting with representatives of Stirna's and they are having a conversation about the parking and the parking, as Mr. Gaughan said, will remain public parking.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Okay, that's all I'm

interested in because the people from the Taurus Club told me that they tried to buy that property before and were told that it was done with federal money and couldn't be sold.

MR. GAUGHAN: All I know is that this from the legislation that we have in front of us all of the proper procedures were followed and both pieces of property were purchased June 4, I think, 2012, at a tax sale so --

MR. SBARAGLIA: They weren't sold.

There was a building there and it was ripped down. There was a building that and the building was ripped down. There should have been a lien against the property for the teardown of that building.

MR. EVANS: Yeah, but once it goes to tax sale all those liens are washed away.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I don't remember this going up on a tax sale. I know the building was ripped down and paved by the city. The city ripped it down and usually they put it lien against it. Now, you are telling me that lots went up for the tax

sale and the Taurus Club just let it go by?

I don't believe so. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else?

MS. GAUGHAN: Good evening,

gentlemen. My name is Mary Gaughan and I'm a new resident of the city. I'm here to say something positive. I bought this shirt at the police department for \$15 to honor the fallen Officer Wilding. I understand that there is a basket raffle at a place called "Headquarters" on South Main Avenue across from Gerrity's on tomorrow evening from 6 to 8 it's a basket raffle to benefit the widow and her children. My uncle, Robert Gaughan, died in service. He left five children. I have some idea what Mrs. Wilding must be feeling.

And, also, I want to tell Mr. Evans that I looked at a property in the Hill Section that is his property and it's a condominium and it's beautiful and there is nothing not nice about it upon on Clay Avenue, and I think that Mr. Bolus was correct when he said that he was proud of the city residents and the way that they

feel about their officer, but he should also know that the people of the county and the state should also show pride with the state trooper who was murdered and I think that we need more positive things in this city.

I talked to the people in the Hilton, they are going to have a casual day and the Hilton is going to buy these shirts for all of their employees and have a day where they will wear them with pride. Thank you very much.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mrs. Gaughan.

MR. EVANS: I would say, I should remind the public that the shirts can be purchased at headquarters. Most of the time staffed by the officer wives, I went down over the weekend, so I'm not sure if they are there on regular hours, but we if we find out we need to announce that as well.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher.

Starting from Seventh Order, I guess, and working backwards, on 7-F tonight what tonnage agreement would it take the pay the

costs of this? 1 2 MR. GAUGHAN: I'm sorry, I didn't 3 hear? 4 MS. SCHUMACHER: What tonnage 5 improvement would it take to recover the cost of this addition? 6 7 MR. GAUGHAN: Of the recycling? 8 MS. SCHUMACHER: Recycling, yeah. 9 MR. GAUGHAN: I'm not sure, that's 10 not detailed in the agreement, but it's 11 \$5,000, I can try and find out. 12 MS. SCHUMACHER: And why the county 13 isn't doing this since we are part of the 14 county system I would also be interested in. MR. GAUGHAN: The county isn't doing 15 16 it, this woman used to work for the county. 17 She is doing this independently. 18 just -- she used to be their recycling 19 coordinator/consultant. The county has 20 nothing do with this. 21 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, that's my 22 Why wasn't she doing it while she 23 was the consultant for the county and why 24 are we now paying her separately when they 25 are the overarching component? Every penny

1 counts around this place. 2 The next then is going down to 6-A, 3 the capital budget, does it include the 4 replacement of the South Side Sports Complex 5 that we were promised or is that still 6 missing? MR. GAUGHAN: I don't recall seeing 7 8 that in there. I don't think -- I don't 9 believe it was included. 10 MS. SCHUMACHER: What a surprise. 11 6-C and D, does that price cover the cost of 12 the demolition that we did? 13 MR. EVANS: What demolition? 14 MS. SCHUMACHER: Of the properties on West Market Street? 15 16 MR. EVANS: Oh, okay. 17 MR. GAUGHAN: I'm not sure how much 18 the demolition cost, we could look into 19 that, too, but I don't have that 20 information. 21 MR. EVANS: I would doubt it. Most 22 time in tax sales or even through the 23 Pittsburgh plan all liens are waived so if 24 there is a demolition lien there it's gone. 25 So I'm sure that cost is not covered in the

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demolition cost.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, I think Andy had a good question whether it was really -- whether it was on that list, but we'll --

MR. EVANS: Well, we can find out.

MS. SCHUMACHER: We'll see, yeah. Okay, on 5-C, I have been after Mr. Rogan to give us the status of how much money we lost on the loans that were made pretty much throughout the first decade of this century, he has been apparently reluctant to do it because we haven't seen it so I will pledge tonight to do my best to have that available for you all in September because, again, as I have said from this podium, I think we need to know what went wrong with those loans before we start giving out new loans and I worry about the competitiveness when we give one business \$150,000 and what -and give, it says loan grant. How much much of it is loan and how much of it is grant and at what point is it converted?

MR. GAUGHAN: It's converted -- they have to create five full-time jobs within 12 months from the signing of the agreement.

If they create the five full-time jobs within the 12 months after that time has passed then it turns in a grant.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Then I'm opposed to it. I think it's not fair to the other -- to the competition downtown that you give somebody -- because that's what it's going to turn into, it's easy to create five jobs when you have a restaurant you can hire five waitresses and waiters and you fulfilled your commitment and I am definitely against that.

And what -- well, there is no sense talking about the guarantee or what the collateral is because it's obvious this is not a loan at all it is a grant of \$150,000, and again, I am opposed.

Mr. Evans, you're brainstorming plans, are they not going to happen?

MR. EVANS: No, they are. They are.

Council has to meet to discuss the assignments. We are going to establish different councilman for different committees and once we do that then we will move ahead with the plans.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well. did I 1 misunderstand I thought you wanted to do 2 3 that during the recess? 4 MR. EVANS: It's possible. 5 MS. SCHUMACHER: Have a meeting, so next week we should expect something? 6 7 MR. EVANS: I would say next week we 8 should at least have the --9 MS. SCHUMACHER: Because that's the 10 final meeting; right? 11 MR. EVANS: Right. We should have 12 the committee assignments established by 13 next week. 14 MS. SCHUMACHER: And I to assume 15 then I guess that the -- that we are not 16 going to have anything on the rental 17 registration ordinance rewrite until at 18 least September since you all will be gone 19 and it takes three readings? 20 MR. EVANS: I imagine it's going --I mean, it's in the Solicitor's Office as 21 22 part of the lawsuit so we are sort of stuck 23 right now until they come to some conclusion 24 with the lawsuit. 25 MS. SCHUMACHER: Unbelievable. And

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then what -- there is a fee on the storage container proposal for the -- I believe it was a \$50 fee for up to 30 days for having a storage container on your property, what is the city going to do to cover their portion since a fee is by definition to cover the cost incurred.

MR. EVANS: That's one of the questions we asked for in the backup so we are waiting for that information.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. Dave Dobrzyn, resident and taxes paid, fees Once again, call your Congressman paid. 1-202-224-3121 an ask for whoever represents you, Senators and Congressmen alike, and White House 1-202-456-1111. Yesterday while watching the news in Malaysia there was 25 to 30 graves or bodies found in cages out in the Malaysian jungle and currently Malaysia is lobbying to be raised up on the list from no to watch list. How do poor Jersey and Scranton compete with that? They were sex slaves, but, shame. It's shameful. It's

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disgusting. We have abandoned our whole American ethic.

Now, getting back to city business, on the mercantile tax, okay, every Friday in upper South Side on the east side of Crown Avenue and some on East Mountain our recycling was swiped up for snow removal downtown and that has to be dealt with. Ιt can't be -- I had approximately 12 cubic feet of newspapers and papers sitting in my kitchen. If I put them on the porch, I am in violation of the city code. If I put them in the trash, I'm also in violation of the city code. If I put them down on the sidewalk, the cans and bottles got knocked all over and I had to dig them out of slush and snow and whatever that was on the streets, so before people ask for tax breaks, and also we have a snow on the bridge issue, that is very important. need some type of device to remove that on a timely basis, like a Bobcat, those little bucket loaders.

And on 6-A, I think it's 6-A, no, no, it's the one on ECTV, I'm not sure.

MR. GAUGHAN: 6-B.

MR. DOBRZYN: We have to remember our ECTV and that contract, they are currently teetering and it's just unthinkable that they would disappear. I know people come in and here and get a little carried away, but therein again it's very important to those who are interested in what goes on in the city and the ones that wish to be respectful that don't reserve to be cut out because of that. And please call your senators and lobby on these issues.

Also, something popped into my mind last week or last time I was here the city -- the banks got a half a percent in the bailout, what did the cities get? And a lot of the reason we are in the condition we are in is because of property tax and tax exemptions and the likes. It's ashame. Why can't the federal government loan cities like Scranton money, and we are not going anywhere, I mean, what are we going to do hook a trailer to the town and tow us to South America? I mean, come on.

You know, the streets like Moosic

Street that aren't actually part of

Scranton's enforcement, could we possibly

get a state assemblyman over to look at that

and maybe will something will happen in

Harrisburg because that's also taxpayers

money being wasted.

And on 5-D it's time we change our ways. These loans and grants and trying to job create it's not your job to create jobs, and it's -- if you took that money and gave it to five or six different people it would be just the same as if, you know, it's just terrible that the people get these loans and they don't pay them up and it winds up we wind up holding the bag so I'm totally against any type of the loan to more bars and whatever. It didn't work the last time and it certainly won't work now the economy is way worse. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler?

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. McGoff. I had the privilege of attending the funeral for Officer John Wilding. It was a very moving experience. The funeral captured the support from the community and the law enforcement was overwhelming. Mayor Courtright and Chief Graziano and Corporal McDonald truly expressed the feelings of the City and we will not forget Officer Wilding's sacrifice, and I do agree that it was a very moving tribute from the city and the state and the county. It was heartwarming.

This week I was contacted by several residents with concerns about some potholes that need repair. Also, some streetlights that are out that we'll be forwarding to Mr. Reed to have corrected.

I did take the time this week to call Mrs. Gavin about the purchase of the property next to Stirna's restaurant. She informed me of some information on that project. I guess back in the day those lots were all very narrow on Market Street so

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actually the Taurus Club owns the lot right off their building so they have parking that is theirs already.

Mrs. Gavin told me that she plans to use the property closest to her building for perhaps using it for storage of her dumpster or perhaps in the future to do some kitchen renovations once acquired. She did assure me that the parking in that lot will remain open to the public. So as far as I'm concerned, it's an opportunity for those properties to get back on the tax rolls and it still maintains the community spirit that exists in north Scranton. It's a very tight knit community. That's what she expressed to me that these lots will still be used for public parking in North Scranton. that's all I have tonight, Mr. McGoff.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you,

Mr. Wechsler.

Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. I may have repeated this mantra several times recently, we can no longer tax our way of distress, we have to grow our way out of distress. This

is already happening in dramatic ways in cities throughout the northeast. We are seeing the success stories of Allentown because of the NIZ or Neighborhood Improvement Zone, they are experiencing a renaissance with an investment of \$1.3 billion in their downtown and riverfront area because of this state program. The cities of Bethlehem and Lancaster with the KRIZ designation from the state continues to grow as well.

Outside of state, New York, Governor Cuomo has committed \$1 billion of tax breaks and grants as well as a comprehensive plan to fuel a similar renaissance in Buffalo. Under that plan, he called out for a study from the Brooklyn Institution, the state is trying to seal all their contracts with marketing sales in several areas including advanced manufacturing, health and life sciences and tourism. Out of this process, came opportunity to renewable energy. For example, there is a green energy complex on Lake Erie where there is a new solar rate that is drawing a wind farm already

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completed in 2012.

Additionally, there is the appending arrival of a solar city, the country's leading roof top solar installer. They plan on building a solar panel factory in Buffalo. Yes, Buffalo. And one up and running it will provide 1,500 jobs on site to support 1,500 more jobs among Erie suppliers.

So while we can constantly find ourselves distracted by our financial troubles, I would never diminish the importance of getting our finances in order because that is so critical to our survival, but we can't let that be our only focus. We need to have conversations and dialogue on growth, on jobs, on small business, on our quality of life. We need to talk about what is our vision and what we want Scranton to be.

When was the last time you saw a new home constructed in Scranton? When was the last time you saw a commercial building that wasn't a government building or medical building or education building constructed

partners and visionaries at the state government level, the county level, the city level, and the school district level, and we need partners and visionaries in the business community, the arts community, the new immigrant community, and the larger community known as Scrantonians. Somebody criticized our plans to reach out to the community for ideas, that is there opinion and they are entitled to it, but for me I can't wait to hear from the many talented and intelligent individuals that love Scranton and want to share their ideas with us. No matter how small or grand the idea may be, there is one more idea then we had today, and as I have been reminded by

a new friend of mine who sends me ideas

I have.

almost every day, maybe the next big idea is

just connecting the small ideas. That's all

in the city? We need to fix what is wrong,

together and grow this city. Believe it or

not, we can be of next great success story,

but I know we can't do it alone we need

emphasize what is right and start working

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MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr. Evans.

Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. То piggyback on what Mr. Evans said we did have a caucus with Bob Durkin from the Chamber of Commerce and he had some interesting things to say about a few grant opportunities and different things that they are focusing on in the central business district. the things that I brought up and that I have been thinking about over the past few weeks that I think is very, very important is the fact that we need to attract blue collar jobs or factory-type jobs, 17, 18, 19, 20 dollar an hour jobs with good health insurance for people in this city. Not everybody went to college, not everybody has a degree, not everybody can afford to go to school, and those that have had jobs that are in their 40's or their 50's a lot of people that I know are now unemployed they don't have enough money to go back to school. So I did bring this up to Mr. Durkin and he did say that there are different things on the horizon that the

city will be very happy about in the next
year or two so I think that needs to be a
particular focus. I know that we have the
health care industry, education and
government, but if you not involved in those
three sectors where are you going?

You know, I know a few a people in my own neighborhood who are in their 20's who decided that they didn't want to go to college, where are they going? You know, so that needs to be a focus, I believe, to make Scranton vibrant again.

Mrs. Reed, did we ever receive a response from Mayor Courtright regarding the June 30 letter council posed to him asking for his opinion on appointing the Tax Claim Bureau as the collector of delinquent taxes?

MS. REED: No.

MR. GAUGHAN: Okay, we haven't received anything yet. If not, can we resend that and ask for an answer some time before next week's meeting. I think that's important to get the mayor's opinion on that whether or not we want to move forward.

I would like to congratulate the

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Lackawanna Heritage Valley Authority and everyone involved in the opening this Monday of the Nay Aug Avenue natural play area.

This park will be the first of its kind in the state and was constructed with materials that were found in nature. It is designed to help children foster an appreciation for nature and the environment.

This morning I attended a meeting on the Rockwell Avenue bridge so I have update Officials from PennDOT and our on that. city engineer were present. PennDOT is waiting for DEP to sign off on the environmental review which may take a few more weeks, once that happens construction will be ready to begin. PennDOT officials are thinking that construction will begin by mid-September. Residents should expect to see preparatory work begin, taking the pedestrian bridge, things of that nature. Work will have to cease as the it did last year during October to December 31 because of the trout restriction, and they expect the project to be complete late next year.

I received a few questions from

residents over the past few months about the procedure for filing a refuse vacancy. We received a procedure this week and I'm going to ask that they be put on the city's website for anyone who would like to view it. In short, you need to prove to the city that your property is vacant and it needs to be done annually in order for you not to receive a garbage bill.

I believe Mr. Rogan requested a few weeks ago that a letter be sent to the Scranton Housing Authority about their recycling program. We did receive a letter from Mr. Peliccaci, the executive director and he said that he would be interested in discussing the recycling program with the city DPW. Currently the Scranton Housing Authority has a private hauler so that will be something that I'll be getting in contact with Peliccaci and Mr. Gallagher and see if we can set a meeting up.

I asked for an update on the city paving project. It looks right now like the paving will begin mid to late August instead of building the whole \$2.3 million paving

project as a whole, they are going to bid different sections of the city and it looks like North Scranton and Central City are scheduled to begin first. And that is all I have this week. Thank you.

MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. A couple of things. First of all, council did meet in a brief executive session prior to caucus this evening. The purpose of that is that executive session was a personnel issue and, as I said, it was for five minutes, but we do need to announce that it was held.

Unless a motion is made and carried to not meet in August, council will recess -- according to the Home Rule council will recess for the month of the August, so unless a motion is made next week to conduct meetings during August and it is approved to not meet in August we will have a recess during the month of August.

Just a couple of more brief
comments. We had sent a letter to the
Auditor General's Office concerning some
comments that were made concerning the audit
or their investigation of the pensions and

all, and I would like to say that the
Auditor General did respond to our letter
and just one very brief statement that was
in the letter, and I quote, "City Clerk Lori
Reed and her staff went out of their way to
accommodate my team so that the report could
be issued and the answers regarding the
retirement incentives could be provided to
the people of Scranton."

So I did want to mention that and sort of applaud our city clerk and her staff for the work that they do outside of what takes place during the meeting, so thank you very much.

MS. REED: You are welcome.

MR. MCGOFF: Just one -- Mr. Gaughan did mention the caucus that was held prior to the meeting with Bob Durkin and he did ask that question concerning jobs that were not college degree-type jobs, one thing that I would like to see done as we move ahead in some of this planning that was suggested we need to identify what those jobs are going to be, what types of the jobs they are, and then work with the local schools, both high

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schools, college, technical schools to train for those jobs. I think right now what we have is a disconnect between the jobs that are available and the skills that people have and we need to change that. We need to get that connection so that we can divide jobs and sustaining jobs for, you know, people of Scranton.

And the last thing that came up, the Comcast contract, which is a strange issue, a couple of years ago we sort of had two contracts and nobody knew which one was operational and now we have received legislation to approve a new contract and council is somewhat at a loss for what we can do as far as that contract is concerned. Is it a yes or no? You know, either we approve it or we vote it down or are there possibilities -- or is there the possibility that we can amend and propose changes to this contract that we feel would be legitimate? And I think in the past that was the way the contract was, that it gave council an opportunity to review it and to make those changes.

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For example, and I was just talking to -- or kind of going back and forth with Councilman Evans -- or Councilman Gaughan, one of the things I would like to see in that contract is a subsidy for a public service provider. At this point in time we have ECTV, there should be in this Comcast contract a subsidy for ECTV to continue its operations. I don't what that amount is, certainly it's something that could be discussed, but we need to -- we need to put that into the contract so that we are assured that through the length of that contract we have a provider for public service TV. It's something that's needed. And if a certain amount is put in the contract, you know, that the Comcast would pay perhaps we then look for other amounts that could be also let's say the city and the county and the school district, whatever, again, to make sure that that entity exists through the length of the contract. So while we are voting on it, I think we are voting a little bit in the dark. I think it's something that we do

need to at some point in time pass. It is a great revenue source for the city, but I think it's something that also needs some discussion.

MR. GAUGHAN: Some things you are saying jogged what I wanted to say earlier about the Chamber of Commerce and all of that. I agree with you completely about identifying those jobs, I think we need to strengthen our health care industry, education, but since I have been on council one of the big things that I have heard from people is that they are struggling, not just in the city, not just in the state, but in the whole country and it's going to play out in this next presidential race, but, you know, I think we need manufacturing jobs.

And the other day I watched a very heartwarming video about a gentleman who, you know, was looking for work, couldn't find work, finally got a job and he said at the end of the video, you know, I wasn't -- I'm not rich, but I'm happy. You know, as long as these people can provide for their families. I think in the end that's all

people want, not only in Scranton and the state but in the country and I think that's what the Chamber should strive for and the city should strive for.

And before I end my comments, I forgot, Mrs. Reed, and I just received this on my way here, 439 Fourth Avenue, there is a lot that's overgrown and some issues at this property that the neighbors are complaining about. Thank you.

MR. EVANS: If I may, one final comment, because we are all jogging each other's memory, I agree with that 100 percent and I also want to emphasize that most of the job growth in this country is done through small business and that's where our focus should be, including manufacturing, but small business is where we have to concentrate. We are always looking for that home run, but we need a lot of singles and need to hit a lot of doubles to make this happen.

And when you said struck me, too, I always remember a comment that Governor Ridge made once way back when he was

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governor, all jobs have honor. I think we always have to remember that. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. McGoff, let me just chime in, I kind of forgot one tonight because Mr. Rogan isn't here. I work in the manufacturing industry. That's what I do and there are jobs out there but, unfortunately, the competitive nature of the business is very competitive, it's very tough. Where I work we win and lose jobs by It's difficult to create \$17 and pennies. \$18 an hour jobs right off the bat. Many of the jobs right now are coming from temporary agencies and those jobs go out there and they are available. As Councilmen Evans just said, if you need to work there is work out there. It may be not \$17 an hour, it may be \$10 or \$12 an hour.

Unfortunately, within the city
limits now all of the -- many of the new
industrial plants are located outside of the
city. A lot of our buildings are very old
and not conducive to forklifts and heavy
storage and things like that so it's going
to be very difficult to get those types of

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jobs within the city limits. It's a bit disappointing that we have a lot of land available, especially over in Keyser Valley over where the old warehouse used to be. That's a primary area for development of these types of jobs. As we see in the area right now many of the jobs are going to be warehouse type jobs and it's surprising to hear that one of the reasons why these warehouse jobs are coming here is because the Panama Canal is going to be open and ships are going to be able to travel to the east coast instead of the west coast. unfortunately, once again, technology has kind of proceeded the regular working man where many of these warehouses are going to be automated. They are going to be run by robots and unless you can fix robots there may not be that many jobs in the area so I agree, I was very happy to hear from Mr. Durkin tonight on his ideas and his plans and hopefully they are focused on the City of Scranton because right now all those type of manufacturing jobs or a lot them are up in Jessup, but there is work available in

manufacturing industry, but, unfortunately, it's not in Scranton. I drive to

Mountaintop every day for my job. The

Crestwood Industrial Park has many

facilities open down there. Our industrial park in Dunmore has kind of been abandoned,

I don't know why that is, they were built at the same time, but we do have -- we do have to focus on finding jobs for people and every job -- the more jobs there are the more competitiveness there is for higher wages so we have to start somewhere and I am happy to hear that Mr. Durkin and the

Chamber does have some plans for that.

They are successful, they are successful business persons with a legitimate, you know, history of success in the restaurant/bar business. 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I agree with one of the speakers that we should be able to look at the history of our loan program and see what the city is doing to recoup any of the losses from those loans. Mrs. Schumacher has continually asked for that and I think it's I think it's time time that we see that. also if we are starting a new program where we are giving out \$150,000 grants, which eventually it will be, then I think it's time that we hear from the director of OECD that comes here and explains what's going on with this new program and also answers questions concerning the history of loans given to these types of businesses and what they will do in the future should someone default on these loans or these types of loans I think it's just something that we need to hear before we move forward with, you know, final passage of this legislation.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. McGoff, just one comment on that, although it seems like it's a document that just kind of sits there, it really is an active, breathing document because so many grant applications can only be prepared if it's listed in the capital budget program.

MR. EVANS: Okay. I'm going to follow up on that, particularly what some of the comments President McGoff said. I did talk to the Pennsylvania Municipal League today and they felt that it is within our right to make amendments or changes to this

ordinance so maybe Attorney Minora can confirm that, but it sounds like that we can do that.

Secondly, on the EG funding, there is funding for the peg channel in the contract to the tune of two \$100,000 payments increments for a total of \$200,000, the question is that's up to the city to decide that so I guess I would like to find out from the administration are there plans to use that specifically for ECTV, and I think that's where the money should go. I think that would certainly give them an opportunity to grow, to be sustainable on their own, but that's something that we have to be asking for next week. Are there plans for that money specifically directly to ECTV.

I absolutely agree with Councilman Wechsler, I'm hoping to -- I wrote some brief amendments down and that was one of them and I know we brought it up before and I know Councilman Rogan brought up the senior discount scenario and I think those two things are critical. You know, it's

very easy to do. The language in the contract reads: "A Comcast service Center shall conveniently be located and shall be open during normal business hours." To change that to, "A Comcast service center shall be conveniently located within the City of Scranton and shall be open during normal business hours."

And as far as the senior discount, I don't see why we couldn't put that language in there that says, "Residents over the age of 65 will qualify for a 10 percent discount off of basic cable service as well as a 10 percent discount on additional cable TV services."

So maybe I can fine tune the language with Attorney Minora or Councilman Wechsler on the one issue and Councilman Rogan on the other. The other question I had is, is a 12-year contract more appropriate than a ten-year contract. Most of the contracts I have seen have been a 10-year contract.

MR. GAUGHAN: Solicitor Minora, do you know if we were to make these amendments

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would it then have to go back to Comcast and be --

MR. MINORA: Yeah, it would have to go back to Comcast and Comcast could reject them.

MR. EVANS: They would?

MR. MINORA: It would be establishing a negotiation, yes.

Well, what if we reject MR. EVANS: the rejection? Because, I mean, what we are asking them to do is these are beyond --I'll tell you, I think the contract was actually very well written, very well done, very comprehensive, but I think these are a couple of things that are important. have a large senior population. I think Councilmen Wechsler makes the point all the time that they need to have a place to go physically because that's how they roll, for lack of a better word, and I think we need to have a -- I think we need a discount for the seniors.

MR. MINORA: Another way you might consider would be to table this and ask the administration to go back to Comcast and

renegotiate it according to the issues that you have raised and that sort of shortcuts the back and forth ordinances and, you know, new legislation, that might be a way to do it. It might be something to do.

MR. EVANS: Well, do you feel that by us amending it could be basically -- that would be more appropriate?

MR. MINORA: So we are only in Sixth Order, you know, could be tabled and/or moved onto Seventh Order and tabled until the administration has an opportunity. I'm just suggesting, I'm not trying to shortcut anything.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ EVANS: Well, we don't have to do it tonight.

MR. MINORA: No, we don't have to do it tonight.

MR. EVANS: I mean, we have worked on a contract for quite a long time now, I don't think it's urgent, but I want to see something that would finally solidify ECTV's situation, which has been sort of hanging out there for quite a long time and unfairly. I know the county has given ECTV

MCGOFF: I think that the problem lies in the fact that this was given to us without adequate preparation. have been -- the administration had been negotiating this contract I think it would have been wise to engage council in this negotiation in some way and that way we could have introduced some of these ideas and determined you know, whether they would were feasible or not feasible. Right now, as I said, we have been given this and we have been asked to vote on it without any real introduction to the contract and to the terms of the contract so I agree with our solicitor that it may be in our best interest to -- we could move this forward this evening and prior to Seventh Order table it or in Seventh Order table it and find out if, you know, Comcast is amenable to some of the suggestions. If not, can we go back to square one and renegotiate.

MR. EVANS: I really don't think we are asking for the moon, we are asking for

some very simple things to enhance and protect some of our senior citizens, and we have a large population of seniors, and this was done by the Cohen Law Firm. They are the ones that negotiated for the city, they do cable contracts throughout the country, this is the standard operating procedure for them so I think it's not -- you know, I thought maybe they could have contacted us well, maybe had a hearing to get some -- hear some of our concerns is not asking too much.

MR. GAUGHAN: Because if it's one thing that I hear from senior citizens is that they're -- and I think Mr. Rogan mentioned this, is that their cable bill is sometimes higher than, you know, all of their other bills. It's just gotten to the point where I think we do need to sit down and --

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question just very briefly. The intent of this contract is to seek assistance to improve the City of Scranton commercial recycling program. Program improvements will result in greater tonnage reported to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and an increase in our Section 904 performance grant.

The program deficiencies were discussed during an August 6, 2014, meeting with DEP regional recycling coordinator, and the amount of the contract, which is \$5,000, is included in the 2015 budget, and within the proposal after over 25 years there is still many commercial establishments in the city who are not recycling and/or reporting recyclable tonnage collected as required by law. Because of this, the City is losing significant funding from the Pennsylvania

DEP through performance grants.

Although, yard waste and leaves cannot be counted for performance grant funding, they account for a significant amount of the landfill waste, nearly 20 percent, and can save significant money if taken for composting or chip and mulch.

So, I think this contract for \$5,000 is a steal. I think it's great for the city. There are a different steps that Mrs. Hatala, who originally worked for the County's Recycling program, different steps to increase recycling and reporting. She has been working closely with the city, DPW and for \$5,000 I think this is a great thing. That's all I have.
