MR. ROGAN: On the question? is the Comcast contract. Prior to the meeting today we did have a phone conference with our attorney representing us in the negotiations with Comcast. Two big items that the city council cares about and is very interested to try and see worked into this agreement is to maintain a service center within the City of Scranton, preferably at the mall at Steamtown, and obtain either a discount for senior citizens or an income based discount. There were also have concerns regarding funding for ECTV that have been discussed I know over the last few weeks as well so this item we

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are hoping will be readdressed at our first meeting following the August recess, but we will keep the public informed as this develops.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question. With the recent news of the acquisition of the mall by a local developer, I think council should take a stand as we are doing in tabling the Comcast contract that would have been on our agenda tonight until a deal can be reached to keep the Comcast service center in the mall at Steamtown. We should not forget that Scranton is Comcast's largest customer. Why should our citizens have to travel to Dickson City for service. If we are even going to consider this contract, Comcast should make a commitment to the city by guaranteeing us that they will keep their service center in the mall.

I am extremely disappointed that

Mayor Courtright would negotiate a deal in

which a business gets a 12-year contract and

gets to close up shop and move to Dickson

City in the next breath. Shame on Mayor

Courtright for allowing this deal to even

get this far in the process and for keeping council in the dark. Let's not forget that as of May of this year Comcast is worth \$147.8 billion. Keeping their store in the mall and making an investment in Scranton, which is their largest customer, certainly won't break their bank.

MR. EVANS: On the question, I'll just comment that the reason it's also important to stay in the mall is because the Comcast store brings a tremendous amount of foot traffic to the mall and that's very important for the new developer and new owner and we are hoping that Comcast takes a look at this and reverses their decision to move to Dickson City.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, Mr. Chairman. I started pushing for the Comcast remaining in the mall once they announced it earlier this year, and Comcast being a large company naturally turned their back on us.

Fortunately, we have the opportunity for both the city and Comcast to correct this mistake that they made. Thank you.

I would like to note that one of our residents here in Scranton has just been selected as a Pennsylvania delegate to the Young Democrats of America conference. He will be representing Scranton and Lackawanna County in a few weeks in Los Angeles where he will receive training on how to engage and elect Democrats and meet other young Democrats from across the nation, and his name is Paul McNally so I would like to congratulate him on that great honor.

John Anthony Pizzo, Jr., passed away earlier Friday after a courageous five-year battle with cancer. John worked in the Department of Public Works for the City of Scranton and I would ask that you please remember his family in your prayers tonight. And that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Rogan, I have
two. On Monday, August 3, beginning at 7
a.m. until 5 p.m. the 300 block of Meadow
Avenue will be restricted to one lane in
both directions. They are installing a new

gas line there. Once again, these are one of the roads that was just paved two years ago and it's being torn up again. This construction project is expected to last for a period of three weeks so if you could avoid that area it would be suggested.

The only announcement I have is that August 2 is the 108th annual German Day to be held at Waldorf Park. It will be from 1 to 5 p.m. It's the only day the Irish let us have up there so please attend.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. A couple of announcements, the piece of legislation in Sixth Order this evening, the JAG grant, there will be a motion to move that to Seventh Order for final passage.

City council will recess for the month of August and will resume meetings on Thursday, September 3.

There is an event to benefit the family of Officer John Wilding. This will be on Saturday, August 1, from 1 to 6 p.m. at Toyota of Scranton, 3400 North Main Avenue. There will be t-shirts and signs available for purchase.

And finally, Scranton's Police

Department will be having their National

Night Out on Tuesday, August 4, at Scranton

High School from 6 to 9 p.m. There will be

free food, kid's activities and police and

fire department demonstrations.

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. ROGAN: Our first speaker tonight is Fire Chief Pat DeSarno.

MR. DESARNO: Good evening, how is everybody doing? My name is Pat DeSarno, I'm the fire chief for the City of Scranton. I have come here tonight to speak a little bit about our smoke detector installation program, and since I have been asked a couple of other things directly related to fire prevention and fire education in the city have come up, so if you don't mind, if you'll oblige me I will touch on them as well.

About ten years or so we started our smoke detector program and for the most part it was a giveaway, just pretty much you needed smoke detectors you came and saw us

and we gave them to you, a lot of that was due to large part to WNEP's Operation Save a Life program, which was amazing. Since then though, the actual installation by fire department personnel has only been going on for the past two and a half years or so and that is due in large part to the efforts of Deputy Chief Alan Lucas and our fire prevention officer Sean Flynn, and I can assuredly say that in that time thousands of smoke detectors have been installed in hundreds of homes directly by fire department personnel.

Now, since I have gotten to into my position I have kind of made moves to expand our fire prevention capabilities. We have doubled our efforts in finding and dedicating funding for new detectors and other fire prevention tools and now we are able to protect homes by the following means:

We now install one small battery operated detector in every bedroom of the house we go to, three, four, however many bedrooms, two. Now, they have ten-year

lifespans, but we strongly suggest that batteries are changed every six months. We also include two ten-year lithium detectors, that would be one on the first floor and one on the second floor of your home and there is no battery replacement necessary for those for ten years I could say.

And now we are now able to include expanding them even further to include one carbon monoxide detector for each home, and this service is available to any and all city residents and Scranton Fire Department personnel will do the actual installations for you, and I will give you the information on how to get that done when I close.

We are currently awaiting a \$100,000 FPS or Fire Prevention Safety Grant, we are awaiting word on our application, and this is done under the umbrella of the AFG or assistance to firefighter grants through the federal government. If we are awarded this funding we will be able to go out and protect approximately 1,000 more homes. So the county after that particular thing, right now our detectors through Operation

Safe a Life and what we purchase through our own means, but the caveat to the -- for lack of a better word, for the AFS detectors should we get them is going to the low to mod household range, something like that, so with that in mind once we get them we will figure our way through it. We are thinking of reaching out in conjunction with the Scranton school district through their school lunch programs. I think that might be one of other better ways to go out and find out the homes that are need.

So speaking of the Scranton school district, that's a nice segue, go right into there, I would like to quickly add that we have a little bit of a partnership and a more aggressive fire prevention and education program, a lot more comprehensive with the Scranton School district and this is due in large part to Dr. -- the new superintendent Dr. Kerijan coming over and reaching out to us and with help from Jeff Brazil, and our two fire inspectors, Jamie Lundy and Jack Joyce, we are going to get together with them and as more details come

along I'll come back and announce how that program is going to go if you don't mind.

And speaking of partnerships, one more segue, the Red Cross awhile back had reached out to us and the new executive director, Mr. Bill Goldsworthy, and their disaster management program specialist, Jeff Banks, approached us and asked if he would consider going into a partnership with them on a smoke detector installation program and, of course, we said of course.

Now, I don't Mr. Goldsworthy, first time I had ever met him, he seems like a very aggressive and progressive person, really wants to get this done, and I have met Jeff several times on occasion on scenes and stuff and, you know, meeting Jeff is bitter sweet because if Jeff is there something -- an individual or family has experienced some sort of disaster, but Jeff is sweet because Jeff is awesome. Jeff is a go getter. If something happened to me I would like Jeff to be handling it, I would be in very good hands with Jeff.

Anyway, our discussions kind of came

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down to this, we will -- what we are going to do is target different areas and neighborhoods of the city that we feel, we deem that are very much -- in very bad need of these detectors, and we will be reaching out to neighborhood associations to find out and get their input on who they think and where they think these detectors should go.

Now, the Red Cross is going to provide all of the detectors, they are going to provide the smaller battery operated ones and the ones with the ten-year lithium ones. If we can somehow drum up some funding for the CO detectors possibly through this program we will try to add them, but for sure smoke detectors and we, of course, they are going to provide detectors, as I said, and volunteers and Scranton Fire Department will assist them in every way that we can and what we can is we plan to hit three different areas, one each month in the city and that is in August, September, and October and our first efforts will be in South Side scheduled for installation -installations are scheduled for Saturday,

August 29, and September and October dates are yet to be determined. Tuesday morning August 25, we are going to, Engine 2 in South Side, and we are going to hit the areas that we picked and they will be passing it out and/or leaving door hangers telling neighbors and other residents what we are all about up there, they are bilingual, English and Spanish, and also a little questionnaire type, not questionnaire, a paper to have the residents tell them all about what they have received and education involved with installation of the different fire prevention tools.

So we will be meeting with the residents, talking with them and answering any questions or concerns and, again, I'll repeat that on Saturday, August 29, we will reconvene at Engine 2 and we will get out to the neighborhoods and do the actual installations.

Wilkes-Barre is doing this this
Saturday, they are doing the installations
Saturday and this past Tuesday they did the
neighborhood canvases and I understand it

was very well received, very warm and well received.

So in closing I will get to what I came here for, again, our Scranton Fire Department smoke detector fire prevention installation program is available to all city residents and the number to call is 570-348-4164, that will be extension one or prompt number one, for fire prevention officer Sean Flynn and, again, I repeat 570-348-41644, extension one, prompt one, fire prevention officer Sean Flynn, and there is a link on the city websites landing page. You can click on that and that will take you to how to go about the process.

So, gentlemen, have any questions?

MR. ROGAN: Thank you very much,

Chief. Just a compliment actually, I think

it was about two years ago John Judge from

the Fire Department contacted me just trying

to get the word out and I put a post up on

my Facebook page and I had nothing but

compliments from the people about the guys

that went out and did the installations and

how much time they took to professionally

install the smoke detectors because when I think of I just think, okay, you buy a smoke detector and put it up, but they explained that there is a method to it and they were very happy with the service from everyone on the fire department so thank you.

MR. DESARNO: Thank you, Pat, I appreciate that, and, yes, if nothing else we try to be as professional and as courteous as we can out there. Thank you. Have a great summer, see you in September.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you, Chief. Tom Blomain.

MR. BLOMAIN: Hello, Council. My name is Tom Blomain. I'm here on behalf of Electric City television, which I serve as a board member and apparently a very timely issue right how with the paper and your commentary just now about tabling the issue. I will be brief, the only reason I want to appear here today is to thank you for the efforts that you are trying to put forward to benefit not only ECTV, but the city, it's contract with Comcast, and all of the viewers that have come to rely on Electric

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City television as a true community access channel. With the kind of help that is being suggested with this new contract, I think that not only will we be able to continue the types of services we provided but enhance them and I think that's to the benefit of something like 85,000 households in our area, most of which are in Scranton. I do hope they keep their center obviously in the Steamtown Mall and that we can continue to provide and expand the services that we have done, hope it passes many years.

So just a thank you for your efforts and encourage you to get the best deal you If I or anyone affiliated with the channel could ever be of any help in any way please let us know and we will be happy to provide whatever service. If you guys have any questions from me or I'll go ahead and finish.

> MR. ROGAN: Thank you very much.

MR. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. BLOMAIN: Enjoy the rest of your summer.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Next speaker is Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
Scranton resident and taxpayer. With regard
to the Comcast contract I want to compliment
you on taking on this issue and not simply
rolling over and rubber stamping what was
coming before you. I personally don't
subscribe to Comcast. I dumped them about
two years ago primarily for their outrageous
bills and their extraordinarily bad customer
service.

One month they deposited my check into somebody else's account and they used to leave nasty messages on my answering machine because I hadn't paid my bill. So I sat back one day and spent an hour on the phone trying to reach them and just before I could talk to a human being they gave me message that I would have to pay \$4.99 to speak to a customer representative, so Comcast (sound uttered.)

I would tell people there is a option to having Comcast, if you don't have to have a cable service, and some people

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want ECTV when they want and EWTN, but if you don't have to have those services and you don't have to have your sports channels, and you watch just the basic broadcast channels, consider buying a digital indoor TV antenna like I have. I get 14 different channels in high definition quality, ABC, CBS, NBC, PBS, WVIA, ION, all of them. different channels, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and I pay zero, okay? And it's not just me because I'm on the fifth floor of the Forum, people on the second floor of the Forum get the same reception from downtown. So, you know, it's something you want to consider unless you want to feed the hog and I don't. So good luck with the contract, but they are superlatively bad and you can tell them I said so.

With regard to the Steamtown Mall,

I'm so happy to see that we now know who
bought it and we are so happy to see that
the new owner is interested in working with
the city and other city stakeholders in
revitalizing that property, I hope they
succeed.

I also want to compliment Mr. Evans and the rest of the council for the meeting you had on Monday brainstorming ideas to move the city forward. That was such a breath of fresh air and such a positive attitude. I would be the one standing up here saying where is the audit, where is the audit and following the money trail, but the other side of that coin is you do have to look at the things that are positive and that's when you have done and that's what I'm looking for in terms of leadership in the city and I'm glad that you stepped forward and are fulfilling that role.

I hope you have a good August, I hope you come back refreshed because you are going to need to hit the road running when you get back. You have got the 2016 operating budget around the corner, you've got the 2014 audit, and I'm going to start asking what's the status of the audit, you are going to have the status of the sale of the Scranton Parking Authority, the Scranton Sewer Authority, what's happening with the mall, a whole lot of other issues, so I hope

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you have a wonderful August recess and I hope when you come back on September 3 you have your stuff in one bag so we will be asking questions.

I noted with pleasure the two PILOT payments that were made on your item three agenda for a total of over \$54,000. If you recall the city only budgeted \$200,000 for PILOTS so if you got \$54,000 there usually the University of Scranton pays you \$175,000 if they come through again this year that's well over \$200,000 right there, so that's a good thing and hopefully we will get more people to belly up to the bar. And I'll be waiting -- also, I hope when you come back in September we have the minutes on the website for the July 9 council meeting, that's the one where the mayor was here with Mr. Amoroso, I'd like to see those minutes to go through those again so that we can keep looking at where we stand on the recovery program. That's another issue that's not going to be dropped. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,

Council. Les Spindler, city resident, homeowner and taxpayer. Friday evening I attended a benefit at Fellows Park for Patrolman John Wilding. It was a wonderful event, it was attended by hundreds of people, and lots of money was raised for the family and his widow was there, I think it was -- the chief had to be pleased by the great turnout.

One thing this bothered me, the only elected official I saw there was our mayor. I didn't see one city council person there. Unless you were out of town, I think you should have been there. I know, Councilman Rogan, you were on your honeymoon, that was a legitimate excuse. Unless you other people were out of town you should have been at that benefit.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Spindler, I was out of town.

MR. SPINDLER: Okay. I said if you were out of town that's a different story.

If you weren't out of town, there is no excuse. You should be there to show respect

for this fallen officer and his family, a wife and two young children, I don't think \$10 is too much to ask, and I spent much more than that going to that benefit and it was a great benefit to attend and it was a very good success.

And I know there is another one
September 20 at the former Ice Box, one of
the officers told me that, and it's from 1
to 9, that's a few months away, it will be
here before you know it.

MR. ROGAN: I think that one is going to be a very large one.

MR. SPINDLER: It's going to be a very big one they tell me from 1 to 9 so I'm looking forward to that.

Moving on, I was again glad to see that a local person bought the mall, I wish Mr. Basalyga all of the luck in the world. I just hope he gets the right people running that mall. I think the first thing he should do is hire a general manager that has previous experience in running a mall and I think he should get all of the help he can from Mr. Boscov. I think Mr. Boscov could

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help turn that mall around.

And another thing, I said it before, I think he should lower the rent because I said it a few weeks ago, I said you better off having a mall filled with people paying less rent than a mall 75 percent empty paying high rent so I think the first thing he should do is lower the rent, we'd get more businesses in that building.

Lastly, Comcast. Every time this contract comes up I bring the subject up as why don't we look to another provider, and every year I come up it's fallen on deaf ears. I'm sure it will probably fall on deaf ears again, but I think their prices are outrageous. I have it because I love sports and I don't just want the basic cable so I pay the outrageous price. I think what they should do, and I've said this for a long time, they should have a package where you pay for the channels that you watch. must get over 100 channels, I probably don't watch 25 percent of those channels so I think they should have a package where you pay for what you -- you tell them what you

are watching and you just pay for that. I don't know if that's something we can get into the contract, I think it's good idea because, like I said, their prices outrageous, but they are the only game in town so we are stuck with them, but I think we should look to other providers because there are many other providers in area.

That's all I have. Enjoy your month off, we'll see you in September.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. I'd like to say that from beginning one of the problems with the mall was just crossing the street. I heard that, you know, now AND then over and over and over again that was a dangerous place. Cars ran the light, cars turned, people couldn't get there in time. It was a bad intersection and nothing was ever done about it that I know of.

My associates at the Taurus Club are completely 100 percent, get ready for this, against your \$150,000 loan with what has happened in the past, I'm talking about, you know, some financially business people. We

shouldn't be in the banking business after the past history this city has like the glass company was here for a couple of months that blew out of here over \$50,000 or something, you know, the glass place downtown. The two motels, if some deadbeat can't go to a bank why should the taxpayers have to give money as much as it could be used all around this city.

And, Mr. Minora, I think I got a question for you, when -- I'll wait for you to quit laughing at me.

MR. MINORA: No, I'm not laughing at you.

MR. ELLMAN: Well, you probably will when I ask you.

MR. MINORA: I won't laugh at you.

MR. ELLMAN: I know you have to be much more familiar with the American Disabilities Act where a person is supposed to be able to go and get a room or an apartment or buy a house after a certain age and with certain physical or mental problems, I've read little articles about the ad, I'd like to know why the University

of Scranton, Lackawanna College, Marywood, why somebody can't go to that dorm and ask for an apartment. I asked HUD and they have no reason they said it seems the person I talked to said it seems feasible. It looks like there can be some kind of legislation to make this possible for the people in the city that have lost all of this money and the property that they took to give us eight apartments to rent towards their money that's due. They just can't go on like they are and you can't rely on Mr. Amoroso to do a thing to help this city. How he is going to help the city when he is getting \$60,000s from Lackawanna College not to oppose them in anything.

This city is just a laughing joke, this is administration, but what is wrong with what I just said? It seems like there is a loophole --

MR. MINORA: I was just waiting for the question.

MR. ELLMAN: Sir?

MR. MINORA: I was waiting for the question.

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MR. ELLMAN: Why can't the city through legislation take some of these dormitory apartments for people that the city is taking care of and putting in homes and everything right now? There have got to be thousands.

MR. MINORA: I'm not sure what you're referring to, dormitory apartments, that I don't what you mean.

MR. ELLMAN: Well, it seems all of these apartments, all these dormitories, I don't know how many, there are probably 1,000, 2000 in the city, I don't know how many.

MR. ROGAN: You mean the student housing, Mr. Ellman?

MR. ELLMAN: These apartments they came from confiscated property that used to pay taxes. They built the dorms, we don't get a penny for them. It seems with all of the people in the city that the city and the county have to take care of they could demand amount of apartments in these dormitories, which they are going to turn you down, then give the city and the county

"X" amount of rent for those apartments that we need.

MR. MINORA: I'll tell you what,

I'll talk to you after the meeting because I

don't understand the question. Are you

suggesting that the University should turn

over their property to the city because it

used to be tax producing, is that the

question?

MR. ELLMAN: They're not going to turn it over, but maybe the threat --

MR. MINORA: Well, I'm just trying to find out what the question is.

MR. ELLMAN: Looks like the threat of doing something -- nobody has nothing to help the people of this city against the University. Nothing. Lackawanna College told Mrs. Evans to go to hell when she asked them for money. It's time something is done about it and Mr. Amoroso is not going to do nothing. He is getting \$60,000 not to do nothing to anybody.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you for your time,
Mr. Ellman. Attorney Minora did say he will
discuss it with you after the meeting

further.

MR. ELLMAN: Well, it's something that I -- it seems like somebody could toy around and that I'm not the least bit knowledgeable what I'm talking about, but it seems like it's something that somebody up there or Mr. Minora could investigate.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MR. ELLMAN: Thank you. You all have a nice summer.

MR. EVANS: Thank you. You, too.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia.

Fellow Scrantonians, the loan again, it wasn't -- we built a garage for the Connell building, we gave them special tax incentives, now, you are planning to give \$150,000 to somebody to move into the Connell building, are you planning to give money to anybody that wants to rent a room in the Connell building, is that where we are heading? You are doing nothing to stop the tax increase that's going to come in January. How you can justify giving out a

contract to study one traffic signal on

Parker Street and Main Avenue is beyond me.

Everybody laughs. Why you would do that, I

don't know. I just hope it ain't for

contributions.

Another thing, you are giving out \$5,000 for recycling so the lady can say, "Put the glass in the can to the blue, put the newspapers and paper in the red."

Is that going to be our \$5,000 gift to her? You are not doing a thing to stop what's going to happen. All you do is add on. You shouldn't be giving out any contracts other than needed for safety actually. You don't need all of these contracts, there is no reason for them. If you don't stop that 6 percent is a joke that they said, it's going to be 12 to 18 percent. You just don't watch the pennies or realize that people are looking. Why would somebody get \$5,000 to help with the recycling?

They look like their is payback.

Everybody looks at your contracts like they are payback.

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MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Sbaraglia, can I interject for one second? The \$5,000 to the recycling consultant was a result of a meeting with the state, that was a state recommendation for the City of Scranton so that's why the administration decided to move forward with that, and it was included in the 2015 budget.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I realize that, but it's a joke. We got the county handling the recycling. What the state got to do, I don't know, but if anybody realized there is so much politics between the state and local governments that they are no longer trustworthy. Why you would have a contract out because the state says you should give them one is beyond me. The question is did you need one no matter what the state says. You and I know what's going to happen in January, but don't lie to the people. That's 6 percent is a house of cards just like he said. If one thing don't go, another thing don't go, that 6 percent goes to 12 percent and 15 percent, God knows what.

You know, you gave a \$4 million to a bank that you didn't have to, and you mortgaged the revenue from the parking meters. Did you have to do that? No, but you did it and so and so on. You are not helping what's happening. You are adding to it and in the end people are going to see what's happening and in the end you are not going to be sitting up there somebody else is going to be sitting up there that wants to watch what's happening to the city.

I'm sorry that you don't really look at everything. You got to have a need, a good need before anything is done. You don't just say it looks good. A lot of things look good, but we are not in the position to look at things just because they are good, you got to look and say that we are in dire need of it.

Them two lots that they are selling up to at -- Gavin. They are worth more than that, you and I know that. They are prime lots, but yet you let them go for \$2,500 where each of them lots is probably worth about \$10,000, but that's the way it goes in

this city. People are political connected and whether that had anything to do with it or not I don't know. I just hope not because this is what's happening with the city and I'm sorry to say it's true.

I was brought up in this city, you are talking about the Boys Club, West Side Club for the Boys House, I with the poster boy for the Boys club. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone who would like to address council?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

Marie Schumacher. First, I would like to say I was elated to find that the mall was not sold to a nonprofit and I hope that it stays that way for a very long time and on the tax rolls, that is.

And then since ads for special meetings have to be submitted to the Times at least a day before they appear in publication I'm a little bit dismayed that the special meeting that was held on Monday which appeared in Friday's paper was not announced at last week's meeting especially when I had asked about the status of the

brainstorming session. Now, the ones that are on in Seventh Order tonight. 7-E, again, I am definitely against a grant, a loan, yes. Frankly, I don't believe that a grant should be given to -- I think the grants out to be the people who have been here and require loans to help them stay in business or update should be the people who get the grants. I think others should be loans.

The sewer and the water line, 7-I, is that an exclusive arrangement or will the insurance, line insurance, be available as it is now competitively?

MR. EVANS: Your insurance still stays in effect, this is just another option.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, thank you.
7-J. Oh, what was it, I put 7-J and I
didn't put -- somebody help me, what was 7-J
on, the subject, I'm sorry.

MR. ROGAN: There is no 7-J.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Oh, that's the one you are moving back on the agenda tonight?

MR. ROGAN: It will be temporarily

1 placed back on the agenda and then --2 MS. SCHUMACHER: But what is the 3 subject? I understand that, what is the subject of that? 4 5 MR. ROGAN: The pods, the pods legislation. 6 7 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. I still -- I 8 think you should vote against that because I 9 don't think there is any justification for 10 charging a fee for having a storage 11 container on your own lot because you are not providing any service in return for the 12 13 fee which is the definition of a fee, so I 14 think that needs to be reworked definitely. What's the status of the matrix that 15 16 PEL is preparing on the items that have be 17 accomplished? When you come back it's going 18 to be, two-thirds of the year is going to be 19 gone by the wayside. 20 MR. EVANS: I know they are working 21 on it, so I will talk to them about where 22 they are with that. 23 MS. SCHUMACHER: We won't find out 24 until September so --25 MR. EVANS: I'm not sure.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, and how many firefighters have we hired now? Whose committee is that?

MR. WECHSLER: To my knowledge we haven't hired any.

MS. SCHUMACHER: When are we going to hire them? I mean, that whole MOU was based on savings of overtime because we are doing hiring, we have lost the firefighters, I think that the administration needs to get a kick in the butt from you people.

 $\label{eq:mr.mayor} \text{MR. WECHSLER:} \quad \text{I request that from}$ the mayor every time I speak with him.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I hear you. Well, I think maybe all of you need to send a consolidated message that it's time to start hiring. I'm sure there are people out there who would qualify or I can't believe that there isn't. And I guess, okay, that finishes it for the night. See you in September, as the oldies song says. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you very much. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

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MS. GAUGHAN: Good evening,

gentlemen, my name is Mary Gaughan, and I'm a recent city resident and I'd like to say that I'm friends with the management at the Hilton Hotel, and today they had a lemonade stand at the corner of Spruce and Adams and they raised a little over \$800 and all of the proceeds will go to Patrolman Wilding's widow and they spent a lot of time, the employees volunteered, they wore shirts. The manager, Mr. John Argonish, approved He also sent them off to the baseball this. game with the shirts and the bracelets and he is also backed up by the desk manager, Mr. Luck Menaphy, and even his little six-year-old daughter came to help today, and I think that's wonderful.

And I also want to say that I talked to Borys Krawczeniuk yesterday while I was waiting to see Hillary Clinton and he told me that he looked at the internet and he said, indeed, what I asked him was right that John Basalyga, his father, was Sergei Basalyga, the later Sergei Basalyga, and I went to school with him in Dunmore and I'm

looking forward to seeing John.

And the other thing this gentleman, I understand you have an ordinance on the books and one of the ordinances is skateboarding in the city, and I see a policeman wandering very nice and he is very well dressed and very sharp and he should have a book full of money for the city because there are people going down the street, the sidewalks, on skateboards. There are people driving town the middle of the sidewalk on bicycles.

And also there are people smoking all over the place and if you look at city there are cigarette butts all over. I talked to a new business woman, Joann Martinelli Finnerty, and she says to me, "Tell me about the cigarette butts, they even put them in my planters."

And I think if we are going to attract business we better clean up the city a little bit, we better do something about the homeless population and we better make the city look clean. Let's be proud of our city, we have a lot to be proud of, and

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thank you very much, gentlemen.

Oh, and, Mr. Wechsler, August 2, as an Irish person, I'll be up at the Waldorf.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer. paid, etcetera. Once again, call Congress 1-202-224-3121, I won't mention the president, that's 456-1111, 1-202. Last week I failed to mention that the reason I mentioned the 25 to 30 people corpses found in cages under slavery in Malaysia is the currently our US Chamber of Commerce is lobbying to lower them from code red to code two, meaning that they will qualify for the Transpacific partnership. Now, you wonder why we have no jobs in the United States that pay decently.

Furthermore, it's been mentioned about schooling, well, at 55 years old you don't go to school and turn your life around and become something entirely different.

Mr. Minora would no better make an automotive mechanic than I would make a lawyer or an attorney. We can't -- the doors are closed, so to speak, so if we

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didn't need an attorney anymore, I mean, he could ponder around the shop and maybe get something up with the same with me going to Court, I get laughed out.

On our local issues, on 7-E, once again I mentioned that I was opposed to it, one of the things that concerns me is a lot of these grant loans, and this is also a grant, so if they achieve what they say they are going to what type of wages do they have to pay, first of all, how many hours a week do they have to create a job for, or can we have five people working 20 hours a week and call it that, and with some of the employees would it be applicable to the low waitress wage or waiter wage where it's 30 percent of minimum wage which, you know, people just don't get it. The average age of a car right now in this country is 11.5 years. Now, talk about demand, there isn't any obviously. They are fixing up old rusted old clunkers just to get by, just to get by, so some of those people, although they are our friends and so forth, they are not necessarily doing us any favors.

And on Mr. Amoroso, I don't want to bash or whatever, but I don't see -- I do see a possible conflict of interest there and that's all there is to it. He was hired by people that basically would oppose paying out in various instances and, in fact, the Chamber of Commerce has attracted businesses out of town and large businesses such as Sanolfi Pasteur and the former Diversified or whatever it was called after that.

Here we have an article, "CUC group, Chamber of Commerce, joins group urging gas export." Now, get ready because you are going to pay the same price that they pay in Japan or any or else even though the environmental impact is right here in our Just like the coal days, go up state. McDade Park face the breaker, the tip breaker and turn left and you will find undeveloped lands and that's what all of the land looked like when I was a young kid, and I grew up in a different town in Central Pennsylvania, but it was the same, it was a coal region, and there wasn't a safe place for a kid to even play out in the woods.

On tabling ECTV, please stay on it and try to get some justice here for Comcast or the city, it's up to them, they do get a royalty so if they want to share it they really should.

And on the sewer pact once again there was one in the paper today or yesterday another article on the bid and it's probably going to happen, but currently if they have the right to bill other people for my bill I disagree with that, and currently I am being billed for luxury gated communities that have to pay a high percent and I disagree with that, also. I'll make my bills, pay my bills and they can feel free to do the same. Thank you and have a good night and have a nice summer.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Regarding the questions regarding the loan grant, I do have a packet of information I can give to you after the meeting on that. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

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MR. ROGAN: Councilman Wechsler, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, thank you, I would like to thank John Mr. Rogan. Basalyga for his investment in our city. Ι don't know John personally, but I am familiar with some of his projects and all of them that I have ever seen are quite outstanding. All of a sudden with this purchase John now becomes on of the most important people in our area. For right now pretty much all we have to be are cheerleaders for John, I know I'm one of I promise to do anything that I can to help make his investment at the mall a success.

Last night I attended a meeting of
the Hill Neighborhood Association and our
district forester and city forester Tony
Santoli was there. If you want to hear
about trees Tony is the guy that you need to
speak to, and he went on for quite a bit
about trees, but the most interesting thing
that I came away with from the meetings, and
I did not know this, is as you go through

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the city you see trees with red dots or lines on them, and the red dotted trees are trees that are scheduled to be taken down and the trees with the lines on them are trees scheduled to be trimmed if you have any questions about that. And it was interesting that he told me there is an inventory that he has prepared for trees throughout the city that are scheduled either for trimming or for removal and we do have dedicated staff from DEP that when they can they go out and do trees every day. Unfortunately, in the DPW the first requirement is that the garbage trucks are filled with people first every day so they, unfortunately, don't get to do as much tree trimming as possible.

The other interesting thing I heard from Tony was that the city Recreation Authority has assisted him financially with some spraying up there of some hemlock trees, so all in all it was very encouraging me, Mr. Santoli had high remarks for the city and our efforts to control trees, and also had high marks for the DPW staff that

he works with on a daily basis so it was quite interesting.

The last thing that I have to say is that the meeting that we have on Monday, concerning new initiatives to bring some brighter and more spirited ideas to the city was quite a success. I have been contacted by several different people with ideas, people that I did hot know were in this area and have a varied interested in contributing to this program. Now it's up to us to as council people now to make this work, and I think we will need as much assistance as possible, but I'm very excited about it and the initial response has been tremendous, and that's all I have tonight.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Councilman Evans, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. Council
President McGoff asked me to read the status
report on the audit, the audit prep is
making good process in support of the full
audit and SP & Company is probably going to
do the preliminary work at this point.

I'd like to touch a little bit on

comment that Mr. Spindler made, I absolutely agree that it would be phenomenal to have competition in the arena of cable TV. The problem being is that Comcast owns all the facilities for cable TV right now, so anybody that would want to compete with them would have to overbuild Comcast, which basically means it would cost close to \$100,000 million or more. With that said, the only one I could see competing would be Verizon. Verizon is telephone operator and Verizon does have the facilities to provide cable TV with a little bit of adjustment here and there.

Verizon does have cable to be serviced throughout the east coast, it's called FIOS, F-I-O-S, and by all accounts FIOS is one of the top five cable providers in the country when it comes to service, so what I would suggest is write a letter to Verizon, I'm going to write a letter to Verizon because I would like to see them implement their FIOS cable TV right here in the City of Scranton. It would be an easy build for them. They have it in

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Philadelphia, they have it in New Jersey,
Maryland, Baltimore, D.C., and it's
something that I think would be a benefit to
all of us, so I thank you for the suggestion
I think that's probably our only opportunity
for true competition in that arena.

Finally, when we return in September we will entering into the last quarter of the year, so to say that we should expect a full court press from the administration would be an understatement. Some of the items that need to be addressed and have not been completed as of yet are the monetization of the Sewer Authority, monetization of the Parking Authority, full pension reform, rental registration revisions, rental registration RFP to get registration issues finally revolved, updated condemnation policy, foreclosed property registration RFP, the Comcast cable contract changes, a plan to collect the \$13 million for delinquent garbage bills or at least some kind of cash infusion for the 2016 budget and, of course, the budget itself.

There is going to be numerous other issues that we can expect to deal with in the fourth quarter as well. I know we will be more than ready to tackle them but we have to get them before us so we can do that.

I also need to remind everyone that on several of those hard issues failure is not an option, we really have to get them done so we are ready, willing and able to work with the administration to get some of those larger issues done this year. So for that, that's the end of my motions for tonight.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Councilman Gaughan, do you have any motions or comments.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. I received a letter last week in support of the legislation regulating portable on demand storage containers this week. The resident who wrote the letter would also like something to be done about landscaping trucks throughout the city. The letter says that they take up more than one parking

space, block corners and many times sit for days with debris in the back of the truck and when it rains it smells unbearable and I guess this a problem in some of our neighborhoods so it's something that I'll be looking into over the break.

We received a complaint about parking in the 600 block of Campbell Street in South Side. Residents are having problems pulling out onto South Webster Avenue. Chief Graziano is having a member of the traffic division conduct an evaluation of that area.

I received several reports about issues on North Sumner Avenue that we forwarded to the appropriate departments.

Several complaints about an overgrown lot at 516 Leggett Street in North Scranton.

Neighbors are having a hard time backing out of their driveway and there have been many close calls in that area because of the overgrowth of the weeds and grass in that lot so hopefully Licensing and Inspections will take care of that.

We received a letter last week from

a gentleman who is requesting that the city vacate their rights to the 900 block of Jones Court. Council sent a request officially to our city planner, Don King.

I received numerous questions from residents in North Scranton about utility work being conducted on Mary Street.

Residents are concerned, and I am concerned, about the number of pave cuts that are taking place on a road that was paved within last five years. We reached out to the pave cut inspector and he reported that Mary Street will be paved curb to curb when the work is complete, so that was good news.

I was very pleased to see that local developer John Basalyga acquired the mall on Monday. It is a positive first step in the redevelopment of the mall and the overall improvement of our central business district. I commend Mr. Basalyga for taking on a difficult situation in a time where retail malls are struggling across the industry. Mr. Basalyga's investment will go a long way in restoring the vitality of Lackawanna Avenue. I'm confident that

Mr. Basalyga, with the support of the council and all of the stakeholders in our city will be successful in creating a vibrant and bustling mall downtown that will have a domino effect attracting more business and development and I am excited along with the rest of my colleagues to sit down with Mr. Basalyga in the next few weeks and discuss his plans for the future of the mall and our downtown.

I would also like to wish everyone a safe August and into the summer and look forward to seeing everybody back in September. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you.

MS. GAUGHAN: We look forward to seeing your new Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, Mary.

MR. ROGAN: A few quick items and one that I can speak a little more at length. First, I would like to echo my colleagues who spoke regarding the mall. I was also very pleased that a local developer purchased the mall and it wasn't purchased by a nonprofit or a national company. We, I

think as a body, wish the developer best and we are your partner. We will do whatever we can to help see that mall succeed in any way we can, and we hope, and I personally hope, that the many ideas that have been brought up by the residents of this community are considered by the new owner of the mall. There have been many of them have that have been on social media, in the newspaper, and it's great space and right in the downtown we're a great city and that really needs to be revitalized, so we are very optimistic regarding that.

I apologize for my absence for last week's meeting and the idea session on Monday, but I would like to thank everyone who wished me well, I did get married last Saturday.

MS. GAUGHAN: Hurray.

MR. ROGAN: So thank you to those who did wish me well and my wife regarding our marriage and we are gone away on our honeymoon so I did miss the idea session, but I am very anxious to work with Councilman Evans on the economic development

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committee and also with Councilman Wechsler on the arts committee, but I will preface it with the arts committee I do have a little bit of a learning curve there so --

MR. WECHSLER: We'll help you.

MR. ROGAN: We'll have to get a group of people on that committee, but it is a great idea and I think good things will come out of those committees.

And finally turn to something I am quite upset about. When I returned from my honeymoon I had a few voice mails from an neighbor of mine who is involved with some veterans groups and some other organizations within the city, and apparently last -about a week or so ago there was a large fundraiser at the Gino Merli Veterans Center and the point of the fundraiser was to raise money for some of the veterans canteen fund. What the canteen does is it's basically an account that each vet in the center has where they could go and buy toothpaste, snacks, things of that nature, and they were trying to raise money more so for the vets that are in the center that don't have

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families that could support them, and by all accounts the fundraiser was a big success, there were a number of groups that are active in it and it was a very successful fundraiser and they all did a great job from what I am told.

What I'm upset about, and what many of the veterans that I spoke to are upset about is for that event they requested to use the city showmobile. Now, city council just recently, and the administration, recently passed legislation regarding the showmobile. I firmly believe we need to do something to make it -- to carve out an exemption for veterans, veterans groups and veterans organizations. This group that put on the fundraiser received a \$600 bill from the city. Now, they are able to find a donor to cover that \$600 bill, but that \$600 most likely would have been donated to the fund for the vets instead of going to the city.

So I did speak to our city clerk regarding this issue and what we are going to do is send a letter to DPW asking that

the \$600 is refunded to the organization. I am also going to speak to Mayor Courtright personally about this issue after the meeting today. Moving forward to ensure that this does not happen again, I am going to speak with Attorney Minora and see if there is anything legally we could do to amend this ordinance so veterans groups are exempt from paying this fee. I don't think it's right, a group raising money for veterans and disabled veterans and shouldn't be charged a \$600 fee by the city to use the showmobile.

On all my time on council I have brought up veterans issues. I voted against the fee for the parking -- for the handicapped signs because there was no veterans exception. I think veterans should receive a discount on their city taxes just like they do -- disabled vets do from the state.

They fought for us, many were wounded and died for us, we need to do what we can to help them and although it's a small fee it's more than principal of it

than it is that fee. So I am hoping that that fee can be refunded to this group and moving forward there will be a little bit more discretion when it comes to the fees being charged to the use he show mobile. Certainly a veterans organization should not be charged \$600 from the city. And that is all I have nor tonight.

I did get a couple of calls on this legislation in the past week, a few concerned plumbing contractors in the area. Their question was if we go through with deal and someone buys a warranty and then they need a contractor to work on their line, where does this company get the contractor from?

And I was in contact today with a woman who provided me with several answers and was very helpful from this company.

Basically what happens is this company has a contractor network, so they will create a Scranton network, contractors within the city that they will then choose from when work is needed on any of these lines. So the contractors have to be licensed, they have to be bonded and they have to have the proper insurance, and they also check their Better Business Bureau rating.

So everything is above board on

this. I was concerned at first because I did have a little bit of hesitation that we would be picking contractors from out of the area and we wouldn't be sticking with contractors locally, but that was cleared up for me today so I will be voting for this in final passage.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else on the question? I would just add I was contacted also by a number of concerned individuals within this industry and I understand where they are coming from and I do see both sides of the issue, and I guess it's just a judgment call on our part on which way to proceed.

MR. GAUGHAN: Right. And I will also add that the city is going to get a licensing fee from this deal, it's 50 cents for each warrantee that is sold for each month the warrantee shall be in force. I did ask if we have had an idea of how much money we would take in from this and we do not. This company has 6,000 customers across the state, the closest municipality that this company does business with is

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Wilkes-Barre.

MR. EVANS: On the other side of it, you know, this is a competitive service so it's already being provided now by a branch of American Water I think, so it's nothing new, only difference is we have licensing rights so if we get this company in the city gets a little money.

MR. GAUGHAN: Right, and also if you were to purchase a warrantee it is around \$8 to purchase the warranty a month so it comes out to \$88 annually.

MR. ROGAN: Anyone else.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes. Just as

Mr. Evans mentioned I personally have this
on my water bill so it seems to be redundant
to be honest with you. I had to use the
service with the water company earlier this
year and it worked out quite well, but on
the other side of it the competition is also
good.

MR. EVANS: Yeah.
