MR. WECHSLER: Are there any comments? If not, received and filed.

Do any council members have announcements at this time?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, I have two. The Minooka Lions are having a raffle to raise funds to install a gazebo in the Billy Barrett playground on Colliery Avenue in memory of Attorney Mark Walsh who passed away three years ago. It will be held Saturday, July 16. The project will also commemorate the Lion's centennial celebration. The drawing will be at 12 noon and tickets are \$20. Also, please keep in mind that

Spruce Street between Adams Avenue and North Washington Avenue will be down to a single lane starting Monday July 11 at 8 a.m. This traffic pattern will be in place for four weeks. PPL will be replacing, upgrading and adding new concrete top to a manhole. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, I have two.

First one is there will be an addiction awareness rally held on Sunday, July 17, 2016, at Lackawanna County Courthouse square. As we all know the opoid problem in our is becoming quite dramatic, if you read in the paper this week we also lost another young person to drug abuse. This particular rally is in memory of Sammy Henehan, who also suffered from this terrible disease so please everyone come out so we can combat this problem.

I was asked to announce for anyone that on Tuesday evening there will be a meeting of Greenridge neighborhood Association. That will be at 7:00 p.m. and that will be at the American Legion on Deacon Street. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, city resident and taxpayer. First, a couple of thanks are in order to all of the city workers who helped carry off the wonderful events on July 3 for the Fourth of July celebration. It was well executed, well done and they deserve kudos for that effort.

Also, even though in a perfect world every road would be newly paved, thank the people who have been paving downtown or elsewhere around the city. It's nice to see those roads paved over and it makes the city looks so much better and I'm sure it's best for the drivers so thank you for that, too.

Today is July 7, you're probably thinking about the August recess coming on a hot, humid day like today. After today there are only three more meetings that you will have and you can see in today's agenda that the calendar is getting light. With that in mind, I would also remind you that as of today the 2015 city audit is now 37

days late by Home Rule Charter and I'll be watching that when you come back after recess to see how that is progressing. I'm still intensely curious about what kind of bill PFM is going to give us for their work on the monetization of the Parking Authority. Correct me if I'm wrong, they are also involved in the monetization of the Sewer Authority, are they not?

MR. WECHSLER: Yes.

MS. HODOWANITZ: They do have a four-year contract that runs through March of 2018 and I hope we don't have to wait until April of 2018 to find out what the bill is.

MR. WECHSLER: They are being paid at the end of the each agreement being reached so --

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, September they should be paid.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, they are not going to invoice us, they are getting fees from the --

MR. EVANS: They will be paid at closing at both of those so probably

mid-August for parking.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, good, because I would like to see that in the September Controller's report.

Also, coming up around the corner is the ever popular 2017 operating budget, and I hope we are all contemplating those numbers and what should be going up and what should be going down. Have you heard anything on Mellon's replacement as the pension fund manager and trustee?

MR. WECHSLER: I contacted Business Administrator Bulzoni this week, there are currently five firms that they are evaluating and no final decision has been reached.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. Remind the general public that next Wednesday, July 13, starting at 8:30 in the morning are the pension board meetings and if I recall correctly from this morning's paper that Monday examiners come hear the double pension dispute. Whether that will be an open or closed hearing I'm not sure. I suspect it will be a closed hearing.

Hopefully this whole issue of the double pensions will come to a close this fiscal year and not drag out into the future.

And the article about the parking profits far off, you realize I'm going to be 91 in 2040, if we don't see until then I want to live long enough to see some kind of proceeds come back, but it brings up the issues, a question, Renaissance 500, that sign is still up about the Delilah's Gentleman's Club, is that really coming to downtown Scranton?

MR. WECHSLER: No, really it can't because there is a park nearby so it would violate every zoning law.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay.

MR. WECHSLER: So I think right now it's just an attention getter for someone.

MR. EVANS: That particular building is not part of the Renaissance 500, that actually was condoed and owned by a separate individual.

MS. HODOWANITZ: But we are still

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not going to bring gentleman clubs back to

MR. EVANS: No, it would be also impossible because it wouldn't be allowed where there is residences and there is homeowners within that block.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, good. Good. Thank you. Have a good night.

MR. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Albert Young.

MR. YOUNG: Good evening, Council. Albert Young, Scranton resident. Back on March 31, 2016, we came to council with a problem that has plagued us for many years. After few appearances, council addressed this as an emergency problem and since then you have been in contact with DEP. About five weeks ago we were notified that the draft letter was supposed to be in print and was supposed to be sent to us but was not. Last Tuesday we saw the mayor and the solicitor at lunch and we stated that we had yet to receive this letter. Well, that night at 5:30 in the evening the secretary called and said that she had just finished

printing out the letter and it would be sent out the next morning. That was June 27. We received a letter on the 5th of July.

After reading the letter, which contained a bunch of the legal jargon, I give it to two different lawyers to read.

This has been recommended to me by a friend and thank God I did. They both called and both stated, "Please, do not sign that letter."

and apparently legal thinks I was and no one apparently has read my first proposal when I sent it in to council back in early April.

That proposal clearly states 1713-1715 Young property and 1717 Kennedy property. The Kennedys are working parents and are required to work nights and sometimes are called out of town. Because I'm retired, I'm the one that's basically doing the fighting for this whole project.

Now, as far as this letter goes, after receiving it, I don't know whether you have it in front of you, but if you don't take notice, if you do I would appreciate

you taking notice to it.

Paragraph two, who is going to asses the problem?

Paragraph three, the whole thing is ludicrous. They, the city, will not pay for reseeding or paved repair. Chris and I -- Chris is my next door neighbor, and I have no problem with reseeding, but I have about ten feet of blacktop that's either in the hole or washed away because of the massive flooding in the past.

Paragraph four, hold harmless agreement. My foot. The coverage belongs to the city or now and not me and -- this should be in this agreement should be eliminated.

I'm going through the second page of the agreement, the entire page should be eliminated. It has to go. Number one, we are not leasing the property to anyone.

Number two, the city wants us to give up all rights for recall or to sue if the company that they hire botches the job and it goes south in a few years. It also states if there is injury while on our property we are

liable to the city or the contractor.

Number four, if for any reason there is damage to the contractor's property while on site, again, it is our problem. Not going

to happen.

Now, when I was in business I had to provide workmens' compensation for all employees. That's the law. So this only shows someone has no clue as to proper procedures upstairs. The contractor must provide enough insurance, that is liability and comprehensive, to cover damages if any occur of. Again, this is mandated by law to perform work in this city.

If Legal Department in this city does not get with the program, as they have stated they have 60 days to complete their date started June 28, then I guess I have no recourse to do something that I did not want to do and I stated here at council, I do not want to sue the city, but I guess my recourse is going to be sue the city and the Sewer Authority if there is nothing done.

Gentlemen, there was a lawsuit against the city for \$100,000 back in the

90's.

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MR. WECHSLER: Go ahead.

MR. YOUNG: And that lawsuit was settled and won by the plaintiff. This person only had the problem for four or five years, not 47 years, and if there is any further estimates needed I certainly would like to have a complete copy of these estimates for comparison because I know what I got and I don't know what else is going to be given. I'm sorry, gentlemen, but thank you for your time.

MR. EVANS: Thank you. Attorney Minora, can you do us a favor by next week can you review the letter that was sent to Mr. Young? How I'm confused is they seem to be putting all the liability on him, and if we hire a contractor the contractor should have all of the liability insurance for all of the work he does on-site, so if we could take look at that and find out.

> MR. MINORA: I'll review it.

MR. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Ron Ellman.

Hello, gentlemen. MR. ELLMAN: I'm

going to read something so I don't make too many mistakes. My friend Bob Benke was murdered over two years on Wyoming Boulevard by a speeding car and according to witnesses -- well, a witness that I talked to, no attempt was made to avoid or stop with, you know, like, skid marks. My friend through his cane up at the last couple of seconds so you could just imagine the terror that went though his mind knowing this was going to happen. This is a terrible occurrence.

And what about the charges? None.

Nothing done about this and in over two
years. Mr. Quinn, I think he was from
Honesdale or someplace out of town, he just
figured this is being swept under the rug
and it has been. This is inexcusable.

Mr. Benke attended the little church on
Olive Street and they had services and took
up a collection to bury him. Nothing was
said from his family. Nothing to contribute
to his burial. It's inexcusable the way
this went off. This man was treated like
roadkill or something by this city, by the

DA's Office. I phoned twice and the lady at the desk told me I'm not a member of the family, this is none of my concern and hung up two times. That's our tax dollars at work. You shouldn't have to be a member of the family to have something done about this to be able to talk to someone about it.

In the paper it seemed like the newspaper tried to portray him as a homeless panhandler. This couldn't be further from the truth. I have known this man for almost 15 years and he always had an apartment. He used to watch television and talk about politics when I'd see him. He had an income. He was like thousands of people in this city, but he is being treated, like I said, it's being swept under the rug. As far as I'm concerned, Mr. Quinn slaughtered my friend and nothing, nothing is being done about it from this D.A.'s Office.

You know, they got so many people in there working that they step on each other's toes and I got to be told it's none of my concern when I'm asking about it debt like this. This is unconscionable. Well, you

want to know where I'm going, to Mr. Benke was a citizen of this city and deserves some kind of justice. This needs to be brought to Court. It's deliberately being avoided being brought to Court. How would anybody out there, how would any of you want if there was an incident like this related to your family to have it whitewashed like this, never brought to Court because of financial status of these people compared to Mr. Benke.

We used to call him Flea Market Bob because I used to see him at rummage sales and he used to buy western books all the time. Very good man. Always had nice words to say, he didn't even used to bad mouth the councils when we'd talk or the mayor and always was congenial, and if this murder, and that's what it was, if this murder isn't addressed immediately I will go to Harrisburg in my car and see Mrs. Kane or somebody but I'm not going to let it drop, and nobody should let the death of somebody in this city drop by a speeding car going twice what the posted speed limit is on

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Wyoming. I guess you people -- well, not you people, I guess the DA's Office is waiting for the young lady that witnessed this, unfortunately, to drop dead from old age, and I wish council could do something, I don't what, but I wish council could do something that bring this before the people and the courts. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. Ellman. Anyone else?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, a lot of people have been stopping me and asking about the parking agreement. them I'm not a lawyer, I can't actually tell you what legally should be done about this parking agreement, but if you find that it bothers you so much I explained you should contact the federal officials. You should contact the Auditor General. You should contract the Attorney General and ask them to look at this contract and then you will get an answer, but I cannot give you an answer. I don't like many of your provisions in this contract, whether it's

legal or not legal that's up to the Courts to decide, not mine. Like you keep saying, you are not lawyers and neither am I, but to give up \$150 million over the life of this contract isn't very smart.

In the paper today they said you won't get a penny from this deal until almost 20 years from now before they might have money to be able to give out. How you can say this is nonprofit is beyond me, but, obviously the Courts have to decide what is a profit and what is nonprofit. If they decided it's a profit then the city, state and federal government will get a share of whatever is generated. If they decided it's a nonprofit then we are all at a loss and we have to come up with another \$150 million or maybe \$200 million down the line to make up for this contract.

But, like I said, to the people, I don't like it but there isn't much I can do about it. You could if it bothered you so much do it. Go contact your state officials, federal officials and let them look into this contract. I'm sure there is

a lot of things in this contract that the state doesn't like or the federal government may not like or the Attorney General might like. Namely, money that belongs and should come to the city isn't coming, or to the state or to the federal government. How they can ever decide to lease our garages to a nonprofit is beyond me.

Like I said before, there is so many things that stand out as a red flag this these contracts that only a state, federal commission can look into it and really say whether it's above board or below board, and I'm sorry to say that's what should be done. Whether you believe in it or not believe in it, the people of Scranton have to believe in it and they don't. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening, Marie Schumacher. Since completion of the full year of Lackawanna County property transactions in mid-March, 730 properties have been transacted of which 177 or 24 percent were Scranton properties. Keep in mind I believe we have a 46 percent of the

properties in the county. Of these 177
Scranton transactions, 42 percent were sold blow the common level ratio. Think about that, gentlemen. 42 percent of those transactions below the CLR. We have not only lost our parking assets, but we also have also lost significant property value in addition to other losses, which I'll address sometime before your break, I hope.

Mr. Rogan, will you be providing the number and locations of the No.16-99 demolitions currently out for bid during Fifth Order as I requested?

MR. ROGAN: I have it on my to-do list, I do have to do that prior to the meeting, but I didn't forget it.

MS. SCHUMACHER: What about the rental registration? I was upset to hear tonight in the meeting that rental registration is being canned and being kicked down the alley one more time.

MR. ROGAN: Well, it's not being kicked down the alley, Councilman Evans and myself have been actively working on this for quite awhile and we want to see it done

1 more than anyone. 2 If you what know MR. EVANS: 3 happened was we asked Director Hinton for 4 one last input into this, he gave us the 5 input and now we are meshing that with the ordinance that we have. That's where we're 6 7 at. 8 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I'll tell 9 you, you have gone and gotten emergency 10 certificates how many times? Probably you 11 guys hold a record, you could still do it in 12 July. 13 MR. EVANS: That's true. That's a 14 possibility. 15 MS. SCHUMACHER: Until waiting until 16 September. Mr. Gaughan, during Fifth Order 17 will be please provide the increase in the 18 recycled materials since we added a person 19 to DPW for that purpose? 20 MR. GAUGHAN: I don't have that 21 information with me tonight, but I can get 22 it. 23 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Next week? 24 MR. GAUGHAN: Hopefully. 25 MS. SCHUMACHER: I thought that

1 person was supposed to come in for a caucus and brief us. 2 3 MR. GAUGHAN: Right, they gave us a-- Dave Bulzoni gave us a report and an 4 5 update, I think I read that maybe three or four weeks ago, I don't exactly know what 6 7 happened with her coming in for a caucus. 8 I'm sure we can try and schedule that. 9 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, but you will 10 hopefully have the numbers next week, and then what about when the storm drain at 11 12 Snook Street and Seymour and the corroded 13 drain pipe that that drain goes into that it 14 feeds be corrected? MR. GAUGHAN: I don't. I sent it 15 16 along to the DPW and I have not heard back. 17 MS. SCHUMACHER: How many follow-up 18 calls have you made? 19 MR. GAUGHAN: One. 20 MS. SCHUMACHER: Maybe you want to 21 increase that number. That's a dangerous. 22 MR. GAUGHAN: Keep in mind, I 23 understand that it's dangerous, but keep in 24 mind all I could do is say, "Here's the 25 problem." I can't make them go out and do

1 it because they don't work for me, unfortunately, but I am trying to get the 2 3 situation resolved. MS. SCHUMACHER: 4 Okav. 5 Mr. Wechsler, would you please provide the initiation cost of that Court award bond? 6 MR. WECHSLER: Yes. 7 8 MS. SCHUMACHER: There is an 9 issuance cost. how much was that? MR. WECHSLER: I will get it for 10 11 I don't have all of the information up 12 here on my table. 13 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. And, also, 14 could you please provide the dates of the four executive sessions that were held on 15 16 the parking assets lease? 17 MR. WECHSLER: We'll have to have 18 Mrs. Reed go back and check. 19 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, whatever, I 20 would like to have those dates, thank you. 21 Mr. Evans, you have advocated against 22 replacing the business privilege and 23 mercantile taxes with a payroll tax until 24 the business privilege and I call it B-Po 25 collections have been increased, would you

please share the dollar amount of those 1 taxes that would satisfy you? 2 3 MR. EVANS: As far the in crease is concerned you mean? 4 MS. SCHUMACHER: Uh-huh. 5 What level? 6 7 MR. EVANS: Well, basically how it's 8 worded now is effective January 2018 is when 9 we want to go over to the payroll tax, so 10 whatever it is at that point in time is what 11 it is so it doesn't matter what it is. Ιf 12 it's 25 percent increase or 50 peers 13 increase, we are going to cut it over, at 14 least that's my idea of what's going to 15 happen. 16 MS. SCHUMACHER: Why not 2017? 17 MR. EVANS: We are not ready to do 18 it. 19 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. I'll hold 20 the granddaddy for next week. MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. 21 Dave 22 Dobrzyn, resident. I didn't bring anything 23 with me, but please call your Congressman 24 and tell them to can the Transpacific 25 partnership. If they're Republican, tell

them you are sick and tired of being called a 47 percenter. If they are Democrat, tell them you are still waiting for that government cheese that they promised many years ago, and the free computer service so you can sit at home and the money will be given back.

Once again, keep in mind "Free Lunch", a book by David K. Johnston, how the wealthiest people stick the average jerk with the bill. There is also another book "Perfectly Legal," that's on taxes, and one of the punch lines in the book is that if you applied for earned income tax credit, which is for working poor people signed by Ronald Reagan, nonetheless, you're 56 times more likely to be audited by the IRS. And then there is a "Fine Print", which is kind of the vague, it's about some crummy business practices and lack of regulation on railroads and so forth.

I have been wanting to do this for awhile and we talked about a vibrant downtown and everything and, of course, we have been though all kinds of consternation

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over the whole works and Steamtown, our museum, stands ignored by city government at this time. I have asked in the past through several councils to at least send -- lobby the powers that be, your senators and congressmen, to get some money to them. They have been frozen since 1992 at 5.2 million operating and then they were sequestered 10 percent of that two years in a row so that puts them down, you know, close to another million dollars, then they have projects that aren't being completed and I'm the only one that can speak on this, we can't get somebody from the park over here because they are not allowed to, they are federal employees, so they cannot discussion the park with you, but it was supposed to be a jewel of our downtown, attract all of these people, restaurants on hotels and some of their equipment, mainly the steam engines have been off the tracks and in the repair garages, quite frankly, too long.

Now, the last statement on the Parking Authority that I hope to make,

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mistakes were probably made, but -- with default, but there are two garages that should have never been built. They should have been refurbished. We tore them down after spending a lot of money studying them and our former mayor was really big on studies. Another thing that came to mind, a few years ago the animal refuge up at Nay Aug was told they were going to have to move and a guy brought some little animals in here to show council, it might have been pre-Janet Evans council, and they told me that the mayor had pledged \$50,000 a year for three years and instead spent the money, \$50,000 a year three years plus another 25 for the fourth year on a study of the feasibility of having wildlife refuge at Nay Aug. Well, now, it is only hearsay, but I don't think the man was lying and if that's true shame, for shame. So, you know, some people aren't the sense that the newspapers and whomever decide, Chamber of Commerce, whomever decide to put them out.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Anyone else?

MR. MCKEON: Hi. Good evening. Don McKeon, resident. My concerns are very few, I'm just here, I want to build on what Joan said about being complimentary to the city on a lot of the paving that's been done so far, and especially in the downtown area, and that's primarily my concern here. A lot of my concerns are really cosmetic in nature and probably could be addressed quite easily, but there is certain things that I don't -- image is very important, we want to present our city as being very clean and as beautiful as possible, and I think there is some effort that's needed in our immediate downtown area just to make a better impression, and I'll just give a few examples.

I know that for the past few years

anyway, Scranton Tomorrow used to plant flowers on the islands on Mulberry Street, and I guess they decided they weren't going to be able to do that anymore so right now they are pretty much covered with weeds and, of course, that's a very negative impression from anyone entering our city from Mulberry Street. A lot of the trees that line the streets on Lackawanna, Wyoming especially, first and second hundred block are either dead or dying and they are not replaced, you know, very quickly, so that makes a negative impression.

That, I don't know what you would call it, it's some kind of a round enclosure over some utility boxes in the 700 block of Wyoming Avenue. It's a dome-type structure that's been marred with graffiti for a long time. I know in the past DPW would on occasion paint over it, it hasn't been done in a long time, but it's very noticeable. That whole block in the 200 block, I don't have to tell you, is in need of redevelopment. I don't know if anyone actually is looking into that concern, I

mean, there are missing bricks in the sidewalks, missing benches, busted street lamps, but I don't read about anything, you know, happening to try and address that.

It's probably the worst looking block really in all of downtown. Many of the lampposts have been replaced and look really good so I think that should be addressed.

And speaking of graffiti, I just noticed this, it may be a very recent thing, but coming into town from Moosic Street going on the viaduct under the bridge there is a huge tag, that must have just happened, with the statement, "We are the kids who run this town." Now, I hope that, you know, proper people have been notified of that and that's obviously as you enter into the city, the downtown, that's what you are seeing. It's a huge tag with that statement, and also some of the concrete barriers along there are tagged in the same way.

And then just coming here tonight I pulled into the alleyway here and the building that formerly housed Tink's, which has been renovated, has a huge tag visible

on the side of the building. So that's always been a pet peeve of mine --

MR. EVANS: No, it's hard to hear, but I know you as well as anybody that the city has an ordinance against graffiti that's on private property.

MR. MCKEON: Oh, I know.

MR. EVANS: So that has to be enforced by LIPS and the property owner is obligated to take it off in a certain time frame and they have to go out and make that happen.

MR. MCKEON: Right, and I understand how that works, I'm just bringing it to your attention to make sure that you guys are aware of and that, you know, make sure that it is addressed in the proper fashion, you know, especially, again, anywhere but primarily when it's downtown, you know, we have to be conscious of the image that we

set and I think we need to address it as quickly as possible so there are really beautification things, you know, some of them can be remedied quite quickly, but I don't know if there an active downtown business group that even, you know, addresses those type of things, and maybe you guys can answer that, but I don't really know. So that's my primary concern and possibly you could just, you know, forward that to the appropriate people, okay.

MR. GAUGHAN: We definitely will. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?

MR. PERRY: Really all I have this week is just, again, to gloat on the city's paving project. It's getting -- I mean, paving potholes have been a problem in our city for quite awhile and in the rustbelt part of country and everywhere, we are no different, but just to see so many streets

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Mr. Rogan?

get done so quickly is something that I haven't seen in my lifetime, so I'm very happy about that. And even on a more personal level, Kane Street which if anybody is familiar runs from Colliery Avenue to Stafford Avenue up to the post office is in Minooka section where I grew up was always an issue, always an issue, and for 45 years that street went without any maintenance whatsoever and every now and then you would see somebody drive out and put some cold patch in it, but it got so bad the cemetery had limited access because Kane Street was the main inroad, and, I mean, when I drove by and saw that getting milled the other day I was floored. Even though I saw it on the project list, you know, it's one thing to see it on a project list and then another thing to actually see it happen.

So, again, I can't say enough good things about this paving project that we have and I hope that we continue with going forward. That's all I have this week.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Two brief items. As

Mr. Perry mentioned, I also brought up last

week the paving, over the last month I have

probably had more compliments from residents

regarding street being paved than I had on

my entire time on council and I think a big

part of that is because in past decades the

downtown, although much money was bumped

into the downtown for other items, the

paving was always neglected, so it is great

to see paving come to the downtown. There

is much more that needs to be done and

hopefully next year we'll be able to find

more money to do even more paving.

Secondly, Mr. Dobrzyn brought this up a number of times, and I agree, with my colleagues' agreement, would we be in favor of sending a letter to Congressman

Cartright, Senator Casey and Senator Toomey asking for increased funding for the

Steamtown National historic site. It really is a hidden gem in the City of Scranton that many Scrantonians don't even know it's there or they haven't stopped by to see it. If you love history the way I do, definitely

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put that on your to-do list along with the coal mine tour and many of the other great historical items that are in the city, but with my colleagues' agreement if we could send that letter to request that increase in funding. And that is all. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. A couple of things, first of all, I want to clarify the transfer from the mercantile business privilege tax to the payroll tax, one of the issues is the fact that it was discovered that the school district was not a part of this and we want to get the school district to be part of it because they are the predominant taxer when it comes to these nuisance taxes so Senator Blake is working on that with some of his colleagues to get the legislation that we need to allow the school district to participate so we can roll the entire business privilege and mercantile tax over at the same time.

As far as what Mr. McKeon said, I know I have had conversations with several

downtown business owners about creating a business improvement district downtown that would be properly funded that would allow for some employees and some volunteers that would go out in the day and clean the streets and sweep up and plant flowers and eradicate graffiti, so that conversation is ongoing so hopefully that will be something that will happen in the near future.

But I'd also like to comment on some positive things that happened over the weekend, or last week. First of all, I want to thank the young person by the name of Allison from Moses Taylor Hospital who took time out of her day to attach a note at the yarn bombing at the Harrison Avenue bridge. She just wanted to tell those involved with the project that every time she drives by back and forth from work that it just cheers her up every day so she took the time to do and leave the note for those who were involved in that project so I thought that was very, very nice of her.

And a big thank you to the county and the city and all of the sponsors that

made the July 3 celebration on courthouse square such a success. Now, I spent the evening with approximately 10,000 friends and family and strangers on a beautiful summer night that collectively listened to patriotic music by the great Northeastern Philharmonic and saw a fantastic fireworks display, so as we celebrated our country's independence day.

And then just yesterday I attended the unveiling of the little free library at Connors Park in South Side so I'd like thank and recognize Bill Moran who designed, built and donated the Dr. Who inspired tardis to be used for the free library, it really is something special, and to Bob Gattens from the Friends of Connors Park, and Katie Carney from UNC who took that idea and ran with it and brought it to completion, as well as Mayor Connors and Susie Connors who were the first in line with bags full of books to donate for the little free library in South Side. Too often we live in a community that can be dominated by negative comments and negative thoughts. We need to

know and enforce the idea that there are so many great people out in our community doing great and positive things each and every day without fanfare just quietly trying to make Scranton a better place. So my comments this evening mostly dedicated to them.

But one final comment, if I may, I was struck by Chris Kelly's article about Ozzie Quinn the other day. First of all, Ozzie, if you are watching all of the best and get well soon, our thoughts are with you. Secondly, Ozzie in many ways embodies what Scrantonians are all about. Here is a man literally fighting for his life, himself and for his family but at 79 years old he is fighting for us to because all he really wants to do is get back to work helping his city and helping his beloved Hill Section neighborhood. So thank you, Ozzie, for all you have done and the past and all of you are going to do in the future. That's all I have tonight. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you, just a

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few items. First of all, over the last month and a half we have received several stop sign requests so I would like to just run through a few of them. We received determinations from the city engineer. Aker Avenue a stop sign was requested. The 900 and 1000 blocks of Aker Avenue are being recommended to be designated as a one-way going southbound so we should see an ordinance on that soon.

The 1100 and 1200 blocks to the Taylor line will remain a two-way road so that was approved.

The stop sign request for Prospect and Fig Street that was denied by the city engineer and also Capouse and Woodlawn a stop sign request was also denied.

We received a request for a light that was out at Sheraton Place and North Garfield Avenue so we had sent that along to the DPW and Walsh Electric.

Also, I received numerous calls about a vacant lot in the 600 block of Beech Street that is overgrown, has various materials stored on it, neighbors are very

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concerned so we sent that along to Licensing Inspection.

Also, have received and have been receiving since I have been on council not so much complaints, but requests that we try to do a better job coordinating the street cleaning schedule so that residents know when that machine will be on their street. Many people are unaware when the street sweeper will be coming on their street and they leave their cars in front of their homes so my suggestion was when I first was on council, and has been to the mayor and his administration, to post signage on telephone polls or maybe do robo calls which are relatively cheap to the residents wherever the street sweeper is going to be because it would make sense to give the people operating these machines more room to clean curb to curb, and just a remainder that the street cleaning schedule is posted on the city's website in anyone wants to take a look.

Also, received concerns from neighbors in East Mountain about catch

basins being covered with debris and dangerous intersection of Meadow Avenue and River Street so we will pass that along.

Also, if my colleagues would be in agreement I would like before we recess in August to present a proclamation to Mia Nonneberg, a North Scranton resident and swimmer for the University of Alabama. She has been in the paper recently and she competed and did extremely well in the US Olympic trials so I do think we should honor her for representing the city so well. And that's

all I have this week.

Mr. Gaughan just a follow-up on some of the comments that have been made. The event on the third of July was just a fantastic event for the people of our area. As Mr. Evans stated, there was thousands of people downtown and I did not see one problem. I didn't see any nonsense at all. It was a great family event and I think everyone that was involved in it should be very, very proud of what they did.

I understand that there will be

several films shown this year, Scranton

Tomorrow is putting on a program, they have invested in some quality movies, I think

Star Wars is going to be shown on the courthouse square, so these family events are what we are about and we hear so much problems with the city, these things are working.

I also attended the mayor's Fourth of July ceremony at Nay Aug Park. There were more people there than normal, but not as many as should be there. I take great pride in going to these and being able to celebrate these events with our veterans. They do such a great job and they are very loyal to the country and to the city and to themselves as a whole and they are dwindling, a dwindling lot, so if you ever have a chance I think you should participate in one of these ceremonies and just shake the hand of the men and women who have been out there and done it for us before.

Over the past two months we have been talking about the unpaid garbage fees in the city. We have been contacting

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Northeastern Revenue Service and through the work of the administration and council legislation has been passed that we are able to start filing liens against people who don't pay their garbage fees. Right now liens have been filed for the years of 2011, through 2013. The number that I was provided was 2,420 liens that were filed with the city with the Clerk of Judicial Records last week. People who are on the lien list will be getting copies in the The total dollar value represented by mail. these liens is \$1,400,068 which is a huge amount of money for a city like our own. are very limited in what we can do in terms of collecting these, but I'm very happy, very proud that this council and administration has taken these steps to make everybody pay the garbage fee. Everyone that's up here has paid their fee, people at home and here everybody pays and then I do think that it's only fair that people pay theirs.

This is something that we are going to continue to keep doing. There is going

to be another group for the 2014 and 2015 and for people that don't pay that those liens will be filed and be completed by the end of the year. So, once again, I am very happy to say that we are trying to do our best and make sure that everybody takes care of their responsibility. And that's all I have tonight.
