22	so although they had a public comment
23	period, you couldn't ask any questions which
24	for me defeats the purpose of a public
25	comment period.

1 And the second thing was the shock 2 of the night for me was to find out what was 3 the selling price for the Electric City It was the magnificent total of \$1. 4 garage. Now, as I recall this sale was not 5 6 bid out. I remember the mayor put out a 7 press release on, let's see, June 3, in 8 which he explained that the city basically 9 couldn't afford to repair it and if they had to demolish it it would cost several million 10 11 dollars, and he talks about Mr. Basalyga 12 very glowingly, I quote. "My friend, John 13 Basalyga, needs no introduction in Scranton. 14 I think I speak for us all when I say that we are incredibly excited about the work he 15 16 is doing at the newly rebranded Steamtown 17 marketplace, at the movie theater and the 18 downtown more broadly. John is not a 19 typical developer and I think that's exactly 20 what we need in Scranton, and it's what 21 makes me happy to be his partner." 22 I'm sure the man is doing good 23 things with the Steamtown Marketplace or 24 rather the Marketplace at Steamtown, but I 25 think he is getting a good deal with a sale

price of \$1 for the Electric City garage, and then you come to find out Steamtown 300, LLC, and the Parking Authority will split the immediate capital expense costs to start repairing the Electric City garage with Steamtown putting in \$2.25 million and the Parking Authority \$2.85 million, and then apparently he is getting what is it a \$4.85 million upfront payment when the lease begins and that kind of surprised me, you know, and I'm thinking, my, God that almost compensates him for what he paid for the mall to begin with, so I'm not quite sure what's going on there.

At least to me it doesn't and, you know, a lot of other people because they are asking the same questions and wondering and scratching their heads, and I don't know, to me it just doesn't sound like it's, you know, \$2.85 million towards renovations on the crumbling Electric City garage, where is the city going to get \$3.5 million? Is this coming from the borrowed money that we are in the process that we are going to eventually borrow? I have been waiting for this happen. We still haven't gotten that money, whatever money we are borrowing, I don't even know how much it is anymore. Is that going to come out of that to pay this \$2.85 million or what? I don't know. There is a lot of questions and people need answers and, you know, the only people that have the answers are the administration and the elected officials, and there is seven elected officials in the City of Scranton. The mayor and five city councilmen and the city controller. MR. EVANS: That's why we are having

9	Whether that's the total we are going to
10	get, whether we have to pay other stuff with
11	that I don't know. \$28 million is \$28
12	million. That's almost the amount that the
13	unions are going to be getting so I think
14	that's a good thing.
15	And lastly, always complaining about
16	the utility with these pave cuts, I said a
17	few weeks ago they are digging up North
18	Rebecca Avenue, they are fixing it up again,
19	but the seven and eight hundred blocks of
20	North Rebecca have been completely repaved
21	over the last year or so and now they have
22	been talking about the length of each block
23	and filled it in with it's a terrible job.
24	I hope they plan on repaving the whole
25	street. These utilities are just out of

18 control. Ripping up all of the city streets 1 2 and making a mess of them, not repairing 3 them correctly. As I said, these two blocks are just recently totally paved and they dug 4 5 them both up. And, Councilman Rogan, I'm 6 sure you know the area because you live in 7 west side, also. 8 MR. ROGAN: And Farr Street was only 9 half paved. MR. SPINDLER: I've talked about 10 that many times, so I'm sure it's the same 11 12 people doing this. 1 income eligible households within the City 2 of Scranton to have their homes brought up 3 to code to enable families to live in safety and sanitary living condition. 4 5 In order to be eligible for 6 financial assistance, your total annual gross income must not exceed 80 percent of 7 8 the 2016 HUD limits that are designed by the 9 federal government. I'm not going to read 10 them all off, but for a one-person household 11 that limit is \$33,850, for a four-person 12 household it jumps to \$48,000, and when you 13 go up to an eight-person household it jumps 14 to \$63,800. 15 In order to be eligible all property 16 taxes, utilities, garbage fees and your mortgage must be paid up-to-date. The home 17 18 must be clear of clutter and debris in order for the inspectors and contractors to 19 20 perform their duties and OECD urges anyone 21 that may qualify to contact OECD for an application, and that phone number is 22 23 570-348-4216. This is a very good program 24 that can certainly help spruce up our 25 neighborhoods, and that is all. Thank you.

I was asked by a resident to give an update on the civilian parking enforcement program. From January 1, 2016, through June 6, 2016, the civilian parking enforcement personnel have issued parking violations totalling \$111,000 and to date the city has collected \$79,175 of that amount. Keep in mind that the mayor budgeted \$270,500 for the parking enforcement program for 2016. Chief Graziano noted the first half of this year has been challenging and staffing these civilian parking positions on a consistent basis due to personnel issues beyond the department's control. For a good portion of time, he operated with only one position filled and for at least a couple of

additional weeks there was nobody available to fill either of these positions. So as it stands right now we've only collected 79 -roughly, \$79,000 so it does not look good that we will hit the budgeted amount for this year.

The Friends of Lackawanna dropped off a letter today detailing several issues that would lead me to the same conclusion that the Greenridge line was changed somewhere in December. As we have discussed here several times, and it's been determined, that the city solicitor is in charge of making the decision whether to allow the use of the line or follow with the lawsuit preventing

25	creditworthiness, cut us off from the

capital markets and triggered the insertion of a receiver by the bond insurer which has cost the taxpayers of this city millions and millions of dollars. This would be similar to an average citizen refusing to pay their mortgage because they didn't like someone at the bank and wanted to send a message. The message has been sent to people around the state and the country that moronic decisions made by our leaders based on politics has had catastrophic consequences for Scranton taxpayers. The decision to allow the default is dangerous, foolish and has had an absolutely crippling effect on our finances that the city is still reeling from today.

As we move forward in examining this deal and making sure that is the best for the city, I don't think that the people of Scranton should forget what lead us to this point. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: I guess since we are going to take a stroll down memory lane tonight we'll ask for more context. The Parking Garage debacle began long before city council refused to bail out the

Scranton Parking Authority. This debacle began when former Mayor Doherty built garages that there were no need for. The basic problem that the City of Scranton had on a parking issue was that we had too many spaces with too much debt and not enough patrons. The solution that was proposed by the former Parking Authority was to keep increasing rates, and anyone that knows anything about business knows just increasing rates isn't going to work, you are going to lose patrons, and that's when we saw private garages throughout the downtown thriving while occupancy rates within the system have continually That is what caused the Scranton decreased. Parking Authority to be unable to make their debt payments which, yes, the city did guarantee. When a caucus was held, a very lengthy caucus with the then leaders of the Scranton Parking Authority, prior to bailing out -- or prior to agreeing to bail out the Authority to the tune of millions of dollars Scranton City Council asked for an Authority Going back in the minutes you could budget.

In the Medallion garages there are opportunities for a hair studio over there. There is another -- the Coliseum is over there, there is other building is the former Poly Redners, and based upon the testimony I heard last night NDC and ABM are committed to marketing those properties and bringing their expertise and successful track record to this program. It was interesting that NDC served as a conduit for funding for one

of the most popular spots in downtown, Northern Light Coffee.
