MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, citizen and taxpayer. Happy Veteran's Day to all veterans and their families. Nov. 15 through the 20th the Friends of Scranton Public Library will be holding a book sale second floor of the Marketplace at Steamtown Mall and right in front of Crunch Fitness. Please come and support the library. Everybody is a winner in this one.

Today is November 10, the City's independent audit is now 164 days late.

During motions if you would please update us on the status of the audit and the working session which supposed to be open to the public. Also, during motions if you can give us an update when the proposed 2017 operating budget will be made available for

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public access. You are getting close to the November 15 deadline. Also, during motions if you would update us on the status of getting the police, state police report on their investigation of the double pensions and how that is going and when the public might have access to that if information is ever.

I'm going to quote from Mayor

Courtright's March 18 press release. "From this point onward, the City's pension fund will be managed by a nationally recognized third party administrator who will ensure that the pension funds are professionally managed so that regular and disability pensions are only paid according to the strict application of our laws and that the pension system operates at the highest standard expected by our retirees and taxpayers."

That was March 18. Now let me quote from his state of the city address on November 4 and see if you hear anything similar. "The City's pension funds will now be run by a nationally recognized third

party administrator who will ensure that the pension funds are professionally managed, that all regular and disability pensions are only paid according to the strict application of our laws that the pension system operates at the highest standard expected by our retirees and taxpayers."

Well, this taxpayer would like to know what's going on. It's promised on March 18 from this point onward, on November 4 it says, "Now" and I'd like to know what is going on with the appointment of this administrator. Has an RFP been written? Will there be an RFP that is being considered and when is this going to come to pass? When you are discussing this in caucus, you mentioned that this might be tied to the Sewer Authority sale. like an explanation of why that should be. I think it should be done independently even if there were no Sewer Authority we still need to manage the pensions better than we have in the past.

With regard to Item 5-B this ordinance involving the contractors, is this

a redo of the ordinance that failed to pass several months ago? If so, would you please explain what has changed and why this has been reintroduced.

And with regard to Item 5-D, the grant application for \$18,375, I skimmed through the background on this item and I saw several references to improving economic recovery of both Scranton and Lackawanna County. I'm just wondering if the backup is poorly written or does this include both Scranton and areas of Lackawanna County outside of Scranton and if that is so, what kind of the money is the county putting forward. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Lee Morgan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Well, I think one of the greatest things
that ever happened to our country just took
place on election day. With all of the
irregularities that were reported across th
is nation and the ballot boxes Donald Trump
managed to win this election, and it wasn't
a Republican win, and I have heard a lot of

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people talk about the amount of concern that a Republican has become president, but I don't think that's what's happened here and obviously Donald Trump isn't a Democrat either, but, you know, since he put his hat in the ring I told everybody he was going to win this election and I spent a lot time outside of this city and I have to honestly say that I almost saw no Hillary Clinton signs anywhere, and when you look at the map of this nation and you see what's taking place the people themselves have finally realized something, that they have no use for the people they elect. They have no use for the two-party system, and you can't really blame them.

The sewer deal is a bad idea for the This council should know that. Sewer Authority knew that. Every resident of this city knows that, and we may avoid a tax increase for a very short period of time but not of the city's fiscal problems have been solved, not by this council and not by previous councils for over two decades. American people across this nation sent a

very strong signal and I really think we are playing with our democracy here because the general public is getting ready to give up on this system.

I drive about the country where I have heard numerous women say that it's time to star shooting. It's a really a troubling thing that the people have no faith in their government, and a lack of employment outside of the city and all of the poverty that's there, and it is there, and the poverty is here. You know, when you have got school students in the Scranton School District receiving a free lunch and a free breakfast because the amount of poverty in this city.

And we look at our elected government that over 25 years hasn't figured out what our problem is and hasn't even restructured the city and it has a council that sits here week after week and fields questions from its residents and really never answers them most times and has nothing but total contempt that elect them.

It's troubling, very troubling.

The other thing we found in this

election was that the people in the press that we counted on to tell us things truthfully and honestly had picked sides, and in a city with one newspaper I think it's time for the Scranton Times to hire an investigative reporter and start telling us what's really happening in our city government because we really don't have anybody telling us anything of any value. We have five council members who in my opinion have a very hard time coming forward and being truthful and hide behind just a multitude of different things not to come forward and tell us what's happening in our city.

And now we see that the county is talking once again about reassessment, but you know what the truth of the matter is?

This city needed to restructure a long time ago and it needed to really respect and cherish the people who lived here and, instead, we wasted every dime of federal funds we get our hands on and state funds.

We have squandered everything. And how long it's going continue I can't tell you that,

but I know that we have a lot of seniors living in the high rises even around this building that at one time were property owners in this city and they sold their homes because they couldn't face the crushing taxation that was taking place.

And now we have this city who says that they are going to study the garbage fee, but I mean, you have got to really take a look at how absolutely silly that is. You are offering people the opportunity to come here and build and avoid taxation for a certain period of time, there is a lack of employment opportunity here, there is a lack of almost anything, but the most important thing that's lacked here is transparency and honesty and that comes from you and the mayor. I mean, I have never even heard us tell us where Mr. Bulzoni came from.

I really think that this council needs to wake up, and I know you don't care much for what I said, but then you really don't care much about the residents of this city either. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. Morgan. Aaron Faust.

MR. FAUST: Thank you,

Mr. President, Council. Right before you tonight to speak on the Amendment 155 ordinance entitled provisions for licensing and regulating of contractors, specifically, to start out with under number three, Section B, "Any person wishing to apply for a contractor's licensing including, but not limited to, the following categories of general construction, residential construction, electrical, plumbing, mechanical, masonry demolition, roofing and carpentry."

That provision you are letting have four years of practical experience being proven by simple paychecks or W-2's. I'm more in favor of the exam being given to the contractor. I feel that council has an obligation to this City of Scranton to ensure that the contractors that will be working are of that quality. Now, if we let just the paycheck prove which contractor can be licensed, anybody can work for somebody for four years sweeping the floor and give

an electrical license. They might not have any experience under that contractor doing electrical work, doing HVAC work, doing mechanical work.

So I really urge council to take a long hard look at this ordinance and how you want to amend it to make sure that the contractors are held to the highest standard and make sure they can pass and they're competent and we owe the residents of Scranton and in the name of the safety especially you are dealing with mechanical, you are dealing with electrical and we need to be sure that the contractors that are put forth in this city know what they are doing. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. I'm sorry, I can't read the next name. Does anybody who signed after Mr. Faust and. Before Rick Schraeder?

MR. MCNULTY: Well, if you can't read it I'll take it.

MR. WECHSLER: That's you, Tom.

MR. MCNULTY: Good evening, Council.

My name is Tom McNulty, I'm a resident of

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the city, life-long resident of the city and my job currently that I hold is the Director of Education and Safety for the National Contractor's Association, and my two principal duties are to make sure that our people, all 161 contractors are up on the latest codes and safety requirements. Obviously, that's a --- going to take care of -- we cover a big territory. We cover from Allentown, Philadelphia, almost all the way up to Pittsburgh and not quite Pittsburgh, I should say, but in my duties there is an awful lot of responsibility to make sure that our people are brought up to the latest codes in the electrical. code changes every three years and with that change there is major changes every three years that come out. A lot of our guys that work for us, okay, the contractors are the ones that has the license, the contractor is the one that has the responsibility to make sure that he is up on those codes, not the individual, the contractor has to. are going to allow a guy to go out and do electrical work because he has worked for

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some guy you have no idea whether or not he is capable of navigating the code. You have no idea. None. And that's the concern I have. It's a major concern I have. It's not an easy book to navigate, especially with changes occurring every three years but it's important that they know how to navigate that course, that code.

That test that supposedly the test that the City of Scranton gives or used to give hasn't been given in three years. Maybe that's where your problem lies. test hasn't been given. I have got guys right now saying to me that I have got my sons wanting to take the electrical exam and no one has given it in three years, so the problem is not with test, the problem is you haven't given the test. That's where the problem is. Don't walk away from a test requirement. It's the only sure way you know that the guy is capable of handling the It's the only way. It is the absolutely only way. To let it go is just irresponsible, I think. In all honesty, I mean that sincerely, and I know you guys

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personally. I know you wouldn't do something to jeopardize people. I'm trying to tell you from the heart this is not a road we should ever go down.

The City of Bethlehem has a test. The City of Allentown has a test. The City of Reading has a test. The City of Harrisburg has a test. What are we trying to do here? It just doesn't make any sense. I honestly and truly believe that there is a different way of doing this thing, you know. Get after that company that's supposed to issue that test. Get after them and, by the way, if guys are having a problem taking the test or they are saying that they can't pass the test there is companies all over that they can go to, they can do it on-line and they can practice those tests so they understand what it's all about, but don't let somebody just go through the door, the back door. That's a problem and that's a problem that's going to come to the residents of this community, you as city council members, you know, let's not have something like that. It's just not

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worthwhile, guys. I don't know what your reasoning is for doing it, but I honest and truly believe it's the wrong road. Thank you very much.

MR. WECHSLER: Rick Schraeder.

MR. SCHRAEDER: Thank you. Rick Good evening, Council. Schraeder. Thank you for the opportunity to address you. name is Rick Schrader. I'm the business manager of IBEW International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 81 located here on Wyoming Avenue in Scranton. I'm also here to speak on an ordinance 155 and revision of I had spoke before when this was brought before council and I just want to let you know I feel as though this is the same animal in different clothes. Our number one primary concern is the safety of the citizens of Scranton, and I'm sure every one of you sitting up there share the same concerns.

I cannot see for the sake, I have heard people say we need to have the city become more business friendly, that we need to have the city be able to have people come

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in here and not have to go through some red tape to do work in the City of Scranton. say that if that were red tape saves one life then you have done your job. I say that if there is one job that doesn't have a problem because of a fire that's in the house because we don't have people that were properly tested then it was worthwhile not I feel as though we heed to to do this. make sure that the people that are going to be doing the work are properly tested. We would support other changes that you had there, we would support some of the other parts of it, I understand some of it is going towards the residential and one, two family dwellings or multi-family homes or townhouses, and I have an understanding of that, but that's exactly where the people live and that's why we are cannot sacrifice the safety in any way, shape or form in order to have the city become more business friendly. I would rather the city be a safer city for our people to live where they are staying. As you know, and you're well aware almost any fire that takes place if

it's in the arson I would dare to say that it was almost always blamed on the electrical.

There is also other trades that are involved here. There is other construction groups, you know, with the steam lines, refrigerants, movers for ventilation, all of these things play into the safety of the people that are going to be in the dwellings. We see so many things that happened even with ventilation in the town where places had to be evacuated. We see where there is problems if there is a leak of refrigerants that we have to be careful of.

I think it's extremely important that we do a little examination of our conscience as to where we are going to go with this. We certainly want Scranton to be the best place it could for our families to live, for people to grow up and for the sounding areas to see the example that's being set by a city. Almost all of the major cities do have testing for their contractors within the city limits. The

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cities are the ones that are held to a higher standard, as every one of you Sitting there on council you understand. understand you are held to a higher standard than a Borough or municipality would be, you are where the people are in mass. represent them people that are here in Lackawanna County and I think it's important that we just take a hard look at this and I ask you for the safety of the people and for our friends, our relatives and our children that we make the right move and make sure that there is a test. I don't want to hear that someone isn't a good test taker. important that they understand what the code is, that's why the code is revised every three years. We need people that are up-to-date with it. We have a full apprenticeship program, but we would like to see even our people tested to make sure that they understand all of the responsibilities of the contractors. Thank you for your time tonight and he hope everyone has a happy Veteran's Day.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

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MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Schraeder, if I could ask you one question?

MR. SCHRAEDER: Sure.

MR. GAUGHAN: The Advisory Board, do you know if that has met, the Electrical Advisory Board?

MR. SCHRAEDER: The Electric Advisory Board I know that they have had one or two meetings, I will defer that. Casparo who will be coming up here, he sits on that board and I believe he would be better suited to tell you when they did I know that they did have one or two meetings, but it wasn't called officially like it should have been, it was someone that sat on that board for awhile. I think the board will oversee what is being done. I certainly would hope that we would not do away with them. You know, the city and to hear that an inspector goes out and inspects it afterwards he can't see through the walls. There is lot of older buildings in Scranton that are rewired and you know what, if we don't have, you know -- it's terrible that we don't have a city electrical

inspector now, I hope something could be done about that, but just to rely on a third party inspector not working for the city but working basically to go out and to inspect these jobs after the fact and they might stop in from time to time, they can't see through the walls. They don't know what's in back of that. You see a receptacle and you can't see in there once it's covered up. He doesn't know if it was done properly. He can only inspect what he has in front of him.

So, again, I implore you to try and think about, you know, having the Advisory Board and an inspector that would be working for the city on staff. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: I did ask about the electrical inspector and the plumbing inspector because we don't have either of those, and I was told that they can't find anyone qualified to do the job, which I find very hard to believe so --

MR. SCHRAEDER: Well, again, you know, I believe that I had sent over a couple of guys that I believe would be

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qualified, they need a master's license in order to do it. The city hasn't an issue a test for that license in over three years, as was previously stated so we have a multitude of issues here that maybe we need to try to address. I think that, you know, and if you weren't aware of it hopefully we are making you aware of it tonight, certainly would like to see the testing put back in place, that was one of the requirements for electrical inspector so we are very proud of the way that we do things through our apprenticeship program, through our training. We have ongoing training and certainly want to invite each and every council member to come up to our training facility to see what we are doing and maybe have a grasp on what takes place and our people. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Paul Casparo.

MR. CASPARO: Thank you,

Mr. President, Council. My name is Paul Casparo, I'm the president of Local 81 IBEW. I'm also Chairman of Code and Panel three of the National Electrical Code and that's been

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a nine-year cycle. Previous to that, I have been on the code panel for five other cycles which is a total of 15 years. I'm a resident of the City of Scranton for 64 years and I do pay taxes here.

Tonight I'm here to speak on the opposition to the amending the File of Council No. 155. We are in agreement with Section No. 2, the contractor's license, because of the testing that takes place in that section. We are not in agreement with Section 2-B, No. 4, and that states, "Alternate means for a master contractor license. Any licensed journeyman for which said journeyman has held a valid continual license for a period of eight years or more and that has the following information in addition to the existing application requirements," and here is the part, "Shall be exempt from the requirements of taking the master's test and shall be granted a master contractor license."

Additional requirements shall be W-2 forms, as they have already stated, letters of referral, recommendations and five

letters from customers. I mean, come on, really. So to be exempt from taking that test is not acceptable.

I'd like to ask Mr. Evans and Mr. Rogan, do you have a license to sell real estate?

MR. EVANS: Yes, we do.

MR. CASPARO: Did you have to take a test to get that license?

MR. EVANS: Yes, I did.

MR. CASPARO: So there it is. I mean, can you get killed selling real estate?

MR. PERRY: Depends on the price.

MR. CASPARO: You can get killed doing electrical work and you can kill people doing electrical work, you know, while doing faulty electrical work, killing some people, children, families, and so forth. Council, I ask you, do you have the liability -- if you sign off on this do you have the liability to take care of some family if their children or family members get killed? Are you going to be able to sleep at night knowing that you let

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something go through that isn't worthwhile and is not up to the standard? You know, we set the standard here for years in the City of Scranton to do everything right. We've tested for years and there's never been a problem, and this isn't a union/non-union issue we have -- a lot of our non-union counterparts contractors who are good friends of ours who get themselves educated and IAEI, International Association of Electrical Inspectors, they have classes once every two months, you can get yourself there and get ready for a test. There is online training that you can take practice tests, there is numerous sites there that you can get yourself ready to go so, you know, if you are able to live with yourself and being able to pass this without having these people tested and being properly trained and to do this work, you know, I'm not sure so, you know, we will leave that up to you. Hopefully, you will make the right decision and thank you for allowing me to speak and Happy Veteran's Day to all the veterans.

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MR. WECHSLER: Pat Dolan.

MR. DOLAN: Good evening, gentlemen.

My name is Pat Dolan, I'm the business manager with the pipefitters and plumbers here in Scranton. There is probably nothing new that I could add to what these gentlemen have already spoken to, but I'd just like to drive home a couple of points. To do anything to lessen the requirements for licensing in my mind is totally absurd. There has to be testing involved. Just because somebody says that you work for a contractor for a number of years and he could show it doesn't mean he has got broad knowledge of this trade. I don't care if it's in a mechanical side, plumbing, electrical, I mean, there are so many different avenues you can go down in each of those trades so that's why I believe the licensing should require testing. It's just to show that broad experience and training and anything to alleviate it I can't see the logic in it. I mean, you are talking about putting people's lives at risk.

And, again, the Licensing Board

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seems to be going by the wayside, I don't think everything should be up to the director. I really believe there needs to be a board but, again, I can't add anything new, these gentlemen have already pretty much covered all of real issues in here so please give it serious consideration and I'd like to thank our veterans. Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

Marie Schumacher. As excited as I was to witness an over 73 percent turnout in seeing people actually come out to vote on Tuesday, I was disappointed to pick up the paper and see that the Young family and their neighbors had to go to Court and hire an attorney to get the satisfaction that they need from this city. It seems more should have been done for them, most of it a long time ago.

And the next thing I'd like to talk about is something that occurred in last week's caucus in the back room, I believe Mr. Evans it was you who brought up the fact of a property on Crown Avenue that was

MS. SCHUMACHER: For a delinquent CDBG loan if the city doesn't go after them what is -- what starts the clock running on whether or not the statute of limitation expires for going after those people?

MR. MINORA: Well, it probably would be governed by the contract itself, but ordinarily in non-criminal cases there is a four-year statute of limitation for contract actions so that's the general answer I can give you and at the best I can give you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: So it's not tied to anything like when the last payment was made or --

MR. MINORA: It could be. It depends on, that's what I said, it depends on the agreement.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, well, then, Mr. Rogan, I'm going to amend that question that I had asked and that is would you ask them also to tell us when the statute of limitations expires for each of those delinquent loans?

MR. ROGAN: First I'll ask if there is a blanket -- and, again, we'll see if there is a blanket policy regarding that or if it isn't on --

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I still would like to know individually because I know there are a lot of big ones in there whether

or not they are --

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MR. ROGAN: Sure.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you.

Everything I'm saying MS. FRANUS: like every week is just my opinion, of course. First of all, I'd like to say I don't believe there would be any justification in this world for any of you to limit what those contractors are saying. There shouldn't be any justification if you do not make sure that they have a license to take a test. I mean, what is it -- like they said, what is one life worth? house burns down and one person gets killed, that would be on your heads, it really would. It be your responsibility because you are the one that are making these rules and it is imperative that you make sure that everybody takes a test. No excuse for nothing, for anything around here. Nothing. So, please, like I said, there is no excuse you can give that will be good enough. None. And every one of them are professional and they do know what they are talking about.

I'd like to bring up something about it's an election year and you probably won't raise taxes too much because it's an election year. Mr. Rogan, I know you were on the council with Jack Loscombe and Frank Joyce and Janet Evans and they raised taxes 22 percent and you sat there and you said, "I will not raise taxes on the people, I will not do that."

But since you have been in office now you have raised taxes I'd say about 83 percent with Mayor Doherty's 57 percent but coming two months later Bill Courtright took office so you would take the -- you wanted to make sure he had that money available.

Taxes and bills wouldn't be as bad for him so for someone who never raised taxes when it was 22 percent went from that to 83 percent. People should really think about electing you again. And you were also a person that said you wanted term limits, two terms for councilmen and here you are.

MR. ROGAN: This is my second term; correct.

MS. FRANUS: This is going to your

1 last term; right? How many years are you in 2 already? 3 MR. ROGAN: Seven years. MS. FRANUS: Okay, so when you get 4 5 elected again how many more years would that be? 6 7 MR. ROGAN: Who said I was running 8 again? 9 MS. FRANUS: You are not going to 10 run again? 11 MR. ROGAN: I haven't even thought 12 about it. 13 MS. FRANUS: If you are --14 MR. ROGAN: The general election for president ended two days ago, I haven't even 15 16 thought about it. 17 MS. FRANUS: Oh, I'm sure you 18 haven't. I'm sure you haven't. People 19 better remember this. Now, another thing, 20 the garbage fee, I talked about this last 21 week and, Mr. Evans, you said to me that you 22 have no control over the people that are 23 doing the study as to when they get this 24 done. That's not true. I have been talking 25 about this garbage fee for almost a year

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now, maybe more than a year and I have never been able to get the figures and you yourself and Mr. Perry said that \$300 was It was just -- it wasn't the too much. right amount that people should be paying, it was too much, so then you wanted to have a study, which you are going to, do and you are the ones that wanted the study to get the right figures for this coming year. You were the ones. The grant was approved in June so there is no reason in the world why you couldn't go after whoever is doing this, PEL people, whoever it is, to tell them we need this -- we need this study done for the budget, which is due next week or November So how could you sit there and say you had no control and you can just pick up that phone and go and see them any time you want, but the reason I think is because since you get can't raise taxes too much next year because it's an election year, God forbid, you want to keep the garbage fee at \$300 to get that much more money in.

MR. EVANS: Well, I don't want to keep the garbage fee at \$300 I'll tell you

1 right now. I never did. 2 MS. FRANUS: Well, let's see what 3 you do. I don't think the 10 percent you pay it all once is good enough. That's only 4 \$30 off. 5 MR. EVANS: Well, that's your 6 7 opinion. Up until that changed that was the 8 first positive change to reduce the garbage 9 fee ever. 10 MS. FRANUS: What happened to your 11 idea -- it shouldn't have been 300 in the 12 first place. 13 MR. EVANS: Well, the feedback I got 14 on the senior discount, which we are going to talk about now, was the fact that it 15 16 would be too difficult to administer so 17 that's why we implemented the 10 percent 18 discount for everybody. 19 MS. FRANUS: If they pay it all the 20 once; right? 21 MR. EVANS: If they pay it all at 22 once. 23 MS. FRANUS: Yeah, not many people 24 could pay it all at once, Wayne. Whatever 25 happened to your idea about the senior

1 citizen discount? 2 MR. EVANS: I wanted to do a senior 3 discount, but I was told that it was too 4 cumbersome and too difficult to administer. By who? How is it? 5 MS. FRANUS: How come Abington Township and Clarks Summit 6 7 could do it? 8 MR. EVANS: How many people live in 9 Abington Township? 10 MS. FRANUS: A lot of people. Many, 11 many, many. 12 MR. EVANS: --- (unintelligible) 13 2,000. 14 MS. FRANUS: Wayne, I don't have the 15 exact amount, but let me tell you they 16 didn't have a problem administering it. Ιf 17 you have a problem administering a senior 18 citizen discount then we have a real big 19 problem with Dave Bulzoni and the 20 administration. 21 Well, why we were MR. EVANS: 22 waiting for that to happen we initiated the 23 10 percent discount which is at least doing 24 something. 25 MS. FRANUS: Oh, not enough.

1	MR. EVANS: That way all the
2	citizens pay, by the way
3	MS. FRANUS: No, you could still
4	give the senior citizens a discount. Don't
5	forget, it went from \$189 to \$300 and you
6	even said that was too much.
7	MR. EVANS: Well, I didn't vote for

10	than if the money coming in is more than
11	what's going out that's a tax, not a fee.
12	MR. EVANS: That's why we are doing
13	the study.
14	MS. FRANUS: That's right, and that
15	study could have been done
16	MR. EVANS: I will find out the
17	status of the study
18	MS. FRANUS: Pardon me?
19	MR. EVANS: I will find out the
20	status of that study for next week and let
21	you know.
22	MS. FRANUS: Next week. It was June
23	that the money was approved and you sat on
24	this all of this time, I believe on purpose.
25	MR FVANS: I didn't sit on the

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1	study.
2	MS. FRANUS: Did you do anything
3	since June?
4	MR. EVANS: I have no stance, Fay,
5	to sit on a study. I want the study done as
6	much as you do.
7	MS. FRANUS: Well, then how come it
8	hasn't been done since June?
9	MR. EVANS: I don't know, we'll find
10	out.
11	MS. FRANUS: So you can all of a
12	sudden find out. You never, ever asked
13	since June?
14	MR. EVANS: I have asked about it
15	several times, about where is the study and
16	what is the status of it and it's ongoing.
17	That was my that was the answer.
18	MS. FRANUS: Oh, well that's really
19	a lot of pressure.

1	you're not going to raise taxes that much.

3	with it.
4	MS. FRANUS: I don't believe you at
5	all, and you there is no doubt in my mind
6	you can give a senior citizen discount.
7	None. You just don't want to. Too
8	cumbersome. That's the biggest joke in the
9	book.
10	MR. EVANS: I would do it right now
11	if I could do it.
12	MS. FRANUS: Pardon me?
13	MR. EVANS: We don't implement that,
14	the administration does. I would do it
15	tomorrow.
16	MS. FRANUS: Oh, I
17	MR. EVANS: If it was up to me and
18	not the administration I would do it

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident and taxpayer. I have
a little question, tomorrow is Veteran's

Day, is there trash removal tomorrow?

MR. EVANS: Pardon?

MR. DOBRZYN: In my neighborhood.

MR. EVANS: I think Friday --

MR. WECHSLER: They are off Tuesday, they will be working tomorrow.

MR. DOBRZYN: What's that?

MR. WECHSLER: They will be working tomorrow, but they will be off Monday.

MR. DOBRZYN: Oh, okay. Okay.

MR. EVANS: They swapped.

MR. DOBRZYN: Thank you. I'd also like to remind you that our neighborhood gets slighted on recyclables on hard winters. Once again, 2014 issues coming up please try to figure out something to do with that and it would be nice but if I agree it would be hard to verify to cut somebody back, sell them a certain size barrel and if they are elderly or whatever hopefully something like that can be done so

we could have a little less consternation around here.

Once again, try and do something for these poor people down there in Greenridge, the Youngs. It's ashame and, you know, all too often I have heard city officials, especially an executive or the county when they lose a lawsuit we got insurance. Well, if I ran around drinking and driving and causing accidents I got insurance, too, but what would happen to it, you know? It goes up and then so hopefully we could resolve that before it ever goes to Court.

And on the sale of the Sewer

Authority, I kind of regard that as a done deal. It's going to happen. I didn't really favor it, but we have the Wall Street debacle in 2007 and I'm very concerned that if that money is contributed to the pension funds and lost what happens then? Once again, I'd like to bring up the social security system, these public pensions and public safety workers should be rolled into a special social security, they should be given a special retirement age based on

their work -- expected work life and it's a -- it's ridiculous we have 500 and some school districts and they all have their own pension funds it get crazy.

estate, if you encourage too many young families to move in you might get some taxes out of it for the city but what's going to happen to the school taxes so that's something to consider. Scranton Lace, please, no \$414,000 apartments like North Scranton. Everybody was glad that it was done but, you know, at \$414,000 you could have probably each one of those apartments could have paid for a ranch house.

And we had a presidential election, once again, call Congress, no matter who you are or who you voted for, 1-202-224-3121 and tell them to can the Transpacific pack, and 1-202-456-1111 and tell the White House to can the Transpacific pack. Never was I ashamed of a ballot than this last one. They had a little -- no taste about, "Do you believe the judge should retire at 75," when it should have read "The current age of retirement is now 70, should we raise it to 75," but they didn't do that. This is what's wrong with America. This is why Trump is in there. People don't tell things plainly. They slant them and they slant them too much.

To me, the greatest threat to democracy is political treason. The politicians that sell their vote out, that do things for certain individuals for their own benefit. This is what's destroying the

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republic. I have never approved of the Supreme Court saying how this money can be spent on different candidates. To me, that weakens democracy. You should never be allowed to spend oodles of money on any It doesn't -- it doesn't do candidate. nothing for democracy. It's just slanted. It's like buying an election, and that's not right. Scranton does the same thing. took a multi-million dollar garage and said a dollar, we sold it for a dollar. send in here and there to find out how much actually that garage was worth? bringing in over \$300,000 a year and had the potential to bring in a heck of a lot more with the county buying the Globe. Was that I knew it was malfeasance. right? No. called for something, but in this city we'll never get it. Maybe in the state we'll never get it. If the state can put out something like that on a national ballot, there is no hope for democracy in the state.

Trump maybe is right. We need more than a shake up, we need a concerted effort to clean out politicians and decisions made

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by politicians or put in penalties for politicians that can be sued instead of being immune. To me, that would be the best that we can sue a person for his vote, let him going to Court, let him see if the people think he was right or wrong. that would increase democracy throughout the whole nation. But we are not interested in democracy. We waive the flag for the veterans. I served, I'm a veteran, but I wouldn't say I want to waive the flag for I did my duty. I don't how much money you would make for building all them townhouses if you were to use people that weren't exactly qualified. I know have you to pay a fair prevailing rate if you get federal, but I don't know if you have to pay benefits. I'm

a little gone from that. It's been a long time since I retired from the building trades, but I did my duty when I was there, too. I had to go to school, constantly went to school for years and years and years.

The state oversaw us. Every time we turned a new elevator over a city inspector was there and after three months an insurance inspector would come and check the job, too. Constantly check it because it had to do with people and safety.

How you can look at something and say Joe Blow from Kokomo can get a master's license because he got some papers that said I worked instead of actually did he run the job, how many people did he have working under him? There is whole bunch of qualifications. Like, I went to school, I'm going to say it, repeat it, I went to school all of the time I worked for the elevator business constantly, because they constantly changed. Laws came from the state, laws came from the federal government, laws came from everybody, and we have who keep up on the laws, and I was a mechanic and I did my

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duty the best I could in that field. I never was satisfied with the job, but I always ran. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A

MOTIONS.

MR. PERRY: Yes, I have a couple of things. First, I would to recognize the boy scout troop up there, guys.

MR. WECHSLER: That's No. 16.

MR. PERRY: No. 16. Thanks for coming. You guys are welcome back any time, thank you. I guess I was going to wait until we got to -- but, let's talk a little bit about 5-B. I'm very flexible with 5-B when it comes to certain issues, but what I'm not flexible with is when it comes to proper testing. That's something that when this legislation came out, I believe it was in March, I was very vocal about it that I think there was some assets to legislation, but where it fell short was when you put somebody with tools in their hand in a home in the City of Scranton I want to make sure they are qualified as could be and I think

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proper testing is really the only way to prove that so that's a stance that I'm going to be firm with. When it comes to 5-B that's all I'm going to say as far as that.

Also, I would like to read a letter here in honor of Veteran's Day. Veteran's Day is very important holiday to me and my family, we have lots -- a lot of people in this area do, we have lots of people, family relatives that served, some that came back, some that didn't and, you know, to me this sums it up. Vantey Barford was born June 24 years later on March 23, 1944, Mr. Barford who was now an enlisted member of the United States Army stationed fighting in Italy set out alone to fight German machine gun positions for gunfire was raining down on his fellow soldiers. advanced took him through a minefield, but having done so proceeded single handedly to take out three enemy machine gun positions returning with seven prisoners of war by himself, and if that wasn't enough he later destroyed three German tanks that didn't -and that didn't make much news during the

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scope of the war, but it did earn Van T.

Barfoot, who retired as a colonel after also serving in Korea and Vietnam, a

well-deserved Congressional medal of honor.

What did make the news, however, was his Neighborhood Association's quibble with how the 90-year veteran chose to fly an American flag outside his home in Virginia. It seems that HOA rules said it was okay to fly a flag that was mounted bracket only on a house, but to fly an independent flag pole was not allowed. His application for a flag pole was denied. He erected it anyway and faced possible Court action unless he agreed to take it down. The story made national news and the neighborhood rethought it's position and agreed to indulge this aging hero who lived among them and let him put the flag pole up.

He was quoted as saying, "In the time I have left, I plan to continue to fly without interference."

As well he should. As well he should. And if any of his neighbors had taken notice or contested this further they

might have done well to read his Medal of
Honor citation first. It indicates that
Mr. Van T. Barfoot wasn't particularly good
at backing down at anything. So to
Mr. Barfoot and to all the men and women who
served or are still serving our country, I
say thank you. That's all I have.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Perry.
Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, very well said by Mr. Perry. I'd also like to welcome our guests, very nice to have you here today and we actually have a very packed house. We don't normally have this many people here so it's good to see so many people here.

Last Friday myself and Councilman

Evans did attend the mayor's State of the

City address and it was good to hear from

the mayor and also hear from members of the

business community who were at that address

as well and I know we spoke to afterwards.

A couple of items regarding the agenda tonight, as Mr. Perry mentioned regarding the testing that was brought up, I do have a real estate license, I have an

insurance license as well, and the fact that the city hasn't had a test in this many years is troubling. If there are people that want to do a job, they should have the opportunity to test to do that job.

Regarding the legislation, as I said, I was in support of the legislation last time around, Mr. Hinton has agreed to come in next week to speak with us about changes that were made. At that point, I will listen to what Mr. Hinton has to say and make my decision, but if the legislation hasn't changed substantially, even though I did support it in the past, if it doesn't have the majority of the board there is no reason to move forward if substantial changes haven't been made, but I am interested in hearing from Mr. Hinton and see what he has to say.

Regarding an update on the double pension investigation, Attorney Minora did brief us in caucus regarding the subpoenas to obtain information on this investigation and Attorney Minora did let us know that he has a draft of the subpoena written and

hopefully next week that will be filed at the courthouse. I did ask as a follow-up for a timeline, and there is really I guess three things that can happen, the state police could turn over their investigation to us at point in time, they could challenge it at two different levels, and it can -- this may go into 2017 if it's challenged as far the legal battle going back and forth whether to determine whether council does, in fact, have a subpoena power.

So it's something I'll be continuing to press forward on until we get answers and until we find out what happened to those millions of dollars that were wrongfully given out.

The election, obviously, was

Tuesday. I know the presidential election
has gotten all of the attention, but I do
want to congratulate our state
representatives, Kevin Haggerty, who was
just elected to the House as well as my
State Representative Marty Flynn, who won
another decisive victory in his district as
well. So I would like to congratulate both

of them and looking forward to continue working with Mr. Flynn, and to work with Mr. Haggerty actually for a second time.

And finally, although, my words won't be as eloquent as Mr. Perry's were, I would also like to thank all veterans who give us the rights that we are exercising in these meetings every Thursday so a big thank you to all our veterans. And that is all. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. Happy
Veteran's Day to everyone and to all of our
veterans. Thank you very much for all you
have done for all of us. A shout out to
Troop 16, where was Troop 16 based?

AUDIENCE MEMBER: South Scranton.

MR. EVANS: South Scranton. That's the one that I was a member of. I know Scout 16 used to go to Manning's Student Center.

MR. WECHSLER: That's right. Troop

10. F-Troop.

MR. EVANS: F-Troop. All right, I

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remember it well. Thank you, Joe, for reminding me. I was in city hall for a meeting on Monday with PEL and my schedule permitted so I sat in through a second meeting about the LED streetlight project so I'm just going to give you a brief update on that. A couple of takeaways were there are approximately 230 polls that were targeted for painting, pressure wash and painted. Approximately 44 more architectural polls have been identified in the downtown area that need painting and that process will begin as soon as well. There will be over 6,000 lights that have been identified and replaced plus some additional lighting along the Heritage Trails, so because of the ordering constraints the worst case scenario that the lighting will begin sometime in January. If the fixtures come in earlier, then the project will start before the end There has also been some of the year. conversations possibly with some of the universities to do some special lighting around their campuses that could be very, very interesting and exciting development

that takes place.

Other issues I have, I will reserve for agenda items so that's all I have for tonight.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. Just a few items. First of all, if we could send another correspondence to the Business Administrator, Mr. Wechsler informed us tonight that we do not have a third party administrator for the police and fire pensions yet so if we could find out what the holdup on that is I would appreciate it.

We received information from the Business Administrator about a program I think can be extremely beneficial to the City of Scranton and our municipal unions. GovInvest is an actuarial technology company which has built an analytical tool to replace much actuarial what-if work by producing clear actuarial analysis to empower government agencies to better budget and negotiate with labor groups.

The software is very intuitive and

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easy to use and does not require a finance person to be able to use and understand the software. It will help the city manage their pension and other post-employment benefit liabilities. The value of this program, from what I can see, is multi-faceted. The information used and produced is based on realtime data and the city will no longer have to wait weeks for an actuary to produce and complicated Instead, the analysis is done report. instantaneously and saves time and money normally spent on the actuary.

The software is able to convey an otherwise complicated but important issue to decision makers and stakeholders, and in light of the all of the city's troubles with the pensions I think that this would be a very smart move and from what I can see looking at the proposal I think we would actually end up saving money, so I would hope that the administration moves forward with that project.

We sent a letter out on October 14 about the concerns with the lack of

recycling in housing projects and apartment buildings throughout the city and I would like if we could send that again and ask for a response from our recycling coordinator.

A letter was also sent out October 7 asking who from the city was collecting information regarding damage to people's homes from the July 2016 flood. I am getting concerns from residents about this information so I would ask that if we can send that again, please.

with the budget set to be unveiled next week, it's due on November 15, I would like to ask my colleagues if they would be willing to send a letter on behalf of this council to Mayor Courtright inviting him to a public caucus so that he may present his 2017 budget, so if no one has any objections to that I would appreciate if that letter can be sent.

Received good news from the residents of Phelps Street praising our DPW for their tree trimming job that was done which has brightened up their lot significantly, and a new streetlight should

be arriving shortly according to our DPW director and our city engineer so I would like to thank them for that.

As was mentioned, tomorrow is

Veteran's Day. Let us remember the service
and great sacrifice of our veterans. I

would like to thank each one of them for all
that they have given to our country,
especially my father, Jack Gaughan, United

States Marine Corp veteran, and also a happy
birthday to the Marine Corp, it's their
241st, and my grandfather Bill Gaughan and
Edward Trently, United States Army. Thank
you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,
Mr. Gaughan. Just a few comments on the
proposed contractor legislation. Next week
there will be public caucus which would be
held here in chambers. That will be at 6
p.m., and at this caucus we will have -besides Mr. Hinton we will have John Marino,
who will also be here to assist Mr. Hinton
and answer some questions about this
proposed legislation.

As our colleagues have spoken about,

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we are going to focus on amending this legislation to include testing. That is our main concern. We do have to work on this legislation to make sure that we protect the safety of our citizens and make sure that quality work is done. We also have to be able to assure that we are issuing permits in the proper fashion that we can get work There are a lot of done in our area. construction projects that are coming to Scranton and there is an issue right now where city council is being blamed for delaying the issuing of permits. cannot be further from the truth. Our goal is to protect the citizens of Scranton. goal is to protect them while encouraging business and accusing council of being a roadblock to business I find very disheartening. We are here to protect the people and that's what we are doing, so we also want to encourage business but we want to protect our citizens as well, so the quicker we can get this cleaned up, that we have confidence in our system again the better it will be for the city.

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And following up on comments that Mr. Rogan made about the election and state representatives, I believe right now that as a result of the elections we see that there is a hunger from the people for reforms in politics. There is a hunger in this state for pension reform and property tax reform. The legislature right now is solidly controlled by one party. I'm not a member of that party, but the legislature has a responsibility to move these reforms along, especially in the case of the pension Scranton is trying all it can do to reform. get our pension and our financial house in order, but we do need assistance from the state legislature for helping us do that so I would encourage them when they get back to work in January to focus on these problems to bring us some relief.

In regards to Mr. Gaughan mentioned the recycling coordinator, I was at a meeting the other night and Mr. Lynott from the Housing Authority was at the same meeting and he did tell me that he has met with the recycling coordinator Lynch. Now,

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I haven't seen any reports on it, I don't know what the result of that meeting was, but they have met so I'm not sure what the progress is of implementing that plan.

And Mr. Evans touched on Troop 16, Troop 16 was my Cub Scout pack. I'm very proud of Troop 16. I go back to Mr. Warner and Ralph Roberston, two great men from South Side who inspired many youths in I did transfer to Troop 10 on Scranton. East Mountain and it was F-Troop. One of my greatest disappointments was that I did not become an Eagle Scout, but I enjoyed scouting and I congratulate you guys for making it through the whole meeting. one guy fell asleep, right there. You can touch him, he is still sleeping. He is well rested up there. And that's all I have.

MR. WECHSLER: At this time, I'll entertain a motion that Item 5-B be introduced into its proper committee.

We already had this conversation, as many of the gentlemen had spoken tonight, we shared the concerns and that's why it was defeated three to two back in March. Obviously, the mayor and Mr. Hinton didn't get that message. From what I can see, not much has been changed. The same concerns that I had back in March I have now. You know, my wife had a baby two weeks ago and if the doctor walked into the room and had a W-2 and if a letter from one of our friends I would have passed out right there on the floor. I knew she was qualified. I knew she took the test to become a doctor, so for me this is a concern that we are sacrificing the safety of our residents in order for convenience and making things easier.

And the other thing that concerns me even more is, as Mr. Wechsler had mentioned and I hear this often, that Mr. Hinton is denying, and has told me he denied well over 200 contractor's licenses and he is blaming this council. It's my opinion that

Mr. Hinton is wielding his power in a very negative way up in that office and there is many other things up in the Licensing and Inspections Office that I am deeply concerned about and that is one of them.

One of the questions that has come up that I would like an answer is why hasn't the test been given? Why aren't the Electrical Advisory Board meetings been held? And I asked that back in March and I never got an answer to it.

Again, usually I would vote to introduce this so that we could discuss it, it's already been discussed. And the other thing that I also find absurd is that this legislation will be sent down and Mr. Hinton did not include a summary of the changes that he was being made -- that was being made to the legislation. So, again, I'm voting on this tonight for those reasons. Thank you.

MR. EVANS: On the question, I'd like to remind everybody this is the first reading, there will be three readings.

We'll meet with Mr. Hinton next week and

hear what he says to say. Most importantly, obviously will be the seventh reading. We either say yes or no so I'll be voting yes just to move it along and hear from Mr. Hinton next week.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, on this issue, I think this does give us an opportunity for us to define what we want this ordinance to be. Obviously, there is a need for improvement and how we issue licenses and the input that we received so far from the professionals leads me to belive that there is something that we can do here to nail this down and make it acceptable to the people in the profession, union/non-union so I think that's something that I'm going to look forward to working on as we move along.

If we can't reach an agreement on improvement, I'm not sure what the alternative is if Mr. Hinton does not issue the licenses or permits, I'm sorry, so we have a few weeks to work on this and improve it and get to a point where I feel that the safety of citizens is not effected.

MR. ROGAN: I would just add that I

agree with most of what was mentioned.

We'll hear what Mr. Hinton has to say on the changes and it is a -- looking at it, it's a bigger piece of legislation and, unfortunately, it wasn't itemized as to what was in the old legislation but what the changes that actually made were. I'm also very concerned that the length of time, and this has been reported to me before tonight, but the length of time between testing is unacceptable. If somebody wants to work in a field and they have the qualifications to

do it they should be allowed to take a test.

Most other industries if you meet qualifications, for instance, real estate was mentioned, if you meet the qualifications to test you pay a fee, you sign up and go to a testing center and you take a test. That to me seems pretty simple. That should be how that should be administered, and it really wouldn't cost the city any money if was done on a third party basis like most other professional licenses in the state are issued, so that's something I will be looking forward to

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discussing with Director Hinton and Mr. Marino at next week's meeting.

MR. PERRY: I pretty much said my peace on this and my stance is pretty clear. I'm in the food service industry and the very first thing a health inspector does when he walks into my restaurant is he looks at my certificate and that I passed all my tests and I'm up to all of the codes and all of the new health regulations. The very first thing before he even checks the temperature, before he does anything, he asks, "Mr. Perry, where's your certificate? Is it up-to-date? What was the last date and what was the score," and then he goes on with it because without that you can't get in the game. Without food safety in my business you don't have the right to operate a restaurant, that's first, and I believe that's the same way when it comes to anything with any danger when there is a public safety risk foodborne illness or fire hazard, electrocution or whatever the case may be. That safety piece is the foundation of where you go from there, so I'm going to

After 20 years of less than mediocre results in the registration of rental properties, the work again will shift back to the Licensing and Inspection Department for implementation. We should continue to support LIPS in this endeavor if need be whether it be through a use of a third party vendor or we have the vital information on properties and property owners in whatever other way or resource they may need to finally get the job done at the highest levels.

MR. ROGAN: I would just add, as I

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mentioned in previous weeks, a few of the significant changes, the two biggest ones are the fee, there is no longer a \$150 per building fee, the fees are just on a per unit basis, that's one large change. Another one that I have been fighting for many years and finally good to see it implemented is a comprehensive family exemption. So if you are renting to a mother, a child, a grandson within the immediate family you do not pay any fee to register your property in the City of Scranton. And, finally, most importantly, is protections are included for neighborhood groups which have always been in the legislation that it's done in a way that is not contradictory to law in other municipalities and states that have been struck down by a number of the courts.

The previous ordinance was subject to a lawsuit and anyone who has followed the city other the last few decades knows when the City of Scranton goes to Court it never ends well. So my hope is that this legislation will end, that litigation can be

settled and we can finally move forward to
the rental registration program that is fair
in everyone, landlords, tenants and
neighbors.

MR. EVANS: Yeah, one additional comment or two, mandatory inspections are no longer in this. That was a sticking point, of course, for a lot of landlords and a lot of property use advocates; and, secondly, the sticker I think is an innovative approach to allow for identification of units that are in rental register -- already registered as rental units so I think that's going to go a long way for lobbying for identification.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes. I would like to thank Councilman Rogan and Councilman Evans and Solicitors Minora and Shrive and also Director Hinton for the time that they spent in coming up with this new ordinance. My biggest thing that I see, the biggest plus of this is, as Councilman Rogan said, it should eliminate the current situation that we are supposed to and also protects us from other lawsuits such as has happened in Ohio

1 and even in Wilkes-Barre, but they are 2 rental registrations so I think this puts us 3 in a good place and actually establishes a 4 program that we really wanted was to get 5 people registered.
