19	WHEREAS, in 2016, an estimated
20	53,070 people in the United States will be
21	diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, one of the
22	deadliest cancers, and 41,780 will die from
23	the disease; and
24	WHEREAS, pancreatic cancer surpassed
25	breast cancer this year to become the third

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1	leading cause of cancer death in the United
2	States, and it is projected to become the
3	second leading cause by 2020; and
4	WHEREAS, pancreatic cancer is the
5	only major cancer with a five-year relative
6	survival rate in the single digits at just
7	eight percent; and
8	WHEREAS, when symptoms of pancreatic
9	cancer present themselves, it is generally
10	later stages, and 71 percent of pancreatic
11	cancer patients die within the first year of
12	their diagnosis; and.
13	WHEREAS, approximately 2,090 deaths
14	will occur in Pennsylvania in 2016; and.
15	WHEREAS, pancreatic cancer is the
16	seventh most common cause of cancer related
17	death in men and women across the worlds;
18	and
19	WHEREAS, there will be an estimated
20	418,451 new pancreatic cancer cases
21	diagnosed worldwide in 2020; and
22	WHEREAS, the good health and
23	well-being of the residents of Scranton are
24	enhanced as a direct result of increased
25	awareness about pancreatic cancer and

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1	research into early detection, causes, and
2	effective treatments.
3	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that
4	Scranton City Council wishes to designate
5	Thursday, November 17, 2016, as "WORLD
6	PANCREATIC CANCER DAY" in Scranton.
7	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this
8	Proclamation be made a permanent part of the
9	Minutes of this Council.
10	MS. SAUNDERS: On behalf of the
11	Pancreatic Cancer Action Network and the
12	volunteers here today he would like to thank
13	you very much for the observance and
14	declaring today World Pancreatic Cancer Day.
15	Obviously, it's a very personal group, it's
16	a very personal issue for all of us here
17	today. We have all lost someone we love to
18	pancreatic cancer so just some facts, again,
19	to reiterate some of the things you have
20	already ready. Pancreatic cancer is the
21	third leading cause of cancer deaths in the
22	United States and is anticipated to be the
23	second by 2020. Pancreatic kills more
24	people than breast cancer. Here in the
25	northeast pancreatic cancer is an issue. It

is on the rise. My husband, Jay Saunders, was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer when he was 45 years old and he lived two years with this horrible disease. He was the exception. 76 percent diagnosed will die within the first year, and the five-year survival rate is only 8 percent. In 2010, 43,000 individuals were diagnosed that year and in 2016 it is predicted that over 53,000 individuals will be diagnosed and 42,000 will die.

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There are no screenings or early detection methods for pancreatic cancer. Cancer can develop for up to 17 years before signs and symptoms present themselves and then it's too late and surgery is not an option. There are no effective treatments for pancreatic cancer and they are often quite harsh and difficult for patients to tolerate. And lastly, there is in cure.

Research is desperately needed to develop screenings, find a cause and find a cure and that is why funding is so critical for without funding there is no research and there will be no cure. Funding for the cancer correlates with survival rates.
Breast cancer, prostate cancer, colon
cancer, have received an enormous of
research dollars over the years and they
have the highest five-year survival rates,
they also have screening tools, which
pancreatic cancer does not.

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The Pancreatic Cancer Action Network's goal is to double the survival rates by 2020. Two years ago when this initiative began the five-year survival rate was just 6 percent, and although it's a slim increase, the five-year survival rate is now 8 percent. This is in part due to the efforts of the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network and their efforts had increasing federal and private dollars for research so there is hope to find a cure for this disease but funding and research is critical to the success of this goal.

We would like to thank you for your support in helping us create awareness, wage hope and for declaring November 17, 2016, World Pancreatic Cancer Day. Thank you. MR. WECHSLER: Dispense with the

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Also, I'd like to though when we are going see an RFP so we can see the qualifications that are going to be required for this position. budget that there is not going to be a tax hike this year. I have been coming to these meetings for 14 years now and this is the first year in all of those years that we haven't had a tax hike. I think that's great news for the citizens. I think that's great news. I think the mayor is doing a good job contrary to what some council people might think and some speakers that come to this podium. There is new business moving down town. I read in the paper today where a new restaurant is coming in where the Banshee was so I think the city is looking much better than it did 14 years ago.

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The only thing I didn't like in the budget is still having \$300 illegal garbage fee, which I talked about for years and years and years. We pay our property taxes to have our garbage collected, and it was put into effect to pay tipping fees, which I've said in the past the tipping fees will be paid this year. We shouldn't have the garbage fee, but you people you sit there and do something about it, you didn't do a

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1	thing about it, all I hear we are waiting
2	for a study, we're waiting for a study. You
3	don't need a study. It's illegal. We pay
4	our property taxes to have our garbage
5	picked up. No argument with that.
6	Oh, and I did speak to former Mayor
7	Connors, he tried to do away with the
8	garbage fee but the council at that time
9	voted against him, so you people have the
10	ability to do away with the garbage fee but
11	you really don't do anything to help the
12	taxpayers.
13	Next thing, I haven't been here
14	sense the article came out in the state
15	police investigation for the double
16	pensions, kind of convenient that Chris
17	Doherty got away with giving those double
18	pensions out and state police said the
19	statute of limitations was up. I asked for
20	an investigation 10, 12 years ago and I said
21	Chris Doherty was as corrupt as Cordaro and
22	Munchack and kind of convenient that the
23	state police said the statute of limitations
24	is up. This investigation should have been
25	12 years ago.

Moving on to another subject I've talked about for a long time, the terrible streets on Sumner Avenue, five, six, seven eight hundred blocks. Last meeting I attended, Council Perry, you said you were going to go up and look at those blocks, did you have a chance to go up there?

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MR. PERRY: Yeah, they match a lot of other city sheets. They are not very We have been getting numerous reports good. since that time we have had -- we had a meeting with Mr. Hazzouri and Mr. Pocius, the engineer, on pave cuts and we are getting recent updates on what streets and what are getting fixed and a timeline so that information has been coming in so at least what we are trying to do is hold their feet to the fire a little bit, not just letting residents in the dark on what's happening and when. There is street close to where I live, Colliery Avenue, Councilman Gaughan is aware of it, too. I'm not even sure how to explain it, it's just -- it's crazy, as you can understand.

MR. SPINDLER: Terrible.

MR. PERRY: And that looks like it's 1 2 not going to get done until the springtime, 3 and it's unfortunate but at least I can tell someone that now. Before I was kind of in 4 the same boat you were, I wasn't sure what 5 6 to say, so we are getting information, they 7 know that the citizens want to know, they 8 know that we want to know, and they are 9 giving us information, they are getting it 10 either from the gas company, the water 11 company, or whether it's something schedule 12 to be done by the city. 13 MR. ROGAN: And on those one in West 14 Side, Mr. Hazzouri actually messaged me on Wednesday that the paving is beginning on 15 16 that section so -- and this is the pave cut 17 streets that had the utility work, they 18 actually will be done before winter. I 19 actually just pulled it up on Wednesday, so 20 they started to pave the West Side project 21 so you know. 22 MR. SPINDLER: Are they just going 23 to -- kind of where they --24 MR. ROGAN: No, this the whole 25 street.

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1	MR. SPINDLER: Oh, that will be
2	great if they do it of because, as I said,
3	two of those blocks were recently paved
4	about a year ago and they are terrible.
5	Next thing, I brought up last
6	meeting was also about the street markings
7	on the corner of Jackson and Main and Oram
8	and Main going the one direction and there
9	is markings that are in one direction not
10	the other.
11	MR. PERRY: I remember,
12	Mr. Spindler. We did send a letter out and
13	I will do follow-up to see where we are with
14	that. If the State I did ask if that's
15	our responsibility or I'll follow-up on
16	that.
17	MR. SPINDLER: Okay, thank you for
18	all your help and I'd like to wish everyone
19	a happy and healthy Thanksgiving. That's
20	all I have.

22	MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.
23	Well, the first thing I have here tonight
24	is, you know, there's been a couple of
25	statements here made about the pensions, the

double pensions. The truth of the matter is that at the time that all of this stuff took place the council should have used it's powers and did an investigation and issued subpoenas at that time, and to do it at this time just proves a point that the city government is just so broken and so dysfunctional that it's remarkable because we are doing an investigation much too late, and I think everybody knows that who understands how this city government functions, but I think that the thing that we really need to kind of think about is that the city may not have a tax increase next year, but the fees that are coming for the storm water and everything else, those -- the store water was never designed to be separated from the sewer, from the sanitary sewer system, and I just think that what our city government is doing to us is basically in my opinion just about criminal, but nobody in government is going to step in and doing something about it.

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You know, we are selling off assets and, you know, tonight I'd like to thank the

Scranton Times for the editorial they did Monday and I hope they spend a lot more time looking at things and reporting them because they are talking about how federal grant money is used for the parks, it's used for roads, it's used for everything except economic development, and that is true and, you know, our government is just so completely broken, you know, the Scranton Times brought up how meetings are held and they are basically hidden from the public, and it's just a disgraceful thing to be in a representative government when your government has nothing but contempt for the people they allegedly represent, and to live in a city for almost a quarter of -- well, more than a quarter of a century and be distressed, and when the time comes to depart from this distressed status, the city will probably be in worse shape than it was when it started.

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And what do you say to all of the residents in this city who have managed to live through this utter silliness where, you know, the truth of the matter is council

should have come up with ideas, not jus this council, but other ones. And, you know, it's nice to dress the part, but sometimes it's important to actually play the part and do things that are going to help people, and when I look at my downtown I don't see what Les sees, I don't see economic development there. I see massive amounts of empty buildings and empty store fronts. A total lack of investment there, and I also see where any time there is money to invest in the city it's thrown back in that pit, but money that should be really going somewhere should be going to the neighborhoods, and I'm not talking about little trickles of money, I'm talking about a major initiative throughout all of the city's neighborhoods to give people a reason to come here and live in the city because people don't want to live in blighted rundown neighborhoods and, you know, it's time to face the reality that when you have got a school district in trouble like this one is, there is problems all across the whole spectrum, and for the county to say that it's not going to do a

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reassessment is utterly ridiculous because we don't need a reassessment, what we need is a government that functions and we don't have that and the children in Scranton School District being shortchanged on education. I mean, everybody in this community is just being run completely over, and the truth of the matter is that in my opinion council needs to show who it represents to start thinking of things that can make our city better, and maybe you don't agree but, you know, all of these votes about selling parking garages and just selling everything is just -- it hasn't gotten us anywhere. Our people are just getting poorer and poorer and poorer and there is lack of development here, and it's not going to change probably ever until, well, until there is no population here because we lack something here. It's leadership. The suits look nice, but you know what, it's not how you look, it's how you think and how you react to the people you represent and maybe it would be good to think about that. Thank you.

4	Gerard Hetman from the Lackawanna County
5	Commissioner's Office. To begin this
6	evening, the final 2017 Lackawanna County
7	budget was passed by the commissioners at
8	their regularly scheduled meeting on
9	Wednesday, November 16. The tax rate stays
10	the same as projected at 57.42 mills so
11	there is no change from the preliminary
12	budget that was introduced in October. The
13	only change is the reallocation of some of
14	the arts and culture funding that previously
15	went to the library speakers series. This
16	will have in place a fund to be distributed
17	to other programs used by the Lackawanna
18	County Library System. The final budget
19	will be available on the county website
20	LackawannaCounty.org for the public's review
21	and we have an archive of all budgets going
22	back to 2006, maybe a little bit earlier,
23	again, available in PDF format for anybody
24	who wants to browse and compare.
25	One key item that I will note as

this was brought up by Council in a previous session when I spoke, the issue of reassessment. This is currently being actively explored with an effort being lead by our County Chief of Staff, Andy Wallace. He intends to make a recommendation to the commissioners, we believe by the end of this calendar year. So it is an issue, again, that's actively being examined, explored and discussed so we will see some type of, I believe, statement, or recommendation on that within the next at this point few weeks before the end of the year. So please understand your concerns are well-founded and they are being actively considered by the commissioners and our staff. So we thank you for raising that and we know it's a subject important to everyone who is a stakeholder in the county. During some of holiday events, and I

We going to have some Christmas trees, garland and lights, they will look very similar to Globe Store of vesteryear both in terms of Christmas and holiday decorations so please come out and join us for the brief celebrations, it will be a lot of fun. The other times for the Marketplace are going to be Saturday, December 3, 11 a.m to 7 p.m., and Sunday, December 4, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. That also will force, because that's Friday night, our annual county tree lighting, which I know some of our audience members come to, will be held that Thursday evening, December 1,

10	owe \$11,000. That's when everybody in the
11	newspapers praise you. Cedar Avenue
12	Associates 509 they owe 11,000. 501 Cedar,
13	LLC., \$20,000. This is what the paper
14	thinks we are so proud of. They are not
15	paying taxes. What the the city is going
16	to pot and nobody seems to do something
17	about it. Whoever heard of people like
18	this? James Talerico, his name is all over
19	the paper for dozens of property, he owes
20	7,100. Maeve Gantz, \$3,000. Paul Boss,
21	\$7,000. Dave Clooney, \$3,700. Now listen
22	to this one, Passwood Manor, which is a
23	going business, they are making money, they
24	owe \$53,000, and there is others. That's
25	not fair to the people that are paying that

borrowed money and so forth to pay their taxes and allow this to go on by these businesses.

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I can understand. I have talked to so many people that just can't make it that we've discussed, but these are business people they are living off of us. Why should they get away with it? You know, there is one business Scranton Investors, LLC, they owe \$484,000 to the city. Now, who the hell ever heard of allowing this to go on year after year after year? That in 2005 is the time I paid my taxes twice the city was so messed up and I never got nothing accomplished about it. Here people go for years, years and years and don't pay taxes, and you people sit there and not doing nothing. There's got to be something you can do, attach the property. Look at Boscov's, he got a whole business down there, why don't you attack someone and get some money for us.

23MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,24Mr. Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: I'm not chastising you

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1	or the mayor. I once said that I really
2	thought that this should be a full-time
3	occupation up there. I'm not mad at guys,
4	it's just time you quit talking about
5	downtown and the mall and do something for
6	the people of the city. Thank you.
7	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.
8	Ellman. Anyone else?
9	MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia,
10	citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonians.
11	I, too, am glad that it's going to be no tax
12	increase, but we all know why that dollar
13	you got from selling that multi-million
14	dollar garage put us over the top. We don't
15	need a tax increase with that dollar we got,
16	and the money we gave away, millions and
17	millions of dollars, well, don't worry about
18	that either. That's the thing to do, but
19	next year somebody is going to come and say
20	we need the tax increase, and I'm going to
21	ask where is the \$120 million you gave when
22	you gave away the parking business? We lost
23	that. We lost all of the parking meter
24	revenue and all of the fines. And what did
25	that guy do? How do we even know that he

with the best one for this contract? Who was he the best for? Himself? The Mayor? Who? But not for the citizens of Scranton. No way in heck was it good for the citizens of Scranton, and you tell me why you should have paid off the mall, given 4 1/2 million for parking spaces. You've got to be kidding. I tell you there should be an investigation of this whole deal. Why there is none, I don't know. How PEL can sit there and say it was a great deal, if they even said it. I read a little article from PEL in the paper, I can't believe it. Is it Is the city, state, and government so bad. so bad that we allow things like this to happen? The deal was great for the person that leased the parking meters. He didn't have to put up a penny. We even gave him the money to do it in the form of a lease. He borrowed on this lease. That means we are responsible if he for some reason or other go bankrupt, default or whatever, the city is on the hook for 40 years to maintain them garages, maintain the parking over there in the mall, but the only garage

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that's really going to make a bundle is the one we sold for a dollar because it's going to deal with the County and I am waiting for that shoe to fall to see how much the county is going to pay because there was nothing wrong with that garage. There was only a few things that had to be done, and the worst part about it the first half of that garage, or the last half I should say, was built at the same time as the mall, but yet we figured the mall spaces for some reason were in better shape than the spaces over the movie theatre. I can't comprehend it. I don't know who was the engineer that told you that that place was worthless? Is there a name of that engineer that declared that whole garage as being in danger of falling down? That garage was making over \$300,000. Did they shut the garage down now? Is the garage still open? Believe me, it probably I don't know how you can sleep at night is. with what you did.

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23 MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?
24 MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,
25 Council. Marie Schumacher. First, the real

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1	estate report as of today, 1,726 properties
2	have been transacted in Lackawanna County
3	since mid-March. Of these 22 percent have
4	been Scranton properties of which 47 percent
5	actual sale price was below the common level
6	ratio.
7	Yesterday, the county passed the
8	2017 budget without any funding for
9	reassessment. What action does this council
10	plan to take and by when?
11	MR. EVANS: You want an answer now?
12	MS. SCHUMACHER: Crickets.
13	MR. EVANS: No, I told you many
14	times I would expect the City if they don't
15	do the reassessment
16	MS. SCHUMACHER: I'm sorry, somebody
17	coughed, I couldn't hear you.
18	MR. EVAN: If they don't do a
19	reassessment soon I'm looking at 2017 then
20	we should take them to Court. I have said
21	that over and over again.
22	MS. SCHUMACHER: And when is this
23	going to happen?
24	MR. EVAN: Well, I want it to happen
25	in 2017. We can't wait any longer so that's

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1	my expectation.
2	MS. SCHUMACHER: Do you have a month
3	in mind?
4	MR. EVAN: We don't have the ability
5	to take them to Court. It has to be done by
6	the administration, but that is something I
7	want to see happen.
8	MS. SCHUMACHER: How are you going
9	to make that known to the administration?
10	MR. EVANS: They know.
11	MS. SCHUMACHER: I don't know. The
12	credibility of this whole council is going
13	down the tubes. Many months ago, for
14	instance, we were told that we would have
15	the audit available to the public by the end
16	of September, and then more recently it was
17	before the budget, and now you have the
18	budget in hand, but we don't have an audit.
19	The criticality of the debt portion it could
20	only be obtained from an audit and it's just
21	pitiful the way you keep telling us lies.
22	MR. WECHSLER: Mrs. Schumacher, they
23	are not lies. They are what we are told by
24	the business administrator so I would please
25	ask you not to call it a lie. That's what

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1	we were told by the business administrator.
2	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, I will call
3	the business administrator the fibber then.
4	MR. WECHSLER: Well, it's not a lie.
5	MS. SCHUMACHER: Many months ago,
6	also, we had something called a revised
7	recovery plan and one of the things in there
8	said unless otherwise provided for in an
9	overall debt management strategy prior to
10	December 30, 2015, which did not occur,
11	proceeds from the sale of the Scranton
12	Parking authority shall first be used to
13	reduce the outstanding Scranton Parking
14	Authority indebtedness. Any excess funds of
15	the funds from the parking monetization
16	after satisfaction of death shall be used to
17	reduce the City's unfunded liability for its
18	pension funds. How much is gone into the
19	pension from the sale of the release or
20	whatever you want to call it?
21	MR. EVANS: There was no excess
22	funds, there was stranded debt so I think
23	they were wishing against something else
24	that happened, but it was stranded debt not
25	excess money.

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1	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Now, I again
2	was disappointed, I thought we are going to
3	see a reduction in the trash bill. I have a
4	lot of things on trash which I'm not sure
5	I'm not going to get to this week because it
6	appears that, just if I could find the right
7	paper, Forbes has been doing a lot on trash
8	and it says the economic of recycling have
9	turned upside down. The oil gut has made
10	fresh plastics cheaper than the recycled
11	stuff and there is lot some communities
12	across the country have even stopped
13	collecting glass because it costs too much
14	and when he goes to the landfill it doesn't
15	pollute, it doesn't do anything except sit
16	there, and there are a lot of things and I
17	thought we were going to have somebody here
18	from the recycling department that could
19	maybe answer some of these questions, but I
20	don't know what happened to that either.
21	Mr. Wechsler, you attended the
22	meeting of the parking
23	MR. WECHSLER: I'm on the board.
24	MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, okay, you're
25	on the board, so one of the things I would

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1	like to know is how much was in that budget
2	for the contribution to Daniel Marsh? If
3	you look at the 990 of the parent
4	organization he gets and the last one was
5	2014, he gets a salary from the organization
6	of over 255,000 and he also gets money from
7	all of the deals that are made, and how is
8	he getting from the Scranton deal?
9	MR. WECHSLER: I'm not sure, but
10	there is going to be a public meeting on
11	December 5. December 5 at 6 p.m. there will
12	be a public meeting which is going to be
13	held by the Scranton Parking Authority which
14	would be attended by members of the ABM and
15	NDC.
16	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Got lots
17	more. See you in two weeks.
18	MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.
19	Dave Dobrzyn, resident and taxpayer. Once
20	again, call Congress, your Congressmen, both
21	Senators and Representatives, 1-202-224-3121
22	and tell them to can their Transpacific
23	pack, and the president at 1-202-456-111 and
24	tell Mr. Obama that it's about time that
25	somebody other than the Democrat puts their

name on NAFTA and the Chinese trade packs and whatever else. We constantly hear about, oh, it's mechanized now and robotic, well, if the US government gives out huge tax cuts for investment in robots even though it eliminates people then on top of it how much can working class take? We heard about the salaries of probably the salaries that were aforementioned in Scranton might even have dual employed people in the household, so it all gets funneled into one basket. Sounds good, but if you really knew the facts of it sounds bad. And trash once again came up DPW so everything is moved up a day, and

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tonight, apparently they had off Monday with DPW so everything is moved up a day, and recycling came up and, you know, we have a man in New York, the magnate of broadcasting, he wants a soda tax, why don't we put a five cent a bottle on everything and if somebody is against it financially you could run around and pick up 20 bottles you have a dollar, you know? And all of this liter that's, like, you ever see you have probably see it every couple of weeks they clean up on Moosic Street there or at the top of River Street by 81, and everybody throws their bottle out of the car window and it's a mess. So, you know, it's some food for thought instead of telling people what they should drink and what they shouldn't drink.

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Now, getting to the pensions, there is lot of it over the dam and the sale of the sewer plant has been cited as a solution and, okay, it's practically a done deal so I'm not going to bother there, but call Congress once again at those numbers and tell them not, not to repeal the (unintelligible) was repealed and we got ripped off for \$26 million dollars out of the police and fire pension fund and we can't have \$90 million being ripped off It's ungodly. Why you would want to again. give these people the ability to steal that money off from under you after we got through all of this.

I see our friends from the union are here and, you know, they shouldn't be able

to lock anybody out, but they are right, a technical job if you can't read a book how do you get a job? And education should not be -- or testing should not be withheld. There should be -- there should be -- you should have the ability to take the test on a timely basis for whatever field you want to work in in order to attain the license and authorization to do this work.

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A lot of people stop me on the shopping malls and stuff and they mention about school tax and the one thing that I feel the public has to understand, I'm just using this as a forum, if only people that pay taxes were to get -- if it were only people with kids in school it would be tuition, it wouldn't be a tax, and it probably would be unaffordable so that's the way it is and it kind of stinks that it's in the form of a property tax, but we really can't go the other way. All right. Well, thank you and have a good night.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else? MR. MCNULTY: Good evening, Council. My name is Tom McNulty, resident of the city

and I'm representative for the National Contractor's Association. First of all, I want to thank you guys for having that open caucus on this ordinance proposal. I think it's pretty clear coming out of that caucus that obviously there is a lot of confusion about what should or shouldn't and what people believe is in there and what's not in there, okay? So obviously you want to make sure that we get the proper language when it is revisited.

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There is a couple of things that Mr. Hinton said that I'd like to expand on, Number one, years ago, and I was if I may. a contractor for many, many years in the city, there was an ability to pull a one-time license to do a project. Now, I don't know if that still is in effect. Ι don't know, but that should be something that's explored, but if you remember just a couple of months ago, maybe six months ago, they built a Popeye's restaurant down in South Side; right? Well, none of those contractors were local contractors. None of them. So how did they get the permits to do

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1	it? So I don't know if you are into a
2	selected you know, I don't know what's
3	happening there but obviously something has
4	to be looked at it.
5	But I do believe that Mr. Hinton is
6	right. We are not here to prohibit anybody
7	from working. You know, if an individual
8	can pass a test, pass the electrical test
9	then he is qualified to do the work. We are
10	not trying to push anybody out. I have a
11	real problem when it's said let me just
12	explain something else on this Uniform Code
13	Act. The reason the Uniform Code Act never
14	addressed licensing, okay, never addressing
15	licensing is because it was never passed.
16	That's exactly what happened. For 28 years
17	I have been with this association and we
18	have been trying to get state licensing, and
19	we can't even get it out of the committee.
20	If they put any kind of licensing
21	requirements in that bill that would have
22	never happened, and it's a good bill.
23	There is there is too many times
24	I have walked into buildings and homes and I
25	can't believe what I see, so I think it's

the right thing to do. I think it's the right course to take, but in all honestly safety doesn't begin with the Uniform Code Act, safety begins with me, the contractor. That's where it begins. So that contractor you have to feel comfortable with that contractor when he goes into the home that he can do the work, that he has capable men to do the work so that's the other thing I want to address.

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The other thing is the City of Allentown, the City of Bethlehem, the City of Harrisburg, all of those are under the Uniform Code Act, none of those took the licensing requirements out. None of them took that testing out. Not one of them. So that's tells you something.

And then the other thing Mr. Hinton, you know, is talking about, he says we can go to Dunmore and we can go to Old Forge or we can go to Throop and we can do electrical work and he is right. He is absolutely correct, but let me just explain to you, let me just read something to you, this is out of the Dunmore application for licensing for electrical permit. It says number six, and if I may could I address council and give you this, okay? If you look at this, take a look at number six. If you look at number six on that application it basically states, "Do you have a license in the City of Scranton? Yes or no."

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What does that tell you, okay? Ιt tells you that we are on the right borough. Now, the Borough may not have enough people, just like the Borough of Old Forge doesn't have enough people to mandate and -- not to mandate, but to manage all of this stuff, but let me tell you what Old Forge has, and this one will really open your eyes. This application, this is Section 9 of this application and it says, "The application shall be accompanied by an indemnification clause agreement approved by the Borough Solicitor or the contractor indemnifies and holds harmless the Borough, it's officials, it's agents, okay, and employees and from any damages caused by neglect of contractors for performing his own work."

Gentlemen, you and I know what that

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1	is, okay? That's covering somebody's you
2	know what. All right? So let's not fool
3	around with the testing requirement, let's
4	make sure there is a test there, okay? I
5	know personally almost every one of you guys
6	and I know where your heart is and your
7	heart is with city. This is not something
8	you want to do. This is not something that
9	we should ever do. Keep that testing in
10	there, I beg you, please. Thank you very
11	much.
12	MR. WECHSLER: Mr. McNulty, before
13	you leave the podium Joe Wechsler.
14	MR. MCNULTY: I'm sorry.
15	MR. WECHSLER: Is there a city that
16	you would consider that has the model
17	ordinance?
18	MR. MCNULTY: Yes, if you can take a
19	look at Bethlehem, not too long ago
20	Bethlehem has you know, a couple of years
21	back they did their licensing requirements
22	and stuff like that, they do have a
23	residential. They do have a residential,
24	you know, license and they have a, you know,
25	commercial license, master license. You

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1	could look at some of those cities, they
2	already have the language, it's already
3	there, okay? But that test for every one of
4	those licenses is required and that's what
5	you want to make sure, you know?
6	There is a difference between wiring
7	a home and wiring a commercial building,
8	okay, or wiring a hospital. I did
9	hospitals. I did schools. I didn't do a
10	lot of home work. That's wasn't my
11	expertise. That was left to other guys.
12	The non-union contractors, by the way,
13	nonunion contractors to this city, they do a
14	majority of the residential work. They do.
15	And that state licensing bill, by the way,
16	is we are together on that, the union and
17	the non-union are together on that. That
18	would simplify everything. That would take
19	you guys right out of this process.
20	Unfortunately, you can't control what the
21	state will approve, but be careful what you
22	could here.
23	MR. WECHSLER: Do they use private
24	testing services in Bethlehem?
25	MR. MCNULTY: Yes. Yes, they do,

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1	okay, but I'm not sure if they provide a
2	true that company, you know those
3	companies that they talked about, I have to
4	tell you something I personally have called
5	those companies and I don't get a return
6	call and so something is wrong in that
7	system and it has to be investigated. Thank
8	you.
9	MR. EVANS: Tom, before you go.
10	MR. MCNULTY: Yeah.
11	MR. EVAN: You talked about at the
12	meeting earlier about the testing and that's
13	basically what we're all talking about
14	right, is a residential test appropriate.
15	MR. MCNULTY: For a journeymen?
16	MR. EVANS: Yeah.
17	MR. MCNULTY: I think for a
18	journeyman that has spent four or five years
19	obviously work in the trade. Yes, if he
20	could pass that residential test no harm, no
21	foul. That's the way I look at that, but he
22	has got to be able to show he can do it.
23	You know, a lot of times when I would go on
24	a job I would tell me guys, listen, here's
25	what I want you to do, four circuits over

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1	here, three over here, two over there. I
2	knew what I wanted. I knew what I could do
3	by the code, okay? Not that they were
4	these individuals were very intelligent,
5	very smart, but they are not looking at the
6	code every day. They are not looking at the
7	National Electrical Code every day, so it's
8	up to me. It's my responsibility to make
9	sure that I laid out job the proper way so
10	that's what you have, okay?
11	MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. McNulty, just to
12	answer your question.
13	MR. MCNULTY: Yeah.
14	MR. GAUGHAN: The ordinance does
15	address you can get a one-time license in
16	the city.
17	MR. MCNULTY: It does.
18	MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah. For a fee of
19	\$400 and all you have to have is a valid
20	contractor's license equivalent to that the
21	city issued by another municipality to the
22	applicant. If not from another
23	municipality, proof of experience in said
24	field. Experience shall meet the minimum
25	requirements for a journeyman as defined in

51 this ordinance. 1 MR. MCNULTY: Well, if that language 2 3 is still there then I don't see the problem where this Whitney guy came in and wanted to 4 5 know, you know, can I work here. It's just not real. 6 7 MR. GAUGHAN: And just for the 8 record, too, I requested all of these 9 licenses that have apparently been denied 10 and they can't produce them because as 11 Mr. Hinton said, he doesn't keep any record 12 of it so, you know, that's one thing that I 13 challenge is if he can get a one-time 14 license how are all of these big contractors getting denied. It doesn't make sense. 15 16 MR. MCNULTY: There is something 17 else that -- and I think Paul will probably 18 expand on it, but currently right now in the 19 City of Scranton there is 100 contractors 20 carrying a license in the City of Scranton. 21 Now, you are telling me that's not a good 22 size pool? There is something wrong with 23 that, okay? So thank you very much for your 24 time, appreciate it. 25 MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

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1	MR. CASPARO: Thank you,
2	Mr. President. Paul Casparo, President of
3	Local 81 IBEW, International Brotherhood of
4	Electrical Workers, taxpayer. We spoke on
5	this last week, we don't want to beat this
6	thing to death, but I do have couple of
7	comments, Attorney Minora talked about it
8	before and Tommy just talked about it, there
9	is state licensing all around us, we are one
10	of the few states in the whole country that
11	doesn't have state licensing, and as Tommy
12	said that would clean up a lot of this. Why
13	Pennsylvania doesn't have state licensing I
14	don't know. Our business manager, Rick
15	Schraeder, who spoke last week but couldn't
16	be here tonight because he is out of town on
17	business, him and a group of businessmen
18	from Pennsylvania have legislation in
19	Harrisburg to get state licensing. I'm not
20	sure where it's at right now, they're
21	confident that it will get in there and it
22	will get passed and, you know, that will
23	take this mess out of all our hands here,
24	and we are long, long overdue in
25	Pennsylvania for that.

53 1 You know, Tommy mentioned at one 2 time licensing. I still sit on the city 3 licensing board as far as I know, nobody told me I'm not on it. Through the years, 4 5 we have issued a lot of one-time permits for companies who have come in out of town who 6 7 did have a license in their jurisdiction and 8 we have issued those permits without any 9 problems so I don't see what the problem is 10 there. And then if that particular 11 contractor did get a second job he had more 12 than enough time to be able to test in the 13 city and pass his test and do and bid other 14 work so, I mean, that's a lot of bull that's 15 being thrown up here. 16 The Uniform Construction Code, yeah, 17 they are saying that's the real safety 18 issue, you know what? For a long time we 19 have known that the Uniform Construction 20 Code is back two or three code cycles. They 21 are not up-to-date with their code cycles. For instance, if we are using even though 22 23 it's 2016, now, I think the city is using 24 the 2011 code, the cold is updated every 25 three years. Sometimes they are back two

cycles so they can be on '08 or a 2005, so you tell me is that safety or what? Because there is thousands of changes every code cycle. I sit on National Electrical Code so every three years that's updated, and just this past year, in fact, 2017, the code book isn't out yet, but it's too early to put in place here, but there is thousands and thousand of changes. And how do those changes get in there? They get in there through documentation. Fires. Deaths. People getting killed doing electrical work. That's how they get in there. It's tough. Very tough to get anything passed in the electrical code, but what does get in there is those statistics. Just two nights ago there was a fire

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two blocks from my house in North Scranton, what was the cause of that fire? Electrical. Case closed. I don't want to prolong this anymore and, you know, we know what we need to do. Tommy is right, if we can get this testing in there, you know, do we want to really lose unqualified people doing this work? I know I won't hire

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1	anybody, I wouldn't go to a doctor
2	that wasn't qualified, I'm sure you
3	wouldn't, so I'm sure we will do the right
4	thing and I thank you for your time.
5	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.
6	MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?
7	MR. REILLY: Excuse me, I'm Josh
8	Reilly, I'm a resident. I'm a taxpaying
9	citizen and I'm also a master electrician.
10	I'm a contractor, I'm non-union. As much as
11	he may be union we have no problems. I
12	absolutely agree. I think testing is
13	essential. I think that us being currently
14	in the 2008 Code book is indicative and
15	proof of no growth at all and at the same
16	time I want to make it crystal clear that I
17	have a videotape, the words that come out of
18	his mouth saying that nobody had applied for
19	Mr. Bannon's position in the City of
20	Scranton because I did. I personally put
21	that application in as a licensed
22	contractor, as a licensed individual who has
23	never had problem, I personally put it in. I
24	handed it RH. I called back week after week
25	with no response. I reached out to Mr.

Hinton with no response. I want that to be crystal clear and on the books that I did my part to try to fill that position and I was told specifically by the staff inside of his own office that they were not hiring this year for that position and that that position had been eliminated. That came from both HR and his office.

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I have a lot of respect for Mr. Marino. I would like to consider myself a friend. I respect him. I think he does well and very good job. I have nothing against his organization, but I haven't had a chance to review any of what their ordinance or what they are trying to set in place, but I don't -- I find it very hard to believe that with those same 200 applications that he can't have proof for, I'm sure mine also vanished, so I have little to no truth I don't think came out of that entire meeting and that's it. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else? MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

1	MOTIONS.
2	MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?
3	MR. PERRY: Wow, where to start. A
4	big day, a lot of information. Well, I'm
5	just going to start with the public caucus
6	that we had with Director Hinton and Mr.
7	Marino. I felt it was a very, very
8	effective public caucus. There was a lot of
9	information that we received. A lot of the
10	questions that we asked that was followed up
11	with three gentlemen here at the podium,
12	some repeat speakers on this legislation,
13	some not, but yeah, I'm optimistic that with
14	the information that we have that we are
15	going to be able to find common ground,
16	middle ground whether we have to reform this
17	legislation but let's put something crystal
18	clear as far as I'm concerned, testing is an
19	absolute must for anybody who is going to
20	receive a license to work in the City of
21	Scranton. That's the only way that this
22	passes for me personally, and I was clear on
23	that last time in March. Safety is first.
24	Easy and competition is great and it's a
25	great concept and it what's we're all about,

but not at the cost of safety at all. Even if no one gets hurt in an electrical fire, we are still sending first responders out and there is danger in that as well. So I personally will not have any part of that, but I do think there is enough information that we received here tonight to get together and get common ground, clean up some bad legislation to make it easier. At that same time, make it absolutely as safe as possible. I'll address other questions or other comments on that as it comes up.

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Third party administrator for the pensions came up today, and please forgive me, I don't know have accurate numbers, but I know it does involve the disability claims, and again, these are rough numbers because it was several months ago. The city average of disability claims were 50 percent. 50 percent of them got approved. The national average is in the single digits. That is absolute huge amounts that is not being overseen, I believe, so that's what I thought the TPA was a very integral part of that deal. I was concerned it was

taking a very long time to get that in place, but once that third party administrator is in place as in charge of disability claims I expect that number to drop drastically. 50 percent city average to the single digit national average on disability claims.

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Let's talk a little bit about the budget. We're going to be introducing the 2017 budget tonight. It's my first go around on the budget and I know I'll just talk all the credit for being the lucky The no tax increase on that is charm. absolutely ecstatic. One of the reasons why I went out and I went to get into public office was because of the possibility of me having to downsize. I would never move out of the city, this is my home, thee is where I live, but I didn't know if I could afford my house anymore with some of the crazy tax hikes that were happening in the city and I'm very happy now to say that there is not going to be -- or potentially not going to be any tax increases based on this budget in here that's in front of us. This could

actually help us see our way out of Act 47 sooner rather than later, and you couple that with the growth that we are seeing currently on Penn Avenue with new businesses coming in, and the business owners will tell you we are coming downtown because that's where the people are. If you are getting people moving outside of the city to inside of the city there is a reason for that and they know that that's where the people are, and you couple that with the rebirth of the Scranton Lace, you know, that's going to draw not only the jobs, as a speaker said, we definitely need jobs. Jobs are what make the world go round. Job brings income, income brings homeowners, homeowners bring community and we all want to live in a good community so that's the bedrock is jobs and I do agree with that.

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You know, there is going to be tough times in the city. There is going to be tough times ahead of us, a lot of things that we are going to have to face. I'll tell you right now that I believe that we are in better position today to face those

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1	tough decisions than we were three years
2	ago, four years ago, even last year. We are
3	making some strides.
4	Finally, next week is Thanksgiving,
5	we won't be here, but spend your time like I
6	will with your family, friends and enjoy
7	your holiday. Thank you.
8	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Perry.
9	Mr. Rogan?
10	MR. ROGAN: Yes, I guess I'll pick
11	up where Mr. Perry left off regarding the
12	budget since I think everyone was very happy
13	to hear that there had not be a tax increase
14	in this year's budget, and it really
15	represents a turning point for the city over
16	the last decade where every year there have
17	been increases. I have long stated that one
18	of the biggest hindrances to the city's
19	throat is our tax structure, not only real
20	estate taxes but the wage tax, fees, which
21	we have talked about quite a bit tonight
22	regarding contractors, and many other items
23	within the city that really have restricted
24	our growth. My hope is that this budget is
25	a turning point for the city. We have seen,

as I stated for decades, increases. And no tax increases is very good, but even better than that is a tax cut, and I'm hopeful that this budget and many of the initiatives that have taken place over the last year will lead us towards reducing taxes for the residents of Scranton.

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A couple of other items that were brought up tonight, the issue of the subpoenas was brought up again. I know Attorney Minora will be filing next Tuesday at the Court to subpoena those documents regarding the double pensions scandal. I am very anxious to get those documents and to look them over. I hope that we -- first, I hope that we do receive the documents, we'll see there may be some legal wrangling, but I'm confident, we have an excellent attorney in Attorney Minora, I'm sure will do a great job representing our case for us.

A little bit more good news, obviously the budget is the big story, but another business is moving into town. The AV, which is a very popular restaurant in Moosic has chose to move into downtown

Scranton. And I would have a tally, but I could say over the last year there have been a number of businesses that have been relocating from out of town into downtown Scranton. That is something that is very good for the city and for years many of us have talked about growth, and that's the only way to have long-term sustained recovery in the city is to grow, have more people move into the city, and the first time homebuyers grant Mr. Evans and myself put together for a \$5,000 grant to bring people in. We need more residents in the city and we need more businesses, but the amount of the progress the city has made over the last few years has been tremendous. We do have a long way to go, but we are certainly on the right track.

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And, finally, actually on the contractor legislation, I think it's -- I think we all agree that we may be a little more confused after the caucus than we were prior, I know I am, but I do think there is middle ground that can be reached here from what Mr. Hinton said from what many of the

contractors that are here said, and I think we very, very close. It just sounds like it might be one or two items that need be added or subjected in this ordinance to make everyone happy. Personally I would like, and as I stated last time around, I did support the original legislation which I'm confident we are not passing in this form, so there has to be a middle drowned that's met her. Personally I would like to see more licensed contractors in the city, especially on the residential side. I have heard of so many times from people throughout the city, many times seniors that they can't find somebody to do the work especially a small job when, you know, they can't find somebody that wants to go out and do that, you know, very minor job, but it needs to be done. So I'm hopeful that we can come up with something that keeps the safety, keeps the -- you know, the items that need to be -- boxes that need to be checked as far as testing goes, and at the same time allow more people if they need the qualifications to do work within the City of

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1	Scranton.
2	And I was upset, you know, hearing
3	about the fact that there are people out
4	there that want to do business in the city
5	but can't because testing hasn't been
6	offered, and that's something that certainly
7	needs to be addressed whether it's a third
8	party testing service I think would probably
9	make the most sense or some other type of
10	arrangement, but anyone who meets the
11	qualifications should be able to take the
12	test, and if you pass the test then you
13	could do work in the city then make it your
14	home so that's why I think we are the
15	five of us on here and I think Mr. Hinton
16	can certainly come to an agreement on some
17	I really they are probably going to be
18	minor modifications, like I said, it sounds
19	like we are pretty close so I hope that
20	something can be agreed to that works for
21	everybody.
22	And finally, I would like to wish
23	everyone a very happy Thanksgiving and we
24	will see you in a couple of weeks.
25	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

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1	Mr. Evans?
2	MR. EVANS: Thank you. On the
3	contractor's license, I feel better tonight,
4	I think we are on the path to consensus and
5	compromise. I think we are going to be able
6	to get that done.
7	On the budget, we will all be
8	reviewing it in-depth over the next several
9	weeks, but for now we know the main story is
10	no tax increase for 2017. Is this cause for
11	celebration? Maybe for about five minutes
12	and then we have to get back to work. You
13	need to remember the impact on our city that
14	a dramatic increase in property taxes have
15	taken that has stymied growth, reduced
16	property taxes and values not taxes for
17	sure, but values, and hurt those that are
18	the most vulnerable, our working poor and
19	our senior citizens. We need to make sure
20	that this scenario never happens again. We
21	need find new ways to increase growth,
22	increase property values and help those that
23	need it the most help. It must begin within
24	the walls of this building. We need to
25	create a new culture of entrepreneurship.

We need to make systemic changes that are needed to become an efficient government that deliver services in a cost effective manner and on time. We need to create a vision for economic development and not continue to repeat mistakes of the past while maintaining the status quo.

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On a related matter, as far as the budget is concerned and proceeds of the Sewer Authority, I am clearly on the record in favor of paying down or paying off high interest and long-term debt. I would withhold any contributions to the pensions until all of the current reforms are in place and are working, until the third party administrator is hired and in place and working, and additional pension reforms take place.

Finally, I would like to Honor our former council president Bob McGoff tonight by saying a few words. This Saturday, November 19, is the first anniversary of Bob's passing. The following are his words of the subject that sadly too many of us have come to know all too well.

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	"Just one thing I would like to
mentio	n, I would just like to say that I
know a	ll of us have been effected in some
ways b	y this insidious disease and I would
just e	ncourage anyone that knows someone who
is fig	hting this or dealing with treatment

long w	ay to helping people deal with that.
And I	would just encourage that if you know
someon	e please be a friend and be part of
the he	lping process."
	These words are wisdom and sincerity
by som	eone who understood the importance of
even t	he smallest actions. Someone who
always	created respect are worth mentioning
again	in his honor. Thank you.
	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Evans.
Mr. Ga	ughan?

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1	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. I'd like
2	to thank Mr. Evans for that. I can't
3	believe that it's been a little over a year
4	since Mr. McGoff was sitting up here with
5	us. He is someone who is truly
6	irreplaceable and if you look at the long
7	list of councilmen that we have had in our
8	illustrious history as a city he is one of
9	the finest. He was a friend, we all
10	considered him a friend, he was a great
11	colleague, and most of all he was a
12	gentleman, and that's how I will always
13	remember him.
14	I'd like to start off tonight with
15	some citizen's complaints from the past week
16	and a half. First of all, the 300 block of
17	Foster Street there are overgrown hedges
18	and, Mrs. Reed, if you could send somebody
19	over to the Licensing and Inspections
20	Department. Also, received a complaint
21	about a food cart on Cherry Street. We did
22	send correspondence to our DPW Department
23	about overgrown trees on Brook Street on
24	East Mountain. They are very dangerous and
25	there seems to be a lot of dead trees that

could be impeding traffic and pedestrian traffic. Residents had contacted me and are curious about a large area of deforestation on West Mountain so I will get together with the Licensing and Inspections Department and try to find out what's going on up there.

I did see this week on the news that a hole had opened up in somebody's backyard in Schuylkill County almost swallowing their The Department of Environmental home. Protection was out almost immediately, a contractor was there this week to stabilize the home and support beams and they are currently working on filling the hole immediately. I bring this up because I would ask, once again, that Mayor Courtright settle the issue with the Young family on Wyoming Avenue and the unbelievably large hole that they have in their backyard before somebody gets hurt. And people are probably getting sick of me bringing this up, and I don't like to get personal up here, but this has become a personal issue for me, and one of the most important issues I have dealt with here from a citizen's standpoint since

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1	I have been on council.
2	You have to understand when you meet
3	with these people you sit at the kitchen
4	table across from them, you hear their story
5	and you see what they have to deal with.
6	You want this to be fixed for them. I talk
7	to them at least once a week, once every two
8	weeks and I cannot believe that the mayor of
9	the city and the Law Department had promised
10	these people to fix this hole so they could
11	at least sit outside and enjoy their yard
12	and now they can't even get a meeting with
13	the mayor or the Law Department and, in
14	fact, those people in their 60's and 70's
15	they had to hire a lawyer and sue the city.
16	This is disgusting.
17	I am going to make it my mission to
18	try to get this problem solved for them. My
19	recommendation to the mayor was get rid of
20	all of the lawyers, sit in a room across the
21	table like that and explain what's going to
22	happen and settle the deal. Fill the hole.
23	I don't understand how it's gotten to this
24	point, but you are literally ripping apart a
25	good family in this city. So, again, I

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1	would urge Mayor Courtright put politics,
2	put everything aside, put the lawyers to
3	rest, and fix this problem once and for all.
4	I did also receive issues about
5	parking on Ralph Street and Greenridge, so
6	we did send something to the Police
7	Department and we are going to look at a
8	traffic study in that area. The 200 block
9	of Ferdinand Street where tires outside of a
10	home and broken parts that's dangerous to
11	children playing in the area.
12	Regarding the sale of the Scranton
13	Sewer Authority, I would like to find out
14	from Director Gene Barrett how are any
15	delinquent accounts going to be handled with
16	the transition of the sale?
17	Another issue that has been coming
18	up that has me baffled is leaf pickup in the
19	city. I know my colleagues have gotten
20	inundated with phone cause and e-mails from
21	people who were confused about what the
22	process was. And ad was put in the paper
23	that the DPW was going to ask people to bag
24	leaves. I talked to the DPW director before
25	the meeting tonight and come to find out

that there are actually two leaf trucks that are circulating in the neighborhoods. People are still putting out their paper even though it's supposed to be a substitute week where the DPW will come out and take care of the leaves. Moral of the story here is there is a complete and utter lack of communication between this administration It just and the people that they serve. doesn't make any sense to me. I don't believe the director, I don't blame the employees, I blame the mayor, quite frankly. He is in charge. Come up with a plan. Ι met with him when I first got into office about this very issue. There are simple things that we can do. I just don't understand how we are dropping the ball on something as simple as picking up leaves so I would ask that please, for the love of God next year, come up with a plan and follow it so people are not confused.

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I'd like to take a second to talk about the news of the DEP citing the landfill for being in violation of the Solid Waste Management Act. It was determined that leachate, in fact, has been leaking into ground water. Water monitoring wells intermittently have been picking up contamination at the landfill's leachate treatment plant for 13 years or longer with DEP officials and Keystone Sanitary landfill officials struggling until recently to identify the source and no violations issued in total this past week.

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To say this has shaken my faith and the public's faith in the DEP is understatement. What else have they overlooked over the period of the last 13 years? What else have they struggled with? Is it a coincidence that the cancer rate in this area is one of highest in the nation? Is it a coincidence that there are a high number of toxins in the air around Sherwood Park in Dunmore, and I wonder where else? I'm deeply concerned, outraged and disgusted by what has been allowed to happen to the health and welfare of the residents of this city and our region over the period of the last 50 years, probably more. It seems to me, and I'm a rooky councilman, this will be my third year but I've learned a lot, that based on how much money, how much power, and how much influence you have in this area agencies and elected officials that are supposed to protect us will look the other way when it comes to regulations and the law. The offer of a monetary donation, maybe a new building, or a shiny fire truck seems to make people think twice about speaking up, telling the truth, and standing with the people and that, in my opinion, is shameful.

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I stand firmly and strongly with the Friends of Lackawanna and the Greenridge Neighborhood Association in their fight to stop the expansion of the landfill and shutdown the leachate line that runs underneath our city. I'm, quite frankly, appalled that Mayor Courtright continues to remain silent on this issue, along with some other elected officials. The fact that he is mayor of the largest city in Northeastern Pennsylvania and in my opinion is too much of a coward to take a stand on one of the most important issues facing our city speaks

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1	volumes about who he actually answers to,
2	and it's definitely not the people of this
3	city. Thank you.
4	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,
5	Mr. Gaughan. It's been long evening so I
6	will just touch briefly on some of the
7	issues that came upon us this evening.
8	Number one, in regards to the budget we have
9	received a budget, we are quite happy that
10	there is no tax increase, and to be honest
11	with you there could not be a tax increase.
12	We are at the point of tax the highest
13	taxes that we can have. There can never
14	been any significant tax increases again.
15	In my opinion, over the past three years we
16	have taken the tax rate to where it should
17	have been for all of the years that there
18	weren't tax increases, and I think right now
19	we are at the point where we begin to
20	gradually work with our budget and control
21	our costs that is at least in line with
22	inflation, so I think as we move forward I
23	think we are in a better place.
24	Also, from speaking to Business
25	Administrator Bulzoni, the fact that our

financial house is getting in order and the budget is in place we also had a better reception to our application for the TAN, tax anticipation note, for next year and it is my understand that that will be done quite soon at a much better rate than we experienced in the past, so all these steps that we have been taking in terms of getting our financial house in order are beginning to pay off. We are going to go through the budget again, we are going to take a look at where perhaps there are some savings, perhaps there are some better efficiencies in the budget, but we will be doing that over course of the next couple of weeks.

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In terms of the contractor's legislation, it's taken us a long time to get to this point. Last year we went through it, it wasn't satisfactory to us, Director Hinton had worked on it and we also continued to look at it and also work with the community of the men and women that do this work. And I think, as my colleagues have said, I think we are very close to coming to a point where we have satisfied our concerns for safety, our concerns that work is done by qualified people, and Scranton also becomes a better place to do business so I think we are very close to that right now, and I appreciate the comments that we have gotten from the public. I also appreciate the work that Mr. Hinton has done, and also I appreciate the work that my fellow councilmen have done trying to get this issue resolved. I think we are in a much better place with that.

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I echo what Mr. Rogan mentioned, I did sign off on the paperwork this week to submit our request for a subpoena. Attorney Minora is working on that and that is in the process right now so there is many different roads of that request we can down so we'll see how it plays out as we go along.

A couple of other issues that have been in front of council the last few weeks, we did attempt to contact Director Gallagher in regards to the Merrifield Avenue problem. We are requesting information with regards to what would it take to scope out the storm water line on Merrifield Avenue and also

1take a look at getting an estimate on what2costs would be to fix it so we are pursuin3that and we haven't heard anything back y4We also are waiting to hear a5response back from Sewer Authority Direct6Barrett in regards to the monitoring that7should be taking place upon the Monahan8library, so we are all on record as being9opposed to that line, but while it's ther10it does have to be properly monitored and11want to make sure that this is happening.12As Mr. Perry mentioned, we have

13 receive updates from Mr. Hazzouri on the	
14 paving issues, and just to touch on a cou	ple
15 of real quick, Mr. Rogan had mentioned th	at

18 Mr. Hazzouri said that the water company	
19 project in West Side will be begin today,	
20 that's on Sumner Avenue and on Filmore an	d
21 Lincoln. I also received some calls from	
22 people over on Cameron Avenue, their road	
23 had just been paved and now it's being du	g
24 up again. Unfortunately, under that road	
25 there were several gas leaks that were	

required to be torn up so from talking to residents there and also from talking to representatives from the utilities next year when we do paving we will have to try and do a better job on coordinating paving with the city and paving by the utilities. This year was the first attempt at doing that, we had some positive results, but we had some negative results, also. I'm optimistic that if we can work together we should be able to get a plan together to result in a new plan.

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And just one last thing I would like to touch on, myself, Mrs. Novembrino and Mayor Courtright are members of the Board of Directors for the new parking board. As such, it's a seven-member board, there are four members that are from the company representatives and the three of us.

For the first time in my three years on council the Scranton Times did a disservice to this council, I shouldn't say the council, to the members of -- to Mrs. Novembrino and myself and to Mayor Courtright. The story online had a sidebar that detailed the information that Attorney

Shrive requested that the press be allowed into the meeting. I had sent an e-mail earlier in the week that the press be allowed into the meeting. I requested that the press be allowed in the meeting the day of the meeting. Mr. Lockwood was in Roseanne Novembrino's office when the meeting began. Mrs. Novembrino has asked if Mr. Lockwood could stay at the meeting and that request was rejected. Unfortunately, this is a private company and as such they are not subject to the Sunshine laws. Ι will continue to try to request again the press at the meetings every time we have them but, unfortunately, we only have three votes, but as the meeting went on we continued to pressure the board just as for the act of convenience Mrs. Novembrino, the mayor and myself we agreed to funnel our comments or questions through Todd Johns who was the solicitor of the Parking Authority, so we can all get information directly, so I believe it was soon after the meeting concluded around noontime -- I'm sorry, concluded around 1:00, I believe Mr. Johns

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got the information to Mr. Lockwood later in the day, but I do believe that the editorial saying that we are against transparency is absolutely incorrect. This council, myself, and my colleagues I think we are very transparent, and like I said, it's the very first time that on council I think the Times did a disservice. That's all I have. MS. REED: 5-B. FOR INTRODUCTION --AN ORDINANCE - APPROPRIATING FUNDS FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT FOR THE PERIOD COMMENCING ON THE FIRST DAY OF JANUARY, 2017 TO AND INCLUDING DECEMBER 31, 2017 BY THE ADOPTION OF THE GENERAL CITY OPERATING BUDGET FOR THE YEAR 2017. MR. WECHSLER: At this time, I'll entertain a motion that Item 5-B be introduced into its proper committee. MR. ROGAN: So moved. MR. EVANS: Second. MR. WECHSLER: On the question?

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MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question. I'd first like to say that I appreciate the work that Mayor Courtright and his administration, particularly the Business

Administrator's Office put into crafting the 2017 budget. I realize after being on council for almost three years that this is not an easy task and I thank them for their effort. I am still reviewing, along with my colleagues, the 2017 budget and I will continue to do so over the next week.

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However, let me offer a different, maybe more cautious perspective on this budget. At first glance it seems to me again that Mayor Courtright is fixated on increasing salaries almost across the board for city employees and adding more positions to the budget. In the budget narrative, the mayor says, and I quote, "That the percentages of salary increases may be modified in future budgets if inflation and cost of living levels increase."

I have to ask when the last time the city taxpayer has had a cost of living increase? I also have to ask when is the last time the taxpayer has received a raise? I also have to wonder if we are not seeing a tax increase this year because there happens to be a mayoral election quickly

Many people are relieved we approaching. will not see an increase in the taxes this year, and I understand that and I agree, but I'm not ready to celebrate just yet. I'd like to know if there will be a tax increase in 2018 and what the projections are, if possible, for the next five years? I'm also seriously concerned, and I think this is going to be one of the biggest issues that we face that I think people are showing a lack of really regard for that we are banking on the proceeds from the sale of the Sewer Authority without first knowing how much storm water management will cost us. Ι believe, as I said, in the newspaper that we should put any proceeds from the sale in an escrow account until we know for sure how much it will cost us to manage our storm water system. This is going to be a huge multi-million dollar undertaking that will cost the taxpayers of this city. How much will the equipment cost? What about the manpower? How are we going to handle lakes and costs and the employees that we'll probably have to hire? Who will clean the

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system on day one and are we equipped to do that? We need to remind the mayor that this is not his money, it is the ratepayers' money. They have invested their hard earned tax dollars into the Sewer Authority for a long time. This is not his personal piggy bank. Allowing this deal to go through without first knowing the cost of storm water management, in my opinion, is simply fiscally irresponsible.

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I would also like to know after months of asking for this information how much we have saved in total from the mayor's renegotiated police and fire contracts that take us out to 2021. It is now been nearly a full year and I think it's time that we see the exact impact. I did ask and I finally received an answer on what is going on with the third party administrator for the police and fire pensions. The director of human resources had sent a correspondence that was hand delivered today of saying that they are not at a point where they even have a request for proposal ready to release. You know. I have to wonder what is the

holdup? Keep in mind that the agreement was finalized back in March and the mayor had said that the police and fire would have their pensions managed by a third party administrator having a neutral doctor determine disability pensions. I was surprised to see that in the firefighters' pension meeting minutes from October 12, 2016, a work-related disability pension was granted. Attorney Durkin stated that his opinion is that the Pension Board is under provisions of the old system where the board still picks the physician. The new system has not been finalized by the city and the This is, quite frankly, fire union. unbelievable. Why is it taking this long? I do remember the mayor saying pack in March and at other points over the past few months that everyone is going to feel the pain over the next few years with our budget problems, and really I don't think this has been completely true.

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In my overview of the budget so far I'm also deeply concerned about the drastic rise in health care costs. 13.92 percent

for the police department, 12 percent for the clerical union, 34 percent for the Public Works Department, and 5.2 percent for the Fire Department. What is the effect of this going to be on the budget and future budgets? These are just some of my concerns

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and I don't think that we should entertain passing this budget until we have answers to these important questions and all of our questions. Over the next weeks, I'll be posing numerous questions to the administration regarding this budget and I hope that I will receive answers. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else? Following up with Mr. Gaughan's comments, I would just like all of us to realize that this is going to be a partnership between city council and the mayor on the proceeds of the Sewer Authority. Mr. Evans attends weekly meetings as our representative with the Pennsylvania Economy League, and there has been some just broad discussions on the best way to spend the proceeds from the

Sewer Authority, so as far as I know, as far as I'm concerned there is nothing settled yet in terms of where the money has -- where the proceeds are going to go. I'm sure there will be a temptation to spend the money on a private -- we haven't had money for quite awhile, but we have to have the discipline and the -- just the fortitude to do the right thing with this money when it comes in, and it will be a combination of the decision and recommendation from the mayor and also the recommendations from the five of us as how we see that money to be spent, so the main thing is get the deal complete and then work on how best to handle the proceeds. The storm water management issue is

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going to be an issue whether the Sewer authority is sold or isn't sold. Somewhere down the line there is going to need to be a major creation of some type of authority, some types of bonds are going to have to be issued and I don't -- I don't see to be able to pay for the improvement from the storm water management system spending all of the

money that comes from the sale of the Sewer Authority. There is going to have to be some type of investment from that, but I think we also are going to have see a creation of some type of authority and also some bonds generated to pay for that improvement.

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So the introduction of budget tonight is the first step, as you said. Ιt does have to be reviewed and I believe it is open to amendment, we can make amendments as we see required, and we will make it a living document. Now, the Pennsylvania Economy League has weighed in on it, it is an accordance with the recovery plan, and as Mr. Rogan stated, I think as we move along this year it should be a good step towards us finally getting out of Act 47. I look forward to the challenge of doing what's right with the budget and also with the proceeds of the Sewer Authority. MR. ROGAN: I wasn't going to bring

up the Sewer Authority, but since I think everyone has chimed in on it, I firmly believe that the Sewer Authority proceeds

need to be we can't put all of our eggs
in one basket when it comes to the sewer
Authority proceeds. I know there are some
out there that think we should use it all
for debt repayment or all for pension to
help the pension funds, but the best way to
use it, in my opinion, the best way to use
this money, is a measured approach across
all of these categories. You know, I do
believe firmly that the pensions need to be
shored up. I think we can all agree to
that. Even more so a big portion of the tax
bill the residents of the Scranton are
paying is not for to operate the city.
It's for debt that's been levied for the
last 10, 20, 30 years, that we are paying
off. Much of that debt if it's retired will
actually result in a tax decrease for the
residents and that's something I think is
very important moving into 2018. If we can
retire a couple of the pieces of this city
debt and reduce that millage I think the
residents of Scranton will be very happy to
see the tax bill go in the opposite
direction which is down, and that's the

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1	direction we need to get that tax bill
2	moving.
3	I would also like to say the
4	recovery plan was brought up, I have to get
5	the mayor a lot of credit this I believe one
6	of the first times that the recovery plan
7	that was crafted has pretty much been
8	followed. I know Councilman Wechsler
9	mentioned, the Pennsylvania Economy League
10	can sign off on this year's budget, but many
11	of these very large initiatives that when
12	this recovery plan was presented many people
13	didn't think they could be accomplished,
14	especially the parking deal that was done
15	and now the sewer deal. These are massive
16	deals and they take, as you see, they take
17	not only months but years to put together
18	and I'm glad to see that for the most part
19	many of the items in the recovery plan,
20	especially the largest ones, have been
21	followed.
22	There's still a lot of work to do
23	there is no question, but many of the key
24	items are being hit and I think we need to
25	keep working our way down that list.
