3	first moved there? Why didn't so what I
4	understand from the last meeting, it's the City
5	and DPW's problem to flush drain water, rain
6	water.
7	So why won't they come out? I don't
8	understand why they won't flush that pipe when
9	I have been asking and other neighbors for
10	years. It seems to me it's such an easy thing
11	to do to at least somewhat please the
12	neighbors.
13	MR. ROGAN: The DPW doesn't have the
14	proper equipment.
15	MR. SREBRO: That's right. The DPW
16	was there today. They looked at it. I saw
17	them there. I went over. I asked them what's
18	up, you know, is anything being done. He told
19	me, well, it's blocked. And they don't have
20	the equipment.
21	And the Sewer Authority won't let
22	them use the equipment to flush the line. So
23	how does the DPW flush lines them?
24	MR. ROGAN: Unfortunately they
25	don't. What we discussed at the meeting was

	21
1	putting that out to bid so a private firm can
2	come in and do that work.
3	MR. SREBRO: I've been an auto
4	mechanic all my life and I don't understand how
5	you could have a job and not have tools to do
6	your job. That's beyond me. Now, I don't
7	understand why the last meeting too the caucus,
8	why there wasn't a representative from DPW here
9	when this was supposed to be all set up.
10	And I thought that there would be a
11	city engineer here. There only one was the
12	supervisor from the Sewer Authority and the two
13	PennDOT guys that I know. PennDOT says it's
14	not their problem. I don't even understand why
15	PennDOT was here because they made that
16	perfectly clear many times I've been on the
17	phone with them.
18	The state representative was on the
19	phone with them. It's not their problem. So
20	is that wow, same questions, same answers.
21	See, this is my beginning of coming to Council
22	meetings. You know, I never had a problem
23	before. But in the five minutes they give you,
24	you know, to say everything that's out there
25	that I'm concerned with and all those neighbors

1	we had and that was just a small part of them,
2	to get in what I want to say, you know, is very
3	difficult.
4	So tonight, it's all about that
5	flushing. Why can't they flush it? Well, do
6	what you have to do to get the equipment, okay,
7	to hire an outside contractor. But it just
8	seems so simple, flush that drain. You'll
9	probably make half of those neighbors not come
10	here anymore because that is going to alleviate
11	the problem somewhat.
12	We know it's not going to cure it.
13	But, jeez, you know, it wouldn't be so bad if
14	the water has somewhere to go. That's beyond
15	me, like, just flush it. You know, I could
16	take you to either side of that drain where it
17	empties into Keyser creek there.
18	And so the equipment to me is like a
19	snake when your drains are clogged to run it up
20	one side, run it down the other side, whatever
21	you got to do. I don't know. I don't seem to
22	be getting answers. The last time one of the
23	guys suggested a lawsuit against the City, a
24	class action lawsuit.
25	Do we really want to go there? But

1	people are starting to talk it when their
2	cellars flood every time it rains or every
3	moderate to heavy rain.
4	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,
5	Mr. Srebro.
6	MR. SREBRO: Thank you.
7	MR. WECHSLER: I know you're not
8	satisfied with the response that you're getting
9	from us. But we are working on it. And I know
10	we're not working on it fast enough for you but
11	we are working on it.
12	MR. SREBRO: Well, I have been
13	hearing that for four years myself and 20 years
14	to the other neighbors.
15	MR. WECHSLER: But just so you're
16	aware, I'm not sure who else is working on it.
17	We are working on it. I'm not sure who else
18	is, but we are.
19	MR. ROGAN: Just to add to what Mr.
20	Wechsler said, you know, I know you've been
21	dealing with it for decades. But we just had
22	the meeting we set up for the neighbors in your
23	neighborhood last week. So we've only been
24	involved in this process probably a month or so
25	since you first came to Council with this

1	issue.
2	MR. SREBRO: First came to Council
3	probably about six weeks ago. But I have been
4	on the phone with the City, you know, for years
5	now.
6	MR. ROGAN: No, I understand that.
7	I understand your frustration. But we've only
8	been involved for six weeks. Since when you
9	first came to Council, since then, we did
10	organize a meeting as I promised we would. And
11	we're going to keep pursuing it because it's a
12	major problem that we want to see fixed.
13	MR. EVANS: Since it looks like the
14	DPW was actually out there this week, can
15	Mrs. Reed, can you send something a note to
16	Mr. Gallagher to find out exactly what he knows
17	and what he found out while his crew was out
18	there? Maybe there are plans to hire somebody
19	and get somebody out there and finish this
20	project.
21	MR. GAUGHAN: And just to add, I
22	wasn't here last week. But when you brought up
23	the idea of lawsuits, you know, I understand
24	what you're going through because I'm trying to
25	help the gentleman out on Wyoming Avenue.

25 1 I don't know if you heard, he has a 2 big hole in his backyard. And he just called 3 me today and he has to sue the City. They told him for -- he came here six months ago. 4 The 5 money is appropriated for the project. Then he called the Mayor. Then he called the Law 6 7 Department. Nobody would call him back. 8 So I understand what you're talking 9 I wish I could snap my fingers. about. But 10 I'm going through the same thing. You call the 11 Law Department. You call the Mayor, nobody 12 answers. You call the DPW. You call somebody 13 I don't know, I think it's the Sewer else. 14 Authority's problem. Sewer Authority tells you it's the 15 16 DPW's problem. So when you talk about 17 lawsuits, it might -- that might have to be an 18 option to be honest with you because the 19 gentleman that lives on Wyoming Avenue had to 20 sue the City as of today. So I mean this whole 21 thing is ridiculous. 22 And the Mayor actually lives in your 23 neighborhood. Why this thing can't get taken 24 care of is absurd. MR. SREBRO: See, now, I've just 25

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1	been going through this like a representative
2	of the neighborhood. But other neighbors have
3	been through what I'm going through. They've
4	had a caucus like this a couple years ago.
5	Afterwards, nothing was done.
6	This is a problem that's going on
7	severely for 20 years. People are just giving
8	up. I'm not.
9	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Lee
10	Morgan.
11	MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.
12	Well, you know, a while back people were
13	watching this on YouTube and laughing at the
14	Council. And they said they were laughing at
15	Ray Lyman. But maybe they were just laughing
16	at the Council. And, you know, that was a
17	reason to tune in.
18	Because it's like I said before on
19	this issue you were just discussing today, the
20	problem will solve itself when these people die
21	because this City has hasn't done anything for
22	its residents for so long that it's just
23	mind-boggling.
24	And I think you could see that now
25	in what's taking place nationally how very

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1	upset the American people are with all the
2	political hacks that are in office from the
3	bottom of this country to the top, whether it's
4	district attorneys, whether it's judges,
5	whether it's state representatives, federal
6	representatives.
7	We've just elected people that have
8	no respect for the American people in general.
9	And for Mr. Rogan to come up and say you just
10	got involved in something in the last month or
11	two after all the years you've been on this
12	Council, you know
13	MR. ROGAN: Six weeks ago was the
14	first time it was brought up to us. And as
15	soon as it was, we started working on it.
16	MR. MORGAN: Well, these people have
17	been suffering for 20 years. But this isn't an
18	isolated issue. There's people suffering
19	across this whole city. We've got people now
20	that have two empty downtown properties and
21	they are waiting for a handout. I asked this
22	Council a couple weeks ago what Mayor Dougherty
23	had to do with the Parking Authority deal with
24	the new owner of the mall and what part he
25	played in that role in that.

1 Look it, this Council has 2 sidestepped its obligation to investigate for 3 decades. Like this double pension thing, that should have happened a long time ago, not now. 4 5 Don't worry about what the state police did, wonder about what the Council did when these 6 7 pensions were voted and when all of this took 8 place. 9 And for a City to be distressed for 10 25 years and sell off every single asset in 11 this City and then just to sit there and, you 12 know, twitch your finger or doodle on a piece 13 of paper, you make an ass out of yourselves 14 because it's beyond the point of incompetence. It's really official oppression. 15 16 That's my opinion. And I think that if anybody 17 had any common sense, they'd just start suing 18 every single one of you. Sue the City. Sue 19 every Councilman. Sue every representative. 20 Start throwing them all out of office. 21 You know, I was thinking about it 22 today about the state hospital when Governor 23 Casey was Governor and he closed the State 24 Hospital in Scranton. And then you look at the 25 detox unit they had there. And you look at the

doctor that was going to give land for Veterans Center so they didn't have to tear the Scranton State General Hospital down. And you look at the cost of the healthcare across this nation. And you look at George Yuhas on the -- up by the U of Scranton, okay, who was fighting the process of closing the state hospitals.

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And, you know, you just take a look at all the incompetent things that our elected government has done. And you're not even sorry for it. You're just ignorant. You just -- you think you're powerful. You have no respect for the people you represent. The five minute bell goes off and you're done with us. Go.

And then you send the sheriff out. You sell somebody's house. You got seniors living in this country on measly Social Security because Social Security was looted for the last 50 years. And there is no money left in this country from the bottom to the top.

We're borrowing over a trillion dollars a year to stay afloat. And the American people have been reduced to third world country with massive amounts of Americans with no jobs. And we sit here and we look at

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1	what we see here. And it's ridiculous.
2	We're doing a study to find out how
3	much it costs to take garbage to the landfill?
4	Come on, are you serious? I mean, it's the
5	most ridiculous thing I've ever heard. You're
6	fighting blight with a land bank that you
7	created by incompetence of city government, not
8	this decade. For 80 years and you've just
9	pushed people and pushed people into poverty.
10	And there is no place left to go.
11	You've got people living off of Gordon Avenue
12	by the river, hundreds of them because of how
13	well you run the City. And I just really think
14	you need to hang your head in shame. And I
15	hope and my I really hope that this country
16	elects Donald Trump to be President, why?
17	Because his not a politician.
18	He may not be perfect. He has
19	flaws. They all have flaws. But I think the
20	mole that's bringing all of this information in
21	on Hillary Clinton and their foundation are
22	inside the state department and the FBI because
23	they're tired of the way our government is.
24	MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?
25	MR. SBARAGLIA: Andrew Sbaraglia,

31 Scranton, I guess today isn't going to be your 1 There's too much happening in the City. 2 night. 3 I heard there's a petition going around to try to put on the ballot if we should declare 4 bankruptcy. I don't know if the City is 5 bankrupt, just the leadership. 6 7 We reduce -- we get rid of the 8 leadership, we wouldn't have to be worrying 9 about bankruptcy. But we have four year --10 another year to go. I don't know if we can 11 take another year. It's just too bad. Too bad 12 you don't look at the total picture. We have a lot of problems in the 13 14 City. Most of them wasn't caused by you. The federal government caused a lot of it when they 15 16 decided to out source jobs and destroyed our 17 garment industry, our tube industry, our plant 18 industry, all kinds of industry was destroyed 19 by the federal government. 20 I don't know if you were around. Ι 21 fought it. I fought NAFTA. But I was old 22 enough to realize you can't take a job and take 23 it away from an American who is paying high 24 taxes. That's the problem and give it to 25 somebody from a different country who don't pay

our taxes.

2	What does that do for the individual
3	within the country? It raises our taxes. Why
4	the government didn't see it, I don't know. I
5	hope it's just for they were incompetent,
6	rather how to put it, not very honest. And
7	that's what we face today. Our government is
8	our problem.
9	The government is destroying
10	democracy. And there is no question about that
11	from the federal, state, and local. Democracy
12	is being destroyed. Individuals are being
13	given all kinds of benefits and the rest of us,
14	nothing. How you can sit there and think about
15	that parking leasing and the money we lost is
16	tremendous.
17	I estimated over the life of the
18	contract to be 150 million at least, if not
19	more. And I don't know why we should make one
20	individual rich because of the fact we don't
21	like competition. That was a ludicrous answer
22	to a problem. Why you would pay four and a
23	half million for spaces in the garage and then
24	sell almost the same spaces in another garage
25	for a dollar.

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1	And most of that garage were built
2	at the same time. Does it make sense? No.
3	Nothing that this City has been done within the
4	last couple years has made sense. You made
5	people rich or being going to be rich. And
6	when you start making individuals rich, you got
7	to look at why. I asked for an investigation.
8	The best way we can straighten out
9	this whole problem is to have an investigation
10	of the actions of the City government, Council,
11	Mayor, and poor Roseann, which I don't even
12	know if she knows what's going on there. But
13	these are things that we should do.
14	And if we don't do it, we're going
15	down the road of real deep problems. And
16	there's no way out of them. Pretty soon it
17	won't be safe to go anywhere in the City
18	without a problem because of our government.
19	People are lose faith in the
20	government. You don't even have to guess. You
21	see what's happening on the national stage.
22	They have lost faith. They think the
23	government all they are is for themselves. And
24	that's the sad part about it because a lot of
25	them are.

34 I have the saddest thing I ever 1 2 heard was a man running for treasury -- the 3 last three treasurers were indicted for corruption or the Supreme Court being indicted 4 5 for corruption of the state. And you tell me things are great? 6 No. 7 As I always said, your government is 8 your enemy. Your weapon is your vote. If you 9 don't use your vote wisely you're in for deep, 10 deep trouble. Thank you. 11 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. 12 MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening. Dave 13 Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer, property owner. 14 Last week if I'm not mistaken, it was mentioned that the 14th -- starting the 14th is leaf 15 16 collection week. Well, guess what? That's 17 paper week. So now it will carry over and 18 maybe half the town is affected by this because 19 Thursday, two weeks later is Thanksgiving day. 20 And the day after that is my 21 recycling which will be moved up to Saturday. 22 So I could see that no recommendation is taken 23 seriously here. I'm so tired of papers sitting 24 in my house over the holidays -- recyclable 25 I don't know what to do about it. paper.

But that's the way it is. So don't 1 2 expect a good grade on that. Earlier this week 3 I guess, what, November 1st we had another think tank with advice of Scranton. 4 Some of 5 their advice wasn't even legal. Mr. Bulzoni jumped in on that. 6 7 And, you know, I wonder if this 8 think tank was paid for all of this wonderful 9 advice and these observations probably very 10 generously. Some crony, clueless, college prop 11 came up with this idea and got paid \$100,000 or 12 whatever. My advice to the government if that 13 was the case, send us the money. Skip them. 14 You know, I get the impression if I was a cucumber farmer and my crop failed, 15 16 they'd probably say, why didn't you cut to the 17 chase and grow pickles. Send us the money 18 instead, you know. You require us to have 35 19 percent of our property on tax exempt. 20 It's just mind-boggling. And the 21 leachate line is in the next or a few days, 22 what was that, October 29th, a few days 23 earlier. And my advice to you guys -- excuse 24 me, is I would definitely differ from the 25 City's opinion on it.

1 I have witnessed myself but I would 2 suggest that you get that out there. And that 3 man that keeps coming about the flooding in the neighborhood, I mean, we need an emergency 4 5 project. These are people's houses and their homes. And when you have a situation like 6 7 that, it could do enough damage that you wind 8 up with a condemned sign on your house. And 9 guess what? You still have to pay the mortgage 10 or your credit rating is ruined. 11 Once again I'd like to get out there on pensions. I'm sure a lot of anti-Social 12 13 Security idealize which have been around since 14 1936 are totally against it. And if you people think that their pensions are more secure by 15 16 being handled by a smaller entity, a lot of the 17 money wasn't returned to the pensions after the 18 2007 started, shake up on Wall Street and 19 continued into 2009. 20 And we came with the bailout. And 21 the government assumed a lot of the debts and 22 problems with it. But it was largely caused by 23 people being handed mortgages that really 24 should not have handed mortgages. And then it

tumbled from there. So when people start

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1	losing their jobs and there's a total domino
2	affect from it, then they're unable to pay for
3	their pay their way and on loans and so
4	forth.
5	So it's time that most pensions be
6	rolled over into a Social Security system
7	that's stable. And by the way, raising the age
8	only takes it off of the industrial workers.
9	They don't live as long as somebody that sits
10	on their ditty box in a nice clean office all
11	day. Thank you and have a good night.
12	MS. SCHUMAKER: Good evening. Marie
13	Schumaker. Following up on what Dave just
14	said, whatever happened to your revisory
15	recovery plan and that item to validate the 401
16	C3s or nonprofit organizations are not
17	automatically exempt from property taxes?
18	Whatever happened to that? What, I didn't hear
19	you.
20	MR. EVANS: I'll mention that in
21	motions if you'd like.
22	MS. SCHUMAKER: Yes, I would. Thank
23	you. And then maybe while I got you, last week
24	we talked about the difference in tax

19	MR. EVANS: Yes, I was.
20	MS. SCHUMAKER: Can you tell me when
21	was the last assessment?
22	MR. EVANS: Between 1968 and 1970.
23	MS. SCHUMAKER: Two years?
24	MR. EVANS: Well, it took that long
25	to do it, yeah, in that time frame, yeah.

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1	MS. SCHUMAKER: Okay. Thank you.
2	There is a rather new area of the East Mountain
3	which is at the top of Cherry Street, all new
4	housing. First building I think was in '93.
5	They've got lots that are 100 by 150. And
6	their lot is assessed at \$2,000.
7	And you're telling me that because
8	it's in a neighborhood where the other ones
9	I mean, nothing makes sense. I would just love
10	to see how land a simple statement on how

40 MR. WECHSLER: I didn't attend the 1 2 meeting either. But I have Spoken with 3 Mr. Notariani and Mr. O'Malley about 2. 4 reassessment. MR. EVANS: Yeah, and I've spoken to 5 all three of them. 6 7 MS. SCHUMAKER: I thought you were 8 sending a letter to the commissioners, to all 9 three commissioners that you needed or you were 10 going to go to court. That was my 11 understanding. I think I could go back in the minutes and pull that out. 12 13 MR. EVANS: Yeah, I'm not sure if we 14 actually formalized sending a letter to them but we all talked to them individually. 15 16 MR. ROGAN: I believe we sent them 17 more than one letter over the last year or two. 18 MR. SCHUMAKER: Maybe you could ask 19 Mrs. Reed. Maybe she would remember if you 20 sent a letter. MR. ROGAN: I know as soon as the 21 22 commissioners changed, when the new 23 commissioners came in office, we sent a letter 24 at that point again. 25 MR. WECHSLER: I think we're having

41 some affect because Mr. Wallace started talking 1 2 about it last week. 3 MS. SCHUMAKER: Well, I understand that. 4 MR. WECHSLER: So I think we're 5 6 having --MS. 9	blocked. We don't know what equipment is used.
10	I'm not disagreeing that we should do
11	something. We don't have any idea how much
12	it's going to cost.
13	MR. EVANS: We did authorize the
14	funding for Mr. Young's hole and that's still
15	in limbo because of now a potential lawsuit.
16	So we don't have shovels. We don't have picks.
17	We don't have backhoes. You know, and we don't
18	have the authority to tell somebody to go and
19	do it. We can ask them to do it.
20	MS. SCHUMAKER: Well, you could tell
21	the Business Administrator to put out an RFQ to
22	see what it would cost.
23	MR. EVANS: We did.
24	MS. SCHUMAKER: For this effort?
25	MR. EVANS: Not for this one but for

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1	Mr. Young's property. The money has been
2	appropriated.
3	MS. SCHUMAKER: Twenty years I think
4	is long enough. I think you could do that.
5	You could
6	MR. WECHSLER: I agree with you. I
7	agree that's something that we should look at
8	because we did have success. We got
9	Mr. Young's project as far as we can get it.
10	We got them to approve an emergency
11	declaration. We found the money for it. And
12	then between the City and Mr. Young, they can't
13	come to agreement on how we can get the
14	contractor on his property.
15	Mr. Young has concerns that are
16	legitimate. And that's up to him and the City
17	to work out now, not City Council. We got it
18	as far as we can get it. I see you don't agree
19	but it's the truth.
20	MS. SCHUMAKER: I don't agree
21	because you keep talking about what a wonderful
22	relationship with the Mayor and the Business
23	Administrator and all of this. But the proof
24	of the pudding is in whether they do what you
25	request. If they're ignoring you, you don't

44 1 have a good relationship. 2 MR. WECHSLER: But they -- they did 3 agree to fix Mr. Young's property. That's not 4 in dispute. The problem is getting an 5 agreement between Mr. Young and the City on getting the contractor on his property. 6 And 7 Mr. Young's concerns are legitimate. 8 MS. SCHUMAKER: Yes, they are. 9 MR. WECHSLER: So they need to have something worked out. 10 11 MS. SCHUMAKER: So does Mr. Srebro --12 13 MR. WECHSLER: But in terms of what 14 the City Council can do, we did what we can do. Council's 14 request for the copy the PSP investigation. Corporal Reffer indicated that the 15 16 State Police doesn't traditionally release any 17 of their investigative materials unless it's a 18 criminal case and then would release to law 19 enforcement agencies, such as, the District 20 Attorney's Office. 21 However, request for release of 22 information may be subpoenaed if the requesting 23 party has subpoena power. And if information 24 is tied to a criminal case. A subpoena to turn 25 over the report can be served to the

1 Pennsylvania State Police Commissioner. 2 In our caucus prior to the meeting, 3 Council and Attorney Minora discussed this 4 issue at length of whether to pursue this route 5 to get this information from the State Police. 6 I have been of the opinion since the story 7 first broke, that Council should exercise our 8 subpoena power. 9 First, in this case, to get the 10 information from the State Police and review 11 the information. Make it public. The public 12 has a right to know this information and they 13 deserve answers on how this happened and we 14 need to make sure it doesn't happen again. 15 That being said, I would like to 16 make a motion to authorize Attorney Minora to	40
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15 That being said, I would like to	
16 make a motion to authorize Attorney Minora to	
17 do whatever by any means necessary to petition	
18 the courts to serve the subpoenas to request	
19 this information from the State Police.	
20 MR. EVANS: I'll second for a vote.	
21 MR. WECHSLER: There's a motion made	Э
on the floor and seconded. On the question.	
23 MR. ROGAN: Yes, this is in response	Э
24 to the State Police in order to get the	
25 information, the proper procedure for Council	

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1	is to pursue a subpoena. I don't know if you
2	want to comment at all, Attorney Minora, on how
3	that process works.
4	ATTY. MINORA: Sure. In order to
5	obtain a subpoena if you don't have a present
6	court case with a term and docket number, we'd
7	have to go into motion court with a petition
8	requesting a subpoena and the reasons why we
9	would want that issued.
10	And it would be filed to a
11	miscellaneous docket and the court would issue
12	a subpoena for us to serve. And that would be
13	then sent to in this particular instance the
14	Commissioner of the State Police. At that
15	time, he would have several options.
16	He might move to quash the subpoena
17	or he might simply send us the documents we
18	requested based on our petition. And that
19	would be generally how it goes. There could
20	certainly be further litigation afterwards on a
21	motion to quash. But generally, that's how it
22	would go.
23	MR. ROGAN: Thank you.
24	MR. WECHSLER: Yes. On the question
25	as Councilman Rogan mentioned, we did talk

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1	about this in caucus and the idea that we have
2	for serving the subpoena would be that we would
3	like to get this information so we can use it
4	as we move forward in working on pension
5	reform.
6	We don't know what's in the PSP
7	report. But I do think we have to make an
8	effort to get that information so we can take a
9	look at possible changes that we need to make
10	to this. Also we're going to do this because
11	there is some question on the extent of
12	Council's subpoena power.
13	And I think this would provide some
14	good case law for us as we move forward
15	possibly using subpoenas to help us administer
16	this government. So I will be voting for the
17	motion.
18	MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question,
19	I don't have a problem requesting the
20	information. But the reason given I don't
21	necessarily agree with that we need to look at
22	the information to find out what we need how
23	we need to reform the pensions.
24	There was a report issued by the
25	Auditor General when he did his investigation

49 1 into this whole deal that clearly states what 2 happened, what went wrong, and what reforms 3 need to be put in place. So I don't think although I agree with the motion, I have no 4 5 problem with it, I don't think we're going to find anything that's going to lead us to, you 6 7 know, making different reforms. 8 Those reforms have already been 9 issued in the report months ago from the Auditor General. 10 11 MR. Anything beyond that is just 23 window dressing. And I don't really have an 24 appetite to go beyond this step. 25 Hopefully we'll get the information

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1	we need and we can make real affirmative
2	positive reform because of that and then we
3	move on.
4	MR. WECHSLER: All those in favor
5	signify by saying aye.
6	ALL MEMBERS: Aye.
7	MR. WECHSLER: Opposed?
8	(No response.)
9	MR. WECHSLER: The ayes have it and
10	so moved.
11	MR. ROGAN: Thank you. And I
12	appreciate my colleagues unanimous support in
13	this endeavor. And I guess we will soon see.
14	Attorney Minora, you have your work cut out for
15	you. Bring us back some information so we can
16	dig through it and release it to the public.
17	One other item I would like to
18	address today is the upcoming budget. It has
19	been brought up by a couple speakers. As you
20	know, budget time is about two weeks away when
21	Council will receive we'll receive the
22	budget.
23	And a lot of people in the community
24	have been asking me what's in the budget, what
25	does it look like. And unfortunately, I don't

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1	know those answers. Only at this time the
2	Business Administrator, the Mayor, and maybe
3	the Finance Chair do.
4	But the big question that everyone
5	keeps asking is the pocketbook question. Is
6	our taxes going up, how much, what would you
7	support. Well, I can't answer the questions on
8	what will be in the proposal, I would state
9	that I would not support any budget that has
10	contains a property tax increase.
11	The City of Scranton has increased
12	fees and taxes for many years. Some
13	unfortunately were necessary. Other times it
14	was done in a wasteful manner. But I think
15	over the course of the last few years, the City
16	has gotten itself to the point where the budget
17	is beginning to stabilize. And tax increases
18	have to be taken off the table.
19	And that leads into my final comment
20	and I wasn't planning on addressing it but I
21	will very briefly because it was brought up.
22	There is talk of a petition going around
23	through the City regarding bankruptcy filing.
24	City Council is not entertaining filing
25	bankruptcy.

1 It's certainly not something on any 2 of our plates right now. And the progress that 3 has been made in the City since 2012 when it was something I did seriously look at until 4 5 now has been quite substantial. 6 Because of that progress is why I 7 wouldn't be able to support any property tax 8 increases. But if you look at our budgets, 9 they really have been shored up over the last 10 few years by a combination of many items. So I 11 think unfortunately it has been getting some attraction in the media. 12 13 But that is completely off the 14 I know Councilman Wechsler is going to table. address it as well under his comments. 15 But I 16 just wanted to set the record straight 17 regarding that. And that is all. Thank you. 18 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Mr. Evans. 19 20 MR. EVANS: Thank you. On the 21 validation of the nonprofits, as you all know I am a proponent of that. I insisted on the 22 23 language that was added to the recovery plan. 24 I'll send a letter again to the administration 25 asking them when they are going start that

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1	process because I think it's something that is
2	very valuable. And we'll reach some dividends.
3	On the land assessment values, it
4	was established back at the last reassessment
5	they are totally out of whack. I've seen land
6	assessments on one side of the street being
7	double what they are across the street. It's
8	absolutely and that points to why we need a
9	reassessment, especially in Scranton because
10	land values are taxed at a higher millage rate.
11	So people who have a higher land
12	value are really impacted. And you see that in
13	areas of East Mountain and West Mountain, Green
14	Ridge, and the upper hill. So again, it goes
15	back to our need to do a reassessment. And all
16	of us I think are in agreement with that.
17	All of us have formally or
18	informally asked the commissioners to support
19	that. I made the statement before that if it
20	doesn't happen, I would support the
21	administration taking the county to court to
22	force a reassessment. I've never shied away
23	from that. So and it's still my position.
24	At some point in time it has to
25	happen. Hopefully it's going to happen sooner

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1	than later. On a positive note, I would like
2	to personally congratulate since he's here
3	tonight, Councilman Gaughan and his new son
4	Murphy James Gaughan.
5	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.
6	MR. EVANS: Congratulations again,
7	you and your wife Kelly.
8	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

10	And it helps there's a little bit of a

15	that a little while ago.
16	But I noticed there was a small
17	notice in the paper relative to leaf pickup.
18	It stated that the DPW is picking up leaves
19	from November 15th through November 19th.
20	They'll be picking up those leaves instead of
21	newspapers. Again, they did that last year.
22	And the leaves should be bagged and
23	I'm assuming in paper bags. I have a couple
24	comments relative to the scenario. First of
25	all, I truly appreciate the thousands of

55 1 citizens and taxpayers that take time to rake 2 their leaves and bag them for recycling. They 3 are accomplishing several things. 4 They are improving the appearance of 5 their properties. They are removing potential 6 safety hazards and they're helping the City to 7 save tipping fees. So thank you very much for 8 what you do in that regard. 9 But here's where it sort of goes off 10 the rails for me. Apparently the City will 11 only be collecting for one week. And during 12 that week they don't collect newspapers, etc., 13 for recycling. So if you haven't raked your 14 leaves by that time or the leaves are not fully 15 off the trees of your property by that time, 16 then most of your leaf pickup will end up in 17 the landfill. 18 And some of the newspapers and 19 cardboard, etc., will also end up in the 20 landfill because most likely because you would 21 have had to wait two cycles to pick up those 22 recyclable items. So now we're working on that 23 but our recycling percentage remains anemic 24 especially for newspapers. We should be doing 25 everything we can to increase those percentages	-

I know recycling 11 this year was a big topic for all of us. Zero waste is something we talked about we really 12 13 have to get back to. But the leaf pickup plan 14 is flawed. It sacrifices recycling, which is wrong. And hopefully we can get -- it's really 15 16 not that complicated, folks. 17 You know, we have to figure out a 18 better way of doing it. They are doing it all 19 over the country in a much more efficient 20 manner than we are. So that's all I have for 21 tonight. 22 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Mr. 23 Gaughan. 24 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. 3	has been detailed for the past year to the

5	The training unit conducts various
6	procurement activities for the police
7	department including use of City funds to
8	procure police equipment. A potential conflict
9	arises because Joseph Harris's father, Thomas
10	Harris runs a family business called Roll Call,
11	LLC.
12	The company sells equipment of the
13	same type that the police department procures,
14	police, fire, EMS and sports equipment.
15	Recently Roll Call applied for a grant for its
16	business under the City of Scranton's Business
17	and Industry Loan and Grant program, a program
18	which supports small business.
19	Under the CDBG conflict regulations,
20	a conflict of interest exits if a public
21	employee who is either in a position of
22	decision making authority or in a position with
23	opportunity to access inside information in
24	regard to CDBG activities stands to obtain a
25	benefit from a CDBG assisted activity.

	61
1	In this case because of his
2	position, Joseph Harris could have the
3	opportunity to be exposed to information on the
4	City's procurement and selection process.
5	Harris could be familiar with the processes the
6	City uses to award grants and choose suppliers.
7	This inside information could
8	benefit his father's business Roll Call, LLC,
9	and knowing how to maximize the chance of being
10	awarded a grant from the City. This knowledge
11	would, therefore, bring an indirect benefit to
12	Joseph Harris. And thus it would constitute a
13	conflict of interest.
14	Once a threshold determination is
15	made that a conflict exits, we must decide
16	whether the person subject to the conflict has
17	shown good cause to waive the conflict. After
18	careful review, we have decided that the City
19	of Scranton OECD has not established good cause
20	to award the grant to Roll Call.
21	It is true that Roll Call plans to
22	use the funds to relocate its business from
23	Duryea to Scranton which would bring eight to
24	ten jobs to the City. However, this potential
25	economic benefit to the City of Scranton cannot

	62
1	override HUD's strong interest in maintaining
2	public confidence and the fairness and
3	integrity of programs that are funded by HUD
4	funds.
5	We also review the affidavits of
6	Joseph Harris and his father Thomas Harris
7	that we received recently. Joseph Harris swore
8	in his affidavit that he has no ownership
9	interest in Roll Call, LLC., has never had any
10	ownership interest and will not accept any
11	ownership interest for a minimum period of one
12	year following his termination of employment
13	with City of Scranton.
14	Thomas Harris affirmed that his son
15	has no ownership in Roll Call, LLC., and will
16	continue to have no ownership interest for a
17	period of one year from the end of his
18	employment with the City. However, the
19	father's affidavit does not say that Joseph
20	Harris has never had interest in Roll Call.
21	Additionally, we have received
22	conflicting information at different times
23	regarding whether or not Joseph Harris has an
24	interest in Roll Call. But perhaps most
25	significantly even if Joseph Harris does not

	63
1	retain an ownership interest in Roll Call, his
2	job position with the City can potentially
3	expose him to inside information that would
4	benefit Roll Call's application for the loan
5	and grant program.
6	This may undermine public confidence
7	and the impartiality of City programs that are
8	funded by HUD's CDBG. For these reasons we
9	are unfortunately unable to waive the conflict
10	of interest presented due to the absence of
11	good cause.
12	Now, that in itself on its face is
13	extremely troubling to say the least.
14	Mr. Rogan also stated that once a different pot
15	of money was being used to avoid the conflict,
16	the state had vetted the deal and gave the
17	okay. I'd like to see the documentation on
18	that.
19	It was not in the backup, nor was it
20	in the documents provided by OECD. So I'd like
21	to know where that information came from. And
22	I'd like to see it. I do plan on requesting
23	more information from the state on the use of
24	these funds. And the reason that I bring this
25	up is because I believe that set an awful

	64
1	precedent by the actions taken two weeks ago.
2	First, legitimate concerns were
3	brought up about the legislation and they were
4	blatantly ignored by my colleagues.
5	Second, the mere appearance of a
6	conflict of interest should have been enough
7	for Mayor Courtright and this Council to put
8	the nix to this deal. It erodes the public
9	trust in these programs and quite frankly in
10	this Council.
11	I find it amazing that Mayor
12	Courtright would work so hard to find ways to
13	avoid a conflict and help a City employee's
14	family out but won't take the time to answer a
15	call from Al Young who has a gaping hole in his
16	backyard and who I found out today has no
17	choice but to sue the City.
18	I find it amazing that Mayor
19	Courtright would go to great lengths to
20	sidestep this conflict of interest but will not
21	lift a finger or utter a word and actually
22	sides with Louis DeNaples and the landfill when
23	it comes to fighting for the neighbors in Green
24	Ridge who want their day in court to settle the
25	leachate dispute.

65 1 I'd be lying if I said I was surprised but this is business as usual under 2 3 the Courtright administration and I am quite 4 frankly appalled. Thank you. 5 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Gaughan. 6 Just to clarify one 7 MR. ROGAN: 8 thing that Mr. Gaughan mentioned and it was 9 clarified in the newspaper as well. I believe it was two weeks ago. I did reference the 10 11 state funds being the use of the funds. And I 12 did misspeak when I said HUD.
