2	MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else? A
3	couple of announcements for council.
4	First of all, next week's council's
5	meeting is scheduled for back at City
6	Hall. We are hoping that the repairs
7	and the inspection of the elevator are
8	completed by then.
9	Tomorrow, October 30th, 10 a.m.
10	the groundbreaking for Goodwill at the
11	old or former North Scranton Junior
12	High School long awaited by many
13	people and a good project to begin.
14	Also a reminder that this
15	Saturday is daylight saving time, turn
16	clocks back one hour and change
17	batteries and smoke alarms which is
18	recommended by many.
19	Tuesday is Election Day. Please,
20	a reminder to all citizens to go out
21	and exercise your right and as far as
22	I'm concerned your responsibility to
23	vote in this election.
24	And last thing, on next week's
25	agenda or next week there will be a

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1	public hearing regarding the SAPA
2	legislation that will be reintroduce
3	in 7th Order and anyone wishing to
4	comment or any support or not for the
5	SAPA plan, please, there will be a
6	public hearing at 5:30 next Thursday.
7	And I believe that was all of the
8	announcements.
9	MS. REED: 4TH ORDER. CITIZENS
10	PARTICIPATION.
11	MR. MCGOFF: I believe Mr. Ellman
12	first on the list.
13	MR. ELLMAN: Friends and ex
14	friends and the people in the middle.
15	You know, in my opinion the past eight
16	years of my young life I've suffered
17	through the worst president this
18	country ever had that I've lived
19	under, the worst governor. Two people
20	put in jail for the county and the
21	worst mayor since the founding of the
22	city. That's a lot for one person
23	now. I talked to so many people
24	failed this administration just go
25	going nowhere, absolutely nowhere.

Yesterday -- let me just get off the subject. Yesterday I went to the Taurus Club about 2 o'clock. Thev put me out the door at 7:30 so I was there a good while and I probably talked to eight or ten people. You know, every time I went to the bathroom we would talk about it and people, most of them that I talk to don't live in town, some had property here. I'm not talking about the people that I talked to at the grocery store. I'm talking about some professional people, you know, and so forth. They just don't see anything good going on. Everybody thinks you need to restructure these loans instead of worrying about credit and borrowing more. It's just going to fall on children and grandchildren. Last week -- well, a couple weeks ago Marywood took another piece of property on Washington, a \$150,000. How are we going to cover it? Just raise taxes, that's all. That's all that we -- this very host at this

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1 building, our very host last month 2 took four million dollars off. You 3 know, what we're going to do? Just 4 raise more taxes? Something's got to 5 be done. Mr. Bilda proposed a little 6 program, nobody had any interest in it. 7 I ask why we can have a zone and 8 Mr. Hughes looked into it and said it 9 might have some possibility. Nobody 10 went ever further. You people just 11 keep falling back on the fact that you 12 can raise taxes and that's obscene. 13 You just can't do it. I don't know if 14 anybody saw it or was interested. 15 Kings College bought a piece of 16 property, \$125,000. Guess what? They 17 agreed to pay taxes for ten years. 18 Here it is right here. Why couldn't 19 your messiah, Amoroso think of 20 something like that for the city 21 instead of just telling everybody to 22 raise taxes and sell everything we 23 have. He is such a -- who is paying 24 him anyway? Why is he still hanging 25 around here wasting everybody's money

1	and time. He hasn't come up with one
2	positive thing since the day he hit
3	this city. You know, he doesn't live
4	here, he doesn't have no property
5	here, he doesn't now the people, the
6	city and that's why people don't want
7	to live here because of things that he
8	thinks we ought to be doing instead of
9	helping people save their homes. I
10	just you know, it's just so the
11	city is just going downhill and you
12	people don't just acknowledge what is
13	going on under your noses. This man
14	just I just don't see where he has
15	any right whatsoever to tell 72,000
16	people what he wants. He's dictating
17	to you and he's just not the kind of
18	person that the caliber of leadership
19	that we need in this time. And before
20	I go, I'd like to say something. I
21	couldn't believe what I heard. Some
22	piece of filth shot out. A momma bear
23	and three cubs needlessly like at the
24	airport and they have a continual
25	history of doing such and our Game

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1	Commission is just worthless and
2	they've been worthless for years and
3	years because I keep up with all this
4	real good. They don't make any
5	attempt to do anything but this was an
6	atrocity. If I get up in the morning
7	early enough to do my chores, I'm
8	going to go to the airport meeting
9	they're have at 10 o'clock or 10:30.
10	But this is most objectionable. Thank
11	you.
12	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you, Mr.
13	Ellman. Miss Hodowanitz.
14	MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
15	Scranton. With regard to Item 3F, the
16	audit status report from Robert Rossi
17	dated October 23rd, there's been
18	actual progress. Instead of 24 items
19	outstanding there are now 23 which is
20	progress over the last two months.
21	Keeping in mind that the audit was due
22	on May 31st and at this rate it won't
23	even be done in 2015; or on the other
24	hand, it might see a flood of
25	information come in and we'll get an

1 audit and then I personally would 2 question validity of the information 3 if everything just suddenly pours out. 4 One of the items that's still 5 outstanding, by the way, is the 6 audited financial statements of the 7 Scranton Parking Authority and we 8 approved that four million dollar note 9 last year and you have no idea what 10 the books look like and we still have 11 no idea what the books look like. 12 I'll be interested in seeing those 13 lines in the budget pertaining to the 14 Scranton Parking Authority. By the 15 way, the budget is due in 17 days and 16 I don't think there will be an audit 17 to support that budget. It also would 18 be interesting to see how you all word 19 the request for proposal for the 2014 20 audit when you have no 2013 audit and 21 no clear concept of when it will be coming in. But that's somebody else's 22 23 headache. not mine. 24 I have a question. If the 25 governor does not sign the Act 47

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1	legislation, does it automatically
2	become law after a certain number of
3	days? Does anyone knows?
4	MR. GAUGHAN: I think after
5	I'm not positive but I think after ten
6	days.
7	MS. HODOWANITZ: Ten days, that
8	would be November 2nd, would it not?
9	MR. GAUGHAN: I'm almost
10	positive.
11	MS. HODOWANITZ: Unless he, of
12	course, vetoes it, correct?
13	MR. GAUGHAN: Correct.
14	MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. Well, I
15	hoe he doesn't veto it even though
16	it's just before the election because
17	I think the city needs a sense of
18	urgency on its distressed status, I
19	really do. I hope we don't go another
20	eight years in distress status. I
21	hope that it's resolved one way or the
22	other even if resolution means going
23	into receivership. I don't think you
24	can continue down this path
25	indefinitely. Twenty-two years is

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1	much too long.
2	Has there be any information on
3	the city's negotiation with the union
4	first on the topic of pension and
5	concessions for pensions. Any
6	information? Was that in progress?
7	MR. MCGOFF: Yes.
8	MS. HODOWANITZ: Negotiations?
9	MR. MCGOFF: Yes. I have
10	received the letter from the Fraternal
11	Order of Police and I'll address it
12	during motions.
13	MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. I
14	appreciate that. I'm glad to see
15	something is going on and I'm happy to
16	see the groundbreaking tomorrow
17	morning for the Goodwill project. I
18	will there. I hope many other people
19	show up. Does anybody have an idea of
20	once that groundbreaking occurs what
21	the timeline should be before that
22	becomes, you know, a functional
23	entity? Anybody? Is it like
24	distressed status? They're working on
25	it, the audit, we're working on it?

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1	MR. ROGAN: I'll ask that
2	question tomorrow morning. I'll ask
3	that question tomorrow morning at the
4	groundbreaking.
5	MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. I'll be
6	listening there. Thank you.
7	MR. MCGOFF: Anyone else who
8	wishes to address council?
9	MR. DOBZYN: Good evening. Dave
10	Dobzyn, resident of Scranton.
11	MR. MCGOFF: Good evening.
12	MR. DOBZYN: Resident of Scranton
13	taxes and fees paid. Now, last week
14	we got into some rather heated
15	comments about the Parking Authority
16	and the default of Landmark loan and I
17	would like to point out once again
18	that it resembled the Kedoff
19	Commission with Frank Costello and
20	Lucky Luciano and whomever else. You
21	know, I paid my taxes. What did you
22	do for your country? I paid my taxes.
23	So what if I squeezed them out of the
24	working class. But I'd also like to
25	remind that 50 million dollars were

spent thanks to the Parking Authority. They acted like a prodigal son and guaranteed and agreed that as long as the litigation with Landmark continued, it will be a negative mark on Scranton. So whether or not we're right or wrong, we kind of -- we might be stuck paying and that's all there is to it. But back when these parking garages were initially in the planning stage, for instance, at the Connell building, a neighborhood activist walked up through the old parking garage and said there wasn't a crack in the concrete or anything. He was told to stay the hell out of there or he would be arrested for trespassing. So, you know, we put up a nice new one and naturally nobody is parking there anyway. On state taxes and the laws and the constitution. There's two dozen cities that are in the same boat, at least two dozen cities. It's probably

more like 30. And I'd like to see us

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1	form a group, a class action group and
2	go after the state to compensate
3	cities for their required taxes and
4	after a certain threshold it's beyond
5	comprehension that we could ever pay
6	our bills with a third of our property
7	tax missing and then drawing on city
8	services on top of it.
9	And on the Sewer Authority, I'd
10	like to bring that up again.
11	Preparations rarely when they
12	misconduct themselves does anyone ever
13	wined up in prison. The only reason
14	Bernie Madoff wound up in prison was
15	because he kept his family out it who
16	probably didn't know what was going
17	on. And in the nineties I'm not
18	sure of the years. I remember the
19	name of the person that went to jail
20	for the lower Lackawanna for
21	cooking a Sewer Authority for
22	cooking the books. And he was
23	released on that point that was poorly
24	treated or whatever and caused the
25	problem and he got caught and I think

1	there was a one year jail sentence.
2	So it's something to consider if you
3	ever think that handing over the Sewer
4	Authority to a corporation it's a good
5	idea because they won't wined up in
6	jail, we'll wine up with the fine like
7	we did the last time and it was
8	considerable. It was two million
9	dollars initially and they bought off
10	and extended the compliance for
11	another 15 years. They wanted it in
12	ten years or something like that. We
13	have 25. So it's only a couple
14	million dollars a year and it's not
15	really attached to city taxes.
16	We need to collect our back trash
17	fees and whatever else is owed. It's
18	like I said, I think people are red
19	poor, red flags in the past, don't
20	bother, do not disturb this person and
21	it's not right to keep raising up
22	someone else's fees so that somebody
23	with five times the money can get by
24	cheaply.
25	And it's time to bring back the

1	golden parrot. I'll make it fast.
2	I'm not even out of time. How about
3	that? Al Boscov owns all kinds of
4	money around town. He donated a \$150
5	grand to Governor Corbett there and
6	it's like you can't keep the them all
7	afloat but you can donate 150 grand to
8	politics. I hope he's gets 15 or 20
9	million back and then it will be a
10	good investment for Mr. Al.
11	And Times editorial page, poor
12	Mr. Courtright, every week, every week
13	there's something depicting him as
14	some kind of wacko or fein and they
15	should really be ashamed of
16	themselves. Why don't they pick on
17	all the people from outside the area
18	that donate to the mayor's race.
19	Thank you and have a good night.
20	Maybe they deserve to pay a few
21	commuter taxes.
22	MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,
23	council. Marie Schumacher.
24	MR. MCGOFF: Good evening.
25	MS. SCHUMACHER: I'm going to

1	start off going back to last week
2	because I'm not sure what you voted
3	on. Going back to the prior week, the
4	16th of September there were several
5	exchanges between Mr. McGoff and
6	people who came to the podium
7	regarding that loan approval and, Mr.
8	McGoff, you said in one, "There is no
9	loan agreement as of yet." The
10	citizen said, "You have no idea what
11	kind of percentage?" Mr. McGoff,
12	"There is no loan agreement get so we
13	don't know. What we are voting on is
14	to give approval for them to negotiate
15	that loan." Mr. McGoff this is the
16	second one. Mr. McGoff, "There is no
17	loan. All we are doing is setting the
18	parameters in which the loan can be
19	negotiated." Citizen, "I understand
20	that but sooner or later the loan is
21	going to negotiated and there's going
22	to be a loan, correct? Is that what
23	this is all about?" Mr. McGoff, "Yes.
24	That's the purpose but there is no
25	loan agreement at this time." Then

1	there another Mr. McGoff said,
2	"Well " Well, I'm sorry. The
3	citizen then replied, "Then why are we
4	voting on it? You know, I mean,
5	seriously." Mr. McGoff said, "We are
6	not voting on a loan." And then there
7	was something else said. And Mr.
8	McGoff again said, "Well, ask it when
9	the actual loan agreement negotiations
10	are complete." "Well, then it will be
11	too late," said the citizen. Mr.
12	McGoff said, "No, it's not too late."
13	Mr. Jackowitz happened to be the
14	citizen. He said, "Yes, it is." And
15	Mr. McGoff said, "That's when we vote
16	on it." Now, that implied that there
17	was going to be separate legislation
18	to approve the loan. But if I'm not
19	mistaken, you guys sort of slipped the
20	actual loan in as well but on the
21	other side of that is the terms that
22	were for that loan had a very small
23	window. I believe it was from the end
24	of October to the end of November
25	which means the loan would go into

1 effect on the first of December and 2 that required five months of payments 3 upfront and the Home Rule Charter says 4 the payment of funds -- city funds 5 shall not be made unless specifically 6 provided for in the budget which these 7 funds weren't and specifically authorized by the controller and there 8 9 was nothing from the controller to 10 state that she had the approval that 11 you had her approval to go ahead with 12 spending five months worth of loan 13 payments in the month of December. So 14 what did you approve last week and 15 should that not have been separate 16 legislation, a whole separate 17 ordinance? Because it was stated and 18 people believe that it was going to be 19 separate that you were only 20 authorizing the investigation and then 21 all of a sudden at the last minute 22 when not everybody who had spoken 23 before even knew that it was being 24 voted on so why was that not separate 25 legislation to the approval of the

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1	actual loan and why don't we have the
2	supporting documentations?
3	MR. MCGOFF: We received the term
4	sheet last Thursday. The terms were
5	within the parameters of what we had
6	voted on before and, yes, we voted on
7	that term sheet for that loan. As far
8	as the payments, as far as I remember,
9	I don't have it in front of me, the
10	first payments on that are not due
11	until the first quarter of 2015. I
12	believe March of 2015.
13	MS. SCHUMACHER: Even those first
14	five months. I thought it said you
15	had to do upfront. This is the
16	upfront, the five months payment?
17	MR. MCGOFF: I said I don't have
18	it in front of me. It was my
19	understanding that the amortization
20	I can never say that word for some
21	reason
22	MS. SCHUMACHER: I know. It's a
23	toughie. It's a tongue twister.
24	MR. MCGOFF: That is was that the
25	first payment was March of 215 after

	24
1	the first collection of the meter
2	revenues.
3	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. I'11
4	check that out and be back next week
5	but I it just seems to me that
6	should have been two separate pieces
7	of legislation.
8	But onto something else which is
9	e it's been a month now, almost a
10	month since the deadline for paying
11	the trash bill was negotiated. Do we
12	have it was Mr. Wechsler's idea to
13	bill those who had only made one
14	payment or had made no payment follow
15	through. I did a Right to Know and I
16	know there are thousands of people who
17	have not paid so I'm wondering and I'm
18	wondering if Mr. Evans has the exact
19	numbers of how many paid and how many
20	didn't pay.
21	MR. EVANS: Not at that point but
22	I'll try to get them for next week.
23	MR. WECHSLER: I know right now
24	that Treasurer Beck is in the process
25	of determining homes that may have had

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1	multiple billings but don't have those
2	apartments rented so right now those
3	people are coming and proving with
4	their electrical bills that they did
5	not have apartments rented so they do
6	not have to pay the additional fee so
7	if someone had didn't rent the
8	apartment for a year, they don't have
9	to pay the extra tax. So I know right
10	now that that process is still going
11	on and that's why there was some
12	reluctance into mailing out those
13	deficient bills again.
14	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. But you
15	don't have the breakdown on how many
16	are questioned and
17	MR. WECHSLER: No. Because it
18	won't be that information, they
19	have to supply it to the end of
20	October.
21	MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. As usual
22	I have other things but good Lord
23	willing, I'll be back next week.
24	Thank you.
25	MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. Anyone

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1	else who wishes to address council?
2	MS. REED: 5TH ORDER. 5A.
3	MOTIONS.
4	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Wechsler.
5	MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.
6	McGoff. Just a few things this
7	evening. Kind of been a quiet week.
8	In terms to the legislation about the
9	fees for the showmobile. During the
10	summer I spoke to a couple of
11	different people who were interested
12	in renting the showmobile for some
13	activities and unfortunately our
14	showmobile was in for repair. So I'm
15	very happy to see that this
16	legislation is coming through to
17	increase the fees because this
18	showmobile is an item that the city
19	can make some money off of. It is a
20	fine thing to have. I think it also
21	provides an opportunity for some
22	sponsorships and when it's used around
23	the city or even outside the city, I
24	think it would be good for our
25	publicity and good for our reputation

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1	that someone could see that we are
2	able to make some money off of this.
3	The other item that I have is
4	that the city will be opening bids on
5	November 19th for repair of the roof
6	and roof deck replacement on Engine 10
7	fire station up on East Mountain. I
8	applaud the administration for their
9	commitment to keep in building in a
10	state of repair. It is a valuable
11	asset to our neighborhood and we're
12	happy to have it open. That's all I
13	have at this time. Thank you.
14	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Rogan.
15	MR. ROGAN: Yes. Just one very
16	brief item. Some residents from the
17	Sandy Banks Community contacted me.
18	This is going back about a month or
19	two ago regarding a possible zoning
20	change in their area of town. There
21	were some there was some industry
22	in the area that has since moved out
23	and they are seeking to have a change
24	from light industrial to residential
25	in their area and they did drop off a

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1	petition for all of city council. So
2	I will like to make a motion to ask
3	the City Planning Commission to review
4	the request of the residents of the
5	Sandy Bank area regarding the zoning
6	change.
7	MR. MCGOFF: Is there a second?
8	MR. GAUGHAN: Second.
9	MR. MCGOFF: On the question?
10	(No response.)
11	MR. MCGOFF: All in favor of the
12	motion signify by saying aye?
13	MR. ROGAN: Aye.
14	MR. GAUGHAN: Aye.
15	MR. WECHSLER: Aye.
16	MR. EVANS: Aye.
17	MR. MCGOFF: Aye. Opposed?
18	(No response.)
19	MR. MCGOFF: Ayes have it and so
20	moved.
21	MR. ROGAN: Thank you. That is
22	all.
23	MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Evans.
24	MR. EVANS: First of all, I think
25	this may be our last meeting at

1	Lackawanna College so I would like to
2	personally thank the multi talented
3	Jim Cullen and his crew for they've
4	done for us here. They've done a
5	great job. It's been very, very
6	comfortable here and it's worked out
7	well and props to them and thank you
8	very, very much.
9	On pension reform, recent
10	historical review of the City of
11	Scranton pension funds as prepared for
12	the Pension Funds Deposit Board and
13	completed by the Beyer-Barber Company
14	disclosed the following findings. And
15	this is from their summary of issues.
16	It states and these are three of
17	the six summary of issue statements.
18	"The court settlements on the fire and
19	police pay issues led to increased
20	pension benefit payouts that already
21	exceeded contributional levels. A
22	significant number of disability
23	retirements has seriously eroded
24	funding and finally plans are not
25	actuarially sound and may be headed

1 toward insolvency as recently noted by 2 the auditor general." So as you can 3 see, it's simply more confirmation of 4 the seriousness of this issue. I had spoken to many active members of the 5 6 police and fire union as well as 7 retirees currently receiving benefits 8 and justifiably they are concerned and 9 want to see action taken to create a 10 path to solvency for the pension. 11 Kicking this can down the road is no 12 longer an option. There is no magic 13 bullet. There's no one going to ride 14 in on a white horse to save the day. 15 We are left with only real and 16 comprehensive pension reform. That's 17 the hard part and we need to get to 18 work on it ASAP. That's all I have 19 for now. 20 MR. MCGOFF: Mr. Gaughan. 21 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Keyser 22 Avenue is undergoing repaving from 23 Ferdinand Street to North South Road. 24 The project began October 19th and is 25 expected to be completed by Friday,

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1	this Friday according to PennDOT
2	representatives.
3	Last week I mentioned that
4	residents in the Bull's Head section
5	requested Crime Watch signs be put up
6	in their neighborhood. Chief Graziano
7	responded that there are a few signs
8	left and they will be put up in that
9	area.
10	I am extremely concerned with
11	blight in our neighborhoods as our
12	all of my colleagues on council. It's
13	been the number one complaint that I
14	received since being elected to this
15	office. I feel it's crucial that we
16	address the urgent need to reverse
17	blight and rebuild our neighborhoods.
18	One of the ways the city can address
19	this need is to seriously explore the
20	possibility of creating a land bank
21	and I'd like to take a moment to
22	explain what a land bank is. Land
23	banks are governmental or nonprofit
24	entities that acquire, hold and manage
25	foreclosed or abandoned properties.

1 The concept of a land bank is to 2 acquire and purchase vacant and under 3 utilized property with a future goal 4 of productive reuse of the land. Land 5 banks acquire properties through tax 6 foreclosure, intergovernmental 7 transfers, nonprofit transfers and 8 open market purchases. Land banks are 9 typically governed by a Board of 10 Directors that adhere to bylaws and 11 Articles of Incorporation specifically 12 tailored to meet the need of 13 individual communities. Land banks 14 have proven to be an effective tool 15 for stabilizing communities burdened 16 by at a large number of vacant, 17 abandoned or foreclosed properties as 18 is in the case here in the City of 19 Scranton. Most local governments find 20 as in the case of Scranton that they 21 have limited capacity and resources to 22 deal with the intricacies of these 23 mounting challenges on their own. 24 They simply cannot deal with 25 adequately maintaining and securing

1 properties until new owners can be 2 found delivering clear title, erasing 3 unpaid property taxes or navigating 4 the often cumbersome processes from 5 transferring government land to 6 private owners who will return them to 7 productive use. Across the county 8 land banks have become an effective 9 tool to address these challenges 10 reversing the cycle of decline and 11 decay, facilitating the transfer of 12 vacant property and promoting economic 13 development in neighborhood 14 stabilization. More than 80 local 15 governments an 23 states have created 16 land banks or other entities with 17 similar powers to turn the liability 18 of vacant properties into community 19 assets. In January of 2013 the 20 Pennsylvania state legislature passed 21 land bank enabling legislation giving municipalities like Scranton a new 22 23 tool to fight blight. As we are aware 24 in the city vacant, abandoned and tax 25 delinquent properties impose

1 significant costs on neighborhoods by 2 lowering property values, decreasing 3 tax revenues and undermining community 4 cohesion which is very important. 5 Land banks allow local government to 6 overcome barriers that inhibit the 7 redevelopment of these properties. Ιt 8 make it easier to developers, 9 nonprofits and individuals to acquire 10 vacant publicly owned land. For 11 example, the disposition of tax 12 delinquent properties can be 13 challenging when delinquent taxes 14 exceed the property's market value or when there is no clear title to that 15 16 property. The affordable housing 17 stock also benefits from land banks. 18 In the event that vacant lots cannot 19 be developed due to a lot's irregular 20 shape or small size, land banks can 21 assembled adjoining parcels to create 22 a larger, more marketable property. 23 This would be particularly helpful for 24 many properties throughout our 25 neighborhoods in the city. The land

1 bank can also operate side lot 2 programs which I think is very 3 important. Ownership of vacant lots 4 is transferred to adjacent property owners for a nominal fee. 5 This 6 ensures abandoned properties are back on the tax rolls, it increases revenue 7 8 and reduces maintenance costs. The 9 side lot program also allows for 10 community gardens that will beautiful 11 neighborhoods throughout the city. 12 This past month I have met with members of the city administration, 13 14 county official and state officials 15 about the possibility of creating a 16 Land Bank Authority in Scranton or a 17 regional Land Bank Authority in 18 conjunction with Lackawanna County. 19 These conversations have been held 20 previously and I am making an 21 aggressive effort to continue them so 22 we can bring all the key stakeholders 23 in the area together and begin to use 24 this tool to address vacancy, blight 25 and property tax delinquency. I will

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1	update my colleagues on council as I
2	progress and I have Mr. Evans,
3	Councilman Evans who has a great
4	background in real estate to help me
5	in this cause and hopefully we have
6	something concrete by the new year.
7	And that is all I have for this
8	meeting. Thank you.
9	MR. EVANS: This year?
10	MR. GAUGHAN: This year, no.
11	MR. MCGOFF: He's taking a
12	vacation here.
13	MR. EVANS: There you go. Let me
14	make a quick comment on that. I
15	absolutely am in full support of this.
16	As the President of the Greater
17	Scranton Board of Realtors and also as
18	a Board of Directors for the
19	Pennsylvania Association of Realtors
20	we have been instrumental in pushing
21	this through the state legislature.
22	We have been in support of land banks
23	for many, many years and finally saw
24	this come to fruition. So I think
25	it's a valuable, valuable tool in

1 fight again blight and this along with 2 our new Quality of Life Ordinance 3 which we hope to get on-line soon will 4 go a long way but this is a long term 5 play and a very, very important 6 initiative. So thank you very much 7 for taking that up. 8 MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah. And just one 9 more comment. I would like to say --10 thank Councilman Evans for helping me 11 out with this and this is going to be 12 our mission to get this off the ground 13 and I know the Courtright 14 administration supports this, the 15 County supports it. It's just going 16 to be about getting all the key 17 stakeholders together, making sure the 18 conversation does not die out in 19 getting this process started. Thank 20 you. 21 MR. MCGOFF: Thank you. And with 22 that said I would like to just point 23 out that as you've heard from council 24 members this evening, we are working 25 on a number of projects individually

and collectively that we hope will 1 2 address some of the issues of the City 3 of Scranton. As a council and as five 4 members there are limited things that 5 we can do simply by numbers but be 6 assured that we are aware of the 7 problems that exist in the city and 8 are doing our best to address those 9 problems. And I thank all of my 10 members of council for the individual 11 efforts that they have made to address 12 some of these issues. 13 Just a couple of quick 14 announcements. First of all, I forgot 15 earlier to mention that because of 16 Election Day there will be no garbage 17 pickup on Tuesday, November 4th which 18 means that the collections for 19 Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday 20 will be delayed. Just so that you 21 don't put things outer early and it 22 becomes problematic. 23 I did receive a letter from a 24 resident concerning some animal 25 control issues, and I just want to

1	make the resident know or make it
2	known that these issues will be
3	brought up with the Animal Control
4	Officer and hopefully we can arrive of
5	some resolution for the problem that
6	exists.
7	As far as one of the questions
8	that was asked earlier, we have
9	received a correspondence from the
10	Fraternal Order of Police, President
11	Paul Helring, a letter addressed to
12	the Council President. It says "It
13	has come to attention that City
14	Council is looking for an update on
15	contract negotiations between the City
16	and the FOP. Over the several past
17	several weeks the FOP has met with the
18	City several time and has future
19	meetings scheduled. The meetings are
20	positive and both sides have presented
21	cost saving measures for the
22	betterment of the City and its
23	taxpayers. I ask that the Council be
24	patient and realize that this is
25	lengthy process to be done

1 efficiently. The membership of the 2 FOP realize the City is facing tough 3 financial times and being stakeholders 4 as employees and taxpayers of this 5 community, we only have good 6 intentions towards the City and it's 7 residents. Currently we have a 8 contract set to expire December 31st, 9 2017. Our willingness to even talk at 10 this time should show City Council our 11 Ιf sincerity towards negotiations. 12 you or any of your colleagues have questions or concerns, please contact 13 14 me." I should -- and that is again 15 from the president of the FOP, Paul 16 Helring. And I should also mention 17 that in talking with the Mayor, they 18 have also been conducting discussions 19 with the fire union as well. Because 20 they are basically contract 21 negotiations, sort of by law the 22 nature of those negotiations are 23 private and not divulged. Hopefully 24 we will see some resolution to at 25 least some of the issues that we need

1	prior to the budget and hopefully
2	prior to the end of the fiscal year.
3	But negotiations and discussions are
4	ongoing and hopefully, as I said, a
5	resolution to some of the issues.
6	We also received on 3G this
7	evening was a recommendation from the
8	Lackawanna County Regional Planning
9	Commission and we also received a
10	letter from the City Planning
11	Commission both recommending the
12	adoption of the SAPA comprehensive
13	plan which will be, as I stated
14	before, which will be on the agenda
15	next week and a public hearing at 5:30
16	next week concerning SAPA. So the
17	basically the go ahead by from both
18	Planning Commissions for the adoption
19	of the SAPA plan but that will be
20	discussed next week.
21	Also the last thing, end of the
22	year schedule for council. We expect
23	that we will receive the budget in a
24	timely manner. It is due November
25	15th. Council needs to vote on that

1 by December 15th. With those dates in 2 mind, it is at this point in time plan 3 to have the last meeting of council on 4 December 18th and a letter was sent to 5 the administration that all 6 legislation -- pertinent legislation 7 should be sent to council in a timely 8 manner so that it can be addressed by 9 that final meeting date. It should 10 also be noted that both Christmas and 11 New Years are on Thursday evenings so 12 it is likely that the last meeting 13 would be December 18th and then the 14 next meeting of council would not be 15 until January 8th. But we will 16 discuss that and determine if that's 17 the way in which we wish to proceed. 18 And that's all. 19 MS. REED: 5B. FOR INTRODUCTION AN ORDINANCE AMENDING FILE OF THE 20 21 COUNCIL NO. 188, 1994, AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "ESTABLISHING THE RATE TO BE 22 23 CHARGED FOR THE USE OF SWIMMING POOLS, 24 RECREATION CENTERS, BASEBALL FIELDS, AND THE SHOWMOBILE BY PROVIDING FOR AN 25

15	investigate market based revenue
16	opportunities. To this date I don't
17	know that any of us have knowledge of
18	anything that they have done to bring
19	that about. I think about the only
20	thing that I can think of is that
21	there is some banners or flags
22	downtown. But certainly this might be
23	something to bring to that group, to
24	that enterprise to see if they can act
25	on it as far as the showmobile is

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1	concerned.
2	All those in favor of
