MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. ROGAN: Our first speaker tonight is Tom McCafferty.

MR. MCCAFFERTY: Good evening,
Council. My name is Tom McCafferty,
Scranton resident. I'm here to speak
tonight about a shining light we have in
North Scranton by the name of Jimmy Hughes.
If you don't know Jimmy Hughes, you will by
the end of tonight. Jimmy Hughes has swept
a 50 to 70 block radius of North Scranton
for the past 20 plus years. Back in 1989,
on April 8, Jimmy had a massive stroke which
left him paralyzed on his right side, he
still does not have use of his right arm.
That did not stop Jimmy from doing what he
does. You can see him, especially this
week, Monday and Tuesday in Providence

Square where he has swept everything up and down North Main Avenue and Market Street, and he does this on a continuous basis.

Jimmy has such great pride in North Scranton.

A couple of months back the Scranton Times ran an article on Jimmy about what he did. I decided I think we need to take it one step further so on October 19 from 6 to 8 p.m. at Stirna's restaurant on 120 West Market Street we will have a Jimmy Hughes appreciation party. It is just a party for the people to come out and to say thank you. We all drive by, we immediately waive when we see him, but I said to myself I don't think I've ever seen him and said thank you.

You come home from that day at work and you come up in front of your house and you don't see your spot in front of your house swept you see the entire block swept on both sides up and down. It's such a great relief to know that you have someone in the neighborhood that cares that much about North Scranton.

So I'm asking everybody if they can

just take a couple of hours out of their time on October 19, again, 6 to 8 p.m., it's \$10 donation at the door. There will be some light fare and it's a cash bar. All proceeds will go to the American Heart Association as Jimmy's choice, that's where he wanted it to go. There will be some basket raffles there, but that's just besides the point, it is just to come out and to say thank you. I left a poster in your office next door and gave Mr. Wechsler a smaller copy of it so he can just remind everybody next week because I won't be able to be here.

So we would hopefully, truly like to see everybody out. The response has been tremendous, but as you all know as politicians when you run parties until they come into the door you can't bank on it, so we are just hoping everyone comes out on the 19th just to show their support and to say thank you, Jimmy.

If you have any questions, I'd be glad to answer them. If not, thank you very much.

MR. GAUGHAN: I would like to thank you I think on behalf of council for being a part of this and I see Mr. Hughes almost ever day and his work is amazing.

MR. MCCAFFERTY: Thank you very much and have a good night.

MR. ROGAN: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, city resident. With regard to Item 5-H, it's the settlement agreement between the city and the Teamster's Local 229. I was looking at the backup and apparently the city is going to pay a \$1,000 bonus to all regular full-time and part-time employees formally employed by the Scranton Parking Authority. Can someone tell me how much money we are talking about, how many employees this involved?

MR. ROGAN: We are actually going to introduce this legislation tonight and immediately table it until we can have a meeting set up with Attorney Abrahamsen.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I would like to know how much money you are talking about and what account you are going to take that

from.

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With regard to the 2016 operating budget which is due to you in no more than five weeks now. I'm still concerned about the administration's ability to come up with realistic numbers for 2016 when you consider the following: The city may fall short of it's \$4.2 million goal for the local services tax that was tripled to \$156. Rental registration fees are still stuck in escrow thanks to an ongoing lawsuit. still don't really know the status of delinquent real estate and garbage fee collections. We may incur another interest payment if we fail to pay the minimum municipal obligation at the end of the year. We still don't know what's going to happen with double pension payments for 28 retirees and that may be a cost. The city is being sued by the firefighter and police pension boards for retiree raises as of January 1 of this year. What are we going to do if we lose those lawsuits? And what is the status of the our efforts to monetize the Parking Authority and the Sewer Authority?

I ask this because of that recent incident with that liquid black, noxious ooze that was found in the -- underneath the Dunmore and Greenridge and the sewers, where as I look at it the creature from beneath Greenridge. How is that going to impact any parties that are interested in picking up the Sewer Authority? You know, I mean, that may color your negotiations with those parties, and what is the status of the City's efforts to obtain a bond for the \$24 million Court award to the unions? That still has to be paid.

Having said all of that, I do want to raise one issue for you to consider as part of the budget process. After that incident with the liquid ooze and the Sandone Warehouse fire, it's apparent to me and to some other citizens that we have some safety issues in the city and they have to be factored into the budget process. Years ago we had a Director of Public Safety, it used to be Ray Hayes, and retired at the end of 2009 and his position was eliminated from the 2010 budget, but Mayor Doherty's intent

is for his functions to be picked up by a deputy mayor. Well, I don't believe we have a deputy mayor, but I think the city should rethink those functions in that position. There is such a thing as being pennywise and pound foolish and we have two big red flags this year, you know, that ooze and that Sandone warehouse fire that maybe we don't have the proper handle on some safety issues that concern the entire city and go beyond just the Fire Department or just the Police Department so I think you ought to discuss that with the administration. Somebody has got to be looking at that before we look at some long-term liability issues.

And, finally, what is the status of the 2014 independent audit? I haven't seen a single status from S&B and Company and I recall being told months ago that they were going to provide us updates. Does anybody know anything about it, how the audit is going, when it will be completed? Nothing?

MR. ROGAN: We haven't received anything.

 $MS.\ HODOWANITZ:\ Okay.\ Well,\ I\ can$

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look it up in the minutes when I was told that, but somebody needs to be kicking on the mayor's door and the BA's door to see what's going on with that, okay, because that provides a lot of information to drive the budget process and the two cannot be done independently. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,

Council. Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. Picking up on the Sandone Tire fire, the last two times I was here I mentioned about firefighter John Rivers who is a hero, saved four firefighters' lives, I said I think the city should give him a proclamation and none of you up there said a word. Do any of you have an opinion on that?

MR. ROGAN: I agree that he is a hero, and I think he deserves a proclamation, but if we do a proclamation every time for every -- you know, every time a firefighter or police officer does a great job, because they do it every day, we would

be doing it every week.

MR. SPINDLER: I understand that, but this person saved four lives. You don't see a public safety person saving four lives, and I have been coming here many years and I have seen proclamations given out for a lot less than that. He saved four lives, I think he definitely, not only does he deserve a proclamation, I think he deserves a day in his Honor by the city.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Spindler, I spoke to one of his colleagues just yesterday and it is something that's being worked on right now.

MR. SPINDLER: Well, he definitely deserves it. Something else, I was reading in the paper today, I had a candidate for council, he gave all of his issues in the paper and everything, Councilmen Evans, when you got this position you said you were just going to fill out the term you weren't going to run again and now I guess you are running.

MR. EVANS: Um-hum.

MR. SPINDLER: I guess you are just

a typical politician, you don't tell the truth and I hope everybody remembers that on election day.

MR. EVANS: That's your opinion.

MR. SPINDLER: It's a lot of people's opinions.

MR. EVANS: We'll see.

MR. SPINDLER: Politicians don't tell the truth all the time and, like I said, I hope people remember on election day.

Lastly, this isn't a forum for this, but I want to get this issue out to the public because a lot of people watching this, I'm disgusted with this teacher's strike and their President Rose Mary Boland and the t-shirts they are wearing they say, "Standing up for public education."

Well, if they were standing up for public education they would be in a classroom right now not walking the picket lines. All they want is give, give, give, they don't want to give anything back to the people. They don't care about the taxpayers, they don't care about the

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students, they don't want their kids playing football. These student athletes bust their butts all summer so they can play football in the fall and just because of those selfish teachers they are not allowed to play football and I think it's wrong. people get ever holiday without pay, they get two and a half months in the summer off, the only job around here I know that does that and every time you contract runs out they strike. I think they are wrong and selfish and I just hope a lot of people are listening to this and maybe make a fuss and get this thing brought to an end because the only ones being hurt here are the students. The teachers are going to get their money, but the students have to go probably until the end of June they'll have to go to school and that's not right. Like I said, especially for student athletes that really bust their butts it's not fair for them. Like I said, the teachers just think about themselves, they don't care about anyone else. That's all I have. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Ron Ellman.

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MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. As a

taxpayer, I can't hold back my total disgust

of this whole school problem and ${\bf I}$

understand both sides of it. These overpaid

prima donas they won't pay for nothing, they

want everything free. Tell me if I got

something wrong, we got 10,000 students,

right? We got renege 880 teachers and 110

assistant teachers. 880 teachers, that's 12

students per teacher with about 110

assistants that's about ten students a

teacher. What do we get all of these

teachers? We got, like, five, six hundred

teachers and we don't need them. It must

cost 25, 30 million dollars a year. What is

all of this -- it just falls on the

taxpayers and nobody is ever happy.

On the other hand, it's easy to see

They couldn't have found a worse choice if

they tried. It was my understanding that

she was just one of four secretaries on the

school board or some kind of job like that

in Atlanta, just nothing but crooked

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politics that brought her up here and this loathsome demand of hers to live outside of the city is just a kick in the teeth for taxpayers. They were just there and they did such a good job and that's why I have experience with both of I have no complaints with brother them.

Bill settling it with him, even it wasn't the best thing for taxpayers. Thank you very much.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Mary Gaughan.

MS. GAUGHAN: Good evening. My name is Mary Gaughan and I'm a current city resident. As a follow-up as what Don McCafferty said, I can certainly attest to seeing Jim Hughes sweep the streets for decades. I would like to ask that the mayor and council make October 19 Jimmy Hughes Day and have a proclamation because he certainly needs to be recognized and he gives all of the money that he raises to the American Heart Association so that strokes can be prevented.

On another note, we had a tragedy this week, as we all know, a woman was killed crossing the street. Now, her death ws ruled accidental, but as I walked through the streets of Scranton I wonder how many people think they are at the Pocono 500 and if you are trying to cross the street in the crosswalk on Lackawanna Avenue be careful

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because the signs mean nothing to people.

And with respect to the Sandone tire factory or burn, I wonder if the zoning should look into the other warehouse I believe that's across the street. Perhaps zoning should not allow someone to have that type of a warehouse, I guess they did not have sprinklers, I really don't know.

And another thing is that I think that the city should try to do something like have fight for blight Sunday or something for two hours and sweep the streets of all the cigarette butts. And the other night when I left here last week after the meeting I saw Kevin Shaughnessy, and he is in charge of the county Parks and There he was looking at the Recreation. streetlights to make sure that they were going to be lit for the -- there was an event the next date, and I also was down in town with they had the Race for the Cure and I saw his crew do an excellent job all around the courthouse, even though they are county employees they are cleaning the streets of the city and I think it's a very

nice thing to see.

And another thing, as a devil's advocate, as the University of Scranton is my alma mater, but somebody posed a question to me and I wonder if there is an answer, the University has a cafeteria or something or I don't know if they are Fortune 500 companies, but Subway, Chick-fil-a, the University must be charging them rent, and why is it that the city couldn't look into that particular building being non-tax exempt and being on the tax rolls? Thank you very much.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, are you planning to hold hearings on the Pension Board and the money paid out to people who aren't supposed to get it? The kangaroo court they held between themselves has no bearing. It's up to you to find out the answer. \$3 million were misappropriated. You can't cover that up.

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Whoever did it has to be held responsible. Somebody gave the order. That man has to be pointed out and the only way you can do that is to hold hearings. If not, ask the courts to appoint a special prosecutor to look into That's your job to protect the people of Scranton and if misdeeds are done and you know about it you are all held liable for it, so somewhere along the line you got to do it whether you want to or not. Whether you are going to step on people's toes or The important thing is who ordered It was strictly political so that done. someone in top of politics has to give the order and it's up to you to find out who it is and point the finger at them and hold him responsible for the \$3 million we lost and that's not even how much we lost because the interest we lost, too. You know what's going to happen in the two more years. are you going to do in 2017? You are going to sit there and cry? You know what's going to happen with the pensions, that has to be addressed and the only way you can address it is either hold a hearing yourselves or

asking the Courts to hold hearings, maybe a special prosecutor. Somewhere along the lines it has to be.

Now, you changed the way you were supposedly going to advertise bids to save the city money supposedly, what does the state law or federal law say about notice for contracts? It has to be on something that has the greatest amount of distribution. I don't think your website has it, and I don't think you even made a study of you how many people are on computers or on your website, so if ain't going to advertise on your website, you are going to continue to advertise in the paper. I have no doubts that's going to be done and the main reason you did it was strictly political.

The city is going to be looted of all of its assets. You are going to give out contracts, hundreds of contracts and in the end you are going to call in for a receiver. I just hope when that time comes somebody is held accountable, not saying you are elected and can't be held accountable.

I have here an article, I don't know it anybody sees it in the paper, but it reads, "Generational Hit. College Debt Traps Parents and Kids." So it sounds awful intelligent when somebody says you can go to school and you can do this and you can do that, but just imagine yourself being tossed at 50 years old or 55 years old right back to where you were when you walked out of high school because that's about all you have going for you and it's really ashame. Sometimes you have to be careful what you say, a little parable, we were in a restaurant about three or four days after -our favorite restaurant three or four days after my wife's plant closed and Governor

Corporate (sic) had just been there and Governor-to-be Corporate, the saying of the day was, "Yep, a Hilton (sic) don't want to work, up, a Hilton don't want to work," and well, my wife when she heard that that was the last time we ever ate our favorite restaurant. We had to find a new favorite restaurant so, the point is that it sticks in people's mind, when you read about this, did you -- did anybody see this? think Tuesday's paper, yeah, Tuesday's paper, but it has a full analysis of how bad financial shape that people are after they attend years and years of college and fail to makeup the income and that the wages are stagnating for college graduate.

So now back to city business, and that is city business because we are part of America, we are not just the island of Scranton, nation state of Scranton. Taxes on my house in the last 14 months have gone up about \$75 a month, so I refinanced in 2014 and if they reduced them it to \$421 a month and now they are up to \$494 a month, so easy come, easy go. At least I have a

porch to sit on this summer.

And, you know, a lot has been said about these teacher's strikes and I would like to point out that it's not only the teacher's union, it's time we start to get on it. I got the impression when I attended on Audubon that there is never a school that they didn't want to close and build a new close so it's both sides. It's the school board, too. And somebody said, well, as long as somebody connected with school board, well, it's for the kids, but, you know, what's the point if you can't even afford to pay the teachers to come in and teach.

And another thing, years back Valley View School District spent more on their -- renovating their sports stadium and they had books falling apart, people in South Scranton had no books last year, I don't know where Judy Gatelli changed, but, oh, she was ripping one night down there at the school board because those kids didn't have books. I wish she had shown that kind of stamina when she was on council and not

fallen on her sword so many times for somebody else.

And ECTV is still on so it would be interesting -- I'd love to see if council could kind of prod that administration and start getting that straightened out that they can get some money in and hopefully have a wage.

And on the double pensions, I'll make this fast, I agree, I don't think you can collect the back money, but at this point they should stop, they shouldn't be paid any more. I don't see how you could collect \$94,000 out of 74-year-old person, it just won't work. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

Marie Schumacher. I have a couple of quick items before I get back to the revised recovery plan tracking and first is did anybody follow up on my request to get the DEP reports on what the measurements were and what was measured in both the Sandone

fire tire and the Greenridge goop?

MR. GAUGHAN: We sent a letter for the incident in Greenridge, but we didn't send anything for Sandone tire.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, I hope you would add that. I'll bring the toxic stuff that's in tires next week with me then because we really need to know that.

Then I notice on the report tonight on the real estate taxes that we are now lagging, although, it showed a 17.3 percent increase, the budget increase at 18.99 so we are now behind on the real estate as well.

And then maybe, Wayne, you can tell me this, where in the budget did the Court awards go for the fire and police? It used to be in Court awards and it was dropped in this year's budget, where is it in the budget?

MR. EVANS: I'm not sure, I'll check it out for you next week.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. Okay, back to the revised recovery plan. The debt -- there was a requirement after -- let me just read it, it's easier. "Unless

otherwise provided in an overall debt management strategy prior to September 30, 2015," did we have overall debt management strategy prior to September 15? Yeah, September 30 of this year 2015?

MR. EVANS: Not that I'm aware of.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Maybe you could get follow-up on that. And then it called for review of other city assets and said the city shall assess the feasibility of divesting any city asset that is not directly related to the provision of the vital and necessary services. These assets may include real property, apartments or other rental properties, unused buildings, recreational assets and rolling stock.

I'm a little confused about why you went ahead with the possible procurement of Serrenity with that kind of a mandate that you have in your revised recovery plan that you approved last year, and then I hope you would also follow up, again, I noted the rebidding of the roofing on the Engine 10 bar to see if another location the money might be better used if it was at -- the

whole thing was moved it another location like with access for that Meadow Avenue or 307 where there is currently property available.

Payroll preparation tax, from what we have discussed before when I asked about the status of that, that is dead?

MR. EVANS: No, that study is ongoing.

MS. SCHUMACHER: When will it complete, in time for the 2016 budget?

MR. EVANS: I hope so, but I'm not sure at this point. That was being done through PEL.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, because, yeah, it does say for the 2016 and 2020 budget that's a requirement.

MR. EVANS: Yeah.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Employee benefits and health care, there was supposed to be a major review of health care insurance and related programs and buyers and advisors and administrators, the review was to be completed as soon as practical, but no later than 180 days after the adoption of this

2	February of last year but I haven't heard
3	anything about this, is this something

1 had, I mean, is anybody even talking about it? 2 3 MR. EVANS: Well, we will talk about it, I'll bring it up again at the next PEL 4 5 meeting to find out exactly where they are going with this. In the plan, obviously, we 6 7 want to see it get done. 8 MS. SCHUMACHER: Next, restructure 9 of the city staff advisors, has that been 10 completed or initiated. 11 MR. EVANS: I know that's something that BA Bulzoni has been working on so I'll 12 13 find out the status on that as well. 14 MS. SCHUMACHER: I'll be back and hopefully maybe I can complete next week, if 15 16 not I'll --17 MR. ROGAN: Ms. Schumacher, can you 18 please provide those in writing? I know 19 there is a lot of questions. 20 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, you have the 21 revised recovery plan, they are all -- all 22 you have to do is review that and see which 23 ones haven't been done. 24 MR. EVANS: I think what we should 25 go back to is the matrix that we've talked

about and see if we can't get a matrix developed and bench marks. That way a lot of these questions will be answered on an ongoing basis.

MR. ROGAN: Is there anyone else who cares to address council?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. ROGAN: Councilmen Wechsler, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. WECHSLER: Not too many this week. I would just like to take the opportunity to thank everyone who supported my family this week on the passing of my mother-in-law, Gloria Jaworski. The outpouring of support for her was outstanding. My mother-in-law was an outstanding woman herself, raised three children on her own and never once took one dime from the state so I would just like to once again thank everyone for their support.

And just one other thing, I'd also like to thank DPW for finishing the temporary repair of East Mountain Road.

Last week they did some patching and this

week they followed up with some tarring on that to help us get through the winter, so I do appreciate the fact that that did get done before the snow came along. That's all I have.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Councilman Evans, do you have any motions or comments?

MR. EVANS: Yeah, a couple of quick comments. We sent a letter to DPW I guess on the leachate issue and wait for a response from that. I'd like to add that if we can and send a letter to Colleen Connelly, who is DEP's community relations coordinator to make sure she does get back to us if there is a final report and the that's probably in the letter.

MR. GAUGHAN: It says just to keep up-to-date on all matters.

MR. EVANS: All right. That's fine. I'd like to talk about something different, pay-to-play politics. That got everybody's attention. Anyway, this is something that we rail on quite a bit but we rarely act on. To that point, the city council of the City of Allentown yesterday passed an

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anti-pay-to-play law that limits the awarding of contracts to political donors. The law states that anyone who gave more than \$250 to city politicians they are not allowed for getting contracts greater than \$2,500. So I would like to ask my colleagues they concur if we can send a letter to the mayor and the law department advising that we are very interested in pursuing this legislation, something like this anyway, and they should immediately review the Allentown law and present something similar to that before city council in the near future. It's clearly time to take a proactive approach on this horrendous topic, so if that's all right I would ask that we send a letter to the mayor if everybody agrees with that?

MR. GAUGHAN: I would be in agreement, but I would just like to review the ordinance first.

MR. EVANS: Actually, what we are looking for is the administration and the law department to review it as well as our solicitor and us as well.

MR. GAUGHAN: Sure.

MR. ROGAN: I would agree with what Councilmen Gaughan said, while I know the Scranton School District had a similar policy, it was enacted but it was never really enforced and didn't seem to work so I think we should compare, you know, the differences between the two before making a decision.

MR. EVANS: Oh, yeah, this is very preliminary at this point, but I think it's something we really need to look at and I applaud the City of Allentown for taking this unusual step.

MR. WECHSLER: The FBI -- (unintelligible.)

MR. EVANS: That will do it every time. That's all I have.

MR. ROGAN: Councilmen Gaughan, any motions or comments?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you.

First, PennDOT has announced it will begin
the final stages of the paving project, a
much anticipated paving project on Main
Avenue starting Monday. Repaving that

ADA compliant sidewalk ramps will begin at Wood Street in North Scranton and end at the Price Chopper in Bloomis Avenue. Crews are working between 6:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays and the project will be wrapping up October 23. The project is part of a \$4 million contract to upgrade Main Avenue, Keyser Avenue, Morgan Highway and Grove Street in the Clarks Summit area so there will be traffic delays.

I would lake to wish all of the runners best of luck this Sunday at the Steamtown Marathon and congratulations to all of those who put the event together and participate every year. It is a great event for our community.

I'd also like to give me condolences to Councilmen Wechsler on the passing of his mother-in-law and my prayers are with him and his family at this difficult time.

I have been contacted the past week, week and a half by numerous residents throughout the city concerning pave cuts and I know I have touched on this in the past.

There are a number of different locations, I have a list of them that I will give to our city clerk once the meeting is over that I have compiled after talking to many residents and these locations should have had the road restored under the new ordinance that was passed. All work was started in these locations well after June 5, 2015, and the restorations are not in compliance with the new city ordinance according to those residents.

I do have a few questions, are we collecting the inspection fees for the pave cuts as was called for in the ordinance that we pass? Without full compliance of this ordinance the city is missing out on the inspection fees as well as the benefit of the increased restoration to the road surface after the pave cuts. I did realize that the utility companies threatened to sue the city, but I do not believe any official action has been taken yet so I would like to an update on these issues.

Councilman Evans mentioned the letter to the DEP and I would like to read

that letter into the record. The letter went out to the regional director of the Department of Environmental Protection.

"Dear Mr. Bedrin: On behalf of Scranton City Council, please provide all documentation relating to the investigation of a recent odor in the Greenridge section of Scranton that may be related to discharge treated leachate that runs underneath the Greenridge section to the South Scranton Sewage Treatment Plant.

Also, city council has requested to be kept up-to-date on all matters relating to this investigation. The council is very concerned about the health, welfare and safety of the residents of Scranton, and your prompt attention to this matter will be greatly appreciated."

And that was also sent to Gene
Barrett, the executive director of the
Scranton Sewer Authority. So we will be
awaiting a response back from those
individuals.

I would like to request that the DPW patch the 2300 and 2400 blocks of North

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Washington Avenue. I received a couple of calls about those blocks, they are in really bad shape. Also, the last part of Middle Street, which is off of Albright Avenue and runs down to the farmers market is in extremely rough shape. The pavement is down to the bricks and people are going to get hurt if that remains that way so I would like to get that taken care of.

I had an interesting conference call today with Joshua Frett from I-Compass Technologies, Lori Reed, our city clerk, and Dave Bulzoni, our business administrator, to listen to a presentation on something called Agenda Free Meeting Manager Pro. It is a web based platform that automates the entire city council meeting process digitalizing and eliminating the manual tasks taken on by our office staff. It presents a huge opportunity for improved efficiency and cost The most exciting aspect, as my savings. colleagues and some of the public who is on the caucus saw, is connecting with citizens in a way that hasn't been possible before with something called Civic Web Portal.

This would be linked to our current website ScrantonPa.gov and the portal delivers information to the public automatically as staff works throughout the day. Different from a website, the civic web portal you don't have to post content. Once the work is done, the automated open government portal automatically refreshes with the latest information. We would be able to provide all back up documentation to the legislation on-line to citizens immediately. Citizens would be able to sign up to be updated as soon as the agenda and back up would be available.

I presented information, as I mentioned, in tonight's caucus and will have further discussion with my colleagues about this technology. I, too, do believe it will improve efficiency and transparency in our office. And that is all I have this week. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Thank you. Just a couple of items, a few that I wasn't planning on addressing but they were brought up. The first is the school teachers strike

and although the members of city council we don't have anything to do with school district as far as those negotiations go, but it is a good time to look at your tax bill and reflect on how much money the taxpayers and the City of Scranton are paying to the school district.

Your school property taxes are by far the largest portion of your tax bill and the quote/unquote city wage tax 1 percent of that actually goes to the school district as well so when many times people think of Scranton and the city imposing much of the tax, it's actually the property and the school district that is the biggest portion of your tax bill so that is something for all residents to think about.

Regarding the double pensions, I am in complete agreement that city council at some point needs to conduct hearings of some sort and find out who authorized the double pensions. As was mentioned, there has to be somebody to blame, whether it was a criminal act or whether it was just an error is something that's remained to be seen, but we

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need to find out how it happened, why it happened, and so it doesn't ever happen again.

Regarding the questions that were raised tonight regarding the recovery plan and the mandates in there, many of them -the vast majority of those questions would best be directed to our business administrator. We do have a Chair for Finance on the board, but it is not the Finances Chair's job or the job of the council to see that these get laid out. Ιt is our job to approve them, to vote them up or down to research them as they happen, but city council doesn't have the authority to enact many of these items so that does have to come from the mayor and the business administration.

And, finally, I should have mentioned this during announcements, but it's a great -- it's very important great project, I figured I would mention it now. Scranton Firefighters are taking part in Operation Warm, and I'm going to read just a little bit of the letter that was sent.

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"Councilman Rogan, can you think of a time when you were cold? That teeth chattering, knee knocking, able to see your breath type of cold. In this instance, you may have been wearing a coat, but imagine if Imagine if you didn't own a you weren't. coat and it was out of your control. For 16.1 million children in the United States this is a harsh reality. Many of these children are forced to walk to and from school or wait for the bus in the subfreezing temperatures. Scranton Professional Firefighters Local No. 60 has decided to take action. By partnering with Operation Warm, a national nonprofit, we are committed to providing brand new American made winter coats to children living in these unfortunate circumstances."
