I wanted to talk about Item 7D

which was introduced last week and 16

it's the contract with Pennsylvania 17

Fire Recovery Services, LLC, for the 18

periods September 1, 2014, through 19

August 31st, 2018. I did try to do 20

some research on this item in the past 21

week. I did call my own insurance 22

agent and learned that these fees have 23

existed for some time what is known is 24

25 happening in agency collector for the

8

City of Scranton. But I learned other

- 2 things, too. I learned that
- Pennsylvania has banned similar fees
- for police services. So this would
- only be fire. But I still have some
- concerns about it because naive as I
- am, I thought when I paid my taxes and
- EMS LST tax when I was working that I
- was basically buying or paying for
- essential government services. I mean 10
- that's why government exist. It
- provides essential services which
- citizens cannot provide for
- themselves. Among those are police
- and fire protection and garbage 15
- collection and that was my 16
- understanding. And that's why I was 17
- surprised but then again you have to 18
- look at the history of the garbage 19
- fee, you know, which we charge our 20
- citizens for that apparently is not
- covered by the taxes which we pay. I 22
- personally believe that. Yes, we do 23
- have to pay for those services and
- those should come out of taxes. We

should not be creating fees. I think

- if we create a fee, we take the
- spotlight off of the taxes which is a
- major issue for all cities. That
- basically government is supposed to
- serve and protect, not serve and 6
- collect. But that's where we're 7
- headed right now.

They also brought up the issue of 9

some of the arguments I heard about 10

the commuter tax. And as I recall one 11

of the arguments for having a commuter 12

tax was the commuters were getting the 13

advantage of emergency services. 14

Well, hush my mouth. Do you know that 15

if a commuter is in a traffic accident

in Scranton and the Fire Department

responds, that driver is going to be 18

build. So you have ask yourself the 19

questions why were we imposing a 20

commuter tax if they were also paying 21

for those fees. Granted they weren't

paying a police fee and a garbage fee, 23

but, yeah, they were paying for fire 24

25 protection just like any other

citizen. If I was an accident in

Clarks Summit, Scranton couldn't bill

me. I don't know whether Clarks

Summit would have billed me but not

Scranton. So I just have a little bit

of heartburn about that. It's almost

like a back door method of helping to

balance the deficit for Scranton. I

know you're going to pass it. I just

want to go on record saying it seems 10

to me like it's the son of the garbage 11

tax and that's what you have created. 12

For what little time I have, is

13 there any update on the status of the 14

mayor's budget or the audit? Are we

15 getting any closer to an audit? 16

working on it. I don't, you know, I'm

not aware of what the status is at 19

this time and there had been 20

discussions and the administration on 21

MR. JACKOWITZ: Well, you should 23

be able to have it. It doesn't take 24 long to find out. All it takes is a 25

- 3 get answers. All we get is spin, more

- 21 I've started laying the groundwork for
- 22 recreating the neighborhood
- 23 associations to cut the ability of
- 24 political insiders to manipulate
- 25 things that are going on in this City

1 for decades. I'm very troubled. I

- 2 have received some feedback from some
- 3 neighborhood associations. I think
- 4 that Scranton's government is so
- 5 broken that it just can't be -- it can
- 6 be salvaged. I mean, you sit and you
- 7 listen and we're talking about a
- 8 commuter tax, we're talking about a
- 9 community that has been distressed for
- 10 22 years. We're talking about -- I'm
- 11 talking to people. I talked to a
- 12 gentleman today -- I forgot his pay
- 13 stub. It's at home and I apologize
- 14 for that before I came to the meeting.
- 15 He earned \$66,000 and he paid \$2,300 I
- 16 believe it was in city tax, more than
- 17 state tax. And he handed it to me and
- 18 he said, "Lee, I'm done here. I moved
- 19 out. I'm done." Okay. We've created
- 20 a situation in the City where we're
- 21 creating more blight that you would
- 22 ever imagined. We're giving money to
- 23 organizations creating rental units
- 4 when people don't live in rental units
- in the City because we've created

- 1 taxes and then out of the same mouth
- 2 speak about blight, I mean, where do
- 3 you think people get their earnings to
- 4 pay their taxes? Where is the great
- 5 economic engine of Scranton? Does it
- 6 really exist? And at what point does
- 7 your populus reach a point when it
- 8 can't pay the taxes you're asking for.
- 9 Is there ever that point? Or have we
- 10 elected people to government that
- believe that they can sign anything
- 12 they want and they don't serve us.
- 13 The problem in this community and
- across this country is the government
- isn't working for us. We're working
- 16 for them. I hope Mr. Wechsler was
- 17 here today because, you know, look at
- 18 the North Scranton project. How did
- 19 they get rental vouchers to complete a
- 20 project that's been so heavily funded
- 21 by the state or the federal
- 22 government. And then where is the
- 23 community development money that could
- 24 have brought a lot of these properties
- 25 inside of the City up to code and

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- ordinances trying to go in and condemn
- 2 as many of the as we possibly could.
- 3 I've asked to look at the book for the
- 4 condemnation book. You know, and it's
- 5 just this administration. I mean, I
- 6 did Right to Knows. The Right to Know
- 7 law doesn't require me to do that. It
- 8 just requires that I could ask
- 9 council. I don't have to do anything
- 10 in writing to the Right to Know Law.
- 11 You may not agree, Mr. McGoff, and I
- 12 appreciate your candor on that but,
- 13 you know, the other thing is, why not
- 14 answer some questions here. People
- 15 come here for years, decades. You
- 16 know, I stated here once before that I
- 17 got here late. Mr. Clifford recently
- 18 passed away. He was here for decades.
- 19 This City hasn't turned around at all.
- 20 We keep electing people like I say all
- 21 the time, nice suits, but you know
- 22 what, suits don't think. People do.
- 23 There's no thought taking place, not
- 24 that I can see. Because if we're
- 25 going to keep talking about raising

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- really helped with the blight in the
- 2 neighborhoods. Where did all that
- 3 money disappear to? These are the
- 4 elected officials who went to
- 5 neighborhood associations and not only
- 6 this group but prior ones and said

ourselves out of debt and that's

ultimately that's led us to where we

are today because we excessively 15

borrow and think that's the way you 16

that's not the way it works. But the 18

one thing that really just disturbs me 19

tonight is we're going to entertain 20

legislation and I understand it's only 21

for introduction but that's besides

the point. We're introducing 23

legislation this evening and yet we 24

25 don't know how long it's going to take

judge because a judge determined that

stubbornness wants to take place and

now discussions are occurring of

that if we don't have one, whether 12

through Act 205 or Act 47, it's going 13

to mean future property tax increases 14

on the residents of Scranton. That is 15

why I fought vigorously for the 16

commuter tax this time around when 17

just two years ago I opposed to it. 18

And on that issue I did read an 19

article. This was in Morning Call 20

newspaper. It was -- the headline 21

reads, "Northampton County and Easton 22

squabble over commuter tax." The town 23

of Easton, the City of Easton is a 24

very similar situation with their 25

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elaborate on that but a big thank you

to Mr. Evans for leading the charge on

this. It seems following our meeting

and doing a little bit more research

5 into it that this could really be a

good tool to tackle a lot of the

nuisance problems in our neighborhoods

and in the town, many problems that

under the current system we're not

able to address and there are small 10

things that lead to bigger things in

our neighborhoods so hopefully that's

something that we will have in front 13

of us shortly. 14

Finally some comments on property

taxes and the commuter tax as well.

There's no question that the property 17

taxes in the City of Scranton between 18

the three taxing bodies are high and 19

it's all around Lackawanna County. If 20

you look at surrounding school

districts, they're pretty comparable.

In the past if you looked at your tax 23

bill, the school district was and 24

still is by far the largest portion of

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16 of 24

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commuter tax ordinance as the City of

Scranton. And this is all -- I'll

cite it from this article. "In 2013

Easton began levying a one percent

commuter tax on those who work outside

of city limits -- live outside of the

City of Easton. On 2014 that was

increased to 1.75 percent and they're

looking to increase it again to nearly

two percent of -- 2015 Easton is 10

proposing and 1.9 percent tax which is 11

expected to raise two million dollars

towards the nearly five million owed 13

to pensions." Now, the gist of the 14

article is that the county government 15

is upset with the city government over 16

this tax which is quite similar to 17

what we see here in Scranton where 18

nonprofits and government employees 19

that work in the city but live outside 20

of the city are upset with the City 21

regarding the tax. Now, the County of 22

Northampton is citing the Scranton 23

case saying that their tax isn't 24

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legal. The mayor, Sal Panto of Easton 25

believes as I do that until there's an

- 2 equal treatment provision in the law
- 3 this can occur. What the City of
- 4 Scranton was trying to do in court is
- 4 Scranton was trying to do in court is
- 5 an exact same thing that the City of
- 6 Easton has done. So I definitely
- 7 think it's something that we should
- 8 look into as we continue to explore
- 9 our options regarding an appeal of the
- o judge's decision or pursuing a
- 11 commuter tax through another avenue.
- 12 And that is all I have tonight. Thank 13 you.
