B. Citizen Participation and Public Comment

Response: Scranton advertised "Notice of Public Hearing" in the general circulation section of the Scranton Times Tribune on Wednesday, April 22, 2009 and Monday, April 27, 2009. The Notice is as follows:

Notice is hereby given that the City of Scranton's Office of Economic and Community Development (OECD) is soliciting public comment for the following; 1) substantial amendment to the City of Scranton's Consolidated Plan and the 2008 Annual Action Plan for new funding under Title XII of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("Recovery Act") for the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP) and the Community Development Block Grant – Recovery (CDBG-R).

The Public Hearing will be held on Wednesday, April 29, 2009 at 4:00 P.M. in Scranton City Council Chambers, City Hall, 340 North Washington Avenue, Scranton, Pennsylvania 18503.

The Substantial Amendment to the Consolidated Plan/ Action Plan 2008 will guide the use of \$1,401,868 of Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP) funding to provide financial assistance and services to prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless and help those who are experiencing homelessness to be quickly re-housed and stabilized. Funding comes from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

It also guides the use of the Community Development Block Grant – Recovery (CDBG-R) funding for \$916,485. HUD expects to issue a CDBG-R Notice to provide additional guidelines and requirements for the use of the CDBG-R funding in the near future.

Citizens are encouraged to review and comment on this proposed substantial amendment. The amendment is available for review and comment from Thursday, April 23, 2009 through Monday, May 11, 2009. Comments received will be taken into consideration prior to adoption of the proposed amendment. Response: Fourteen (14) persons attended the Public Hearing. This included six (6) City of Scranton Office of Economic and Community Development staff members, seven (7) from non-profit organizations that is part of the Continuum of Care and one (1) City of Scranton resident. The Public Hearing Comments for both the HRHP and CDBG-R are attached to this application along with the sign in sheets.

Response: The proposed activities that will include infrastructure for two activities and two activities for economic development insulting in job creation.

Response: The City of Scranton has designated a lead staff person along with the Executive Director and the Director of Finance and Compliance within the Office of Economic and Community Development (OECD) to coordinate the effective and timely use of CDBG-R funds. Scranton will sub-grant two out of the four activities planned using CDBG-R funding for economic development that will result in job creation. The two other activities will be carried out by the City/OECD in the same manner as the CDBG funding.

4. Describe the grantee's plan for ensuring the effective and timely use of CDBG-R grant funds on eligible activities, as outlined in the CDBG-R Notice. Response: The City of Scranton is aware of the urgent nature of the CDBG-R funding and will comply with the funding commitment requirements. The City will designate a lead staff person within the Office of Economic and Community Development (OECD) to oversee the design and bidding process for each project and work with the contractors to ensure that each project schedule are maintained, bidding procedures and Davis Bacon Prevailing Wage requirements in order to use the CDBG-R funds in a timely manner.

The City of Scranton OECD office has experience in utilizing the IDIS system for other federal grant programs and has monitored other federally funded programs such as ESG and CDBG. The City of Scranton OECD office will have systems and internal controls in place to separately track and report on funds and activities per the federal requirements.

Background

Scranton, Pennsylvania is eligible to receive \$916,485 in Community Development Block Grant-Recovery (CDBG-R) funding from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA or "the Recovery Act"). The administering office for these funds is Scranton's Office of Economic and Community Development. The office contact is Linda B. Aebli, Executive Director, as noted above.

This funding, referred to as "CDBG-R" is separate from the regular, annual CDBG funds that Scranton receives every year. Scranton received \$3,362,611.00 in CDBG funds in 2008 (January 1, 2008 – December 31, 2008) and has not yet received notice from HUD concerning CDBG funding for 2009 but anticipates the same or a slightly increased level of funding.

Page Two

Scranton is required to amend its existing Consolidated Plan to include the CDBG-R funds. The Consolidated Plan/Action Plan 2008 provides specific information about projects that are currently being funded as CDBG eligible activities, and it is expected that similar activities will be eligible for CDBG-R funding.

The CDBG program enables local governments to undertake a wide range of activities intended to create suitable living environments, provide decent affordable housing and create economic opportunities, primarily for persons of low and moderate income. The full range of CDBG eligible activities and projects will be considered for CDBG-R funds based on further guidance as provided by HUD; however, the Recovery Act directs that priority be given to projects that can award contracts based on bids within 120 days from the date the funds are made available.

HUD has released the "CDBG-R Notice" to provide additional guidelines and requirements for the use of CDBG-R funding on May 5, 2009.

Scranton is also receiving \$1,401,867 in Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP) funds under the Recovery Act. In order to ease the administrative burden associated with preparation and submission of a substantial amendment to the Consolidated Plan, HUD is allowing Scranton to consolidate the two amendment processes and to submit the CDBG-R substantial amendment simultaneously with the HPRP substantial amendment by the HPRP submission deadline of May 18, 2009. As noted above, the public is invited to a Public Hearing on Wednesday, April 29, 2009 to review and comment on this substantial amendment.

Citizen Participation and Public Comment

Scranton is following its Citizen Participation Plan to ensure the opportunity for public review and comment on this substantial amendment to the Consolidated Plan/Action Plan for January 1, 2008 – December 31, 2008. A newspaper advertisement has been published in the Scranton Times/Tribune, a newspaper of general circulation on Wednesday, April 22, 2009 inviting the public to review and comment on the draft substantial amendment and participates in a Public Hearing on Wednesday, April 29, 2009.

The substantial amendment is posted on www.scrantonpa.gov/oecd.html and is also available in alternative formats by calling 570/348-4216.

Comments on the draft substantial amendment is open for a 12-day period until Monday, May 11, 2009 and all comments will be considered. A summary of the public comments regarding this substantial amendment will be provided to HUD, including a summary of any comments or views not accepted and the reasons for non-acceptance.

CDBG-R Funding

Priority Areas – In accordance with federal guidelines and requirements for the use of CDBG-R funding, Scranton through the Office of Economic and Community Development (OECD) will give priority to eligible activities that can be implemented with 120 days from the date the funds are made available. These projects will be given priority so that OECD can expend funds quickly in accordance with CDBG-R guidance.

Eligible Activities

CDBG-R money will be used to fund projects in conjunction with other public and private funding. Specific activities will be determined as eligible based on guidance to be provided by HUD in the "CDBG-R Notice". Efforts will focus on job creation and infrastructure activities for funding that support broad neighborhood improvement strategies. The tentative projects that are to be funded are:

•	Paving of city streets in low to moderate income areas	\$300,000.00
•	Economic Development Projects – Job Creation	\$400,000.00
•	Crisp Avenue Bridge	\$150,000.00
•	Program Administration	\$ 66,485.00

Scranton's Office of Economic and Community Development plans to oversee and monitor the administration and use of CDBG-R in accordance with practices currently in place and approved by HUD for use in the CDBG program. These include, among others, affirmatively furthering fair housing, conducting required environmental reviews, complying with financial management requirements and complying with all applicable Federal Labor Standards. In addition, OECD will follow local requirements as well as its own standard operating procedures. These include monitoring and record keeping in compliance with all federal requirements.

Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP)

Scranton partnered with the Lackawanna County Continuum of Care as part of the Continuum of Care strategic planning to address and prevent homelessness. Agencies include Catholic Social Services, Catherine McAuley Center, Community Intervention Center, St.. Joseph's Center, United Neighborhood Centers and the Women's Resource Center. The following are tentative activities to be funded by HPRP in the amount of \$1,401,867.00.

MS. AEBLI: I'd like to welcome everyone to this public hearing. My name is Linda Aebli, I'm the Executive Director of the Office of Economic and Community Development.

Before we begin, it gives me great pleasure to introduce our OECD staff. On my right is Lori Reed, she's the Deputy Director of OECD. She oversees our small business loans.

Kevin Mitchell, on my left, he's the Director of Finance and Compliance. Kevin does all of our financing, along with checking to see that we're all in compliance, the HUD regulations.

Next to Kevin is Leo, he's the
Director of Planning and Development. Leo
oversees most of our construction projects
when we fund parks, the demolition, the
paving program.

Sitting down in front is Liza

Skelton. She's the Director of Housing.

Liza oversees all of our housing programs,
which include the HOME Program, our

Homebuyer Program and our Housing Rehab

Program.

Next to her is Chris Tansits is our project coordinator. Chris works with all of our public services and our Emergency Shelter Grant Sub-Grantees. And when the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program begins, she also will be overseeing them.

I personally want to thank just not the staff that is here today, but all of OECD. We're a great crew, we all work good together.

This public hearing is being held to receive public comment for the following, A substantial amendment is needed to change the City of Scranton's Consolidated Plan and the 2008 Annual Action Plan to include the new funding under Title XII of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 known as the Recovery Act that President Barack Obama signed into law on February 17, 2009.

The new funding Scranton has been designated to receive will include two programs, The Homeless Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program known as HPRP and the

Community Development Block Grant-Recovery known as CDBG-R.

Before we start receiving public comments, please be aware this meeting is being recorded in order to transcribe your comments to be included in both applications to HUD.

This public meeting is being held on Wednesday, April 29, 2009 at four o'clock in City of Scranton's Council Chambers, City Hall, 340 North Washington Avenue in Scranton, Pennsylvania.

I want everyone to be aware that HUD has reduced the substantial amendment comment period from 30 days to 12 days. All comments must be received to OECD no later than 4:30 on Monday, May 11, 2009.

The city has been allocated \$1,401,867.00 for the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program known as HPRP. HPRP will provide financial assistance and services to either prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless or help those who are experiencing homelessness to be quickly rehoused and stabilized.

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Only individuals that have an income under the 50 percent median income established by HUD for the City of Scranton qualify to receive assistance under this program.

Scranton is required and has coordinated with the local Continuum of Care to ensure the HPRP activities are aligned with Continuum of Care strategies for preventing and ending homelessness.

The HPRP application must be received by HUD no later than May 18, 2009. HUD will complete its review of all substantial amendments no later than July 2.

HUD intends to execute all grant agreements no later than September 1 and Scranton must obligate all grant agreements no later than September 30, to its grantees.

The Recovery Act requires grantees to expend 60 percent of all HPRP grant funding within two years of the date the funds become available to Scranton and 100 percent of the funds must be expended by September 30, 2012.

HUD also allocated to Scranton

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\$916,485 to the second program entitled
Community Development Block Grant-Recovery.
This program will be similar to our
Community Development Block Grant Program;
however, HUD has not indicated there will be
-- HUD has indicated there will be
limitations on this funding that CDBG
funding does not have.

To ease the administrative burden on the grantees, HUD encouraged grantees to have a public hearing for both the HPRP and the CDBG-R to change their consolidated plan and action plan at the same time.

I want to point out, though, as of today, April 29, HUD has not released the Notice of Regulations for the Community Development Block Grant-R Program or the date the application must be received by HUD.

With that being said, the city is only proposing in this substantial amendment what activities we plan on funding with CDBG-R based on the information we have received from HUD to date.

As soon as the regulations are

released, we need to review the regulations to determine that all activities we proposed are eligible under the CDBG-R Program. If not, unfortunately, we will need to have another public hearing to incorporate the changes into this substantial amendment.

We will now receive the public's comments on Scranton's substantial amendment. When speaking, speak clearly and state your name and residence.

I would like to introduce our first speaker, Lea Dougherty. Lea is the Deputy Director of United Neighborhood Centers of Northeastern Pennsylvania.

Lea is also the lead contact for the Scranton Lackawanna Continuum of Care Planning Committee. Lea will be providing us with more detailed information regarding the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program.

MS. DOUGHERTY: Thank you, Linda.

At this time I'd like to just comment on the process that was used over the last six weeks for the implementation of the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program.

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Following the announcement of HPRP funding availability on March 19, 2009, the City of Scranton had discussions with United Neighborhood Centers, which is the lead agency for the Scranton Lackawanna Continuum of Care.

This conversation was to develop a collaborative process to determine eligible subgrantees and projects that would further meet the ten-year plan to end homelessness for Scranton and Lackawanna County.

On March 26, 2009, the CoC planning committee, an established group in Lackawanna County, met to identify the unmet goals in the ten-year plan and the annual HUD CoC plan.

The committee also reviewed the ways in which the HPRP funding could be used to further advance the rapid rehousing initiatives which have already begun in the community.

The committee then met again on April 1, 2009 to review project proposals and budget requests. Six proposals were submitted from the agencies in the community

that fit with specific identified goals in the community's efforts to close the front door and open the back door to end homelessness.

The six projects proposed include four homeless prevention projects, one from Catholic Social Services targeting those individuals who are -- to supplement existing efforts to keep individuals and families from experiencing homelessness, one from Community Intervention Center targeting those that are precariously housed, a third from Women's Resource Center working with victims of domestic violence, and the fourth from United Neighborhood Centers working on a homeless eviction prevention program in partnership with the judicial system.

In addition there are two projects that will work on the initiatives called rapid rehousing. The first will work with homeless pregnant women, including those exiting Lackawanna County Prison, second will work with difficult to serve homeless women and children that have multiple barriers to establishing permanent housing

through mainstream resources.

These projects work collaboratively with each other and with the City of Scranton to meet all of the goals outline through both the ten-year plan to end homelessness and HUD's annual continuum of care plan.

MS. AEBLI: Thank you. Our next speaker is Marie Schumaker.

MS. SCHUMAKER: Good afternoon,
Marie Schumaker. I do have a couple of
questions, and I recognize you're just here
to hear public comment, but I do hope to get
the answers to the questions at some point,
one because I think they have a potential to
intersect is, I don't believe we've ever
been told what the outcome of the
Neighborhood Stabilization Proposal was, if
that's been resolved. Do you want to do it
now?

MS. AEBLI: Yeah. To date, we have not received anything from the DCED. They are still reviewing.

MS. SCHUMAKER: I thought it was a short -- I thought it was like a ten-day or

a couple weeks turnaround.

MS. AEBLI: No one has. They have not released that information yet.

MS. SCHUMAKER: Okay. And then is the comment time changed permanently or is it just for these Recovery Act Programs?

Because you can go on vacation and totally miss a 12-day period of time.

MS. AEBLI: It's just for the stimulus money.

MS. SCHUMAKER: Okay. Thank you.

Okay. Once again, even with the
disclaimers, it seems that, once again, the
cart is being put before the horse, in that,
projects are being selected prior to the
issuance of the delivery of the guidelines,
other than the quick spend aspect of the
guidelines.

I question why the Crisp Avenue bridge was selected. The Rockwell Avenue bridge, I believe it is, has been under -- on the list for years and currently has weight restrictions that put people at risk, people and property at risk, because fire apparatus exceed the weight limitations on

that bridge as it now stands and people have to go -- or the fire department would have to go a circuitous route instead of a direct route, and as we know in a fire, every second counts.

I'd like to know if there would be a separate advertisement for the utilization of the job creation funds and the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program via a media solicitation.

I just listened to that proposal, and I didn't hear any hows. I heard who was going to get the money, but I didn't really -- I don't really understand or I don't think it was explained how that's going to happen.

And, again, the HPRP section describes strategic planning to address and prevent homelessness, but I don't find any program to tie the job creation.

I think there should be a program to tie the job creation and the HPRP funding.

How do the funds in the homeless prevention fund prevent homelessness? Are these the permanent solutions or mere temporary

housing?

And finally, will the lower Green
Ridge residents' requests for a flood alert
siren be included in any of the above
projects? They've been looking for that for
a long time.

And that sort of ties back in. I think it would have been nice if there had been a public safety category would have been most beneficial, because these items affect people and property, both the bridge restrictions and being notified whether or not there's going to be a flood in the middle of the night. Thank you.

- (4) Anti-lobbying. To the best of the jurisdiction's knowledge and belief:
 - 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of it, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement;
 - 2. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, it will complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions; and
 - 3. It will require that the language of paragraph 1 and 2 of this anti-lobbying certification be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

(4) Activity Narrative: Statement of Project Components:

Introduction

The Mount Pleasant Corporate Center is a relatively vacant 23.5+/- acre site within the City of Scranton that will be developed by SLIBCO into approximately five building sites ranging from 1.9+/- to 9.3+/- acres in size and served by a new road (an extension to Eighth Avenue) and utility infrastructure. The Mount Pleasant property offers an exceptional opportunity to transform wasted and non-productive land at the gateway to the City of Scranton into a corporate office center.

The project area is bounded by the Scranton Expressway to the north and east, railroad right-of-way to the west, West Linden Street to the south and a portion of 7th Avenue to the southeast. The site was formerly part of the Diamond Colliery and was used extensively for coal mining operations.

The Mount Pleasant Corporate Center is an extension of the Scranton Central Business District. Its conversion is entirely consistent with current efforts by the City of Scranton Administration, the Greater Scranton Chamber of Commerce, Lackawanna County and the Scranton School District to promote economic development in Northeastern Pennsylvania. The development project anticipates the realization of new and permanent job opportunities for approximately 1,000 employees, with direct and indirect economic benefits to the City and County.

The site is zoned General Commercial (C-G) and is intended to be occupied by commercial, mixed use, and office complexes. The site is designated a Keystone Opportunity Zone (KOZ).

Project Description:

The proposed Mount Pleasant Corporate Center project envisions the development of 23-acre industrial site historically associated with deep and strip mining of anthracite coal. The project lies within Lackawanna County, at the gateway to the City of Scranton, Pennsylvania.



The Mount Pleasant property offers an exceptional

opportunity to transform wasted and non-productive industrial land into an extension of the Scranton Central Business District. Its conversion is entirely consistent with current efforts by the City of Scranton Administration, the Greater Scranton Chamber of Commerce, Lackawanna County and the Scranton School District to promote economic development in Northeastern Pennsylvania.

The property is bounded by the North Scranton Expressway to the East; the intersection of 7th Avenue and West Linden Street to the South; and the Canadian Pacific Railroad to the West. The existing Keystone Concrete Block & Supply Co., Inc. plant will be completely relocated to make room for a new office park development on the southeastern portions of the site adjacent to Linden Street.

Project Components:

Roads and Streets

An extension to Eighth Avenue, approximately 1,400 feet long and terminating in a culde-sac, will be constructed from West Linden Street into the site. The roadway alignment will be designed to provide access to the future building sites. It is intended that this new road will be dedicated to the City of Scranton and consequently, will be designed to the City's specifications.

Storm water will be collected along the roadway via dedicated inlets and subsurface piping. The storm water will be temporarily held on-site in a subsurface detention system and will be released at a controlled rate into the existing and adjacent PennDOT drainage system. It is intended that the storm water collection and detention system will be dedicated to the City of Scranton.

Water and Sewer

A proposed 8" ductile iron pipe (DIP) and associated valves, fire hydrants and appurtenances will be constructed along the roadway for domestic water service. This water system will be connected to the 20" water main owned by Pennsylvania American

Water Company (PAWC) in West Linden Street. The total domestic water consumption is estimated at 26,000 gpd at full build-out.

An 8" PVC gravity sanitary sewer system will also be constructed in the new roadway and will connect to an existing 60" sanitary interceptor transversing the site, which is owned and operated by the Scranton Sewer Authority (SSA). The project will generate domestic sewage only with an estimated average daily flow of 23,400 gpd.

Utilities

A future 50 foot wide utility corridor will be located along the western property line adjacent to the railroad for future construction of overhead facilities for electrical distribution (PPL), telephone (Verizon), and cable television (Adelphia). These utilities will connect to their appropriate existing infrastructure in West Linden Street.

A new 4" polyethylene gas main will also be constructed within the roadway right-ofway and connect into an existing 8" main in West Linden Street. The gas service will be provided by PG Energy. The connected natural gas load is estimated at 12,000 cfh.

Demolition

There is an existing commercial building on-site, owned by Keystone Block Company, which will be demolished as part of the project. Additionally, numerous concrete piers leftover from the previous coal mining operations will be removed.

Excavation/Grading

Excavation and grading will encompass clearing and grubbing of the roadway and future building site areas. The necessary erosion and sedimentation control measures will be installed to stabilize all disturbed areas.

Wetland Mitigation

Two small wetlands that cover a total of 5,729 SF (0.13 acres) are found on-site. These wetlands have developed over time as the result of storm water runoff from the Scranton Expressway. An existing storm water collection system along the expressway conveys storm water into a drainage ditch which flows into the site and terminates in the wetlands. Other than for storing storm water, these wetlands have limited functions and values. In order to create future building pads, these wetlands will be recreated with the construction of an on-site replacement wetland.

Off-Site Construction

The Mount Pleasant project will require off-site construction to the area roadway network system. This work will include reconstructing a portion of West Linden Street at the site's intersection to provide for new left and right turn lanes into the site. Infrastructure

for a future traffic signal will also be installed. Utility pole relocations to accommodate the West Linden Street widening will be required.

Extending an existing left turn lane from 7th Avenue onto West Linden Street via restriping and the installation of emergency pre-emption are being proposed at this intersection. Other off-site roadway improvements may be necessary upon finalization of the Traffic Impact Study.

Approximately 1.8 acres of PennDOT right-of-way, adjacent to the project site's eastern property line, will be selectively cleared of undesirable trees and undergrowth to provide better visibility of the site to and from the City of Scranton.

Investment Description:

The property is bounded by the North Scranton Expressway to the East; the intersection of 7th Avenue and West Linden Street to the South; and the Canadian Pacific Railroad to the West. Designated as a KOZ, Keystone Opportunity Zone, approximately 17 of the 23 acres enjoy local and state tax abatements and other benefits designed to encourage development. The proposed subdivision of the parcel aims to maximize the use of buildable land, while addressing anticipated market demands. However, the flexibility exists for many other equally valid subdivision approaches capable of satisfying specific tenant requirements.

Topographically, the land has a general gradient of approximately 12% from its high western boundary to its low point at the North Scranton Expressway right-of-way. The surface has been reshaped by years of extensive mining activities and exhibits abundant culm and shale scattered throughout the site. A meager and spotty layer of topsoil barely supports the site's flora, which is limited to hardy sumac and birch. The absence of significant vegetation or vulnerable natural features will allow architects and engineers the freedom to reshape the surface contours to best serve the master plan objectives. Future studies will determine the possible presence of wetlands and propose remedial action, if necessary.

The general approach to site development focuses on the transformation of industrial mine lands into a modern corporate office park. The scope of the project includes the creation of building pads to accommodate up to five office buildings and the extension of approximately 1,400 lineal feet of infrastructure components to serve the 23 acre site. A new access road will be extended from West Linden Street and follow the eastern boundary providing entry to the various parcels and facilities. An optional utility corridor may follow the access road, providing for ease of maintenance. If the forthcoming traffic analysis requires it, the possibility exists to complete the loop along the western boundary of the site. The removal of old abandoned mining structures will eliminate an eye sore and make the project more marketable and attractive for corporate relocations.


SLIBCO has executed an engineering design contract with GJAI Consulting Engineers and master planning, engineering studies and infrastructure design work is well underway. Upon completion of the engineering work and construction bids are received and financing is secured,

a development agreement will be executed between SLIBCO and Keystone Concrete Block & Supply Co., Inc. and then the land will be transferred to SLIBCO.

In addition to the design work, SLIBCO will be responsible for the construction inspection of the infrastructure. Upon completion of the infrastructure, the EDA funded road, sewer and storm water management will be owned and maintained by the City of Scranton. The remaining non EDA funded water, gas, electric and transmission lines will be dedicated to the appropriate utility companies. The EDA and non-EDA funded infrastructure will be constructed concurrently. Once the sites are sold within the park, the tenants will own, operate and/or maintain their own facilities.

The site design adheres to the requirements set forth in the Scranton Zoning Ordinance. Ongrade parking areas will be proportional to the size of the buildings; building setbacks have been observed; impervious area coverage is well under the allowable ratio and the proposed reforestation far exceeds any legal requirements. Future studies will address the need for storm water collection and detention systems. The open green space located at the entrance to the site proposes an attractively landscaped detention pond.

The proposed buildings will be carefully sited to maximize exposure to the southern sun and at the same time enjoy the impressive distant views extending from Downtown Scranton to Green Ridge and Dunmore. The main entrance to each building is clearly visible approaching drivers and pedestrians walking from designated parking areas. Extensive landscape features will be utilized to mitigate the visual impact of the parking lots. Loading docks and other service areas have been discretely planned away from view.



Signage will project a professional image and be controlled by design covenants.

To date consultants have been hired to prepare preliminary site survey, preliminary conceptual master planning, geotechnical engineering study, topographic mapping, phase I environmental study, and a preliminary wetlands report.

(5) Job Creation – The Mt. Pleasant Corporate Center project will create a significant impact including job creation along with the following:

Business Owners – Project will provide additional small and medium sized business owners with quality, high-tech office space at affordable rates.

Incubator Tenants – Project will provide the incubator tenants in the Scranton Enterprise Center an opportunity to expand within the downtown into larger space, thus growing their business.

Unemployed/Underemployed/Dislocated/Low-Moderate Income Workers — Project will provide these individuals with additional employment opportunities that may not be available with additional space with the community. It is estimated that up to 1,000 jobs will be created at the completion of the Corporate Center. Eight (8) full-time equivalent jobs must be created as a result of the \$250,000.00 of CDBG-R funds being allocated to this project.

Local Restaurants/Service Businesses/Retail Locations these businesses will be directly affected by this project due to the increase in businesses and people who will be working in downtown Scranton. The tenants of the Corporate Center will utilize the restaurants for breakfast, lunch and/or dinner, shop at the Mall at Steamtown located in downtown Scranton and other sever small retail stores.





\$300,000.00 of CDBG-R funds will be incorporated with the City of Scranton's successful Paving Program. The funds will be used on Paving and Handicap Curb Cuts of city streets in Scranton, Pennsylvania. 100% of this funding will be expended in an approximate twenty-two (22) block radius only in low to moderate income areas that will benefit approximately 3,000 families. No other funding will be used on this activity.

Scranton will proceed to following the proper bidding procedures that includes advertising in the local newspaper Legal Ad for competitive bidding, Spec Book, Davis Bacon Requirements, mandatory pre-bid requirement, and meet other requirements of Title XII of Division A and Section 1602 of ARRA.

This project preserves and creates jobs and promotes economic recovery by providing job opportunities for a wide range of areas including Engineers, City/State/Private Inspectors, contracting companies, truck drivers, and heavy construction works, etc.

This project will assist those most impacted by the recession by providing a significant physical improvement to many low to moderate income residential areas. In the Northeast United States where Scranton is located the severe weather conditions play a big part of the shape our city streets are in. Also, Scranton has a large elderly population that needs the handicap curb cuts in order to get around in their neighborhoods.

By providing improved roads this will attract investments needed to increase economic efficiency in our neighborhoods.

(3) <u>Jobs Created:</u> (Report the number of full- and part-time jobs estimated to be created and retained by the activity (including permanent, construction, and temporary jobs).

Response: It is estimated that during construction activities this project will retain and bring back many construction workers that have been laid off due to our economic times. Using CDBG-R funding along with other City funding this will create more temporary jobs during construction.

(4) <u>Activity Narrative</u>: Crisp Avenue Bridge - Replacement Scranton, Pennsylvania 18505

The Crisp Avenue Bridge was destroyed by flooding and is under design for replacement. Permit applications have been completed and sent to the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PA EPA). FEMA is providing funding, however, the additional funding that is needed to replace the bridge will be provided with CDBG-R funding through the City of Scranton's Office of Economic and Community Development (OECD). The Crisp Avenue Bridge is a shovel ready activity and is in urgent need to be completed by October, 2009.

The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (PA EPA) has required hundreds of feet of stream bank restoration and environmental improvements that FEMA did not pay for. Nevertheless, the work had to be completed and the costs burden had to be entirely paid by the City of Scranton. The City of Scranton has been under The Financially Distressed Municipalities Act (Act of 1987, P.L. 246, No. 47), also known as Act 47 since the early 1990's. This Act empowers the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development to declare Scranton financially distressed.

The Crisp Avenue serves as a vital link between population centers over Lindy Creek. There is only one other crossing of this creek located on Keyser Avenue. The missing bridge posses a significant urgent problem in providing essential services, including emergency vehicles and school bus access.

The City of Scranton through the Office of Economic and Community Development will allocate \$150,000.00 a portion of our total CDBG-R requested funding, to enhance businesses within our City of Scranton and promote Economic Development and job creation and retention.

(3) Activity Narrative:

Through the funding requested the City of Scranton will be preserving nearly one hundred (100) current employees in the city as well as creating at least five (5) new full time jobs through initial stages of direct funding. Our plan is to fund projects that will enhance Downtown Business as well as offer services to potential customers throughout the country. We feel this funding will lead to additional employment that we cannot calculate at this time through indirect business in the surrounding area.

Funds will be allocated to individual projects who, based on the opinion of the City of Scranton, meet the requirements of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. One of the goals for the Central Business District Economic Development will be to assist businesses looking to relocate to a newly refurbished building that has been vacant for over ten (10) years in the downtown. Renovation of the building is expected to be completed by Fall of 2009; some potential applicants have already inquired about availability of the aforementioned space. These funds will be necessary to foster growth in this section of the local economy and create and retain jobs.

Additional funds will be allocated and disbursed to companies whose target market would include health and community benefit. In the Fall of 2009 The Community Medical College will be enrolling their first class. With the Medical College now located in Scranton we feel it would be best to fund projects that will work in conjunction with The Commonwealth Medical College (TCMC) as well as the area hospitals and doctor's offices. As the new President and his administration of TCMC look to secure all patient and medical data that is required on the electronic Patient Health Information (ePHI) network we hope to foster a relationship with a potential local business that already operates in the Scranton market and has been in contact with this office regarding ePHI.

Through our Central Business District Economic Development funds we plan to enhance the economic and medical community for the citizens of Scranton as well as potentially bringing new jobs to the area through ancillary companies and industries that will be attracted by those we are funding.

(4) Jobs Created:

According to Bureau of Labor Statistics from March 2009 the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre metro area has a labor force of 282,063, employment at the end of that same month was 256,023, leaving unemployment at 26,040. Based on the data provided from Bureau of Labor and Statistics the unemployment rate in this metropolitan area has grown from 5.3% in April of 2008 to a projected 9.3% through April 2009. It is with this in mind that we are trying to infuse the struggling economy through funding to our Central Business District. Through the use of CDBG-R funding the City of Scranton's Office of Economic and Community Development expects our grantees to retain/create approximately 120 full time, seasonal, or temporary positions in our Downtown Business District. We also expect that more jobs will be created in the city as these businesses expand and draw in potential ancillary companies.

(5) Additional Activity Information:

This office is giving priority to projects that will be located, or are looking to relocate, into buildings that have been built or refurbished in a manner that promotes energy conservation within the building. The City of Scranton also encourages the enhancement of smart growth and the use of smart technology to produce and secure products in a safe and environmentally friendly manner.

In order to comply with Title XII of Division A and Section 1602 of the Recovery Act we have taken steps to ensure that all proposed projects under the Central Business District Economic Development activity will be prepared for funding within 120 days of disbursement to the City of Scranton.
