comments? If not, received and filed. Do any council members have any announcements at this time?

MR. EVANS: I do. First, I'd like to offer a reminder that the second payment is now due for refuse bills. It's payable by September 30 to avoid penalty. Also, an additional reminder, beginning in 2017 if you pay the full amount of your refuse bill by the end of May you will receive a 10 percent discount on the total bill.

Also, friends of Connors Park is sponsoring a chicken barbecue on Sunday, September 18 to be held in the park at 515 Orchard Street from 12 noon to 2:30 p.m. Tickets are only \$10 and all monies raised will be used to purchase and install a handicap accessible play equipment in the park. Tickets will be on sale at the park Saturday, September 10 through 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

MR. WECHSLER: One announcement concerning the agenda this evening, Item 5-B, the 2017 Action Plan on tonight's agenda will be the first of three readings with a public hearing scheduled for next week, September 22, at 5:30 p.m. Following that second reading, the legislation will be

Are we still on track with that 12 project? MR. WECHSLER: Yes. 13 14 MR. EVANS: It will be ready prior to the budget, yes. 15 16 MS. HODOWANITZ: I'm sorry? 17 MR. EVANS: It will be ready prior 18 to the budget, that's the goal. 19 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. With regard 20 to Rainey & Rainey, they had a two-year 21 contract to assist employees in the BA's office audit preparation activities, I 22 23 assume there is no need to extend our 24 contract into the third year? 25 MR. EVANS: I'm sure that will be

reviewed now because they are still active for this year. It's being reviewed.

MS. HODOWANITZ: All right, I'd be interested in that. I attended the Composite Pension Board meeting yesterday and learned that the Auditor General's audit of the municipal pensions had been briefed orally in draft form to the Composite Pension Board. Four members said there were no major findings and hopefully the final report will be made available to the public in the coming week, we'll see how that goes.

I raised several questions last week, and I'll raise them again in case there is any new information the status of the Sewer Authority sale, I still haven't seen anything about briefings on the easements, still a non-issue for them?

MR. WECHSLER: No, I contacted Mr. Barrett this week and he did not respond to me.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. I saw in the paper on Saturday all the legal notices and the RRP for preliminary storm water analysis which they said the deadline for input

October 31, appropriately Halloween. I'm wondering how much we are going to get out of a project like that at this late date, but it remains to be seen.

With regard to the foreclosures on Sampter's and the Oppenheim building, I asked a question about how much money was loaned to Mr. Boscov that might not be paid back to the city and, Mr. Rogan, and I believe you said you were going to look into how much money he owed the city in it's entirety for all his projects? Can you update us in motions or sometime later?

MR. ROGAN: Yeah, I have it. I'll give it to you in motions, it's rather lengthy.

MS. HODOWANITZ: I hope it's good news. Okay. Also, there have been an article in the paper several days ago about a rape kit that was more than one year old in the city, did anyone check with Chief Graziano or the mayor, do we still have an outstanding rape kit? Nobody knows? I think you should still ask that question.

MR. PERRY: I will ask that question

tomorrow morning.

MS. HODOWANITZ: It may be a non-issue by now, maybe it's been resolved.

MR. PERRY: But the fact that it's hanging over the head --

MS. HODOWANITZ: If has not been, the public is due an explanation.

MR. PERRY: I absolutely couldn't agree more.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. Also. I attended last week the County Commissioner's meeting and they introduced a resolution to offer property tax relief to the seniors and I asked the questions whether or not there had been discussions with the city, has anybody been looked into that or is the city looking into that? Anybody know? That's another thing you should look at, please.

And yesterday an article in the paper that a woman was attacked in the garage at the Marketplace at Steamtown, I know that Mr. Basalyga and the new owners of the parking garages have made quite a bit of to do about the fact that as soon as they got control of the garages one of the first

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priorities would be repair with an eye towards safety and security. Now, I'm well aware that you can't prevent all crime and place can't be everywhere at all time and you can't guard an entire parking garage. Also, the county budget process for 2017 fiscal year is now underway. The budget will be available mid-October keeping with the Home Rule Charter. I'll present a tentative presentation on the tentative budget at your October meeting, of course, we will have all of the information available on the county website in a complete PDF of the proposed budget and all of our supplementary budget materials when the budget is released again mid-October.

Lastly, I'd like to thank Mr.

Bulzoni. He attended or Department of
Planning and Economic Development meeting
today on ground field reclamation and
redevelopment. This is an exciting program
and the County's OECD Department has a grant
to study, of course, the ground field is a
former industrial property that cannot be
developed at the present time due to
contamination of some sort and some
environmental factors so we have got a grant
to study those properties in the county, we
are looking for properties to study and we

think Mr. Bulzoni's involvement, if anyone else from city government it would be a great opportunity to develop some of those properties in the city and put it towards a productive use.

Lastly, we'd be happy to follow up with council on Ms. Hodowanitz's recommendation on the program that was voted on by the commissioners last week. We'll work to get details to your office and the mayor's office as well. That's all we have. Lots of good events coming up and hopefully we'll see you there.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Albert Young.

MR. YOUNG: Good evening, Council.

Albert Young, Scranton Pennsylvania. I'm not going to take a lot of your time, gentlemen. I'm going to hand out some papers that I have received lately on the Meadow Brook fiasco. The top copy is the copy that was received by my lawyer the other day and the second copy is the changes that we have indicated for their digestion, but I will say this, over the last six

months we have gone -- we have come here to council and you deemed it an emergency project. Six months have gone by and this thing has gone from ridiculous to more ridiculous as far as the language is concerned. City law and engineering have seen fit to drag their feet with a lot of legal jargon.

Now, the mayor stated that there was no need -- that there was a need to repair but the contractors were needed not city workers. You have in front of you now the latest information that I have from city law and engineering that they have put together and it is very ridiculous. It's time that city law and engineering get off the deck and fix this before it costs the city a lot more money. The weather is going to start to get cold and I would like this thing fixed ASAP no later than December 1 in its entirety.

Now that the second property has gone down the estimate that I gave you back in April was for 60 feet. That's going to have to be increased to 80 feet to cover two

pieces of the property and the estimate naturally is going to be more and probably cost of materials have gone up because we can't agree to disagree here. It's no fault of yours, it's the mayor, the city law and city engineering and drag their feet on this. I think I'm going to start selling burial plots for remains if this thing doesn't get on the stick.

Now, I'm going to segue back to there was a mention of a budget, I don't know whether you have done anything with the budget for crossing guards for a raise, but I think it's time that they are considered, also, after ten or 12 years everybody else gets a raise, they should get a little.

My thanks, gentlemen, if there are any questions. I know, Bill, you have contacted me numerous times. Digest this, gentlemen, and please, if you can, put a word in with the mayor if it does any good or city law to get this thing fixed. We are about at our wit's end at this point. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Young, is there

any future meetings planned? Is there anything -- I know last week they talked about a meeting that was supposed to happen.

MR. YOUNG: The last I got was there was supposed to be a meeting on sometime in September 19, Monday. Then this document comes into play. I don't know whether they are going to continue or not. My lawyer has e-mailed -- they have been playing e-mail tag here with this thing to try and get this thing squared away, but --

MR. WECHSLER: Not going through the whole thing, but did they did take any of the modifications that your lawyer said?

MR. YOUNG: At this point they have not take any modifications that I have -- or the lawyer has made, so I'm at a loss to answer any questions you have as far as modifications are concerned. I did talk to the lawyer extensively this afternoon and, you know --

MR. WECHSLER: I don't think anyone here has been made aware of that meeting.

MR. YOUNG: We were not invited either, gentlemen. My lawyer nor either

party, the Kennedys or myself were not invited along with none of the council so these secret meetings I guess are secret. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Ron Ellman. Hello,
Council. I hope everybody rested up enough
for the 11 months of abuse that's probably
coming. Pat, I asked Mr. O'Brien to add my
bill onto yours but he said when he finished
yours would be big enough.

MR. ROGAN: One of the best mechanics in town.

MR. ELLMAN: Council, I was at Allentown for the car show and the Red Cross gave these out, CPR, these little kits, and they are just such a wonderful tool if you can see, and the best thing they are free, and if anyone has been fortunate enough to use CPR to help save a life like I have it's a wonderful achievement. I figure I can tell St. Peter about it when I go up there to overcome all of my adversities. I asked someone if CPR would help for an overdose and they said it couldn't hurt, so with all

of the problems going on I believe somebody 1 2 up there could get the Red Cross and get 3 these as a tool to the right people in the city and you can have this one, I don't have 4 5 much use for it, but I wish it could be instrumental that council could do something 6 7 like this. 8 Like I said, they are free and they 9 gave away gobs of them at --go ahead, open 10 it up and see how it is. It's really 11 something. 12 MR. EVANS: Yeah, I took a class. 13 MR. ELLMAN: Thank you, Council. 14 MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Ellman, I'm glad you are going to see St. Peter. 15 16 MR. ELLMAN: Sir? 17 MR. WECHSLER: I said I'm glad 18 you're going to see St. Peter, that's very 19 optimistic. 20 MR. ELLMAN: He might need that if I 21 get that far. 22 MR. WECHSLER: Lee Morgan. 23 MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council, 24 Lee Morgan. In regard to the parking 25 garages, you know, maybe it would be a good

idea for Scranton and the mayor to come up with a law that requires all parking garages to put cameras on every level so that there would be some monocle of security there at all times. I mean, there are many different places, and I just think it would be a benefit to the residents. Maybe it's time to enact some legislation that might actually help someone in this community.

Other than that, I'd just like to say that the city itself is going to be faced with an election fairly soon. There are just too many questions in this city about how so many things took place. I think the residents need to know how the parking deal came about and what the former mayor might have had to do with that parking deal since he was hired as consultant to the owner of the new mall, and I think there is a host of other questions in regard to that deal.

I also believe there is a host of questions to be asked about how authorities members are chosen and what their qualifications are and how the authorities

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were so mismanaged over decades. I think it's a very, very, very important questions.

It doesn't only have to do with the Sewer Authority or the Parking Authority, it has to do with all of the authorities. Are they playgrounds for the politicians to appoint their supporters because that's not what they were intended for? Really it's questionable to try and figure out what the intentions of any of these authorities were when you consider the amount of debt they carry and the additional taxation burden they put on the average resident of this city. It's extremely troubling what's taken place in our city since Act 47. I think there needs to be some questions asked about just so many things and council hasn't asked these questions. It's just been basically beyond ridiculous.

Now, today I paid my taxes on the three properties I own in this city, pretty close to \$11,000, and you know the future of the things I own in this city in my opinion is extremely bleak because council and the administration, and not just this one but

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others, have done nothing to contain costs and to manage the city in a way which would be productive and to call Scranton a progressive city, an electric city I think is a stretch, and I think that in the next election the residents of this city need to make a choice. They either continue as they are and be unable to pay their property taxes, you know, I had a conversation with a person today who sold their house for less than they bought it for 30 years ago to get out of it because they couldn't keep it because social security, and the payments from social security have been so managed by the federal government because they do the cost of living index and they have looted They have looted social security that fund. so they can't given increases because they are paying it out of the deductions that Americans make every week into the system.

And once again that's politics, chewing up everything around it, and the question is how long can the American people stand here and let a two-party system destroy their lives and their ability to

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earn a living? You know, we don't hear anymore about keeping taxes down so that American can be competitive anywhere because there is nothing left in American because the politicians, the Democrats and Republicans, voted all of these trade deals in. It's just really pathetic.

And, you know, I'd like to see what Chimpanzees in a suit could do if they were elected because, obviously, this isn't working. Thank you.

This isn't something that occurred overnight, but what's frustrating is when you continue to repeat the same mistakes over and over again you would think eventually we would have people competent enough to come up with solutions to fix the problem, but all of the elected officials in this community only understand kicking the can down the road, putting the burden on the residents of this city, and also putting the same burden on people outside of the city and as far as any realistic future for this city I think we can basically, you know, toss that in the wastebasket because that's not realistic to think there is a future, you're only fooling yourselves. A developer, I might add, who happened to be in -- happens to be located in Binghamton, but rest assured there are many local people who are as delinquent or deeper in delinquency and I am requesting tonight that we get that whole list of all of the OECD loans that were made from 2002 on and the current status and what happened to them, were they paid, are they delinquent, have they been written off, I would like to know that and I think the people deserve to know that? But I do and I happy they're finally starting to do that. Very overdue.

I didn't bring all of the statistics tonight, I'm sorry, I got a little sidetracked today, but I do recall that as of today the property transfers, all of the

property transfers since I started keeping Scranton and everybody else in March the 45.5 or 6 percent are below the CLR and that's tragic. It's truly tragic.

Next, on the agenda for tonight, 5-H during motions or before you vote on these I would like to know on "F" what -- if there is a retention of all of these tapes included and if they are -- if the retention and storage of those tapes is included in this and the duration of retention because that's proving to be a problem across the country. A lot of police departments are stopping cameras because of the need to store and retain all of those tapes.

And the next one is on "H", I would like to know, again, the amount of this and I would like to know the duration of the lease.

This is the your SAPA and it says for the City of Scranton, "Scranton City has a wide array of storm water problems ranging from inadequate past practices to aging infrastructure. urban area that has been developed for many years, stream enclosures exist through entire city blocks. Older neighborhoods, such as the East Mountain, were built

without adding the storm water planning for infrastructure. The City's working constantly to add storm water management facilities to address past practices and is not limited by need but by funding. Many areas of the city are served by a combination of sanitary storm sewers leading to significant problems associated with combined sewer outfall discharge throughout the city. Constant maintenance and preservation of the flood control project is required and implementation of additional regulations would help preserve their capacity."

May I just read one more sentence?

MR. WECHSLER: Please keep it within the time limit. Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: The one -- it lists all of the creeks and all that are causing damage and infrastructure along with soil bank erosion and it says here, "Bleach Creek is currently routed through what appears to be a railroad tunnel and requires a major construction project."

That would be in our next capital

plan.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I'll see you next week, good Lord willing.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, I was here when Mr. Boscov came for his last borrowing why -- I think you are all very smart. Mr. Rogan, might have been there.

Were you -- might have been at that meeting?

MR. ROGAN: I was and I voted against it. I was the one vote against it.

MR. SBARAGLIA: It wasn't so much that he was asking for money, it was a question who in their right mind would lend to the Mall Partners instead of the company headquarters. I believe everyone else that lent Mr. Boscov money lent it to the parent company and not to the Mall Partners when you know there were financial problems but it was done. I think you are very smart. That's the trouble. I know you understand everything that's happened, my question is why. I don't understand. Why anybody would

do the things you do.

Let's take the street lighting, that's my favorite one. We borrowed money to buy lights from PPL then we have gave another contract for the people to change it to mercury vapors and then another contract for people to go around and replace the bulbs. Now you want to borrow another 44 million to change the lights again. There was nothing wrong with our lighting.

If you come up and give a figure of how much we are saving by doing all of these things that would make more sense, not just giving contracts out for things like we give contracts out for. Things that aren't needed are being given on contract. That's what made he wonder what is going on here because I think you are all very intelligent or you wouldn't get away with what you are doing but, unfortunately, that's way it goes.

And the problem with the water is not the homes it's the asphalt. You and I know the biggest culprit of any city when rain happens is the asphalt. Most of the

homes on the outskirts or where I am the water mainly goes into the yard and perks down to the river, but the asphalt does not perk so they in turn flow into the sewer system and that's the main culprit so you can blame the city as being the main culprit for the water problem. The only trouble is we are going to have to pay for it because, unfortunately, we like to drive our cars on asphalt instead of bricks and dirt so these things are there and they will continue to haunt us.

As far as the parking garages, you know what I think of it, I just wish a government agency would come in and investigate. I'm surprised they didn't.

I'm surprised PEL isn't in here crying their heart out. That's what's surprised me more than anything, PEL would let that go through without any kind of comment and that's the sad part because obviously they are smart, too. They know what's going on.

Everybody knows what's going on and they are going to show up when it comes to voting time then they are going to have to

say what happened and the family ain't going to bear the jury duty. I understand the family is very proud of them. You want to call it a political organization, I call it the family. People in the housing, schools, city, state, county, they all vote as a block and that's what's destroying Lackawanna County. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Anyone else?

MR. PERRY: I just want to quickly address two things that Mr. Sbaraglia said. When we entered into this latest agreement for the streetlights there was actually a guaranteed savings. This contract that we signed with them if we didn't see the savings that they offered us in that contract they were going to pay the balance of it, so there is going to be a savings with that contract that we signed.

And just to defend my part of the parking decision, the general fund was constantly getting raided at the end the year to pay that Parking authority and that's after you include revenue from the

meters and the garages. There still wasn't enough money to pay for it, and not only was there not enough money to pay for it, but year after year it was just the revenue was cycling down and down and down the garages just were empty and it wasn't even able to be propped up any longer. It was going to cost us a lot more down the road and, you know, personally that's why I voted for this. It just stopped the seepage from the general fund.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxes paid. First of all, once again call Congress, talk to your senator and your congressman

1-202-224-3121, tell them to pack it in on their trade packs. And 1-202-456-1111 to talk to the president and tell him you are very disappointed and please pack it in on the trade packs, especially the transpacific pack. You are tired of social security going broke, you are tired of the government being broke, you are tired of paying more in property taxes, you are tired of people

going crazy. Tell them to pack it in on the trade packs.

Now, on local issues, the tax office, one of the things that disturbs me about my tax form is that I get combined city and school taxes and all I would like to know is how much am I paying the city and how much am I paying the school? The person that was employed by the school and on council years back used to crow that the school taxes were high, but, you know, I'd like to know who is charging what and they shouldn't be combined.

On the Parking Authority, years back, and there is nothing you people can do about it, I don't know if the current path is the right path, but several people that I know personally resigned from the Parking Authority years ago because they felt that the aggressive building policy was stupid and that's all there is to it. We are stuck with what we are stuck with, but it's ashame and I do agree that it's going down. Oh, by the way, I parked in the Parking Authority a couple of weeks in a row and it won't accept

my credit card so they didn't even get paid.

Give me a break.

ITT, if you read in the paper a large institution, ITT went broke, well, it brought new meaning to thousands of people that you can go 'ta school. It's a big business anymore. You get put out of a job because of these trade packs and stuff and you can go to school. It sounds like the politician knows something, well, they don't know anything because you are in for years of debt, and in addition if you are ever accepted in that field or if you even have an aptitude for it because the unemployment office has been sending people and paying for it and some people don't have a clue when they are in the field anyway.

This flooding is getting really disturbing. We have people from West Side, people from Greenridge with problems that really -- would you really want sewer water backing up in your house and I know you have expressed concern on it, but it is time to get something done about it and done in a hurry. I mean, sewage in a house that makes

a house condemnable. How would you like to have your house just condemned some day because things got out of hand? It's just not right. The people shouldn't have to deal with that, that type of stuff should be the dealt with immediately. Mr. Young has been in and out of here six months and all he has gotten from the law office is a bunch of hoopla and legal ease and it's sad. It's really sad.

And once again, oversized housing we need to consider the ordinances that we have on oversized housing. It's silly to have two people living in a 14-room house, and granted if should be done tastefully, but it could be an answer and the rents are going way up. I had a house next to me that was left for taxes sold for \$15,000 and with a few repairs \$850 a month rent. You know, there is no competition in the rent. It's ashame because not a lot was done with it, and I'm just glad somebody is in there and I'm glad the guy bought it, I don't mean that, but 850 a month is kind of high.

That's an awful hefty investment to get back

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for something you put \$20,000 in and get \$2,000. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

MOTIONS.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?

MR. PERRY: Yeah, I have a couple of things and I'll try got get through as quickly as possible. Ms. Hodowanitz brought up about the Rainey & Rainey contract, I'm going to drop Mr. Bulzoni a line tomorrow and just see if he has an idea of an extension because at this point, you know, we are wrapping up the 2015 audit, although it's late it's months ahead of where we were last year and we are that cusp of the 2017 budget so even if he doesn't have a definitive answer about the extension I think he has pretty good idea on which way he wants to build his team after, you know, they just may needed to and it's success rate in getting this 2015 audit, knock on wood.

Really right now the biggest thing on our plate on my mind is the Sewer

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Authority and the sale. I mean, it's coming to a head, it's coming to a head very soon and I don't know if anxious or anxiety is the word I would like to use that's hanging over everybody's head, but there is just major issues waiting for this shoe to drop with storm water management and storm water costs. There is the easement questions that are happening and, you know, I'm sure, you know, one thing has to happen for the next thing to happen, but the more we wait and the longer this goes it just shortens that window of how prepared we are going to be and that's definitely a reason for me to put some energy into this and see where we are because this is too big of a deal to the city right now. This is the biggest thing that we have going for us and we cannot, for lack of a better word, underperform on this.

I also will call Chief Graziano about the missing rape kit and see just what's the deal with it. Is it just something that's misplaced or was it returned, just to get an answer because I think we are all wondering.

And I don't want to steal Councilman Rogan's thunder, but I do want to just say thank you to Linda Aebli and the whole team really at the Office of Economic and Community Development for getting that Section 108 information to us about Boscov's and the money that is outstanding still because I know, again, that's something else that popped up in the also eight to ten days, the foreclosures on his property that we do have some stake in, but I'll let Mr. Rogan get into all of that.

And, finally, Mr. Morgan brought up kind of a good idea about cameras in the parking garages. If there is no push back from councilmen, I would like to send a letter on behalf of council, Ms. Reed, to not only the DNC but also the Marketplace at Steamtown to see if there is any chance to add cameras. That might be something that's in the works already because I know they were very extensive and they are very proud of the record of safety. It just so happens that, you know, before they get the feet up and running and everything is in place we do

have an issue and I want this issue to be followed up. I want this to be the place to go that, you know, this needs to -- we need to reign this in and stop it. One is too much. That's kind of my feeling on that.

And that's all I have today.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, before I get into the Boscov loan issue, two positive items I'd like to mention. Earlier this week while leaving a meeting at city hall I ran into students from the University of Scranton, first year freshman who were doing a tour of Scranton, and the timing was very well and the mayor and myself were outside and we were able to speak to the students and let them know about many of the great things that are available in the City of Scranton outside of just being on the University of Scranton campus so I enjoyed the opportunity to speak to those students.

Also, the same day WNEP did a very nice story about businesses in the downtown, new businesses relocating to the downtown

and expansions. It was very nice to see a positive story about the city downtown, and if you look at what's happened it's really all started with the mall, with John Basalyga's investment in the city and we are starting to see that snowball effect.

The paving that has been in the downtown as well as certainly gone a long way towards making the downtown more friendly for people to commute in and, you know, there is much more work to be done but there is a lot of progress on that front.

Getting into the Boscov issue, as
last week I brought up a number of questions
regarding we'll call it Boscov's, they're
technically called Steamtown Mall Partners
and Steamtown Mall Associates, but they are
loans in regards to the Steamtown Mall and
Al Boscov as noted was the principal on
these partnerships.

So the first question was regarding the amount that was owed in total to the City of Scranton and it's listed as Steamtown Mall Partners around \$22,700,000. Steamtown Mall Associates is \$4,638,000 for

a grand total of \$27,332,000. In addition to that \$27 million, there is an additional Boscov Section 108 loan for 2008 which was a principle loan of \$3 million. The current balance on that loan is around \$2.5 million of that loan currently Boscov's is paying that correctly to HUD and it is current but if there is default on that loan the city has guaranteed that loan as they have the other Section 108 loans.

The second question was provide a breakdown of each loan, which I will get into when I give it to the spreadsheet in the back here. The next question was regarding the 108s which the city is responsible for paying back, again, I will get to that in one minute. And, finally, which was one of the more pressing questions that myself and I know some of my colleagues raised as well was have any donations been received from Mr. Boscov and if so in what frequency?

And the reply that we received is that "Scranton's Office of Economic and Community Development has no knowledge of

the City of Scranton receiving donations from the Steamtown Mall Partners, the Steamtown Mall Associates and/or Boscov's Department store other than the personal contributions from a Boscov's Department Store on December 4r, 2014, in the amount of \$713,00 to pay for an overdue Section 108 loan that was owned by the Steamtown Mall Partners. That amount was around \$613,000 in principal and \$102,000 in interest."

So since that one good faith donation has been made to the city there hasn't been any else that follows.

As a breakdown of the loans, as I mentioned, there are two types of loans that are involved here. There is one type where if they're defaulted upon the city is not responsible for paying them, but we do lose that programming income coming in to loan out to other small businesses or for other projects within the city. The second type of loan, which is much more detrimental to the city where they're defaulting on the Section 108 loans, and the timing for this is very coincidental that tonight we are

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also introducing the 2017 Community Development and Block Grant funding, which I will get into in a minute, as payment for one of these Section 108 loans that has been So not to go into too much because there is quite a number of loans here that have been paid off, refinanced, if you remember I believe it was my second year on council Mr. Boscov came in or he sent attorneys in asking for I called it a bailout, others called it a remodification of his loan so many times these loans have changed the form they were in, so the current total that the city is either out or on the hook is \$27 million but that could increase to almost \$30 million if the Boscov's loan, 108 loan that is current is not paid.

So that is the total of where we currently stand regarding the Boscov's loans, and I do think, and my colleagues agree, we should send correspondence to Mr. Boscov asking if there will be any future donations made to the city as was promised at the caucus that city council had

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that Mr. Boscov was looking for for future loans.

MR. PERRY: The only item that I would just like to add is if we would could see what time frame when the next donations would be made.

MR. ROGAN: Absolutely, and I always say this and sometimes people will stop me on the streets and say I'm being too hard on Mr. Boscov, and I always preface my statements with I say he has a great store. I don't think there is anyone that could say that Boscov's isn't one of the best stores in the area, but the stores and his financial dealings with the City of Scranton are two completely different things. long been a Boscov shopper, if these loans continue to go unpaid and the taxpayers are out millions of dollars I think it will be hard for myself and many people in the City of Scranton to continue shopping at Boscov's.

Moving on and still OECD issues, we are introducing the 2017 Community

Development Block Grant funding for this

year, so I'm go to go through all the items that are proposed to be funded. There will be a public hearing on this if anyone wishes to comment. I'll first start off with the four biggest funding sessions within these programs. The largest is paving. The city has one, it's no secret that the city streets are -- many of them are in disrepair and this year \$400,000 is allocated for paving.

Neighborhood police patrols \$261,000 is allocated. That will pay for four full-time police officers to patrol the beats in other neighborhoods. That's a great program, I think everybody is very happy to see that funded.

This next one bothers me quite a bit. The third largest funding source out of our block grant allocations is one of the Section 108 loans from the Steamtown Mall Partners and that's in the amount of \$201,000. If that loan had been current and paid by the partners headed by Mr. Boscov that would be \$201,000 additional dollars could be used for any of these programs that

I have been mentioned while I go through the rest of these allocations.

The fourth largest item is demolition of hazardous structures within the City of Scranton, which there are far too many and the \$200,000, unfortunately, only was a small debt to that but it is a start.

Some of the other items that are being funded through the city are public sidewalks with ADA ramps and increased lighting to serve economic development zones.

This one is very important, a balance of the engine purchase price for Scranton Engine 7. As you know, our fire department has gone many, many years without upgrades. I talked to one firemen who is about to retire and he told me he is using the same piece of apparatus today as he was hired over 20 years ago because of all of the breakdowns throughout the city, so that's a very important piece of funding there.

St. Joseph's Center, the

mother-infant program will be funded for \$10,000.

United Neighborhood Center, the Bellevue Youth Program will be funded for \$10,000.

United Neighborhood Center, the
Project Hope summer camp, which is one I
know we are all happy to see that that's
still going on, it's proposed for \$40,000.

Administration for the Office of Economic and Community Development will be funded for \$500,000.

CDBG funding for the HOME Program will be \$28,000.

The North Scranton Neighborhood
Association, this is the McLane Park
improvement project, and I did speak to the
mayor at length about this project and I
believe we received a petition just this
week in our mailbox, that's going to be
funded for \$90,000 and that sounds like it's
going to be a great, great improvement for
the North Scranton neighborhoods.

The Connell Park little league will be funded \$29,000 for various projects at

that little league.

Boys and Girls Club of NEPA \$15,000 for the Park-It program, which is one the Scranton school district and the city partners up to help low to moderate income children enjoy the parks in the summer.

The Scranton/Lackawanna Human

Development Agency, that's for the

weatherization program to help individuals

who get their house up to code as

weatherization goes to save them some money.

The Catherine McCullough Center, \$5.000 for rental assistance.

And I believe that is it. There are a number of other funding though the HOME Program that I won't get into, many of those are housing rehabilitation. Our first time homebuyers program, which I know myself and Councilman Evans have always fought for increased funding on, but that is in a nutshell the current proposal for 2017, and unfortunately, a very long and sad trip down memory lane regarding Mr. Boscov's loans for the City of Scranton. That's all.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Rogan.

Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. I would like to ask for mayor and his administration officially and on the record again why don't you create a defined contribution pension plan, a 401-K-type plan for you and your cabinet and the non-union personnel that are employed by the city? In fact, I would not be surprised if you polled cabinet members and non-union employees with city government I'm sure you would find a large majority would be in favor of such a change.

Besides the obvious benefits of making the change, there are other reasons for the city to do this. Number one, we need to find ways to eliminate legacy costs at every opportunity. Number two, there will be will some long-term savings, something we don't look at nearly enough. And three, it is a benefit that would help attract qualified and professional staff for cabinet and non-union positions on a going forward basis.

For the enrollee, this type of plan there are many benefits as well. Number

one, control. We have more individual control over the process and investments. Number two, affordability. You can easily take the money in the plan with you when you move to another company or employer. Three, equal benefits. You get a plan where the benefits are equal for everyone. You will be able to get access to the benefits sooner than a defined benefit plan and on day one you can start saving for your retirement, plus you could potentially start saving for your retirement plan during retirement and you can chose the investment yourself and if they perform well, of course, you are well rewarded.

So let's see if we can finally make this seemingly simple change sooner rather than later. It's something I have been asking for probably at least for two years. I know there's a little bit of a movement afoot trying to get this done so I urge the mayor to sit down with his administration and try to get this thing done.

Additionally, there is a drum beat for reassessment -- the drum beat for

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reassessment received another supporter this week as the director of the Greater Scranton Board of Realtors endorsed and are in full support of a countywide reassessment. They recognize that increased property values and growth as well as tax quality cannot be fully achieved without a reassessment particularly within the City of Scranton.

Finally, while we will forever have those that will tell us how bad Scranton is as not a good place to live or work or it's a dying town with no opportunity etcetera, etcetera, etcetera, I would like to offer a slightly different perspective of who we are as Scrantonians. I attended a fundraiser for Patrick Sweeney at the Icebox on Saturday. Pat is a friend but he is also my wife's cousin so to me he is a family. sons came with their wives and girlfriends and some of our grandchildren came as well as so did hundreds, maybe thousands of others to offer their support. As I said hello to old friends and some new ones, politicians and relatives and strangers, I couldn't help but think that this is what we

are all about. This is who we really are.

When one of our own needs help we rally. We come together, we care for each other. I saw hundreds of smiles and just as many tears, not out of sadness, but out of joy.

A joy that comes when you realize that you are not alone that "we", the collective "we" that is Scranton are with you. That is all I have for tonight.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Evans.
Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. Just a few items. Last week I asked when Colliery Avenue and Cedar avenue would be paved due to the extensive pave cuts that have taken place on these two roads and on the pave cut inspector informed us that the utility companies would be paving both streets in the spring. I was hoping that it would be done earlier because I believe that this is going to make for rough travel during the winter.

Councilmen Wechsler and I attended at meeting in the 400 block of Phelps Street in regard to the flooding that has occurred

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there this week -- or rather the flooding that occurred previously, we attended the meeting this week. The damage to this block is absolutely astounding and unacceptable. People lost cars, there were cars that are floating down the street, water heaters, boilers, and many other things that cannot be replaced. To give you an example, Pantuso corners, which is right on the corner there, had well over \$200,000 in damage and as we stood there on that block my heart broke for those people because they literally have no recourse whatsoever. can't get flood insurance because they are not near a body of water and a lot of their insurance doesn't cover many of the things that they lost and some of the deductibles are absolutely ridiculous.

Councilman Wechsler and I invited AJ Magnotta to the meeting who works as an engineer on behalf of the Sewer Authority and he explained what some of the issues were in this area. Apparently, they need to do an extensive cleaning of one of the lines that may be blocked and causing the flooding

but this may take months because of bidding procedures. I'd like to find out if there is a way that we can possibly speed this process because these people cannot afford to get hit with another disaster.

Also, we need to investigate if there is funding available to these people to recoup some of their losses and for that matter all people across Scranton who have lost many different things with some of the disastrous flooding. This is an absolute tragedy that has happened to this block and these people and hopefully something can be done to help them out.

We also requested that PPL go out and cut the trees in the 400 block of Phelps Street. There is lot of different hazards and hopefully PPL can get out there and cut those back so they can get off of the lines.

I was informed this week by

Mr. Wechsler that the mayor will not be

attending a caucus in council chambers to

give us a state of the city update. He is

apparently working on his state of the city

address and will give it at some point to

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the Chamber of Commerce.

I mentioned this before the recess, but I think that the mayor needs to sit down and review the quality of life ticketing program in the city. I requested last July how many tickets had been issued to date in 2016 and the amount of money has been collected as a result of these citations, and I did receive the information and the numbers seem to extremely low. Just to give you an example, January 53 tickets, February 65 tickets, May 87 tickets, so we are not issuing as many tickets as I thought we should be based on the complaints we get every week from people in the neighborhoods about all of the things that are going on. We budgeted \$42,500 and it doesn't look like we are going to hit that amount.

Now, saying that, I don't believe that this program is just about giving people a ticket so that the city can collect the money. Rather, find out what the problem is and try to work with the person to get it cleaned up and keep our neighborhoods clean. One of the things that

I mentioned that I think has been done before and it was very successful is saturation patrols with all city inspectors, police department, and the neighborhood groups, so focus on one section of the city instead of keeping the inspectors spread out. I believe you can make more of impact that way.

So I definitely think that there are more efficient ways that this program can be successful and we can accomplish some of these goals.

I'd like to thank the DPW for taking care of a very dangerous situation on Olive Street that was impeding pedestrian traffic. They cleared some brush there that blocked. It was very dangerous for students from Lackawanna College traveling down to the stadium and to Scranton High School students.

Also, as was mentioned, council received the RFP for a preliminary storm water analysis and proposals will be opened Monday, October 31, at 10 a.m. in council chambers. And that is all I have this week.

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Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

Gaughan. This evening my comments are really going being basically following up pretty much on everything that was said by my colleagues, very well spoken as it was.

Mr. Perry mentioned the storm water plan and the Sewer Authority plan. I think as a city government, and especially administration working with council, is we really have to start separating the say of Sewer Authority and the storm water management plan. The sale of the Sewer Authority is on a track of it's own and it's either going to be successful or it's not going to be successful, the powers that be will decide that. The storm water management issue is our problem. holds the storm water permit and it's up to us as city government officials to get this plan moving either the Plan A working with the new owners of the Sewer authority or Plan B working on our own or Plan C working with some type of hybrid agreement between the new owners, old owners and the city.

But we are seeing -- starting to see problems with the neighborhoods as

Mr. Gaughan and I saw and part of the problems that we are seeing is even though we hear tonight there is nothing happening in the city, there are a lot of developments now in the city that are causing more parking lots to be built and more buildings to be built and they are impacting the old, obsolete system that we have in our homes.

Following up on Mr. Gaughan's comments, when we were over on Phelps Street this weekend -- this week, I'm sorry, the thing that struck me is these are just working people. There is no -- we hear from the podium all the time about special interests and we are only serving this one and we're serving that one, I can honestly say that I have never met one of these people at political functions and never seen them at a political function, don't know if they're "R", "D's, "I's" or not registered at all, but when you talk to them they go to work and they fear that when they come home their property isn't going to be there or

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when they go to bed at night they fear that they can't wake up in time to go down and rescue their vehicles and their properties. These are the people that need are help.

These are the people that we need to make sure are taken care of.

One of the questions that came up while we were there, and I am going to request that we get in contract with Director Barrett, if there is a possibility that the Sewer Authority is putting off work while waiting for the sale of the Sewer authority these problems exist today, and just as I said, we have to start looking at this city whether in terms of where we are today, not if the Sewer authority is sold or not if the Sewer authority is sold. would be very disappointing to hear that there are projects being delayed while the Sewer Authority is waiting to see their status with the Sewer Authority because these people need to be served.

And just as we did with Mr. Young if it's a matter of doing an emergency declaration, if it's the matter of just

cleaning out a drain that should be done and it shouldn't be delayed while we wait for a study or anything like that, and I am not go to listen to putting off this work, but this is something -- every person should go over and talk to these people on Phelps Street and just get a sense on how terrified they are of what happens there.

Also, following up on Mr. Rogan's comments about the good news in the city.

Once again, we hear how bad things are now, being accused of not being in the neighborhoods, councilmen are in the neighborhoods all of the time. I don't see the speakers where I'm at, I don't see them there and we are all in the neighborhoods.

On Saturday, Councilman Evans and I and the mayor we attended a unity rally at the mall that, you know, those people weren't there. We were at the Sweeney benefit where there were so many people there they ran out of raffle tickets to sell. Once again, an outpouring of people positive and the majority of those people were Scrantonians there, dedicated

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Scrantonians trying to help a friend and they will come out when you need them, so maybe I happen to go to different places and get a better feel for the negativity out there, but I really believe if some of our people that are not seeing a good they need to get out and try to go to some of the places where good things are happening.

Try to get at the City Deli on Spruce Street on Saturday morning or Sunday morning, it's loaded with customers. It's so big they had to add more seating. There are positive things going on here if you choose to see them. I mean. I choose to see a lot of the negative, but you have to open your eyes to some of the positive as well and it's frustrating for me that maybe I'm not seeing some of the negative, but they are not seeing any of the positive and it is there. It really is there.

I also want to kind of a personal neighborhood note, we came very close to a tragedy on East Mountain last week with a fire and, fortunately, Engine 10 was quick responding to the fire, saved a home without

any major property damage and no loss of life, so I always have to give a shout out to East Mountain finest Engine 10, and it is one of the things that myself as a councilman would never allow that station to be closed. That's all I have at this time.

My goal was to get council's office to become virtually paperless and at the same time more transparent to the public which we serve. I would to take a second and explain what this program is and how it will benefit the taxpayers.

Currently in council's office we have a highly manual paper dependent process with little automation. We literally waste hundreds of pieces of paper a week, thousands of pieces of paper a year with multiple agenda packets being created manually, and this will just give an idea and there is even more to it, (holding up agenda packet) but what we get in a packet each week.

On top of all of this, if someone from the public wants the backup to a particular agenda item, which I just held up and showed everyone, they must physically come in and pay for paper copies at 25 cents a copy. They cannot currently access any of this information from the city's website. I knew there had to be a better, easier, more efficient and transparent way.

By using Granicus and it's peak agenda management software we will automate the entire agenda process. Our city clerk will use software that makes creating the agenda much easier and more efficient.

Instead of printing out six agenda packets weekly, including hundreds and sometimes thousands of pages, council will use iPads and receive all of that information electronically saving roughly \$28,000 a year in paper, ink, and other costs and this comes from a cost benefit analysis that was prepared and essentially we are paying for -- the savings pay for the program itself.

Now with a simple click of a button all agendas, legislation, backup, Third

Order items will be posted automatically to the City's website for all residents to view with ease, and a secondary benefit of this is I'm sure it will bring more traffic to the city's website.

Another benefit is all of the material that's posted on the city's website, legislation and backup will be searchable by keyword making it easy to find specific pieces of legislation.

When I became a councilman, I listened to many people who wanted more transparency from our office and I think we are about to deliver that with this program. Once everything is signed, sealed and delivered our staff will be trained and we are looking to roll everything out in the

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next few months so I will keep everyone posted as we move towards paperless agendas. Thank you.
