First, there will a special day in remembrance of the Kathleen Cavanaugh, a victim of domestic violence. The event is called Kathleen's Crusade and it is a fundraising event. It will be held Sunday, September 18 from 3 to 7 p.m. at the Radisson Hotel. It's \$20 per person and all proceeds benefit the Women's Resource Center.

Also, there will be a fundraiser for Pat Sweeney recently diagnosed with lung cancer. All proceeds will help offset medical bills and expenses. It will be held Saturday, September 10, from 4 to 9 p.m. at the Ice Box Sports Complex, 800 Providence Road. There will be food, beverages, raffles and entertainment and it is a \$20 donation. Thank you.

MR. EVANS: I'd like to remind everyone of the obvious, that beginning tomorrow La Festa Italiano will be taking place at courthouse square Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday. That's all I have.

MR. WECHSLER: In addition to La Festa this weekend you can also attend the

Railfest. It will be labor day weekend,
September 3 and 4 at Steamtown. This year
it's kind of a special occasion I believe
it's the 25th anniversary of the Steamtown
Scranton.

Also, on September 11 and September 18 Scranton Tomorrow will be working on the planters in downtown Scranton. On September 11 it will be wedding and cleaning and mulching of the Mulberry Street island and on September 18 it will be the removal of summer planting and the planting of the fall flowers. I'd like to thank Scranton Tomorrow for doing that. It is a great addition to our city. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

MR. WECHSLER: Kara Seitzinger.

MS. SEITZINGER: Good evening, Kara Seitzinger, city of Scranton resident, live in the neighborhood of Greenridge. I came this evening for obviously since we met last there have been multiple storms and on the Greenridge Neighborhood page people starting sending me pictures. We invited them to so

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we can catalog what is going on. gotten worse and worse and worse with every storm. Mr. Wechsler and I had a wedding, a mutual wedding that we were attending and I almost didn't make the wedding. I went to church, came home and again had sewage in my basement, and so it's just at the point now where the odor is so bad, I don't have to tell you gentlemen, you understand what is going on. I know Mr. Wechsler has sent letters to Mr. Barrett, and I do appreciate that, but we are at dire straights at this point. It's citywide because people are sending them to me from West Side and South Side, Dunmore. I'm Greenridge neighborhood based, that's what we are, but that being said, I mean, the ball is in someone's Court. I guess we have to choose what to do and I don't really know from here.

But that being said, I did get a call, I was up at physical therapy, I got a call from Joe Profera from Profera's Pizza, his family started that business, he has a property that is next to Mr. Young or a couple of doors up. He also owns a property

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on Greenridge Street in Dunmore, high up in Greenridge Street. He has a third property. The Greenridge Street property has been flooded not in the three storms eight times He contacted the Sewer raw sewage. Authority, two different gentlemen at the Sewer Authority and he has all of their names, have given the proper people to speak to legalwise for that matter and they were rude, they were ignorant, they simply told him that they gave up a long time ago because they were so much debris and rocks in the storm drain system that they couldn't even handle it, and that's very consistent with what happened to the McGrath's who live across the street from me. 75 feet they dug to the alley, it was grass or rocks, debris so we don't know what's mixing with what obviously, and I'm going to leave that matter as it stands.

The next thing I have to tell you is this letter that the Sewer Authority had done with the easements, that came to pass because I received a telephone call on my cell phone, because my cell phone number was

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with the Greenridge Neighborhood page, when I received the phone call from a gentleman who lives behind St. Joseph's Center he told me about it, I asked him if he could provide it or pick it up, he delivered it to my mailbox. From that point on, I invited people to obviously send it if they had to. I forwarded that information all to the Scranton Times. The gentlemen who was the subject of the article in the Times happened to come to me the day before the article was being done by Chris Kelly. That gentlemen had called Jerry Notarianni asking for help, our county commissioner and he didn't even Mr. Notarianni did not even know about it. know that this was being passed around.

There is an Exhibit A, any legal document would have an Exhibit A reference, there's the pin number but no meets and bounds attached and Exhibit B nothing. It's an absolute mess. We have told everybody not to sign it or to get legal counsel before they sign it because you don't know where they're encroaching on your property without further information. There could be

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52 public hearings, Paul Walker is a disgrace. I apologize for taking that tone but in my opinion the transparency is beyond, and I'm not going to say anything more than if anybody else has that document that's listening tonight certainly please contact the Greenridge Neighborhood Association, we will point them in the right direction.

The last thing I wanted to mention was in keeping with the sewer storm and the leachate, I had kind of disconcerting situation that happened and I'm going to read a brief thing to you. You cannot put a price tag, a score card of how many times I have attended daily mass, bestowed favors or donated charity gifts to help with my family, my husband and child in particular. Make no mistake of the love of a strong, Irish Catholic mother or any mother can take Thank you, Wayne. No matter how on anyone. large their wallet, how tall the amount of trash or how deep the pool of leachate. was astounded, hurt and deeply offended when the nephew of Louis DeNaples verbally

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accosted me at a church picnic at St. Rocco's last month because he had a front row seat at the DEP hearing and he could not believe that I stood up and advocated for my Apparently, his father and uncle family. did not raise him to be a better man. have never held any ill-will towards any member of the DeNaples family. I attended school with many of them, Dr. DeNaples in particular was my classmate. My children are their children's friends. wanted to become involved in the Friends of Lackawanna fight, it didn't effect me, until unbeknownst to me the nefarious caper of Eugene Barrett lost a sudden amendment to a 30-year-old permit barring liquid untreated leachate trash suddenly appeared days surrounding the execution of the agreement of the sale of the SSA, then it most certainly became my and my neighbors and the entire city's problem. So I began to research every single document that I was able to put my hands on through the tireless

efforts of Friends of Lackawanna and

Greenridge Neighborhood Association.

MS. SEITZINGER: Thank you. I'll give it to Mr. Lockwood, thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Than you.

MS. SEITZINGER: He can print it.

MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
Scranton. Taxpayer and resident. I, too,
want to extend my condolences to Ozzie
Quinn's family on his passing. The city can
certainly use a lot more men like him. He
was outstanding.

The Friends of Scranton Public
Library are conducting another book sale,
second floor of the marketplace at
Steamtown, right in front of the Crunch gym.
The book sale runs through Sunday 5 p.m.
Books sell from one to two dollars. It's a real bargain.

Now that we are back from summer recess it's time for an update on a lot of issues so if you could during motions give us some information on the status of the following issues: The 2015 audit, which is

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now 94 days late; the status of the Auditor General's audit of Scranton's municipal pension fund. I sent him office an e-mail asking for a status, I did not get a reply. If memory serves, the Composite Pension Board will meet on Wednesday, September 14, at 11 a.m. right here and among other things I will be voting on their next investment advisor and that's quite important.

The status of the Scranton Sewer Authority's sale, I must compliment you, Mr. Wechsler, that you went to attend the board meeting last week to see what was My first question is, if for any going on. reason the sale falls through or is inordinately delayed does the city have a Plan B with regard to super funding the pension funds? This is a really important to the entire city and this could hinge whether or not we will go into receivership, so if as the president of city council you can discuss this issue with the administration and pass the information onto us.

If you recall during that board

meeting, there was mention made of having public hearings or public briefings on this easement issue and I saw something in the paper, did I miss it?

MR. WECHSLER: No, I spoke to

Mr. Barrett today and he is still coming up
with a mechanism to do that.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. The status of the planning for the 2017 operating budget which is coming upon us very quickly, and the status of the rental registration legislation, which has been hanging in the air for God knows how many months. I am very happy to see in the paper that the city is going after delinquent loans. I saw the issue with the Davis' for the Linden Street project, be nice to know if there are any other deadbeats we can go after.

And, finally, I attended the COLTS board meeting, and I know this is county level, and this was with regard to the hiring of a new operation's manager, and one thing that really disturbs me, and this applies to the city as well as to the county, we have a number of boards and

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authorities which are appointed by the county commissioners and/or the mayor and that was city level, and once they are appointed many of these boards and authorities operate independently. answer to no one. Although appointed by an elected official, they don't answer to the official anymore and they certainly don't answer to the voters and I think this whole structure based on the Home Rule Charter needs a relook because if you look at the history of the Scranton Parking Authority the COLT's board with it's ghost ridership and \$6 million payback to PennDOT, double pensions, just to mention a few, and I didn't want to mention the Scranton school board you know how that goes, but we don't have adequate oversight of these entities This is since they answer to no one. bothersome. We need to look at this problem and we need to come up with some innovative ideas.

One thing we need we need is more citizens like Ozzie Quinn willing to take the time and the effort to look at these

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issues and be heard and if anything else maybe we can put the fear of God into some of these potential criminals. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Anyone else?

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. Permission to -- I have some papers for you. I'm sure our attorney is aware of it, but give him one anyway. I think there is enough there. Of course, I'd like to speak tonight about ordinances and I have mentioned before at times that some of our ordinances seem to get a little overbearing and in many instances they exceed state law. I have here a paper on Wilkes-Barre settles one strike lawsuit. Apparently, they have an ordinance if there is drugs or guns involved the apartment house can be shut down immediately and in some cases it happened here in Scranton a few years ago, a person went to visit their mother, collapsed from a drug overdose and the apartment house in South Scranton shut down. He didn't even reside there, and also on Linden Street I know where the house is, I used to walk past

it on a regular basis, but I don't know the address, I could point it out or find out. But apparently the American Civil Liberties Union took this to Court and now several landlords and several tenants that were effected by this qualified for \$100,000 settlement each. That's a lot of money if it starts piling up, and then the second day Wilkes-Barre could be open to lawsuits, they announced that anyone that was effected within still falls under the statute of limitations could also file for a lawsuit, so now you are talking maybe millions of dollars and in too many instances I look at many of our ordinances and they far exceed state law.

I hate to drum the smoking ordinance in the parks. I was up at the racetrack over our little vacation at Pocono and there are certain places you can smoke and certain places you can't. Bleachers, communal, eating facilities, you cannot smoke there, but, you know, we are going overboard and it's only a \$25 fine, but then again it starts to get you involved with police and

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different issues and things can tumble from there, so I want you people to consider this in the future here, digest it. I mean, I apologize about the poor printing but I need a cartridge I guess, but it is important because this could add up to millions and millions of dollars worth of senseless -and it also punishes other people in the apartment houses, it also punishes people that aren't involved in it, and may not have any awareness of it. If the landlord was involved in something like that then, hey, that's the way it goes, but you still have other tenants that are possibly totally innocent so we really need to look at this because it just snowballs some day and we have had enough settlements for the next century, the rest of the century.

And once again, I'd like to note the passing of Ozzie Quinn. He was a good friend and great activist in the community and I'd also like to call to people's attention that radon gas in houses. Now, he quit smoking 25 years ago, and I'm not excusing any smoking, but we could be living

even if we don't smoke literally an atomic bomb. Radon is radioactive and it can come up through your basement floor, especially in areas with heavy mining and your friends or family or your pets could be all exposed to this so if have you any question get rid of it and get your house checked.

And I have a little fan club, Jennie from Pittston Township don't forget to bawk, bawk, bawk. Thank you. Every now and then I meet somebody that is a fan.

MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council.

Lee Morgan, obviously a resident of

Scranton. I guess everybody is going to,
you know, give Mr. Quinn's family, you know,
condolences on their loss and I guess I'll
just add my name to that list. But there
were some discussions here about sewage
going -- backing into people's houses and
the first thing I think I'd tell them to do
is put a backflow preventer in and, quite
possibly ask the Scranton Sewer Authority to
reimburse you for the cost of it, and I
think that another important thing is, you
know, when we are just -- well, one of

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speakers here was just discussing the case in Wilkes-Barre and I just think that in that case this was a flaw. I think that the party that was suing should have sued the individual lawmakers who created that law and try to pierce their immunity and sue them individually and it might be hard, but in the end I think it might be possible and I think that whenever you decide you're going to engage your government sometimes you have to consider not only suing the township or the city, but the individual council members or the mayor or any other official because they do have a certain amount of immunity, but it's not endless, and I'd say to anybody that's having a problem with an elected official to spend some time at the law library and file something and maybe you will get lucky enough to, you know, take their assets and, you know, return things to an even keel because I think that too often we have elected officials who believe that they create the law and they are above the law and that's not the case, and the law belongs

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to every citizen, not just elected officials.

The other thing I would like to say here today is in the month that council has been out on vacation the sewer deal, it's my hope that that's all we are going to hear of that deal and I hope it just never happens because Scranton is going to be a city that after the sewer deal goes through it's my opinion that it's going to go into receivership and when it goes into receivership it's going to have more debt than it had when it went into Act 47, and I think it's a very troubling thing that over a quarter of a century the residents of this city couldn't elect people that had an understanding of who they served and what they were trying to accomplish and I really feel sorry for residents that had to endure this and the residents who live outside of the city who are also feeling those effects, whether it's taxation or lack of the government in the city which really causes a lack of employment opportunity and makes the city really drag the whole area down.

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And the last thing I have here today is, you know, I watched former first lady Hillary Clinton and also a senator at one time and Vice President Biden come here and as a Scrantonian I'd like to say that these two individuals have had almost limitless political power in their lifetime and as a Scrantonian I don't remember them ever doing anything for the residents of this city and helping us in any moment where the city itself was in trouble, and I'm so tired of political people talking about where they are from, okay, to curry votes and to create talking points. When I live in a city that's been just since the 1930's just in decline, and with all of the power and all of the access to power and to come here and visit and say you are a Scrantonian and ask people to vote for you that's what's really wrong with this whole system. We have elected people who have come up with slogans like walk the walk and talk the talk and all of the other silly things that have been said, but in the end it's my hope that the people will see that politics as usual has

1 to end and, you know, conservative 2 Republicans have lost control of the 3 Republican party, it's come to the center, 4 and it's my hope that in the next election 5 what do we to lose by voting for Mr. Trump because we have heard all of the lies and 6 7 consider all of the seniors who worked all 8 their life trying to live on social security 9 and consider all of the residents of this 10 city that have watched elected officials for 11 25 years loot this city in every possible 12 way that is imaginable, and listen to all of 13 the slogans we have listened to, and you 14 I think it's time to take a look know what? 15 at the Scranton Parking Authority deal --16 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. 17 Morgan. 18 MR. MORGAN: And consider what 19 Mr. Doherty's role was in that. 20 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, 21 Mr. Morgan. 22 MR. MORGAN: You're welcome. 23 MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else? FIFTH 24 ORDER.

MR. PERRY: Yes, I have a few

things. First off, I want to send my

deepest condolences to Ozzie Quinn's family.

To say Mr. Quinn was just a sad in passing,

we were on a first name basis but we weren't

8 all that close, I just met him fairly

recently, but as a person of obvious stature

in the city he knew a lot of people and had

a lot of friends and one of them was my

grandfather, Micky Lawler, and my

grandfather was also really into the

community and that's how I come to know

Ozzie and, you know, I hear stories about

the days of the yore and just knowing Ozzie

these last couple of years, my goodness, I

don't know if I knew someone who grabbed an

issue and ran with it harder than he did,

and it was great just watching him work at

neighborhood association meetings, I mean,

no one owned the room like he did. He was a

tremendous person and Scranton definitely

has a big hole that needs to be filled and

someone needs to step up to fill that for

the community that Ozzie left and he will be deeply missed by the city and, you know, I do want to pass that onto his family.

And moving onto some city business.

Miss Reed, there was an issue that we were working on before recess about a truck ban on River Street that ran from Cedar Avenue to Meadow Avenue, the issue that we had was trucks were turning on Cedar up River and, you know, the streets in South Side they just, you know, they just go up at an angle and there was just truck after truck being towed out of that intersection, so I just want to see where we are with that, if there is a ban in place. If not, if we could implement it.

And, lastly, there is a storm drain on the corner of Kane Street and Pittston

Avenue that was being worked on by the Sewer Authority, then it was -- the work was stopped abruptly and I don't know what the reason was or what the stoppage was for that, if we can send a letter out to maybe Mr. Barrett and a copy to Mr. Gallagher on it just to see what the issue was on it and

if we can get that back going on. I'm not sure what the cost was but it was brought to my attention by a couple of the neighborhood residents that the work started and stopped and nothing was received yet.

And we have the festival going on.

All definitely be there probably more than I should so, you know, my favorite is definitely the Unico porketta, I start at one end, they're delicious. So I hope to see everybody out there. The weather is supposed to be fairly decent and that's all I have.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, a number of items. First, I'd like to join many of the speakers and my colleagues in wishing Ozzie Quinn's family the best in this terrible time they are having. I have known Ozzie before I have been on council. Luckily, we have agreed more than we disagreed, but even when we disagreed on issues he did it with class and he truly believed in the things that he was working for. The Hill Section would not

be the same without Ozzie Quinn and his legacy will live on. He has done an amazing job not only with the Hill community -- Hill Neighborhood Association advocating here at council, he's worked with Habitat for Humanity and other organizations and he definitely deserves to be honored for all of that great work.

With my colleagues' agreement, could we send a letter to the mayor asking that some of the green space in the Hill section Mr. Quinn worked so hard for can be named after him. I'm not sure what the process would be, but I think a plaque or some small monument would definitely be in order for all of the great work that he has done for that neighborhood, so if everybody is in agreement if we could send that letter to the mayor's office to hopefully get the ball rolling on that.

Onto a number of items, just a couple that I'm going to bring up, over the recess I was able to attend a number of community events but one that I do want to mention, my colleagues and I we were

fortunate enough to walk in the first annual Bob McGoff memorial race and I just have to say what a great job done by the organizers, especially Bob Gattens and the entire Connors' Park group. It was a well run fundraiser and I know it meant a lot to Mr. McGoff's family and everybody in the community. I'm sure they raised a lot of money for Coaches for Cancer. They did a great job.

Onto a agenda item, there is legislation regarding taking funding from the bridge repair and putting it into paving. Again, this happens almost every year, there is a timeliness issue with our federal dollars that need to be spent. did meet with Linda Aebli and Tom Preambo to discuss this and many other items in OECD throughout the recess, but the good news regarding this transfer of funds is that the bridge project is now going to be funded 95 percent by the state, instead of fully by the city so that is a bit of good news and that did open up additional funding for more paving in the city. They haven't decided

for sure what areas have been paved -- will be paved with these funds, but they are looking at areas in the Pennsbrook development in South Scranton because of the maps changing you can only use them in certain areas, but this is definitely a plus to the city especially when we get some of that state money to come back home for a bridge project and use our funding elsewhere for paving that desperately needs to be done throughout the city.

Next, obviously over the last month there has been -- we've had some torrential rainstorms, and I knows it's been an issue in all parts of the city. Last week I met with residents on West Mountain and Keyser Valley. They are having significant problems, and they are not new problems but they have gotten worse year after year. From what I have been told, the rain water problem actually originates -- on West Mountain actually originates in Newton Ransom. There has been a lot of new development, new houses being built and that water has to go somewhere. Unfortunately,

it's going down West Mountain though West
Mountain Road, and it's causing a lot of
issues with pavement and further down onto
Keyser Avenue and then into the Keyser
Valley area.

So we did receive, and there are a number of entities that are going to be trying to get this repaired, so we did receive two correspondence, one from the gentleman I met with who also spoke to Senator Blake's office regarding some grant funding and possibly partnering with Ransom, some kind of retention pond at the top of the mountain to prevent that water from coming down or filling in the exposed culverts coming down West Mountain Road, so I have that.

And we also received correspondence and pictures from a resident on north

Merrifield Avenue where the water is ending.

It's starting up in Ransom, going all of the way down West Mountain Road, Keyser Avenue, going onto the other side to Keyser Valley in west side. So if we can send both of these correspondences to Senator Blake's

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office with a formal request for funding for some sort of a solution up there, not only for the city but for Ransom as well to try and tackle this problem. I also was in contact with PennDOT. Residents in that area, and I certainly believe this, they have lived there for decades, are telling me since the Keyser Avenue project has been completed the flooding in their neighborhoods have been much worse. in the past there would be some water issues, but since the Keyser Avenue project has been completed it's been much worse, so I did reach out to representatives at PennDOT and the possibility of a community meeting maybe at the Keyser Valley Community Center with many entities involved is definitely on the horizon. So these are two big issues on West Mountain and into lower Keyser Valley that certainly need to be addressed.

And as Councilman Perry mentioned,

I, too, will be enjoying La Festa Italiana

or as those of us in west side call it "The

Italian Festival", but one of my favorite is

cannolis, unfortunately. As we all know we eat too many of them, but a Unico pork sandwich and a porketta to take home will certainly hit the spot this weekend so I hope to see everyone down a the festival and that is all. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.
Mr. Evans.

MR. EVANS: I think we all call it the Italian festival, not just you westsiders. On the one-strike law in Wilkes-Barre, the current legislation has similar language, it has been stricken completely out of the new version that city council is working on.

As far as Ozzie Quinn is concerned, we lost a great one. We lost Ozzie this week. In many ways, Ozzie was bigger than life. Maybe like most Scrantonians he was a little rough around the edges and maybe a bit outspoken but he was the very definition of what a Scrantonian is with a heart as big as they come. There was never a more dedicated servant of the people, of the city and of his neighborhood as Ozzie Quinn. I

have known Ozzie for probably 35 to 40 years. I wish to offer my deepest condolences to his family. He was a good, good man.

Over last weekend, as was mentioned earlier, that we attended the Bob McGoff race. I would like to congratulate all those volunteers and the people that participated. It was a great event by every imaginable measure it was a success and Bob would have been very proud of the event and we hope that it carries on for years and years to come and decades to come with his name on it been done proud in that way.

This city council also announced in the race that beginning in 2017 we will create what will be known as the city council cup to further honor our friend Bob McGoff. This will be a series of three races, two races will be part of the Run Around Scranton series, and the final leg each year will be the Bob McGoff race. The fastest male and female runner over the three race series will receive a city council cup as the fastest distance runners

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in Scranton as well a substantial amount of money as prize money. Our goal is to make Bob's memorial race a premier 5-K race in the northeast and to continue to honor his memory.

On another note, the sewer deal. there is no Plan B as far as I know, Joan, I wish there was a Plan B, but there is not, but as someone who has worked for a large utility for 30 years and has been through numerous PUC requests for rate increases I found the recent comments by the administrative law judges on the sewer deal to be both predictable and in my view somewhat expected. However, I disagree with their interpretation and their list of Act 11, and the ability for utilities to spread costs across a larger customer rate base. think they were way off base with those comments.

It should be noted that I have been saying from the beginning that this is something that should be expected, and then when the PUC meets we can expect similar comments and requests for more information,

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but I was surprised it seemed the administration and the Sewer Authority and, Pennsylvania America Water and numerous consultants working on this deal seemed to be caught flat footed and surprised by this opinion and unable, in my opinion, to formulate a proper response to the media.

Another issue that was brought up was the storm water management and the lack of a plan. Again, this should have been no Members of this council have been surprise. requesting this information and I forewarned that the PUC will want to see a plan for storm water management. I don't think anyone should expect a comprehensive study and plan in time for a closing, but ratepayers and taxpayers deserve to know on day one after this deal is closed what is the basic plan for storm water in the City of Scranton. Will Pennsylvania American be responsible? If so, for how long and what will their duties be? Will be the DPW be responsible? If so, at what level? Storm Water Authority be enacted? If so, These are simple questions that when?

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should have been answered months ago and I would expect will now have to be answered in front of the PUC. I would hope that all involved are working diligently on this issue as well as anticipating other issues so when the PUC asks the hard questions they are not again caught flat footed and surprised.

Also, I want to make a brief comment on the use of the proceeds of the sale. has been constantly reported in the media that an estimated \$65 million of the proceeds will be put into the distressed pension plans. For the record, that is something that I have not agreed to or will not agree to without significant pension reforms and assurances that is what makes the most sense financially in the city. That's all I have for now.

> MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you. First, I would like to send my condolences out to the family of Ozzie Quinn, very sad to read and hear about his death. He was a

dedicated neighborhood leader, an activist and he was a friend so he will definitely be missed at these meetings and throughout the City of Scranton.

I would like to ask for an update on the Young property on Wyoming Avenue. This has been dragging on now for months and I'm not exactly sure why since we have deemed it an emergency. My recommendation has been and continues to be for the Law Department to simply schedule a meeting with the Youngs and get this whole thing worked out before somebody seriously gets injured. This is an major public safety issue for everybody in that neighborhood and in speaking to the Youngs in the past few days the hole continues to get bigger.

Also, received a complaint about two vacant overgrown lots on East Locust Street in South Side. An elderly neighbor is worried about animals and tree that looks like it's going to fall onto her house so we had sent something out to try and take care of that issue. Also, there are major potholes nature One Cross Drive on East

Mountain if we could send something to the DEP regarding that issue.

Also, I was really disturbed over the recess with the way our Licensing, Inspections and Permits Department is currently being run. Director Hinton had sent an e-mail to all of us regarding putting the contractor's ordinance, which had previously been defeated, back onto our agenda, apparently there have been changes that have been made. Within the e-mail, Mr. Hinton stated that since he has been director he has had to deny over 250 applications for a contractor's license in the City of Scranton.

In reply, I simply asked for the names of the companies or persons who applied for a license and the reasons they were denied and was told by Director Hinton that they don't keep those records in the office. They give the denied application back to the applicant. The only records that they keep, according to Mr. Hinton, are when a person challenges the denial.

Something is seriously wrong with

this whole picture, and if that's the case I'm afraid to see what kind of other records are being kept or not kept in that department and I, quite frankly, was embarrassed to get a reply from Director Hinton questioning my request. All I did was ask for information so something doesn't past the smell test in that regard.

I have requested and hopefully will receive an answer for all denials that have been challenged since January 1st of 2014, and I also would like to know why we have not hired an electrical inspector and a plumbing inspector for months now. That seems to be an issue.

Also, I sent a request in the middle of July for an update on the third party administrator with regard to new disability language for the police and fire pensions.

Again, my request was not answered and I'm surprised.

I did ask for a meeting on another note with residents of the 400 block of Fellows Street and members of the Scranton Sewer Authority regarding the catastrophic

flooding that occurred over the period of
the last few weeks with some of those major
storms. The residents are concerned and
they have numerous questions so we did send
a letter and we are waiting for a meeting to
be set up.

I would also like an update on the Rockwell Avenue bridge project and when exactly that will be completed. I am hearing conflicting reports on the completion date. I thought it was December, now I'm hearing it may be later, so I would like clarification on that before next Thursday.

Also, some good news, the city is partnering with the University of Scranton and a student who is completing his senior project to develop a City of Scranton mobile app prototype or proof of concept. This mobile application will be given overview of city services, downtown businesses, things to do within downtown Scranton, and it is a collaboration between the City, Scranton Tomorrow and the University of Scranton so that was exciting news and I was glad to be

involved in that meeting.

Apparently, the Board of Directors of Community Development Partners Scranton, CDPS, a nonprofit corporation for the Parking Authority, held a meeting August 30. This meeting was not open to the public as was reported in the paper. Any future meetings, and we discussed this in the caucus, I would ask Mayor Courtright who is a member of that board to demand that the meetings be open to the public. I think as a matter of transparency, all of these meetings, all of that information should be available to the people of this city.

I'd also like to request an update on the City's lighting project. We talked about this before the recess, but I feel we also need an update on the pave cut program in the city, and I would like to know if the legislation that we passed months ago to protect our infrastructure and hold the utilities companies accountable is being implemented and I would like know if it is working. I'm also getting conflicting reports on that.

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As it relates to the storm water, I continue to be extremely concerned about the mayor's lack of a plan for storm water management in the city. I find it almost unbelievable that Mayor Courtright would consider selling off one of our major assets, the Scranton Sewer Authority, without first having a clear and concise plan to manage our storm water infrastructure. It's not like this is some big surprise that just fell into his lap. The mayor and his administration have been aware of the pending storm water infrastructure mandates from the EPA for quite a few years thousand. I am not sure why the mayor thinks the wait and see approach is a good idea, usually that never works out. And as Councilman Evans said, there is no Plan B, I also don't believe that they have a Plan B which is really scary.

I have suggested on multiple occasions to the mayor to form a shared services committee. This was a recommendation in the recovery plan and

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required the mayor to bring all of the stakeholders together from outlying cities and boroughs who are also faced with all of these various issues and see how we can work together and share the burden.

Unfortunately, the mayor never answers. As usual, he can't be reached for comment.

The city has supposedly been approved for a grant for a storm water management plan feasibility analysis. question is when will this analysis take place and how long is this going to take? In talking to the business administrator, after this initial study takes place an another comprehensive analysis has to be What is the mayor's plan to undertaken. maintain the storm water infrastructure on day one if the Scranton Sewer Authority is sold which now, as we know, is also in question? Again, unfortunately, he can't be reached for comment. This has, quite frankly, become a disturbing trend in Bill Courtright's almost three years as mayor of this city. He refuses to answer the difficult questions, he refuses to take a

stance on the important issues such as the landfill, and he won't make a move or speak a word without the approval of a team of lawyers. We didn't elect the attorneys, we didn't elect the business administrator, we elected Bill Courtright to lead and so far in my opinion he has failed. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

Gaughan. I'll be the last to echo the compliments and condolences for Ozzie Quinn and his family. I know Ozzie Quinn going back to the mid-90's and was fortunate to work with him on several different projects.

As was stated earlier, he was dedicated to the City of Scranton, he was dedicated to his neighborhood and was dedicated to his family and he will be sorely missed.

One announcement moving forward is that Monday is Labor Day so city hall will be closed. DPW will also be off that day and refuge and recycling collections will be delayed by one day next week.

In regards to some of the other issues that were brought up this evening, over the break I did request information

from Mr. Barrett at the Sewer Authority concerning the storm event that happened at the end of July. This letter will be available, I just brought it in tonight, but two of the main questions that I asked Mr. Barrett was if the line had been used during that storm period, and also if it was used if the flow was metered and in his response Mr. Barrett says, "The alternate line for pretreated waste water being discharged from the Keystone Sanitary Landfill treatment was not used during the week of July 25, 2016 through July 31, 2016."

He also further said, "Again, the alternate line was not used. The line used exits the KSL chute and land property listed a mile or so interfaces with the combined sanitary sewer, the sewer line near the top of Drinker Street and the Authorities manhole No. 57. At this point, the pretreated waste water comes in contact with untreated sanitary waste flowing to our waste water treatment plant in South Scranton and Minooka border."

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So we did ask if water from the landfill came through the system that night, Mr. Barrett said no.

I did have a meeting with Mr. Barrett to discuss this matter, also, to discuss as was speaking here about the storm water management system for the city. It's my understanding from speaking to him that the day the Sewer Authority is sold the next day the City of Scranton is responsible for the storm water management of the city. The Sewer Authority will take over -- or the new owners of the sewer authority will take over any of the combined sewer lines, so anything that -- the older lines in the city, the Sewer Authority will take over those, so in my opinion we have to be ready with a Storm Water Management Authority the day the sale is complete and we have to work out the details of that.

Our DPW workers have an interest and contractual requirement to do that work of storm water management so somewhere along the line we are going to have figure out how we can create a storm water authority and

also work in the current obligations the city has towards its workers.

From talking to Mr. Barrett, we are way behind on getting this going. If the plan is to have a Sewer Authority sale completed by the end of the October, closing probably sometime in the beginning of next year, we have to have all of this in place rather quickly. So, as was discussed here by my colleagues, we really have to get moving along with how we can handle this problem.

Also, as I spoke to Mr. Barrett, it's apparently clear regardless of whether the Sewer Authority transaction takes place or doesn't the storm water issue still has to be controlled. The city has been found in violation of EPA requirements on storm water that went into the Chesapeake Bay area so regardless of what happens with the Sewer Authority we are going to have to come up with a plan sometime next year.

I also, as was spoken about, I did attend the Sewer Authority meeting last
Thursday night just to get a feel for the

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problem with the easements. The way we understand it is there is 1,600 easements that are in required where the storm water lines are under city properties and in the course of the 40 to 50 year history of the city, the Sewer Authority only has about 1,000 of those easements in place. other 600 have to be completed before the transaction. Once again, regardless of whether the Sewer Authority sale takes place or not, I think it's imperative that we get this problem straightened out. easements where people who have sewer lines under their property it's a major concern, number one, people don't want their properties damaged. Number two, people want the Sewer Authority to come out on a property if there is a problem with the sewer line. So, once again, regardless of whether or not the Sewer Authority still happens or not this is something that has to be taken care of.

I also today I contacted Mr. Barrett to see if there is any plans for the meetings for people who received easements

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letters and currently they don't because they didn't have a mechanism to do it. had suggested to them that the meeting really should be somewhere -- held somewhere where they can break it down into neighborhoods where maps could be visible. This problem is throughout the whole city. Easements are required in West Scranton, South Scranton, Greenridge, East Mountain, everywhere so this is a major, major thing that has to be corrected, and at the meeting Mr. Walker and Mr. Barrett did agree that the mailing of these letters was not handled properly and they could have did a better job, and I agree with them, so they are trying to rectify that situation and see where we are with it. I have been talking with Mr. Barrett to try and move that along.

Also, there is no Plan B for the Sewer Authority. The reason why there is no Plan B is because the sale of the Sewer Authority was part of our approved recovery plan. There should be an alternative method and we don't want to think about what the alternative method is but we do have to

realize that right now the sale of the Sewer Authority is a major lynch pin of the recovery plan, and as it is we have to deal with that right now and we will be evaluated by PEL in the next few months to see if we are on track with our recovery plan and they will make the determination where we are at and if we are moving along fast enough to avoid receivership and they will have to do that evaluation to see where that gets us.

Just a couple of other things while we are off, I did have -- Monday morning I came down to go to work and there was a tree across East Mountain Road and the DPW responded very quickly and I called them at quarter after six and it was cleaned up by 7:30, I believe, so I'd like to thank them for getting that done.

Also, as the summer goes along we have had several complaints about overgrown bushes coming out onto the streets, one is on Oswald Avenue and there also was a situation up on Wintermantle Avenue where the trees were overgrown and actually scratching cars so we will be working on

MR. GAUGHAN: On the question, I just have a couple of questions and I got some of them answered from Ms. Aebli and one of my -- I understand the transfer of \$200,000 for the unallocated funding or the West Lackawanna Avenue bridge project because of the timing issue, however, I'm concerned about the other move with \$200,000 from apparently different program income from economic development loan repayments. It's an extra \$200,000 that they are now putting into the paving totaling \$400,000. I would like to find out exactly where this \$200,000 came from, specifically, which accounts if that's possible; and secondly, I'm not, you know, sold on the idea that we should spend \$200,000 on paving and not put that \$200,000 back in economic development loans or something like that.

This office, I think, has become the office of paving. I'm not seeing a lot of economic development coming out of OECD which I think is why the office exists so

think we need to look at the way that they are spending money down there. I understand there is a need to update our infrastructure and we do have roads that are in bad shape and need to be paved, but we also have small businesses that need help with loans and grants and things of that nature, so I would just question spending that \$200,000 and reallocating that funding. Thank you.

MR. EVANS: While I would agree with that, I would to also ask is this upper bridge or the lower Lackawanna Avenue bridge? Is it the one -- there is two Lackawanna Avenue bridges?

MR. ROGAN: It's the portion by I think Kost Tires and Old Good Things. This is the older --

MR. EVANS: The old one, okay. The reason I ask it looks like we are resurfacing or doing roads, but also we have handicap curb cuts and if anybody has tried to walk on the sidewalks of that bridge they are absolutely horrendous and to put curb cuts without repairing the sidewalks, handicap curb cuts, nonetheless, is

absolutely ridiculous so I would like to 1 find out their plan for repairing the 2 3 concrete sidewalks on the bridge itself because what I have seen, I know the money 4 5 for the curb cuts were federal funded but what I'm seeing is handicap curb cuts that 6 7 are leading into sidewalks that you wouldn't 8 push, you know, a wheelchair on if you 9 wanted to or anything else like that. MR. ROGAN: These funds couldn't be 10 11 used for anything associated with a bridge 12 project. That's going to be down 13 exclusively from PennDOT. 14 MR. EVANS: I was mentioning that because of the handicapped curb cuts --15 16 MR. ROGAN: Right, that's where the 17 money is going from the bridge project. 18 MR. EVANS: Right. 19 MR. MR. ROGAN: We will still have our share but from, you know. PennDOT, unfortunately, works at their own pace, but it sounds like the entire bridge is going to be replaced or say reconstruction because there are some issues with that bridge.

MR. EVANS: So we are not doing curb cuts at that location?

MR. ROGAN: We are not doing curb cuts at the bridge.

MR. EVANS: Okay, citywide curb cuts, again, I'd like to look at the next known location that we are doing curb cuts because I think that -- I saw one down on Cedar Avenue where we had a curb cut on the left side of the road and then the right of the side road everything in-between there was no sidewalk. It's bizarre.

MR. GAUGHAN: Well, apparently this from the e-mail I received from Ms. Aebli this funding, this \$400,000 is probably going to be used to pave up in the Pennswood development.

MR. EVANS: Well, which it

definitely needs it, I'm not going to deny that, the roads up there are terrible, but I would like to look into when they are doing handicapped curb cuts and make sure that if there is a money available so the sidewalks adjacent to the curb cuts will be taken care of.

MR. PERRY: Yeah, that's a good point because I saw them starting now in other states and now we are getting onto our area and you have these nice beautiful curb cuts that, like you said, it leads to a sidewalk that's you couldn't walk across it safely let alone use a wheelchair on it.

MR. ROGAN: And, unfortunately, using federal dollars you have to put in the handicap pave cuts.

MR. EVANS: Well, I understand that but what we should do is try to see if there is an account available when these situations happen that we have have paving and curb cut and also replacing the --

MR. PERRY: Finish the job.

MR. EVANS: -- adjacent sidewalks to that, it makes sense because to put a

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handicap curb cut in and then have dirt or sidewalks that are lifting it doesn't make any sense.

And as far as allocating money from the program funding to paving, I don't think there is a single person in this city who would disagree that we need paving and this year has probably been the most paving that-- at least in my lifetime that we have ever seen on the City of Scranton and it's

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not enough. You know, every day each one of us still receive calls about different areas that need be paved and, unfortunately, the federal funds could only be used in certain areas and, you know, we try to backfill the other areas with city dollars and some other ideas that the business administrator and the mayor come up with, so I fully support this change and, you know, the community portion of the Office of Economic and Community Development can't be overlooked either and clean roads, safe roads, paved roads are certainly an essential part of building a good community and I think this year we have come a long way but there is still much more work to do as far as paving in the city and bridges as well. We haven't even gotten started on those.
