MR. WECHSLER: Are there any comments? If not, received and filed. Do any council members have announcements at this time?

MR. EVANS: I have one. I just like to make another announcement that as a reminder the second payment is now due for the refuse bills. It is payable by September 30 to avoid penalty and also remind everybody beginning next year in 2017 if the entire bill is paid by the end of May 2017 it will be a 10 percent discount.

MR. GAUGHAN: And I have one,
Lackawanna County Commissioners Pat O'Malley
and Jerry Notarianni and Laureen Cummings
and the County's Office of Environmental
Sustainability and the Pennsylvania DEP will
provide Lackawanna County residents with an
opportunity to recycle used tires at the
Lackawanna County Recycling Center located
at 3400 Boulevard Avenue in Scranton. For
our county this will be Wednesday, October
12 through Saturday, October 15, from 8 to 3
p.m. on Wednesday, and on Sunday from 8 a.m.

1 to 11 a.m., so if anybody has any tires they 2 would like to recycle that's the time to do 3 it thanks. 4 MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else? MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. 5 CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION. 6 7 MR. WECHSLER: Andrew, I'm sorry, I 8 can't read the last signature. Oh, Andy 9 Sbaraglia. MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, 10 citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonian. 11 12 Was there a fee attached to the recycling of 13 the tires? 14 MR. GAUGHAN: Let me check. Yes. \$2 per tire for tires 13 by 16 and \$3 per tire 15 16 for 17 by 20. 17 MR. SBARAGLIA: Yeah, that was 18 important. 19 MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah, sorry, I missed 20 Not as sharp as you, Andy. that. 21 MR. SBARAGLIA: Kind of forget that. 22 Let's talk a little about 7-C that has to do 23 with the lighting contract and the borrowing 24 for the lighting contract. No one really 25 can dispute that the waive of the future

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isn't LEDs. That isn't the problem with it, it's the payback time. We are a distressed city and we got to wait 10 to 12 years before we break even with this deal. like -- plus, we are going to lose the liquid fuel tax that's going to be poured into pay for this project. That tax usually goes for roads. I guess you can use it for almost anything because you are getting away with it for lighting, but we just did the LEDs, we really didn't need to get into this In the future maybe, but not now. The payback is too long. I'll be dead long before you even break even with them lights, and a lot of people in this city will also join me, but that's the way it goes. they did it, I don't know, but you didn't even vote unanimous when you voted on it, you had some disagreement amongst you.

Now, let's talk about the parking because that's awful, awful important. I have the 2012 budget, which you know has to be balanced as law requires all budgets to be balanced, and it gives the list of how much money we gave to this company from our

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treasury not counting everything else that was given to them, just from our treasury. It measured parking tickets, we used to get around 700,000 for it, that was yellow. White was about 35,000. Permits was another 25,000. Meters 1,400,000 plus parking spaces that used -- different people that had lots 50,000, came to somewhere like \$2,210,500 back when this was printed. there has been raises in the fees, but let's look at basically the whole system. went and paid off the bank that the Parking Authority loaned out so they couldn't actually put a lien against this deal that came later. You didn't pay off this loan for the greatness of the city but to clear your path for the garage, whatever you want to call it, I call it a giveaway. didn't put up a penny of his money so we in turn give him a lease that he was able to borrow on, so really in a sense we gave the man the \$28 million that he got from our good nature people here and then when we went out and borrowed more money to makeup the difference would take all the stranded

deal.

debt, what I all idiocrasy. If yous people were here, well, maybe Mr. Rogan was the only one that remembered, when they came before council and wanted the same deal that you gave this private individual, the Parking Authority wanted and it was rejected, okay?

MR. ROGAN: The Parking Authority wanted to buy the meters.

MR. SBARAGLIA: What difference?

MR. ROGAN: A completely different

MR. SBARAGLIA: So what did you do? You leased the meters. It's the same damn thing. We ain't going to get a penny from them no matter what owns hem and then you turned around and sold a garage for a \$1 that was worth a heck a lot more than a dollar and then you went out and leased more parking spaces in the mall, which couldn't fill -- in all of the garages you couldn't fill them anyway but you needed more, bend other backwards and then now you want to angle parking so they get more meters in and maybe this -- if you ever went down to Penn

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Avenue it's not fun parking there, really.

I don't blame Delta Medix for moving out
because that's the worst place to park.

Okay, five minutes enough.

MR. WECHSLER: Les Spindler.

MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, Council, Les Spindler, city resident and homeowner and taxpayer. Two weeks ago when I was here talking about the terrible job that the utilities are doing on the streets I neglected to talk about PennDOT not hiring competent contractors to pave our city streets. Last year Main avenue was paved and there are manhole covers and shutoffs, each below the street surface. They are as bad as hitting potholes. It's terrible. There is one on the corner of Jackson Street and North Main. I hit that awhile back, I thought my car was going to fall apart. It's ridiculous. There is a couple in front of Rite Aid on Main Avenue, also. They are all over, all over Main Avenue.

MR. ROGAN: That's the worst one.

It's right by my house.

MR. SPINDLER: The one on Jackson

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Street is terrible. It's got to be three or four inches below the surface. Totally incompetent. These things got to be fixed. It's worse than hitting a pothole.

Okay, on a good note, I was glad to see that Delta Medix is moving into what used to be the mall, the old Bon-Ton store. I think that's -- in one way it's a good thing and another way I'd like Mr. Basalyga to look and I wish he would start concentrating on getting some retail stores in that mall. We are getting people in the mall but there is nothing for them to do in If there were retail stores to shop in then we would get more business in the I mean, you got the gym, you got kids city. in the college, there is no where for them to shop in the mall. No where for young kids to shop in this city. Everything moved out of the city. I think he should concentrate on getting some retail stores in I think it would be a lot better. there.

He's behind schedule, also. The marketplace was supposed to be open by summer and not even close to being open.

The theatre was supposed to open, that's not ready yet either so I do like what he is doing but I hope he gets some retail stores in there.

And lastly, Councilman Evans mentioned the illegal garbage tax, which I've talked about for years, we shouldn't have to pay anything next year. I talked about this before, it was put in for the tipping fees to be paid off, they would be paid up at the end of this year, we shouldn't have to pay that illegal tax any more. It's ridiculous. I thought you people were going to try to do something about it but it seems like you are just like all of the last councils.

MR. EVANS: There is a study --

MR. SPINDLER: We are going to have keep paying and paying and paying.

MR. EVANS: There is a study in process to find out what the true costs then we'll make a determination after that.

MR. SPINDLER: We shouldn't have to pay it. It was put in to pay off the tipping fees. We won't have to pay any

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tipping fees anymore so why do we have to pay it? We pay our taxes for that, to have our garbage collected. It's illegal. I mentioned that until I'm blue in the face but nobody listens. It's illegal. We shouldn't have to pay it. That's why we pay taxes. That's all I have tonight. Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: Just one comment on the PennDOT issues, I did speak with PennDOT regarding the numerous issues at that intersection on Main Avenue, in particular, the lack of the traffic device, a red light or any signal coming out of Brunetti's, well, coming out of Family Dollar, the old Brunetti's. Again, this week traveling to city hall I saw another person pulling out onto Main Avenue where there is no light so I did speak with the safety officer regarding that and the condition of Main Avenue, and also the press officer trying to see some dates as far as scheduling a caucus regarding the flooding in the Keyser Valley area.

MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
Scranton resident and taxpayer. The City's
annual independent audit is now 115 days
late. However, I noted in the August
controller's report that the auditors, SB &
Company were paid \$21,000 in the month of
August which would suggest to me that the
audit is completed, can you give me a status
on the audit?

MR. WECHSLER: It is not completed yet but it is getting put together to be done in time for the budget.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. I also noted in the August controller's report that Rainey & Rainey got another \$3,000. Let's hope that this will be the last year that their services will be required.

What I haven't seen, also, is the Auditor General's aggregate audit of the pension funds, has anyone else seen the report come out?

MR. WECHSLER: No, we were told we were going to get it within two weeks and I think today is the second week.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Because I have been

checking online and it's not posted.

MR. WECHSLER: They've assured us that it will be available when it comes out.

MS. HODOWANITZ: It's supposed to go on their website. Once it's posted it's a public document. I know that you don't have the entire list of all of the 108 loans that are due to the city, I do hope that there is a number high enough to encompass that total, I fear that is going to be a very high number. Any idea, Mr. Rogan, when that might be coming out to --

MR. ROGAN: Well, I did request OECD the report on all loans within the city, but 108 is a separate program, the only delinquent 108 we are currently paying is the Boscov loan. The other programs, the other loans that many of them are delinquent were through other programs so they don't come out of our programming account, but they don't come out of our block, but it is program income we lose so we can't loan it out for other projects.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. I have heard that the mayor was working on his state of

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the city address, does anybody have a projected date on when he might present that?

MR. WECHSLER: They are waiting to get, as best they can, final review on the Sewer Authority sale.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. And I compliment you, Mr. Wechsler, again, you came to the Sewer Authority's meeting last night, the briefing on the easements for the general public. I was not positively impressed by Attorney Paul Walker's, shall we say his attitude and remarks to the general public. I personally have nothing to did with the easements, it's not effecting me as a homeowner, but I can understand the anxiety that many of those people in the audience were feeling and I thought they had a very valid suggestion that the Sewer Authority should rewrite the letter, include the attachments which were not present in the first mailing, send them back to the 600 owners with a reasonable time window for them to sign off on the easement.

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You know, to get a letter like that where attachments were missing, number one, where it was written in a legal ease which would almost require them to hire a lawyer to explain it to them, which might cost more than the \$100 he was offering, I thought it was very arrogant of him the way it was presented. I understand that they are trying to complete this sale of the Sewer Authority and they're obligated to Pennsylvania American Water to get this done, but I wasn't impressed by that and I think he did not serve the taxpayers well which underlines the whole problem with people appointed to authorities, they do not answer to the taxpayers. They are appointed by either a mayor or county commissioner and once appointed they are independent and it's almost like a fire and forget cruise God forbid they hit the wrong missile. target. And keep in mind, too, that these authorities and boards and commissions often have their hands on very big budgets. now Colts has still got to pay \$6 million back to PennDOT for the ridership numbers

which were inflated over the years, look at what happened with the pensions and the double pensions. This is another example of authorities existing who do not answer to the voters and to the public and that's why I was very happy to see you there that, at least you were representing City Council and the City of Scranton. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Lenny Serebo.

MR. SEREBO: Lenny Serebo, Scranton homeowner. Mr. Rogan, I didn't quit catch what you were saying about the flooding problem in the Keyser Valley there that's why I'm here?

MR. ROGAN: As I mentioned, I think it was about two weeks ago, we would like to have a large meeting with many stakeholders to try and address that issue. Mr. Spindler brought up issues with PennDOT and I did mention I was in contact with PennDOT regarding issues that he brought up as well as the flooding issue as many residents seem to think it's gotten a lot worse since the Keyser Avenue project has been completed.

MR. SEREBO: Can give yous pictures

1 of the flooding? MR. ROGAN: Sure. 2 3 MR. SEREBRO: Just a few pictures. You guys can keep the papers, but that's 4 5 just from the last storm we had overnight. That's what I woke up in the morning to. 6 7 That's what I constantly wake up to. 8 is no drainage there, or very minimal, and 9 that's why it just comes down the streets 10 and floods people's yards. 11 Now, that's right, last time I was 12 here they talked about having a meeting at 13 the Keyser Valley Community Center so when 14 is the meeting? MR. ROGAN: 15 That's what my 16 conversation with PennDOT was about. 17 MR. SBARAGLIA: That's what we keep 18 hearing all the time but there is never any dates. 19 There will be a date, I 20 MR. ROGAN: 21 promise you that. 22 MR. SEREBRO: How about that 23 drainage pipe is in those pictures there 24 that's just blocked. Last time when I was 25 here you suggested that, okay, let's get it

flushed and that may not solve the problem, but I'm sure it's going to alleviate it so that's what I'm wondering, too, about you know what a couple of blocks up, a couple of blocks that way they are flushing but they won't do that one and I have had it -- I have spoken -- I have left numerous messages with the mayor's office, the state representative Marty Flynn I spoke to him personally and PennDOT, too, I spoke to a representative from PennDOT which looked into the problem and said there is nothing that PennDOT can do, that was the reply and I have the guy's name at the house but I don't have it with me.

I have had DPW there, the supervisors and all of that, Scranton Sewer Authority supervisors, they all come and they look at it and they say, yeah, if we can flush it, but nothing ever gets done. I'm telling you a couple of blocks down the street they are flushing and they are there like a couple of times a week it's a common thing. I even asked them how come you are here all of the time, what's been -- what

are you doing and he told me it's roots that grow, but I don't understand why they can't come over a couple more blocks and take care of that drain age pipe. I know that would alleviate some of the problem, but I'm telling you, you know, like my cellar in my house that I have a classic car in my garage that you know what I can live with the flooding in the garage, but now this year it comes in the house and my cellar and literally gushes from the walls and it shoots out a foot or two, next thing I'm worried about my fuse boxes and a couple of feet down from it, what do I do if sparks start flying? All you could do is run.

But it's always passing the buck,
like, you know, we got to look into it, we
got to contact this person, we got to
contact that person. You can see the road
lifted about a month ago there, I watched
the street sweeper come down to Merrifield
and Lafayette and turn, you know, but there
is right at the intersection right there and
that's an old picture already after we had
those floods that came every couple of days,

you know. Nowadays the cars keep driving over it it's much worse than in the picture there.

So pretty much just maybe to get something happening I'm wondering about flushing that drain?

MR. ROGAN: We did send correspondence to the Sewer Authority requesting that they look into flushing that out as a tentative thing. It's only a temporary solution. We did request that.

MR. SEREBRO: That's right.

MR. ROGAN: I think it was two weeks ago when you were here previously, I don't believe we received a correspondence back from them.

MR. SEREBRO: Well, see, that's what always happens, all of the neighbors up there can tell you the same thing they have been through it, they are doing what I'm doing, you know, like contacting everybody and we are looking into it. Council, please, help us.

MR. PERRY: We are going to put a call and do a follow up on that initial

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letter you sent and I don't know if you plan on hanging out for the entire meeting, if you wanted to afterwards we can talk and exchange numbers and I'll give you the information as soon as I get it.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Serebro, I would like to tell you one thing, we had a problem when the Keyser Avenue project was being done with some routing and traffic and city council was able to get PennDOT here to discuss the issue, took commentary from the neighbors and we were successful in getting changes made to their plan. They were very reluctant to do it while they were here, but through the actions of council we were able to give some pressure to it so we just started on this a few weeks ago and we do have some track record of success in getting some results when other people haven't. can't promise you that here, but we are kind of like dogs with a bone and we do have a track record of having some success so we are going to work on that.

MR. SEREBRO: Thank you.

MR. ROGAN: You are right that you

said that each agency keeps passing the buck. Many times we contact DPW and they send us to the Sewer Authority and they send us to the state, they send us back, that's why we all need to be in one room, all of the agencies to talk together instead of sending letters back and forth.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, I figured I'd save you some time. Call 1-202-224-3121, call of your congressmen and all your senators and tell them to can their trade packs. And 1-202-456-1111 and call the president and tell him to can it, too. You are tired of all of these problems and broke cities and broke social security and broke everything.

Once again, the tax office please separate the city bill from the school bill. It would be nice to know what you are paying.

And, once again, last week I mentioned about ITT going belly up and one of the things that I noticed about these community colleges and it ties in with this trade packs business, they are training

ungodly amounts of people all for the same thing. They have three or four courses, major courses and, I mean, how many of this or that do you need and they don't even tell people, I knew somebody that had a morbid obesity problem and they went through criminal justice and how did you do that? You know, solve the obesity problem first and, I mean, it was a problem. Not knocking the person.

But something does have to get done with this flooding. It's just ashame. And last week you give a good speech on that,
Joe, and stay on them. Stay on them because they just don't seem to be interested. And another thought popped into my behind when I was down there with all of these easements,
Joe, why can't the Sewer authority commit to as long as we have to separate the sewer systems flood and sewer hit to the getting these relocated off of people's properties and under the streets where they belong because I wouldn't be happy if I found out that, you know, I had a bootleg line under my house so I'm stuck with that.

It's just, you know, every year I'm scratching my head whether I should buy subsidence insurance and that's money out of my pocket every year so JP Morgan made a lot of money, he is gone. Can't even complain to him.

And I do feel that certain oversights, housing should be opened up and it's banned from being turned to rental property due to an ordinance on a rental property that's empty for a year, I understand it turns back to a single dwelling and if somebody's place is too large it might be an answer for some of our elderly people, they can put a bathroom in the kitchen upstairs in an eight-room house and their family's moved out, their spouse passed away and rent for half the price and actually have a good situation for themselves.

And, you know, I read letters to the editor in the Scranton Times and it's mostly outlying area people they seem to omit the fact that we are 35 percent tax exempt and their towns aren't and it really is very

frustrating, I mean, I have to start writing my own letters to the editor and remind some of these people just how much we are out from Scranton tax property taxes.

And last week Pat mentioned about how much we are out over the mall, we are also out over certain hotels in town and all of these people that were supposed to come here with big deep pockets and just throw money around and that's what the average Joe is told and it didn't happen. They wound up going bankrupt, costing us money time and time again. I'd love to know how much money went down with some of these developers and it's never going to be repaid but there is other places other than the mall is the point. And thank you and have a good night.

Marie Schumacher. Tonight I'd like to spend my time on the Scranton Sewer asset sale, or as I call it grand theft government. I still have a real problem wrapping my head around having an authority that we have been told is autonomous and then having the city resolve the sale of the assets for which we,

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening.

the ratepayers, have paid and invested for the future and use the proceeds for municipal expenses totally unrelated to collecting, treating and disposing of our sewage and storm water.

Last night I attended the Scranton

Sewer Authority meeting. I would have great
difficulty trying to find a single adjective
to describe that meeting, but I do believe
the gist of it was caught in the headline of
Mr. Lockwood's article, "Sewer Authority

Explains Why Easements Needed." That's what
it was all about, what the Scranton Sewer

Authority needs to complete the sale
expeditiously as had been promised city
council.

Now, as an aside, that tidbit about the involvement of you all as a body was quite shocking. Perhaps one of you during motions could tell us when this vote on this posture was taken --

MR. WECHSLER: Before you get too far ahead, and I'll give you your time back, we -- I say "we", I requested and I kept on Mr. Barrett to have that public meeting,

that's what Mr. Lockwood was commenting about. It was a request from council and myself to have this meeting so people could get information about the easements. It was not --

MS. SCHUMACHER: For the meeting not the expediting of the --

MR. WECHSLER: Correct.

MS. SCHUMACHER: -- okay, thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: -- to hold the meeting. I told him that this board would like to have this meeting and he was reluctant to do it and I kept the pressure on him until he finally held the meeting.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I stand corrected.

Thank you. Okay. The meeting was far, far less than a meeting to inform those effected homeowners, but rather to tell, no, demand the signing of the paperwork giving the Sewer Authority the demanded rights of ways or off to Court we go. The solicitors and the Authority demands are on the top shelf while the needs of the effected homeowners are on the bottom rung, and it's about as upside down of the normal employer/employee

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relationship as you can get and it's wrong and they have should not have been treated the way they are and while only less than 600 homeowners are effected I believe it would behoove all homeowners to read a copy of that letter. The tone was both intimidating, unclear, and incomplete in that exhibits were missing, and apparently only those who have attended meetings and found out that you can go down and make an appeal to have the inclusion of a restored to original condition put onto your deed and in your right-of-way will get that. I think that should be something that's available to all, and even there these homeowners are concerned. We have all seen, I can show you PAWC pave cut that took months and months to be fixed and it still isn't in original condition so if that's how they do our pave cuts how would you feel if those people came onto your property and did some work and, again, you are giving up the right if it goes down the middle of your property and you wanted to put something on there forget about it, it's not your property anymore or

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your could lose it afterwards.

To me, this arrogance should be the final nail in the coffin of the asset sale. Given that we are been told -- the ratepayers will see \$7,650 from this sale over time, which I believe is 30 years, or computes to \$25.50 a year are we really gaining very much? I asked that question.

Now, the 32 percent tax increase that was estimated by I believe the business administrator that would have to occur if the asset sale does not go through would provide about \$10.7 million based on this year's budget, and as certainly a world of hurt for a lot of taxpayers. However, it's a lot more much -- it's a lot more than the MMO increase due to the expiration of the state's contribution to our pension fund which I believe is somewhere between four and five million dollars, so if we went that way we could put the balance of that \$10 million if, in fact, it turned out to be \$10 million into making the pension found healthier and overtime it would become healthier, but over that time they would

take the whole 12 years. We would still own the assets of the Scranton Sewer Authority, part of our storm water problem would go away, and I think it's something perhaps worth considering. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?

MR. PERRY: Yes, I have a couple of things tonight. The first thing is just to follow up on some housekeeping from last week, a letter did go out to the National Development Council, the DNC, about cameras in their garages and as of yet we haven't heard anything back yet to see if they were going to be doing this, but again, when I find out I'll pass that on.

Also, a question was asked if we are going to be continuing the use of Rainey & Rainey in the audit department. As of right now, it appears that we want to keep them on a little longer. When I talked to the business administrator this afternoon his reasoning was it was fairly simple, just

we are you know, it was out of control.

This year with the year under our belt we are very close to having that audit come out months and months prior than the year before, but we are still not where we need to be with the audit so we need to have it in a more timely basis and if we do decide to go with this firm again that would be for the sole purpose of tightening up to get it to where we need to be. We still feel like we could do better right now with our audit getting it there so that's the course of

with this company, we are strictly going on

a year-by-year basis right now but nothing

And lastly, we had a fantastic meeting this afternoon before this with the members of OECD and the community about the CDBG funds and, you know, there is -- I'm not going to read them because Councilman

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Rogan did it yesterday, but there is dozens. There is a lot of people and a lot of worthy organizations that they really, you know, they need the funds and if they really go right to the community public safety whether it's public safety or parks, Boys and Girls Club, that sort of thing. The two line items that stick out to me that really, you know, get my blood going is the two loans to that we have to guarantee for the Steamtown The Section 108 loans which Mall Partners. we are on the hook to make good and that comes out of CDBG money the total of those two in this turnaround is \$482,000. almost a half a million dollars that we have to kick in from the Steamtown Mall Partners. Now, what that means is we have almost a half a million dollars less to give to these organizations and to these people that are looking to put the money directly back in the community. We can't do that. We can't do that this year so, you know, I want to --I want to make an appeal to the Steamtown Mall Partners right here, right now, we supported you when your time in need, and

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it's time to pay it forward. This money that you are going to pay to make sure your 108 loans are good, doesn't go to the general fund, it doesn't sit in the bank and do nothing, that money frees up a half a million dollars for us to put directly back in the community public safety, parks, Boys and Girls Club, I mean, that's where the money you taking the money from. It's from those people, that fund race until they are they can't even stand anymore just to make sure their community and their organizations continue and for us not to have that money is tough. It's tough enough, but not to have money because we have to make good on a loan that we are there, we stepped in when you needed us, and now it's time to repay that and I'm asking Steamtown Mall Partners to make good on that so we can put that money back in our community. Thank you. That's all I have.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes. Mr. Perry said it just perfectly and I think we all agree on

the city. that this money needs to be repaid back to

At this point, we'll leave it at that. A letter went out, we'll see if we get a response. If we don't receive a response within the next few weeks, we have to look into what else we can do to put pressure on Mr. Boscov have to pay these loans, unfortunately, and after talking to Attorney Hickey the city can't file suit to have this money paid, so really the only way it will be paid back is out of goodness of Mr. Boscov's heart or by significant public pressure put on him and there is a number of

ways to do that. Hopefully, you will read the letter correspondence appropriately and we'll go from there, but it will be an ongoing issue for many, many, many years as Mr. Perry mentioned.

Our CDBG allotments, it's a huge chunk of money. We heard from members of North Scranton today looking for additional funding for renovations with the park safety items that need to be done, if we had this money this, you know, this large amount of money we would be able to put more into that program as well as many others throughout the city.

Unfortunately, if money wanted to be moved from one category to another to give to one you have to take from another. Our federal dollars are dwindling and getting reduced every year so, again, as I mentioned during the caucus, please for anyone listening that supports all of these programs that I mentioned last week and some that we heard from this week call Congressman Cartright, Senator Toomey, Senator Casey and ask them to continue to

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support CDBG money for us. I believe all three of them do, but there is much more that needs to be done. These monies really make a difference in the community, but most federal tax dollars a lot of time you don't see them come back but these dollars you do. They really make a difference in neighborhoods, neighborhood police patrols, purchasing a fire engine, paving, demolition of hazardous structures, parks, nonprofits, these are all great programs that will funded and many great programs that, unfortunately, weren't funded so we need to, you, now, we need to keep the pressure on our federal representatives to support that program.

Moving onto some positive items actually, the rest of all of my comments are positive which is very nice thing. Had the pleasure of attending the Hill Neighborhood Association meeting last night to talk about a variety of issues, the main reason I was invited was a few weeks back after the passing of Ozzie Quinn we talked about dedicating green space within the Hill

Section in his name and we discussed that at the Hill Section they are working on forming a committee to pick a location that would be perfect for that, and I talked to Mayor Courtright, he has agreed that the city can help regarding a plaque, but the wording of the plaque and location shouldn't be decided by the members of council, the mayor or anyone in government, it should be decided by Mr. Quinn's family and by the Hill Neighborhood Association.

Also, at that meeting I'd like to congratulate Nicole Pettinato who was elected a the permanent president of the Hill Neighborhood Association. I'm sure she will do a fabulous job. She does have very big shoes to fill, I'm sure she knows, but I'm confident she will do an excellent job.

At that meeting a number of citizens' requests were brought to my attention, many of them were still being worked on, but one I do want to give a shout out to is Larry Wynn at the DPW. There was a lingering issue for two years regarding a large piece of glass that was dumped in an

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alley, and DPW wasn't able to pick it up, it was becoming dangerous, kids were playing and literally within a couple of hours of contacting him that was taken care of so I want to give him a big thank you for that.

And, also, I would to like Chief Graziano and Director Hinton and City Inspector Jack Liptai who all worked together regarding condemning a property on Meridian Avenue that has been a nuisance to the neighbors on that block for probably a decade. This building was in such bad condition that there were cockroaches in the house that were leaving and going into the neighbor's houses, so it was in such bad condition they acted very quickly, and the resident contacted me, a couple of days later and actually had taken care of so it's nice to report some good news on these fronts from good work from our department heads, members of the DPW, LIPS and our police department. And that is all for tonight. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Mr. Evans.

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MR. EVANS: Thank you. I was very happy to see the announcement about Delta Medix moving into the mall, actually the Marketplace, I have to get -- stop using

the word "mall" because it's no longer a mall, that's a very positive move. You

know, when Mr. Basalyga took over the mall

or Marketplace he talked about creating

mixed use space and that's how that place is

going to be successful. You know, a

downtown that is vibrant is one that was

lots of different uses, not just retail, but

restaurants, offices, banks, colleges,

schools, etcetera, so I think that's the

model he used to be successful at the

Marketplace so I'm very happy to hear that.

Delta Medix could have gone anywhere. It

could have went to Dickson City, it could

have went to Dunmore, could have went to

Moosic, but they stayed in Scranton and

specifically they said downtown, in fact,

are adding to what their presence downtown

was before so that's a very, very positive

statement that was made today.

Also, I attended a few meetings this

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week. At the PEL meeting we talked about, of course, the audit and as Councilman Wechsler mentioned we hope to have that completed prior to the budget or at least prior to final approval of the budget.

I also attended a meeting about the tax payments issue or legislation that is being passed on Tuesday with the BA and the Treasurer as well as representative from the Single Tax Office and what we are looking to do is create a simple, seamless process for applicants of the program. The meeting went well, which is they are just waiting for the first applicants when they apply. We expect the application for the abatement to also be dispensed on the city's website. I will keep everybody informed as you move that forward, but it was a very, very good meeting and, you know, sometimes we have to be involved in passing legislation. Sometimes we just can't pass it and then expect it to get done the way we want it to get done, so I was happy we were all able to get together on this.

I also attended the sewer meetings,

I was sitting behind Joe and Marie to the right in the back and a couple of takeaways from the sewer meeting last night. It was somewhat informative and the problem was, you know, the horse was already out of the barn. I mean, Councilman Wechsler chided the Sewer Authority to have the meeting, but they really should have had the meeting prior to any notices going out.

Secondly, Attorney Walker, who represents the Sewer Authority, he made a comment through the night that I thought was interesting he said he was advising the residents that were there to contact their attorney so they could issue a language to the easement to reflect that when work was done on the property that the property would be returned to its original condition. That's a great idea, however, and I think Joe mentioned this himself, that's good advice but why wasn't it on the original letter that went out to the property owners, so that's something we should really look at and why should I as a property owner have an attorney when it's something that could have

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been in the agreement right off the bat, so
I think that's something they should do.
Again, possibly, resending all of the
letters again instead of threatening eminent
domain I think that would be the first thing
they should do prior to that course of
action.

Also, I was at a meeting as a requested by some citizens who were involved in a lot of special events downtown that incorporate vendors as well as Tom Welby who was representing First Friday. I met with them and the BA and the Director of LIPS to discuss revising legislation for peddlers, vendors, etcetera, to make all involved and to make it easier for all involved and to continue to encourage special events and the use of vendors in the downtown. So it was a very productive meeting, we're hoping to have new legislation that will address that come out by the end of November so we can have ready for a big event they we are planning for sometime in the December. That's all I have tonight.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

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Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Regarding the easements from the Sewer Authority, I wasn't able to attend, unfortunately attend the sewer meeting, but from what I have heard from some of the residents who attended the meeting and what I read in the paper, there has been a complete lack of regard for the people of this city. ignorance and the arrogance from officials from the Sewer Authority is disgraceful. can't believe that you would put the onus the residents of the city. It's not their fault and I don't think the attorneys at the Sewer Authority are getting the message clear enough and, quite frankly, you know, I think they need to be told that they are not going to be able to bully their way through this deal. You know, you are not going to bully a 75-year-old person who has lived here their whole life and just expect them to sign a piece of paper so I found the whole thing to be quite a disgrace.

Just a few DPW issues, I have been in contact with a resident on West Mountain

Road, the 100 block. There is a blocked drain up there. It needs to be pumped out. Water from Newton Township flows down. There's a pipe at the bottom of their driveway and water goes directly across the road to the basin and that road also needs to be patched so we have been in contact with the DPW and the Sewer Authority to try and get that issue taken care of.

Also I received some complaints this week about potholes on Crane Street in Minooka and Charlotte Street in North Scranton so we will send that along to the DPW, and I received a call from a neighbor in the 100 block of South Cameron Avenue about a property that we have been working on that has been in terrible condition and finally the bank -- the property was foreclosed and the bank did send someone to cut the grass and clean out the building and make it secure so that was good.

Also, I received a call for update on the 300 block of 16th Avenue. They submitted a streetlight petition. We did receive it and we are sending that along to

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the appropriate department so we'll get an update on that probably in a few weeks. And that is all I have. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. Gaughan. Since the Sewer Authority made out letters requesting citizens to provide easements for their property access in August, I have been requesting that the Sewer Authority communicate the required information to homeowners so they can make an informed decision on how to proceed with the dealing with this request. I met with Mr. Barrett and attended a meeting of the Sewer Authority Board and have reached out to Mr. Barrett weekly to determine the status of the public meeting that would inform the residents. In response to my request, the meeting was held last night. Only a few of the affected parties attended and I think that was mostly due to the lack of advertising and the short notice provided within the classified section of the Scranton Times. At the meeting last night, it was obvious that the Scranton Sewer Authority needs to do a better job at

I would encourage them to prepare another letter to affected homeowners. The threatening language of further legal action should be removed from the correspondence. The new letter should contain a map detailing the location of the sewer lines on the property, and also the letter should contain that if work is required on a sewer line, and I would like to see this language in there, that says the property is restored to its original condition, and further as described by the property owner.

I also would like to see a statement in that easement that would say the owner will be exempt from litigation resulting in work injury or property damage while work is being performed on the owner's property.

Further examination of this issue leads me to believe that these easements are required to let the utility work on private property. In a case of an emergency, I'm sure that property owners would want utility to fix the problem. We are well aware of Mr. Young's problems getting work done on

his property. He is rightfully concerned on granting access protecting himself from litigation. Also, this easement issue should not be expedited because of the impending sale of the Authority. This is an unknown problem that existed for the entire life of the Scranton sewer system. Some lines go as far back as 1861. Many original deeds go back when the Scranton area was part of Luzerne County. It seems unrealistic to correct a 150 year error in eight weeks.

I am concerned that if the Authority fails to get the signed easements that it can file requests for condemnation and then that condemnation act would be sufficient for the sale to be complete. As a result, Pennsylvania American Water Corporation would be required to complete the easement for condemnation procedure. This would leave the public to deal with the private company instead of public officials. I don't believe that it's fair or just for homeowners to take money out of their own pocket to pay legal fees to protect their

interest against negligence caused by the
Authority and their predecessors. It is yet
to be determined how these liens will effect
property values. Vacant land may become
unbuildable if there is an easement on the
property.

At a minimum, I would suggest that the Authority prepare a new letter for the taxpayers to further explain this issue.

Ultimately, I would like the proces to be delayed until there are assurances that the homeowners are protected.

The scary part of this issue goes back to the same thing I spoke about last week, this issue has to be looked at independent of the sale of the Sewer Authority. The easements on these properties should have been attained back in the 70's when the sewer system was built, and I'm not sure if it was something that just wasn't paid attention to or we never thought we were going to sell them, but it is something that's going to have to be completed whether the Sewer Authority sale proceeds or not and based upon the comments

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of the people last night, once again, these are just regular people and there was not one political person there who had a line on their property that was there. These are just people fighting for their rights to be protected and defended.

The easements are going to have to granted. We heard tonight about relocating the lines. If you look at the map, that's going to be impossible. A lot of these properties are built on top of lines that are there for generations so separating or rerouting the lines is not practical. Many of them go right under the homes so, once again, I am concerned that the Sewer Authority would just abandon the letter issue, the letter writing campaign, just issue the condemnation and then turn it over to Pennsylvania American Water Company. very concerned about that, so hopefully they will come to some type of understanding on that.

That's the by bad news. I do have the positive, also. Getting back to what Mr. Evans said about Delta Medix, Delta

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Medix was aggressively pursued by several communities in our area. This is a true victory for Scranton and we hear a lot of negatives about us and comments about us as a group, but the fact that the Steamtown Marketplace is now a functioning entity and it's able to be successful in attracting a major company like Delta Medix and also Luzerne Community College, when we asked Mr. Boscov if he was interested in doing something like that he said no. He was only interested in retail and he would not commit to anything like that so, once again, I am very happy that Mr. Basalyga was the successful bidder on the mall, and now that you have some anchors at the other end I think you will see more retail space as the mall moves on towards the Boscov area of the store.

Also, I have been contacted by
Leslie Collins, the director of Scranton
Tomorrow and she asked me to read a letter
that Mayor Courtright sent to Mr. Steve
Ward, who is the Penn State Master Gardener.
The mayor goes on to write: "Dear Mr. Ward,

on behalf of the City of Scranton, I would like to thank you for dedicated efforts within the downtown Scranton business district. Penn State master gardeners in partnership with Scranton Tomorrow have made significant strides in improving the downtown curb appeal. Your streetscape efforts, including the seasonal planting in 100 downtown city-owned planters, revitalization of the Mulberry Street islands and ongoing maintenance are commendable.

Additionally, we thank you for the continuation of your annual donation of that planting of the steps at city hall. We recognize that your organization has provided this service as an in-kind to the City of Scranton and are very grateful for your support and dedication and partnership."

And Mrs. Collins also asked me to make this information known about her group. The project has utilized over 1,000 volunteers providing 3,000 hours of labor and more than 40,000 annuals planted within

the past three years. And, also, with all of this, good stuff, there is also more worked involved. The cleanup date and the winter planting is scheduled for Sunday, November 13, 2016. And I would like to thank Scranton Tomorrow and the Penn State master gardeners. And that's all I have tonight.

MR. GAUGHAN: I apologize, I forgot to add one thing.

MR. WECHSLER: Go ahead.

MR. GAUGHAN: I should have mentioned this earlier, we received a letter from the civil designer and the environmental analysis -- analyst rather, Albert Magnotta and David Osborn, vice president and director of engineering for Labelle Associates, the engineers for the Scranton Sewer Authority, and I just want to read it really quickly. This is relating to the 400 block of Phelps Street and Councilman Wechsler and I were out there at the meeting on September 13, and this letter is written to Eugene Barrett from the Sewer Authority. It says, "Dear Mr. Barrett, on

Tuesday, September 13, we met with Councilman Gaughan and the property owners along the 400 block of Phelps Street at his request along with Councilman Wechsler. The purpose of this meeting was to determine the potential course of action to alleviate the flooding as I identified in our prior correspondence dated August 230, 2016.

After taking into consideration the eyewitness accounts and discussions held during said meeting we recommend the following:

Number one, to significantly reduce odors and prevent surcharging during wet weather events, the Scranton Sewer Authority should install in-line check valves on the outlook end of the catch basins located immediately upstream of the combined sewer system within the 400 block of Phelps Street. We would recommend a red valve series 3--G or approved equal.

Number two, the Scranton Sewer

Authority should commence with the

inspection and cleaning program of the

Pinebrook branch interceptor as identified

on the Scranton Sewer Authority's 2015 annual operation report.

And finally, number three, in accordance with the nine minimum controls program, the Scranton Sewer Authority collection system maintenance personnel should periodically verify that grit or sediment will not accumulate within the inlets along Phelps Street. If grit does begin to build up, the basin should be cleaned as soon as possible.

Please note, that though we are aware that these measures will not complete eliminate the drainage issues along the 400 block of Phelps Street, it is the extent to which the Scranton Sewer Authority can do to reduce the flooding in lieu of a complete upgrade of the Pinebrook branch intercepting sewer line.

To provide further protection to the property owners during wet weather events, the city should perform an investigation on what controls can be put in place in conformance with their MS4 permit for storm water management. Very truly yours," and

they go onto sign the letter and the chairman for the Sewer Authority, the mayor, Councilman Wechsler and myself and John Pocius are cc'd on this letter.

So I would ask in follow-up if we could check with our city planner and our city engineer on what controls we might be able to put in place to conform with the MS4 permit that we hold, and also this might be useful for the gentleman from Keyser Avenue if some sort of correspondence was created and an engineer goes out and looks at the issue over in Keyser Valley.

So I just wanted to update everybody on that and we'll continue to follow up with the people from the 400 block of Phelps Street. Thank you.

I hope nobody has anywhere to go tonight, I want to read another letter. I received this letter from one of my neighbors and I wanted to read it into the record and give to my colleagues, and this relates to the McLane Park improvement project.

"To the members of the Scranton City Council: I am unable to be at this meeting because of a family vacatio out of state, but I wanted to let you know how I feel about the updates to the park at Rockwell Avenue and Gilbert Street corner in North

Scranton in North Scranton. You know this park as the James Pine McLane Park but for as long as I remember the nickname was Rockwell playground or just the park.

That's right, I have used this park since there was a pool, a hopscotch pad, a dodgeball circle, a king square, a volleyball court, an old fashioned merry-go-round, swings and even a building used to store supplies and equipment.

I was raised in the house on the corner and still live there now. I remember a winter when I was quite young when my father and many of the other fathers in the area made arrangements with the city to build a shallow ice skating rink over a few winters. That was before the baseball field was fenced in.

I also remember my father telling us that my Aunt Marie, which was his sister, could hit a softball passed the scoreboard that used to be on the hill directly behind center field. My children and grandchildren have played on the equipment that is there now.

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We have been informed that there is a grant request in the works for the repair and refurbishment of this park that will include many things that are very necessary, but I have also heard through the grapevine the amount approved has been much less than the requested total. I realize that the city is in bad shape, but I know that in the past years there has been a great deal of funds allowed for the other parks in the City of Scranton with many parks receiving multiple grants over a number of years. This doesn't seem to be quite equitable to me and I would hope that you would feel that the residents of North Scranton are just as important as those in the other areas of the city.

Many people use this park with many people coming here from other areas of the city since it is a quiet park and the residents are very kid oriented. We watch out for the kids, both those who live in our area and anyone who visits in park. We have always had a large population of children in our area and it has been this way since I

was young. Come here at any time of the day and if it is nice out you will probably find a parent here with their young children to use the rings and actually sliding down slides with their children. There is almost always a basketball pickup game going on as soon is out and on weekends. We are also a place where you will find tavern softball leagues playing almost every week and weekend.

With the use of the park as abundant as it is we need to keep it safe and sound for those who use it. As long as I can, remember, the only upgrade I have seen to this park is when the neighborhood scout promoted an eagle project to upgrade it. JP Myers earned his Eagle Scout badge by repairing and replacing the wooden portion of the structures and placing new mulch around the playground equipment. That was a number of years ago and it wasn't something that the city did.

Even with the Rockwell Avenue bridge being closed, you still see many people at this park often. It's very important that

we show our young people that they matter by giving them an area where they can come to play, sit and talk and be with friends. We also need to show the parents of these young people that their children will be safe when they go to the park. This park can be used to teach our children and adults about many things including community involvement, pride in your community, pride in your country and pride in yourself. If we can make the improvements to this park, all of these would come to fruition.

With the addition of the flag pole, our scouts and veterans could also hold ceremonies as well. Please consider raising the amount of the grant to the original total of the request so we can keep our community safe, happy, healthy and civically involved. This is not only important to the people of North Scranton, but also to those who come here to play baseball, basketball, and many other sports. Thank you for listening to my ramblings as important as they are. Sincerely, Rosie F. Gavin, Rockwell Avenue, Scranton, Pennsylvania."

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And I apologize for taking up so much time, but I think that letter was important, as I said earlier at the public hearing at 5:30 I'm very passionate about this project. It affects hundreds and hundreds of children in North Scranton and this park has not been upgraded, there has been no money put in this park in almost 25 The equipment is out of date, it's not ADA accessible, the sidewalks and the park are a disgrace. The softball fence is a hazard, something needs to be done up there and while I know that the residents appreciate that it was funded for 90,000 that's not going to be anywhere near what is needed.

So over the next month as we take a pause from this action plan to allow for public comment, I am willing to try to work with my colleagues to see if we increase the funding and provide much needed updates to this park. Thank you.
