16	MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'
17	PARTICIPATION.
18	MR. WECHSLER: John Foley.
19	MR. FOLEY: Good evening, gentlemen.
20	I like your Rules of Council. First time
21	I've seen them, should have put out there a
22	long time ago. I will try not be as
23	cantankerous as some people think I am.
24	First, I'd like to apologize to
25	Mr. Wechsler. If I had any impact on your

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1	not being reelected to participate in the
2	November election, I apologize, it was not
3	meant to be.
4	MR. WECHSLER: You only need to talk
5	to 82 more people, John. You had to change
6	82 more minds before. That's all.
7	MR. FOLEY: I apologize to council
8	because I was under the misguided opinion
9	that you were primarily responsible for a
10	lot of what has gone on over the last two or
11	three-year period. I have changed my
12	opinion that you are not primarily
13	responsible.
14	Now, with that said, I have started
15	to go through my files and pull out things
16	that have been in there for awhile. I have
17	looked at the three-year recovery plan and I
18	will tell you that I am disappointed in the
19	plan. First and foremost, the only
20	reduction significantly in operating
21	expenses that have caused close to a
22	balanced budget for the three-year period
23	and the December 31, 2012, is the
24	elimination of COLA for retired employees.
25	That's it. That's the only thing in there

of to get anywhere near a break even. There are things that were not in the plan that are equally disturbing. The plan does not address the three major pieces of litigation against the city. First and foremost, the Act 511 which I believe will strip out and be stapling in dollars worth of revenue from the city on an annual basis. The PL Plan was issued at the end of June 2017. The Court of Common Pleas ruled that the City's position was not correct. The city is going to appeal it. They will go to a higher court as they have in a number of other litigations and lost. It is time that the city take some responsibility and actually create a plan for the next three-year period. You have three options as I see it.

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You will raise taxes, like it or not. You may have to borrow money, like it or not. Failing those two, at some point over the next couple of year period the city will slip in receivership with no help from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, which is currently experiencing it's own financial

10 1 problems. I would dare suggest to you, you 2 take some of my remarks, go to the city 3 business administrator, the outside financial advisors and set the plan in 4 5 Don't wait for the problem to motion now. 6 occur. Deal with it now. Unappealing as it 7 may be, you are probably going to have to 8 raise taxes. 9 So with that, I can go back to 10 Moosic Lake, have dinner with my wife. 11 Gentlemen, you have yourself a great 12 evening. 13 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Foley. 14 Lee Morgan. MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council. 15 16 Lee Morgan. You know, that was an enjoyable 17 conversation we just had with Mr. Foley, but 18 the problem is that the average residents in 19 this city knew for the last 25 years that 20 this was the way this was going to roll out. 21 The sad part is we kept electing people with 22 cheap suits on, well, maybe they weren't 23 that cheap but, you know, who had no 24 leadership ability and it's taken us right 25 to where we are and there is still no

leadership ability here and the voters are going to vote soon. I find it mind boggling, but I think that what really has to happen for the average working person is that the taxes have to definitely be cut. The wage tax has to go away no matter what happened to this city because the residents should be paying 2 percent wage tax to the city, well, a little more than two, but, I mean, it's the beyond ridiculous. The 2.4 percent we give to the city itself is like throwing money out a window and nothing good has come out of it all of the time it's been collected except to give the city an ability to spend money and prop all of these silly little games they play, and it's been going on for so long that it's ridiculous, and all of the residents properties are really just about worthless because this council has sat here and other ones and done nothing.

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I think honestly that the residents of this city have to realize that what Janet Evans did to the Parking Authority was the best piece of legislation that ever came out of this council, and all of the other garbage that we've seen has just buried us further and further. We are feeding nonprofits as the residents of this city go hungry. It's ridiculous. And there is never a really a comment coming from the council, you just sit there like cigar store Indians just -- I don't know what your purpose really is except for a ability to hold a meeting, legislate something through the council and spend money or transfer money. Because for the life of me, I don't remember anything that is really worthwhile coming out of this council for a long time.

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We have pools that have been closed for years that are an asset that while allegedly belong to the residents haven't been repaired. We are putting more development in the downtown, but a building downtown and get a ton of money from the state or federal government, don't worry because the city will be a conduit for it. It's ridiculous. Not one answer to a problem.

And I disagree with the attorney that just stood here because the sale of the

Sewer Authority goes back to this council. All of the bad borrowing goes back to this council and previous councils who borrowed and borrowed and borrowed. The parking garages they knew they couldn't pay for. They legislated it through the council and The council is the problem. built them. You are supposed to be a counterbalance and, Mr. Wechsler, you know, you losing the election was a great thing. I hope Mr. Rogan can possibly get knocked off and maybe we can get something done here because, you know, I'm not a politically partisan person but at almost 60 years old and after coming to this council for decades watching a parade of incompetent public leaders march through here, it gets to the point where it's ridiculous, and then you wonder why people don't vote because you're just the next ship of fools. You come in here with some kind of grand idea, don't exercise the power of council, don't hold the mayor accountable, don't work for the residents of this city.

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You know, I saw a remarkable thing

in the Scranton Times editorial page, somebody talked about the street signs and if we had any pride in our city we would do something about it. We did. Mayor Doherty spent a ton of money on garbage, okay, and took down street signs that were probably her for 50 years that you could read instead of replacing a couple that had to be replaced and they are all faded.

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And you look at the boondoggle down at the Scranton Lace building where some arsonist was going to burn it down to the ground I guess. But, you know, we wanted to give people grant money and they came in there and they cut all of the metal out of the building and now it's an eyesore, just like North Scranton was and the junior high school was never fixed until they just got enough taxpayer's money out of it to put it together. But anything that means anything to the residents of this city, like the South Side Sports Complex built with Section 70 money which was never to be sold ever was sold.

You have just looted the city and

17	an announcement that the Scranton Human
18	Relations Commission will be holding it's
19	first public heating on Monday, October 2,
20	here in chambers at 6 p.m. We will caucus
21	the commission will caucus at 5:30.
22	The second announcement is that it
23	has to do with the Puerto Rico situation in
24	Puerto Rico and some citizens of Scranton
25	joined together and are putting a collection

for food and health and safety items to donate or to send to the people that desperately need it in Puerto Rico who are US citizens, as everyone sees in the news and that will be coordinated at Nay Aug Park on Sunday, October 1. the city was charged too much. I mean, it didn't disappear like a dollar I've been talking about for the past two weeks or whatever. Year after year Courtright's friends helping friends program has done nothing except protect a bunch of tax cheats all over this city. These are all of the supporters of this administration and, of course, they oppose any political change. Why in the world there is people like Talerico got dozens of house on there, 5,000, six, seven thousand year after year it just goes up and nobody says nothing. The Langans on North Washington they owe \$100,000 year after year, nobody tries to collect it. That Scranton investors I think they're on Boulevard, they owe like \$150,000 and it just goes up, nothing is ever done. And Thomas Hill I think it's on Linden Street, he owed \$161,000 and this is all over the city, there is large amounts of money and nobody does a thing about it. Ιf you collected all of this money, we wouldn't have our taxes double like they have been under this administration.

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You want to know why it's because of friends of the Courtright administration that's why this is allowed. I'd like anybody out there to find me another city like Scranton where all of these injustices against the taxpayers are tolerated. We've got an absentee mayor for four years as I have been -- like I said, I think Lackawanna College is running the city with Amoroso and Bulzoni just whatever he is told he does. Some 13 of these houses are just next to being 14 condemned. Well, if you will allow me just a second more --15 16 MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Ellman, you can't 17 start another thought, I'm sorry. It's five 18 minutes. 19 MR. ELLMAN: I just want to give my 20 condolences to someone that died. This 21 young lady that was in the paper for OD'g I 22 can just imagine how hard it is for that 23 family because this is such a problem even 24 here in town. It's just heartbreaking to 25 read those things. Thank you.

2	MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
3	Scranton. I saw with pleasure in Monday's
4	paper the summary of the 2016 audit and I
5	note that under other financing sources,
6	"Sale of Sewer Authority \$66,519,966."
7	Was that entire amount put into a
8	trust or a lockbox?
9	MR. WECHSLER: Yes, it's been
10	separated because we still have some money
11	that hasn't been spent yet but it's in
12	separate bank accounts.
13	MS. HODOWANITZ: And I'm still
14	confused by the Controller's August report,
15	which I mentioned to you last week, I'm sure
16	you've had a chance to review. How is that
17	as of August 31 the City's expenditures
18	exceeded revenues by more than \$21 million?
19	MR. GAUGHAN: I do have an
20	explanation from the business administrator
21	and I'll read that in motions for you.
22	MS. HODOWANITZ: Because that's very
23	troubling. I mean, if that's the
24	refinancing of the bonds for which they
25	spent \$28 million I don't understand why

that didn't come out of the sewer sale proceeds and why it would cause such a dip in revenues that would be coming from other sources. And I know you are coming into the budget season for next year, so I would really like some explanation on that.

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I was also pleasantly surprised to see September 25 a letter to the editor from the States Attorney General, Josh Shapiro, commenting on the City's request to review the sewer sale and basically he said we are reviewing the issue and when our investigation is completed we will communicate our findings, which says to me this is not necessarily a dead issue. For awhile there when we heard nothing from the Attorney General I thought, well, you know, they are not going to do anything. Well, maybe there is a possibility they will come down and review and audit that entire fiasco, and I sure hope the city has a Plan B prepared in case somebody says there is a problem with the sale of the Sewer Authority because if everybody is just plotting around saying, oh, everything is fine, don't worry

22 be happy, I don't think that's the way to go. I was here yesterday morning at 10:00 when the bids were opened for the independent medical examination coordinator, which is the rewrite of the third party 7 administration for the pension funds. There was only one bid. It was Vocational Rehabilitation, Incorporated, which is based up in Clarks Summit. The president is a Thomas Boyles and he listed on his paperwork three employees, their fee schedule was \$85 an hour plus mileage, tolls and parking fees, so if you kick in the parking fees they are going to make a lot of money per 16 But having said that, this is not I hour. think the nationally recognized firm that the mayor promised us on March 18, 2016, but hopefully this will open the floodgates to move some of that money to the pension funds so they can start making interest in the stock market. Does that mean you are going to just adjust the figures in the capital budget where it says acquire that property for \$450,000? That should free up some money there, so before you pass that is there going to be some clarification on the capital budget? Because you got two different actions on the same property, one to transfer the deed for \$375,000 and the other one to acquire the property for \$450,000. I would like to see that cleared up. What happened to the Knowel's insurance list which has now been promised to me for six months? MR. EVANS: We have it. It's being routed around to the various department heads for final review and then we should have it probably by next week. MS. HODOWANITZ: That's been told me more than once.

Community Block Grant funding earlier today. I spent quite a bit of time reviewing the documents associated with this plan. As I mentioned during the hearing, we will vote on this plan again tonight for the second reading and then it will be tabled for a comment period.

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As was mentioned at the hearing, we are going to look into see if any adjustments can be made regarding Veteran's Park that I think all of us support, it's a question of whether HUD will allow those dollars to be used for that source, but I do want to talk a little bit more in broader strokes about the Community Development Block Grant Program. I think it's something that the average resident doesn't realize how much this program does for them and it's critical, and I'm pleading with everybody out there to contact their representatives. Congressman Cartright, Senator Toomey and Senator Casey to ask them to continue to support Community Development Block Grant fundina. This money really is a lifeline for the City of Scranton. They are your tax

2	home to help the residents within the City

4	Just a couple of items that are
5	funded pretty much on a yearly basis through
6	this program, one that's very popular is the
7	neighborhood police patrols. Four of
8	Scranton's police officers are funded by the
9	federal government, your federal tax dollars
10	through this program. Without CDBG funds,
11	the city would either have four less police
12	officers out on the beat or we would have to
13	use city tax dollars to pay for those
14	officers.
15	We are currently paying for a new
16	fire truck in part with federal dollars.
17	The city I believe just this week finally
18	had the first new truck in decades. There
19	is no secret that infrastructure and
20	equipment was something that the city put on
21	the back burner over the past ten years
22	while we had different financial struggles
23	but this is an important piece of equipment
24	that if, God forbid, one of us as a fire at
25	our house or needs it it's there for us.

Little leagues. Various little leagues through my tenure on council have received funding from Community Development Block Grant dollars. The one I think that affects everyone every day is the road As Mr. Preambo mentioned during our paving. caucus, \$7.6 million has been spent of federal dollars to pave 415 city blocks. Again, I can't stress it enough, it's not free money, it's your federal tax dollars but it's important that Scranton gets their share and that we get these projects for our people. There is a number of other items on here, on the list, many different camps to help children, different housing for women, different programs skills to teach individuals to get them back into the work force, there's a whole slew of programs that are funded through this allotment. So I guess this would be my yearly plea just to ask everyone to address their

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Additionally, the location is vital because of the museum's connection and partnerships with the Scranton Public Library and the Lackawanna County Historical Society. Dozens and dozens of children each year have had the opportunity to learn about a history of Scranton that they simply weren't aware of, mostly because of that connection to the library, of course, and the Historical Society, but to me what is even more impressive is the dedication of the volunteers to this mission. They should be commended for all that they do. I want them to know that I will always be it's advocate now and in the future along with my fellow councilmen. So, again, to the curator of the Civil War Museum I thank you for all you do for keeping our history and

I would ask that you only do not take the bait and I belive the 2 3 question is crafted solely to solicit a "no" vote. 4 First of all, \$13 million cost in my 5 6 mind remains a phantom number and not based 7 in reality because of all of the required 8 work, the field work has been completed on 9 every parcel throughout Lackawanna during 10 the last attempt at reassessment eight years 11 ago, so most likely that information only needs to be revised. It certainly doesn't 12 13 need to be completely redone. Therefore the 14 cost will more likely be closer to \$5 15 million not \$13 million. So, again, I ask 16 of our voters and our property owners take the time to be as informed as you can, and 17 18 if you do I think you will chose to vote for 19 tax equity for everyone by voting "yes" for 20 the reassessment. 21 On pensions, I haven't talked about 22 this in a little while, this is something 23 that I did talk about at length and I'd like 24 to revisit, I have been a proponent of offering all nonunion personnel and cabinet 25

members the option of enrolling in a 401-K are defined contribution-style plan. Ι first proposed this idea over three years ago when I was appointed to city council. The residents cannot understand why the city is not forcing the issue and making this company restore the streets back to their original condition so I am going to reach out once again to the DPW and to our pave cut inspector to see if we can reconcile this because it is a big issue and there are several people, pretty much all of the neighbors in that area who are extremely upset. Mayor Courtright also expressed his support for that. As of right now, we don't plan to do anything, put that request back in I did speak to the president over motion. there and just to make sure that it's what the neighbors want in Greenridge. I'd like to know what they want to do now, now that they are not going to proceed with the lawsuit I would like to have input from the neighbors over in Greenridge to see what they would like city council to do. Last week we had some concerns

expressed about the development on West Mountain in regards to the PPL power station. We got in touch with city planner Don King and asked him a lot of the trees were torn up there and if they going to be replaced and according to Mr. King by federal guidelines there has to be a buffer between the trees and the power lines. In New England a few years ago the amount of trees were lessened and during a big storm the trees fell down and knocked down the power lines to the transmission line. So Mr. King assured me that the amount of trees that have been removed up there are in conjunction with federal guidelines in order to protect the line from storm damage from trees falling.

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And I did receive one complaint this week concerning the drainage ditches up on Derby Avenue up on East Mountain where the Friendship House used to be, there is a large gutter there that's really in need of some defoliation. The weeds have grown up there, also, and the residents are hoping that we can get something down before the snow hits.
