Nancy is his wife who passed away several years ago, a personnel friend of mine, and she was certainly outrageous, so if you can

get an opportunity please see that if you're downtown, and I'm sure you will have a few laughs and it will be a great show. That's all I have for now.

MR. EVANS: Monday at 1:30 he will be giving a press conference in the conference room.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Aww, I wonder what that's all about. Also, during Fifth Order if you could give us any stats you have on the Sewer Authority sale. I noticed in the backup paperwork for tonight's meeting that you have the audit for the Sewer Authority from their last fiscal year and I scanned

it, the numbers aren't overly surprising, but what was interesting was they omitted the management's discussions and analysis, which doesn't effect the numbers, but which is required by GASP and GAP and it should have been in there. That would have been the appropriate place to discuss issues such as lack of the easements, documentation, but they didn't put it in.

And during Fifth Order if you could give us any update on the status of the OECD loans where we stand on that issue, and when we will get the state of the city address from the mayor, and the rape kit. Do we or do we not have one rape kit that's more than a year old?

And I did attend the working session on the pave cuts, found it interesting, although a little hard to follow because you don't have microphones, but one thing came to mind, I received a letter late this afternoon from another resident with regard to the pave cut issue and it's many pages long so I haven't had time to digest it, but the pave cuts is symptomatic of a problem we

have throughout the city and that is when a citizen has a problem, a complaint, an issue or a question and attempts to get answer from a city official or city department so often all that a resident gets is a voicemail or we'll get back to you and then nothing is ever heard again. As you revise this ordinance or any other ordinance I would request that you always consider the citizen as a stakeholder in these ordinances.

What is a citizen supposed to do? I no longer drive so for me pave cuts is an academic issue, but consider the citizen maybe a retired person living on a fixed income that has to drive a car to get around and their street is a wholly mess, a wholly terror, you know, good only for Halloween Trail of Tears. What is that citizen supposed to do? He or she pays taxes, pays fees, has a problem, how does that citizen get information back?

I did notice, I think you brought it up, Mr. Gaughan, is that there ought to be some kind of computerized database where you

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could get answers and where citizens could get answers. When might their street be paved? If there was a pave cut, you know, who is inspecting it? You know, is it going, you know, sit for a month while the ground settles, citizens get no feedback but they do get their tax bills and somehow we have got to relook that attitude towards the citizens as you turn to them for taxes and money and fees, but they get no satisfaction when they have an issue or a problem, and I don't think that's a hard thing to do. Citizens aren't stupid. They understand that not every road is going to get paved and paving doesn't have a host of issues, but they deserve the courtesy of information back from the city, so maybe you could put a paragraph somewhere in the new ordinances that addresses citizens' concerns. you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Bob Bolus.

MR. BOLUS: Good evening, Council.

Bob Bolus, Scranton. It's hard to figure
out where to start here once in awhile but

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today, you know, I have some reserves about what we do in this city and who we respect and who we don't, and each of every one of you have been candidates in the past and on everyone's platform, and correct me if I'm wrong, you said you represent all of the people, am I correct on that? Not just an individual one here or an individual party there. I haven't seen that. We have had presidential candidates come to this city and, quite frankly, I don't know care if you are a Democrat or Republican, an Independent, as long as you sit in an administrative position of this city that's a council or the mayor it's your duty out of respect for all of us to show the courtesy to those candidates and show up there because you represent us, not yourselves anymore, you represent all of us and I think you need to take that to heart because it's very disappointing. Trump came here. Hillary showed up, Democrats run right over I didn't see anyone come over and see Trump.

MR. ROGAN: I was there, Mr. Bolus.

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MR. BOLUS: I saw you there. I'm addressing the issue to a couple of the others, and I respect you for doing that. I don't want to single you out individually, but we have other people here that have an obligation to us and that's out of respect to all of us. You represent every one of us and when they come here I expect to see you show up.

The issue going on here today, and I'm very proud to say I was part of it, CNN was here in Scranton today. They rode around with me in the Trump trailer yesterday all over the area and it highlighted Scranton, Pennsylvania. Today the trailer was parked downtown Scranton right across from the courthouse, so was CNN, and I felt honored to say that I represented Scranton, whether it was the Trump trailer that we brought there, I brought people here to Scranton, our city, that's been in the spotlight nationally from Biden, Trump, Clinton, everybody that comes here and we can't turn our back on that. are Scrantonians. I don't think I want you

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guys ever to forget that. That's why you ran for office so respect us with that dignity that you owe us.

But I was proud to say they had a heck of a time here in Scranton, and then some loudmouth, egotistical idiot as I will call him from WILK, Steven Corbett, well, Mr. Corbett wanted to blast me all over his radio today with me parking the Trump trailer downtown Scranton, my failure to put money in the meters. Well, what the loudmouth didn't understand, I won't even return his phone call because we have had discussions back and forth, I find him a very ignorant, belligerent individual who is generally very arrogant in discussions. Here is tickets from the city today that say "Violations," but what Corbett didn't understand it says "Warning Only." Today the city they were not writing tickets and you didn't have to put money in the meters. You would only receive a warning because I went over the Parking Authority this morning to see about renting the meters, which I do every time I park the trailers. We pay 20

bucks a meter. They said, "No, you don't have to do that today because you'll only get a warning."

So to that loud mouth, the one that discredited me and the City of Scranton where I'm from put his money where his mouth is because I'll be able to show him any time he wants face-to-face where he has no control over a microphone and let's see how big mouth he is and how smart he is. I welcome the challenge.

Moving on what we are doing here, I had the road up by East Mountain by the Cultural Center when you come down through there, Joe, you know how bad it is, people are going all the way over into the left side coming down to try and avoid the bumps and somebody is going to get hid head on there because it's a blind corner. I'd really like you guys to look into that because it's a safety issue.

MR. WECHSLER: I have been working on that.

MR. BOLUS: Thank you. I'm glad you are doing that because I saw a lady almost

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get hit there this morning so I thought I would come here tonight.

I had a sign on East Mountain, I own the lot where you had it "For Sale" there by the lake, I now own that lot, I had a Trump sign twice it's been taken, okay? So won't tolerate that, but we did have a lot of vandalism over the hall at 305 Fifth Street where we have the Trump headquarters for the Scranton public and the volunteers for Trump and we have had parties there, we've had things going on there, on the second, and you may want to attend this, the miners for Trump, these are the coal miners, are coming cross country and they are going to hold a rally at the hall on Sunday at 2:00, and I think it would good for each and every one of us to remember where we all came from, the pioneers, the grandfathers, the uncles and those that worked in those mines in our These are the miners who have built areas. America and I think we owe them the respect to maybe come over and I'm extending that invitation to all of.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Bolus.

MR. MILLER: Good evening. Miller, Scranton. You know, just to respond to a couple of the comments that Joan stated earlier this evening. You know, I think she really hit it right on the head with a lot of the statements she made in regards to -well, the audit we have been talking about. We have been talking about audits for a long time and I find that kind to be a little ridiculous at this point with the audits, but once she discussed the condition of the roads in the city and how our government fails to realize the importance of making the residents aware of what you intend on doing, what your plan is to solve that problem, I mean, it's something we have been dealing with for a very long time in this community, and the sad part is when you have a city that's in the status we are in and you consistently year after year rely on federal and state funding for projects such as that to pave streets, to repair sidewalks, you just have to really step back and ask yourself is that something that we

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should be proud of? I mean, how pathetic is that we are a city of beggars, that we rely on state and federal government funding consistently?

You know it's been brought up before from this podium by many other speakers in the past, when is the last time the city invested in a project using it's own money? I can't remember any time. All of the hundreds of thousands of dollars that have been pumped into the downtown, it's all state and federal money. A lot of these developers they are not investing a lot of their own money they are using grant money and it just spread around and it's handed out like candy. I mean, it's really comical. You know, we go through the neighborhoods, we have had absolutely zero investment in the neighborhoods. property owners for the conditions of the neighborhoods, the blight that's just taken over excessively. I mean, it really is sad when you really think about it.

And I mentioned before, you know,

Mr. Evans being a realtor he sees it every

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day, it's not a secret to him. Go up and down, when you go down a city block and you see four or five "For Sale" signs in one block, I mean, that doesn't open your eyes? I mean, it really, really isn't something to be proud of.

And then had we look at the national election that we have taking place in the next what 40 some days we realize the importance of that and what's really at stake and I hope the residents of this city understand how important it is because believe is it or not that election has an awful lot to do with the future of this city because the federal government really has an impact on what we do, not their grant money and all of the other nonsense we rely on, but their ability to come in and assist us and put their minds to work and help us come up with a plan because obviously this isn't working. You know, the same plans that we have listened time and time again haven't lead us anywhere. The Amoroso plan is a suicide mission, Mr. Courtright said to put forward a plan, and at this point this

council as a whole has yet to come forward with a plan because we rely on this council to lead not just the mayor. You know, the mayor has his vision and then council has to have a vision and we have yet to really hear a clear vision from this council. Your job isn't to back the mayor, that's what we have here. You have a council majority that feels their obligation is to back the mayor. No, your obligation is to back the 70,000 people that live in this community from the oldest resident all the way down to the youngest child and you haven't done that.

You know, I really want to call out Mr. Gaughan because I really appreciate him initiating the issue in regards to the agenda, the backup to the agenda, because it's my understanding that you are going to put it online finally and let the residents have the opportunity to go on there and view it and that's something that's been discussed in this chamber for a few years now and I have to really thank you for that and give you credit for stepping up. That's leadership. That's an example that when you

believe in something and you believe in putting people first that's -- those are the things you do, and I know a lot of people appreciate that and so to have the ability to look at the backup and have that transparency that's an example of transparency right there, and we have had a lack of it in this chamber for a few years now.

You know, and I just really hope moving forward these are the types of things we are going to see more of. You know, it's only one small thing, we have long way to go, and as we get into budget season and different things that are going to come up I really, really hope that the residents of this city are going to be on your mind because our future is at stake here and this election season is vital and I hope people do come out to vote, as I said, and really pay close attention to these candidates because there is are really huge difference between the two. We have a political insider who for 30 years did absolutely nothing for the city and yet she comes here

asking for our votes as an alleged
Scrantonian, and then we on the other
spectrum a businessman who tells it likes it
is, who is going to come with realistic
solutions, who is going to brings jobs back,
he's going to help this country once and for
all and that's what we need. Democrats,
Republican and Independents all need to come
together and put us first for a change.

cancel their meeting, which they did not have any legal notice that I noticed, the people were locked out of the say at that meeting if it was actually held this evening.

A quick question for Mr. Rogan, which will require a yes or no answer, is there a statute of limitations regarding seeking payment on unpaid CDBG loans?

MR. ROGAN: I would have to ask
Attorney Hickey regarding the legal
question.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Maybe during Fifth Order we could get that. At the SSA meeting, the Scranton Sewer Authority meeting, on the rights and ways that was held at the former Central High School a view weeks ago, it was stated that properties having storm and/or combined storm and sewer lines but without rights-of-way had been identified. My question to you is will the city be soliciting rights-of-way for the storm water only lines and will we be guaranteeing the return to original condition should the city need to access any

of these lines?

MR. WECHSLER: The Sewer Authority is keeping the combined lines.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I know that I'm asking but they said they have identified all of the lines.

MR. WECHSLER: The city won't have to get into those because it's going to be part of the transaction. The combined lines are going to be part -- the Pennsylvania

American Water --

MS. SCHUMACHER: We'll talk about it later because they are not all combined --

MR. WECHSLER: Well, that's ---

MS. SCHUMACHER: And those will be ours, okay? Next, I would like to talk about initiatives that appear to be stagnant. My number one favorite is reassessment and, Mr. Evans, at the first council meeting of June this year you stated, "I'm in favor of a countywide reassessment. We have to get that done. I also favor that we should put on the county to act if they don't act then should take them to court. It's that simple because our

property owners are getting crushed. It's not fair to them, it's not fair to us, it's not fair. We are not going to have the growth we need and the equitable tax base we need if we don't have a reassessment and I will personally, I'll guarantee you over the next few months, I will be visiting the Court Administration building and the commissioners to make our case for reassessment."

Has it occurred?

MR. EVANS: No, because every time I wanted to go to the meeting they would change the time and it didn't work with my schedule but I'm am going there. I'm going to try to arrange a meeting with one of the commissioners myself first before I go over. I want to get some feedback from one of the commissioners.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Do you have an estimated time?

MR. EVANS: Hopefully I'll get over in the next couple of weeks and make my visit over there, but I stand by that statement, and if they don't want to

1 cooperate then we should sue them and take them to court. 2 3 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, I agree. Results of the analysis, this is number two, 4 5 results of the analysis of the actual cost of trash collection. Have these been 6 received and if not when will the results be 7 8 known or will we have to wait for the 2017 9 budget request? 10 MR. EVANS: That study is ongoing so 11 we haven't had any feedback yet. 12 MS. SCHUMACHER: The study is what? 13 MR. EVANS: Is ongoing. We haven't 14 gotten any results back yet. MS. SCHUMACHER: It shouldn't seem 15 16 to be that difficult, but number three, the 17 condemnation policy. When will legislation 18 revising this procedure be coming to council? 19 Well, the administration 20 MR. EVANS: 21 should be coming in possibly next Thursday 22 and to follow that would be a review of the 23 condemnation policy. 24 MS. SCHUMACHER: Do you expect to occur before the end of the year? 25

MR. EVANS: Well, you know, we are 1 2 looking at it ourselves internally. 3 MR. WECHSLER: I would assume that that will not be done this year. 4 5 MS. SCHUMACHER: That's been years that we have been talking about it. 6 MR. EVANS: Well, it will be study. 7 8 It will be looked at finally after rental 9 registration is done. That was the plan all 10 along to get that out of the way and go 11 right to the condemnation policy. 12 MS. SCHUMACHER: Next one, storm 13 water fee, will we see this prior to the 14 receipt of the 2017 budget? MR. WECHSLER: No. because a 15 16 decision of the Sewer Authority is probably 17 coming next Thursday so we don't know, you 18 know, what the status of it is and I don't 19 believe that we have storm water fees in 20 2017. 21 MS. SCHUMACHER: But the contract 22 was let to come up with recommendations; 23 right? 24 MR. WECHSLER: I thought your 25 question was is there going to be a fee?

1 MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah. 2 MR. WECHSLER: No, I don't think 3 there is going to be a fee in 2017. MS. SCHUMACHER: No. no. no. 4 5 that was not the question then. I assume, I did assume it would be in the 2017 budget, 6 7 but if not what my question was, if I may go 8 back, is will we see the results of the 9 contract that was let? MR. WECHSLER: The answer to that is 10 11 always, yes, you always get to see the 12 results of whatever comes in. 13 MS. SCHUMACHER: We don't hear 14 everything, but --15 MR. WECHSLER: Well, if we get it, 16 you get it, I know that. 17 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, you know, I 18 still have a concern that a few years ago we had a Washington -- or a Wall Street West 19 20 initiative that was failed and I have an 21 ongoing feeling that we are going to end up 22 Newark West. 23 MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, council. 24 Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer. On that 25 sewer issue, I mentioned last week that it

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would be interesting to explore a plan of getting this sewer system, the storm sewer system off of people's properties and, I mean, it would be troubling to know that some day might be get a knock on a door and told you can't live there anymore or whatever, or they have to come in and do major construction on your property and have it all torn up, some of these construction outfits also we had the lady about a year or two ago with tooth brushes and some light bulbs, broken light bulb socket where it screws in and so forth so, you know, it's a good time to start to at least look into it and see. I mean, years back I bought my house and I thought because the trolley tunnel ran under it that I would be safe from mining that I have a big arch of bedrock under my house. Somehow somebody went up there and mined on top of -- on top of the tunnel so you can't win, you know.

Once again I'd like to mention

for outlying communities. When you write

them please consider that yeah, we all have

our problems with management, but we have 35 percent of tax exempt properties with little hope of having any say as to whether they are given a tax exemption to begin with and a lot of times it seems awfully sloppy and disheveled the way that it gets granted. We have a junkyard who used building material down on Providence Road, they're tax exempt, it was owned by a religious cult or something or former, you know, come on. Do they really need a tax exemption for something like that and to have a bunch of the old iron railings and whatever sitting around.

And, once again, how much money has been lost at hotels and developers where their plans didn't come to fruition and they were overly optimistic and 15 or 20 years something turns totally around like the mall. I'd like to see a retail space just simply because it's very hard, I can only imagine if you didn't have a car and the ability to get up to Commerce Boulevard or somewhere like that, I mean, what do you do if you need a pair of shoes with so many

stores just closed down there that all you could get is a pair of sneakers or whatever.

And, once again, finally, the police apprehended a big time burglar on our street and harump but it's -- I'm glad he off the streets it seems like he has been hitting everybody for a whole year now and we really need police resources to put where they belong and that's apprehending people like or controlling them, possibly catch them even if takes unmarked vehicles. Let them use their own vehicle some night and give them a little stipend for it because if you are breaking the law on that respect you probably have a little bit of radar.

And I'd like to remind council once again we have winter coming and we have the bridge issues so some kind of equipment should be bought to clear those bridges.

That's not a good way to get the town if you have to walk across the bridge. They are piled up with two feet of ice. And, finally, I'll make it quick, recycling in my neighborhood if we have a lot of snow it's not acceptable to have eight or ten weeks

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without recycling being picked up. It's just too much. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?

MR. PERRY: Yes, just a couple of things. First, I'd like to thank the engineering department, we had a work session before tonight's meeting specifically on pave cuts. Pave cuts is a hot topic. Anybody who does any time anywhere in the city just, you know, there is just a lot of them going on right now. And, Ms. Hodowanitz, I think you brought up that citizens were out of the loop a lot, and nine times out of ten we're out of the loop a well where we are with that process of the pave cuts and I think we got a lot of that cleared up, and I know some might have colleagues even brought up the point of getting that information to us ahead of time so if we do have questions that are put before us we can not only give you the

answer on will paving be done or when will the pave cuts be filled, but we can actually give you a decent timeline on where are they in the scope of the project, because I think that's where the missing pieces were on our end. We see the work being done, just like you see the work being done, but you come up with us and you give us a question there is a pave cut that's been there for over a month. There's a pave line, it's at the corner of Cedar and Duncan and we're running around and doing our research and we aren't able to find out exactly where that is and where it is on the scope of the work to be filled in permanently.

A couple of key points that we did
learn from this meeting was they have 60 to
70 pave cuts, once they get to that number
that's the magic number and that's when they
go back and that's when they fill in
everything permanently. I believe it was
said, you know, it's not four, it's no five,
it's not ten of them. To make it
financially just doable they do 60 they get
them all done and it's over. They are

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followed up and they are very little -- once they are completed and permanently done there is very little problems that we have after that. It's just when do we get to that point of permanent completion, I think that's what we are all suffering with, and I'll let some of my colleagues talk more on that as well.

Secondly, I sent a request out to DNC about the camera situation at the Steamtown Mall and the Marketplace, and I'm just going to read a little bit from this letter that I got. This was sent on September 27. "We were extremely sad to hear about the recent incident at the Marketplace at Steamtown garage -- " and, of course, this is talking about the mugging that took place a couple of weeks back. a new member of the City of Scranton and the community we felt the impact of this event deeply and do not want it to distract from the great process in downtown Scranton. Consistent with our preexisting plans, we have made security a priority and the follow measures including finalizing and

renegotiation of the security contract that was assigned to the community development properties, Scranton, Inc., by the receiver at close of concession. Inspecting existing security cameras within the former Scranton Parking Authority garages, and analyzing camera enhanced validation and control systems of our scope for new parking garage equipment.

Steamtown 300, LLC, has informed us that operating security cameras exist within the Marketplace at Steamtown garage, although, regrettably the incident occurred in a blind spot of the cameras. We will continue to work through ABM parking services, our day-to-day manager, to implement best management practices on security-related issues in the garage."

So just to sum that up, there are cameras but this particular incident happened in the blind shot but they are continuing to look at do they need more cameras, do they need enhanced cameras, do they need to replace cameras.

And, Mr. Reed, what I would like to

over to them, if possible maybe this Monday, if available, I would like just to tour the facility of the garages and the mall parking area of exactly the security that's in place and maybe speak with the operation's manager on any kind of proposal they make because there is always going to be blind spots and there's going to be something but just to give a better answer on exactly what happened and their direction, and if you could get back to me on that that would be fantastic.

And, lastly, I believe Mr. Dobrzyn hit on this earlier but I also want to comment on it, I just want to thank the Scranton Police, they apprehended a burglar that was in no short words, there is really no easy way to say this, was a one-man crime spree in this area. He was hitting up cars, homes, multiple businesses and this was going on and on and sometimes the same place multiple times and it's a big relief I know in my community that this guy has been caught and, you know, is being held and, you

know, he will get his trial, but we are very happy to have him caught and, again, just thank the Scranton Police for taking care of business. That's all I have today.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, a couple of items that were brought up, regarding the OECD loans, the request was made to OECD for the entire loan portfolio and where that stands. I did talk to Linda Aebli regarding that. It is going to take a little while to put that together because it is an extensive number of loans over the last few decades.

Regarding a statute limitations for legal recourse, I will inquire with OECD Solicitor Attorney Hickey regarding that issue to see if there is a statute of limitations for that issue.

Echoing much of what Councilman

Perry mentioned regarding our meeting

earlier today, I would also like to thank

John Hazzouri and John Pocius for coming in

and passing on additional information to us

about how pave cuts are managed in the City

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of Scranton. From most of the complaints that I have received from residents, it isn't so much after the pave cuts are completed and restorations are completed, now that does happen and I do know Mr. Hazzouri has been very responsive when we received complaints on that end, but the complaint that I receive more and I see more in the community is a street is torn up and it's temporary filled and then it sits and it sits and it sits and if it goes through the winter, I mean, they're putting salt and they're running plows over those roads it gets worse and worse. I know it's not a city road, but Washburn Street last year in the lower part you couldn't even drive down there in the winter because it was in such bad shape.

So one of the things I would like to look into the process of reviewing pave cut legislation is establishing some sort of time guidelines where when work is done for the job to be completed. I understand the blacktop plants close down in the winter, but I think the residents of Scranton are

owed. The roads have to be, you know, they have to be restored prior to the winter.

Too many people have problems getting around to begin with the deterioration of many of our roads. We paved a lot of them this year, a lot more work to do, but when you have a utility that cuts all of them down the streets they are extremely unsafe and when they are left exposed during the winter hollowing down just the roads even further.

I was also here and Councilman Evans will probably talk more about this, I brought this up about a spread sheet or a map of proposed work. As I believe we all had a lot of questions regarding when is this project going to start, when is this project going to finish and with the city paving it's easy, you know, it's done within the city. Unfortunately, the frustrating thing with any of the utility work is it's not done by the City of Scranton and we are really at the mercy of these contractors and, you know, there has to be a better way so I am very encouraged with some of the information we got from the meeting today.

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I'm very happy to hear that in my neighborhood that a very large project is finally going to be paved throughout the Hyde Park and Tripps Park section of West Scranton, blocks and blocks of roads have been torn up for months and it was so bad that I even take a different route to go home from my mother's house. So I'm really looking to for ward to getting those paved.

And finally, on a more lighthearted note, anyone in Scranton that's gone to either West Scranton High School, which I have, or Scranton High School, which I believe Councilman Gaughan went, knows about the battle of the bell game, and I'm very pleased to report that West Scranton did, indeed, win the bell back this year so I want to give a shout out to West Scranton Invaders for the win and while the game was played well by both sides, the bell is back in West Side where it belongs, and that is all. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Evans.

MR. EVANS: Thank you. Briefly on the paving, yes, we did request a spread

street, I think that's going to be very helpful to see the entire scope of work for the entire coming year so we know exactly when the pave cuts are going to happen and the second phase happens and when the final restoration is done. I know sometimes it's a moving target, but at least we have something to work on when citizens come before us we'll be able to tell them exactly what's going on in that particular street or what's planned on another street before coming here.

On other another issue, over the last two years you may have heard me at times rail against different facets of city government, but it's a culture that in many ways is ingrained within the walls of this building and not necessarily in a good way. This should not be an indication that I don't believe in government, because I do, all civilized societies should have some form of government. Government, if nothing else, allows us to act collectively to solve problems but it's the way we go about solving the problem that may be at issue. I

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have talked numerous times about the systemic problems that exist with the local government, but it is not necessarily the people who work in enforcing that problem. In many of the cases, if not most, the system they work in may actually be a larger problem. So, yes, maybe we can lease the Parking Authority for 30 years and we could probably sell the Sewer Authority and we can even get out of Act 47 and distressed status, we may even be fiscally sound for the short term, but if we don't change the systems, if we don't truly reinvent this government into something that it currently isn't then at some point we will be right back where we started, broke and broken.

So over the next few weeks, and even months, I'm going to periodically discuss further the concept of reinventing this government. One of the models I discuss early on we call the entrepreneurial government, a description that looks for government to use it's limited resources in new ways and maximize productivity and effectiveness.

While this subject was first brought to our attention in the early 90's by author David Osborne, it's time for another look and for many involved in local government a first look so I hope you will find my future comments somewhat interesting and worthy of consideration and at least food for thought. That's all I have tonight. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you, just a couple of things. First of all, I received a complaint from a few neighbors, dump trucks are going up and down Mineral Avenue in Pinebrook and they dumping in the area of an old auto site. The trucks start at seven in the morning, they continue past 6 p.m. and they are dumping sometimes seven days a week nonstop so I would like to find out who gave permission for this dumping since that neighborhood is classified as light industrial and according to zoning regulations dumping is not allowed there, and a recent sign according to the neighbors was posted for no dumping in that area,

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however, the dumping continues so I would like clarification on that.

Also, last week I mentioned that we sent a correspondence to PPL for them to trim the trees on Phelps and Division Street. We did receive a response from Elaine Roberts, who is the regional affairs director. She said that PPL does not trim for streetlights that are owned by the municipality. Phelps Street has one street light on the block that the city can trim safely. The electric line was recently trimmed and is clear. Division Street is off road and they did a hot spot trim here earlier this year and the wires buried in trees are telephone and TV wires so we did send additional correspondence to the DPW director to see if they can go out and possibly take care of that problem.

Mrs. Reed, did we receive any information that I requested from OECD at the last public hearing last week?

MS. REED: No.

MR. GAUGHAN: Okay. I'm going to ask that we send an additional request, I

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asked a few questions about the action plan, this year's action plan so if we could resend that. I would like the answers by no later than Thursday of next week. All that information should be contained on a simple spreadsheet so I'm not sure what the holdup is.

In regards to the caucus or the work session that we held in the Governor's room, first of all, and I did express it to my colleagues last week, I was disappointed that the work session was not held in council chambers for a number of different First of all, and as my colleagues reasons: have mentioned, the pave cut problem in the city has been one in which we have all gotten complaints about over the last two and a half to three years. I know I get at least one or two e-mails and phone calls every single week about some part of the city so I think it would have been beneficial to have that caucus held here so the residents could be informed rather than hearing secondhand information.

The second reason is for those

residents who did show up to the caucus in the Governor's room it is awful hard to hear if you are sitting in the outskirts of the room. We could hear fine, but there is no microphone in front of us so it is difficult for the public to hear that information so in the future I would just hope that we could hold these important work sessions in council chambers, have them be televised so that the people can see what's going on.

As it relates to the actual work session, you know, I think I'm more concerned and more confused now than I was before the meeting. You know, it's clear to me that part of the ordinance are not being followed and not being enforced, some parts are being enforced, you know, kind of by the paving inspector's discretion and the city engineer's discretion, which I have concerns about. One of the things in the ordinance is the work order inspection tracking ticket which I asked numerous questions about that and I'm still concerned about the record keeping in that office. One of the things that was discussed was if there is a problem

with a pave cut and the inspector goes out and looks at it there is no documentation, he does not keep documentation of that. He just gives a verbal warning or speaks to whoever the contractor is and they take care of it, and that's an issue because if the utility company continues to have these, you know, problems with the pave cuts and there is no documentation, you know, that just doesn't make any sense from a good standard business practice.

The other comment that I had been concerned about is that, you know, when I press these gentlemen on whether or not the ordinance is being followed and the work order inspection tracking ticket they said that they weren't sure what was in the final version of the ordinance. They just kind of had a chance to read it. That's very concerning. Everybody should be reading the ordinances before they are passed and when they are passed to make sure they know what they are enforcing so for some reason there is a disconnect there. I'm just concerned about the procedures and controls that are

in place and the other comment in the work session was that we should trust the utility companies because they have their own inspection process, which I object to.

That's why we have an inspector. I'm not saying that the utility companies are doing anything wrong, but the reason that you have someone in city hall whose job is dedicated to that is to make sure that they are protecting the city's interest. I don't really care what the utility company does.

I only care that whoever works in city hall

We did receive a very detailed letter from a resident with lot of detailed questions that I will be submitting, I have my own questions that we didn't have enough time back there and some of them will require documentation so I will be submitting that. And that's all I have this week. Thank you.

is making sure that everything is inspected

and the cities infrastructure is protected.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. Gaughan. In regard tos the reason why

the work session was held in the Governor's

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room, I think Mr. Gaughan answered his own auestion. This was the introduction meeting to evaluate this ordinance, and as Mr. Gaughan stated, we have more questions than we have to develop so I'm not sure that this -- these work sessions are arranged for information for the council so we could get a handle on what we have to do and questions that we have to answer, and in my opinion in order to get the best information from Mr. Pocius and from Mr. Hazzouri the meeting to me was better in the Governor's room, and I manage people all the time. I have 35 years of experience in management and I kind of have an ability that I think to get information from people for the best use and our goal was to get the information about the pave cut program, and I think as time goes on and we get a better handle on it I think we will be more prepared to discuss it with the public because there was some things, as you stated, and in private industry contractors do a lot of self-certification but there also is a process for that to happen and I have not

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gotten a feeling based on our meeting tonight that that process is 100 percent established.

The contractors that were mentioned

are certified, they do have track histories of quality performances, but I would like to see little bit more documentation that they provide to us, that they certify their work that it meets the requirements and that gives us the opportunity and I think is something that we should make sure is defined and refined in the new ordinance as you work on it, is that the city does do core sample testing to verify the work that's being done, and just to get a level of confidence in the certifications that the contractors provided. I think it's impractical to have the pave cut inspector go out and inspect 100 percent of this work. In sampling -- in a sample like that we want to make sure it's as good as the sample that you have taken. It doesn't tell you that down the street it wasn't something different and so I think we have to refine that process a little bit better.

What I was impressed upon this evening was the fact that the pave cut inspector is following the fee schedule that's listed in the ordinance for pave cut dollars and surprisingly it was reported that we had budgeted about \$278,000 for pave cut proceeds and right now as of this September we are almost at \$481,000, which is a significant amount of money for us.

Also, it was reported that over the course of the next few years the utilities are going to be doing major upgrades in the city especially trying to replace water and gas lines I think they said they were in place since prior to 1989, they want to replace all of those lines so this is something that is going to be an ongoing problem and that's why we do want to look at the ordinance.

Our goal was to improve the old ordinance in 2015 and I think now we have an opportunity to refine that a little bit in terms of what the industry standards are and just following through and make that it happens because I also am concerned that we

aren't getting the inch and a half milling requirement that is there to make sure that we are getting our two inches of paving they are supposed to get and that I think will be cleaned up.

Even though it's not a state road, we did bring up the question of why the manhole covers up on Main Avenue are such a problem and it was discussed that one of the utilities did not raise theirs in time and the state paved the road, so what I got out of that is I guess we have to put pressure on PennDOT to get those replaced either involving the utility or doing it themselves because, as we said in the meeting, those are permanent potholes now on Main Avenue and it's not acceptable that those are there, we just had the roads paved.

I did receive a complaint this week or a question about a street light on Alder Street that I will be getting the information then to get with that and I clean that up, and just one thing back on the pave cuts, I just checked my list, there was a representative, field representative

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from Pennsylvania American Water at the meeting who came voluntarily to offer some input to the meeting and he told us that we could contact him at any time if we had any problems or projects that he would come here, so I was happy to see him there.

That's it.

MR. GAUGHAN: Just if I may, I have two dish additional items. I would just respectfully disagree with my colleague about having the caucuses in the Governor's room. Look, you know, this isn't just for our own information, our information is the public's information so I don't see the difference between having it there or having it here and having it televised. A lot of what we on back there is hard to relay secondhand to the public so it would just make more sense to have it out here and have it televised so that people can understand what's going on.

And the second thing is that I forgot to mention earlier in my comments, a woman had written a letter to Senator Blake, we got a copy of it about the flooding that

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occurred throughout the city on July 30, and in Senator Blake's reply for this woman he said that he has forwarded her letter onto his contacts at Scranton City Hall as they are continuing to collect data and total damages caused by the flooding events in the last week of July. So I would like to find out, Mrs. Reed, if you could tomorrow who the contacts are in city hall, who is collecting this information about the flooding, and I'd like to see that the data and the total damages that have been collected so far because I don't think that's been publicized about where people can call or who they should contact if they have that damage to the property so I would like be updated on that. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Just, and I don't want to go back and forth on this, but as council president I have the responsibility to the council and to the public to make the decision that's best, in my opinion, in getting the best information on the city and if council -- other council members disagree with my decisions they are always free to

bring that up and if there is enough members that want to overrule me then I evaluate it, but there will be -- in the future there will be a work sessions that will not be out here.

MR. GAUGHAN: If that's the case then I won't be a part of them. If it's that important then if it's going to be back there I'm not going to attend unless it's in these chambers for the reasons that I stated.
