FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS'

PARTICIPATION. Cara Seitzinger.

MS. SEITZINGER: Good evening,
Council. My name is Cara Seitzinger. I
have a letter that my husband wrote to
Pennsylvania Insurance Company as well a
letter that I wrote on his behalf, on our
family's behalf. I have a copy for each of
you if that's okay that I give it to Lori?
I have never done this before.

MR. GAUGHAN: That's okay, you are doing a great job. City employees don't come to meetings. I'm going to read my letter and Mark's parallels pretty much the same.

"Dear Insurance Commissioner: I am currently an employee of the City of Scranton and my husband, Mark G. Seitzinger, is currently a patient of Delta Medix in Scranton, Pennsylvania. I am the insured policyholder of the plan issued to my employer by Highmark Northeast PA Blue Cross First Priority Life Insurance Company,

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hereinafter referred to as Highmark, and my husband and children are named insured on this policy. Currently Delta Medix is not participating in any of the Highmark products due to an ability to reach a contract agreement.

Mark has been under the care of Dr. Donald Preate after being diagnosed with cancer on February 1, 2007, at 29 years old and one month before our wedding. Following two recurrences of cancer, subsequent surgeries and countless painful cancer treatments he was five plus years cancer free until his scheduled six-month checkup on August 24, 2015, revealed there may be a recurrence of his cancer. He is currently being worked up under a continuation of care and will have surgery and a biopsy on September 1, 2015. However, this agreement expires at midnight on September 2, 2015, less than 12 hours after this scheduled surgery.

This is a hardship on many counts.

First and foremost, Highmark has advised
that Mark can no longer be seen by the

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specialist with whom we have developed a relationship and trust with over the past eight plus years. Additionally, Highmark has provided a list of in-network urologists, none of whom are located in the Scranton area. I personally contacted the office of Dr. John Minella of Geisinger Health system, urologist, oncologist in the Wilkes-Barre area last week and was advised that my husband's records must be reviewed by a nurse, triaged and that the earliest appointment was not available until November. I then contacted Dr. Michael Rittenberger, also a urologist/oncologist located in Kingston and after providing all information was told by the scheduling department we don't see Delta Medix, and I was promptly hung up on.

This is a woefully inadequate network present by Highmark and I'm at a lost as to how the Insurance Commission has not investigated this matter thus far or intervene on behalf of the thousands of residents of both Scranton and Northeastern Pennsylvania who are currently subscribers

with Highmark.

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By way of background, after the original cancer diagnosis Mark was on a three-month protocol testing and cystoscopy for two years and if there was no recurrence of the cancer during that time period he would finally graduate to the six-month protocol, which is was finally able to achieve two and one half years ago through the first rate care that he received from Dr. Preate and Delta Medix. Even if he was cancer free, that six month protocol would remain in place for the rest of his life due to his young age when diagnosed, the number of recurrences, and the type of the cancer that he suffers from. As such, we have been vigilant and we have never missed or failed to schedule his appointments, cancer treatments or testing.

On August 24, Mark's 39 birthday, we were literally shaken to the core with the news that his cancer may have returned, yet we were firm in our resolve that there were countless in this area who are being disenfranchised by the practices of Highmark

and so are now publically speaking out on behalf of ourselves, our children, who are also insured through my policy, and have treated by other physicians within the Delta Medix group for other medical issues, and any other policyholder that may not have the time, strength or the courage to come forward.

Additionally, I myself suffered a neck injury in a motor vehicle accident and traveling long distances for my husband's care is extremely difficult for me. I will have to take days off from work, make arrangements for our children much like most families in the area. My husband is now expected to disrupt his oncology care, travel a great distance and wait almost three months for the care because Highmark cannot reach a contract with my provider.

As the director of insurance for the State of Pennsylvania I implore you to address this issue with NEPA Blue Cross, First Priority Life Insurance Company, now known as Highmark leadership so that we, the members, can have adequate network

specialists to provide care for the members
living not only in Scranton, but all of
Northeastern Pennsylvania. I await response
and thank you for your prompt attention to
this matter.

On a personal note, many of you know that Mark began his employment with the city in 2004 and he served the city very well until January of 2013. As you can see the dates here, Mark was on-call all the time 24/7 and he never didn't answer a phone call. Not on our honeymoon, not on a vacation. His first cancer treatment I remember coming out of Moses Taylor, and I can't remember why we had had two cars, but I looked to the right and saw the smoke and I said -- I called and said, "What do you think that is?"

He said, "I don't know."

I said, "Don't even think about it."

Well, of course, it was the fire on Monroe Avenue where the three homes were lost, his story is a little different than -- I don't know, I'll have to check with Officer Mike Costanzo, he said he was

stopped and told they needed him, he got there, the porch collapsed and he wouldn't drive over the firehose because it's a \$1,000 fine in the State of Pennsylvania -- or in the City of Scranton.

His third and last set of cancer treatments towards the end of that year I remember by then he could get very sick from the treatment, so he would take a couple of days from work off so that he could sleep and rest and the phone rang at 5:30 in the morning, it was Director Ray Hayes saying there was a fire downtown, we will be taking down the building. And I heard Mark's response, "Over my dead body."

He got out of bed, and for 15 hours every day he was at that fire, and it went on for days because he was afraid of the collapse zone. And then last week, trying to keep our minds off it we took our children out to dinner at Russell's and he was perplexed through the whole dinner, and I figured he was thinking about that, and as we started to drive he said, "I think I'm going to drive down by the fire."

I said, "Oh."

And I didn't even know there was a fire, and I work for the city. That's disgraceful. He said they called a mayday and he said -- I said, "Well, did everybody get out?"

And he said, "Yes, as far as I know, but I just want to make sure that that collapse zone is wide enough."

I don't know a man who is more honorable and honest than my husband and I just think about he is so private, so many people who have reached out to us said that they never knew because he never showed it, he just did his job. He went back to work today after having surgery and being sick yesterday and the day before, but I think this problem with High mark speaks to a larger problem, as the bigger hospitals come in they see the quality of care in this area is deplorable.

Many people said, commented that I should take him out of the area. I did that, I took him to Johns Hopkin's when he had his first recurrence. Johns Hopkin's

found nothing on that three-month checkup.

I brought him back here and Dr. Preate found something so I just -- I'm asking you as councilmen to be leaders and to send a letter along with myself to stand in support of us and countless residents of Scranton and Northeastern Pennsylvania because it starts with one voice and to ask the mayors, council men, people across this area, across Northeastern Pennsylvania to stand with you and to try and get help for everyone.

I'm so grateful for our health insurance. I mean, I work for health insurance, that's why I work. People complain about it, I have never complained, I really haven't, and I'm not now. My complaint is with the Highmark Delta Medix issue which we did not want to get involved in. And, again, I just thank you for your time and I appreciate any help that you can give us.

MR. EVANS: Cara, first of all -sorry. You speak about Mark and what he is
going through a dozen years I didn't know
that and it goes to speak to the kind of

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person he is. So certainly we will, I'm sure we can all agree to send a letter tonight and do it as soon as we can.

MR. GAUGHAN: And our prayers are with your family.

MS. SEITZINGER: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: I had the privilege of working with Mark on several different issues and I'm sure we can put something together and get it out as soon as possible.

MR. SEITZINGER: And for anybody that doesn't know, Delta Medix themselves have uploaded a letter, a sample letter, for citizens if they would kindly write to Highmark and ask that Highmark reconsider. The quality of care that we get here, it's just -- it's very difficult for people to go out of the area, people work very hard, and as Mark said when we talked to the newspaper, which for him to do that was business, that's just not the kind of guy Mark Seitzinger is, we figure somebody always had it worst than we have and that's why he did it. So I really appreciate it any help. Thank you very much.

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MR. EVANS: Do we have to make a motion or anything at this point or should we just talk about it?

MR. WECHSLER: I think if we can access the sample Delta Medix has and just work from that.

Joan Hodowanitz.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, Scranton taxpayer and resident. With regard to Item 3-F, July controller's report, I'm not sure you have had the opportunity to look at it closely, but there were two items that were charged against the contingency fund, this is on page 15, Miller Bean Funeral Home \$10,802.59. Cathedral Cemetery, \$3,040. Now, only funeral associated with a city employee in the month of July that I'm aware of was the funeral for Patrolman Wilding who passed away on July 12. Now, this surprised me because I was under the foolish assumption that city employees, especially police and firefighters who go into harm's way, are protected by things like workmen's compensation and life insurance.

I did just a quick check, and this the 2013 audit, page 96, workmen's compensation claims budgeted \$3,700,680, actual \$2,642,281, so at least in the past we had workmen's compensation and workmen's compensation will pay for both injury and death, there are claim benefits.

And life insurance, this is the 2015 operating budget under the Bureau of Police and life/disability insurance the 2015 budget was \$300,000. Assuming that this is the funeral for Patrolman Wilding, some concerning questions come to my mind. First, was Patrolman Wilding covered by workmen's compensation an/or life insurance as a city employee? If not, why not? Why would we send an employee into harm's way without covering him financially. Two, is this the first time the city has paid funeral expenses for an employee? Did we pay for Captain James Robeson who died on January 6, 2008. If not, why not?

According to a story in the
Times-Tribune, four of our firefighters came
close to being killed last week during the

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Sandone Warehouse fire, had they been killed would they very have been covered financially? I don't know. Have we set a precedent by paying for this funeral for all city employees in the future an employee dies then we are going to use tax revenues to pay for their funeral because they are not covered or if they are covered is this in addition to their entitlements?

I would like to know, and I have asked in a Right-to-Know request what is the written policy the benefits that we provide to our employees and under what circumstances do we use tax revenues to pay for funerals? I have never heard of this before in any city. If a soldier dies on the battlefield his funeral is paid for under his servicemen's group life insurance, SGLI. The unit does not pay for his funeral. I don't know if any of you have heard of such a situation, but I'd certainly like to know how the contingency fund was used to pay for a funeral in the month of July, and I do know that Wildman's funeral was handled by Miller Bean.

1 Other issues not that you are all 2 back, in future weeks I will be asking you 3 about the status of the 2014 audit. Has SP & Company given us any statuses? 4 5 MR. WECHSLER: Not at this type. MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, because we 6 have paid them \$20,000, which is half of 7 8 what we gave them under the contract. Do we 9 have any status on how soon we are going to 10 see the 2016 budget? 11 MR. WECHSLER: No. 12 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. How about 13 the rental registration ordinance, are we 14 making any progress on updating that? That's in litigation 15 MR. EVANS: 16 right now, that's the problem. MS. HODOWANITZ: So that's frozen. 17 18 How about the sale of the Parking Authority 19 and the Sewer Authority or the sale or the 20 leasebacks, make any progress there? 21 MR. WECHSLER: The administration is 22 working on both. 23 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay, and I'll get 24 back to the other things next week, but I 25 would like some kind of response on what

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happened with that funeral and why we have to pay out of tax dollars. Thank you.

> MR. WECHSLER: Ed Klonicki.

MR. KLONICKI: Hello.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Klonicki, could you just state your name, please?

MR. KLONICKI: Edward Klonocki, and I am a property owner in the City of Scranton.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. KLONICKI: My name is Ed Klonicki, and my wife and I have a property on 802 Adams Avenue. It's the corner of Adams Avenue and East Gibson Street. have two apartments there. It's right next to Regional Hospital TCM and Northeast Intermediate school. When we bought the home in 2013, there was a problem with the tenants having a place to park because the hospital and school employees were parking in there and the tenants could not find a place to park. There was a sign that said for parking permit only, so I called the Scranton Police Department because we could not get a spot and our tenants were, you

know -- weren't able to so Officer Anthony
Geida came up and he said to me, "I'd like
to help you out, but it's not properly
posted."

There was only one properly posted sign, the other ones there were not visible enough, which you will see in one of those pictures there, and I'll go through them in a minute with you. So I talked to the guy at the DPW and he was doing the job for quite some time but he said they didn't have the money to buy the material to put the signs up so, he did go he tell me two more signs put up at that point. We had to get the budget passed, I guess it had something to do with the budget with him getting materials with the signs.

I make all of our tenants get parking permits and I have the sheet at my home that when by tenants move in I bring them, I literally bring them to the DPW building and make them get permits -- (unintelligible) was enforcing it. I actually talked to Officer Gieda and Officer Bachman, he handles that. They said there

isn't anything we can do until we get all of the signs up of. The guy came and got a couple up. I then myself, since I'm trying to enforce this with the people in the area arguing with people that weren't living there that worked for the hospital and things like that, I went down to the DPW and asked for a parking permit for myself. We worked on the house, I have to do things there, so I mean, it's not -- and I just got a ticket myself which is now I'm fighting it and pleading not guilty over at the magistrate's office.

I took our deed, I showed her we have bills that common areas because of the fact that it's a two apartment, you have to have a light and I have to have some utilities in our name. I took them over there, I took the deed. She said that there is -- no, she didn't say that. What she said was that, "You did not live there, you can't have a parking permit."

Took the ticket down, showed her the ticket. Sorry, still can't help you. So I was informed that there was kind of a glitch

in the ordinance for saying that homeowners if they don't live there they cannot get a parking permit so that's where we are with that. There is a woman who drives -- she's a nurse, she lives in Nanticoke, she cursed at me and did several things she then has a parking permit in her car that was -- I know because Officer Gieda ran her license plate and found out that see lived in Nanticoke and she worked at the Mercy Hospital. I seen her there, she was a nurse.

Also, on the parking permits it's supposed to indicate the address of the block, not the home, but the block. Let's say you will see in the picture there, visitors pass or like the tenant's pass. The tenant's pass has an address and it has a license number. The pass for their visitor does not have a license number and it has, you know, a date.

When some people are parking in there now that are using parking permits from other areas they push the parking permit, which is a piece of paper, down underneath the window so you could only see

partial day and parking permit for the city, parking permit for the City of Scranton so you really don't know which car it was in. I mean, that's another glitch that this parking permit situation has, and like I said, from time-to-time I have to go there and I have to paint, I have to go there every three days to take care of the boiler, we need to do something to get this ordinance straightened out.

If you look at the piece of paper, these are pictures taken from this morning. The first one is a black Honda, the last four digits of the license plate are 5248. You can see where it clearly says, I have it circled here, it says, "Parking permit only."

No permit in this car. This Venza no parking permit in that either. This Compressor C-230, it's a new Mercedes, there isn't a parking permit in that car either. Now, here is one on East Gibson, it's from Connecticut, no parking pass there either. Now, this next one that you see supposedly I was told this was a fireman in the City of

Scranton, he has a pass there, which you could see, that expired 4-10-15, which is quite a few months ago. The license plate doesn't match, and you can see the other one in the license plate is on that vehicle.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Klonicki, could you just give your full number to Jamie, please, so we can forward these pictures to Chief Graziano and discuss it with them and just take a look at it. Maybe it needs defined or maybe he can explain it to you and to us, you know, why this is happening so if you could give your number to --

MR. KLONICKI: All right, what about the ordinance for letting an owner get a --

MR. WECHSLER: That's we would have to talk to him and we would have to take a look at that ordinance and see if it needs to be fine tuned. To be honest with you, this is the first I have heard of a problem like yours.

MR. EVANS: It's usually just the opposite, it's usually people complaining that they got tickets and everybody got a ticket. Since we have had the parking

enforcement people out there, that's been our bigger complaint so not getting tickets is odd for us though, but I think it's time for us to have a talk with Chief Graziano anyway to go over the progress of that program as well as issues like yours with the permit parking, and I think that's a good point you should have almost a guest pass if you are the property owner so you can park there when you are doing work on your house or painting or etc., so I think that's not something that we should look at lightly.

MR. WECHSLER: It only makes sense that you should have the right to park since you own the building and you pay taxes, that only makes sense. We have to fine tune that a little about so we should start working on it, but if you could give your contact information to Jamie we will he get back to you in a few days and let you know our progress. Thank you for taking the time to come down and making us aware of the problem.

Ron Ellman.

MR. ELLMAN: Ron Ellman. I got a surprise, I had no intentions of attacking anybody tonight, and I'm proud to hear the doughboy is still around. I was wondering I have brought some things up and I was told you have to do -- see council about this and council about that, you people are operating under codes that are 50, 60 years old. Why aren't they brought up? Why isn't it brought up to the 21st century for crying out loud. You know, there is lots of them.

During the holiday, your holiday, I tucked to -- I ran into a few people that brought up taxes, I know you guys don't want to talk about it, what was it 2090 foreclosures in the county, 639 in the city. There is things on here that have been here for eight, ten years, dead people on here. Everything is so -- why can't we step up a notch in this city? Who ever heard -- there's a lady in here that's my friend's aunt she died years ago and they tore the house down eight years ago and it's still in here for taxes. This is just -- Mr. Amoroso hasn't done a damn thing since he has been

He hasn't done one thing to help this here. city. Why can't you let him go through here on the big sums of money and see what's going on. He is supposed to be collecting money, I know he is not going to collect anything from Lackawanna College. Well, there is some names on here that owe \$500. They shouldn't be there. There ought to be something -- something that they could do. While I think of it, last month when you people were so intent on giving the \$150,000 away to that new business I heard on my car radio twice there is a company called BusinessLoansNow.com that said they give 50 to 500,000 dollar business loans. Why don't you start telling some of those deadbeats that can't go to bank that get taxpayer money to go to them? If you ever talk to somebody, people are just so fed up and frustrated with what's going on with the waste.

I got a bill for two new shocks on my car. I didn't have it done. It was almost \$1,000 and it was because of the streets. You can't avoid it during the

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winter. I have to fix it, but I just thought I would put it off. These antiquated codes for the city, and I know you guys know what I'm talking about, I'm talking about my neighbor's junky truck parked under my window that nobody would do a thing about. Well, he is taking me to Court for harassment because I have complained. It's your fault that I complained because you are the ones never done nothing about it. There is not a one of you if this truck, this diesel pile of junk was parked under your window and started at 4:00 in the morning it might last day and that would be it. If you had to go sell the house and have this truck sitting in the driveway they would tell you they would give you \$20,000 less.

I talked to someone this morning, I had coffee with someone with 5:30 this morning and we were talking about it and they said sure this truck diminishes the value of the whole neighborhood, parking a Martin bread truck in your driveway. I'll be 80 years old soon, you know, my house

will probably be for sale in a year or two or three. I hope something is done by then about it. I guess I'll just have to do it myself, you know, because one other thing, I thought that the parking garage was supposed to know to be settled in April what they were going to do. There was a company wanting to buy and lease them and so forth, it was in the paper, I thought that they had a date in April they would know what they were going to do with the parking garages; am I not right?

MR. WECHSLER: Right now it's still continuing to be -- I think it's anticipated to be done by the end of the year, and I don't believe it was ever in April.

MR. ELLMAN: I don't remember exactly, but April was stuck in my mind.

MR. WECHSLER: That's maybe when they started the process in earnest, but right now the target is the end of the year.

MR. ELLMAN: Well, you take care of the doughboy for me.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you very much.

MR. ELLMAN: I have seen him. Thank

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you.

MR. WECHSLER: He is at the Trolley museum right now.

Marcus Sanchez? Is there anyone else who wishes to address council?

MS. GAUGHAN: Yes, Councilman. Good evening, gentlemen.

> ALL COUNCIL: Good evening.

MS. GAUGHAN: I'm here usually and I say something positive. I believe the positive part is --

MR. WECHSLER: Excuse me, you have to state your name, please.

MS. GAUGHAN: My name is Mary Gaughan.

> MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MS. GAUGHAN: And usually I say everything positive because I think you fine gentlemen could be the answer to the city. The mall is sold, the city could be looking up, but every day I see people violating a law that was passed by the Pennsylvania: Legislature 2007. Anyone wants to get it, it's the Clean Indoor/Outdoor Air Act. On a consistent basis half the people in town

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violate that law. I took the bus the other day, somebody sat down right next to me and started smoking. I said excuse me, sir, if you want cancer I don't would you please move?

Now, I shouldn't have to say that, and I see a policeman that walks around and you could put a rail and put up a blowup dummy because he sees nothing. His book should be filled. The city's coffers should be filed with fines and they are not. too many homeless people, some of them are gone now because of the Italian festival is coming, and there is cigarette butts all over the city, and I see a business, a major hotel that I looked and I thought the canopy was falling in. I looked and I saw vegetation growing in their steps. I looked and I see a wall that looks like it's going to start falling down. The business makes a lot of money in this city, why are they not responsible for keeping this city looking well?

And, also, I'm a senior citizen and several times I almost got run over by a

the middle of the sidewalk. If there isn't an ordinance there should be one. The same thing with skateboarders. I see on a consistent basis they went into the Renaissance 500 and they are skateboarding, there is big sign there "No skateboarding."

I tried to cross the street in the middle of Lackawanna Avenue where it's a crosswalk, where it says you are supposed to get the right-of-way. Well, do you get it?

No. Tonight I went to cross the street, I'm in the crosswalk, I pushed the button and I have eight seconds to cross the street which is like you usually get 15 or something, and a guy came right and he nearly ran over me because he wanted to make a right turn.

It's my point that this city might not be distressed if the people that want double pensions and want a pension better look around and so what's going on when the three-on-three tournament was on Wyoming Avenue there was a homeless man that I see quite frequently with his back up against the Rite Aid, there was a stream of urine

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coming into the road. I don't know why the police did not see this. There were all young people in town. The man needs help, he needs not to be there and do the children have to see that? And there were groups of Korean young men walking around about ten or 20 in a group, and I know that and I know they were from Korea because they looked on their cell phones -- they didn't speak English and they wanted to know where to go to a restaurant. Now, why did they have to see this? And the poor man, I'm not against him, why doesn't something do something? There are Catholic Social Services, the Salvation Army, the Red Cross, the Lackawanna United Fund. These people should shouldn't be on the streets they should be helped.

And I don't think I want to spend the rest of my life in Allied because I get run over by a bicycle or a skateboarder if the police can't see these things and can't see that sometimes they had the ability to clock cars and motorcycles they'd see that they were going 60 miles per hour down

Lackawanna Avenue. Thank you, gentlemen. I think if people paid attention maybe the money that would come into the city coffers would cause the city not to be distressed any more, and I certainly don't think you fine men are responsible for what's going on, I think you are responsible for trying to do something and better the city. Thank you.

MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council.

Dave Dobrzyn, resident and taxpayer, taxes paid, by the way, fees paid and dog license.

Once again, I'd like to mention, and hopefully somebody from Comcast is watching because ECTV disappears, I'm going to disappear from their roles as a paid customer. I find it kind of egregious and I would like to see them funded and funded adequately and funded annually.

In the paper a few weeks ago the Chamber of Commerce and SLIBCO is trying TO sell the globe store to the county which will then make it a tax exempt institution or building. Once again, we are going to loss a quarter of a million dollars in tax

revenue coming into Scranton and, by the way, the jobs are taken out of there a year or two ago for a new development which they own and I have spoken literally to people who used to work there and they couldn't afford the transportation to get to the new place because they moved it once again to out to the wilderness or what was once wilderness or commons, commons were lands that city or towns might have owned and anybody could walk around as long as they didn't cause any trouble.

Once again, the sewer plant is in the paper, and my prediction is that it will not fair well and cities will subsidize rural areas they are right now. We are subsidizing power delivery to the Poconos. We are paying for line repairs out in the Poconos. We are paying for sewer out in the Poconos by companies that own these lines have bought into the sewer plants and their rates get reduced slightly, which are very high, and if you want 500 foot frontage in front of your house then maybe you deserve to pay it and if you can't pay it find

another situation because I don't have money to pay it for you.

The block grants and the \$150,000 I have a question on those and I read through the material that I was handed and that's okay but are these block grants applied for as apples, oranges or peaches. Is there something else we can do with the money like brown field reclamation from our collieries, things like this. Down in the valley it's a law now that you have backfill and restore the grade and there was a coal operation at the old Baker colliery, now they tore down the trees that finally grew there and they are sitting there as a nice eyesore, culm banks and ash banks and whatever.

And, once again, winter is approaching, don't want to rush it, don't like the bills, but we really need a plan for recycle on the Friday recycling run, every Friday -- nearly every Friday our recycling crew was snatched up to remove snow downtown and the recycling piled up, I said 9 cubic feet, well, three or four weeks ago after we went on vacation I was out in

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the backyard and I thought I'm going to cut the grass and do some things and I opened up this trash barrel and it wasn't wise or anything, it was newspapers. Old trash in addition to the 9 or 12 cubic feet paper that I had stuffed in boxes and hanging around on a less than legal basis practically, I probably would had to take it to court if somebody didn't see it reasonably. And bridge ice removal that has to be done, I know that's a pet peeve of yours. One of those little Bobcats or something like that and that's about as wide as the sidewalk and they need to be cleared. They are totally impassable and, you know, if you hit somebody trying to get across that bridge your life is over for quite some time, you know, and it's just wrong to not have those cleared so thank you and I'll be back and besty as ever. Have a good night.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonian. I guess we don't have a quorum up there for right now but I guess I can speak anyway,

it doesn't really matter I guess. As you know, our good recovery plan calls for a 6 percent hike come January. I think it's going to be 6, 8 percent hike in January. You have done nothing to avoid a tax increase. In fact, you are probably relishing it, and that's not right. You should be doing everything you can to avoid a tax increase in January, but I don't think you are quite able to do it because you are not committed to it.

I mean, oppression of the citizens of Scranton with people going out and giving tickets doesn't really help anything. It fosters people's dislike of the City of Scranton and that's what we are getting. I'm surprised you ain't getting a lot more lawsuits with these nuisance filings you were opposing on people. You are not improving the city one iota. In fact, you are causing a lot of people to leave the city and that's not right either. You should try to encourage people to come to Scranton and point out the good things in Scranton. We do have lot of good things in

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Scranton, best I always said you can be out in five minutes. That was a great thing to have because Scranton is a metropolitan If you have tried to avoid people area. going up Main Avenue you'd go all the way to Carbondale or if you turn around you go all the way to Wilkes-Barre and never find open That's how many people actually live space. alongside of Main Avenue, but for some reason no one in the city ever tried to reach out and ask the legislature to incorporate a city franchise where you could take in some of these small areas. There is no reason for Scranton to have a separate government in Dunmore or a second government from Taylor or a second thing from Old Forge, Dickson City. We have to have a citywide government, even if it has to be countywide, it's the only way you are going to avoid what's happening. The city is going to be taxed out of existence and you are not going to cure anything.

Everything that's in that recovery plan is going to cost the residents of the city more money, not necessarily in taxes

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but in services. Your Sewer Authority bills will rise, your parking, we are giving away millions of dollars in parking revenue. Ιf you sell the parking meters along with parking garages or privatizing, whatever word you want me to use, it's going to take a million, a million and a quarter out of the city every year and revenue from the meters. I don't know how much of the revenue you gave to the banks, but you did do that, too. That was a lot of money we have lost and that money given to the bank didn't help one iota. You couldn't -- you didn't even get a loan from the Scranton bank, you were out there with the same people you borrowed before 8 1/2 percent and if they go out to New York or wherever they are going they get another loan or bond or whatever you want to call it it's going to be like 8 percent or 8 1/2 percent, we are not talking about \$24 million, we are talking about maybe \$55 million. Someone has to pay them debts even though they are extended they still got to be paid.

And I don't see a solution of what

you are doing. No matter what you do you are not going to save the city, there is no way to save it. You have to sit there and watch it go downhill. People have been coming here for 20 years telling you stop, stop, stop, but nobody cared. You got your votes, you got your people that were voting for you, you got a thousand city workers voting for you, but the people are leaving. Pretty soon you will only have the nonprofits and city workers, and I don't now how are going to survive like that.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Good evening,
Council, Marie Schumacher. First, I'd like
to congratulate Councilman Gaughan on the
birth of his son.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And wish them all well. Now to business, before you went on your whatever, you were promising a revised recovery plan listing or matrix that was going to show the timing and the status of -- has that matrix been received?

MR. EVANS: No, it hasn't. I'm

sorry, no, it hasn't. A couple of the meetings -- sorry. A couple of the meetings were postponed for different reasons so we haven't had a chance to get that done yet, but I'll ask them about that.

MS. SCHUMACHER: It seems to be taking an awful long time, and speaking of PEL, I'll jump down, is it the 15th of this month that the budget is due to PEL for them to come up with their recommendations?

MR. EVANS: I don't think it's the 15th of this month. I thought it was --

MS. SCHUMACHER: 15th of September.

MR. EVANS: We have a meeting on Monday -- no, we don't have a meeting this week because of the holiday so I'll check on that and make sure that's the date.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, and then how will that -- will that be the same budget that you guys receive in November or what is the process from the time the City submits it to PEL and does council have to act on that budget or is that totally the administration?

MR. EVANS: Well, at that point it's

1 the administration, but when we see the 2 budget we will have an opportunity to 3 comment and amend the budget as we see fit. 4 MS. SCHUMACHER: After PEL has made 5 the recommendation? MR. EVANS: Right. We are part of 6 the process as well. We have a seat at the 7 8 table at the PEL meeting so if that comes 9 down we will have an opportunity to comment. 10 MS. SCHUMACHER: But it's not very 11 transparent to the public what's going on 12 there. 13 MR. EVANS: Well, that's --14 MR. WECHSLER: It doesn't exist yet 15 to be transparent. It can't be transparent 16 if it hasn't been presented to us or anyone 17 else. 18 MR. EVANS: Well, our meetings are 19 open to the public, the PEL meetings you 20 could sit in on those any time. 21 MR. SCHUMACHER: The what? 22 MR. EVANS: The PEL meetings that we 23 have on Mondays. 24 MS. SCHUMACHER: Are open to the 25 public?

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MR. EVANS: Are they open to the public?

MS. SCHUMACHER: I don't believe so.

MR. EVANS: Oh, I thought they were.

MS. SCHUMACHER: They are or they

aren't?

MR. EVANS: No, they're not.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I didn't think so.

Now, at the Pension Board meeting for non-uniform it came to the surface at the last meeting, as I'm sure Lori has probably advised you, that the Pension Board does not have subpoena power, so a lot of the information that would be valuable for untangling this mess that just goes from month to month you people do have the subpoena power, so I would like to make a recommendation that you review the material and where the wholes are and where it would be good to talk to people, I know for instance when I went back and listened to those tapes from the meeting on doubling the taxes I believe it was Gary Dibileo when it was introduced said something to the effect, "Well, I'm voting for it to get it on the

agenda, but there is some issues," and then it sailed through without any comment so what happened? I mean, I would like --

MR. EVANS: Well, I know there is still hearings that are still ongoing and also the FBI and the state police are still involved.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, their hearings, but the Pension Board is operating without that power and without the ability to talk to those people where there are questions that might clear up the mess and so I'm doing a suggesting you might want to consider who should be called in and get to the bottom of this and get it resolved. It would be nice to start the new year with that not hanging over our heads for both of the people who are effected and the taxpayers.

And then something that's been bothering me, Mr. Evans, since July you made this statement, "According to the information we received recently there are 2,400 businesses that would pay a payroll tax and there is an approximately 340 that

are paying the mercantile tax. What this -what that tells me is that it would be a
broader, more equal tax because people
aren't paying the mercantile tax now
anyway."

May I finish?

MR. EVANS: Yeah.

MS. SCHUMACHER: "It's a voluntary tax that probably one-third of the businesses are paying."

Now, I don't see any place where the mercantile tax is listed as voluntarily, number one. Number two, all businesses collect the LST tax from their employees' paychecks so the tax office knows who the businesses are and how can we have only 340 businesses out of 2,400 paying the tax? Are those accurate numbers?

MR. EVANS: According to analysis by a consultant that was working for PEL, yes, they are, or they are close to being very, very accurate.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Why?

MR. EVANS: That's the question.

MR. GAUGHAN: That's a good

question, that's what we asked.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I mean, if you have the identification of all of these people --

MR. EVANS: Not everybody that has payroll is eligible to pay the mercantile tax.

MS. SCHUMACHER: I know that, but you can go and write a letter and have them if they are going to tell you if they are not -- for what reasons they are not eligible, but this is crazy.

MR. EVANS: It is.

 $\label{eq:MS.SCHUMACHER:} \textbf{MS. SCHUMACHER:} \quad \textbf{It's sort of like}$  the trash tax.

MR. EVANS: You are absolutely right, it's exactly like the trash tax and the reason I call it voluntarily is because you don't get a bill for the mercantile tax, you get a property tax bill, you know, other bills you get, you don't get a bill for that so if you don't voluntarily pay it then somebody has to go out and ask you to pay it.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, isn't that what the tax office is for? They've got

1 eight or ten people down there. Come on. 2 MR. EVANS: I'm not making excuses, 3 I'm just --MS. SCHUMACHER: It sounds like it. 4 5 MR. EVANS: No, not at all. MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, has anybody 6 sat DOWN and talked with them and asked them 7 8 that simple question? 9 MR. EVANS: Well, this information 10 -- again, this is information we just 11 received in July so we are absolutely going 12 to look into that. Yeah, I've had this 13 conversation with PEL almost on a weekly 14 basis what we are going to do about it and I found it outrageous. 15 16 MR. GAUGHAN: I have been on those 17 meetings and it is outrageous. 18 MS. SCHUMACHER: But has anybody 19 talked to the tax collector? Like I said, 20 you have -- I mean, I just don't understand 21 why, it's almost the 9th of September, two months, could have been down there on the 22 23 10th and asked a simple question, I mean. 24 MR. EVANS: Well, we are going to 25 get to the bottom of it, it's not something

1 we are taking lightly. 2 MS. SCHUMACHER: Well --3 MR. EVANS: Because this is very 4 much part of our budget discussions when we 5 have asked -- being asked for property owners to increase taxes and then we have 6 7 voluntary tax like the mercantile tax to be 8 paid at less than 30 percent. 9 MS. SCHUMACHER: It's outrageous. 10 MR. EVANS: It is. 11 MS. SCHUMACHER: It really is 12 outrageous, and the same with the trash tax, 13 do we know? Now the second payment was 14 due--MR. WECHSLER: Yes. Thank you, Mrs. 15 16 Schumacher. 17 MS. SCHUMACHER: Do we have the 18 numbers? 19 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Is there 20 anyone else who wishes to address council? 21 MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. 22 MOTIONS. MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Evans. 23 24 MR. EVANS: Just a very brief 25 comment on the budget since that came up

tonight quite a bit. We know that discussions will be taking place in the near future and I have been very clear on my unsupport of the Amoroso plan which called for 18 percent in 2015, 6 percent in 2016 and 6 percent in 2017. Last year, the increase was 18.99, which effectively is 19 percent. So I had stated previously that my threshold is 5 percent as far as the tax increase is concerned for 2016.

It's that simple. Double digit tax increases have had a devastating impact on housing, values, our neighborhoods, development, and growth within the city and this is year it has to stop. I telegraphed this last year at budget time, I'm stating it again, so if you see a budget with more than 5 percent then I will make numerous amendments to that budget. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Gaughan?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes. Thank you, I have quite a few. First, I'd like to welcome everyone back, we had a very busy recess and as Mrs. Schumacher noted my wife and I had our son, Jack, on August 12 and he

is healthy and is doing well, so that's good news.

I've asked Mrs. Reed to send a letter to the mayor asking for an update on you progress of the \$1 million in savings from the new police and fire contracts. I want to know how much we've saved so far and if they are on track to hit \$1 million in savings which is what the mayor proposed when we were voting on these two contracts back in January.

I have also asked Chief Graziano for a report on how much revenue has been collected to date from the civilian parking enforcement. The administration was expecting to see \$300,000 from this new program.

I am concerned about that we may fall short in our collection of the LT tax. At the PEL meeting this past Monday, I asked if we were on track to meet what was budgeted for 2015 and the answer was that we were very behind. To date we have collected \$2,235,256.48. We budgeted \$4,287,500. I asked for a letter to be sent to the mayor

and the business administrator. We did receive information back from the business administrator with a correspondence from the Single Tax Office. The Single Tax Office does not believe we are reach the budgeted amount because the fourth quarter of 2015 isn't due until January 31, 2016. This year's collection will include the fourth quarter of 2014, which is at the old rate. I would like an explanation from Mayor Courtright as to what the plan is to makeup for this possible and likely shortfall and what ramifications will be for the 2016 budget should we not hit that mark.

I also asked for an update on the status of the Police and Fire Pension
Board's transfer of the plans management to the Pennsylvania Municipal Retirement system. The mayor sent a letter to the unions on June 25 requesting that this be done so I'd like to get an update on that.

I've also asked for a letter to be sent to the mayor, business administrator and law department asking for an update and explanation on a proposal that was received

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by the city on January 26 in response to the City's request for proposals for life, disability and dental insurance. I'd like to know why a contract has not been awarded yet when significant savings were identified in a memo dated April 10 from Dave Bulzoni to the mayor, Jason Shrive, our office, and Rebecca McMullen. What has occurred from April until today? And if you look at the memo, it is noted that there are significant savings in the area of \$300,000 so this occurred back in January and then April what is the hold up on this? So I do want an explanation by next Thursday as to what's going on there.

Councilman Wechsler proposed awhile ago that all open city positions should be advertised in the newspaper and on the website, which I think is a great idea. I'd like a response from the mayor to see if there is any effort to prepare legislation to make this mandatory, if not, I think we should, as Councilman Wechsler mentioned, prepare legislation and make this happen.

There was a letter that was sent

July 28, 2015, to all City of Scranton plumbing contractors notifying them that an additional \$50 inspection fee was being levied for residential plumbing inspections. I did inquire if this would have to come before council approval. We did find out the other day that it does not. The fee will be in place until the city hires a plumbing inspector and Northeast Inspection Consultant has a \$50 fee in their contract so that is the reason for that increase so as soon as the city hires a plumbing inspector that fee will disappear.

I attended a very interesting meeting on Monday concerning recycling in the City of Scranton. As you know, the city just hired a recycling consultant per a recommendation from the state. It's clear to me after this meeting with Joyce Hatala, who is our consultant, Barbara Geoclat and Pat Munley from Lackawanna County's Environmental Office Recycling Department, and member of DEP that we have a major issue with recycling in the City of Scranton.

For example, and this is just one

example, if you look at the tonnage that we report for the yard and leaf waste, and this is the 2013 numbers, that's the report that this woman had, we are collecting 70 tons. Wilkes-Barre collects 9,122 tons of yard waste, yard and leaf waste a year. We are losing out on funding because of this and we need to find a way to fix it.

There are a few other issues, lack of recycling at the housing projects throughout the city, lack of recycling downtown, lack of recycling in apartment buildings, and the lack of reporting from commercial sites throughout the city. We do plan on having a follow-up meeting with our DPW director who could not be there because of vacation that was already scheduled.

Fortunately, Mrs. Hatala, our consultant, is preparing a report that outlines our issues as it relates to recycling and what we need to do to fix them and we'll keep everyone updated on that as we move along.

I attended a Hill Neighborhood meeting a few weeks ago and there were a

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number of issues that were forwarded to the appropriate departments and we will keep track of them until they are all taken care of.

On the paving program, the city's paving project 2 1/2 million that we have been talking about for the last few months is being done in phases. Right now there are three phases that have been bid out. Phase one, paving includes the downtown and Greenridge. Phase two includes North Scranton, West Scranton and Keyser Valley, and Phase three includes South Scranton, Minooka and East Mountain and the Hill section. It's my request that the city publish all city streets that will be paved on our website so we can keep the citizens informed. I did have additional questions regarding some streets that were on our final list that council received that didn't make it on the RFP's and I'm awaiting response from our DPW Director and City Engineer John Pocius so I'll get together with them tomorrow.

Phase one bids have been received

and opened on August 31. The two companies that submitted bids were American Asphalt and Krieger Construction and the bids will be reviewed and a decision will be made so we'll start to see paving done in the down town and Greenridge.

I have also asked for the fourth time that the DPW collection schedule be put online, so hopefully we will see that done in the near future, and we also need trash cans for the downtown. There has been some complaints from the downtown business owners that there is some problems with trash downtown so we'll try to cake care of that. And that is all I have this week. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr.

Gaughan. Now I know why I let you go first.

I just have a few things. Number one,
concerning the fire in downtown it was a
special circumstance for our department and
I think we all can agree that an amazing job
was done, but I did contact Chief DeSarno
today because a lot of the special equipment
and a lot of special fire suppression stuff

like the foam had to be used by the city. also understand that fact that the equipment was down by the fire so long and suffered some possible damage from the fumes, also some of the equipment that the firemen wore may also have been effected by the extra use that was taken on in the fire. The question I had for Chief DeSarno was is if there is anything in the insurance policy of the owner of that building that might help us recoup some of those losses. I know the owners of the building pays taxes and fire service is a part of that service, but I'm just wondering if there is any extending circumstances that we may be able to recoup some of the extra expenses that the city incurred because of the time that they spent down on that fire.

One other thing, today we did swear in a new class of firefighters. It's been a long time in coming and it will help us to alleviate some of the overtime when these people come on and also they are a part of the new contract agreement so they will be starting at a lower rate before they get up

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to full rate so I wish all of those young men luck and I know they will make the city very proud, and I do have some other comments as we move through the agenda, but that's all.

"It is our professional engineering opinion within a reasonable degree of engineering judgment -- " this is actually from John Pocius, our city engineer -- "that a stop sign with an except right turn below it be installed at the northwesterly intersection of Ridge Avenue and Ash Street. It is also our professional engineering opinion that the existing one-way sign be removed at the intersection of the Ridge Avenue and Myrtle Street and a

new one-way sign be installed on a channel there. Also, an additional one-way sign should be installed near 927 Ridge Avenue so hopefully that will alleviate some major public safety issues that were occurring in that area.

Also, a gentlemen about a month or two ago came to council requesting a stop sign at Ferdinand Street and Sweeney Avenue, our city engineer performed a study and it is their opinion that additional stop signs were not warranted at this intersection.
